National Shooting Ground

Does the ACTA need a National Shooting Ground? As a result of a recent visit to the 'home' of our sister Association in the United States, the Amateur Trapshooting Association, there is much evidence to suggest that the Australian Clay Target Association should undertake a detailed investigation with a view to commencing such a development as a matter of urgency.

One of the major arguments against such a move has been that many competitors at National Championships attend each year as part of their vacation. Thus, goes the argument, it is vital that a new venue be used each year to provide a fresh attraction. Experience gained at Vandalia (the ATA National Ground) would suggest that, in fact, the reverse of that point is more accurate. That is to say MORE people attend a National tournament which is conducted at the same venue each year, and treat it as a reunion. "Long service awards" have been introduced in America to recognise the efforts of shooters who have attended for a number of consecutive years.

Also, in the opinion of many experienced administrators, the course of the Australian National Championship events should be increased from the present 50 targets to a minimum of 100 targets. It is impossible to consider such a change without establishing a new ground. None of the existing grounds used on the "Nationals circuit" are capable of being extended to a point where it could accommodate an attendance of, say 750, shooting at 100 targets per day.

For those who are interested, the Amateur Trapshooting Association ground at Vandalia, Ohio, currently has 72 trap fields of which 64 are used for the Nationals Tournament competition and 8 are used to provide practice facilities.

International Competition

Moving now to the subject of International competition, August has been something of a miracle month for the Association. We had three teams competing overseas virtually at the same time.

At Edmonton in Canada the Commonwealth Games were held and Australia gained a bronze medal in the trap match, through Terry Rumbel. Then, at the Pesta Sukan Games in Singapore, Australian teams gained a gold medal in trap and a bronze medal in skeet. In the individual section of the same match, Reg Boyce (Melbourne Gun Club) won a gold medal in the trap event and popular Melbourne Gun Club President Bob Buchan won a bronze medal in the skeet event. The third team was the "Air New Zealand" team which competed in the Grand American Tournament at Vandalia USA. It came home with a bronze medal, which is a great result at our first try. These matches will be more fully reported in the next few issues of CTSN.

General

Turning to the domestic scene, the second Executive Committee Conference for 1978 will be under way in Sydney as this issue goes to press. There are a number of major issues on the agenda, including further development of the National Coaching Program. Hopefully the Conference will also produce a decision in the National Logo Competition. The number of entries received has been most encouraging, and the range of ideas presented is quite extensive. It is of interest to note that not one letter has been received suggesting that we retain our present badge, so apparently, there is general agreement that a new design is needed.

Planning for the 1979 National Championships to be held at Griffith Gun Club, NSW, is occupying a position of high priority with the Administrative unit and early indications suggest that a record number of entries will be received. (It is interesting to note that almost 20,000 entries were received during the Grand American Tournament).


In the tough scene of competition clay target shooting shooters will gain an extra advantage in the comfort of knowing that these ELEY trap loads are manufactured in Australia under strict quality control to International standards.

One obvious difference in appearance of these new trap loads is the length of brass. By traditional standards the brass is shorter but since the introduction of the integral plastic case the length of brass head on a cartridge has no value except that of appearance. Ballistic performance of these cartridges is not affected in any way whatsoever by the length of brass. Its only real function is to make extraction and ejection of the fired case easier. Unnecessary extra brass simply adds to the cost.

Based on previous prices in the retail trade the ELEY trap range of cartridges should be available for around \$75 to \$80 per case to trapshooters.

For some time, the Association Executive Committee has been grappling with the problem of controlling costs.

ELEY Ammunition is to be congratulated on this policy decision, because of its obvious effect on the development of clay target shooting in Australia. **Cont'd on page 4**




Among the attractions of Albury are its central position (in relation to the shooting population of Australia), tourist potential, accessibility and economic growth.



Familiar Patterns

Norman F. Cooper is a regular contributor to "Guns Review," an English periodical. He has been clay target shooting for 26 years, and is the proprietor of a successful gun shop and coaching school in England. CTSN is appreciative of the approval to reproduce this article from the June 1978 issue of "Guns Review".

I suppose that almost everyone who shoots clays to any extent will at some time or other have been involved in a discussion on the subject of shotgun shot patterns, although there are large numbers of shooters who do not care much for the technicalities of shooting at all. At the other end of the scale there are some people who are fascinated with the subject and will talk for hours about cartridges, their contents and the type of patterns needed for different disciplines, and how best to produce those patterns.

Although this subject has been around for many years, it seems to have come into much greater prominence in the past ten years or so. I am sure that this is entirely due to the much larger number of people shooting clays compared with the numbers of even ten years ago, the proliferation of cartridges on the market, all with their advocates, even if in some cases it is only the people who are marketing them, and the increase in the number of magazines catering for the shotgunner. These last will obviously have writers who deal from time to time with this matter and of course they will have differing opinions at times.

Even 60 or 70 years ago there were those who had the interest, time and money to devote to the subject and it was quite common for game shooters who could afford to have guns made for them to specify the percentage of pellets that they required to be within a circle of a certain diameter, the most common being that with a diameter of 30 inches at 40 yards. This led the makers to spend hours on grinding and polishing the choke cones in barrels until the desired patterns were obtained, and this often involved working on the length of the barrels as well, not just the chokes, with the result that many barrels left the works at quite a few thousands of an inch larger than they had originally been bored. However, the important point was always made that the resultant patterns were those produced by a particular load of powder and shot in combination or for a particular commercial cartridge then in production. Because of the number of firms then loading cartridges it was usually the former, because most of the cartridge loaders of the day were capable of reproducing a given load of a particular brand of powder and a size of shot.

I have seen any number of gun cases, very often double ones, with a label in the lid stating the patterns which had been achieved with the guns which had been in them giving details of the loads which were used in so doing. In some cases the guns concerned have still been in the cases although, of course, the powders quoted have long been obsolete and unobtainable.

However, the vast majority of guns did not have this amount of time and trouble expended upon them, the owners having bought them "off the shelf" or at best having merely asked for a certain type of boring. Many of the ready-made guns produced before 1914 and between the wars had what we should probably regard as rather unusual combinations of choke these days. Some of the largest Birmingham firms turned out many guns which had an improved cylinder right barrel and a full choke left one, huge numbers of guns leaving the BSA factory in Armoury Road were bored in this manner. Many were shot for years in just that combination and others eventually had left barrel bored out to something which gave more open patterns.

During this time there were still large numbers of guns about which in fact had no choke at all or virtually none, for the breech loader had been invented and produced for some years before choke boring became the subject of the famous trials organised by *The Field* and which led to makers turning to this form of barrel making.

Even after the trials there were those who were not convinced of the value of choke and who continued to produce barrels similar to those used on the muzzle loaders of an earlier age, which were almost always true cylinders. And there were still very many muzzle loading guns in use in the early years of this century whose owners were quite happy to use them although they may have known nothing about chokes. Some of the older generation of shooters then still had their guns made with little or no choke and very many large bags made in Victorian times were made by shooting guns without any choke and it is a fact that many of those old guns, both muzzle loaders and breech loaders, produced patterns using black powder the *quality* of which has not been surpassed even with today's cartridges.

All the cartridges used in the inter-war years were of the rolled turnover variety, although in the Thirties FN at Liege did produce an all-metal cartridge made of mainly zinc which had a crimp closure, although the crimp was not flat, as the modern plastic or paper case is, but was conical in shape, very similar to the Almac brass .410 cartridge which ICI produced for a short while just after the last war. Vast quantities of every kind of game were shot with rolled turnover cartridges and very few shooters worried unduly about what sort of patterns they produced or what degree of choke was in their guns.

Generally speaking they left the gun and cartridge makers to do their part, knowing full well that if they put the gun straight and were using a cartridge produced by either a national company or by their local gunmaker the quarry would be killed or the clay broken. Even in those days very many cartridges which bore the name of a local gunsmiths or even ironmongers were not loaded by them but were the product of a factory and were merely printed with the name of the retailer, although some were in fact loaded to a particular specification which had been demanded by the shop or company which sold them to the public.

The non-corrosive cap

There were very many excellent shots in the Twenties and Thirties who swore by a particular cartridge but who had they but known it could probably have done as well with almost any other one. There were as many as 5,000 *named British* cartridges on sale in the mid-Thirties and there were also a few imported ones, but these were seldom seen by most shots of the day. It was also interesting that Remington, the famous American company, also loaded cartridges over here at a small plant at Waltham Abbey in Essex, not many miles from here as I write and I have used some of these myself, and very good they were, even several years after the plant had ceased operations, as it did in 1939. One advantage that they did have was the non-corrosive cap,

One advantage that they did have was the non-corrosive cap, that great advantage which was available to the American shooter in the Thirties but for which British shooters had to wait another twenty years in a cartridge loaded with British made components. The old type corrosive caps were probably responsible for more pitted barrels than anything else, for if left uncleaned for even a short while or even if not cleaned with a neutralising agent, the cap residues alone would quite severely mark barrels and the beginnings of pitting could be seen not long afterwards.

For a few years after the last war we still had the rolled turnover cartridge with us but about 20 years ago the first British crimp closure cartridges became available in quantity, the first that is if the Almac .410 case is discounted. We had seen other ways of improving the patterns, or so their makers claimed. My older readers will no doubt remember the Page Wood cartridge, with a closure which resembled a kind of double rolled turnover, which was sold by a Bristol company of that name and we also had the pneumatic. Cartridge Company of, if I remember rightly, Edinburgh, who claimed that their special wadding not only improved patterns but reduced recoil and "gun headache". Page Wood claimed the first two attribuutes for their cartridge but I do not recall them mentioning the "gun headache" bit.

For the crimp closure the advantages were that as no overshot card wad was necessary, the patterns were improved to the extentthat there could be no possible chance of what we knew as a "cartwheel pattern". I do not think that it often happened but occasionally the top wad of a rolled turnover cartridge could carry on amid the shot charge for longer than usual and interfere with the centre of the pattern, producing one which had more pellets than usual around the edges of the pattern but with fewer than normal in the centre. This produced a pattern rather like a wheel in shape, with a hollow centre, or nearly so, through which a bird and certainly a clay target, could easily be lost.

The crimp also made possible a more water-resisting cartridge, as under the influence of water the crimp was less liable to unfold than the rolled turnover and when within a few years the plastic case came into use, we had a virtually completely waterproof cartridge. From the point of view of the cartridge manufacturers I am sure that the crimp closure was simpler to effect, although I must say that it was some time before our leading British manufacturers succeeded in producing a crimp closed plastic case that was as good as the American ones.

The plastic shot container

Not long after this, once more the Americans led the way with the plastic shot container. This, which in various forms quickly

came into use by all the American cartridge makers, completely enclosed the shot charge in a plastic cover so to speak, thus preventing contact between the pellets and the walls of the barrels. something which we had known for years caused some deformation of the outer pellets of the charge and this in turn caused these pellets to behave erratically in flight. The plastic shot container, often combined with a plastic obturating wad, effected more regular patterns which also contained more pellets, something which the skeet and trap shooters quickly began to appreciate.

The makers were at pains to point out that these plastic wads didnot make the patterns smaller but merely better. As an incidental benefit they also prevented the "leading" of barrels, whereas ordinary wads allowed the shot passing at high speed along the barrels to deposit streaks of lead in the barrels which sometimes took a deal of hard work in the way of special cleaning to remove. ELEY by this time had already introduced their fibre' "Kleena" wad which, by a scrubbing action in the barrels, reduced but did not eliminate "leading".

So a few years ago we reached the position where an ever increasing proportion of cartridges sold were for use in clay pigeon shooting. Standards were rising in the sport, it became worthwhile for not only the Americans but increasingly the European cartridge makers to ship to us cartridges designed with the clay shooters in mind. Amongst the shooters, there were a good number ever seeking the greatest possible help from the guns and cartridges.

If one looks at the surface area of a clay target, it presents a pretty small mark edgeways on and not exactly a large one from any angle. Compared with the total target area of most game birds or a hare or rabbit, the clay is only really comparable with a snipe. Granted that the body area of a pigeon or partridge is no larger than a clay, nevertheless a wing shot will incapacitate such a bird, whereas a shot that misses a clay by as much as one inch does not appear in the score.

With a larger bird or animal, a shot which is several inches away from the body area may easily produce a wound that will bring a bird down, even if it takes a good dog to find it. So the clay shots and particularly those at the top, pay more attention to their patterns than perhaps the game shot does. The latter knows that more of his misses are his own fault than are those attributable to either his gun or his cartridges, and in any case is probably not very worried if he does miss some birds.

The good clay shot, on the other hand; knows that he cannot afford to miss birds if he wants to win and is often very conscious indeed of the part played by his gun and his cartridges. He has a gun specially made for the disciplines that he shoots, whether it be skeet, trap or sporting (this last one has only really sparked off a special gun in this last year or two).

In brief, what does the trap shooter want in the way of patterns? He requires the best possible regular patterns with no gaps through which a clay can pass even edgeways on, chokings in his gun that hold together for at least 30 to 40 yards those patterns and almost certainly a different choking in the upper barrel than that in the lower. Depending upon his speed, he may settle between 1/4 and 1/2 choke for his first barrel and 3/4 to full choke for his second and he is happy with the plastic collar type wad. Many shooters will be happier with one brand of cartridge rather than another, others will use whichever cartridge maker's product offers most inducement to them -- and the inducements may well take the form of as many cartridges of that make as they want, either free or very cheaply.

The skeet shooter's requirements, however, are very different. Because his shot should not be fired at more than about 20 yards and often as little as 10 feet, his gun needs no choke at all, as he wants the largest possible pattern, relying for the very small size 9 shot to close any possible gaps in the large size of spread. He wants a fast cartridge and is beginning to come round to the idea that he can well use the "fliers" in the way of shot and, therefore, does not need or desire the plastic shot collar and it is significant that at least one American cartridge company is now producing a fast cartridge with fibre wads especially for the ISU skeet shot.

So the wheel perhaps goes full circle and the skeet shot uses much the same combination of gun and cartridge that his Vic-torian game or live pigeon shooting ancestor did. The sporting clay shot may well use a skeet gun for most of his shooting but if not, is now the user of a gun which filled in the past, and still does today, many a game bag or, if lucky, a game cart. We shall certainly be discussing this old subject on clay grounds or round the fire in a sporting home or hotel for years to come.





AUSTRALIAN CLAY TARGET SHOOTING NEWS - OCTOBER



INTERNATIONAL SHOOTING SCENE

As reported elsewhere. Australia has made a name for herself in International circles in recent weeks. The shooting team which represented Australia at the 1978 Commonwealth Games conducted at Edmonton, Canada, brought back two Bronze Medals. One was won by Terry Rumbel for trap shooting (he defeated Australia's other entry Jim Ellis in a shoot-off) with a score of 183-200 while the second was won by Jeff Farrell, in the Rapid Fire Pistol Match.

The whole team produced top class scores in the "badge matches" (pre competition events) but many found the hard grind of competition very difficult to master. This further emphasises that a real need exists to promote more frequent top class International competition. Australia's geographic remoteness needs to be overcome.

The two skeet shooters, Alex Crikis and Ian Hale finished 10th and 6th respectively. The match was won by John Woolley, who many will remember was runner-up to Crikis in the South Pacific Championship conducted in Melbourne last Easter.

The Shooting Section manager, Newton Thomas spoke very highly of the behaviour and general co-operative spirit of his team he also commended his training co-ordinator, Peter Anderson of Canberra who proved himself to be a very worthwhile "backstop.

Pesta Sukan Games - Singapore

Australia was represented at the 1978 Pesta Sukan Games in Singapore by a group of trench and skeet shooters (and their wives) predominantly drawn from the Southern States. Travel arrangements were handled by Jetset Tours and were faultness. In fact each of the travellers enjoyed himself (or herself) so much that bookings have already been made for 1979.

The shooting results indicate that Australia entered quite strong teams. In the trench matches, Australia's No. 1 team won a Gold Medal, while the Individual Trench Match was won by Reg Boyce of Melbourne. In ISU Skeet, well-known Melbourne Gun Club President, Bob Buchan won an individual bronze, and the skeet team also took out the bronze medal.

Scores from Singapore were:

TRENCH - Individual 1st Reg Boyce (Aust) 177, 2nd G. Pavitr (Thai) 174, 3rd H. Tan (S'pore) 171, 4th R. DeVries (Aust) 169. (Kevin Dobson, ACTA Executive member shot a 165 which is a very good score when one considers that Kevin had shot very few trench targets prior to this trip). Team 1st Australia (Boyce, DeVries, Dobson, Abbott) 498, 2nd Thailand (lost on a count-back) 498, 3rd Singapore 496, 4th Malaysia 477, 5th In-·donesia 388.

SKEET - Individual 1st G. Carreyre (New Cal) 185, 2nd F. Hc (Singapore) 173, 3rd R. Buchan (Aust.) 165. Team 1st Singapore 501, 2nd New Caledonia 464, 3rd Australia 415.

During the competition, the Aussies took advantage of the opportunity to promote international competition in Australia, and considerable interest was shown in promoting another Pacific International Match in Australia in 1979. Potential entrant nations include Indonesia, Thailand, Malaysia, New Zealand, Columbia, Brazil and Singapore.

Australia's Infiltration of North America

The "Air New Zealand" Trap Team which competed in the International Match conducted at the 1978 Grand American Tournament performed very creditably for a first-up effort. The match was for five man teams and consisted of 100 targets thrown from a "Continental" trap, to be shot single barrel.

In an earlier match, an unfortunate John Hutchings of Adelaide missed out on final selection – the team consisted of Bob Cartledge, Ballarat, Vic.; Tim Catling, Katanning, W.A.; Peter Tink, Weipa, Q'ld.; Robbie Smith, Goulburn, NSW; and Graham Appleby, Zeehan, Tas.

The team shot in the one squad and made members of the Australian cheer squad very proud as it lined up, in green and gold "Australian" shooting jackets, and showing great determination.

After the first 25, the team's score was extremely encouraging, and a number of the Americans were taking a lot of notice. After all, never before had any country had the "gall" to try to defeat the Americans at their own game – especially colonials from more than 11,000 miles away.

However, in the second round, Tim Catling experienced an apparent gun malfunction, which under ATA rules, is a lost target. This appeared to upset the concentration of the team and the score sufferred accordingly. Nevertheless, after this brief set-back it is to the credit of all in the team that each member backed-up his team mate, and in the final 50 targets, the score was again amongst the top scores produced.

The Australian team's aggregate was 443-500, made up as follows: Smith 95-100, Cartledge 94-100, Tink 87-100, Appleby 88-100, Catling 79-100.

This won for the Australians a bronze medal for third place. The winning score was 449 and the second best was 445.

The Australians competed individually in a number of events during the "Grand" program and their efforts were dominated by the supreme effort put in by Bob Cartledge from Victoria. Early in the match Bob shot 100 straight in a single barrel event,

become one of very few Australians to attain this goal.

(I believe only three Aussies have repeated this feat at the Grand American Tournament - Ed.)

Bob then carded one of the ten highest scores in the International Match - Bob (Recoil) Smith also achieved this rating. (The nickname "Recoil" will be explained in an instalment of the USA tour story).


On the final day, Cartledge kept the Australian spirits high by firing his way into the shoot-off for A Grade honours in the American Double Rise Championship with a score of 97-100. He was ultimately relegated to fifth place, but in a field of 2000 competitors, it was a fantastic result.

The Big 10 — or is it Number One in the Pacific

(Part one of a report on the recent ACTA tour of USA)

These two expressions are catch phrases of Air New Zealand – both are equally true. This will be borne out by the 32 Australians who left Sydney Airport on August 3rd to attend the Grand American Trapshooting Tournament in Vandalia, Ohio.

However, the pre-departure period was not without its own brand of drama. For example, the scheduled air service the group planned to use to get from Las Vegas to Milwaukee (via Chicago) went on strike about 10 weeks prior to the group's departure date. This created no problem as no one thought that such a strike could last. The smile quickly disappeared from the organisers' faces when, a week prior to departure it was found that the strike was still on. Jetset Tours' very efficient staff quickly re-shuffled the itinerary and the problem disappeared.

Then on the morning of departure, one of the Victorians, Mark Edgar of Korumburra, lost his glasses in a friend's car. A quick search produced a pair of glasses which Mark promptly put into his pocket. On the Ansett flight to Sydney, Mark decided to read a magazine only to find that the spectacles he had picked up were those of the friend who had driven him up to Melbourne — the friend now believes he has lost his glasses also!

The next set-back was to find that the arrival in Sydney of the DC-10 scheduled to fly the first leg of the trip Sydney/Auckland

was delayed because of fog at Auckland. The Tour Leader, Wendy Bartley, being an experienced International traveller, undertook all the embarkation procedures for the group and suddenly things were running smoothly again.

Prior to take-off, Air New Zealand's Public Relation's Manager, Gordon Stepto, arranged for a series of photos to be taken featuring the "Air New Zealand Australian Trap Team." The team was pictured against the tail assembly of the "Big 10" (the DC-10) and photos, together with a brief news story were put on the news wire service throughout Australia. The Association is deeply indebted to Air New Zealand for the extensive range of assistance which this first ever Australia D.T.L. team has had.

At last embarkation time came, about one hour late, and 32 very excited people (including Tour Leader, Wendy Bartley) clambered aboard the plane.

No sooner was the group seated and fruit juice was served by the courteous Air New Zealand cabin staff. Next came an extremely well prepared mid afternoon meal of Rainbow Trout or roast lamb followed by rum baba. The 2170 Kilometres from Sydney to Auckland took no time at all, and very few of the passengers had time to avail themselves of the opportunity to listen to the ten channel stereo service provided on the aircraft.

Arrival in Auckland was at 7.35 p.m. (local time) which is equivalent to 5.35 p.m. eastern standard time — the flight took only 2 hours 28 minutes. Oh, the only way to fly. It was just as we landed that the elusive Edgar spectacles turned up — in his wife's handbag. It was possible to see a slight cooling in that relationship, momentarily!

A change of aircraft occurred at Auckland, where most of the previous delay was made up -- in fact "transit" took only 45 minutes. The new terminal at Auckland is now in use, and is quite comfortable. Because of the quick turn around, no one saw more of Auckland than the inside of the airport lounges.

Take off from Auckland occurred at 8.20 p.m. with a fresh cabin crew, and the "horror" leg of the trip in front of us. It is called the "horror leg" because of its length -8 hours. This is a long time to be confined in an aircraft seat, especially for Australians, as it is the sleeping end of the day. Nevertheless, another excellent meal, this time prawn cocktail, grilled steak and a Hawaiian Dessert, and an in-flight film (a dreadful movie called "March or Die" starring Terence Hill and Gene Hackman) combined to ease the boredom. Members of the group found all sorts of other ways to fill in the time, until about 1 a.m. (Australia EST - I've no idea what the local time was!) when a continental breakfast was served. - After that meal (the cabin staff absolutely spoil passengers with personalised service) USA Immigration forms were handed out for completion prior to arrival at Honolulu. A word of warning here if there is an abbreviation or an alteration to any of the detail asked for on the form, it will be rejected and another one will need to be completed. The casualty rate appeared to be one in every

two. After touch down in Honolulu, passengers from flight TE506 were taken from the airport lounge to the Immigration Hall by an articulated bus – called a "plane train". As this is the point of entry into the US for east-bound travellers all immigration formalities are completed here. The Air New Zealand staff at the airport were very courteous and assisted in clearing passengers through the check in the least possible time.

through the check in the least possible time. Back into the "plane train" and around to the departure lounge, climb aboard TE-506 and everything was in readiness for take-off on the last leg into Los Angeles. Flight time for this section was 4 hours and 53 minutes. After a three course breakfast, including the best mixed grill ever seen, a recent release movie titled "Outlaw Blues" was shown. It featured Peter Fonda and Susan Saint-James, and taught us a few new words!

During the long flight, the members of the group had taken the opportunity to get to know each other, and the rapport which had developed was great to see. Tour Leader, Wendy Bartley, had adjusted well to her "new charges," and had already proved her value in avoiding difficult situations before they occurred.

TRADE TOPICS

Re-alignment or continued disarray?

The firearms trade in Australia continues through a phase of realignment and (hopefully) consolidation. One of the most interesting of recent developments has been the tussle to win the prestigious Ruger agency. Predominantly based on rifles and handguns, the Ruger product range is soon to be extended to include shotguns. (Arrangements have been made to have a prototype tested by Pat Browne when the test unit becomes available).

Since the Guthrie Trading sports operation closed at the end of June, the Ruger agency has been sought by a number of existing firearms wholesalers, including some very surprising names. The early victor was Fuller Firearms, which purchased the entire stock of product from Guthrie. Since then, Malcolm Fuller has been successful in obtaining a guarantee of continuity of supply through a U.S. source.

However, it appears from an unsubstantiated report just received that the newly-appointed **OFFICIAL** Ruger agent is Firearms Distributors? The executive of the company is reported to include a number of ex-Guthrie personnel, such as Bill Andersen, Garry Raymond, Ian Campbell. (It is possible that the latter are working as independent agents).

Meanwhile, Fuller Firearms continues to extend its product range, and early reports show that the only setback in sales of Federal cartridges has been lack of supplies of Champion II shotshells for clay busters.

"Super X - Xpediter" 22 cal Cartridge Announced by Winchester.

A new ultra high velocity Super -X* Xpediter* 22 calibre cartridge has been added to the Winchester-Western ammunition line for 1978.

Xpediter has been developed by Winchester-Western, USA. It has been a runaway best seller in America. It is now being manufactured in Australia by Winchester Australia.

Developed to fill the void between the standard high velocity 22 Long Rifle and the 22 Winchester* Magnum Rim Fire cartridges, the Xpediter provides the hunter with an excellent small game and varmit shooting cartridge. It has a 29-grain Lubaloy* bullet with a specially engineered hollow point cavity designed to deliver positive energy release, even in short barrelled firearms. Despite its ultra high velocity, the Xpediter cartridge is loaded to pressure limits standardised by the industry for 22 calibre Long Rifle ammunition.

The nickel-plated Xpediter cartridge case is somewhat longer than the standard 22 calibre Long Rifle case, but is loaded to industry standard pressure limits for 22 calibre Long Rifle cartridges.

Xpediter should be used only in rifles and handguns with 22 calibre Long Rifle sporting chambers.

The new Super-X Xpediter ammunition is currently available at a suggested retail price of \$2.95 per box of 50.

New profile targets from ELEY

The ELEY clay targets which were announced in the September issue of "Shooters News" were on view at the Victorian State Trap Carnival and created a great deal of interest amongst club officials and shooters.

ELEY Marketing Manager, Don Hobill, advised that many shooters were enquiring about the continuing availability of "Bronze Wing" targets. Seems to be there is some opinion which indicates that the new breed of clay targets including the new ELEY targets are harder to break than the old "Bronze Wing". However one wonders whether shooters can pick the difference. Any opinions???

Latest information from ELEY is that stocks of "Bronze Wing" are exhausted and will not be produced again unless shooter demand is strong enough for this specialist D.T.L. target.

ELEY are now selling clay targets direct to clubs and the price for 10,000 (Minimum order) of the new black targets is \$35 per 1,000 plus sales tax ex-factory. Coloured targets are dearer of course. If you were quick enough, the balance of "Bronze Wing" targets were being sold at even lower prices.

Further news from ELEY is that their extra hard lead shot is now available in 10 kilogram bottles. This new package has a larger handle than the 7.5 kilogram bottle available and has been specially designed for ease of handling by reloaders. The ELEY 10 kg bottle packages will not increase the price of shot over that of the 10 kg bag packages.

DESIGN AWARD FOR SPORTING GLASSES.

Sporting glasses, with interchangeable lenses, have been granted an Australian Design Award.

The glasses, which have created world-wide interest, particularly from competition shooters, are made by Shooters Accessories Pty. Ltd., of Morphett Vale, South Australia.

The award was presented by the Minister of Tourism, Recreation and Sport, Mr Tom Casey, at a special function at the Noarlunga Council Chambers recently.

The glasses were highly praised by the Industrial Design Council of Australia, for the value they offered, and the ease of changing the lenses to suit different light situations. The standard pack contains three sets of lenses - yellow, green and cruvaira grey.

The glasses which have already notched up significant overseas sales, were initially developed for competition shooters to improve target definition under difficult light conditions. The green and yellow lenses were designed specifically for this purpose, but have since attracted a wide range of other wearers including snow skiers, trotting reinsmen, golfers and boating enthusiasts. The cruvaira lenses are ideal for bright light situations. It is interesting to note that cruvaira lenses are supplied by the Royal Australian and Royal Canadian Airforces as standard issue for their flying crews.

The ophthalmic quality lenses are made from CR39, which is a hard setting resin selected for use in the American Apollo space program.

Extremely light weight, and with a much higher abrasive resistance than plastics commonly used in sun glasses, the lenses are made by SOLA International Pty. Ltd. of Lonsdale, South Australia.

Mr Heinz Straub, Shooters Accessories Managing Director, said that because of CR39's impact resistance, the Sporting Glasses also offered a high degree of eye protection.

He said that this was a particularly important feature as far as shooters were concerned. The lenses will withstand the impact of a .15 mm. steel ball falling free from 127 cm.


The ultra-violet and infra-red absorption was also far greater than in most other lenses.

The lightweight frames can be adjusted to be worn in a high position for shooting, or in the normal setting for other sporting activities.

The glasses are supplied in special pocket size packs with pouches to hold the spare lenses.

The lenses are interchanged by simply pressing on the arms of the glasses and gently pulling the lenses downwards. Recesses on the sides of the lenses ensure they do not fall out under normal wearing conditions.

The Sporting Glasses are being exported to the USA, UK, Canada, NZ, Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Holland, Ghana and New Guinea.

FEDERAL BUDGET

brings Unhappiness for Sporting Association's

On August 15th 1978, sports development in Australia suffered a major setback, when the 78-79 Federal Budget announcement showed an allocation of only \$1.64 million for sports assistance. Of this amount, \$340,000 has already been earmarked for the two National life saving bodies. This effectively leaves \$1,333,000 for distribution amongst sporting associations.

To say that the Association Administrative Unit is bitterly disappointed would be the understatement of 1978. However, perhaps, to some extent it is our own fault. After all, how many of the Association's members took up the challenge (see Secretary's Note in July issue of CTSN) and contacted their local Federal Member?

Politics is a tough game, and if we are to be in the fight we need to get off our backsides and make our needs more clearly known. The Administrative Unit circulated details of its official proposals to all members of Cabinet. Additionally, each member of the Shadow Cabinet was also circulated. Without exception, all wrote back stating that our requirements "would be kept in mind at the relevant time."

I suggest to you that if a number of constituents had been applying pressure on their Member (not only clay busters but **ALL** of Australia's 4 million organised sportsmen and women) the result may have been different.

It is of interest to read the opinion of the Confederation of Australian Sport, a body which the ACTA strongly supports:

PRESS RELEASE

The Confederation of Australian Sport is bitterly disappointed with the sum of \$1,333,000 allocated to sport in this year's Budget.

The President of the Confederation, Mr Wayne Reid said today that last financial year, the Federal Government allocated \$1,000,000 to sport and the vast majority of this was utilised from January to June. Just to stand still this year, the Confederation believes that the Federal Government should have provided \$1,950,000 for a full 12 month period.

The Government may argue that in a difficult Budget year, they have provided 33% more than last year, but this in fact is not the full picture, because in addition to the \$1,000,000, \$225,000 was provided for the Commonwealth Games Appeal, so in actual money terms, an additional \$108,000 has been provided to sport in this country, which represents an increase of 8.1%.

The sportspeople of Australia should know that the real position is that the \$1,333,000 represents only 68% of what was needed for us to be in the same position of support from our Federal Government as last year.

The Confederation petitioned the Federal Government in June indicating that a minimum responsible contribution to sport in Australia would be \$5,000,000 and there can be no doubt that the voice of sportspeople in Australia has not been heard at all. Therefore, we are now seeking a review of the situation in an urgent sense, aimed at obtaining a substantial input for sport in Australia from a supplementary budget.

The only other reasonable alternative that can be adopted in the short term would be the national sports lottery now so strongly advocated by the Confederation and the athletes returning from the Commonwealth Games after seeing the effect that such a form of assistance has had on sport in Canada.

Talk About Travel

AUSTRALIANS VISIT U.S.A.

Each report on U.S.A. which one reads in Australia makes reference to the sheer size of everything in that country. In spite of this pre-conditioning, none of us was prepared for the magnitude of everything that we came in contact with. For example, the trip from Los Angeles Airport to Anaheim was 35 miles and the full distance was densely populated and solidly developed.

The road was a minimum of eight lanes wide and every inch of it was used. In fact one of the coach drivers quipped that from 6.30 a.m. to 9.30 a.m. on week days, the 'to town' section was the longest four lane parking lot in California.

Then came Disneyland, where the sense of size was more a mechanical thing. There were just so many moving parts, all of which worked perfectly, and were fully synchronised.

More grandeur was recognised when we flew over the Grand Canyon — words cannot provide a satisfactory description of this great chasm, at the bottom of which runs the "Red River" - the Colorado.

The hospitality at Waukesha Gun Club was of such magnitude that it defies description. Vic Reinders the long time President of the Club (and a Grand American Winner and past President of the Amateur Trapshooting Association) is a very experienced administrator and was given full support by his Committee, the Ladies Committee and the club members.

We were all feeling a little wrung out by this time but there were many more highlights on the way. The next of the never ending line was our first view of the National Ground of the Amateur Trapshooting Association at Vandalia. The ground was only a mile from our hotel, and the hotel staff provided a shuttle service in the courtesy bus to the main entrance. A total of 64 trap fields are available for competition, 32 in the "west field" and 32 in the "east field." Between the two fields, eight other trap grounds were used for practice purposes, giving a grand total of 72 grounds. Plans are in hand to extend the number of grounds to 82 by 1985.

The back up facilities are very comprehensive. A fully integrated computer system is used to process scores and provide continuous updating of classification of shooters. Creature comforts such as food and drink booths are situated at regular intervals along the mile long firing line, and there are many other booths housing trade exhibitors and retail operations.

In the main ATA building is situated the "Hall of Fame." As the name implies, the Hall of Fame doubles as a gallery of photographs of trapshooting notables and a clay target museum. It is most comprehensive and well worth a visit.

While the Grand American Tournament was being conducted, a large part of the Australian contingent took the opportunity to fly to Buffalo and Washington for a two day visit. Buffalo is the main entry point for visitors to Niagara Falls and once more we experienced a sight which is beyond description. The party spent a complete day at Niagara followed by a late night flight to Washington. A ground tour of Washington and its environs was another highlight and included the Washington Memorial, National Capitol Building, White House, John F. Kennedy Centre, Alexandria and Mt Vernon (the family home of George Washington).

The next place of interest was San Francisco where Fisherman's Wharf and the Bay area were the main attractions.

One of the most pleasant sojourns of the entire month was the four days spent at Honolulu, on the way home. The weather was perfect and the number of scenic attractions was endless.





DARWIN GUN CLUB Three Day Shoot

On Picnic Day long weekend in Darwin, August 5, 6 and 7, the Darwin Gun Club held the richest shooting event in the Territory, the second annual Three Day Shoot. Trophies worth well over \$2000 were on display and a field of 76 shooters from as far away as Bundaberg, Melbourne, Adelaide and Perth were on hand to do battle for them.

For three weeks leading up to the shoot, the DGC committee worked furiously. Kev Bowring, president, took time off from wheeling and dealing with GMH to do the rounds of the local business houses extracting trophies from the most unlikely prospects, John Doyle altered the program at the last minute to one more in keeping with his unusual imagination, Mick Ellis and Dick Rackemann did the work of four men arranging barbecues, films, grog, raffles, and a myriad other minor tasks. Friday saw the installation of the newly arrived Winchester trap, and an enthusiastic Barry Munt tempted fate and replaced the Damo in trap two with the assistance of Alice Springs visitor Mick Milera. After two hours of perfect targets, it was pronounced a 'goer'.


Saturday the fifth, and the Apex boys doing the catering were out in force with tea, coffee, even Bonox and the odd carton or thirty of that magic cure-all 'Lunatic Soup'. Tony Clausen, who volunteered his services as treasurer and squadder for the shoot in the absence of John Gleeson (ten pin bowling in Singapore) was locked in the cage taking nominations.

At 8.30, the first event, the Parap Preliminary, 10 targets single barrel off 18 metres was under way with almost 60 starters. Seven shooters scored the possible, but after two targets in the shoot off, third place and a primus light had gone to Ted Easton, Kev Bowring and Mick MacArthur, an import from the 'Shaky Isles' with a brand new Browning fought their way to 17 targets before Kev let a clay and first place slip by. Kev collected a Coleman water jug from Dalgety's (a trophy he had organised) and Mick gathered in first place and a silver carving set.

Ray Mack, of Eley Ammunition, South Australia, was on hand to compete and supervise the display of his trophies for the second event, the Eley - N.T. Single Barrel Championship. After the first 15 targets, there were six possibles, but the end of the second round, in which targets dipped and weaved to the vagaries of the wind saw Barry Munt with the only unblemished score. With a grin from ear to ear, he put it down to 'a bit of luck with a couple of skinny ones.' But they all count, and Barry became N.T. Single Barrel Champion for 1978. Eley supplied a Honey Bair reloader. Second placing went to the 'Penciller', Tony Clausen, also undisputed on 28-30, who took home 10 boxes of Blue Stars. In a shortlived shoot off, Kev Bowring claimed third, and six boxes of shells.

The third event, the Casuarina Cash Shoot was a 20 target from handicap form guide for the Calcutta draw that night, and Tony Clausen gave an object lesson in 21 metre shooting to record the perfect points score, 60-60. His tally was tops, and \$90 buys a lot of pencils. Barry Munt (21), Ken Selwood (15), and Graham 'Scrubby' Joiner with his new Perazzi from 12 metres shared the minor prizemoney.

A barbecue and free firewater attracted everyone to the Calcutta draw to listen to Ted Easton auction off the shooters, with Katherineites Ernie Rayner and Ian 'Slug' Winstanley taking on the tally keeping. The pool climbed to \$2150, top money being paid for Barry Munt, which was true to form as Barry had missed only one all day. Kev Bowring and Don Fracaro (Katherine G.C.) also brought over the ton, and an astute Gary 'Stretch' Draper bought the field for \$135.

A few sore heads greeted Sunday's roll call, which started with event four, the Dripstone Double Rise Eye Opener, five pairs targets from 16 metres. Ernie Rayner and Barry Munt battled out for first place and a Coffee percolator, courtesy of Ken Gilmour's Territory Wreckers. Munt won again, 13-14, Rayner 12-14 2nd, and 'Slug' Winstanley got the verdict for third.

First prize in the Ansett-MMA-N.T. Double Rise Championships was a return airfare to Gove to take part in their Annual Shoot in September. Favourite for the fare was Kev Bowring, but the shoot turned out to be 'one of those' ones for him. Dark horse Phil Grove from Alice Springs G.C. took it out in gusty conditions with a final score of 29-34, after shooting it off with 'Slug' after they had both returned 28-30. Barry Munt bobbed up again for third in an up and down shoot off with 37-46.

Event six — the shortest — regaled in the title the 'Coonawarra Case O'Crackers Lightning Handicap', and was five targets double barrel points score eye opener for the Calcutta. Thirteen shot possibles, and the shoot off was conducted in a line up from the centre walk, progressing to the next after all had shot. It lasted 13 extra targets, with 14 year old Peter Bowring, Kev's younger son staggering off with the case of cartridges first prize. 'Scrubby' Joiner took home another minor trophy, five packets of Blue Stars

and Greg Chan came third to collect three packets. Front marker Bill Horner collected two packets with a fine score of 20-21.

The Bowring boys made it two on end when Kev's elder son David, after shooting for only two months, from 11 metres, split the Calcutta prizemoney, \$550, with another newcomer Fred Schreck. These two shooters recorded the only possibles. Completing a sweep of frontmarkers in the event, Bill Johnson from Katherine cleaned up six other hopefuls for third place. Barry Hamilton took the front marker trophy with a 42-44.

It was fitting that the Calcutta pool of \$2150 was shared by two D.G.C. committee members who had put a lot of work and money into running the draw. David was bought by father Kevin, who confessed that he would be getting a few tips from his lads before the next shoot, while Gary 'Stretch' Draper, in a burst of investments that culminated in his paying \$135 for the field, carried on with his winning streak. (Three weeks previously he picked the last six winners at the local greyhounds to win a jackpot of \$3000).


Sunday night was programed for movies, courtesy of Dick Ayres, but the trouble that the club had organising a projector would have made a good episode in a TV situation comedy. Come the time to get the projector and operator and we found he'd gone fishing 'down the track'. Being a long weekend, there were plenty machines unused, but no one home to get them off. Finally, at the 11th hour, Dick Rackemann (who, believe it or not, ran a cinema for five years) got the loan of one from the RAAF Sergeants Mess and showed the movies for us. Great work, Dick!

Monday was the last day for most of us to come good, and the first up event was titled 'The Wonderful Winnellie Wads Workout' (bow your head in shame, JD), and was another five targets double barrel points score eye opener for 10,000 wads. Not one local shooter placed Max Leaford, from Alice Springs at present, took first, with Bob Johnson and 'Bomber' Stacey, both from Katherine taking the minor placings.

On to the final event, and what a thriller it turned out to be. The Grand Handicap had a Beretta 56 for 1st, and Calcutta co-winner David Bowring in the second squad set the ball rolling with a first round possible, but did not have to wait long for company, as squad after squad turned them in. However, only four shooters made it cleanly through both rounds, Norm Turner (Katherine),

Max Leaford, Ted Easton and Greg Chan. Shoot Marshal Munt refereed the final shoot off, with Norm Turner disposing of his first target. Max Leaford was next up. He prepared himself, called and received a left quarterer. Two barrels later, it was still sailing unscathed towards the cliff, and a heavy breathing, lightly mumbling Leaford left the walks. Norm followed soon after, shooting twice behind a swinger. Easton and Chan went barrel for barrel for the next three, then Greg missed with a first barrel and it seemed that all was over, but a long range second barrel caught the clay smack in the middle of the pattern, and the fight went on. Ted, shooting with 'close' friend Peter Close's gun, jacket and shells, received an almost straightaway four birds later, and dusted it, made it deviate, but somehow failed to break a chip off it. Greg made no error with his left flier, breaking it into one cent pieces for first place, a Beretta, and a two metre penalty. Ted, at the presentation when he took a case of wide patterns was heard to mutter something about 'cast iron clays'. Norm Turner took charge of a pile of Winchester components. 

Mary Stacey, of Katherine won the ladies high gun, and Peter Bowring added the junior trophy to his array. John Doyle, who shot dismally all weekend, practically guaranteed himself a long continuation of similar shooting when he won the weekend's raffle, a gallon bottle of MacLeay Duff Scotch, donated by Burns Philp of Darwin.

In a weak moment, Gary Litherland, Medical Officer in the RAAF and a keen shotgunner, invited all and sundry to a 'spur of the moment wind-up shoot' at the RAAF base on Tuesday night, never dreaming that 25 insatiable shooters would take him up on the offer. A feverish burst of energy Tuesday morning had the Gillarm trap performing better than new (a year ago) which just means that one out of two targets was OK. But, true to Murphy, the worst was vet to come. That night, at switch-on, it started continuously firing, worked its way through its repertoire of solenoid jamming, continental target throwing from a non-continental trap, and in a glorious finale, tossing the greatest stack of garbage you'd ever wish to forget. An apologetic John Doyle was promptly put in his place by Pauleen Rayner of Katherine when he tried for the umpteenth time to re-set the trap.

'They're alright', she said 'This is a lot of fun!' Husband Ernie, 'The Fastest Auto in the North' and the rest of the squad concurred, so the sometimes one, sometimes two broken targetcontinental-high flying double rise event continued. Executive Committeemen Retire

In the past few months, there have been two resignations from the Executive Committee. The first was received from Mr Arthur Kenna of Townsville, who has had to yield to business pressures and relinquish his position.

Although Arthur has been on the Committee for only a short space of time, he has certainly left his mark, especially for the way in which he co-ordinated the North Queensland Clubs. There was a time when many of the Clubs in his area were disenchanted with the National Association, but the patience and tolerance of Arthur Kenna moulded them into a unified District Association and kept them within the National body. The display will be left intact for the Monday to enable dealers to see the latest in shooting products.

STATE ASSOCIATION REPORTS ...

South Australian Clay Target Association

At its Annual General Meeting conducted at S.A. Gun Club on the 2nd September the South Australian Clay Target Association underwent a major facelift. The long standing State President, Mr Robert Mules, decided that after 14 years as President, pressure of work, both in his daily vocation and as President of South Australian Gun Club, had finally dictated that he should not seek re-election. Elected in his place was Barry Arnott who is a member of International Gun Club and has had previous Clay Target administration when President of the Australian Gun Club in Victoria. The position of Secretary also became vacant when Past Secretary, Doug Prescott, decided that after having given 20 years of service to the SACTA it was time for a rest. It will be remembered that Doug was Office Manager during the recent suc-cessful National Clay Target Championships conducted at S.A. Gun Club and very few people realise just how much a Nationals drags out of people connected with the running of the tournament. Doug and his office staff did a fine job during the Nationals and it comes as no surprise to find that he now feels he needs a spell. Mrs Claire Sumner, who was one of Doug's assistants during the Nationals and therefore knows what Clay Target Shooting administration is all about, has been elected to the position of State Secretary and will no doubt carry on the good work initiated by Doug.

Doug Prescott has written saying, "It would be very remiss if I did not express my sincere thanks to all who have assisted me over the past 20 years as Secretary. With the newly formed SACTA Committee I am sure the recently implemented Coaching Schools etc., and general policies recently introduced into the sport, clay target shooting must prosper particularly in South Australia."

The final balance sheet resulting from the 1978 National Championships is now to hand and as soon as it has been circulated to the Executive Committee will be published in a forthcoming issue of Clay Target Shooting News.

New South Wales Clay Target Association

Readers will be aware that the New South Wales Clay Target Association is divided into four Zones. Each Zone accepted the responsibility of conducting a fund raising shoot, the proceeds from which were to go to assisting the 1978 World Championship Team to get to Korea. All of these matches have now been conducted and details of results and amounts of money raised should be available for publication in the November issue of Clay Target Shooting News.

Hall of Champions — The New South Wales Department of Sport and Recreation has notified the NSWCTA that a Hall of Champions is to be developed within the State operated Sports House. The main section of the Hall of Champions will be a perpetual display of photographs of sportsmen and sportswomen whose contributions to sport in NSW have been considered sufficient to warrant permanent commemoration. The State Association is seeking assistance from readers to nominate anybody they feel would warrant a position in the Hall of Champions.

State Carnival at West Wyalong — The New South Wales Clay Target Association will conduct the State Trap Carnival at West Wyalong on the 29th and 30th September and the 1st October. It is interesting to note that the New South Wales Department of Sport and Recreation has made a grant of \$500 towards the cost of administrating the Carnival — this sort of State Government support is well worth while. Attached to the Carnival is another round of the Winchester Tournament. It should also be noted that an Air New Zealand return air fare to Auckland for the 1979 New Zealand Championships is the trophy for the overall high gun. This is further evidence of the support Air New Zealand is giving to our sport for which we are all most grateful.

Queensland Clay Target Association

The second State Council meeting of the Queensland Clay Target Association was conducted at Brisbane Gun Club on the 13th August. The meeting was extremely well attended with an apology being received from the four Council members who were unable to get to the meeting. Of those four, two were in USA with the Australian contingent and therefore must be considered to have had a very good excuse. One of the main topics discussed at the meeting was the quality of refereeing and the State Association has developed a policy aimed at improving the standards of refereeing throughout Queensland. Other states should be encouraged to follow this example as whilst it is widely accepted that referees come in for a lot of unwarranted abuse, it is an area in our sport which must be maintained at the highest possible standards to allow our sport to develop along the lines it should.

Learning from examples set by other State Associations, the Queensland Clay Target Association accepted a proposal submitted in writing by Mr Ron Porter that it consider the implementation of a State Carnival. The suggestion was accepted and it is probable that a three day Trap Carnival will be conducted over a long weekend in May of 1979. (The dates of the 5th, 6th and 7th May). The venue will be the Brisbane Gun Club.

Another very important subject which was discussed by the Council meeting involved the forced resignation from the Executive Committee and from the QCTA of Mr Arthur Kenna of Townsville. Mr Neil Hardy, a dental surgeon from Townsville has been recommended as a replacement for Mr Kenna and this recommendation will be discussed by the National Executive Committee at its meeting at the end of December. It should be remembered that the Queensland Clay Target Association is conducting a very worthwhile raffle, the prizes for which are quite significant. Any reader who wishes to purchase a ticket should contact Mrs Bev Grice, State Association Secretary at P.O. Box 22, Moffatt Beach 4551. Alternatively tickets should be available from any Queensland Club Secretary.

President of the Queensland Clay Target Association, Mr Spencer Angel, has been very active in making submissions to State Government seeking financial support and in some respects has been rather successful. Further information on this topic should be available in time for publication in the next issue. Of particular interest to readers is the fact that Mr Jo Bjelke Petersen, Premier of Queensland, has accepted an invitation tc become the Patron of the Queensland Clay Target Association.

Editor's Mailbox

Dear Noel.

Please permit me to offer some comments which could lead to progress in the saga of "A Shooter".

Firstly, congratulations on first publishing the letter. The whole affair is an interesting study in human behaviour.

On the one hand you have a most unhappy shooter who feels sufficiently wronged to express himself most forcibly about a state of affairs which he feels is undesirable - the object of his writing was to (a) make people aware of this situation, and (b) as a consequence, have something done to correct this, for the ultimate benefit of shooting. If he were merely fed-up, he would NOT have bothered to write.

He gives a perfectly logical reason for not having supplied his name - that he not be ostracised - nor has he named any specific referees by name, as he could well have done. Thus, he has kept personalities out of the discussion, and for this he is to be commended.

On the other hand you have the great body of offended people who have put pen to paper in a great over-reaction of selfrighteous indignation, condemning the shooter, demanding his identification and virtually tearing him to shreds before an examination of the condition he speaks of is undertaken.

You, Noel, in your introductory remarks, have said "his allega-tions... may or may not be justified," yet have termed his letter a total display of hypocrisy. Others have termed him "cowardly," "not wanted," etc. It would be a brave man who now would identify himself. And how would identity help the situation?

There is absolutely no need for R. J. Burgess to take personal affront because it throws doubt on referees and the system. No personalities were mentioned, and unless the system can withstand some criticism, it is a poor system indeed.

Things in this life are not always black, or white, shades of grey do exist and we must accept them. Both sides have probably overreacted because of emotional involvement. All the critical letters. have their good points. R. J. B. is quite correct in saying "If some matters require attention, bring it to the attention of club officials, not afterwards." "He could have a legitimate beef."

Brian Mundt also; "Clubs endeavour to procure referees whose judgment integrity and honesty are above reproach."

"A Shooter" has also probably over-reacted because of his emotional involvement in the State team event. But he is sufficiently convinced that a certain situation exists (existed) to try to have it rectified. He has asked that "the matter be dealt with in the proper manner.'

The correct approach is firstly to ask the question, "Could this shooter have a legitimate basis for his opinion?" - This, when stripped to the bare bones, is that equity of targets is not always shared by each shooter.

I shot at the Ballandean State Teams elimination, and, having been a referee since 1963, I can see both sides of the coin. 1. Conditions were (as "A Shooter" says) very windy - I would

- say most difficult, gusty, and varied.
- The referees had a most unenviable task. 2.
- 3. They did their honest best.
- They are human, and so make some mistakes. 4.
- The shooters were all "keyed up" 5.
- There were variations of targets being termed "no targets", by 6. different referees over different traps.

My own experience was as follows: I was given a "lost target" for a target which hit the ground well short of the legal distance before I could fire a second shot. I was so dumbfounded not to be given a "no target" I did not appeal (never having claimed such before), and as the shoot progressed, dismissed the incident as the "poor ref. has a difficult job, and perhaps he isn't calling any "no targets" on this trap."

Yes, I should have appealed, and perhaps have had a target restored - but many shooters on the firing line are NOT in a normal frame of mind.

My fellow shooters' reaction was; "You stupid B., you should have claimed that target." So they, too, thought the referee had erred - i.e. that equity was not observed.

So Noel, let us not declare anyone at fault, nor try to blame anyone. I should have suggested to the management that, in such (almost) impossible conditions, an assistant referee could help decide on the matter of equity of targets, thus satisfying all shooters that such was the case. But, I didn't, so gladly accept responsibility for omitting to do so. Any shooter is more likely to accept the joint decision of two men each doing his best.

It is quite possible for someone to be convinced that a referee is in league with a shooter who often "bluffs" the referee into decid-ing to restore a target; we have all seen this happen.

Finally, the newly-elected President of the Queensland branch of the A.C.T.A., Spencer Angel, made special mention in his maiden address to shooters at the Brisbane Gun Club, that the aim of the A.C.T.A. in all states was to up-grade the standard of refereeing, for the benefit of the sport. No one took exception to this state-ment, so let US not crucify "A Shooter", but all do our best to help equity.

DUBBO AS A NATIONAL SHOOTING GROUND ...

Dear Sir.

DUBBO: The capital of inland New South Wales, a fast growing city ideally situated 410 km north-west from Sydney, 880 km from Brisbane, 840 km from Melbourne, 1200 km from Adelaide, and 400 km from Canberra, and is very accessible by regular plane (25 flights per week) train and bus services.


Many highways cross at Dubbo from Sydney, Brisbane, Melbourne, and Adelaide. You could leave Sydney, by air, 1 hour flight, to Dubbo, and 10 minutes drive from the airport, and be on the shooting ground.

It is well known that most present grounds being used in the present roster cannot be developed further. Therefore, a new ground must now be sought, large enough for any future development. This can be done at Dubbo, for a modest outlay we have the flat country, moderate climate, ease of access, for such a complex. Land not in use could be put into production to supplement our income.

Dubbo has more than it's share of good accommodation, tourist attractions, restaurants, licensed and service clubs, etc. Has its own paper, radio station, three printing works, catering services, and is covered by T.V. from nearby Orange.

Land is available in the city for purchase, for erection of an office block, surplus space could be readily let.

MARCH 17th 1938 — 40 YEARS AGO!

The Melbourne "Sun News Pictorial," carried this headline:

"Victorian Shooters Scoop Pool at Griffith"

Victorian shooters visiting Griffith (N.S.W.) last week for the New South Wales double rise championship at clay targets, "cleaned up" against shooters from the district. With one exception, all the main prizes on the program were won by Victorians.

The title went to A. W. Hall and an accomplished team of Victorians, led by "H. James (Duxbac)", finishing well in front in the teams match.

Bob Ferris (my grandfather), of Langley, near Kyneton (Vic), won a double rise sweepstake, and Hall, W. Gibbs (Griffith), and Corcoran, with F. Holland (Ganmain) divided a handicap at five targets single rise. The main event outside the championship, a 30 pounds handicap at 25 targets, went to F. Holland, with a score of 22/25. Second and third money was divided by Hall, H. McIntosh and Bob Ferris, each 19/25.

The teams' event, five single rise and three double rise (pairs) off 18 yards, was a triumph for the Victorian combination comprising "Duxbac", A. Hall, R. Ferris, and H. A. McIntosh. The Victorians scored 30 points.

When shooting concluded "Duxbac" gave an interesting lecture to his audience, and demonstrated the breaking of clay pigeons with the gun held "pistol style"!

"Taipan" Perpetual Shield

Conditions of Competition -

Ladies' Postal Teams' Tournament.

The involvement of women competitors in clay target shooting continues to grow, as can be proven by the increasing number of States submitting Ladies team scores in Interstate Teams' Matches.

Some years ago, Mrs Elva Churches, co-proprietor of the old established Adelaide gun shop trading as "Taipan" Projectiles, introduced the Ladies "Taipan" Perpetual Shield. The competition is conducted by post and is open to every Club in Australia and New Guinea.

The competition consists of 20 targets from 16 metres for each member of the five person team. The match **must** be nominated before commencement, and Clubs could consider conducting the match as a separate event to further publicise women's shooting activities. The match must be conducted during the month of November, and results (score sheets) are to be posted to Mrs Elva Churches, 945 South Road, Edwardstown, S.A. 5039.

The Shield is currently held by Metropolitan Clay Target Club, which won in 1977 with a score of 82-100.

Only six teams competed in 1977 — there should be at least thirty Clubs which can raise a five person women's team!

Competition conditions are:

1. Teams of five ladies from any club in Australia, Tasmania and New Guinea (ACTA Members). Teams may include members of other clubs if necessary to make up number.

 Event — 20 targets — off 16 metres. Kills to count. Recorded points score to be used only in case of tied score.

 Match nominated prior to commencement, and shot during month of November, under the supervision of an official ACTA Referee.

- 4. No heavier than 32 gram cartridges to be used.
- 5. Score cards to be forwarded to Mrs E. Churches, 945 South Road Edwardstown S.A. 5039 by 13th December.
- 6. Shield held by winning team for 12 months.

ELEY Victorian Teams' Premiership

A new event was added to the Victorian shooting calendar in 1978 sponsored by ELEY Ammunition, called the ELEY Victorian Teams Premiership.

This event is a totally new concept in Clay Target shooting in Victoria. For many years Team Shooting between certain Clubs, Clubs in specific areas within Victoria, and interstate teams matches have been conducted enthusiastically. The ELEY Victorian Teams Premiership however, goes further than anything ever attempted before. The aim of this program is to provide the opportunity for every Club to compete for the right to be called the Premier Club in Victoria.

The Premier Club, decided at the final which is held in conjunction with the Victorian Clay Target Association State Trap Titles in Bendigo on Monday, August 28, will receive a Franchi Shotgun and will also hold the J. Newton-Thomas perpetual trophy. This perpetual trophy will have a great deal of sentimental value to all shooters, particularly those ones lucky enough to have had any association with that legendary figure of Clay Target shooting, Newtom Thomas. The perpetual trophy is the camp oven, suitably inscribed, that accompanied Newton on many of his adventures into the outback of Australia.

Many hundreds of shooters have competed in the event this year and coupled with the prize money going back into the sport and the revenues generated by the host clubs, this represents a real contribution by ELEY Ammunition to the welfare of Clay Target Shooting in Victoria.



An unusual charge ... and a more unusual excuse


The first of the annual batch of mutton bird prosecutions was launched at the Cowes (V) Magistrate's Court on Monday, August 28.

It involved a middle-aged fisherman of Wonthaggi. He faced the rare charge of possession of mutton bird FEATHERS during a closed season.

Fisheries and Wildlife inspectors said the offender walked along a road alongside the Cape Woolamai mutton bird rookery at 11.15 p.m. on Sunday, April 23, got into his car and drove off. He was intercepted. There were mutton bird feathers on the car floor.

The defendant, on oath, said he did not know how the feathers got there, and could only suggest that they BLEW into the car. His explanation for being alongside a rookery at that hour of night was that he had lost his way in trying to locate the home of a mate from whom he had to collect welding rods. There are scattered houses nearby.

Mr T. J. Mayberry, SM, dismissed the charge because of insufficient evidence that the accused was KNOWINGLY in possession. — Tom Gannon, Wonthaggi.

South Australian Skeet **Shooter in World Class**



Fred Guyatt has been shooting for approximately seven years at the sometimes elusive clay. This is the third consecutive year that he has found selection in the State Skeet Team and this year, for the first time, he has been successful in gaining the "High Gun" award in the team.

Last Easter he gained Team selection for the World I.S.U. Skeet Championships in Korea, to be held in late September. This makes him the first South Australian shotgun shooter to be selected for International representation in I.S.U. Skeet.





Olympic Discipline National Championship **Results** — **NEW AUSTRALIAN ISU**

SKEET RECORD

On September 9th and 10th The 1978 National Championships were conducted for Olympic Trench and I.S.U. Skeet. The Trench match was held at International Gun Club, Virginia, South Australia and attracted 60 entries, while the Skeet Match was contested at S.A. Gun Club, Bolivar, with an entry of 12 shooters.

With the exception of Jim Ellis, who was in Canberra for his marriage to fiancee Ann, all members of the Australian World Championships trap and skeet team were entered.

The 1978 National Trench title was won by A. M. "Pud" Burgess from Cobar NSW with a score of 191-200. This is "Pud's" second National title in three years - he was previously successful in 1976 - and demonstrated the remarkable skill and tenacity of the man, as he had not shot trench targets at all for eight months. Second overall and first in A grade was Illawarra shooter Fred Rapley, with a great score of 189-200. Fred is one of the "newer" trench shooters and showed great potential.

B Grade was won by popular Winchester Manager for South Australia, Dick Avres (just back from an extended holiday trip through the Continent, where he must have been getting some sort of practice!) and C Grade was won by talented junior shooter from Ballarat, Victoria - Russell Mark.

The I.S.U. Skeet National Championship was poorly attended. However, what was missing in quantity was more than made up by quality with John Summers establishing a new National record of 197-200, in winning the title. Second was Ian Hale, 186-200 and third was Alex Crikis 184-200.

One of the "finds" of the match was Graham Boyd of Albury, who was in his first I.S.U. Skeet competition, and carded a score of 175-200 to win B Grade.



Last month we had a look at some thoughts on double rise shooting in our bit of a delve into trapshooting and what makes trapshooters tick. I would like to pursue the competition shooting theme a little more this month. The main reason being that some think that kicking around the problems of double rise shooting may be a bit advanced for some. This may be so but this type of shooting is an important part of the trapshooting scene and needs to be looked at. However, clay busting is a very complex game and it was as good a place to start as anywhere else.

Getting right back to basics will be our go this month and basic it will be. It seems to be a fact of life that anyone coming into competition clay target shooting, after shooting a few matches becomes hell bent on making himself or herself a 25 metre X grade competitor in the shortest possible time. Whilst this may be a very worthwhile ambition it is fraught with terrible problems not the least being the incredible mental pressure being expended with very little technique to back it up. I see this sort of thing so often it makes me shudder. The end result of this rapid movement up the scale of gradings and back up the tracks in handicapping and the resultant let down when the technique fail you has led to a lot of very discouraged shooters.

Our handicapping system in Australia is so archaic that it is turning our handicap shooting into a joke. Handicapping in competition according to the accepted definition is to impose difficulties on the superior contestants or to give advantages to the in-ferior contestants to make the contest EQUAL. Or in other words everybody in an event has an equal chance of winning. Under normal circumstances this would be done on ability but in this country we do it by the amount of money you can fluke on any particular day if you are lucky. We start our newcomers off as close to the trap as possible with very little regard to ability and gleefully rip them back down the tracks whenever an opportunity presents itself. A dedicated handicap shooter has a long row to hoe before he can get on the magical back mark in this day and age. I did a quick check of a state program the other day and could only find two events listed that would carry enough prizemoney to get a 24 metre competitor back to 25 metres. So what, you might ask? Well with the lack of incentive to do well in any form of competitive sport the desire to compete loses its edge and we are becoming a nation of handicap whingers. It also shows in the lack of handicap shooting being programed by clubs these days. Again, we run into the Catch 22 situation where until we handicap on ability rather than luck, handicap shooting will continue to slide. Is is a thought that could occupy the minds of some of our clay target administrators.

With graded shooting it is a different story. Grading has probably done more for clay busting than any other single thing in the last several years. It has brought into the sport an equity hitherto unknown and has opened the doors of competitive shooting to all that wish to compete on an equal footing. There are some that play the 'grading game' but to my mind the pluses far outweigh the minuses.

This brings me right back to my original point about this hell bent desire to get up the scale as fast as possible. It has probably ruined the approach to the sport of many a fine and talented shooter. You know, it is not very practical to expect to become a 25 metre/A grade shooter for some people, but if it is practical it is far better to take the trip back up the tracks, and up the gradings, in a natural progression. This natural progression will allow you to develop a proper style and technique that will keep you there when you make it. Grading has helped the younger competitor to do this and all power to it. In a practical sense it is not very sensible to go to a shoot and expect to take on the the hot shot A graders when you are a C grader. What is more practical is to tackle your approach from the angle that if you are a beginner and a C grader you will be the best damn C grader there is by working on your style and technique until you can shoot consistent scores.

It is not very often that you see a C grader topple the top shots. The main reason is that the C grader has not got it all together. But, there are some very consistent C graders that are in actual fact B graders but for a simple mental approach problem. How many times have you seen a C grader miss a target early in an event and then go all to pieces and return a score of 12/20 when you know and he or she knows the ability level should show a score of 16/20 or better. This is where the A grader has the edge, he may miss a target early in the round but keeps it all together and returns a 19/20. He may not win the event but more than likely you

will see him step up to pick up the high gun trophy at the end of the day. If you want an example of this attitude, take Neil Berry at the recently conducted National Clay Target Shooting Titles. Neil did not win a single title at the Nationals but he took home both High Gun presentation guns. This is a classic example of the fine competitive edge that a top shot develops when he has a sound and well developed technique. A technique that has been developed over years and over the gradual rise from tyro to champion.

Grading has put this opportunity squarely in front of every new clay buster. So curb your impatience and take your shooting along the road of mastering the basics before you aim for the big ones. Do this and your grading will look after itself. We will develop this thought a little more next month.

Why Not More Press Coverage of Competitive Clay Target Sports?

This report appeared in the MaylJune issue of the Remington Newsletter, Although based on North American conditions, the comments are also very valid in Australia. Has your Club yet appointed a Publicity Officer?

A nagging concern to the shooters of this country is the danger of a negative attitude toward their activities by the non-shooting general public.

The cause of the danger is easy to understand. A continual shift of our population from a rural to an essentially urban or suburban base has resulted in a large number of Americans who don't shoot, don't know any shooters and have no idea of the nature of hunting or recreational shooting.

Without such direct contact, their opinions and attitudes can be influenced easily by what they hear and read, and, unfortunately, by what they don't read. For it's obvious that the general press tends to devote more space to items that are critical of hunting and shooting than those that are favorable.

Against such a background it's not difficult to understand how a non-shooter could conclude that there is indeed no valid reason for people to own firearms, not at least without some severe restrictions on their ownership and use.

An unfortunate and contributory factor to this picture is the fact that competitive shooting, unlike most other sports, gets virtually no coverage by the general press, rarely even from the newspaper's outdoors editor or columnist.

We know that a fair number of general newspaper outdoor writers are active clay target shooters themselves with a thorough knowledge of competitive trap and skeet. Yet very few of them devote column space to these sports or attempt to report on major matches in their area. Why not?

We suspect there are several reasons. Traditionally, it hasn't been done. Outdoors columns are devoted usually to hunting, fishing, boating, etc., but not competitive shooting. And, possibly, some outdoor writers don't know enough about the clay target sports to cover them, don't know when or where matches are being held, don't think they have the time to cover them, or don't know they are being held at all.

We believe an excellent opportunity is being missed here. It's an opportunity to provide news of valid sports in which many newspaper readers participate and to grant recognition to many top performers in their sport. More important, it is an opportunity to create public awareness of the existence of the shooting sports as legitimate forms of competition. If reports of the local bowling league or tennis tournament merit newspaper space, why not a major trap or skeet shoot in the area?

The greatest value of such coverage occurs when it appears not in the outdoor writer's column but in the general sports section, alongside news of national and local baseball, football, basketball, track, golf and you name it.

It's not hard to imagine what this kind of juxtaposition could do for greater public recognition of the shooting sports and better understanding of the legitimate reasons for firearms ownership.

The only way to develop press recognition of the shooting sports is to start, even if only with a single paragraph. Hasn't the time come? \mathbf{O}


