Why is Sports Assistance the Cinderella Item in Federal Budgets?

\$1,333,000 allocated to sports assistance in 78,79 Federal Budget, an increase of 33 1/3% over 1977/78?

SO WHAT!!!

te 1977-78 Budget allocation to sport was \$1 million dollars ever, EFFECTIVELY this support was for a period of around to seven months ONLY! On this basis alone, it will be clearly such that the 78/79 allocation is a REDUCTION of over 30%. Furthermore the Government already had a forward commitment for 78/79 of \$500,000 to provide continuity of the full-time position

arising from last year's funding.

IN PRACTICAL TERMS, for new initiatives, sport has been allocated only \$850,000 for 1978/79. Consequently, a number of sports including clay target shooting will receive funding assistance which for the current period will have very limited effect

BECAUSE IT IS SPREAD TOO THINLY!

· Who is at fault? Basically, Australia's sportsmen and women are at fault, because of their complacency. We all sit back and wait for things to happen. When it doesn't happen, we bleat like sheep! Would it not be better to get off our butt and do something to influence the decision before it is made, rather than cry into our beer after an unfavourable result.

However, there are other problems. There can be no doubt that sports participation MUST have some connection with a nation's health standards. Yet what could be called health cure programs are allocated hundreds of millions of dollars annually. Why not more for prevention programs (i.e. sports development) - we have oft times been told that prevention is better than cure. Then of course we are tempted to look at the Arts. The following figures have been taken from the 1978/79 Federal Budget:

Firstly, let it be quite clear that there is no dispute with a policy of supporting the Arts in Australia. Any readers who have travelled internationally will readily accept the deep need for such support. But \$26 m. for the Arts against \$1.3 m. for Sport seems to be too large a gap. Perhaps sports aren't socially acceptable. Perhaps the fact that senior Cabinet Ministers regularly appear in the guest lists of openings of Ballet and Opera seasons, or importhe guest lists of openings of Ballet and Opera seasons, or impor-tant art shows, means that as a group, sports have not done suffi-cient work to establish themselves socially. (A good example of this recently received press publicity, when Prime Minister Fraser could only get into the Rugby Grand Final in Sydney because a benevolent LADY gave up her seat!) So there is the challenge — does Australian sport continue to de-pend for assistance on the efforts of too few administrators, or can

a way be found to get Australia's 4,000,000 participant sportsmen and women off their backsides, and express their COLLECTIVE

concern?

It is interesting to note that soon after the 1976 Olympic Games, Prime Minister Fraser, still smarting from criticisms he received whist at Montreal, accepted an appointment as patron of the Confederation of Australian Sport. Although readers may find the connection difficult to see, 1980 is both an Olympic and an election year. Maybe, just maybe, the present Government can be influenced before the 1980 election.

(Because of the importance of long term development of sport in Australia, and because that development is considered in part to be a Federal Government responsibility, the November "Secretary's Notes" have vacated their prime space. The column will be found on page 25).

Report on September **Executive Committee Meeting Discussions**

The Second National Executive Committee Meeting for 1978 was conducted at the Koala Oxford Square Hotel, Sydney, from the evening of Friday 22nd September until late Monday 25th Sepevening of Friday 22nd September until late Monday 25th September. It is evidence of the enthusiasm being shown by members of the Executive Committee that there was a full attendance which included two new faces. Mr Neil Hardy a dental surgeon of Townsville, Queensland, has been appointed to the Executive Committee to replace Mr Arthur Kenna whose resignation was reported in the last issue of C.T.S.N., and Mr Len Bird of Cowra, N.S.W., has been appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr Bruce Noll of Condobolin. The Agenda had been arranged so as the appointment of these two new members could be confirmed as early as possible to enable them to participate in the complete meeting. Tangible evidence supporting the present policies relat-ing to selection of members for the Executive Committee can be drawn from the fact that both these new appointees made a significant contribution to the quality and standard of the meeting. In fact it should be placed on record that the meeting is by far the most effective which has been held in recent years.

On a sadder note all Executive Committee members were

shocked at the illness which afflicted the National President early in the Monday session of the meeting, and which resulted in him having to leave the meeting and, after a long rest, quietly drive home. President Ern had been unwell for some time prior to the meeting and it was only his dedication to the responsible job he has undertaken that enabled him to take his place in the chair at the commencement of the meeting. The weekend was a particularly trying one and eventually took its toll. It was a most unfortunate occurrence and I am sure I speak on behalf of all of the National Executive and our National membership when we extend to Presi-

dent Ern best wishes for a quick recovery.

Now to the matters debated during the meeting. It was an extensive Agenda with 30 major topics listed for discussion. It is the intention of this report to cover those items which are of interest to the general membership of the Association. For simplicity the order of this report has been kept to the order of debate — it may seem that there is a lack of continuity and we apologise for any inconvenience such a lack may cause.

Administrative Report. Arising from the Secretary/Manager's Administrative Report were several recommendations. These in-

Report on September Executive Committee Meeting Discussions (Cont'd)

(a) A Franking machine is to be introduced into the National office to ease the postage burdens currently being faced by the administrative staff.

(b) To ensure prompt payment of any Travel Grant to which a member becomes entitled, a separate banking account is to be opened for this purpose.

(c) Arrangements are to be made to enable the National office to become a processing unit for the placement and supply of spare parts for Winchester Traps.

(d) The Executive Committee supports further investigation into the possibility of creating an Australian Hunting and Shooting Sports Foundation.

2. I.S.U. Sub-Committee. In presenting this report the Chairman of the I.S.U. Sub-Committee Mr Harry Somers of Sydney made the following points:

(a) Australia's International involvement in 1978 has been at the highest level ever achieved.

(b) That the development of I.S.U. Committees at a State level

has not proceeded satisfactorily.

(c) The 1979 National Championships in Olympic disciplines will be conducted at the Downside International Gun Club, Wagga. The date is yet to be decided. However the program will be arranged to enable shooters who wish to compete in both disciplines to do so.

(d) Approval be granted to Melbourne Gun Club to conduct the 2nd Pacific Open International Shooting Championships during Easter 1979.

(e) A recommendation that the National Executive endorse a decision by the I.S.U. Sub-Committee to encourage Clubs staging National Olympic Discipline Championships to hold these events on the week-end which coincides with the Melbourne Cup, usually the first weekend in November.

(f) The two vacancies on the Sub-committee (caused by the resignations of Messrs Kenna and Noll) have been filled by Neil Hardy from Queensland and Keith Sim from New South Wales.

3. Clay Target Shooting News Committee Report. Firstly Mr Hawkins as Chairman of that Committee reported that, resulting from the recent calling of tenders, arrangements have now been made to appoint Waterwheel Press as the magazine printer for a further three years. Reference was also made to the tremendous example set by Executive Committeeman Laurie Connors in contributing a monthly column to the magazine.

Under this Agenda item a letter received from a leading Gun Club was tabled — in this letter the Club had asked that the National policy on editorial content of Clay Target Shooting News restrict subjects to matters relating directly to shotguns and to clay target shooting. The Executive Committe made it quite clear that our prime objective was to promote shooting both in Australia and overseas on the understanding that, as a direct result of shooting gaining a better image, so there would be more clay target shooters come into our ranks.

4. State Association Reports. Although most matters covered in these reports will have been mentioned elsewhere in Clay Target Shooting News issues it is important to realise the significance of the acceptance by Queensland Premier Mr Joh Bjelke Petersen of a position as Patron of the Queensland Clay Target Association. As our needs in political areas increase, it consequently becomes of increasing importance that we mix in the right circles. The Queensland Clay Target Association is to be complimented on its foresight in this matter.

On behalf of the New South Wales Association Mr H. Somers spoke on a need of the newly formed Murrumbidgee Irrigation Area Trench Association for some financial assistance to enable that body to get its Olympic Trench operational. Unfortunately the Association currently has no firm policy on this subject and the matter has therefore been deferred until the March meeting.

5. National Shooting Ground. The subject of the National Shooting ground continues to cause more concern to the National Executive Committee than possibly any other confronting it. This is a natural development as the decision on whether or not to develop a National ground will be one of the most far reaching ever made. Nevertheless, time is getting by and it is vitally important that the Association reach some decisions in this regard as soon as possible. The only decisions reached at this meeting were: (a) That the Association have a policy based on initially using one National ground; and (b) That the Core Group of the Association investigate the alternatives available and report back to the next meeting of the Executive Committee.

6. International Commitments. Brief reports were tended to the meeting on the subject of the Commonwealth Games Training Camp as well as the teams' performance whilst overseas. There was also a verbal report delivered on the preparation for the World Championships Team which at the time of the meeting was over-

Report on September Executive Committee Meeting Discussions (Cont'd)

Then Mr Ron Porter as Delegation Leader for the Australian Group which visited New Zealand earlier this year presented a detailed verbal report on his group's success. He made special reference to some of the early difficulties on policy matters which developed between the New Zealand Clay Target Association and Overseas Entries in their National Championships and commended the New Zealand Clay Target Association for the mature way in which they approached the problem. Mr Porter also reported the discussions which took place between the two Associations on the matter of rules parity and this matter is to be further developed at the next available opportunity. The Committee received Mr Porter's report with acclamation and made an official note congratulating Mr Porter on his dedicated efforts in managing the Australian contingent.

(It was decided as a result of the problems which confronted the New Zealand Association in relation to trophies to which conditions had been attached, that at Australian National Championships any conditions be advertised as such in the Official Program and the Association is to have a suitable trophy available to present to a winner who is ineligible for the original trophy

because of those conditions).

Mr Abbott (Victoria) then delivered a verbal report on the recent successful tour to Singapore. He made special reference to the professionalism of the travel arrangements made by Jetset Tours in their capacity as the official travel consultants to the Australian Clay Target Association. He reported that every member of the group (which numbered 20 people) thoroughly enjoyed themselves and many have already committed themselves to return to Singapore in 1979. He also made reference to the enthusiasm shown by a number of the International entrants in the Pesta Sukan Games towards the idea of visiting Australia in 1979 for a truly International Match. The shooting results of his group were recorded in the October issue of Clay Target Shooting News. Mr Abbott's report was also received with acclamation and he too was complimented on leading such a responsible Australian group. Others involved in the Singapore success to whom special reference should be made include George Breman who did a lot of refereeing during the International Shooting Matches attached to the Pesta Sukan Games and Merv Whitelaw who did most of the original planning work connected with the tour.

Then followed a written report from the National President Mr Hawkins who led the 32 person Australian group to U.S.A. for the Grand American Tournament. This report is published elsewhere


in this issue of the magazine.

The final item under this heading refers to Australia's delegation to New Caledonia which was due to leave Australia on 29th September. Squadron Leader Stan Harding, President of the R.A.A.F. Club at Pt. Cook, Victoria, was appointed Delegation Leader.

7. Simulated Field Shooting and Affiliation with the International Organisation called F.I.T.A.S.C. As simulated field shooting activities grow throughout the clay target shooting world both at a National and International level it is becoming increasingly obvious that Australia as a nation will need to do something officially in gaining recognition. Whether or not this matter should be handled by the Australian Clay Target Association or by the Field & Game Federation of Australia was discussed and resolution was reached that the A.C.T.A. would approach F.I.T.A.S.C. seeking copies of its aims and objectives and its constitution.

Meanwhile an application had been received from Northam Gun Club in Western Australia to conduct a National Simulated Field Shooting Championships in 1979. It was resolved that the Australian Clay Target Association would write to the Field and Game Federation of Australia supporting Northam Gun Club's application for the 1979 National Simulated Field Shooting Championships. However it must be stressed that this is simply intended to be a supporting letter and in no way designed as an attempt to tell the Federation what they should be doing with their National Championships.

8. Constitutional Change. The problems connected with the proposed Constitutional changes continue to dog the Australian Clay Target Association to such an extent that some wonder whether the necessary changes will ever become effective. Once again the Executive Committee spent much of its time debating the advantages and disadvantages of the present proposals and finally re-

solved to put the present proposals to the 1979 Annual General Meeting at Griffith N.S.W. Mr Roy Holtfreter of Western Aust, had prepared a very worthwhile submission on this subject and it was considered sufficiently explanatory to be suitable for circulation to all Clubs throughout Australia. Such a circulation has now been undertaken and should any reader have further questions on this matter would he please discuss them with his Club Committee.

9. Insurance. The Secretary Manager had prepared two data

9. Insurance. The Secretary Manager had prepared two data sheets on this subject, one relating to the possible need to increase the total cover of the Association's Legal Liability Policy, and the second provided information on the possibility of giving Clubs insurance cover for voluntary workers. On the first subject, the Legal Liability Policy, is being increased from \$200,000 maximum to \$500,000 maximum for 1979. On the second suggestion, because premium costs averaged in excess of \$100 per Club, the matter was shelved — the only decision being to circulate the information to any interested Clubs.

10. Change of Age for Junior Qualifications. It has been resolved that from 1st January 1979 the Association will recognise junior shooters as only those shooters under the age of 17 years at the time of registering. This is significantly different from the present rule which recognises shooters 18 years and under. WOULD ALL CLUB SECRETARIES PLEASE NOTE THIS CHANGE.

Report on Executive Meeting (Cont'd)

11. Structure of Team Entries in Allan Brown Club Teams Match at Nationals. It was resolved that at future National Championships in any Club Teams' Match the entrant Club team may only include members whose registration has been taken out through that Club.

12. Classification of Referee Examiners. In a major change of policy in relation to the status of Referee Examiners it has been resolved that Referee Examiners will in future be appointed under

the following headings:

(a) Referee E caminer Trap and Skeet

Referce Examiner Trap (b) (c) Referee Examiner Skeet.

This change will make it very much easier for areas in which skeet is not as well developed as the Association would like to see

it, to have a Referee Examiner appointed for trap only.

13. Concessions to Veteran Shooters. Resolution was reached that a special badge be struck to recognise the length of service of registered shooters whose continuous membership has exceeded 25 years. Furthermore a special bar will be produced for attachment to the badge in recognition of shooters who have exceeded each successive five years of membership. As further recognition of the contribution long serving members have made to the development of the Clay Target Association a membership concession will be offered to all those who have achieved the age of 60 and who have continuous registered membership of 30 years. The concession will be half of the current adult fee. Unfortunately because this decision can only be a recommendation to an Annual General Meeting it will be 1980 before the full effect of this concession can be felt.

14. The Executive Committee devoted much of its discussions to the topic of providing hospitality and courtesies to visitors to various shooting matches. This matter is of vital concern as it will have a significant bearing on the long term development of clay target shooting. This is particularly the case at National Championships and the Executive Committee has pledged itself to ensuring that International visitors and any guests are made to feel very welcome during forthcoming National Championships. However, Clubs also have a very real responsibility in this matter and an appeal is made to all Club committees to ensure that any visitors, whether they be registered shooters or not, always have some recognition offered to them.

15. Travel. As a result of the travel report presented by the Secretary/Manager, the Executive Committee resolved that Ansett Airlines of Australia, Air New Zealand and Jetset Tours each be commended for their efforts in giving the Australian Clay Target

Association such tangible support.

16. National Status of Ball Trap Events. As a result of an enquiry from a Victorian Club which had just installed a Ball Trap it was resolved that every effort be made to encourage Ball Trap shooting throughout Australia. It is acknowledged that the development of Ball Trap matches will play a very significant part in the growth of Olympic Trench shooting and thus will give Australian shooters a much better opportunity to develop their standards. Commonwealth and State Ball Trap Championships are to be added to the allocation list and will be available for the first time in 1979. The 1979 Commonwealth Ball Trap Championship has been allocated to Victoria and the Victorian Clay Target Association will choose the host Club.

17. Deletion of the National Skeet Championship from the National Clay Target Championships program. An attempt to have the National Skeet Championship used as the basis for a National Skeet Carnival was defeated because the Executive Committee considered that the move had come a little too soon. There appeared to be general concensus that ultimately the National Skeet Championship will be able to be conducted in its own right but at the present time skeet shooting in Australia does not have sufficient widespread support to justify making a separate carnival out

of the National Skeet Championship.

18. International Air Tickets to be used as trophies.

Readers will be well aware of the involvement of Air New Zealand in assisting the Australian Clay Target Association with International travel. As a result of this assistance the A.C.T.A. receives an opportunity to send two standard trap teams overseas each year - one to New Zealand and one to the U.S.A. In the past it has been the Association's policy to leave the members of each of those two teams to fund their own costs in reaching an East Coast port of departure. From 1979 the Association has now agreed to pay the assembly fare costs of team members and this will be a welcome change of policy to those seeking positions in these teams. Cont'd on page 10.



Executive Committee Meeting Discussions (Cont'd)

19. Appointment of Queensland Rules Supervisor. The Executive Committee resolved to appoint Mr Arthur Kenna as the second Rules Supervisor for the State of Queensland.

Agreement was also reached that in an attempt to assist Papua New Guinea in improving her standards in trapshooting areas that a Rules Supervisor would be sent to that country to conduct a Referee Discussion Panel and also to appoint a Referee Examiner.

Mr Arch Rowe of Yamba, N.S.W., was asked to accept the responsibility and an effort is being made to arrange his visit for November 1978.

20. Dress at Affiliated Gun Clubs. A very spirited discussion took place on this topic and a unanimous decision was reached that thongs be disallowed on shooting tracks at any affiliated Club in Australia. This applies as much to practice shooting as it does to competition and should be strictly enforced. Furthermore suitable

attire should be worn at all times by members and their guests as in this way to image of the sport will be substantially elevated.

21. National Logo Competition. The Executive Committee expressed its appreciation for the interest which had been shown in this correction. this competition. Over 80 entries were received many of which showed a great level of imagination. The winning entry is that tendered by Mr Jim Shepherd of Maryborough, Victoria, and is as follows:



The Association has expressed its congratulations to Jim and further work is now taking place in relation to selection of colors and production arrangements. Because of the long-term significance of this decision a final decision on color will not be made until the March meeting of the National Executive Commit-

22. Reimbursement of Promotional Funds. V.C.T.A. Agreement was reached that an expense of \$350 which the Victorian Clay Target Association had incurred in the preparation of promotional notes being attached to renewal notices for Victorian Shooters licences should be refunded to the Victorian Association.

23. Determination of Standards of Clay Targets. The Executive Committee expressed concern at the growing number of criticisms being received from Clubs and shooters about the variations in performance of clay targets. As a result of this the National office is to undertake an investigation with the objective of introducing written standards for clay targets for use by affiliated Clubs. This matter is to be further discussed at the March 1979 Meeting of the Executive Committee.

As mentioned earlier in this report the low note of the meeting occurred when President Ern found it necessary to vacate the chair due to ill health. This placed an enormous load on Vice President Ron Porter who became Acting Chairman. The Association's Executive Committee meetings these days are conducted under such pressure that it is no easy task to chair one. To be thrust into the position at such short notice makes the task even more difficult. Nevertheless, as one would expect from an old campaigner, Ron Porter rose to the occasion and performed more than adequately. In fact this matter alone must have given President Ern certain peace of mind.

All in all it was a most successful conference and many of the decisions reached will make a significant contribution to the future development of clay target shooting in Australia. (At the time of going to press the condition of our National President Ern Hawkins has improved considerably and providing he does not overdo it, he

should be 100% fit again in a few weeks). O





TALK about TRAVEL

This month's column is headed by a comparison between the Australian Clay Target Association and the Australian Council of Trade Unions. What has that to do with travel you may ask. Well read on. There are a number of curious coincidences between the two organisations, which culminated in the recent announcement that the ACTU has formed a Leisure Club through which its members can obtain travel benefits.

Let's look at the similarities, one by one. Firstly, the abbreviations - ACTA and ACTU. Then the National President of the AC-TA is Ern HAWKINS while the National President of the ACTU is Bob HAWKE. Have you noticed that President Ern and Bob Hawke LOOK very much alike. Now to the connection with travel. The ACTU recently announced that it would operate for its two million members, a Travel Grant Scheme, similar to the one we have been operating for fourteen months. The ACTU has also selected Jetset Tours Pty Ltd to be its official travel consultant, a decision reached by the ACTA in September 1977.

It is interesting to find that some of the membership service ideas implemented by YOUR ASSOCIATION in recent times have sufficient merit to be "pinched" by other organisations. It's a nice

compliment, isn't it?

Talking of the Travel Grant Scheme, it has already been used by a number of members, each of whom has received a substantial grant to assist with travel costs. The system works only on travel booked direct through Jetset Tours and you MUST identify yourself as a member or family of a member when paying the deposit. A Travel Grant Application form must be completed and signed by the member.

1979 to be a BIG year for Travel

The Australian Clay Target Association will promote travel on a much broader scale in 1979. Arrangements are already well in hand for the following tours:

(a) New Zealand

The 1979 New Zealand National Championships will be conducted at Hamilton on the North Island, from 24th March to 31st March. Your Association has arranged for three parties to attend, one from each eastern port i.e. Brisbane, Sydney and Melbourne. Costs are shown in an advertisement elsewhere in this issue and include transport between Auckland and Hamilton.

Because accommodation facilities at Hamilton are limited, early booking is advisable

(b) Singapore

The Pesta Sukan Games will again be held in August in Singapore. The members of the 1978 group enjoyed themselves so thoroughly that the number of places in the 79 group has been doubled.

(c) USA Grand American Tournament

To cater for the many Australians who have seen the "standard" tourist attractions of the USA but still wish to join an ACTA group visiting the "'79 Grand", alternative tours are available. The standard tour of 28 days will follow basically the same plan as this year's successful promotion AND AT THE SAME PRICE (unless International airfares rise) while the alternative will be 30 days including Canada, and the "Deep South" of the United States.

An approximate price for this tour is \$2100.

(d) Austria, Europe and Great Britain

The 1979 World Moving Target Championships will be held in Vienna, Austria during the last half of August. A group will be organised to take in the Championships and then holiday in many of Europe's most beautiful spots before crossing the Channel into England. After a few days in the United Kingdom, back into Europe and then home. Early indications are that this tour will cover 30 days.

New Caledonia

It is very likely that the World Championship for Simulated Field Shooting will be held at Noumea next year. The ACTA plans to have a big party travelling to the sixth Open New Caledonian Championships, which will be run concurrently. Will you be there?

It will be clearly seen that there are limitless opportunities to combine a family holiday with some shooting, either as a participant or an onlooker. The staff at the National Office are always ready to assist members who have any queries on these matters.





Senior Federal Government Sports Administrator Addresses National Executive

At the September Executive Committee meeting, the Association took another step in its progress when a senior public service officer addressed the Committee. He was Mr Graham Dempster, who is the Assistant Secretary, Sports and Recreation Branch, Department of Environment, Housing and Community Development. As a measure of the increasing stature the A.C.T.A. is gaining nationally, he made the trip from Canberra to Sydney specifically to talk to the Committee.

He began by apologising on behalf of Mr Ray Groom, the Minister to whom the invitation was originally extended. Mr Dempster spoke on the more recent history of sports assistance policies at a National level. The first ever capital grant for sports assistance from "the Feds" was to Melbourne Gun Club and the Victorian Branch of the Sporting Shooters Association, back in 1973. It was this grant, combined with a State Government contribution and a lot of guts and determination shown by many people that the 1973 World Championships were so successful. Mr Dempster was the "bureaucrat" who initiated the 1973 grant therefore he has had a long standing relationship with the shooting sports.

Mr Dempster then drew some comparisons between the Sports assistance policies of the 72/75 Labor Government and the present Government. One of the biggest changes has occurred in the attitude towards competition aid - funding assistance for State teams, from a Federal source, is now very much a no-no. The Feds' attention is now centred on ONLY National and International levels of competition and our readers will be aware that the Australian Clay Target Association has already been a beneficiary under this policy. Under Labor, due to the program being so new, there was a general goodwill shown towards sport, attached to which there was also a certain level of Government intervention sometimes seen as interference. Under the circumstances evident today, the emphasis is very heavily on sports doing their own thing, establishing their own policies and only in extreme cases would Government consider interfering. One exception to this policy applies to the selection and appointment of full time sports administrators and directors of coaching, which result from Gov-ernment financial aid. Quite obviously, in these areas, the Departmental offices have an obligation to ensure that taxpayers' money is being used effectively!

The present Government's policies on sports assistance are based on three main objectives, Mr Dempster said. They are:

 To improve the standards of performance of Australian athletes, and provide them with opportunities to compete at home and abroad. Support National Associations, with the purpose of upgrading the administration and coaching functions to a point where world standards can be achieved.

To co-operate at all levels of Government and sports organisations to assess problems and work towards resolving such pro-

blems to the benefit of all.

He mentioned here, another difference in policy between Labor and the present Government—this one relates to the use of the Sports Advisory Council. Under Labor, this Council was a fourteen man panel, and its responsibilities included advising the Government on almost ANYTHING TO DO WITH SPORT. Under the present Liberal Government, the Sports Advisory Council consists of six people that advises the Government on the way in which funds should be allocated—a very much narrower remit.

Moving on to funding, Mr Dempster pointed out that in the 1977/78 Federal Budget, \$1 million was allocated for sports assistance. In 78/79 the allocation has been increased by 33 1/3% to \$1.3 million dollars. (Ed note — see report elsewhere in this issue on this subject). He said that in present economic climate, any increase in Government expenditure must be considered as a plus. Mr Dempster pointed out that it was NOT present policy to ever aim to completely fund sport in Australia and acknowledged that sports generally did not want it that way either. There is a certain pride and esteem to be gained from pursuing a policy of self-help and he commended the A.C.T.A. for the willingness it shows to accept the challenge of self-help.

Mr Dempster put heavy emphasis on some of the factors considered by the Sports Advisory Council in its consideration of applications from sports seeking funding assistance. These include:

 (a) A strong virile effective National leadership, especially in an administrative sense.

In 1977/78, the S.A.C. recommended the appointment of thirteen full time executive directors. The aim here was quite obviously to improve the professionalism of sports management.

(b) Recognition of a need for change in the structure of the sport — a structure which was found acceptable in 1930 is not

NECESSARILY effective in 1978.

(c) The applicant's ability to prepare and perform to a long term development plan. This plan should cover a minimum of five years and should be under constant review.

Mr Dempster complimented the A.C.T.A. on the preparation of its development plan, which compares more than favourably with





Senior Federal Government Sports Administrator Addresses National Executive (Cont'd)

the plans submitted by many of the so-called major sports. The Association's measurable administrative factors such as membership and financial strength are showing increases appreciably in excess of the accepted norm.

On the subject of structure, Mr Dempster used examples from other sports where a fresh approach to management policies is already producing results. It seemed significant that in all examples he mentioned, the Management Group met REGULARLY and consisted of between 3 and 5 people. He also placed heavy importance on the problems connected with a lack of a "career path" for people entering the profession of sports management.

Mr Dempster made specific reference to the Association's current plans to update its Constitution and without voicing an opinion, left no doubt in the minds of his audience that changes are vital to the Association's long term future. Still on the subject of structure, the speaker commented that, almost without exception the growth of sports in Australia at the present time had a structure which was based on a NATIONAL POLICY MAKING GROUP as opposed to a series of State based groups!! Furthermore, he said that in every case where major policy problems exist, the problems are a result of State bloc-type voting (either directly or indirectly). The successful sports are those which are "big" enough to see beyond State boundaries.

The guest then spoke on some experiences he gained during his visit to Canada for the '78 Commonwealth Games. In Canada, National Sports Associations are actually planning the progress of their top athletes many years ahead, and are offering what we would call sports scholarships to competitors with top potential to ensure that the training program can maintain continuity. In Australia, the forward planning in a competition sense, sometimes extends six months at the most. Mr Dempster drew the anology of the 'cream in the bucket' theory—the cream always rises to the top. His concern (shared by the Executive of the A.C.T.A.) is that in many cases in Australia, the CREAM DOES NOT GET INTO THE BUCKET!

Still on the subject of sports development, Mr Dempster talked about the possibilities of using Federal Government policies on cultural exchange visits to organise a visit by a senior sports coach from overseas — alternatively send one of our top coaches or a team of shooters to a country where he or they can offer something (the visit by some Australian shooting coaches to Fort Benning U.S.A. in 1975 may now come under this heading).

Mr Dempster ended his address, by offering the services of his department to assist sporting associations in ANY problems which may arise with Federal Government departments. Some of the likely areas which come to mind include Dept. of Foreign Affairs, Dept. of Administrative Services and Dept. of Customs and Excise.

Mr Dempster's address was received with great enthusiasm by the members of the Executive Committee and many lessons were learned. Perhaps the most obvious message to come from the exercise is that sports management in Australia is undergoing dramatic change, and the Australian Clay Target Association MUST ensure that it recognises this need.

A.C.T.A. GROUP IN U.S.A.

(Part 2)


Los Angeles must have the worst Custom Hall of any airport in the world. The 32-strong party which recently represented the Australian Clay Target Association in America arrived in Los Angeles by Air New Zealand flight 506 at about 4 p.m. on August 3rd. At 5 p.m., the passengers had still not disembarked, because of delays caused by the archaic conditions at the airport. A Japan Airlines flight was ahead of our plane and appeared to be the subject of a full alert. Consequently it was 1½ hours before the Aussies got an opportunity to see inside the Los Angeles Airport terminal building.

Fortunately, the Custom Department had been advised that the group was due, in an attempt to avoid any unnecessary hassles over the firearms. As we entered the Customs area, a senior officer was calling for "all members of the Clay Target group to move this way" which ultimately saw us through the crush in a very short time — no hassles at all! Nevertheless, it was so crowded in the area that one could easily understand tempers becoming frayed. It took a further 45 minutes for the porter to bring the luggage from the Customs Hall to the ground floor, where a coach was waiting to take the group on the 30-odd mile drive to Anaheim.

The party stayed at the Hyatt House hotel at Anaheim which is on the opposite side of the expressway to Disneyland. The expressway is lined with accommodation houses, all of which appeared to be of a very high standard.

Already we were overawed at the sheer size of everything — for example, Los Angeles has a population of 14 million, which is about the same number as in the WHOLE of Australia. The expressways vary from 8 to 12 lanes, and are all constructed of concrete. There are 4000 miles of expressways in the L.A. area alone. The interchanges and cloverleaves are incredible (a word which will appear regularly in this series of reports). Transport terminals and distribution warehouses line the expressways and contain literally hundreds of pantechnicon trailers either loading or unloading. To give some idea of the density of vehicles there is a motor car to every $2\frac{1}{2}$ adults.

The Anaheim Hyatt House was only two storeys, which set it apart from most of the other hotels. However, it contained 230 rooms and a total of 790 beds — a hotel of very high standards. As was to become the accepted thing during the tour, we placed the firearms in the hotel security room to ensure their safety. This gave the shooters in the group greater ease of mind as this was to be our home for three days.

When the National President entered his room, he was delighted to find an arrangement of flowers and a bottle of iced champagne thoughfully placed there to welcome him by Roy and Betty Ann Foxworthy, who were to be of tremendous assistance to us during the remainder of the tour. (Betty Ann is the editor of the American magazine TRAP & FIELD). However, President Ern found it difficult to get "starters" to assist him to demolish the contents of the bottle, as most of the crew had already gone to Disneyland.

Although almost everybody believes that they know about Disneyland, one cannot appreciate the complexity of it without having been there. The first shock to the system is experienced when you enter the car park. The park covers 160 acres, and holds 118,000 cars, including rows and rows of motor homes and tourist buses.





Every attraction within Disneyland is a show on its own, and one should provide for at least three days and nights to see through it

thoroughly.

The following day (Friday) a coach arrived at the Hyatt House at 8 a.m. to take the party on what was listed as a 7 hour tour of downtown Los Angeles and Universal Studios (one of the world's major movie production "factories"). Driver Rick Crane of Grayline proved to be a most entertaining guide and the day developed into a most enjoyable experience with the tour concluding at around 8.30 p.m. about 7 hours late. The extra time was taken in visting the Mexican area of L.A. known as Olvera Street, where California signed its independence from Mexico. Many of the gang took full advantage of the opportunity to buy leather goods and silver items, all at very realistic prices. Rhonda Porter, daughter of National Vice President, Ron Porter, bought herself a silver embroidered sombrero, about 30 inches in diameter. Some of us felt it would have suited Ron better.

He performed this task with ease, and proudly accepted the accolades of the overawed audience. It was all a great exhibition of the ingenuity of the film makers.

During the downtown Los Angeles tour, we visited the famous Hollywood Bowl, one of the largest entertainment centres in the world. It has a seating capacity of 150,000 people and has been the venue of many of the world's greatest entertainment shows.

The group was taken through the "big name" area of Beverley Hills and saw many of the "grand" homes of the movie stars. Ostentation is the name of the game and the glamour of the area certainly gets to the visitor.

Lunch was taken at a giant bazaar area called Farmers Market, which is recognised as one of the most comprehensive market places in U.S.A. The second full day on U.S. soil was Saturday, and this was the official day for Disneyland. 

One of the most impressive things about Disneyland is its cleanliness. On this day, approximately 500,000 people passed through the turnstiles, yet the grounds were kept spotlessly clean all day! (Imagine how much easier life would be at Australian Gun Clubs if we could develop the habit of putting our rubbish into bins!) The Americans are very experienced at moving people with a population of 230 million they have to be.

Crowd control at Disneyland is wonderful to see. Barriers consist of ropes attached to metal stands and are moved about to suit the particular requirement at the time. Thus, queues or lines as they are called in U.S.A. take up a minimum of ground space. Attendants have people moving all the time, which results in a minimum of waiting time, even at the most popular attractions.

The two highlights of our trip to Disneyland were the parades one in the day and one in the night. 1978 is Mickey Mouse's 50th birthday and all the celebrations revolve around this theme.

The night parade is called the "Electric Light Parade" and is an incredible series of floats depicting various nursery rhyme scenes done in literally millions of small globes — truly a magnificent sight. At the conclusion of the parade, the crowd was treated to a very "American" fireworks display. American, because all of the

At 9.30 p.m. at the height of the Electric Light parade, the timing of the flight was perfect.

It was well after midnight when most got to bed, after making sure that the "Mexico visitors" had returned safely. Short nights were already becoming the norm; for some, shorter than others

Sunday was the day that we had to depart for Las Vegas. We were scheduled to leave Orange County Airport at 9.30 a.m. which meant leaving the hotel at 8.00 a.m. Because there had been some doubt about the bus which was booked to take the group to the airport, we confirmed it the night before — guess what — we finished up with two coaches.

BIG INTERNATIONAL SHOOTING COMPLEX LAUNCHED IN CANBERRA

The Canberra Lakeside International Hotel was the venue for one of the biggest shooting promotions yet seen in the Australian Capital Territory when on the 14th September the A.C.T. and District Shooting Association publicly launched its proposal for the Canberra International Shooting Complex. The power behind the proposal is Mr Val Paral who is one of the most dynamic and enthusiastic people one could ever meet. He has thrown off the lethargy that afflicts so many sports administrators and has proved with the assistance of his enthusiastic committee that obstacles are made to be overcome.

Eighteen months ago Val Paral approached the Australian Shooting Association with a proposal that it consider the development in Canberra of an International Shooting Complex. The delegates at that meeting were too short-sighted to realise the long term benefits to accrue to shooting in Australia from such a development and virtually told Paral to "go roll his hoop". Fortunately for the shooting sports, Paral was not at all dissuaded by this negative approach and simply devoted his efforts in other directions. As a direct result of his tenacity the A.C.T. and District Shooting Association was able to promote a public dinner at the Canberra Lakeside International Hotel which was a sell-out there were 220 paying guests - at which a firm proposal was presented. The guest list at the dinner included a number of prominent people from the Canberra area together with the Secretary/General of the Australian Olympic Federation, Mr Julius Patching.

Because of the Olympic connections with shooting, Mr Patching was invited to address the gathering and during his talk he strongly supported Australia's need for a world class competition shooting complex. He pointed out that both Sydney and Melbourne were rumoured to be considering making applications for the 1988 Olympic Games, there was a strong chance that Australia would be

selected to host the 1986 world shooting championships and should either of those events be allocated to Australia we would be caused great embarrassment through having no venue for the shooting matches. Patching, who is probably the most widely experienced sports administrator in Australia, pointed out that shooting is in the top six Olympic sports. He said it was refreshing to see the foresight of Val Paral and his Committee in recognising the importance of providing an opportunity for the community to use firearms under safe conditions. Furthermore, when it is complete, the planned complex will elevate Australia's standing with overseas countries quite dramatically.

In his profession as Supervisor of Recreation for the City of Melbourne, Patching recently went on a study tour which took in Switzerland. In that country every home has a firearm. Furthermore, in every community centre was to be found a miniature rifle range. Communities can exist compatibly with firearms - there is nothing wrong with the firearm, it is the people who use them who are at fault.

Mr Patching went on to say that in spite of views expressed by some of Australia's "leading" legislators, there is no doubt that legislative control will NOT prevent gun related crimes. Heavy penalties must be imposed to act as a deterrent, while the responsible firearms users are left to enjoy their recreation.

In closing his address, Judy Patching said that the foundation membership of the complex was a bargain at \$150 per person (or \$200 per family) and strongly recommended that all present should take advantage of the investment opportunity.

Senator John Knight, of the Australian Capital Territory then addressed the meeting and expressed the appreciation of all present for the effort put in by Judy Patching in promoting amateur sports in Australia. The Senator pointed out that he is used to being "lobbied" - usually the lobbying takes the form of a few people visiting the politicians office. But to pack 220 people into Canberra's plush Lakeside Hotel, he said, was taking lobbying to a new professional level.

The Senator acknowledged the importance of training the community in the safe handling of firearms — the complex will fill a very genuine need in this area. He pledged his support for the project and promised to use whatever influence possible on his colleagues. Cont'd on page 21.



Val Paral then spoke and emphasised the need to demonstrate a self help motif. He believes that if stage one of the project can be achieved by the family then stage two and three will be possible because of the injection of outside funds. Many of those in attendance took the opportunity to take out foundation membership of the complex.

Before the evening finished, Peter Anderson, the Training Coordinator from Australia's recently returned Commonwealth Games Shooting Team, spoke on behalf of those members of the forthcoming World Championships Team who are resident in and around Canberra. These include Maureen Hill (Small Bore Rifle), Greg Colbert (Pistol Shooting), Jim Ellis (Trap) and Dr Mike Kneebone, Team medical officer. Peter made particular reference to the enormous costs in terms of both time and money confronting team competitors these days — however he acknowledged that to gain a position in a world championships representative team is a fitting reward.

The A.C.T. and District Shooting Association has certainly set the pace in terms of developing new integrated facilities and one hopes that the Australian Clay Target Association can follow suit.



INTERNATIONAL SHOOTING SCENE

The BIG NEWS this month revolves around Australia's clay target shooters competing at Seoul Korea, in the 1978 World Shooting Championships.

Jim Ellis has produced another of his remarkable "under pressure" performances to win a Bronze Medal in the Olympic Trench match with a score of 195-200. Only one target behind Jim, but in sixth place overall, was Terry Rumbel on 194-200.

Australia's development of international style clay target shooting will be greatly accelerated by these performances, as, to use a

worn out cliche, nothing succeeds like success.

After the first two days of the Trench match (at the end of the first 150 targets), Ellis was tied on 148 with another competitor for FIRST PLACE, and Rumbel was equal third on 147. Each withstood the enormous pressure of the last fifty targets to record Australia's best ever performances in world competition. The other two members of the Trench Team, Neil Berry and John Porter gained considerable valuable experience which will equip them well to be contenders for places in the 1980 Olympic Games

The skeet team also performed very creditably, with Alex Crikis being the best Australian with a score of 189-200. Newton Thomas was overheard saying to Alex "For some time, you have been a world-class shooter — now you are a world-class COMPETITOR!" High praise, indeed! John Summers recorded 182-200 and Ian Hale carded 180-200, each a worthwhile performance. Fred Guyatt, the baby of the skeet team (in an international experience sense) although overawed by the congregation of such a large number of competitors battled on well to finish with a 170-200. Unfortunately there has been no official news received from Korea on the team's overall performances, and hopefully a more detailed report will be included in the December issue of C.T.S.N.

. "R & L SKY" OLYMPIC TRENCH POSTAL TEAM'S COMPETITION

Almost two years ago, Ron and Leonna Sky of Taree-Wingham Gun Club, donated a Perpetual Cup for postal competition between trench teams representing ANY club in Australia. The Cup was presented to the 1978 winners, A.C.T. International Gun Club of Canberra, at the conclusion of the National Trench Championship. Harry Somers who accepted the trophy on behalf of the winning Club, expressed his disappointment at the poor entry in the match. Very few teams recorded scores and this seems contrary to the enthusiasm shown by trench shooters in Australia.

So, come on you trench shooters! Scores can now be recorded for the 1979 competition - conditions are as follows:

To be shot over a 100 target event.

Teams of 6-5 scores to count.

At least 3 members of each team must be registered with the Club for which they shoot. 3(a) Limit of 3 teams per Club.

4. Teams must be shot and scores sent to the I.S.U. Subcommittee one month prior to the National Championships.

5. Score sheets to be signed by referee and secretary and submitted to the sub-committee within one month of the date of the shoot.

6. Teams must shoot at a recognised Championship on a 15 trap I.S.U. Olympic Trench layout.

7. Open to all affiliated Clubs in Australia that care to field a

team.

8. Cup to be presented at Australian National Trench Championship each year. The Club who holds the cup is responsible for the cup being brought to National Championship is good order and condition.

9. Rules may be altered at the discretion of the I.S.U. Subcommittee.

MEETINGS OF SHOOTERS INTERESTED IN INTERNATIONAL DISCIPLINES

During the National Trench Championship held at International Gun Club, South Australia, the opportunity was taken to hold an informal meeting of competitors to seek advice on development plans for the sport. One of the things to come out of the meeting was a decision to promote Ball Trap competition in Australia as an

introduction to Trench Shooting.

In line with this decision, Ball Trap championships have been added to the Commonwealth and State roster — the 1979 Commonwealth Ball Trap Championship has been allocated to Victoria.

Talking of Ball Trap shooting, Metropolitan Clay Target Club in Victoria is in the final stages of installing such a facility, which will be tested for the first time during the Grand Prix Carnival to be conducted from November 4th to November 7th.

Switching back to Inter. Gun Club, it has just successfully negotiated the purchase of two Beretta-Fiocchi hopper-fed skeet traps from the Sporting Shooters Association. The installation of this equipment at the Club's Virginia ground will serve to promote the growth of I.S.U. skeet in that state. . . .

COLLECTORS' COLUMN

with Paul Gribben (Cosgrove Gun Club)

Her Majesty's Guns

Part 1

It is just ten years since I saw this remarkable collection of firearms at the Tower of London.

"By gracious permission of Her Majesty The Queen, a selection of finest sporting arms in the Royal Collection at the Windsor Castle, had been lent for temporary exhibition in the Armouries of Her Majesty Tower of London.'

I spent two days at the Tower and brought home with me a detailed description of some of the pieces which had the most appeal. I consider the experience most valuable, and the memory lingers.

I have not sought Royal permission to describe the Royal Arms to our readers, and just hate to think what may happen if I am. summoned at Royal Command, back to the Tower to pay a short visit to the historic chopping block!

Generally the Tower of London is used for the housing of the British Military Collection which contains an example of just about every model of firearms the "Brits" used from the matchlock to the modern breechloader. It was this Collection I intended to study, but to my delight the Royal Collection from Windsor Castle was on show — this was for the first time ever.

The Collection dates back to the time of Henry VIII 1509-1547 who imported quantities of Arms for his Army from many places in Europe, as well as technicians to teach the Art of gun making and War to the Englishmen.

As well, Henry VIII ordered guns simply for their beauty and novelty, and at the time of his death had amassed a fine collection of arms of all kinds.

Charles II and Queen Anne also had an interest in such things, both made gestures of firearms and armoury in order to obtain favours from other Rulers, and doubtless received like gifts in re-

During the reign of the three Georges, the collection gradually grew in importance, but the Prince of Wales before he became King George IV made the greatest contribution, as he and his brothers travelled widely, squandering the Nation's money on wine, women and song, not forgetting vast quantities of the most favoured military and sporting guns, swords and uniforms made by the best makers in Europe and Great Britain.

In 1787 the Government of the time settled debts of the young Princes amounting to no less than the astronomical figure of 659000 Pounds. Prominent among the debtors were some of England's top gun makers, as the Collection contains magnificent pieces from such makers as Henry Nock, John Manton, Robert Wogden, Durs Egg, John Knobley; all apparently made regardless of cost.

The memory of one by Durs Egg remains with me still, a fine double barrelled Flintlock gun dated 1790 fitted with steel locks, inlaid with gold floral decoration and hunting scenes, and the maker's name impressed into egg shaped gold labels. The pans are gold lined, the brown twist barrels are decorated with the Prince of Wales Coat of Arms in gold. The rib has DEGG LONDON in gold letters, gold bead foresight, the barrel tang inlaid with gold floral and lowered to act as a rear sighting channel. The stock of walnut is beautifully figured and neatly checkered at the wrist, and is decorated with the Prince of Wales feathers plus silver mounts of hunting scenes on both sides. The butt plate has the makers name in gold; altogether a richly ornamented work of art costing then 57 Pounds 15 Shillings.

But for the sheer extravagant beauty, the double barrelled Flintlock gun by John Knobley London swordmaker turned gun maker, would be one of the outstanding firearms in the world if judged on ornamentation only. The blue of the locks and barrels, still after 200 years, shone with the brilliance of a new firearm; lock decoration was gold cannon and lions, both the cocks were signed by the maker in gold.

With its cheek rest covered in green velvet, all silver mounts hallmarked for 1789-90 with the silver artist's famous initials MB (Moses Brent). The brown twist barrels profusely decorated at breech and muzzle with gold ornament and gold bead foresight.

TRADE TOPICS

Following the announcement in the October issue of CTSN of a new range of shotshells being produced by Eley at new LOWER

prices, there have been many predictable reactions.

Winchester Australia reacted by offering its standard trap loads at equivalent prices. Meanwhile, apparently by co-incidence, Winchester dropped its complete sales range by 15% across the board, for October and November. As November 30th is the end of that Company's financial year, it would appear that this move is designed to enable the company to meet sales budgets. Over the past few months all firearms distributors have found sales difficult, and figures have been appreciably lower than during the boom of '75 and '76.

Meanwhile, others in the industry are continuing to establish themselves in clay target shooting fields. IT APPEARS THAT THE LONG ACCEPTED CLAIM MADE BY CERTAIN SECTIONS OF THE FIREARMS AND AMMUNITION INDUSTRY THAT CLAY TARGET SHOOTING IS OF LITTLE SIGNIFICANCE IN

THE OVERALL PICTURE IS NO LONGER TRUE.

The FACT is that no other element of the shooting sports can match the present boom being experienced in clay target shooting. The suppliers to our sport who have brought about price reductions are to be commended for the part they have played in bringing clay target shooting within the reach of all who are interested.

Almost without exception, while wages have doubled since 1972, shooting costs are lower. If that doesn't stifle the growlers who claim that the sport is too expensive, nothing will. CLAY TARGET SHOOTING IS ONLY TOO EXPENSIVE TO THOSE WHO DON'T DISCIPLINE THEMSELVES TO KEEP WITHIN THEIR

BUDGET.

Federal Products Gaining Favour with Australian Shooters.

Since Fuller Firearms has taken on the distribution of the complete range of Federal products, it is interesting to note a growing preference amongst benchrest (rifle) shooters for Federal primers. In a recent report on the S.S.A. National Benchrest Championships (see Australian Shooters' Journal August '78) a list of products used by the ten top scorers in the Sporter Class, ALL were listed as using Federal primers.

This seems to echo a recent report in the American magazine "Guns" (August 1978) which states that again in benchresting "Federal dominates, with 81% of the primers used, followed by Remington and Omark. The Federal Match primers have established an incredible reputation for consistency..."

Fuller Agencies is handling Federal and Vihlavuori Primers, which gives that company a very commanding position in the

market.

Rabbidge still busy on Legislation Matters.

All shooters should be grateful for the effort put in by Geoff Rabbidge of Commercial Marketing Company Sydney in fighting any move which could result in repressive Firearms Legislation. Few people in Australia can match Rabbidge's intimate knowledge of the legislative situation Australia wide — two names that come to mind, of people in a similar category are Robert Mytton of the S.S.A.A. and Ted Clarke of the Victorian Firearms Owners' Committee.

In spite of his legislation campaigning, Geoff Rabbidge finds time to direct the activities of Commercial Marketing, the product range of which includes the full Smith & Wesson range of security systems and firearms products and a number of other crowd control products. In our fields, his main interests are Brno shotguns and rifles, and Sellier and Bellot cartridges. No doubt readers will have noticed that Commercial Marketing Co. is now a regular advertiser in C.T.S.N. and is selling very worthwhile quantities of cartridges, especially the S & B Special Skeet.

Geoff is very capably supported in his business by sons Mike and Peter, both young men who have already developed a great experience in the firearms industry. The enthusiasm of the two boys is the main reason that Geoff is able to devote so much of his time

to crusading.

He has just concluded a campaign on behalf of the S.S.A.A., of educating NSW voters in the policies on the subject of firearms control, of the various parties which contested the NSW election. It is perhaps of interest to all readers nationally to read the comments of the leaders of the two major parties:

The Government (Prior to the election).

Mr Wran, to his credit, has extended the courtesy of his office to the Association and has given us his time in detailed discussions. He has now confirmed that there is little point in stricter (gun) licensing laws and we quote in part from his letter to the Association. "... following cabinet this week I announced that having examined provisions in other countries, I now agree that there is little point in stricter licensing laws. The real attack must be upon the people who use violence and who use arms to commit acts of violence. The Government has decided therefore, that greater concentration should be given to increasing the penalties for such crimes." — Neville Wran, July 7th, 1978.

This policy is backed to the hilt by the Association and would, in our view, be supported by all responsible firearms owners. THE PREMIER AND HIS GOVERNMENT ARE TO BE CONGRATULATED FOR THE STRENGTH AND FORESIGHT

OF THIS APPROACH.

2. The Opposition. (Prior to the election).

Mr Coleman, in a similar manner, has given the Association his time in detailed discussions. Some earlier press releases gave us concern as to what the Opposition's policy would be, but Mr Coleman has now assured us that he support the present legislation and its mode of operation: ". . I am writing now to state that I stand by my earlier letter to you, as Chief Secretary, and it is the policy of the Parliamentary Liberal Party to support the present firearms legislation as introduced by the former Liberal Government and its mode of operation." — Peter Coleman, September 8th 1978.

It is interesting to note that a high level of co-operation (unusual for the firearms industry) has been demonstrated by commercially connected people in N.S.W. in relation to assisting in this educational activity. Well to the fore was Keith Herron, proprietor of Keith Herron Pty Ltd who is a tower of strength in the industry, but keeps his help very low key. Keith is another of our regular advertisers.

(Mr Coleman lost his seat at the subsequent election).

Evans & Balfour continues to do good business and in the financial year ending 30th June, produced better profit figures than for the previous year. Les Turner, Managing Director, reported this during a recent interview. His right hand man, Bob ("Phil") Richards has just returned to work after ten weeks long service leave, which he used to undertake an extended tour of the Continent.

.

There is a new product on the market, aimed at preventing damage occurring after accidental discharge of firearms. Although the ultimate is to prevent accidental discharge of firearms by community training programs, there is a place for this new equipment.

Called Gunsafe, it fits easily onto the barrel of any firearm and traps the projectile should an accidental discharge occur. The device consists of a rubber lined steel cap and is claimed to stop any

bullet, projectile or shot that is fired into it.

The suggested retail price is reported to be below \$40, and further information is available from Gunsafe Systems, 172 Bettington Road, Carlingford, NSW, 2118.

With the 1978 World Championships now over, the Beretta people are elated with the results achieved by users of "S.O.4" shotguns.

The victory list is quite impressive as a quick glance will show: Trench — Gold Medal, Individual; Silver Medal, Individual; Ladies Silver Medal, Individual; Ladies Gold Medal, Team (2 members of team used S.O.4's). Skeet — Gold Medal, Individual; Gold Medal, Team (2 members of team used S.O.4's).

Brian Mark of Winchester Aust. in his capacity as Product Manager for Beretta and Browning products was obviously happy when he passed this news on. It seems rather ironic that news of this nature is available from commercial sources before details of Australia's performances have been received from official sources!

1978 NATIONAL TRENCH **CHAMPIONSHIPS**

International Gun Club, Virginia, S.A., 9th and 10th September, 1978.

From the outset it was shaping up to be the biggest and best National Trench Championship on record. Since the '73 World Championships in Melbourne, Trench Shooting has been steadily gaining momentum as Australian shotgunners have been easing into the high pressure world of ISU competition.

Originally scheduled for early October the event was moved forward to coincide with the National ISU Skeet Championships also held in Adelaide at S.A. Gun Club. The event was also shortened from three to two days. This in itself was to cause some problems later in the match as we will discover. The rationale behind the move forward in dates was to give the Australian Trench and Skeet Teams some top competition before their departure to Korea for the World Shooting Championships, and to provide an overall ISU shooting Carnival on the same weekend in the same State. In all it was regarded as successful.

International Gun Club was in its best spruced up condition and the Trench Complex sported a complete cover for the comfort of shooters. This type of cover, whilst common in Europe is unknown in Australia but was well received by competitors.


The event duration of 200 targets and the target color was flouro red/black magpie. Again from the outset it was obvious that the competition would be tough with the roll up of the major part of the Australian team in Rumbel, Berry, Porter and reserve Lowry (Ellis had more pressing things on his plate in Canberra -to wit, his Wedding). Previous winner Burgess and a host of interstate hopefuls all converged on Virginia on Thursday and Friday prior to the championships for the official practice days.

Saturday dawned bright and clear and a maximum field of 60 faced the trench for the first 100 targets. Simple mathematics indicated that this large field would not make it through to Sunday night having to shoot the full 200 targets. Notice was posted very early that there would be a 'cut' at the 150 target mark.

But from the word go it was Pud Burgess that gave notice that he was running hot and it would be up to the rest of the field to stay with him. Pud really had the pressure on after the first 100 with 24-24-25-24 for a 97.

Showing the form that would carry him through to the Silver Medal, Blue Dot man Fred Rapley ran 25-22-24-23 in the first 100 for a 94 to be the closest to Burgess. Then came Ken Lowry 93 with Neil Berry and two local shooters in Dino Oliviero and Trevor Reschke on 92. At this stage Terry Rumbel could only put together a 89 and John Porter was two targets behind him on 87.

Into day 2 for the final 100 targets and again it was Pud Burgess that set the pace with a fine round of 25 first up and at the 125 target mark he had slipped five targets clear of Fred Rapley and six clear of Ken Lowry. Overall standings at 125 were: - Burgess 122, Rapley 117, Lowry 116, Long and Berry 115. Finis Budd and Reschke 114. In the grading the two overall leaders Burgess and Rapley had AA and A well in their grasp whilst Roger Walker with 110-125 had a good grasp of B grade and there was some sort of a tussle developing between young Russel Mark and local boy Peter Marcioinni for the C grade crown.

The decision was made to cut the field to four squads at the 150 target mark and so the pressure was right on to stay with it in round 6. Both Rapley and Burgess returned 23's to leave the lead unchanged but the experience of Rumbel, Berry, Porter and Lowry showed, when they all put together well controlled 24's to make the cut off point easily.

And so to the final 50 targets. It was some kind of drama with the final result in doubt until the final round. It was it seems, the time when all the top competitors came to grips with the targets. Burgess rolled off a perfect 25 in round 7 and Rapley stayed in touch with a good controlled 24. Shooting together in the same

squad there was a deal of interest in the outcome.

Into round 8 (final) and the drama heightened. Burgess shooting lead off dropped his 6th and then his 9th target whilst Rapley shooting No. 3 kept his score intact. One could sense that perhaps something could happen and the atmosphere became electric when Burgess dropped the 19th target and Rapley was still holding it all together. But it was too much to expect the foxy Pud Burgess to miss three out of the last six targets, although he did drop his 24th for a 21. Rapley went clean to get within two targets but the final score was Burgess 191, Rapley 189.



State Associations Report

Northern Territory

Although there is no official State Association YET in the Northern Territory, such a development is in an advanced stage of development.

The project received great impetus as a result of the visit to Katherine by the National President, Ern Hawkins back in July. Since then, Horrie Mills of Alice Springs Gun Club and Kevin Bowring of Darwin Gun Club have been to the fore in keeping the pot boiling, and present indications are that the inaugural meeting of the new Association will be held early in 1979.

Meanwhile, following the creation of the State of Northern Territory, one of the early legislative projects is to control firearms. Reports recently received made it quite apparent that firearms users will have a battle on their hands as early suggestions include such outdated ideas as registration fees for firearms (together with recorded information for each firearm) and many of the other restrictive clauses which have appeared in South Australia legislation. WHY IS IT THAT SPORTING SHOOTERS, WHO REPRESENT ONE OF THE SIX LARGEST OLYMPIC SPORTS, ARE ALWAYS AT THE HEAD OF THE QUEUE WHEN LEGISLATIVE CONTROLS ARE BEING CONSIDERED?

Queensland Clay Target Association

Following representation to the Premier the Hon. J. Bjelke Petersen, M.L.A. who is also the Patron of Q.C.T.A. we have been advised by the Hon. Mr T. Newberry M.L.A. that covering the question of Government subsidy for coaching of Juniors, Mr Newberry advised that the guidelines laid down by Cabinet to be followed in the allocation of subsidies for coaching of juniors provide that subsidies may be paid on the basis of one dollar for each one dollar raised and expended by the organization itself with the proviso that no subsidy will be paid on grants received from outside sources.

Most sporting bodies have a definition of junior and this definition is accepted, but where the sport does not define the junior age then a junior is classed as under eighteen.

Gun clubs, until recently, applied direct for subsidy from sporting funds as there was no State Association for the sport and the clubs were affiliated direct with the Australian Clay Target Association. This has recently changed with the formation of the Q.C.T.A. and for the 1979/80 financial year, applications from Gun Clubs will require to be submitted through the State body.

Up to and including the present financial year, no application has ever been received from a Gun Club for subsidy for coaching juniors, although many applications have been received and approved and payments made towards the cost of the development of facilities.

The Premiers Dept. has further advised that: -

Section 14(a) 1. of the Firearms Act 1927-67 states that any person under the age of seventeen years who discharges, carries, buys, sells or has in his possession any firearm or any kind of ammunition for a firearm shall be guilty of an offence against the Act.

Section 14(a)4. of the Act however gives authority for the issue of a permit, by a member of the police force for the time being in charge of a police district to a person under the age of 17 years, residing or employed in that district, to carry, have in possession and discharge a firearm and to have possession of ammunition, for the purposes specified in that permit.

In this regard, the member of the police force referred to may issue his permit for such a period and subject to such terms and conditions as he deems fit.

Having in mind the provisions of sections 14(a)4., applications may be made by juniors, under 17 years of age, who wish to participate in shoots on approved rifle or gun club grounds, to the Inspector of Police of the particular police district concerned, who may in his discretion issue the necessary permits allowing such juniors the privilege of shooting.

Certain amendments to the current Firearms Act are presently under review and there is every possibility that certain proposals will be made to alter the position relating to persons participating in shooting matches on the ranges of approved Pistol, Rifle and Gun Clubs. We are also pleased to advise that 40 clubs have affiliated with Q.C.T.A. — also there are three newly formed clubs in Queensland, namely Tayon, Granwala Many Kathleen

namely Texas, Greenvale, Mary Kathleen.

At the time of writing an extension has been granted to the Art Union drawing time, this will now take place on 26th November at Gladstone Gun Club, all shooters were advised of this, and urged to take more interest in club administrations. We feel this is necessary as correspondence is not getting past a percentage of club secretaries.

At the Q.C.T.A. meeting in Brisbane in August the President reported that successful meetings have been held in each of the zones. Zone carnivals have been arranged for 1978 showing the enthusiasm of the Queensland shooters, to make the Q.C.T.A. a success

In an effort to encourage clubs to observe the rules, and to have complete uniformity and application of the A.C.T.A. shooting rules, we have written to all registered referee examiners urging them to attend a seminar to be held in Gladstone on 25th November.

Under the guidance of State Coaching Director Mr W. Stevens, Zone Coaches have been appointed. Some clubs have taken advantage of the Coaching plans and already a successful seminar has

been conducted at Kingaroy and Brisbane.

A State Carnival is being organised for May next year, it will be conducted over three days, 5th, 6th, 7th May, at Brisbane Gun Club. The State Team will be chosen at this shoot, thus giving Queensland the chance of a strong team of shooters. Mr and Mrs R. Porter have kindly offered a Perpetual Trophy for the Queensland Champion of this Carnival.

Due to the resignation of Mr A. Kenna, Mr N. Hardy of Townsville has been appointed to the executive committee of

Q.C.T.A. and is also Vice-President.

A State Badge is to be struck the design being the same as the Brisbane Nationals Badge with a bar hanging to depict the zones Commonwealth, State and Zone championships have been allocated for 1979, and clubs have been advised.

Copies of the Q.C.T.A. constitution are available, shooters requiring one of these please write to the secretary for these.

A program booklet for 1979 for ALL Queensland clubs is under way, this booklet shows locations of each club also major shooting events and annual shoots.

The next Q.C.T.A. State Councillors meeting will be held on 26th November at Gladstone Gun Club.

Report on A.C.T.A. Group Tour to U.S.A. & Grand American Championships.

ERN HAWKINS, President.

The idea of building a group tour around Australia's Team attendance at Vandalia proved to be very successful.

Thirty-two members left Sydney on 3rd August to commence a busy schedule of sightseeing at Los Angeles, Hollywood, Disneyland, Las Vegas and the Grand Canyon which left most of us

thinking that at least a month had gone by instead of seven days. The sights were unbelievable to the first time visitor and there is no substitute to learning of these places other than actually being

Then followed our visit to Milwaukee, which I thought to be the prettiest part of the tour, then Dayton and the unbelievable Grand American grounds. From there the majority of the group undertook a side trip to Niagara Falls and Washington where again the scenery and attractions had to be seen so as to absorb their real meanings.

From Dayton we progressed with reducing pressure to San Francisco and its sights for several days and then finally to Honolulu where the group appeared to enjoy themselves immensely, sightseeing, dining out, etc. I am sure they would have all stayed

longer at this location.

My presence in the group was mostly as a holiday tourist and in no official capacity. However at our gun club visits, which are described below, there were official recognitions and presentations

On our return home I distributed aquestionnaireto members of the group and some of the comments made in this report are based on the answers I have received. My comments on shooting are also influenced by discussions with A.T.A. officials, Gun Club officials and shooters from widespread areas of U.S.A.

Visit to Bob Taylor's Gun Club Las Vegas

This was our first attempt at shooting on the tour and our introduction to the club was, to use that word again - unbelievable.

We were met at the airport by Mrs Taylor and club officials who guided our self drivers to our hotel where we were given a full police escort - car and three motor cycles - who took us through down town Las Vegas at 50 MPH with sirens screaming, lights flashing, etc., through red lights and stop signs and continued with us in a non stop run for the full twenty miles to the club.

This reception combined with a temperature of 114°F probably caused the poor scores put up by most of us in the only event available — a $100\ \text{target}$ handicap in which we were all placed on 20 yards. However Rob Cartledge and Tim Catling managed to

shoot well enough to win two of the main prizes.

A presentation of an A.C.T.A. Banner, inscribed piece of Queensland petrified wood and some Adelaide Nationals souvenir wine was made to the Taylors in appreciation of their welcome to us. Bob Taylor contributed some wise comments on the concept of shooting in the U.S.A.

Visit to Waukesha Gun Club Milwaukee

Here again we were met at the airport by Vic Reinders and club officials and welcomed before travelling on to our motel. The next morning a club organised bus picked us up and on our arrival at the club each family or individual member of our group was met by a local family or individual with similar interests who acted as host for the day.

This pre-planning was indicative of the splendid treatment we received during the day. We shot a program of interesting mixed events — including International, U.S.A. style — on one of the most pleasant and picturesque Gun Clubs that I have ever seen. Our scores were quite good and prizes were well distributed throughout

Again similar presentations on behalf of the A.C.T.A. were made to the Reinders for the tremendous effort they had put into making

the day so enjoyable and friendly.

Vandalia — The Grand American

This is what we had all come to see and again it has to be seen to be believed. Seventy-two traps extending over a distance of one and one quarter miles on the edge of an International Airport where the Nationals are of such importance that one runway is closed down and where some 4200 shooters competed in a 100 target event which was concluded in one day gives some idea of the immensity of the operation.

The shooting grounds, the conditions, the targets were all about as perfect as they could be but there were many things that to our

minds were not good.

Safety in gun handling as we know it was practically nonexistent; shoot offs were practically non-existent; and shooters were apparently able to select the targets they wanted to shoot at.

Because of the size of the operation there was no social atmosphere but everything ran like a big well oiled machine and

there did not seem to be any hassles or drama of any kind. Our group was made very welcome by the A.T.A. from the time that their President Forrest Woods, some of his Executive and his General Manager met our plane at Dayton, to the explanation of procedures and assistance through registration by Vice President Len Burford. We were well accepted by shooters on the grounds and by the business people with trade displays. Most members of the group remarked on the hospitality shown by the Remington-Peters organisation.

We were officially welcomed to the Championships and in a very limited ceremony a presentation of gifts similar to Bob Taylors and Vic Reinders was made to Forrest Woods. As President of the A.C.T.A. I was presented with a handsome engraved silver belt buckle by Forrest Woods on behalf of the A.T.A. and for this I was

most appreciative.

At this ceremony I issued an official invitation to the A.T.A. to send a team to our Nationals at Griffith and suggested they build a

group around the team as we had done.

The purpose of our visit to Vandalia was our teams entry in the International event and we can be very proud of the fact that our team took our the bronze medals for third place only six targets in 500 from the winners. Great scores were put in by Bob Smith and Rob Cartledge in this event.
In other events Rob Cartledge was probably the most successful

with scores that included one 100 straight from 16 yards.

To briefly sum up Vandalia, based on our groups response to my questionnaire, on comments from Gun Club officials, shooters and A.T.A. dfficials in U.S.A. and from my own observations I list the following points:--

We should not relax our safety rules in any way.

- We should look at only calling lost targets (2 or lost in Point
- We should look at shooting all the appropriate targets from each lane before moving (2 per lane in 10 target events and 5 per lane in 25 target events).

We worry too much about amplifiers and other noises while shooting.

We should upgrade our official opening ceremony at the Nationals.

We should have a Hall Of Fame.

We look at the practicalities of introducing a "Lewis Class" type of prize distribution.

We should continue the present method of selecting our U.S.A. Team with a condition that a shooter having once received a trip to the U.S.A. is ineligible for the next two years.

9. The "International" Event in U.S.A. should be Single Barrel

from 16 yards instead of 20.

10. We should have more than one National shooting ground.

Since the U.S.A. trip I am personally more convinced that we need two National shooting grounds, located in areas of shooter population such as Melbourne and Brisbane, with one of them as our National Headquarters, Hall Of Fame location, etc.

I am afraid that if we had one location we would drop in attendance to the stage where our existing grounds in each State could

However the overall trip was a great experience - it was certainly no holiday - and I am sure that many of us will need our photographs to remind us that it was not all a dream.

May I conclude by thanking Roy Holtfreter for accepting the responsibility of Acting President while Ron Porter and myself were away. O

Dear Sir.

A great deal of concern is being expressed over the number of shooters failing to re-affiliate with the Association each year. As I see it the main problem is the high cost of competing and I think that Clubs in general are mainly to blame.

Some Clubs are charging up to \$6.00 for local or district championships and paying 1st, 2nd and 3rd outright, with a day's nomination approaching \$20.00. How these Clubs can expect the novice shooter to pay these high Noms. to compete with experienced shooters on an outright basis is beyond comprehension. The main complaint of the graded system in championships is, in a shoot-off, the 2nd placegetter often misses out, but if Clubs paid overall, A, B and C grade this criticism is resolved.

Recently Queanbeyan-Canberra Gun Club held a shoot where the program was organised to give small inexpensive engraved trophies for overall placings on the day of 1st, 2nd and 3rd in each grade along with High Gun, etc., and with the lowering of trophy values, the nominations were reduced to \$12.00 for 100 targets. The Club paid sweeps on each section of the program and comments from the competitors indicated that this is the way Club shoots should be arranged.

With the low current prices of targets there is no reason why most Clubs cannot throw targets at 15 cents each or say \$9.00 for a 60 target program, if they reduced the value of their trophies, and still make a profit for the Club.

I am not suggesting that all shoots be arranged in this way but if the Clubs held cheaper monthly shoots with perhaps once or twice a year holding a shoot with the big trophies and high nominations, I think the attendances would increase and the learner would receive more shooting which is what he needs.

To conclude, I think the management of Clubs would be helping the sport more by encouraging new members with cheaper shooting and more coaching, than grasping for more and more dates to run costly shoots on.

Dear Sir,

I have watched the unfolding of the "a shooter" saga with some interest and a lot of amusement. The suspense as to what form the documentary evidence could probably take, and the amusement at the hurt indignation expressed by some people at the thought that there may be a few one-eyed and/or incompetent referees among our ranks. Of course there are.

As a relative newcomer to this sport, it is evident that it would be difficult to find a sport more likely to be liable to controversy than Clay Target shooting. There is often quite a bit of money involved. The rules are shockingly badly phrased and set out, being quite ambiguous in a lot of cases. Referees are supposed to be able to judge the difference between 44.9 metres and 45.1 metres, and are given every opportunity to favour one person over another in their judgement of what constitutes a slow pull, if they are built that way.

To illustrate this, just after I joined my Club, I was told of a fellow who had just been diddled out of a win because his shoot-off competitor and the referee were bosom mates, and every time the

other bloke missed he was given a "no target". My informant and the person complaining are both members of a highly regarded profession, and I have no doubt that, in their minds the story was true (details available to my Committee if wanted). What probably happened was that the missed targets were being blown short or something of the sort. However the complainant had been about a bit and should have known a legitimate "no target" when he saw it.

Now as to the rules:— Not long ago a popular and capable referee-examiner was challenged, while refereeing skeet, by a visitor to the range, on his ruling on rule 26 in skeet. After the squad finished, the referee came into the office and borrowed a rule book. He read the rule, read it again, read it out loud, threw the book onto the table and said "what the so and so does that mean! These rules were written by a drunken darts player." And of course he is right.

Let's start with rules 6, 7 and 8, which define a legal target. Rule 9 then says categorically "The provisions of rule 6, 7 and 8 shall apply only in still air. Now to me this means that if a trap is throwing targets the right distance at the right trajectory, over the right range, in still air, it should be locked there and left there. It will continue to do just that until a breeze starts, when, according to rule 9, the distances, etc., in the previous rules no longer apply. But that is not what happens. The traps are set to throw a target conforming to the requirements for still air in whatever wind happens to be blowing at the start of proceedings. Referees are charged to see that the trap remains throwing "legal" targets, hence my statement that they must be able to tell the difference between 44.9 metres at which a target is short, and 45.1 metres at which a target is legal. That is rubbish. No one in the world could do that, and I will back that statement with my wallet. If traps were locked to throw a legal target in still air, the referee would only have to call a target which obviously deviated from the norm.

Concerning slow pulls. The rule says that a target shall be released "instantaneously." The difference in that word between a boxer, and an old bloke after his fifteenth go at the rum bottle could easily be half a second. Yet here is a sterling chance to favour your mate. There must be a better way.

Have you ever really read the definition of a baulk? To paraphase, the book says it is "an extraneous occurrence which affects the equity of a competitor after he calls for his target." I bet that it means "an extraneous event which occurs after the competitor calls for his target, and which affects his equity." They are not the same thing by a long shot. Why not say what is meant and exclude room for argument?

The one referred to in the story of the referee-examiner. Rule 26 skeet reads: "the first competitor in a squad should be allowed to move across and stand at least three metres behind the next station from station 2 to 6 inclusive." Why not the second competitor too? The next station from 6 is station 7. How can a competitor stand three metres behind station 7 when there is a trap house in the way. All right, I can guess what is meant, but why not say it? What is the penalty for loading two rounds at singles station 7, or leaving your track at trap before the competitor to the right has fired? If there is no penalty, then those points should be among a "desirable behaviour" section and not in the "rules".

Now, as to referees, why is there not regular provision to advise all referees of any controversial points which may arise. As an example, some time ago, the top brass in my Club were discussing the correct call if a competitor called for his target and then shot the trap house. No answer was forthcoming until there had been considerable discussion and consultation of the book, etc., when it was decided that rule 36 probably meant it would be a lost target. Yet a month later, the identical incident occurred, and the referee involved, who has been around traps for many years and wears a referees badge allowed the competitor a go as if he had had a misfire in his second barrel. After this, I suggested to the powers that be that all referees should be advised of the incident. My suggestion got the same treatment as Poor blind Nell got from the sailor, and when that happens again, the referee still will not know what to do. (I refer to the suggestion that he should marry her).

To sum up, it should be possible to organise matters so that the referee is not required to judge distance and trajectory, only flight paths perhaps, to sort out the occasional "flyer" from wind affected targets. Allowing one second for release of trap targets, as idone in skeet, would get away from slow pulls, and while it would alter conditions slightly, the alteration would be the same for all competitors. Bear in mind, that in I.S.U. skeet, if a competitor







Arthur Kenna Reports for CTSN



Answer --

I'm sure we all realise that if we want to do anything really well, we must learn to do it properly. In other words, there is a right and wrong way of doing all things. Therefore, we must understand and practice the basic fundamentals that are involved. We should practice the basics until they become an automatic reflex action.

- Following are the important basics:
 1. GUN SELECTION AND PROPER GUN FIT.
- CORRECT GUN ALIGNMENT.
- Moving the gun along the same flight paths as target.

 3. PROPER GUN HOLDING.
- - Hands and shoulder position. SWING THROUGH AND LEAD.
- Shoot ahead of the target, not at it.
- CORRECT STANCE.
 - Body in balance.

There are other important things we must develop as we progress, such as concentration and mental approach etc., but these details come along later.

Victorian clubs in all zones can now contact their zone coaches when they wish to stage local coaching classes. Or contact me direct c/o A.C.T.A. office if you wish.

The 1978/79 Season Opens at Kerang

Eric Hall from Kaniva was a little unlucky not to win one of the main trophies but won the backmarker trophy with a score of 37-37.




AN UNCONVENTIONAL FERRET

The following letter has been received from David Hillan, Secretary of the Australian Shooting Association . . .

"I am enclosing two photographs of my Ferret which I use for rabbits. You will see it is different from the conventional Ferrets used by most rabbiters, as this one depends on its 30 calibre Browning. The way the rabbits are developing these days, getting bigger and stronger, it probably won't be long before this is a necessary part of the rabbiter's equipment, as they get rather ferocious if they are only wounded. I am in the process of repainting it so that it is better camouflaged.

"It is powered by a six cylinder Rolls Royce Motor and has a Daimler 5 speed Pre-Selector Gear Box. To date it has only done 7,500 miles even though it is 22 years old. No doubt the low mileage is because the Defence budget could not afford the maximum

economy it produces of six miles to the gallon."

How to Cover Trap and Skeet Shoots . . .

As a follow-up to the article on page 84 of October C.T.S.N., the Remington Arms Company offers this advice.

Reporting on local trap and skeet shoots doesn't require that one be an active clay target competitor himself nor even that he attend the shoot. But it does dictate some understanding of the rules and nature of the sports and the descriptive terminology used.

Outdoor or sports writers who are familiar with trap and skeet can report shoots by either dropping by the host club at the end of the competition or by arranging for someone at the host club to call in the results by phone. A little salesmanship by the writer with his sports editor or editor-in-chief might even pry loose a staff cameraman to photograph winners of major shoots such as state or zone championships.

All that is needed in such a situation is for the writer to learn the location of clubs in his immediate area that run registered shoots and then contact the club secretary or shoot chairman for the dates of scheduled shoots. That same individual may often be most happy to call in results of shoots the writer can't attend.

If a writer isn't sure of the existence or location of clay target clubs that hold competitive shoots in his area, he can obtain such information by writing to the Australian Clay Target Association, G.P.O. Box 2038S, Melbourne 3001.

Simply provide the name of the town or city in which your paper is located and ask for names and addresses of nearby clubs.

There are also a number of potential benefits to outdoor writers in becoming familiar with local clay target clubs. They can provide writers with an opportunity to shoot trap or skeet themselves on an informal or competitive basis, a place to warm up his or her wing shooting before the beginning of hunting seasons, and, since some clay target clubs also have outdoor rifle and pistol ranges, a place to practice with and sight-in both handguns and rifles. Many outdoor writers who perform both newspaper and free-lance magazine work on shooting subjects also find a nearby gun club an ideal place to conduct test work and set up article-related photography.

In summary, the outdoor writer who doesn't have a working relationship with a gun club when one exists nearby is missing a grand opportunity to build public recognition of the shooting sports and to further his or her own practical and first-hand knowledge of all shooting activities.

Clay Target Sports offer unique, lifetime values

For some hunters, the end of winter brings temporary retirement of their rifles and shotguns until re-opening of game seasons the following fall.

Among many other shooters, however, spring kicks off an entirely new season of activity, a busy, interesting and challenging one to boot. These are the nation's legions of clay target shotgunners.

Various types of trap and skeet shooting form one of the largest participant sports in the United States. Participation ranges from simple weekend recreation to serious competition in officially registered shoots and on up to those training for the prestigious opportunity to represent their country in Olympic competition.

Those already involved in some form of clay target shooting are virtually unanimous on one point. The sport can be a lot of fun, with a variety of potential rewards.

Without question, one of clay target shooting's most attractive aspects is the fact that nearly anyone can become a participant, even a serious competitor, with few of the restrictions based on age, size, height or athletic prowess imposed by many other sports.

Another interesting exception is the European sport of soccer in which participation, particularly among youngsters, is growing rapidly in this country. A major factor in this growth is the recognition by parents, once they become familiar with the sport, that their children of average or less-than-average size and height can play at no disadvantage and minimal chance of serious injury.

Non-shooting parents, who may have had reservations about allowing their children to get involved in shooting sports, have also been pleasantly surprised to discover that sports such as trap and skeet are among the safest known and provide youngsters with an excellent platform for personal satisfaction and development of maturity and self-confidence.

A built-in bonus of clay target shooting is the fact that these are lifetime sports, a recreational outlet that won't be shut off when participants complete schooling or reach a certain age. Major clay target championships are won periodically by both teenagers and veteran shooters several times the age of the youngsters. In addition, trap and skeet are enjoyed by many people with physical handicaps that preclude participation in most other sports.

Getting a beginner started in clay target shooting can be relatively simple. Most sportsmen's clubs have shooting programs with competent instruction and help for beginners of all ages. They are usually most happy to obtain new members and have others join their shooting ranks.

Frequently, clay target shooting becomes a family affair, presenting a rewarding opportunity to maintain a common area of activity. Parent and child and husband and wife clay target partnerships are numerous.

What's the best time to introduce beginners to clay target shooting? Anytime is good, but spring is possibly best and that's right now. Anyone interested in obtaining the name and address of a clay target club nearest to them can write to any member of the Executive Committee of the Australian Clay Target Association or the National Secretary-Manager, G.P.O. Box 2038S, Melbourne, 3001.

GUN TALK

Pat Browne

Let's continue our delve into the bits and pieces we have been discussing on the techniques of trapshooting. Of necessity we cannot go too deeply into all the ramifications in so short a column but I think we can kick around a few ideas that may make your life a little easier in the frustrating trapshooting game.

Little sayings that you pick up over the years have a lot of depth to them. I daresay you have heard a lot of them, but do you realise how much depth is in some of them. Let's look at a few and see

whether they have any basis to have you believe they are true.

Try this one . . . the mug shooter will say he is going out to shoot 20 straight, the smart shooter says he is going to break the NEXT target. Oh, how true this statement is. In a coaching clinic I run at my local Gun Club the main thrust of my instruction is to get the novice to work on his technique with one overiding thought in his

This is to master the basic techniques to be able to break each target individually as it is faced. To do this you need a single minded approach to these basic techniques and when they are mastered you can turn your attention to breaking good scores. BUT, the only way you will do it, is to break each target individually. Once you can get your mental side under control to do this you shift out of the all-so-ran class and into the championship class. It stands to reason that if you can divert all your mental capacity into breaking each target as an individual target, the final score will look after itself.

Try this one . . . I'll go in this event, but there are plenty of shooters here that can beat me." If I have heard this statement at gun clubs once, I have heard it a thousand times. I would give you a shade of odds that the fellow who made the statement didn't win. Negative attitudes in competition trapshooting would probably be the single biggest reason for missing targets and thus losing

Hark back to the previous paragraph where we were talking about the basic fundamentals. Trapshooting is not a game where you are competing against a field of other shooters, it is a game where you are matching your ability to master all the techniques required to break a fast flying clay target. You need all your physical and mental capacity to do this successfully. BUT, you cannot do it if you are worrying about every other bloke who is out there trying to do the same thing. You can bet your life that the fellow who wins the event was not worrying about you, he didn't have to, you had talked yourself out of winning before you started.

I well remember at the Nationals just recently, when talking to a top shot after he had run a very nice 50 straight in one of the events. He made the comment that he had noticed on the scoreboard that his arch rival had also shot 50 and . . . "that he is real hard to toss in a shoot-off." You do not win a prize for guessing who won the event.

The negative attitude displayed in that simple comment indicates that there is a flaw in the mental attitude to clay target shooting in that competitor's mind, that unless controlled, could become devastating. Confidence in your ability is not an ego trip, it is an attitude of mind that comes when you have done all the work on the basics and have worked on them to such a degree that you KNOW they will not let you down in the heat of competition.

Perhaps we could finish up this month by looking at this statement you quite often hear . . . "don't call for a target unless you intend to break it." This has a lot of meat in it. It means that you treat every target that you face as the only target you have to break. In simple terms, it comes back to the point that practice and competition targets are of equal importance. On the practice field or at practice sessions you might just as well not be there if

you are not working on some facet of your game.

I could tell you how far you would get if you wandered onto the training field at North Melbourne and told Ron Barassi that you only came out to kick a few balls from end to end and you were not taking your football seriously at that session. It is only over recent years that we have begun to recognise that it needs a single minded approach to the shooting sports to get to the top. More importantly, we are starting to realise that shooting is a sport like any other sport with its just demands on the physical and mental resources of the competitor. In this context then, the competitive clay target shooter needs to approach his game with a plan of action that is going to improve his performance.

There is absolutely no way this will happen if there is a sloppy and ill defined approach to his or her training program. So, for every target that you call for there is only one result, to break it. If you do not break it, you have done something wrong. If you have done something wrong there must be something wrong in your technique. The practice session is the ideal place to iron out these flaws in your technique and this can only be done if you are taking each target you face seriously.

It took me a long time to realise this myself but now that I have learnt the lesson, I hammer it home to all who participate in my coaching clinic. At our sessions every target thrown is one that something can be learnt from. With this approach all agree and you would be amazed at the improvement shown when a shooter stops and analyses what went wrong when a target is missed.

So there it is, three common sayings that roll off the tongue whenever and wherever trapshooters meet. But behind these glib statements is a wealth of trapshooting experience. They were initially made by top gunners that have been through the mill and the advice contained in them if you examine them carefully and can grasp the meaning will do a lot for your game. THINK ABOUT IT, I am sure you will agree. (Reprinted by courtesy of Australian Shooters' Journal)


