





However, a full report on every visit made by members of the Administration is filed with each Executive Committee member, and those of our readers who have a particular interest in any such reports should ask their nearest Executive Member or approach the National Office. This is an important part of our improved communications and we are anxious to share the information with as many people as possible.

Many of the activities in which the Association is becoming involved are very time consuming. If the result is an improved member service or improved status for the Association, the time is well invested. However, the Administrative Unit recently reached the stage where service started to drop off quite dramatically.

Fortunately, the change was quickly noticed and was equally quickly resolved. The result is that our staff has been increased, and on behalf of our readers, a warm welcome is extended to Miss Irene Coghlan, whose prime responsibility will be to control the accounting side of the operation. Irene has had a wealth of shooting sports experience, having been previously on the staff of Michaelis Bayley, and is also a regular competitor at Victorian gun clubs. Irene's home Club is Melbourne.

Back to more mundane things, memberships continue to come in and at the beginning of May, the roll included 8700 names compared with 7554 at the same time in 1977 and 6494 in 1976. Keep spreading the good word about our sport — our membership target for 1978 is 11,000.

International Shooting Scene.

Part One

Since the successful conclusion of the South Pacific Championships conducted at Melbourne Gun Club at Easter, letters have been received from a number of competing countries expressing appreciation of the standard of the competition and the associated functions. This response tends to confirm the belief that there is a place for an annual competition of this kind. Quite obviously, the venue cannot always be in Australia — in fact, moves have already taken place to arrange a four-nation International match in New Caledonia late in 1979.

Moving back to this year's event -- congratulations, Melbourne Gun Club, you did it "bonzer"!

As this report is being prepared, decisions on the size of Australia's team for the Commonwealth Games are due to be made. The A.C.T.A. Administrative Unit is busily engaged in preparing dossiers on each of the shotgun team members, to be included in a submission the Association has been asked to prepare for the Australian Shooting Association.

It is indeed unfortunate that fund-raising activities have not borne the financial fruit that had been anticipated. Almost certainly this will mean a reduction in the overall team size, and the Association will be doing its damn best to ensure that the competitors already selected get their chance to represent Australia at Edmonton.

You know, it is difficult to believe some of the actions and decisions of the Australian Commonwealth Games Committee! For example, early in March this year, the Federal Government announced a grant of \$225,000 to the Australian Commonwealth Games Committee, \$75,000 of which was to be utilised for pre-departure team training. The Association representing sports included in the Commonwealth Games program were invited to submit applications for a share of the "spoils"! The A.C.T.A. quickly prepared an application, the basis of which was to be a training camp of two weeks duration, aimed at bringing the shotgun competitors right to a peak of readiness. It has now been announced that a decision on the actual distribution of the \$75,000 won't be made before the end of June. As the team is due to depart from Sydney on July 23rd, it doesn't leave much time to get organised does it? MAYBE THE AUSTRALIAN COMMONWEALTH GAMES COMMITTEE NEEDS A BIT OF A SHAKE UP, EH?

Talking of International Teams, all Australian shooters should be very proud of the performance produced by the Glenn Cup Trap Team, which has just returned from New Zealand. Consisting of Smith, Cosgrove, Iles, Kable, Byrne and Maxwell it "killed" the Kiwis on their home ground. The scores were Australia 118 to New Zealand 114. This is the first time that Australia has selected its Glenn Cup team specially for the purpose, and the exercise must be considered as successful.

The Glenn Cup was donated by a past President of the N.Z.C.T.A., the late Tom Glenn, for trap competition between the two countries, and in DTL competition, rates in importance second behind the Mackintosh Trophy. Congratulations, boys!

Significant Increase in Commonwealth Assistance for 1978 Games Team

The Federal Minister responsible for Sport, Mr Ray Groom, M.P., recently announced a grant of \$225,000 to the Australian Commonwealth Games Association for the 1978 Games in Edmonton, Canada.

Mr Groom said that \$75,000 of the grant was to assist with preevent training. The balance of \$150,000 was to help meet other team costs including travel, outfitting, accommodation and daily allowances.

"This is the first time a grant for pre-event training has been given. It is a reflection of the Government's concern to ensure that athletes have adequate opportunities to be at their peak for Games events in August," Mr Groom said.

The total grant of \$225,000 is a significant increase on the \$35,000 allocation for Australia's team at the 1974 Games in Christchurch, New Zealand.

This year's grant enables the Australian Commonwealth Games Association to plan the rest of its fund-raising campaign with confidence.

"This grant, in addition to the \$1m previously allocated for sport in 1977-78, confirms the Government's commitment to improving the standards of performance of Australian athletes and of assisting voluntary sporting organisations." Mr Groom said.

The final distribution of the funds for pre-event training will be discussed with the Commonwealth Games Association, the relevant national sports associations and the Sports Advisory Council. Mr Groom said, "The Council will advise me on the most effective use of the funds."

Mr Groom said he hoped that the impetus given to the fund raising campaign by this significant Commonwealth Government contribution would be complemented by the business community and the public.

"In this co-operative way all Australians will be able to contribute to the success of the fund raising appeal and to Australia's success in Edmonton."

Trade Topics ...

The editorial staff of any Trade magazines connected with the Firearms and Ammunition industry must be having a ball at present. The reason — the industry is going through a period of readjustment unparallelel in its history. Rumour follows rumour, and the shuffle of staff between the various Companies reminds one of a giant chess game.

Almost every major Company connected with the wholesale and distribution sector of the trade has been "mentioned in despatches" in recent days. Unfortunately, space restrictions are such that only those moves most important to shotgunners can be reported in this page.

Some of the moves can be classed as GOOD NEWS and into this category comes the report of additional staff joining Boustead Trading, the Remington agents. Geoff Willick, who had eight years with Boustead before moving to Bearing Service Company early last year, has rejoined the Company as National Sales Manager. Also "returning to the fold" is Geoff Carr, who is taking up a position as Sales Supervisor, N.S.W., with Boustead. Geoff started his career in firearms with the original Boustead Wood Pty Ltd., and left about eight years ago to head up the Winchester Sales team in N.S.W.

He then moved to Guthrie Trading Co., before returning to Boustead. These senior staff appointments indicate that in these changing times, Boustead Trading expect to continue selling Remington products for some time yet. The Company's sales range has recently been extended to include Burris telescopic sights and mounts, and Williams shooting accessories both from U.S.A.

Eley Ammunition is again in the news in relation to staff moves. John McLaughlan who has had senior responsibilities for the Nutting and Young range of general sporting goods for NSW left during early April to take up a position as State Sales Manager for Henselite which is the big name in Lawn Bowls. The reorganisation that has been taking place within the Eley machine since last October has certainly created some new faces in the Sales area.





The "New Zealand Style" NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

From 1st till 8th April, well over 400 Kiwis and Aussies "did battle" at Christchurch Gun Club during the 1978 New Zealand National Championships.

The facilities at this Club are most extensive and of a high standard (one would expect this as the Club was the venue for the 1974 Commonwealth Games). Club President Jack Claydon and his band of helpers worked right up to the deathknock to ensure that all competitors and visitors enjoyed the best possible conditions.

Almost 150 Australians had crossed the Tasman for this match, including 90 shooters. Seventy of the total had travelled with the first official ACTA travel group. The balance had either travelled "privately" or through the Wagga Travel Service package. The ACTA-sponsored groups (one out of each of the three eastern Australian ports — Brisbane, Sydney and Melbourne) arrived at Christchurch in the middle of a "war" between Customs officials and the local press. The result was that the Customs officials seemed to be more diligent than usual and clearance took a little longer than one would expect.





N.Z. Nationals (Cont'd)

The group stayed at the White Heron Hotel, which is situated only 400 metres from the Airport and ten minutes drive from the Gun Club. The arrangements made by Jetset Tours to transfer the groups from the Airport to the White Heron ran like clockwork and even the group which arrived at midnight was safely tucked into bed with a minimum of fuss or delay.

The standard of the hotel was first class with all services that a tourist could ever require. The staff were extremely courteous and obliging and their assistance in setting up tours and excursions for the non-shooters was very much appreciated.

Getting back to the shooting, Saturday saw the start of the N.Z. ISU Skeet Championship and the N.Z. Ball Trap Championship. Weather conditions were quite cool when a total of 165 shooters faced the "starter's gun". Of these, 144 were shooting the Ball Trap and 21 had entered the ISU Skeet. Woolley was there, confident of winning the Skeet. However Australia had sneaked Alex Crikis past the New Zealand immigration authorities, as their big gun. Unfortunately, Alex was suffering some post-South Pacific Championship reaction

and after dropping eight targets in the first hundred, found that he had given Woolley too much of a start and therefore allowed Woolley to reverse the result from the South Pacific Championships (which was won by Crikis) to win with a score of 195/200. Crikis was second and Graeme Webber (NZ) third.

In the Ball Trap Match, Australians dominated the scene with Iles, Byrne, Berry and Peter Telford of Mt Gambier all producing good scores. It was odd to see the event being shot in such a way that a competitor shot his 50 targets in two successive 25's. It seems more logical where a match is scheduled for two days, to shoot one round on each day. This should provide greater equity in the competition and also could result in maintaining interest at a higher level. The match resulted in Neil Berry filling first place, Trevor Byrne second and Peter Telford third—an all Australian finish.

It was most unfortunate that due to a breakdown in communications it was not known until after the placings had been resolved that the firearms, which had been donated to be presented to the winner and the competitor placed second, could be won only by New Zealand resident competitors. Thus Berry and Byrne were "paper winners", or so it seemed. Certainly, Neil Berry had won one of the most prized trophies in New Zealand — the highly regarded "Silver Fern" which is presented to all National Champions. After consultations between representatives of the Australian Clay Target Association and the President and Vice Presidents (two) of the New Zealand Clay Target Association, agreement was reached that two replacement trophies would be provided. The NZ Association is to be commended for the fair-mindedness demonstrated by its senior Executive during the issue. Nevertheless, it is a matter which will need to be officially resolved before the 1979 New Zealand Nationals.

Monday was the day scheduled for the New Zealand Standard Skeet Championship. Attracting an entry of 260 competitors, it was keenly contested in very cold windy conditions. Five skeet grounds were in use, and the organisation was first class. There was no hustle or bustle, yet the match was over in a very creditable time. Bill Stevens (newly appointed Queensland Director of Coaching) who had shown good form in the Ball Trap Match continued to show good form and finished with a 50 along with four other New Zealanders. The eventual winner was Jim McKenzie, a very worthy National Champion and a wonderful sportsman. Stevens was second, to the delight of the Aussie supporters and Keith Isitt was third.





Shooting Championships stood him in good stead and he became the 1978 New Zealand Clay Sparrow Champion. John is a hell of a nice fellow and a great sportsman. The minor placings were filled by G. Paton (NZ) and I. Burt (NZ).

At this stage the leader of the Australian delegation, National Vice President Ron Porter was beginning to think that the rest of the Aussies must have gone fishing. He was seen in deep consultation with New Zealand Director of Coaching ("Bricky" Gunn) and his senior advisers — Colin Stott N.Z. President and Ivan Boyce, South Inland Vice President. There were suggestions of midnight training camps (some of the fellows took the hint as at least one well-known Australian trap shot was seen running around the streets at about 3.30 the next MORNING), breakfast pep talks and even the possibility of sending to Australia for reinforcements.

Whatever decision was reached didn't work very well because the Australian shooters continued to be kept in the background during the New Zealand Single Barrel Championship, which was the event held on Wednesday. 327 shooters competed and steadily missed targets, dropping out of contention one by one until the eventual winner (the last man standing, so to speak) was popular Southlander Ewan Pirie, with veteran John Thomson (NZ) second and J. Tindale (NZ) third.

At this stage of the program it was quite apparent that those who held views such as creating a special division for Overseas Visitors or making Australians ineligible for certain championships were way off beam. The facts are that New Zealand shooters are equal to any others in the South Pacific area, so Kiwis, develop some confidence in your own abilities.

Following completion of the National Single Barrel Championship the International Visitors vs. New Zealand Teams Match was held. Although competitors representing New Caledonia, Tahiti, Great Britain, America and Australia were present, the only countries which could manage a team were New Zealand and Australia. Scored on a points basis, teams of six shot at 20 targets per shooter. Australia's team was selected using scores from the Single Barrel Championship, and included John Maxwell, Alex Crikis, Bob Smith, Barry Kable, Neil Berry and Len Anderson.

The scores were New Zealand, 334 points and Australia 342 points, resulting in a comfortable win to Australia.

By Thursday, the supporters group had forgotten what it was like to have an Aussie on the placings rostrum. An early morning visit to a Maori witchdoctor by Ron Porter, accompanied by Bill Iles and Colin Ennis (Dysart Q'land) was arranged. Ron arrived back at the ground, accompanied by his advisers (they must be advisers, they





are always talking) and there seemed to be an air of confidence about them. A little later, soon after the start of the New Zealand Pointscore Championship, in which there were 309 entries, Ron was seen in earnest conversation with one of the senior members of the Australian group, Bill Stevens. A ripple of interest ran through the crowd when Ron Porter was seen to brandish an axe, but it wasn't until later in the day that it all became clear.

The Pointscore Championship was won by Bill Stevens (he said it was only coincidence, eh?) which proved to be a great birthday present for him. In a shoot-off Bill survived from popular Bill Brunton (NZ) who will be known to many Australians who were at the Brisbane Nationals, while in third place was Bruce Anderson (NZ) who also developed his skill at the Brisbane Nationals.

And so the program entered its last day of Open competition -Friday. Weather-wise, conditions were perfect when 362 shooters "fronted" for the Premier Event — New Zealand Single Rise Championship which is the equivalent to Australia's Double Barrel event. The quality of the competition was high with many shooters shooting rounds of 25's in the clear conditions. However, 50's were elusive and after a brief shoot-off Vin Ryan stood as the Single Rise Champion.

Vin was in New Zealand after having won a return Air New Zealand ticket at the Wagga Gun Club Australia Day program. However, it wasn't an easy victory as the "cunning old devil", Jim McKenzie, matched Vin shot for shot until finally falling in a hole. New Zealander R. Everett was third.

The Single Rise was followed by the Glenn Cup Trap Match. Australia's official team consisted of Barry Kable, Bob Smith, Bill Iles, Des Cosgrove, John Maxwell and Trevor Byrne. The team was supported by Air New Zealand and had been selected prior to leaving Australia. This was the first occasion that such a procedure had been used and provides an indication of how seriously the Australian Clay Target Association views the Glenn Cup International Trap Match.

The match was shot in two rounds each of 10 targets per shooter. Australia shot first and was one target down after the first round, with New Zealand's team dropping two targets. Early in the second round, the Australians dropped another target to finish with 118/120.

This left New Zealand to shoot a persect score in the second round to tie. The pressure was too much and the final New Zealand score was 114/120, thus giving the Aussies a convincing win. Executives of the NZ Association and the Australian contingent leaders then entertained members of both teams and their supporters at a small celebration party on the ground.

The only remaining shooting activity was the New Zealand section of the Mackintosh International Teams' Match, which was to be con-

ducted on the Saturday morning.

One of the features of the visit by the various groups from Australia was the alternative attractions provided to hold the interest of those not wishing to compete. Tours of Christchurch, full and two day coach tours, and a combination of coach and air travel were among the ideas available and it was encouraging to see so many take part in these activities.

Still on the social side, the official Social sponsored by the New Zealand Association proved to be a very enjoyable night, and it was disappointing to see it so poorly supported by Australian visitors. During the night Delegation leader, Ron Porter, presented a copper



Black is Beautiful — or is it?

Targets have always been black, after all it is their natural colour — but, have we made a rod for our own backs?

The old adage says "If you can't see them, you can't shoot them" and I suggest that now more than ever before many shooters just don't see the target they call for quickly enough. Remember that with the new metric distances and I.S.U. Regulations we shoot from further back and at a much faster moving target.

Black as a colour does not break any records for being distinctive. Against a blue sky it does stand out, but it takes time for the target to lift over the horizon line and into the sky and here is where I think many shooters lose out. Also, of course, the blue sky school does not make any allowances for dull or cloudy days and we get a lot of these too.

Here is another thought: Lots of shooters have seen age 45 go by. No! That does not mean they are finished, but from age 45 the eyes just cannot focus or range as fast as they used too. Many of these shooters express difficulty and start to talk of giving the game away—missing too many targets—by the way the missed target is expensive. 10-12 cents for the target and 10 cents for each of 2 cartridges, total 32 cents—but the greatest problem is the gradual loss of personal pride which accompanies these off-days. The build up of these bad days spells the end of their club life and gun clubs need every member they can get and keen.

meed every member they can get and keep.

Most of us have seen trench shooting. Have you noticed the extensive use of painted targets. Not just ordinary paint either, usually fluorescent. The idea is to recognise the target immediately it comes into view. In Europe you go a long way to find any black targets being used. Germany and Italy shoot bright orange or yellow top targets. In France too, yellow top targets are almost exclusively used.

Why? Work it out for yourself! When you call for a target you have to see it immediately, no good finding it 2 feet over the trap roof, you must see it the instant it comes into view, then follow, get in front and shoot. 90% of all missed targets are missed because the shooter shot behind the target, he just didn't catch up and get in front. Doesn't this happen because the shooter didn't see the target soon enough?

Cost — Colour targets cost more than black targets say the clubs! Yes, this is a fact, they do but only 1-1½ cents more and most clubs who shoot coloured targets do not have prices any different from those who shoot only black targets.

Here is an interesting footnote: "Callawadda Gun Club, Western Victoria."

Black targets have been used in the past but over the past two years a gradual change to coloured targets has been made. Here the Committee and the club members used to do a spot of colour conversion but in January this year they decided to start purchasing bulk supplies of painted targets from one of the manufacturers. In 1970 the Club record for a competition target break was 121 targets and this remained unbroken for the next seven years then at the January shoot this year, 1978, using coloured targets a new Club record was established, 134 broken targets then again at the March shoot this year, only last month, once again using coloured targets the record was raised to 167 targets broken."



Executive Committee Meeting Adelaide, March

The following report includes the items of main interest to arise from the Executive Committee Meeting held in March during the National Championships in Adelaide. It should be recorded that again the Executive Committee was involved in long hours of meeting and this is a reflection of the increased number of activities in which the Association is steadily becoming involved. The responsibilities resting on the shoulders of the Executive Committee are steadily increasing and it is to their credit that they continue to show the dedication and enthusiasm that they do. The attendance was good with the only absentees being Arthur Kenna, who was detained at work and Phillip Mules who was required to assist with the conduct of the pre-Nationals matches.

Resignation of Mr R. F. Buchan

Due to the resignation of Mr Buchan (see reference elsewhere in this issue) Mr Bill Abbott from Werribee, Victoria, was appointed to fill the casual vacancy. Furthermore the Executive Committee accepted a recommendation that Mr Abbott's appointment be extended to continue through to the 1979 Annual General Meeting.

Sub-Committees

As a direct result of the Association's increasing range of activities a number of sub-committees have been created to assist with responsible decision making in these new areas. The sub-committees now include the following:

- (a) Nationals Sub-Committee this committee is charged with the responsibility of both reviewing past Nationals and planning coming Nationals with a view to ensuring that each is better than the last.
- (b) Clay Target Shooting News Sub-Committee the purpose of this sub-committee is mainly to exercise a watching brief over the calling and allocating of tenders for the production of Clay Target Shooting News. Agreement has been reached that tenders shall be called later this year.
- (c) ISU Sub-Committee the purpose of this committee is to provide detailed control on the activities of the various clubs with UIT type facilities. The committee also acts as a link between the Australian Shooting Association and the full ACTA Executive.
- (d) Development Sub-Committee this sub committee was specially created at the last Executive Meeting essentially as a short-term sub-committee and was given the task of considering a number of the thoughts raised by the Development Blueprint. It reported back to the second of the two Committee meetings held in Adelaide.
- (e) National Coaching Council although this cannot be considered to be a sub-committee of the National Executive the opportunity is taken at each Executive Committee meeting to have the National Coaching Director report on progress to the full Executive Committee. In this way the communication system is as effective as is possible.

In addition to the above the structure of the core group was altered to include one additional member of the Executive Committee and to remove the voting power from the Secretary. The core group now includes Messrs Hawkins (National President), Porter (National Vice President), Holtfreter (W.A.) and in an ex officio capacity the Secretary, Noel Southey. The importance of this core group is becoming more and more noticeable because of the need to make many more day to day decisions than has been the case in the past. It is the policy of the Association that the core group will meet at least once between Executive Committee meetings — of course the opportunity exists to call it together at any time should the need justify it.

1979 Fees

As reported earlier the Executive Committee recommended to the Annual General Meeting which in turn approved the recommendation that fees for 1979 be increased. Thus the standard adult fee for 1979 will be \$20, the second family member fee has been increased from \$8 to \$10 whilst the junior fee remains at \$1. In addition it is now the policy of the Association to transfer to each State Association an amount equal to \$1 per registered shooter from each State, and in this way, State Associations now have the opportunity to depend on regular funding.

National Championships Roster

The forward roster for National Championships has been confirmed as follows: 1979 - Griffith, NSW. 1980 - Perth, W.A. 1981 - Tasmania (venue yet to be named). 1982 - Victoria (venue yet to be named).

There was some discussion about the possibility of altering the timing of the Nationals so as they will be slotted into the second half of the calendar year — however this poses some major policy problems, particularly in relation to competition in the Mackintosh International Teams Match together with a need to hold the Associations Annual General Meeting within a certain time of the end of the financial year under review.

Recognition of Length of Membership

The Executive Committee considered a suggestion put forward by Don Corstorphan of Colac, Victoria (which had received the support of the Victorian Clay Target Association) that ACTA registered shooters who have achieved a certain length of service and a certain age, for example 30 years service at 70 years of age be given some sort of concessional membership. The National Secretary has been directed to prepare further information on this subject and present it to the next Executive Committee meeting.

Suspension of Shooter

Following a breach of safety standards which occurred at a major gun club earlier in 1978 which resulted in a recommendation for suspension of the shooter coming from the New South Wales Clay Target Association the full Executive Committee confirmed a three month suspension commencing from the date of the incident. This suspension expired on the 3rd of April.

Domestic Travel Policy

Agreement was reached that Ansett Airlines of Australia be appointed official Domestic Travel Consultants to the Australian Clay Target Association.

Rules Supervisor's Discussion Panel

It was agreed that moves should be implemented to commence the review of shooting rules which is due to be completed by September 1980. The Rules Committee was restructured and consists of the Rules Supervisors from each State. It is to be hoped that a number of senior shooters who have strong opinions in relation to rules will take the opportunity of forwarding their opinions to either the National Office or to one of the Rules Supervisors. Rules Supervisors are as follows: Q'ld - Mr Ron Porter. NSW - Messrs Hawkins and Rowe. Vic - Messrs Buchan and Biggs. Tas. - Mr D. R. Taylor. S.A. - Mr R. C. Mules. W.A. - Mr R. Bailey.

The revision of the rules is a major step forward in the forward planning of the National Association and therefore any assistance available from shooters will be greatly appreciated.

Import of an Overseas Coach

This matter was raised purely out of interest in an attempt to get the opinion of the National Coaching Director on such a project. The National Coaching Director was very clear in his attitude in that Australia is nowhere near yet ready for an overseas coach to come to Australia. There are a number of tasks which need to be treated with much more urgency particularly in view of the relatively recent formation of our National Coaching Directorate.

The following matters were raised at the second meeting of the Executive Committee in Adelaide — this meeting was conducted in the South Australian Gun Club rooms on the evening of Monday the

Appointment of Vice President

The National President, Mr Ern Hawkins expressed gratitude on behalf of the Executive Committee and all shooters in Australia for the tremendous dedication shown by Mr Ron Porter during his term as National Vice President. Nominations were then called for the position for the ensuing year and as Mr Porter was the only nomination he was declared elected unopposed. Since then of course Ron has been delegation leader of the group which travelled to New Zealand and performed his official duties there with the sort of courage and dedication to which we have become accustomed.

Reimbursement of Antibes Team

Following receipt of a substantial grant from the Federal Government which carried the condition that it must be used to develop International competition overseas, the National Executive approved an ISU Sub-Committee recommendation that some of the funds be used to provide a refund of the personal expenditure incurred by members of the 1977 World Championships team. This gesture was well received by most members of the team and certainly resulted in substantially minimising the individual's expense.

National Coaching Council -Seminar

The first public project of the National Coaching Council will be held at the Melbourne Gun Club (Victoria) on June 18th. At this time, the complete Council will be meeting in Melbourne. The opportunity will be taken to offer their coaching services, to ALL shooters who can get along. The Full Day Seminar will commence at 9.30 a.m. and is predominantly directed at novice shooters or hunters who would like to take up clay target shooting.

There will be a series of class room sessions in the morning followed by a question and answer session. The afternoon will be taken up with personalised shooting instruction in either Trap or Skeet by a panel of Australia's most knowledgeable trainers. There will be a ground fee of \$3, which includes a BBQ lunch.



Whilst Mr. Weatherby has a propensity towards Roman names for his smoothbores, Pat Browne poses the question 'Whither goest thou' Mr. Weatherby with your aristocratic sounding shotguns?

Many, many years ago, one Roy Weatherby threw down a challenge to the big game men of the world, that he could produce a boit action rifle to replace the old double rifle of the day. To lots of big game hunters, Mr. Weatherby won the challenge with the big Weatherby Magnums. Now, I am no rifle man, and in in no position to pass judgement on rifle calibres and the pieces that shoot them. But I am well read enough to know that Roy Weatherby and his rifles had a big impact on the big game shooting field.

Now, I don't know if you have ever seen a Weatherby rifle. I have, and can tell you that they are a thing of beauty in a flamboyant sort of way. So also, are the tales of the performance of the big Weatherby cartridges. But enough of the rifle talk, we are this month discussing, on the test bench, one of Roy Weatherby's offering shotguns. This gun is imported to the country by Michaelis Bayley, who also handle the SKB line of smoothbores. In the States Weatherby offer a line of three models in 12g shotguns. The 'Centurion', a gas operated auto loader that we are looking at this month. The 'Patrician', a pump action repeater and the 'Regency', an O/U.

The gun in simple terms is a light-weight gas operated Autoloader aimed at the field shooting fraternity. Depending on its choking it would be suitable for any of the feathered game we hunt in this country. Being reasonably priced it should find its place in the market depending on the way it is promoted. It is a nice looking gun with a few unusual features and we will look at these in some detail as we examine it.

From the box, which incidentally is very well presented, the test gun is in 12g with a 70 cm. modified choke barrel. It comes furnished with a magazine plug which is normal for guns destined for the American market as their waterfowling regulations restrict magazine guns to a maximum capacity of three shells. Removal of this plug increases the magazine capacity to three thus making the gun a four shot auto loader.

The first thing that one notices is the lack of a forend cap. In fact there is one but it is recessed into the front of the forend. This to my way of thinking is only cosmetic because it does nothing for the mechanical functioning of the gun, it just looks different. The gun has a nice streamlined look about it just the same, and a point will make is that the overall finish is excellent. Blueing is deep and superbly polished, woodwork is close grained walnut with a hard epoxy finish with no blemishes, the plating both dull and bright is



very even and well buffed and the checkering is excellent. Wood to metal and metal to metal fitting is of a very high standard for mass produced autoloader. There are few sharp edges as one would expect but they are not serious imperfections.

Mechanically the gun is quite sound. It is of conventional design. There is nothing new in the design features, in fact a similar gun has

been on the market in this country for many years.

The gun emanates from the land of the Rising Sun and it would be London to a brick that they both come from the same factory. The gas operating system is of the simple floating piston type, which vents off gas about 28 cm up the barrel and into a chamber which is an integral part of the barrel. This chamber also acts as a barrel retaining ring. The floating piston sits over this chamber when the bolt is in the closed position and the the resulting gas pressure forces the piston back to unlock and eject the fired shell.


Piston travel is short, in fact only some 16 mm but the power lar around the magazine tube and thence to the bolt by way of two action bars. The use of two transfer bars is a design feature that I like because it makes for smoother action and one that is less prone to malfunction when using heavy shells. The bolt is of the standard two piece design and works on the camming action of the bottom half supplying the power and lock up and the top half the sealing, extraction and ejection. Lockup is by way of quite a large lug which engages into a recess in front of the barrel extension.

In operation the unlocking and ejection cycle were found to be quite smooth and mechanically sound. The design of this mechanism is very simple and has proved to be very reliable over the years. There is no reason to suspect that the Centurion will be any different. The fitting of the gas operation system around the magazine tube is excellent with a deal of thought having been given to the uses the gun will be put to. The gas piston is stainless steel, and all other parts are chromed or blued. The spigot that acts as a guide for the piston and also acts as the anchor point for the forend cap is screwed into the end of the magazine tube. It has a spring loaded retaining pin to ensure that is does not become loose. The spigot also has four grooves around the gas vent hole to allow the action to be semi-self cleaning. I say semi-self cleaning because there is no such thing as a completely self cleaning action. Excess gas is vented off into the inside of the retaining spigot and thence out through the forend cap.


The bolt as mentioned earlier is of two piece design, is of steel and is fluted. This fluting gives the bolt a nice rakish look and publicity blurb would have us believe that helps the gun to work when it is dirty. With this statement I must disagree. Dirty automatics do not work well and no amount of fluting on the bolt will make them do so. In fact this gun is so well fitted in the action that it takes very little to jam up the works. I am of the opinion as a gas operated user for many years and having tested most of the autoloading guns that are on the market in this country (and some that aren't) that the only good gas operated gun is a clean gas operated gun. As mentioned the fitting of the bolt inside the action is excellent, the design is simple and uncluttered. A point that I do like is the design of the ejection lug. It is quite substantial and is set into the side of the action wall. More importantly however is that it is replaceable, an important point in this type of gun. Extraction is by way of a single hook type extractor on the ejection port side.





3. Gas assembly in fired position. Piston is back and excess gas has been vented off into the forend spiggot.




4. Firend fits very neatly and firmly. Has a metal reinforcing ring at receiver end.

The trigger mechanism is conventional. Hammer is coil spring powered by way of a plunger set in a recess in front of the trigger guard. There is an interupter and whilst there is no split lifter the lifter itself was well shaped, neatly fitted and positive in its action. The trigger pull at just over 2.8 kg was good. There was just a little take up and the trigger was just a little mushy. This is a common fault with a lot of autoloaders but not one to lose a lot of sleep over. A

bit of work by a good gunsmith or trigger man would make a world of difference, but I would be hard to convince that the effort would be justified. The trigger is quite acceptable for field use. The trigger itself is gold coloured, set well back in the nicely shaped trigger guard. Safety is one of the cross bolt variety and is set through the top rear of the trigger guard. It is positive in its action and conventional in its operation. The trigger mechanism uses quite a few pressed parts as is the norm in this day and age but the mechanism itself is well designed and soundly constructed.

The gun is very well stocked for field use. Grip diameter is 115 mm which is a little narrow gutted but the pistol grip flares out quite a substantial shape and was very comfortable. It would be an ideal gun to shoot in a cold swamp if you were wearing gloves. Length of pull at 35.5 cm is normal whilst drop at comb of 34 mm and a heel of 52 mm is quite normal for a field gun. Most average sized gunners could handle the gun straight out of the box. I certainly could and found it quite comfortable to shoot. Dressing up is minimal with an

ebony type grip cap and white line spacer and the inevitable Weatherby diamond set into it. The butt plate is of awful design, meant to leave your shoulder permanently branded, but I will be kind and say that Mr. Weatherby would expect you to have a good recoil pad fitted. It would have been a far better gun if Mr. Weatherby had put one on at the factory. A small point perhaps, but weshoot a lot of water fowl in this country in very hot weather. We Aussies shoot some very hot loads and under these conditions the butt plate fitted would be very uncomfortable, to say the least.

In firing tests we put some 490 shells through the Centurion and we had 34 malfunctions. These malfunctions were all in the feeding mechanism, or more to the point, the failure to feed. All occured in the early stages of testing and we can be attributed to new gun stiffness. After 100 shells had been fired the feeding problems vanished and the gun settled down and performed very well. One thing was noticed however, and that was that the gun will not accept shoddy reloads. Thick rims are the biggest problem. As mentioned earlier the action is so well fitted that the slightest hint of a thick rim will cause a feeding problem. With factory fodder there was nary a problem, the Centurion gobbled them up, be they soft or hot. One of the beauties of the gas operated autoloader is this ability to accept all manner of shotshells and in this respect after the initial feeding problems were sorted out the Centurion performed faultlessly. Ejection was crisp and very consistent. Hotter shells were inclined to be a bit violent, but that's understandable.

At the pattern plate the gun returned very consistent figures. A series of patterns shot with Blue Star 8's returned percentages of 68%. This is a little tighter than one would expect from a modified tube but quite acceptable. With normal hold and considering the gun had a pitch down of 90 mm it was to be expected that it would shoot to a normal point of impact. It did, and if anything it shot about 10 cm high at 35 metres.

Considering the Centurion has an alloy receiver the point of static balance was suprisingly good, being just at the point where the forend joins the action body. This type of gun sometimes tends to be a bit muzzle heavy but in this case it was not so. The gun was very comfortable to use. It mounted nicely and pointed very precisely. It is classed as a "lightweight" model and weighing in at 3.1 kg or 634








Checkering in hand cut end well finished. Note the nice shape of rib years.


lb. it is light by modern autoloading standards. The pistol grip as mentioned earlier was very comfortable in the hand and the forend was very comfortable. The forend itself has a steel reinforcing collar where it mates with the action. When correctly screwed down it was firm to the grip with no movement. The vent rib, of bridge design has a machined, wavy anti glare pattern and was easy on the eye. A single brass front bead is fitted. Over the traps with normal trap fodder the gun was a real pleasure to use. Pointing out targets was smooth and second barrel recovery was excellent. With hotter loads the gun was inclined to buck a bit due to its light weight but you cannot have everything. As mentioned earlier, the fitting of a good recoil pad would be the first thing to do if you were contemplating using it with heavy loads on waterfowl.

Quo Vadis Mr. Centurion? Well, that question is simply answered. Mr. Weatherby has in the Centurion a good average shotgun. designed and well made and probably a little better finished and presented than its closest competitors. As an upland game gun for those that like an autoloader it would be a good proposition with 66 cm improved cyclinder barrel. For the waterfowler it is a good proposition in the test gun form, of 72 cm modified. For those that like a bit more up front the same length of barrel in full choke would be the answer. Prices were not mentioned when the gun was forwarded for testing, but providing it is sensible, there is no reason why the gun should not gain some measure of acceptance amongst those who like a lighter gun for their hunting.




At cap end, forend is split but still fits firmly.

Trade Topics (Continued)

Fuller Firearms Agencies, for a long time one of the most successful importers and distributors of firearms in Australia has further strengthened its position with the recent acquisition of reloading components and powder. You will see in this issue of Clay Target Shooting News that Fuller Firearms is advertising both Vihtavuori primers and Hercules powder. This raises interesting speculation as to how long it will be before the company finds itself a fast selling plastic wad and a supplier of lead shot.

In these current times of economic hardship organisations with low overheads into which category Fuller Firearms must surely come with its streamlined distribution structure, must be finding things a little easier than some of their "larger" competitors.

During a recent visit to Sydney a call was made on the Managing Director of Commercial Marketing Company in the person of Geoff Rabbidge. Not only is Geoff dominant in shooting industry matters (he is the legislation officer for the NSW Firearms Trader's Association) but he is also a very dominant force in both the Sporting Shooters Association and the Field and Game Association, New South Wales Branches. Geoff reports that business is extremely buoyant and recent additions to his sales range included the Simpson, Suhl and Merkel shotguns out of East Germany. These firearms have always been extremely well constructed — Merkel needs no introduction to any Australian — and are marketed at remarkably good prices. These supplement Geoffs steady range of Brno arms and ammunition. An interesting point to arise from conversation with Rabbidge was that the sale of relatively low priced paper cased imported cartridges is increasing quite dramatically. He backed up this claim by showing me his almost empty store.

Whilst on the NSW scene Adrian Brown the recently married sales representative for Winchester Australia has resigned and his place has been taken by Geoff Salmon. Geoff is widely known to clay target shooters as the past Secretary of the Hawkesbury Gun Club. Obviously Geoff brings to his new job a tremendous amount of clay target shooting experience.

A Shotgun Curiosity —

Arron Briggs, an Aboriginal full blood, took me on a tour of the Barmah Forest during 1961.

The reason for my selection of Mr Briggs as a guide was that he had been employed as a Forest Officer at Barmah for some 30 years, with a considerable knowledge of places of interest, and in his well deserved retirement, devoted some of his time to personally conducted tours.

I had been mildly interested in the site of a historic event of a battle between two rival tribes, who had fought a battle of some ferocity about the time of the coming of white man to the area. In addition, I was curious regarding a "canoe" tree in the forest.

However, the real reason for my trip was that I had been reliably informed that a group of sleeper cutters in the red gum forest had a most unusual gun; it, my informant said, had two barrels both fitted with bolt action, one right and the other left hand, and the shells dropping out of a hole in the bottom of the action.

How could any respectable "gun nut" resist such a challenge, particularly as the owners were prepared to swap a reliable shooter.




Early one summer morning I duly arrived at Mr Brigg's camp, a neat weatherboard cabin near the stockyards at Barmah, and we set off. Soon we found the canoe tree with its bent over trunk — really suited for canoe making. The stone axe toe cuts were still visable on both sides of the tree, and a heavy bruising of the bark outlined the area from which the canoe had been cut, rather than the clean cuts of the white man's axe. The cuts were only visable because the tree had died just after the canoe had been removed. In most cases the overgrowth covers the cut marks in a few years.

Next was the battle field, a long spit of a sand bank, apparently the tribes of the area settled a dispute of considerable importance at this spot, resulting in the death of many warriors, the bones of whom had lain bleached in the sun over the years, then finally covered with the wind blown sand and leaves; the area being taboo to the natives, but with the coming of the ever intrusive and covetous white man the skeletons were gathered up; a fact deeply resented by my guide.

But on to the sleeper cutters' camp—as we drove up, we were greeted by numerous and assorted dogs of doubtful pedigree. At a call from Arron one of the wives of the cutters informed us that the "boys" would be home from work in a few minutees. A short wait and in drove our men. I explained the reason for my visit and backed by Arron who assured the bushmen that I was "orlright", so out came the gun, a sorely battered piece of junk.

The badly smashed stock had been plated with copper sheet screwed up as it was beaten into position, but to my eye, it had several features which made it worthwhile. On the barrel rib was engraved the makers name BACONS PATENT No. 32.

The stock was broken right across through the area opposite the action, plus a badly split fore end, but the copper plate held all this together. Its revealing feature was the double bolt action, one left and one right hand, both bolts had been built into the first five inches of a pair of 12 bore 32 inch barrels, the bolts were rear locking and the cowling over the bolts contain the extractor lugs. It had been made for the period of the roll crimp cartridge, as these shorter cases fall out of the bottom of a hole situated just in front of the trigger guard as the extractors pull them back.

The gun, generally very well made, has Birmingham proof marks fitted with safties and cocking indicators, and must have been made during the earliest breech loading period of 1870-80.

Bacon only made a few guns, this one is No. 34. I know of another Interstate, which is a double rifle. He also made an air rifle, but I have never encountered one.

The timber men had no hestitation when I proposed a swap for a reliable single barrel 12 bore shotgun I had brought for the purpose. They said they only wanted it to shoot the tiger snakes at the camp site, Barmah Forest being renowned for them.

They can be assured, if they ever read this, that the "Bacon" has shot its last "Tiger"

Driving Force Resigns from National Executive

Mr Robert F. Buchan has resigned from the National Executive Committee after three years service. In recent months he has accepted a number of quite onerous responsibilities, the accumulation of which resulted in unreasonable pressure. Because Bob is the sort of person who puts his full enthusiasm into every task he pulls on, he decided that he should consolidate his activities and put all his efforts into the development of the Victorian Clay Target Association.

Bob Buchan's connection with the administration of shooting goes back many years to Croydon Gun Club days, when he came up through the Committee to President. As President he was directly involved in negotiations with the Lilydale Clay Target Club with a view to amalgamation. Russell Fox was the President of Lilydale at the time and proved to be a difficult negotiator. However, ultimately a formula was found which provided safeguards for all concerned and the new Melbourne Gun Club was formed, with Russell Fox as the inaugural President. Bob Buchan was the Vice President and was elected President in 1971. Since that time, the Club has continued with the expansion program initiated by Rusty Fox and has grown from an annual turnover of \$18,000 to \$155,000 in 1977.

When Australia was granted the World Championships in 1973, Melbourne Gun Club was selected as the venue for the Clay Target section. Bob was elected Chairman of the Organising Committee and showing his usual verve and forcefulness soon had "a good show on the road". The results are now recorded in history — the highest standard yet achieved in World Moving Target Championships.

In addition to his Clay Target interests, Bob has been deeply involved in Gundog Trials and was on the Field Trial Advisory Committee for six years.

Bob's shooting interests are not confined only to administration. He has been (and still is) a top Standard Skeet shooter and has a number of breaks of 150 plus to his credit.

I.S.U. Skeet shooters of the calibre of Crikis, Hale, Summers and Guyatt have all received some valuable coaching hints from Bob and are determined to put his advice to good effect when they represent Australia in Seoul, Korea later this year.

While on the National Executive, Bob used the experience he gained during the 1973 World Series to initiate a number of development plans for International shooting in Australia in his capacity as Chairman of the I.S.U. Sub-Committee.

Yes, something has been lost from the Executive Committee! Whether you were friend or foe, you knew when Bob Buchan was around because something was ALWAYS happening!!

Bob's place on the Committee has been taken by Bill Abbott another senior administrator and long time President of Werribee Gun Club.



Dear Mr Southey, I am taking the liberty in writing in support of a letter by a Gentleman by the name of "Len" (March '78 News Page 22), who has put forward various suggestions regarding a National Clay Target shooting complex to be constructed in the Australian Capital

His suggestions are an excellent idea and would be most suitable for all registered shooters throughout the whole of Australia; the only ones who would be slightly inconvenienced regarding travelling, would be competitors from Western Australia.

If this matter was given some serious thought and laid out as suggested by "Len", similar to "Vandalia" in U.S.A., it certainly would draw shooters from all over the world, as being conducted in our Capital City offering not only the "Nationals", but the "Tourist" attractions which our Capital City has to offer.

"Len's" suggestions Nos. 1-5 are excellent and I am sure if various members approached their Federal Member, they would be well received and any suggestions that would lead to an "Olympic Shoot" in Canberra would be supported by our Federal Parliament.

I might suggest that if this matter is considered seriously and something definite is decided, all registered shooters in Australia could contribute say \$20.00 each towards obtaining a site and the rest of the finance could be made up of debenture stock bearing interest at a nominal amount.

I would suggest that all Clubs be circularised with any suggestions decided by the A.C.T.A. in regards this matter. Clubs could decide at their meetings and advise the National Secretary of their views and if their members would be agreeable to contribute to the project. All land in the A.C.T. is held under "Lease Hold Tenure" — 99 years lease, so I presume a 99 years lease of a large area of land would be a very small rental and perhaps the Federal Government would grant a lease for a "Pepper corn" rental per year, and perhaps a National Executive and Administration Office could be incorporated in the main building which would be a saving in many ways. I am all in favour of this project and hope it receives a favourable response from all Clubs and members.

INTERNATIONAL SHOOTING SCENE — Part Two

Australian Shooting Association Report.

Due to the newsworthiness of this report, the staff at the Association's Printers, Waterwheel Press, worked long and hard to ensure that the material would be printed as soon as possible.

Thus, the inference in some parts of International Shooting Scene (Part 1) on page 3 that the Australian Shooting Association meeting will be at a later date is inaccurate.

The editorial staff of CTSN is grateful to Waterwheel Press management and staff for this co-operation.

Following the recent successful meeting of the above Association, at which the A.C.T.A. delegates were Harry Somers and Noel Southey, the Secretary filed a report. The following is an extract which may be of interest to readers:

Justification Meeting -Commonwealth Games Team.

I entered this meeting in some fear as widespread reports following the Montreal Justification Meeting had indicated that the A.C.-T.A. was regarded as the poor relation by other A.S.A. affiliates. One aspect of the structure of this group is that it consists of delegates each of whom has a vested interest in the result of every grading - hardly the sort of set-up to produce unemotional and responsible decisions.

Well, it didn't take long for the pressure to show, as the A.C.T.A. recommended that the meeting be abandoned due to the "ineligibility" of those present to make detached decisions. This idea was not accepted (quite obviously, it couldn't be!) and each delegate (one from each affiliate with representatives in Commonwealth Games presented a submission on behalf of his affiliate's nominees. It must be recorded that the standard of the submissions was high and there was no doubt about their accuracy and authenticity.

The A.C.T.A. submission came under strong fire because a recommendation from the A.S.A. that qualifying venues be restricted to four had not been complied with. As complete details of the A.C.T.A. qualifying series had been circulated to ALL affiliates of the A.S.A. as far back as late 1977, the attack was enthusiastically repelled.

After the submissions had been presented the group began grappling with the mammoth problem of grading. For example, how do you compare the performance of a top rapid fire pistol shooter with the performance of a top skeet shooter. After two hours of very good debate, during which a number of worthwhile schemes were considered, the "possibles" in terms of acceptable procedures were narrowed down to two.

The first was a calculation structured as follows:

Average of Competitor's three best qualifying scores, PLUS his best qualifying score, divided by two, and then expressed as a percentage of the current world record.

The second was similar but used Commonwealth Games records as the basis for the calculation of the percentage. There were problems with both - for example the full-bore events conducted in Commonwealth Games are not included in World Championships the Commonwealth Games Trap record was set on a ball trap (Christchurch 1974) and the fact that the I.S.U. Skeet sequence has been altered. No easy problem this one!

After a very close vote, it was resolved to use the system based on World C'ship records. This resulted in the following rankings being established:

At the time of writing, the funding position is not bright, but your scribe is a firm believer in the power of positive thinking. The complete shooting team will go! (Personal opinion only!)

Australia's medal chances in shooting events are brighter in the 1978 Commonwealth Games than ever before. The two Smallbore rifle shooters are potential Gold Medal winners, the Fullbore shooters (7.62 mm rifles) have bright prospects in their first appearance in Commonwealth Games, the Pistol shooters are producing high standard scores and finally, the four shotgunners are each capable of bringing home a "gong"

Australia is going through a critical period of its development insofar as shooting sports are concerned, especially at an International level. The A.O.F. (Australian Olympic Federation) is showing signs of providing funding assistance for training of potential competitors for the Moscow Olympics. The A.C.T.A. has received \$750 for use in 1978/79 for this purpose (it is to be used as a fare subsidy for the 1978 World Championships Team) and a good haul of medals at Edmonton would be the greatest possible boost clay target shoot-

ing could get.

It is certain that our shotgunners will be better prepared than ever before. Not only has the selection process been more carefully controlled (and selection possibilities have been opened to a much wider cross section of our membership) but training systems have been implemented to ensure that the team will be at its peak for the matches. A small grant from the Federal Government to be used to create a training camp is another first for the A.C.T.A. and will make a significant contribution to the team's chances of success. Newton Thomas, the National Coaching Director (he is also Manager of the complete shooting team) has taken charge of the squad and his experience and direction also will be an important factor in the team's performances.

So, Messrs Ellis, Rumbel, Crikis and Hale - the Federal Government, the Australian Shooting Association, the Australian Clay Target Association and all it's member Clubs and registered shooters are doing their best to create the best possible opportunities

for you! The next move is yours!!
