

Secretary's Notes

Here it is, the second issue of CTSN for 1979 and within a month of the 1979 National Championships. The Nationals look like being the biggest and the best on record and a note on this subject appears elsewhere in this issue.

However the really big news arises from a recent meeting of the Association's Core Group, which consists of the National President, Vice-President and a senior Executive Committee member (Mr Roy Holtfreter of Western Australia). That meeting forwarded to the Federal Government a recommendation that Mr J. N. Thomas be appointed as the first full-time National Director of Coaching for the ACTA.

The recommendation was accepted and Mr Thomas commenced duties early in January. It is vital to the continued progress of the Association that this investment by the Federal Government pro-

duces the greatest possible dividends.

It is also of interest to note that the Federal Government has provided funding assistance to the shooting sports (including the forward commitment to the ACTA) totalling more than \$100,000 in the past two years. This must be seen as some sort of insurance against severe anti-gun legislation, at least at a national level.

Another major matter discussed by the Core Group related to the establishment of the Association's National Headquarters. Quite an amount of time was spent on this subject and visits were made to inspect possible sites at Avalon, Carrum Downs (both in Victoria) Albury and Wagga (both in NSW).

Special mention should be made of the effort put into a formal

submission presented by the Wagga City Council.

Other venues on the list of possibilities were Belmont (Q'land),

Monarto (S.A.), Dubbo (NSW), and Canberra (ACT).

It was extremely frustrating for members of the Core Group to find that at the conclusion of their three-day meeting, the ground staff strike affecting the airlines resulted in both Ron Porter and Roy Holtfreter being unable to return to their home states.

President Ern was fortunate to get on the last flight to Sydney

(the meeting was held in Melbourne).

As the 1979 Annual General Meeting draws near, one gets to thinking about election of office-bearers. It has occurred to me that with the introduction of State Associations, we have risked a breakdown in the public relations area, in that endorsed candidates for appointment to the National Executive Committee are not always widely known to registered shooters in their own states.

The solution seems to be that Zone and State elections of officebearers should be widely reported in the pages of this journal - in this way, at least those registered shooters who WANT to be in-

formed will be!

Still on the subject of election of office-bearers, the following nominations have been received for vacancies which will occur at the 1979 Annual General Meeting of the Australian Clay Target Association:

National President: Mr E. F. Hawkins.

Executive Committee: Queensland - Messrs G. R. Porter and S. Angel (two vacancies); New South Wales - Messrs H. Somers and L. Bird (two vacancies); Victoria - Messrs L. G. Connors and K. Dobson (two vacancies); Tasmania - Mr D. R. Taylor (one vacancy); Western Australia - Mr R. Bailey (one vacancy); South Australia - Mr. T. Reschke (one vacancy).

The Annual General Meeting will be held in the airconditioned Clubhouse of the Griffith Gun Club on Friday 9th March 1979, commencing at 7.30 p.m. O

Griffith Gun ClubPrepares for '79 Nationals

Since it last acted as host Club for the National Clay Target Championships in 1978, the Griffith Gun Club has undergone some impressive improvements.

The Clubhouse was razed by fire in 1975, and this tragedy forced the club to erect a new building which now boasts all the comforts of the "soft life".

Complete with spacious kitchen and office, the new clubhouse is fully air-conditioned for summer comfort and is sure to provide a haven for many "hot and bothered" competitors during the 1979 National Championships.

The official opening of the new clubhouse took place on Saturday 30th December at the commencement of the Club's traditional New

Year Carnival.

In introducing the official guest, the Hon. A. R. L. Gordon, Member of the New South Wales Legislative Assembly and Minister for Conservation and Water Resources, the club president, Ian Evans, made reference to the significant financial help the club had received from State Government sources. Mr Evans also acknowledged, that when it is finally prepared for the forthcoming National Championship, the Griffith Gun Club will be one of the largest clay target complexes in Australia, consisting of eight trap fields, five skeet fields, and plans completed for an Olympic Trench.

The Minister took the opportunity in his speech to express his Government's appreciation of the part gun clubs play in community life — he also stated that both State and Federal Governments are becoming increasingly aware of the need to provide the so-called "minor sports" with financial support.


As further evidence that he had done his homework well, the Minister mentioned Australia's recent successes in international shotgun events, making special reference to Jim Ellis, who was present on the Griffith ground at the time.

After a further comment on the important part played in the new clubhouse project by Mr R. V. Budd, who was the architect, Mr Gordon declared the clubhouse open. A suitably inscribed plaque was unveiled and shall be set into the wall of the clubhouse.

Included in the list of special guests present for the opening were National President Ern Hawkins, immediate past president 'Tup' Pedersen and his wife Enid (who is still on crutches following an unfortunate fall last May), Executive Committee Member Keith Sim, and Secretary of the Victorian Clay Target Association, Trevor Nash.



THE TOUR OF THE CENTURY CONTINUES



Resulting from a decision by Air New Zealand to support the entry of an official Australian team to compete at the 1978 Grand American Tournament, a touring group was formed and took a 29-day holiday.

The first four parts of this report have followed the group through California, Nevada, Wisconsin, Illinois and Ohio. While the official team was competing at Vandalia, the giant trap facility of the Amateur Trapshooting Association, the tourists took a two-day trip to Niagara Falls and Washington D.C.

Departure from the Airport Inn, Dayton was at 6.30 a.m. and 23 of the group boarded the bus for the 1/2 mile trip to the airport. Tour leader Wendy Bartley had advised us to carry only our Jetset shoulder bags, as suitcases would be inconvenient due to the constant travelling.

The original suggestion had been to make this extra tour a threeday affair, to also take in New York. In retrospect, the physical ef-

fort to sustain the pace over three days would have taken much of the benefit away — in fact many found the two days pretty hectic.

But back to the story. We boarded an Allegehny Airlines DC9 which travelled via Columbus to Buffalo. A Grayline coach was waiting at Buffalo Airport and before long the party was on its way for a tour of Buffalo and its environs. Then across the Peace Bridge over the Niagara River and into Canada.

After a brief customs check on the north side of the bridge, the tourists continued through beautiful countryside to the village of

After some interesting bartering for souvenirs, with the negotiations all in French, the party continued on to the lunch stop, which was at the "Skylon" restaurant, about 260 feet above the falls. Access to the aerial restaurant was by "exterior lift", a small bubble car that climbed up the outside wall of the giant tower.

The view from the restaurant was something that will live in our memories for many years to come, particularly the majesty of the falls themselves. When one sees the tremendous volume of water that cascades over the precipice that forms the falls, it is impossible to believe that the whole area ices up during winter. In fact, columns of ice many tens of feet high turn the falls into a white wonderland during the freeze! Another experience (one which we missed, unfortunately) is to see the Niagara Falls at night, when giant banks of coloured floodlights turn the tumbling waters into a fairwland. After lunch, many of the party took the optional boat trip which






Back on the bus, and we pressed on to the Great Gorge, through which the Niagara River tumbles in a tremendous fury of wild water. A cable car crosses the gorge and offers the sightseer an unparalleled view of the foaming rapids.

We then walked through the giant Niagara Power Station and Hydro-electric scheme, which is amongst the largest in the world.

After passing the Niagara University, we returned to Buffalo for a quick evening meal before a frantic trip to the airport to catch the late night plane to Washington D.C. Don't ever believe that those giant buses are governed!

bus for a full day tour of Washington and down through the old village of Alexandria to Mount Vernon, the home of George Washington.


The first half of the tour included many of the National Capital's places of pride. Naturally, the most impressive was the White House, which we saw through after queuing for about 30 minutes. The beautifully appointed State and Diplomatic Rooms reflect the history of this great building and leave an indelible imprint on the mind of visitors. Past the Washington Monument, circled by a flagpole representing each of the 51 states, to the US Capitol Building, an experience all on its own.

The group was escorted through the Main Hall of the Capitol Building into the Senate Chamber where the House was in session. It was quite a thrill to see some of the US Senators "in the flesh." Naturally, security precautions were extremely rigid and one went through regular X-ray check points. Even cameras were not allowed in many areas.

After leaving the Capitol Building, we travelled past Watergate to the John F. Kennedy Centre for the Performing Arts, where lunch was available. The Centre is of huge dimensions and contains numerous theatre facilities together with a cafeteria and the inevitable souvenir stalls.

On to the coach again and the driver headed across the Potomac River, past the Iwo Jima Memorial and on to the Arlington National Cemetery. Due to the size of the area covered by the cemetery, which includes graves of fallen heros spanning more than a century — from fallen Cavalrymen to Astronauts — a special sightseeing tram is provided, and the route takes visitors



past the Kennedy graves and numerous other graves bearing the names of famous military personnel. The highlight of the Arlington visit was the ceremonial Changing of the Guard on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier — a tribute to the many unidentified American soldiers lost in various wars. This was a very moving moment and emphasised the American attitude towards patriotism and national pride.

From Arlington the party moved to George Washington country— Alexandria, which was once a great sea port (it is situated at the lower reaches of the Potomac almost into Chesapeake Bay) and Mount Vernon, George Washington's beloved home which dates back to 1674. The Mount Vernon homestead and associated out-buildings have been beautifully preserved and some of the antiques are beyond belief. The back of the main building faces a magnificent panoramic view of the Potomac river.

Here also the tourist is extremely well catered for with restaurant and cafe facilities, a wide range of quality souvenirs

and parking areas of a size you wouldn't believe.

The group left Mount Vernon at about 5.30 p.m. and the coach captain provided an "extra" on the return trip to Washington by showing us around the small side streets of the historic town of Alexandra. The whole town has been preserved in its early 1800's form and in the event of new buildings being erected, a permit will only be issued when the municipal authorities are satisfied that the design meets with the standards required to maintain the atmosphere.

On arrival at Washington Airport, some very tired Aussies fell into an aircraft for the flight back to Dayton, where arrival was at 11.30 p.m. Many were beginning to wonder just how much the

human system could stand.

However, the next day (Friday) was Grand American Handicap day and all wished to share in the conduct of this epic match. (See

January issue for story).

While all this tripping around had been going on, National Vice-President Ron Porter and his wife Muriel (dubbed the "Queen Mother" because of her regal wave — Betty Biggs had even whipped up a set of white gloves for the lady!) had returned to work, in the sense that they had gone to Calvary and Edmonton in Canada to look over the venues used for the 1978 Commonwealth Games. The purpose of this visit was to give Ron a better understanding of what was required for the successful staging of the shooting events included in the 1982 Commonwealth Games to be held in Brisbane. It is this sort of dedication that keeps our sport on a high plane.

Saturday, 19th August, was the group's last full day in Dayton—it was a mixture of good and bad news. The good news was the success enjoyed by Robbie Cartledge in gaining a place in the Doubles Championship. The bad news was that some of the party had to return to Australia. Beth and Tim Catling and Peter Tink had reached the "turn-back" time and their departure left quite a hole in the group. Each had played a tremendous part in the overall success of the tour, thus far, and their departure for Australia was to be a sad moment. The latter part of the day was spent in frantic packing — new bags and cases appeared from everywhere to accommodate all the "new purchases".

Departure for San Francisco was at 0800 hours on Sunday 20th August. Many of the group's new found American friends were at the Dayton Inn to farewell the Aussies as they clambered on to the

coach for another 1/2 mile drive to the airport.

After a plane change at Chicago, the travellers continued on to San Francisco, a flight of about four hours. Some of the wild country in the Rockies was quite eyecatching, with snow still to be seen

on some of the higher peaks.

Arrival at San Francisco was at about 1.00 p.m. local time (this was to be a long day due to time changes) and the party was taken to its home for the next four days, the Kyoto Inn, in the heart of the Japanese section of San Francisco. The hotel was spotlessly clean and very modern — however the lack of American type meals for lunch and dinner disappointed some of the Australians—Cantonese food sometimes loses its appeal.

Mid-afternoon, Ron and Muriel Porter accompanied by daughter Rhonda, arrived back from Canada — living up to the "regal" image, their car from the airport was a huge black Continental

limousine.

Most of the party relaxed for the rest of the afternoon, although many were back at sight-seeing by dusk, and gravitated to Fishermen's Wharf, which is very commercialised, but still most interesting. The fish restaurants which abound there are always full and there is a great variety of other merchandise. However the real charm of the area comes from the street stalls of hand crafted products and the constant entertainment offered by the street buskers.


Back to San Francisco, and a tour of Chinatown by night rounded off the four days.

 ADELAIDE to Perth, Melbourne, Hobart, Sydney & Brisbane & return to Adelaide \$846.20. ADELAIDE to Canberra (six visits) and return \$824.40, saving on Canberra venue \$21.80.

We do urgently require a central neutral ground for Association activities and the obvious choice is the National Capital of Australia — CANBERRA FOR A NATIONAL SHOOTING VENUE.


We are on show to our New Zealand neighbours and, with more interest in travel to other nearby offshore countries, this should increase. What more could we offer our visitors than a modern clubhouse with excellent shooting facilities in close proximity to their accommodation (possibly 10 to 15 minutes drive from their motel) with sightseeing to the Snowy Mountains, Cotter Dam, War Memorial, Parliament House, Institute of Anatomy, Cruises on Lake Burley Griffin and Canberra's famous Autumn Leaves and Gardens

We must accept the fact that, to provide the best, we must consolidate our costs and this does not allow for a duplication of any sort. Should we build two venues then the cost must be doubled for only half the use, we cannot afford this extravagance — likewise, we cannot continue the present system of rotation as the expense involved for use once in each six years is beyond the economic capacity of any Club.

The decision must be made now and whatever the result the Executive Committee will receive some criticism—they will also receive some congratulations. Should they delay further, the costs will increase and we, the present day shooters, will be dead and will never have the satisfaction of seeing our sport delevolp and our country with a National Ground. The national ground issue has been mooted since 1965 and we are not one bit closer to any solution, let's make a decision and get on with the job—the sooner we start, the cheaper it will be and the sooner we will have the pleasure of using the ground.



WHEN THE SIDE BY SIDE DOUBLE BARREL WAS KING

by Roger Darwon

The story of the side by side double barrel shotgun recalls many nostalgic memories as the author traces its origin and recounts the famous gunmakers of yesteryear.

About the time David Livingstone was born at Blantyre near Glasgow not that far away in France, so was the birth of the pioneer type breech loading gun. About the same time, a French gunmaker named Lefaucheux of Paris was making his contribution to this forerunner of the modern breech loading gun.

It may be a symbolic coincidence but when we hear the phrase "Darkest Africa", which is also reminiscent of the mid-Victorian geography book let us remember with gratitude the simple fervour, the courage, the enthus asm and self sacrifice of men like David Livingstone and the French gunmaker named Lefaucheux not only for their achievements but also for the inspiration of their life work — an inspiration that has wielded so mighty an influence not only in the opening up of Africa, but the beginning of the modern day breech-loading gun. For, when the young Scot went to open up Africa, with him went the breech-loading gun.

David Livingstone was born in 1813 and died in 1873. This man blazed a trail through the unknown "Darkest Africa" and left the famed legend reported in the New York Herald by H. M. Stanley, who was head of a relief expedition organised by James Gordon Bennett, proprietor of the paper. Stanley reported "There was a group of the most respected Arabs and as I came nearer, I noted the face of an old white man among them. He had a cap with a gold band around it, his dress was a short safari jacket. I then shook hands with him. We raised our hats, and I said Dr Livingstone, I presume? and he replied Yes."

That phrase today is as famous to the world as the breechloading gun and Westminster Abbey in London, the final resting place of the great Scottish explorer.

In appreciation of Livingstone and Lefauchaux's work, there lies one great claim to undying fame for through their efforts, we today are enriched and multiplied a thousand-fold by their individual deeds and determined devotion as early path-finders, men who dared to search out the unknown, to attempt the impossible.

The properly-equipped hunter in the pre breech-loading days using a muzzle loading shotgun, was forced to carry with him a large assortment of accessories such as spare nipples, nipple wrench, ramrod, shot pouch, powder flask, caps wadding and a pick with which to clear the vents occasionally.

By contrast the Lefaucheux invented breech-loaders self contained ammunition provided a simply convenient solution to these problems. Moreover, the breech loader that the French gunmaker devised was a far safer arm. With the muzzle loader, there was the ever present possibility of putting more than one charge in a barrel and the risk of a loaded barrel discharging accidentally while the other barrel was being charged.


As is evident the hammer breech loader, devised by Lefaucheaux evolved from the percussion cap side hammer muzzle loader. This bears out when one compares the two types of guns and notes the many design features carried over in this early evolutionary process.

Certainly the relatively rapid rate of fire, possible with the breech loader, would have been more pleasing and much safer for men like Livingstone and others who dared enter the unknown, and the many dangerous situations their quick loading breech loaders in both rifle and shotgun must have got them out of.

There would be little comfort in calling to your gun bearer for shot, powder, caps, wadding and ramrod after you missed some enraged lion or big bull elephant bearing down on you with mud

fury, as you attempted to reload your trusty old muzzle loader in self defence, what?

This new breech-loading shotgun was also a great improvement for the Australian shooter and hunter, as the paper and brass shotshells used in the reloading for each shot made it so much faster, trouble free and that much cleaner to use than the muzzle loader it followed.


With the coming of Lefaucheux's new and easy loading gun came an era that introduced many Australian, American, English, Scottish and European sportsmen to their fondness for shotgun shooting, and their appreciation for high quality shotguns.

At this same time, the double barrel hammer shotgun evolved practically to its highest form — the subsequent change over to the present day hammerless gun merely completed the transition started by the inventive Lefaucheux.

The following English firms are among those that pioneered the design and handcrafted production of high quality double barrel shotguns. They are listed here, not in any order of merit or excellence but only by reason of the fact that they all pioneered the shooting world of fine grade and presentation guns and rifles in the era after the Frenchman Lefaucheux made the move to breech loading weapons.

W. W. Greener (1829) had its head office and works at the then St Mary's Row, Birmingham. Greener guns have been awarded the highest order of merit at International Exhibitions. They have won at all the great Gun Trials at London and abroad; have won the most sought after prizes at both trap and field trials in every country, and have been used by the finest sportsmen and best shots in the world. This firm has now been incorporated into the Webley and Scott firm of gunmakers which was first established in

Holland and Holland or Hollands as they are commonly referred to, are famous for their best London guns and their magnificent double rifles which are so much a part of the big game hunting of Africa as Livingstone or the famous Jim Corbet from India, both of whom used their big game stoppers in their day. Listed are the prices you will pay for such fine arms today: Royal game gun 8700 pounds, Royal deluxe from 8000 pounds, Badminton game gun 4750 pounds, Riviera model pigeon trap gun price on application.

And for the interested, their best double rise in "Royal" De Luxe is priced from 12,000 pounds — just in case you feel like dropping a line to order one or two.

James Purdey and Sons Ltd., (Audley House 57-58 South Audley Street London) — I doubt if there is a gun-nut or shooting man in the world who has not heard of the famed Purdey name. The Purdeys commenced business in the reign of King George III and have been making the finest guns for over 150 years. They are holders of numerous Royal Warrants and are currently gun and cartridge makers and gunmakers to His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh. Waiting time for a Purdey gun (1978) from time of ordering to actual delivery is currently 3½ years. Listed are prices currently charged for the following guns: Hammerless ejector game gun in 12, 16, 20 gauge 8800 pounds, Hammerless ejector game gun in 28, .410 gauge 7000 pounds. Purdey also makes an over and under gun in 12, 16, 20 gauges for 10,000 pounds.

Possibly not so well known is the fact that Purdey also makes double rifles in calibres .375 flanged, .465, .470, .577, and single rifles on Mauser actions.

The best known Purdey to the keen gun man must be the very special order placed by a Greek-born American, who requested the best Purdey ever made. The order was placed 12 years before he picked up his prize request. He took part in personal details of how it was to be and all special gold inlays, style acceptable to the Jurdey craftsmen. The owner stated from the start, it was to be the best shotgun ever made by Purdey, possibly the best gun ever made at all from an original cost factor. Twelve years after his order the much prized gun was ready. It cost 30,000 pounds.

After he picked it up the delighted American refused an offer of 50,000 pounds for it — a ready profit of 20,000 pounds but he refused saying it was just not for sale. Can you think what the import duty

and tax must have been on top of all this?

Westley Richards and Co. Ltd. (Grange Road Bournbrook Birmingham). Westley Richards was also established in the reign of King George III. This firm would be of interest to the collector as they sell and do restoration work on the collectors' weapons and also deal in them. Their currently available shotguns to order sell at 5,200 pounds with a delivery time of over two years.

Boss and Co. (13/14 Cork Street Piccadilly London). Boss and Co. make only one grade of gun, "Best grade", one of the few gunmakers which specialises in over/under guns for the custom market. In addition, the Boss single trigger mechanism is regarded as the finest in the world. So versatile is its trigger that will work safely even when regulated to a pull of only 1lb. (Australian law requires a minimum trigger pull of 2½lb on importation no matter how fine the quality of the mechanism).

Cogswell and Harrison Ltd (168 Piccadilly London). Cogswell has been established for over 200 years as gunmakers. Its "Victor" sidelock ejector is price on application. "Konor" boxlock ejector price on application. And the "New Regency" boxlock sells for

3,388 pounds.

Some of the top names in America for shotguns who led the way in that part of the world for the breech loaders were Parker Brothers and L. C. Smith and Co. Their origin dates back to the American Civil War.

Way back in 1926 the top grade or special custom Parker gun called "The Invincible" cost \$1500. Parker Brothers of Meriden, Connecticut, led the way in the United States in the development of the fine breech-loading double barrel shotguns.

A Parker lifter-bolt hammer gun was first offered in 1868 and remained in production for about 30 years. The bolting mechanism of this gun was controlled by an underlever release located in front of

the trigger-guard.

The first guns featured a nipple and cap arrangement to shoot a shell with a flash hole in the base to admit the primer flame. Later this model was modified to take a conventional breech-loaded centre-fire shell. In 1882, about the same time W. W. Greener introduced in England the first ejector hammerless breech loader. Parker Brothers replaced the lifter bar on their guns opening mechanism for the double shotgun and this feature increased its popularity.

At first, Parkers offered over 20 different grades of guns with the 1890 prize tag of from A grade \$300 down the line to their P grade at \$65. They had a selection of bores that covered every known bore possible, with their special model by order as mentioned, "The Invincible" custof at \$1500. Starting from 8 gauge 10, 12, 14,

16, 20, 28 and also 410 bore.



COACHES' COLUMN.

In last month's column I discussed the problems skeet shooters have when, for no apparent reason, they suddenly have great difficulty breaking targets from stations two, five, six and eight.

This month we'll discuss a similar situation when we shoot trap targets and possibly the left and right angle targets from lanes one and five, do from time to time, become a source of worry to many shooters. When this happens, don't hesitate to seek the advice of a qualified person such as your zone or club coach who will be in a position to help you get back on target.

To find the solution to our poor shooting form and solve the problem of continuing to miss a particular target, we must go back to the basic principles involved in shooting moving targets. It is only by adhering to the basics that we can become a more consistent shooter.

One of the most important basic requirements we must adopt for shooting moving targets is the need to have a properly fitted and suitable type gun. A poorly fitting gun will cause the shooter to incorrectly mount and cheek his gun. This position will in turn result in poor shooting, especially right and left angle targets from lanes one and five at trap. Also crossing shots at skeet. The very same thing will happen in the field at game.


Proper stance is perhaps the next most important basic. We must remember to avoid an unnatural stance such as feet too wide apart or too close together which will result in being out of balance. During the shooting action, try to adopt an unstrained and not tensed up position. In other words, stand easy and alert, ready to swing right or left with ease.

Position of the feet will need to vary from lane to lane. Body weight should be shifted to your left foot and lean your shoulders and upper body slightly forward from the waise. The left knee can be bent just a bit. In this position we are leaning just slightly forward into the recoil of the gun. We are also better positioned to follow the purpose with our print and teneral lead.

follow through with gun swing and target lead:

Gun pointing position on the trap house is another important detail. This is where we look for and pick up the target for correct sight alignment. The proper gun holding position on the trap house will enable us to sight the target leaving the trap house at the earliest possible moment. If we can see our target within the first eight to ten feet of flight, we have a much better chance of catching and breaking it. If we don't catch up to it until it is half way out, our chances of swinging through and breaking it are very much less indeed.

Let's assume we are having problems with our left angle target from number one lane at sixteen metres and keeping in mind what we've been discussing. Our diagram will serve to illustrate the trap field lay out. Here we show maximum left and right as well as a straight away target angle.



Firstly we'll discuss the left angle target from lane one: The trap house shown in the sketch is marked with five black dots which indicate a suggested approximate gun holding point on the front top of the house. By holding our gun at this point we are able to focus our gaze over the known area of target release. In other words we will quickly catch on to target/angle of flight.

Stance and feet position is most important on this station. Remember not to expect only a left angle target because we stand on number one lane. We sould in fact receive a maximum right which would appear to us as a straight away from number one lane; hence the need to adopt an easy tension free stance, ready to swing through 90° of target travel if necessary. Further study of our sketch will highlight the pointing positions for the other lane. The solid line is line of gun travel through to trigger let off ahead of target.

Finally, when the target appears, latch on to it and never lose sight until your gun has caught up to, and broken it.

Good shooting for 1979.

Blackies need ounce and a $\frac{1}{4}$

Some of us are a L-O-N-G time in getting the message.

So, to save others from waiting until they are also 53 years of age before they find out, I tell of my conversion to a heavier load for black ducks.

My duck shooting has been confined to opening days when birds are close and mostly teal; rice shooting, which is much the same; and ditto for three or four dusk splash shoots around the South Gippsland coast.

Let's face it . . . you can bring down teal with a handful of wheat!

But weekly — sometimes twice a week — last duck season I did district dams where most birds are niggers.

My usual load of 22 grains of Nobel 60 behind an ounce and an eighth of 5s proved inadequate.

The birds were being hit. One even somersaulted but kept on go-

In addition birds were still in range after my two shots.

A mate lent me his Browning auto. I used the screw-on half choke rather than the screw-on full choke.

"And try these ounce and a quarter loads," he said, giving me some factory loads and some of his home loads.

Those 27 grains of Nobel 64 behind the heavier load of 3s made ALL the difference.

And the birds were not knocked about.

I also liked the five shots that the "jack hammer" provided. O

Australia has Produced Past World Shooting Champion

The reference to Australian medal winners, which appeared on page two of the December issue of CTSN has certainly created some interest. To say that the claim that Jim Ellis's Bronze Medal was the first Aussie medal in a World Championship was incorrect, is the understatement of the month.

The first reaction came from the small-bore rifle shooter of international standing Don Brook, and was published in the January issue of CTSN.

Since then, Ray Parker of Colac has pointed out to the editor that Don Mayfield of Cavendish (Western Victoria) has WON a World Championship.

Ray writes: "Referring to the story Mr Don Brook wrote concerning Australian Shooting Victories at World Championships, and his statement that in 1970 at Phoenix was the first time an Australian Flag was flown over a World Shooting Championship. (Shooting News January 1979).

As Mr Brook quite politely said he could not understand how you made such a mistake. Perhaps as he reads the following he will understand; also how one must be so careful when looking up records.

In Madrid in 1963, Don Mayfield of Casterton, Victoria, won the World Live Pigeon Shooting Championship against a field of more than 500 shooters, a truly remarkable feat. This then would be the 1st time an Australian Flag was flown above the Worlds Marksmen.

Regarding the point that live bird shooting is not now legal in Australia it does however make up a large portion of competition shooting in the world today. Legal or not here it takes none of the credit from Mr Mayfield, nor alters the fact that he was the first Australian to win a World Shooting Championship, and as such his name has gone down in the World Shooting Records as a World Champion, also that in Madrid in 1963 the Australian flag was flown for the first time over a World Shooting Championship for the first place."

To add further to the history of Australian achievements in World Shooting Competitions, the newly appointed full time Director of Coaching, Newton Thomas, has provided information which shows that there have been two earlier World Champions produced by Australia.

These were:

February 28th 1907 — H. Fraser 24-25 from the 30 yard mark using a Boswell shotgun. His prize was 720 pounds and a Gold Medal. 1923 — W. G. (Bill) Downie, of Victoria. Bill Downie's win was all the more remarkable because of his loss of an arm and an eye.

The fact that these championships were won at live pigeon matches detracts nothing from the achievement, as AT THAT TIME, this type of shooting was legal world wide.







New Innovations to be seen at Nationals '79

National Clay Target Championships will take on a new look this year when in excess of 500 competitors assemble at Griffith Gun

Club, New South Wales, during the first half of March.

Probably, the most important change is that the Tenth National Skeet Championship will be completed in ONE DAY. This will be possible because a further two skeet fields have been added to the Griffith Gun Club facilities, bringing the total of skeet fields at the Club to five.

Another major change is seen in the list of trophies for graded events, where recognition is made for an overall winner (who is the National Champion) together with winners of the three grades. In the past winners' trophies have been presented to the overall winner, and the winner of the two remaining grades.

Trophy values have been dramatically increased, and each event

now carries an individual trophy of significant value.
For example, the following list shows some interesting and desirable trophies:



25th National Single Barrel Championships — the overall winner will receive a "Porte Bote" car-top boat, complete with Mercury electric motor, in all valued at \$650. The THREE grade winners will receive a silver trophy valued at \$100.

18th Australia-New Zealand Trap Championship — the overall winner will receive a BRNO shotgun mounted on a special lockable security gun rack, donated by Peacemaker Australia. The THREE grade winners will receive a silver trophy valued at \$100.

39th Champion of Champions Cup — the overall winner shall be presented with a 'Honda' trail bike, made available through the valuable assistance of Mr Sergio Zuffo of Olimpyc Targets. The Griffith Honda dealer, Griffith Motorcycle Centre, has assisted in the supply, help for which the Association is most grateful. A Silver trophy shall be presented to the THREE grade winners.

In addition to the major trophies listed above, each event provides an opportunity to win substantial cash awards.

High Gun Award winners will be very proud of their trophies, which include a Browning Presentation Model shotgun, a Winchester Presentation Grade shotgun and a Beretta S680 shotgun, all donated through the courtesy of Winchester Australia; an SKB shotgun, donated by Michaelis Bayley Trading, the Cec Herbert Cup for the veteran with the best aggregate score over the three qualifying events for Mackintosh team selection; the J. Newton Thomas Perpetual Trophy; the Verlie Hawkins Trophy to the lady with the best aggregate score over the six trap events, and the ELEY Rose Bowl to the lady with the best aggregate score over the six trap events and the skeet.

The list looks even more imposing when one adds the value of the team positions in the Air New Zealand team to represent Australia in USA in August at the Grand American Tournament.

Total value of perpetual trophies, individual trophies, team awards and cash prizes exceeds \$50,000.

In other developments designed to upgrade the standards of the premier clay target events on the Australian shooting calendar, the promoters have arranged for an extensive range of trade exhibits to be installed at the ground, a new range of souvenirs will be on sale, and selection of a trap team to visit Great Britain in 1980 is being considered (it should be noted that any decision on the Great Britain team will NOT take effect until the 1980 Nationals).

The host club is playing its part in introducing improvements, and in addition to the installation of two new skeet fields, has built a new Clubhouse complete with office and kitchen, all fully airconditioned.

Already conventional accommodation facilities at Griffith are fully booked for the period of the National Championships, although some hotel and motel accommodation is still available in towns close to Griffith.

The secretary of Griffith Gun Club, Harry Hillery has recently started to organise billeting in private homes, or privately owned caravans around Griffith, and any persons interested in obtaining this type of accommodation is invited to contact Harry at 6 Lawson Crescent, Griffith 2680.

In another first for the ACTA, a special souvenir program booklet is being printed to commemorate the 1979 National Championships, and a copy will be handed to each entrant as he nominates. The booklet will also provide space for full results to be recorded through the courtesy of Winchester Australia. Clay Targets and Cartridges

A decision has been made by the Association's Core Group to use Olimpyc Targets exclusively throughout the 1979 Nationals series.

Cartridges will again be specially branded and will be available ONLY at the ground — the exception is the Grand Australian Handicap, in which any cartridges may be used (including home loads) provided that they are loaded with 36 grams or less of shot, sized 6 or smaller,

The promoters are pleased to advise that competitors will be given the benefit of the recent dramatic price reduction in cartridges and Browning, ELEY and Winchester products will all be available at around \$80 per case (500) or \$4.30 per packet. Case quantities including a mixture of shot sizes, will qualify for the "case lot" price of \$80.

Cartridges will be available from a distribution booth, which is located behind the Clubhouse and between the bar and the catering marquee.

For the first time in recent memory, the official opening of the South Eastern States' duck season will co-incide with the Pre-Nationals events being run by Griffith Gun Club. As Griffith is in the centre of one of the best duck shooting areas in New South Wales, 1979 provides a golden opportunity to combine duck-hunting with the premier tournament on the clay target calendar.




Sunday 5th November, 1978

Wednesday 22nd, November, 1978.

I was invited to attend a school boys individual and teams Championship match being conducted at what is to become registered in 1979 with the A.C.T.A. and known as the Ouyen Gun Club. This club has only been in operation for a few months. Brian Loxton, a member of the A.C.T.A. and a keen shot gun shooter himself, is its originator. To encourage the growth of the sport and to endeavour to give opportunity to youth to receive education in firearm safety, Brian along with Mr Trevor Monk, a teacher from the Ouyen High School, conducts a tuition class every Wednesday afternoon for students attending this school.

Twenty-one students were competing this day, in what was called the Ouyen High School Team Championship. A sash and trophy was provided for first and individual trophies to fourth place, all donated, as well, a small memento trophy was given to each member of the winning team. The population of Ouyen, a wheat farming district, is only in the 1,700 area, but shooting would be a top activity amongst the lads that live on these farms. The ages of the competitors on this day ranged from 12-16 years. The types of weapons used were old, but safe and in good order. I observed seven single barrel shot guns, one side by side, one side lever action, four automatics, and four under and overs. One youngster was so proud of his old single barrel weapon, he polished it so often it looked as though it had been chrome plated. A social atmosphere had also been created this day by a barbecue lunch being organised prior to shooting being commenced.

After a shoot-off lasting one target, Alan Pickering collected first place 18-21. Ricky Marks was second 17-21. Two shooters shot 16-20 and shot off for third and fourth placings. Third went to Alex Jardine and fourth to Gary Evans. The top team was Alan Marks, Steve Saunders, Rickie Marks, Wayne Manly and John Ross. Their

team score 60-100. LAURIE CONNORS, See you where there is shooting, North West Zone Vic. Executive.





Team Selection Procedures — 1979

Following Australia's excellent showing in International shooting competitions during 1978, the Executive Committee of the Australian Clay Target Association has accepted a recommendation from the ISU Sub Committee, relating to 1979 competitions.

The recommendation is based on a decision to compete in trap and skeet events at the 1979 World Moving Target Championships, to be held at Vienna, Austria from August 14th to 24th (NOTE REVISED DATES!)

Some of the main points included in the recommendation are:

- (a) Provision is made for a total of 11 members to be included in the Australian Shotgun team — five trap, five skeet and a manager.
- (b) A total budget of \$25,000 has been established to fund the team.
- (c) Seven of the team members will have their costs met by the Association, the remaining places will be partially funded. IT SHOULD BE NOTED THAT MINIMUM QUALIFYING LEVELS WILL BE SET, AND IT DOES NOT NECESSARILY FOLLOW THAT ALL FIVE POSITIONS IN EACH SECTION WILL BE FILLED.

The funding arrangements are:-

(i) The first three selections in each section will be fully funded.

(ii) The fourth selection (where applicable) will be 75% funded.

(iii) The fifth selection (where applicable) will be 50% funded.

(iv) The team manager will be fully funded.

The purpose of this new initiative is to provide the opportunity for international experience to a shooter who is "on the way up."

- (d) Mr Newton Thomas has been named as Acting Team Manager.
- (e) For the first time, the Association has named four competitors to be automatically included in the team. There are: Trap — Ellis and Rumbel; Skeet — Crikis and Summers.

This action has been stimulated by the standards reached by the four in 1978. A training schedule has been planned, and every practical opportunity is being given to these four to achieve high standards in 1979.

- (f) The balance of the team will be selected by methods established in 1978. These are:
 - (i) The competitor must compete in three 200 target qualifying events prior to 1st April 1979. Scores from these events must be recorded with the National Office, AS SOON AS POSSIBLE AFTER THE QUALIFYING ROUND HAS BEEN COMPLETED!
 - (ii) All potential team members must compete in a final qualifying round, to be conducted at Melbourne Gun Club during Easter 1979.
 - (iii) After the conclusion of the final qualifying round, selectors will consider scores together with a number of other factors and name the team accordingly.

All Clubs that are known to have international type shooting facilities were advised of these arrangements prior to the end of December and plans should be well under way to provide competitors with an opportunity to qualify. Although time is short, there is no reason that any major problem should arise. Early qualifying rounds have been arranged by Taree-Wingham Gun Club (27th, 28th and 29th January), Frankston/Australian Gun Club (10th and 11th February), Melbourne Gun Club (27th and 28th January), and New South Wales Gun Club (24th and 25th February). Other programs will be advertised in CTSN.

Easter Match — Melbourne Gun Club

The Melbourne Gun Club has experienced an early setback (of only a minor nature, fortunately) in its planning for the Second Pacific International Open Shooting Championships to be conducted during Easter.

The Club has been denied permission to shoot on Good Friday and unless subsequent talks with the local municipal authority are successful, the International match will not commence until Easter Saturday, 14th April.

The match looks like being even bigger than the 1978 tournament and intending competitors should book accommodation early.

Australian Team for 1979 USA Tour

Due to the continuing support of Air New Zealand, the Australian Clay Target Association will select a representative team to compete in the International Match being run as part of the 1979 Grand American Tournament. The team shall consist of six competitors. These shall be selected by taking the shooter from each State with the highest aggregate score over three events at the 1979 Australian National Championships. The events are the National Double Barrel Championship, the National Single Barrel Championship and the Australian-New Zealand Trap Championship (nointscore).



The conditions of both the above fares are that bookings must be made at least 45 days in advance of your outbound journey and payment must be made within 7 days of receiving confirmation of your booking.

This of course means that some passengers will be paying their fares a length of time in advance of travel. For instance if the booking is made in January for travel in October, once confirmation is received, full payment and ticketin must take place within 7 days. There is no minimum length of stay but you can stay up to a maximum of one year from your departure date. There are no stop-overs permitted on these new fares.

There are also amendment and cancellation fees payable on these fares. If you elect to change your booking after your ticket has been issued, you may do so but will incur an amendment fee of \$70.00 Should you cancel up to 45 days before departure you will incur a cancellation fee of \$70.00. If you cancel within 45 days of departure, no refund will be made. It is therefore quite important that you protect yourself by taking out insurance when booking your travel.

Qantas and British Airways are also still operating the Excursion fare to London with a minimum stay of 21 and a maximum of 270 days. This fare allows passengers to make two (2) stopovers; one on the outbound and one on the inbound route, at an additional charge of \$75.00 per passenger. A table which clearly sets out fares applicable according to the time of year travel which is undertaken, is given below:

The situation regarding fares to other parts in Europe other than London is still not settled. Various carriers such as Lufthansa, KLM and Alitalia have made application for cheaper fares very similar to the "Hop-Over" fares to London. However, at this stage these have not received Government approval.

There is an Excursion fare operating into most European destinations which is very similar in content to the Qantas/British Airways Excursion fare. The minimum stay is 21 days and the maximum 180 days, and you are permitted to make one stop-over only at an additional charge of \$50.00. Again, there are peak and off-peak periods for this fare. The off-peak periods for travel commencing in Australia are August to November and January to March; the remainder of the year falling into the peak period. Depending on your destination in Europe, the fare between off-peak and peak periods varies by approximately \$80.00

Full information regarding the best fare available to you will always be given at time your booking is made at Jetset.







Official Opening of Nepean Gun Club (Vic)







When the Side By Side Double Barrel was King (Cont'd) =

The American firm L. C. Smith and Co. was in fact, in association with W. H. Baker, the famous U.S.A. gun designer. Baker sold his firm (W. H. Baker and Co) to his partners, Leroy and L. C. Smith and in 1881 the advertisement appeared for the "Baker Gun" signed "L. C. Smith maker."

Early hammer guns of Baker design represented a modification of a still earlier Baker design, which combined a rifle barrel, below two side by side shot gun barrels. This system was patented in 1875. The gun evidenced its early design by the large hammers, and it was opened by pushing the front trigger forward. It was locked by a bolt fastener, which held an extension rib onto the breech face. This superior rotary bolt was very strong and developed a tremendous reputation for the L. C. Smith guns.

Also, the mainspring of the two locks were interchangeable. As the reliability of the L. C. Smith guns became known, its popularity increased and the firm then offered many grades.

There were seven grades of L. C. Smith guns available in 1889 when the company was sold to the Hunter Arms Co. of Fulton New York. This firm continued to produce the L. C. Smith shotguns. The hammer gun was not changed, except that a 16 gauge gun was offered as well as a 10 gauge and 12 gauge. In the 1888 period the L. C. Smith grades and prices were: F grade 55 pounds, E grade 70 pounds, D 95 pounds, C 125 pounds, B 150 pounds, A 200 pounds, AA top grade 300 pounds.

As these 1888 grades and prices indicate the L. C. Smith guns could be had in any elaborate form in a price range equivalent to any gun made in the United States.

Other makes of guns in the States at this time included such well known names to this day as Remington, Ithaca, Colt Fire Arms Co. and Winchester to name a few. Many of these early guns were offered with a choice of stub twist, Damascus, or Krupp fluid steel barrels in 10, 12 and 18 gauges and of course, the mighty little often heard of 28 gauge.

Weight and barrel length options were available to the purchaser as well as engraving. The early Ithaca double barrel hammer gun was not made until about the time of World War I and remained available from stock on hand for a few more years after that.


From 1878 until 1890, the Colt firm made high quality double barrel hammer shotguns. Over this period about 23,000 guns were produced in both 10 gauge and 12 gauge. Damascus, Laminated, and twist barrels were offered. These barrels were imported from Europe, as were nearly all Damascus barrels used by the early American gun makers of that early period.

Colt advertised a unique system of brazing barrels and ribs which at that time was far superior to that used by other makers. Stocks were of English or Circassion walnut of any desired style and included straight grip, half pistol grip and normal pistol grip. Grades of the Colt double barrel hammer guns were based on this cost in 1880. Standard grade was No. 1, twist barrels, no engraving 50 pounds; No. 2 fine twist barrels, line engraving 55 pounds; No. 3 laminated barrels, line engraving 60 pounds. Finer grades of these guns with selected stocks and barrels were available to special order from 75 pounds to 125 pounds.

Through this effective search for better design, and constant experimentation by the many skilful craftsmen, prompted by the early invention of the French gunsmith Lefaucheux, the early makers of the fine hammer model breech-loading shotguns created a ready market for high quality arms.

As can be gauged by this article, these makers thus demonstrated the highest style and type of craftsmanship known to the shooting world on both sides of the Atlantic and thanks to this dedication and high quality workmanship, the present day owner of one of these master crafted shotguns has a unique product that he should treasure and preserve, not only for the future but for the untold appreciation value that just keeps going up and up as each year passes by.

But apart from values, and treasures, there is something about shooting one of these fine old guns that's just got something going for it that mere words cannot describe. My only advice is, if you are a good keen shotgun man you will know what I'm talking about. The smell, the feel, the balance, the swinging quality, the pre craftsmanship of every detail that shows through on a top grade old gun is pure delight to behold, plus for a moment or more, with one such gun in your hands you can transport yourself in mind back to the early days when the double barrel side by side was indeed King.

PAT BROWNE SPEAKS...

The purpose this month is to continue along the road to controlling your mental processes as related to Trap shooting. We will look at the need for and the method of controlling your mental and emotional processes and extending your span of mental concentration whilst under conditions of competitive stress. The main thrust of the thinking in these next few chapters comes from the USA Army Marksmanship Manual, Fort Benning and has been used as the text book for the USA International Shooting Teams for many

years.

Mental discipline is the broad term used in describing the shooter's actions and reactions when facing competitive pressure. We are going to look at, over the next couple of months reasons why mental control is essential, developing mental discipline, and the dangers of negative thinking, the nature and control of match pressure and how to reduce the effects of normal tension. A distinguishing feature of successful competitive shooting is that it is associated with overcoming obstacles and difficulties which require the utmost exertion of a person's mental capacity. Therefore, you as a shooter must make determined efforts to acquire qualities of strong will. You must learn to fight fatigue and hardship, and to bear up under stress for a long period of time. By the force of your will you must shoot well when under pressure without letting your score be affected. By determined effort, you must maintain your emotional equilibrium.

If you fire poor shots, DO NOT GIVE WAY TO DISGUST AND IRRITATION, but take yourself in hand and bring up your performance by exertion of intestinal fortitude. The ability to keep control of oneself, to force oneself to overcome difficulties, and to maintain presence of mind in any difficult situation is a necessary human quality. Without this resource, you will not shoot consistent

high scores in competition.

To sustain mental discipline, you must have high moral qualities; a sense of duty and responsibility to your team and club and a sense of honor. These honourable traits are a source of the inexhaustable will to win. In moments of a crisis, they help you to mobilise all your resources for victory. Experienced coaches give much attention to instilling high moral and disciplinary qualities in

No person is born with these essential qualities. They are partly developed in the course of the shooter's life and the activities of daily living. The development of the major part of the desirable traits depends upon the quality of the training that you do.

SOME ESSENTIALS OF SHOTGUN MARKSMANSHIP:

(a) Mental control is essential to marksmanship. Mastery of the physical skills alone does not provide the uniform, precise control of performance necessary to compete at the highest level. Emphasis must be placed on how and what to think. The capacity for intense concentration will provide for exacting control. Coordination of the essential factors is necessary for the delivery of an accurate shot string to the target.

(b) Mental discipline provides the control you must have of your mental faculties to maintain confidence, positive thinking, and SUSTAIN THE ABILITY TO DUPLICATE A SUCCESSFUL PERFORMANCE. Mental discipline will help you to avoid overconfidence, pessimism and withstand conditions that may disrupt

your mental tranquility.

(c) Mental discipline provides the emotional stability necessary to the development of the championship shooter. Confidence in his ability to successfully employ the basic skills of shotgun marksmanship produces a dependable performance under all

types of stress. CONFIDENCE

Confidence results from repeatedly bringing under control all the factors that create conditions for firing an accurate shot. An accurate shot is one that centres your pattern on the target. You have probably been told a thousand times that you must have confidence to shoot well. Confidence in what? How do you get it? How do we keep it once it is obtained?

1. First and foremost you must have confidence in the fundamentals. You must be convinced that if you control their employment correctly, you will achieve excellent results. The techniques of the employment of the fundamentals that you have proven to be sound and dependable by experience are not going to change suddenly to unreliable factors because of match pressure.

- 2. Confidence in your ability to execute these fundamentals correctly. You will have proven your ability to do this in your practice sessions. GO AHEAD AND DO IT IN THE BIG MATCH. To the timid and hesitating, everything is impossible, because it seems
- 3. Think big! Think positive! "I will do it," and you will succeed. HOWEVER, AS SOON AS YOU ADMIT THE SLIGHTEST POSSIBILITY OF FAILURE, YOUR CHANCE OF SUCCESS IS QUESTIONABLE.
- 4. It has been said by many and very often that a shooter must have an open mind, this implies that we must have the ability to accept new ideas. WHAT WE SHOULD ALSO STRIVE FOR IS A MIND THAT IS OPEN TO POSITIVE THOUGHTS AND COMPLETELY CLOSED TO NEGATIVE THOUGHTS. You have heard so many times "Don't stop your swing." True as this axiom may be, it is of NO ADVANTAGE to have this thought enter your mind when you are trying to get off a shot. IT IS NEGATIVE, IT IMPLIES FAILURE. Such thinking continually occupies your mind with something you don't want to do, RATHER THAN SOMETHING YOU SHOULD DO. Would it not be more advantageous to think, "I MUST FOLLOW THROUGH, FOR WHEN I DO THIS I WILL BREAK THE TARGET." This is the POSITIVE side of the picture, IT IMPLIES SUCCESS. It gives you something that you should do rather than something that you should not do.

What the shooter needs is a mind full of POSITIVE "do's" and "will's". There is no room or necessity for those distracting "don't" and "can'ts". However, just thinking positively is not enough; we still must have definite ideas of how we are going to employ these positive thoughts. There is no room for vagueness or

vacillation.

A CONFIDENT ATTITUDE ADVERSELY AFFECTS YOUR COMPETITION. Remember a match is generally conceded to a small number of confident individuals who EXPECT to WIN. Confidence is contagious and favourably affects your teammates in team shooting. One last point . . . SMILE . . . Give no comfort to your competition by revealing by word or act that anything is wrong that might affect your winning the match.

CHANNELLING YOUR MENTAL EFFORT

By channelling your mental effort you can resist the tendency of the mind to drift during the period when intense concentration on target flight path and moving the gun to the firing position is essential. YOUR CHANNELLED MENTAL EFFORT SHOULD BE MOVING RELENTLESSLY TOWARDS THE FINAL ACT AS IS THE TRIGGER PRESSURE THAT RELEASES THE FIRING

You must completely exclude all extraneous thoughts for a brief period (three to six seconds) to deliver a controlled shot to the

target.

Prior Planning; is necessary to deliver a controlled shot on to the target. This prior planning enables the shooter to sustain his concentration for a longer period.

Careful Planning; of your sequence of events CLOSES THE MIND TO OTHER THOUGHTS. Example: If a prior plan is made to apply maximum focus on the target, it becomes almost involuntary that you will have a smooth swing through the flight path.

Co-ordination of Thought and Action is the result of EXPERIENCE obtained through extensive practise and match shooting where the same satisfactory plan of action is followed repeatedly.

Precise Co-ordination is absolutely necessary in controlling the

delivery of each shot during the entire match.

Split Second Timing and Co-ordination are Maintained by frequent CONTROLLED TRAINING SESSIONS. When practice times are limited to less than sufficient, do not be overconfident and expect to be able to SUSTAIN your co-ordination completely through prolonged match shooting conditions.
