

Secretary's Notes

In recent months, CTSN has featured a number of articles and reports on shooting conditions in USA. Readers will also have noticed that covers have had a strong American influence.

The National Office has received many phone calls and letters on this subject, most of which have been commendatory in nature. However, some of the callers have expressed the opinion that the "News" should maintain a more National and patriotic approach, and feature Australian situations, especially on the front cover.

We are encouraged by these comments as Australians are renowned for their lack of deep National pride. We must remember that although Australia is a big country, and divided into seven states, all its residents are Australians.

One of the purposes of the cover series in which USA scenes were depicted was to place emphasis on the advantages to come out of having a National Headquarters.

This column is being written just after the conclusion of the first series of Executive Committee meetings for 1979. At the meeting, matters relating to the establishment of the ACTA's headquarters held a high priority. The subject occupied a further two hours of debate (I would like a dollar for every hour spent on the project since it was first considered ten or twelve years ago) which resulted in the Core Group being instructed to undertake a further series of investigations.

The need for a "National Ground" has never been better illustrated than at Griffith — host city for the 1979 National Championships. Although the Griffith Gun Club had worked a miracle in getting the shooting facilities ready — the Club now has eight trap fields and five skeet fields — the town itself was not capable of accommodating the tremendous influx of visitors.

The local paper, the "Area News" summed up the position when it carried the front page headline — "SHOOTERS BOOK TOWN SOLID."

As this is being written, the final preparations are being made for what will be the biggest shooting tournament in Australia's history. Because of time pressures, some of the regular columns have either been omitted or reduced in size in this issue. Hopefully, the editorial staff will be forgiven for this, and the inclusion of the 1978 Annual Report and Financial Statements may offset the inconvenience.

From the report, readers will see that the Association is in quite reasonable shape and poised to make some dramatic growth in the next few years mainly due to the novice coaching program.

Moving back to more mundane administrative matters, it has been brought to the attention of the editorial staff, that in a number of cases, especially Victoria, local police have recommended that Club Secretaries sight shooters' licences when processing registration renewals. The main purpose of this is to save competitors from embarrassment at some later stage — possibly even the threat of having to withdraw from an event part way through.

ACTA members are all responsible shooters and as such when required, should have the appropriate licences and/or permits.

The first series of Executive Committee meeting for 1979 have just concluded in Griffith. Some major items were on the agenda, including a financial forecast for 1980 and matters connected with the establishment of a National Headquarters. A full report will appear in the May issue. Those of our readers who have been following the progress (through these pages) of the 1978 official group which toured USA, should note that there is one chapter still to come — the one in which the group is reported in Honolulu. Because of continuing space problems, this has been carried over until May.

Remember, May will be a great issue, and will include a full written and photographic record of the 1979 Nationals. Good shooting,


"Killer" Voted Sportsman Of The Year

A name that is not widely known in Australian shotgunning circles — that is the Bertuzzi shotgun from Italy.

The "Bertuzzi Brothers", Brescia's youngest gun makers have produced their ultimate, and Clay Target Shooting News is privileged to feature it on its front cover. The owner is Dino Oliviero of International Gun Club in South Australia and Pat Browne has written the following report on the shotgun:

"Dino is a quiet lad, not very demonstrative. I was having a quiet chat to him at the local gun club some time ago when he casually opened his gun case to assemble his gun for the day's shooting. He must have realised something was up as I gasped and stood there with my eyes sticking out like organ stops. Nestled neatly in a plush red case was one of the most beautiful shotguns I have ever seen. It looked a lot like a Perazzi and nitwit me said so. Dino quietly corrected the observation and told me in no uncertain terms that it was a Bertuzzi. Interest kindled, I took the gun for a close examination and soon realised that I was holding one of the classic guns of the great gunmaking era of Gardone V.T. in the Brescia Valley in Italy. I had never heard of, or seen, a Bertuzzi before, but believe you

me, it is a gun worth seeing, and some research was necessary to dig out the history of this particular gun.

Started in 1967, the Trap Zeus has taken eight years to build and is the only model currently in existence. Details of the gun's con-struction from the factory leaves one flabbergasted.

The Bertuzzi Brothers had not made another gun such as this one, and they could not tell how many hours went into the con struction of this gun. But they do mention that if, and when they do produce more, they will only be able to turn out between two and three per year. There are reasons for this, as we will see as we examine the construction.

Steel for the barrels is special and several hundred kilos of the highest quality are needed to obtain the few kilos for the actual production. Barrels are forged and attached to the monobloc and the machining is of the utmost precision and limited to the amount required to get the monobloc to the first fitting stage.

Action steel is of a special nickel-chrome and tempered in a very special way to ensure a tough but flexible and durable fitting. Machining again is of the utmost precision and limited to the amount required to get to the first fitting stage.

amount required to get to the first fitting stage. The action at this stage is then hand fitted by the master craftsmen at the Bertuzzi Brothers' factory. Engraving is most incredible and performed again by the master craftsmen and is of the heavy relief type more in keeping with German engraving style rather than Italian. There is not a lot of radi just the name Bertugzi on the left head

There is not a lot of gold, just the name Bertuzzi on the left hand side, the name Brescia on the right hand side and the name repeat-ed on the barrels in gold. Stock and forend are of very rare Yugoslavian walnut and the finish is of the highest quality I have ever seen. Stocked for trap shooting with a roll over Monte Carlo type check piece and a big hand filling forend with a Schnabel type shape, all the work in this department is superb. Checkering is very fine at around 24 lines to the inch and is extensive, covering the pistol grip and forend. A neat pattern is carved around the butt in front of the neatly fitted recoil pad. Pistol grip is large with a Wundhammer Swell, in fact, very little has been overlooked in the making of the Bertuzzi. Cocking indicators, vented barrels a la Perrazzi, single selective trigger, vent rib, it is all there, and more.

One does not take a screwdriver to a gun of this quality, and I would be of the opinion that it might have strained the friendship between Dino and myself. So, one will have to presume that the great workmanship extends to the innards. I would be inclined to wager that it is as good on the inside as it is on the outside. The few shots I fired would seem to indicate this as the triggers were superb.

The Bertuzzi is a fine example of the Italian gunmaker's art and is probably one of the most exclusive trap guns being used in this country today.

. something I nearly overlooked! If you want one, the Oh.. name is Bertuzzi Brothers. Gunmakers, Gardone V.T., and you will get a little change out of \$9000 – I wonder if they make a skeet gun, I might order a matched pair!"

PAT BROWNE takes a look at THE MARVELLOUS MECHANICAL MEC'S SHOTSHELL RELOADING IS WELL SERVED BY THE RANGE OF MEC PRESSES . . . THEY ARE TOOLS THAT SERVE THE RELOADER WELL.

It would be fair to say that at the Mayville Engineering Company Inc. plant in Wisconsin there are some fellows that know what makes shotshell reloading buffs tick. Over the years in my experience I have never met a disgruntled MEC owner. Oh, I have heard of the occasional mechanical failure, but by and large the MEC presses that I have seen in action have served their owners long and well.

Based on the concept of providing a robust, well engineered tool that will do the job and keep doing it, the range of MEC tools have been on the reloading scene in Australia for well nigh 20 years. Like most things that are well engineered there has been very little change in these years but for minor modifications in the powder and shot metering departments and some tuning up in the crimping department.

On our test bench this month we have three MEC's to look at. The baby of the range, the 600 Junior, the general purpose mid range, single stage loader, in the Sizemaster and the top of the range, bar one, a turret press in the Grabber. In older term parlance, these newer models correspond with the old 600 Junior, the 600 and the big 650, all well known on the Australian scene. Now before we get too carried away with our look at these tools and we will look at mainly the middle of the range "Sizemaster" in this review don't think that there is anything vastly different about these new MEC'S. There are a couple of great new ideas but the basic press is still the same. In fact a quick glance is quite deceptive as most MEC'S look very much alike. Like I mentioned earlier, the boys at MEC obviously do a deal of


Like I mentioned earlier, the boys at MEC obviously do a deal of research before they make any alteration to the basic workings of their presses. Automatic primer feeding was a long time coming with MEC presses but when it did arrive in the form of the E-Z primer feeding mechanism, it was a good one, well thought out and made. The resizing department has always been a bone of contention with MEC'S, the fact that it was always a bit of a hassle on the turret presses. But with the new Grabber the concept of collett resizing has become a reality. The idea of grabbing the brass or steel head of a hull and squeezing it back to its original dimensions is brilliant in its concept and the way it has been built into these MEC presses is excellent. We will have a close look at this feature as we progress.

But firstly let's look at the construction of the presses. There are no castings on a MEC press, be this good or bad. Bases are pressed from steel and the main base components are welded into position. The tool head is mounted on a square column which acts as the main working pillar. The base is fixed and the tool head is brought down by means of the operating handle to perform all operations.

This whole style of operation makes for a very compact press and to some, gives the impression that the various presses could be a bit fragile or weak. In fact if one compares the MEC with say the Ponsness Warren or the Pacific or even the Bair or Texan in the turret versions perhaps this impression could be justified with the comparison of the relative sizes of the presses. But it does not pan out this way in practise as the MEC has stood the test of time in the reliability stakes.

To my mind, mechanically orientated as it is, the reason is good engineering and quality workmanship. MEC'S are snappy looking presses with all the base works finished in the traditional bright red crackle finish, with lashings of chrome on all the tooling and with the incidental working parts blued to a nice dull black finish. They are very well packed for sale with all the little points covered such as bolts for fixing the press to a bench and all the tools necessary for adjustment. Literature is plentiful and very detailed covering basic loading techniques, press operation and maintenance, shot and powder bushing charts and a reloading manual from the big W.

This is not surprising, as the Winchester Company are the agents for MEC in Australia. Little things are thought of too, particularly in the case of the Sizemaster. Six point and roll crimp inserts are provided as are the few bits and pieces required for loading 3 inch shells, even tops for the shot and powder bottles when they are re-

moved from the press. A spent primer tray of sensible size is provided which fits neatly under the base frame. So there you have it, the complete reloading tool with all the bits and pieces that are required to get you into operation, and with a minimum of fuss. The MEC people get full marks from our testing department for thinging of all the little things that can make the life of a shotshell reloader frustrating at time.

THE 600 JUNIOR

This press in its modern form is just a bit more sophisticated than its predecessors. Boasting an automatic primer feed and a resize station it has become quite a neat single stage reloading tool. Capable of around 100 shells per hour it is a real pleasure to use. Operation is from right to left and it has five locating stations on the base. Deprime and resize is at station 1 and uses the time honoured method of forcing the hull into a resizing die with the floating mandrel and punch pushing out the spent primer. Ejection of the resized hull is by way of cam on the operating handle upstroke. Repriming is at station 2 where the primer has been deposited by the automatic primer feed. This primer feeding mechanism is common to all the MEC presses and can even be adapted to fit other makes.

It is quite ingenious in its operation. With a single stage loader you have to pull the handle down up to seven times to complete a shell but you only need one primer fed when it is needed. On the 600 this is accomplished at the final crimp station No. 5. As you lower the handle to finally crimp the shell you are loading, a cam at the tool head pushes the final crimp die down and also trigers the primer feed mechanism by way of several levers and a bead chain. This operation automatically feeds a primer back at station 2 so that when you start operations on your next shell there is a primer there waiting for you. It does not matter how many times you pull the lever, no primer will feed until you put the final crimp on the shell you are working on. On our test bench this facet of the press operation was found to be faultness in its operation when it was properly adjusted.

In fact, primer feeding became so automatic with this press and the Sizemaster that one was inclined to forget it. We were caught several times by the lack of primers in the feeding tray. Station 3 is the charging, wad seating and shot drop position. A crescent shaped locating guide holds the shell in position. Charge bar operation is manual and works right/left, powder . . . left/right, shot. Operation was smooth with very little tendency to bind or cut shot. A degree of automation is build into the wad guide at this station. With the handle down and the charge bar pushed over the drop the powder charge, a lever or stop engages the wad guide support to hold it down inside the shell mouth. When the handle is raised, the



wad guide stays down to allow easy insertion of the plastic wad or wad column. On the operation of the charge bar to drop the shot load, and on the upstroke of the handle this lever slides out of the way and the wad guide is free to rise, allowing the charged shell to be removed. Crimp starting is at station 4 and the shell is held forward in the slotted guide on the base plate.



MEC call their starter 'Spindex' and it is in essence quite simple and effective. A brass starter floats quite freely in the crimp start die and when it comes in contact with the crimp memory in the hull, it revolves to line itself up with this memory thus starting the crimp back too its old position.


There were no hang-ups in testing on this station, the crimp starter worked every time and we loaded over 1,000 shells on this test press. Down the slot to station 5 where the crimp was finished and the primer seating mechanism was activated. This crimp finishing die has full adjustment for depth of crimp and the degree of rounding required at the front end. We opted for a good degree of rounding off because we were using the shells for testing in some auto loading guns. The crimps were very consistent and very, very neat as only a MEC can finish them.

Our opinion? . . A neat well engineered loading press, smooth operating, robust and a real pleasure to use. Highly recommended as a basic loader for the gunner that has a medium usage of shells. THE SIZEMASTER

This is where we have our first look at the new resizing concept that MEC have added to their bigger presses. The Sizemaster is in fact the very same press as the 600 Junior but to accommodate the collett resizing they have had to put it on another base. So, the basic operating concept is exactly the same as the smaller press. The big difference is that the ordinary resizing station is replaced with the 'grabber'. MEC use the term grabber as a name for their big turret press, and aptly named it is, for this is exactly what the resizing operation is.

Instead of placing the shell on the press base and forcing a resizing collar over the brass head you drop the fired case into the gaping mouth of the collet and pull the handle. What in actual fact happens is that a secondary spindle recessed into the main square column and with a spigot protruding to activate the collett cams, raises a sleeve on the outside of the collett to force it closed. Inside the collett is the empty hull which is squeezed back into the right shape and dimensions, including the rim. At the same time the fired primer is pushed out. To my mind, the concept of this sizing operation is quite brilliant and removes some of the major problems facing the reloader with the auto loader.

With this resizing system thick rims and out of round hulls are a thing of the past and so should the fencing problems be. We were quite severe in our testing of this resizer even going so far as to severely mutilate shell heads with a hammer. The collett brought them right back to size without any problems. It was not all beer and skittles however, and it must be pointed out that to get the very best performance out of this equipment you need to be very neat and clean in your reloading habits. If you neglect the grabber, it will neglect you. Shot and powder spills will play havoc with the operation of this mechanism so if they do occur you must clean up immediately or you will have big, big troubles. Lubrication of the



 Metering bar on the 'Sizemaster' showing the powder bush window. Bracket is the trip lever for the automatic wad guide.


die particularly the sleeve is most important. These simple preventative maintenance steps will assure you of a happy time with the grabber and as mentioned earlier, if you are an auto loader user, this resizing system and the final crimp finish will really have you smiling.

Our opinion? . . . A superb concept of resizing and very well adapted to the 'Sizemaster' Press. The model No. incidently is SM77.

THE GRABBER

This is the big daddy of the MEC range, bar one. Further up the scale there is the Hustler, a hydraulic version of this press. This press is the old 650 with some updates in tooling and operation. The new automatic primer feed replaces the old tube feed, there is an extra roller bearing here and there in the charge bar operation, and a shell retaining guide on the back side to stop the shells wobbling with a full load of shot. Here again we see the introduction of the collett resizing die. But the MEC engineers, in their effort to get the new resizing concept on to this press have bogged down the operation a little. What has in actual fact happened is that instead of a smooth flat plate indexing operation on this turret press you have the situation of having to place a shell in the grabber, resize and then lift it out to get it moving around the index plate.






The Marvellous Mechanical Mec's (Cont'd)

Out of inferest we set up an old 650 and ran some comparison speed tests. The old press won the race hands down, but we had to take into consideration the fact that we were feeding the oldie deprimed conditioned hulls that had been through a case conditioner. So, if one was to be honest about the speed angle the old and the new would come out about equal as there is no need to condition cases on the Grabber. But again, to be honest, if you graduate from the old 650 to the new Grabber it will be some time before you will get used to this extra hassle of having to lift each shell.

It is beyond the scope of this article to go into the complex operation of the big MEC, perhaps we might save it for the time that we will have a close look at the 'Hustler' but some general comments on the MEC system would be in order.

... and the empty hull is grabbed around the base and squeezed back, into shape. Spent primer is punched out at the same time.


As mentioned earlier the presses are well engineered and have an excellent reputation as reloading tools. Part of this reputation as has been gained from the fact that they are so reliable. The reliability comes from the excellent design that keeps the tooling so compact. Whereas a lot of presses these days spread their tooling out over massive base plates, MEC keeps theirs neatly around the centre column. This in itself makes for a more efficient tool with less strain on vital parts and thus giving a smoother operation.

Back up, in the way of reloading accessories, bits and pieces such as wad dispensers, and the E-Z Pack make the life of the MEC user a happy one. Charge bars are readily available and come in a bewildering array of options. You can have them as fixed with specified powder and shot loads. Another version has a fixed shot load with removable powder bushes and you can have a bar with both powder and shot bushes. There used to be an adjustable bar available but I can see no mention of it in the up to date literature. However, if you are an adjustable bar fan the properitary brand of plastic adjustable bars that are available will fit all the MEC range. Large shot and powder bottles are readily available as are replacement wad guide fingers.

So there you have it. It has been a long time since we have looked at the range of MEC presses in the pages of this magazine. What we have seen on our test bench this month has not been a disappointment, in fact it has reinforced our contention that the MEC system of shotshell reloading is one of the best around.

Metropolitan Clay Target Club (Vic.)

In an effort to attempt to reduce the current shooting costs, the Committee has decided to try some events without trophies. We are having special Gold, Silver and Bronze Championship medals manufactured, and will present these to placegetters instead of trophies. This will mean that a 20 target event can be entered for approx. \$3.00 and a 50 target event for approx. \$7.00. Selected events will be included in every program on a trial basis.

At a recent Committee meeting, it was decided to retract the club rule about handing trophies over before presentation time. We have previously stuck to this rule but since most other clubs do not have the same rule (and apparently do not care about presentations) we have decided to end all problems by handing over the trophies to all who need them early. The club feels that it will be a sad day when the formal presentation is not held due to the lack of participants.

Fuller Firearms has recently added a number of brands of shotshells to its sales range. Amongst these is the IVI cartridge better known to most Australian shooters as the Canadian made Canuck.

Canuck has previously been marketed through the ELEY group (then known as IMI Australia) and was manufactured by an associated company, Canadian Industries Limited.

In 1976, CIL sold its interest in the Imperial Ammunition Division to Valcartier Industries Inc. Valcartier was formed in 1967 to purchase the Canadian Federal Government small arms facility, after a change in Government policy.

As a result of these changes Valcartier Industries is now the sole manufacturer of small arms ammunition in Canada.

Fuller Firearms sales staff report that the early acceptance of IVI cartridges has been quite encouraging and there has been no adverse effect on the Federal range, which the company also markets

Talking of cartridges the paragraph on page 32 of March issue of C.T.S.N. captioned "Cartridge Prices" brought a very quick and constructive reply from Geoff Rabbidge, M.D. of Commercial Marketing Co. of Sydney.

For some time, Commercial Marketing has been importing Sellier and Bellot cartridges, and has recently added Hubertus to the range.

Geoff writes: "The cartridges that started the return to price sanity Sellier and Bellot, Brno Penetra Special Trap and the Montreal Olympic Games winning Special Skeet, are still selling at a suggested retail price of \$4.60 per packet of 25, and both carry the full consumer durable margin of profit for both Wholesaler and Retailer. Shipments are arriving regularly and the price will remain as is for some time yet.

Further, Commercial Marketing has added another range of world class cartridges — Hubertus in unique packs of 10 which also carry full profit margins and at a suggested retail well below the brands mentioned in your article.

One further comment, neither country has its own lead supply. Both buy at world parity price even from Australia, both rail across Europe to Hamburg, then ship half way round the world to Australia at a sea freight rate of over \$2,500 per container load and we pay 21% import duty plus the world's highest port clearance charge to get the cartridges into our stores. Neither of the factories nor Commercial Marketing are going broke doing this.

In short Noel, it is still as hard today as it was at the start of 1978 to justify the price the shooter is required to pay when purchasing locally made cartridge products. The shooters' answer to price is obvious."

This same argument applies to a number of importers of shotshells and is further confirmed by a price rise announced by the ELEY organisation which became effective from 1st March.

Since Christmas prices have escalated dramatically, and we are advised by managerial staff of the two Australian based manufacturers that these increases are due to tremendous lifts in the price of lead. Other metal prices have also increased and distribution and labor costs continue to escalate.

At this stage I am completely confused on cartridge prices can anybody see any sense in the situation.



PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE 1979 ANNUAL MEETING

The story conveyed in my first Annual Report just one year ago was one of great anticipation.

We were talking of National Shooting Grounds, Constitutional Reform, National Coaching Council, improvements in financial situations, increased memberships, and over the year our progress in these areas has been variable from slow advancement to excellent.

The National Shooting Ground situation has developed to the stage where your Executive have agreed to the principle of a "One National Ground" situation initially and the Executive Core Group have looked at some possible sites and have examined proposals put forward in support of other sites. The Core Groups report will be discussed by the Executive during this National series but much will still remain to be done before any conclusion is reached.

The Constitutional Reform has reached a stage where a proposal, recommended by the Executive, together with some notices of amendment will be dealt with at this meeting. A further delay will occur in the final implementation of any changes agreed to in that the changes need to be approved by the Victorian Attorney General before they can be finally accepted.

Probably the greatest step forward during the year was within our National Coaching Scheme. Resulting mainly from respect for our Association built up by our Administrative Unit with appropriate Government Departments, and from the submission of a sound application, we were granted \$44,000 over the next two and one half years by the Federal Government for the appointment of a full time National Coaching Director. Following advertisements for the position Mr J. Newton Thomas was appointed for an initial period and we sincerely congratulate him.

This National appointment now needs to be backed up with an active State movement extending from the established State Directors through to Zone and club coaches. In some States there is obvious evidence of this happening while in others the progress appears slow.

Coaching is the area in which we can do the most good to preserve our sport and we all need to contribute some effort.

You will see from the appropriate reports that we are in a sound financial situation with the year's trading exceeding our budget surplus.

Shooter registrations also increased for the year in line with our budget forecast with the final overall figure reaching 10921.

1978 saw the first official A.C.T.A. selected and sponsored Teams go overseas to represent Australia in standard "down the line" events. Travel groups built around official six man teams to New Zealand and the U.S.A. proved very successful and congratulations go to the U.S.A. Team for their third placing at Vandalia.

In International Style shooting Australia was also well to the fore and we congratulate Jim Ellis and Terry Rumbel for their respective bronze medals in the World Championships and Commonwealth Games.

State Associations became more solidly entrenched with the formal establishment of a very active Association in Queensland and with initial steps taken to form one in the Northern Territory. The greatest effort put in by a State Association during the year must have been the running of the very successful Adelaide Nationals by the S.A.C.T.A. They are deserving of the highest praise for the splendid financial result they achieved on behalf of the A.C.T.A.

The effects of industry happenings during the year were quite dramatic with substantial reductions in the price of ammunition and clay targets and it is important that club managements see that the competitors gain the benefits of the reductions.

On behalf of the Association I thank the many commercial organisations and individuals for their direct assistance to shooters, clubs, State Associations and the A.C.T.A. with donations of high gun trophies etc. Worthy of special mention are the organisations which donate valuable trophies for high guns and individual champions at our Nationals. Because of the newness of their involvement I make special mention of the generous sponsorship assistance by Air New Zealand.

Over the year I attempted to meet as many shooters as possible with visits to 26 different clubs and I am most appreciative of the welcome extended to me at all locations. My travels extended to all States and I must acknowledge the special hospitalities extended to me at Townsville, Katherine, Perth, Adelaide, Melbourne, Hobart and Coffs Harbour.

Due acknowledgment must go to the members of the A.C.T.A. Executive for the amount of time and involvement they are contributing. There may have been a time in the past where the position of Executive man was not much more than honour and glory but this is not the case now.

While there is still great honour in being your representative the position now is very business like and extremely demanding — and perhaps the latter is why we have seen some new faces appear during the year. At this point I personally thank each member of the Committee for the effort they contributed during 1978.

So much for what has happened during 1978 — now, what is there for the future. We need some new ideas on ways we can improve our sport, on directions in which we can go.


One idea on the drawing board is to attempt to have the finals of Interstate Teams decided in a shoot-off at Nationals instead of as a postal competition.

AUSTRALIAN CLAY TARGET SHOOTING NEWS - APRIL

ANNUAL REPORT 1978

At the start of 1978, the big question being asked was — "Can the Association's progress be maintained?" It is to the credit of all connected with the Australian Clay Target Association that an affirmative answer can now be given.

With the 1978 results now "on the board" it can confidently be predicted that the Association has entered a period of long-term controlled growth.

The major targets set for 1978 have been met, at least in practical terms. For example, let's look at the following:

	Target Figure	Actual Figure
Membership Numbers	11,000	10,921
Operations Surplus	\$34,750	\$43,248

Further, the Executive Committee worked steadily towards achieving a fully-paid appointment in the position of National Coaching Director, and its efforts were rewarded in late November, when the Federal Government announced a special grant of \$44,000 to enable the Association to fund such an appointment.

Also of interest is the continued development of Clay Target Shooting News, which is steadily getting closer to the point where it can be distributed commercially.

During the year, your Association introduced some new initiatives. The most widely recognised was the entry of an Australian Trap Team in the 1978 Grand American Tournament. That such a project became possible is a reflection of some significant assistance received from Air New Zealand, which has become one of the Association's major supporters.

The project was an instant success and is covered more fully elsewhere in this report.

Another major initiative was the creation of a Core Group from within the Executive Committee, The Association is becoming increasingly involved in a more diversified range of business activities. This development requires more regular decision making than available through the normal twice-yearly Executive Committee meetings.

Of particular importance to the development of our sport was the dramatic reduction of prices for clay targets and factory loaded cartridges which occurred through the year. All concerned with bringing about these reductions are to be congratulated for their contribution to the future of our sport.

1. INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION.

1978 will be recorded in the history books as the biggest ever range of International activities in International matches in New Zealand, Singapore, U.S.A., Edmonton (Canada), Noumea and Seoul, Korea — we also competed in a match conducted in Australia.

Australia achieved tremendous competitive heights culminating in two Bronze Medals in Olympic Trench events. At the Commonwealth Games, where Australia's team included Ellis and Rumbel (trap), Crikis and Hale (skeet) and Manager Newton Thomas, Australia secured a Bronze Medal in trap through the fine shooting effort of Terry Rumbel, closely followed by Jim Ellis, who was only one target behind. This was followed by another Bronze Medal, this one being won by Jim Ellis in the World Championship Trench match. In this instance, Terry Rumbel was only one target behind, emphasising the depth that Australia is developing in trench shooting.

The team for the 1978 World Championships included — Team Manager: Newton Thomas; Trap: Jim Ellis, Terry Rumbel, Neil Berry, John Porter; Skeet: Alex Crikis, Ian Hale, John Summers, Fred Guyatt. Our International Skeet performances are encouraging and Alex Crikis' scores in 1978 reflected the experience he gained at the World Championships in 1977.

Meanwhile, Australia's first ever official team entry in the Grand American Tournament was an instant success. Team selection was based on events conducted during the 1978 Australian National Championships. Members of this pioneering team were: Tim Catling (W.A.), John Hutchings (S.A.), Graeme Appleby (Tas.), Bob Cartledge (Vic.), Robbie Smith (N.S.W.), and Peter Tink (Q'land). The team competed in an international match under conditions completely strange to our fellows — AND WON A BRONZE MEDAL!

Earlier in the year, the Association — through the cooperation of the Melbourne Gun Club which provided most of the "arms and legs" — promoted a most successful dual championships tournament — the First Pacific Open International Shooting Championships combined with the South Pacific Regional Championships.

In the first overseas official representation for 1978, and again as a reflection of the tremendous support gained from Air New Zealand, Australia fielded a well chosen team against New Zealand in the Glenn Cup match held at Christchurch, New Zealand. The Australians won this match quite comfortably.

This team, as was the case too with teams which competed in Noumea, Singapore and U.S.A., was supported by a group of keen clay target shooting supporters — this development in the travel area also proved to be most successful.

To cap off a magnificent year, Australia also won the Mackintosh International Teams Trophy, for the fifth successive year and the sixth time in eight years. The winning score was 7381 points.

2. NATIONAL COMPETITION

The 1978 National Trap and Skeet Championships were conducted at the grounds of the South Australian Gun Club by the South Australian Clay Target Association. The series attracted an attendance of 2562 entries, which was higher than forecast and up on the 1973 figures (the last occasion that the Nationals were held in South Australia) by 478 or 23%.

Although the tournament was conducted under very hot weather conditions, the standards set were high and the S.A.C.T.A. is to be commended for the efforts, which culminated in an operating surplus of \$14,644 being transferred to Association general funds.

The winner of the Grand Australian Handicap was John Clark from South Australia.

The 1978 National Olympic Trench Championship was held at International Gun Club in South Australia.

Although the Club was a "one trench lay-out", it did a tremendous job of handling the large attendance (a cutoff had to be applied). The National Champion for 1978 was A. M. (Pud) Burgess of Cobar, NSW — his second National Trench title in three years.







3. STATE COMPETITION

4. "CLAY TARGET SHOOTING NEWS"

The official journal of the Association, affectionately known as C.T.S.N. continued to expand in 1978. For example, an issue appeared in January for the first time previously the January issue had been combined with February.

The 12 issues for 1978 contained a total of 880 pages, an increase of 37% over 1977. More importantly, circulation has increased to the point where it is now over 9000 regularly.

The presentation of the magazine has been improved by the introduction of full-colour covers, and this allows us to encourage the placement of full-colour advertisements.

Around mid-1978, a special sub-committee from the Executive Committee was charged with the responsibility of re-negotiating the supply contract for C.T.S.N. for

a further three years. A decision was made to continue with Waterwheel Press of Shepparton whose prices are quite reasonable, by comparative standards.

The Administrative Unit wishes to acknowledge the wonderful level of co-operation which is being offered by the production staff at Waterwheel Press. It is highly significant that, during the year, not one deadline was missed — in the printing industry, this is a very good performance.

Total production cost for the year (including postage) was \$67,495, and exceeded advertising revenue by \$1850 — however the value now being gained from CTSN more than offsets the small loss incurred.

5. ADMINISTRATION

Staffing costs for the year increased by \$11,000 over 1977 — however, the figure of \$55,022 is still substantially below the all-time high of \$65,000 in 1976. The increase in 1978 reflects normal adjustments PLUS an additional staff member.

Early in 1978, work loads increased to the point where an additional accounts clerk was required.

Teamwork and enthusiasm continue at a high level in the Administrative Unit, something which is unusual in this day and age.

Development of the computer based membership accounting systems continued through 1978 and Clubs are feeling some of the resultant benefits.

Speaking of Clubs, the National Office personnel wish to place on record their sincere appreciation for the way in which Club secretaries are co-operating.

6. MEMBERSHIP

Little needs to be said about membership except that the current rate of growth needs to be maintained. 1978 figures were as follows:

The 1977 figure was 9536, and the percentage increase is 14.5%.

The target for 1979 is 12,200.

The "honorary membership" incentive introduced in 1977 continues to be successful, and 709 shooters took advantage of the opportunity in 1978. The corresponding figure for 1977 was 641.

The annual membership loss, which at one stage was running at a rate of 35% per year, has been reduced somewhat this year with only 2194 1977 members (or 23%) failing to renew in 1978.

Number of affiliated clubs stood at 277 at the end of the year. New Clubs to affiliate through the year included — Texas (Q'land), Veneto (Vic), Hermidale (NSW), Greenvale (Q'land), Mary Kathleen (Q'land), Bega (NSW), Gemfields (Q'land), Muttaburra (Q'land).

7. PROMOTION

The Association has continued to maintain a presence in as many public places as possible.

The policy of widespread Club representation by the National President was continued with considerable success.

Probably the most important of the President's visits was the trip to Katherine Clay Target Club in July, which

coincided with Northern Territory achieving statehood. President Ern was able to greatly assist the Territorians in their early planning for a State Association and his visit was received with great appreciation.

The National President and National Vice President undertook international goodwill visits to New Zealand and U.S.A. where they received a wonderfully enthusiastic reception.

Your Executive Committee continues to work towards developing a closer understanding with other shooting organisations, especially the other shotgun user group, the Field and Game Federation of Australia.

8. NATIONAL COACHING COUNCIL

The Australian Clay Target Association took one of its most important decisions ever, when, late in 1978 it appointed its first full time Director of Coaching. After reviewing applications resulting from extensive newspaper advertisements announcing the position, the Core Group appointed Newton Thomas to fill the vacancy. Newton had been the honorary Director for the previous twelve months.

A Federal Government grant made the appointment possible and adds further weight to the argument that our Association is held in some respect by Government agencies.

Progress of the National Coaching Program was slowed somewhat during 1978 because the National Director also had management responsibilities for both the Commonwealth Games shooting team and the shotgun section of the World Championships team.

1979 shall be used to make further progress in the training, acreditation and appointment of Club Coaches throughout Australia.

No report on this subject would be complete without acknowledging the valuable financial assistance from the Federal Government, which, in addition to funding the appointment of the Director, also provided grants totalling \$7000 for other coaching projects.

9. STATE ASSOCIATIONS

The big news in this area for 1978 was the formation of the Queensland Clay Target Association at a meeting in May. Since its inception, the Q.C.T.A. has set a cracking pace and has achieved a number of objectives, of which it is justifiably proud.

Legal recognition of State Associations through the A.C.T.A. Constitution still eludes us but must be coming closer.

A decision made at the 1978 Annual General Meeting to remit \$1 per registered shooter back to State Associations has assured these Associations of continued opportunities to promote the sport, and a very serious weight now rests on the shoulders of the Executive group of each Association to EFFECTIVELY plan its future growth.

10. GOVERNMENT GRANTS

In April, your Association made application to the Federal Government for financial assistance totalling almost \$80,000 for projects to be undertaken in 1978-79. The result was as follows:

\$10,000 for National Coaching Director's appointment; \$3,000 for U.S.A. Team; \$2,000 for coaching projects; \$1,000 to enable A.C.T.A. to be represented at overseas meetings; \$4,000 (approx.) for World Championships team.

(There is also a forward commitment of \$34,000 to assist with the Coaching Director's salary and expenses for the next two years). Additionally, State Associations are steadily improving their relationships with State authorities with encouraging financial results.

However, each State Association and the National body has a very real responsibility to ensure that the financial assistance being received from these sources is put to effective use, and MUST be properly accounted for.

11. ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

This is a section which does not change very much from year to year but it is interesting to note that in 1978, there was a slight departure from the traditional "leaning" on only commercial organisations within the firearms industry.

The Association followed a policy of promoting travel, and this has led to very significant assistance coming from Air New Zealand, Ansett Airlines of Australia and Jetset Tours Pty. Ltd.

A plea is made to all member Clubs and registered shooters to promote the use of the services of these three Companies WHEREVER POSSIBLE! Such assistance will be tangibly reflected in increased support for the Association.

Special mention must be made in this section of the increasing time commitment to the A.C.T.A. being shown by members of the Executive Committee, especially the Core Group and more especially the National President.

President Ern suffered some health problems towards the end of the year but it is a measure of his dedication to the job that he continued in office, and is now able to present himself for election for another term.

Together with his Committee, President Ern has set a very high standard and we must all provide the "Board of Directors" with every possible support.

To all the people who have played a part in the continued growth of clay target shooting in 1978, the Executive Committee joins me in saying a giant thank you! This includes that "little army" of dedicated Club people, who, week after week work like hell to provide the majority of us with our recreation.


12. CONCLUSION

As the Australian Clay Target Association turns into 1979, major challenges remain to be accepted. One of these is the "Blue Hills" type saga of constitutional reform, and hopefully this matter will be effectively resolved before the conclusion of the 1979 Annual General Meeting.

The other relates to the establishment of a National Headquarters. This project requires some urgent decisions for, as time progresses, so costs are escalating, and potential sites will become increasingly difficult to locate.

Furthermore, the Association must not lose sight of the restrictive pressures constantly being applied to firearms users of all types. By representing shooters as being a united group, however, I am sure we can successfully defend our rights.



The staff complement increased by one during 1978, which is the basic reason for the increased staffing costs of \$11,441 over the figure for 1977.

8. Core Group Expenses: Towards the end of 1977, the National Executive Committee made a decision to create a Core Group (or Management Committee) to accommodate a growing need to make day-to-day decisions. Its major task during 1978 has been to conduct preliminary investigations into possible locations for a national Headquarters. The cost has been \$2,089.

9. Donation to Victorian Field & Game Association - \$500.

During February 1978, World Sports Expo 1978 was held in Melbourne. It was an exhibition open to the public, and the Victorian Field & Game Association presented an extensive display promoting hunting and shooting, of which, part represented clay target shooting. To demonstrate the A.C.T.A. support for the project, a donation of \$500 was made to assist in offsetting the large cost (approx. \$4,000) incurred by our sister organisation, the V.F. & G.A.

10. Grant to State Associations - \$350

During the year, the Victorian Clay Target Association participated in the preparation of a promotional leaflet to be enclosed with Shooter's Licence Renewal reminders being distributed by the Victorian Police Department. The National Association, made a grant of \$350 to the V.C.T.A. to offset the costs incurred.

11. Overseas Study Tour Expenses - \$1,500

During the year, the Association paid amounts totalling \$1,500 to representatives who were involved in official A.C.T.A. business during overseas travel.

12. National Championships - \$250

Due to an oversight two payments due to referees who assisted at the 1977 National Championships had not been made. This represents the adjustment.

13. Suspense Account

Amounts due to be transferred to Travel Investment Accounts. At 31st December 1978 there remained in the General Account an amount of \$635 to be transferred to the General Travel Fund Investment Account and \$2.293 to be transferred to the I.S.U. Travel Fund Investment Account. This latter amount included donations from -

Readers will remember the tremendous success of last year's visit by an ACTA group to the Pesta Sukan Games in Singapore.

In 1979 the Australian Clay Target Association is again planning to send a group and the following are the dates for the tournament:

3rd and 4th August 5th to 7th August 8th and 9th August 10th to 12th August

Already tentative entries have been received from Japan, Thailand and Malaysia so a tremendous international atmosphere is guaranteed.

1979 World Championships Cancelled

The 1979 World Moving Target Championships, which had been planned for August in Vienna, Austria, have been cancelled. The news was received during the first half of March, and the Association's ISU Sub-Committee immediately convened a meeting to rearrange the preparation schedule for Australia's shotgunners leading up to the 1980 Olympics.

It is possible that a small team will be sent to the British Grand Prix match to be held during early August. An effort is also being made to gain competition experience in Russia.

The qualifying system already introduced for 1979 will be continued, culminating in the final round to be held at Melbourne Gun Club at Easter. Entry is open to all trench and ISU skeet shooters, and complete details of the program will be found on page 47 of this issue.

TOP SHOOTERS FROM THREE STATES AT I.S.U. SKEET QUALIFYING ROUND (from Laurie Connors)

Mildura Gun Club was host to shooters from Victoria, New South Wales and South Australia at their 200 target I.S.U. Skeet qualifying round, 17th and 18th February, 1979. From Melbourne came John Summers, Ian Hale, Frank Cuartero, Graham Guy and Graham Gould. From Sydney, N.S.W., Peter Lee and Guy Bedington; from S.A. Fred Guyatt and from Albury Graeme Boyd. It was an occasion when most of Australia's top ISU Skeet shooters met on the same tracks to compete in a qualifying round at the same time. Alex Crikis, Melbourne, Australia's automatic selection in the skeet team was also booked in, but unfortunately was unable to make it, owing to heavy work commitments.

Ideal weather conditions prevailed throughout the two day shoot, but John Summers and Ian Hale were the only two able to record a clean score of 25 for the whole match. After the first 100 John Summers led the field on 94-100. Ian Hale followed on 93-100. Graeme Boyd and Fred Guyatt were on 87-100 and Peter Lee who has only been shooting I.S.U. Skeet a short time followed on 86-100. His mate, Guy Bedington, who travelled with him, was close behind on 84. Both these shooters were showing signs of their trip to Mildura. After having irrepairable car trouble at Yass, they phoned back to a friend in Sydney to bring another vehicle, so they could continue their journey. It put them many extra hours on the road and it was natural for them to be feeling the effects of the trip. Guy Bedington is caretaker and shoot manager of the N.S.W. Gun Club.

With weather conditions still perfect the second 100 were shot and Ian Hale scored 23,24,25, and 22 to finish with 187-200. John Summers shot 23,22,23 and 23 to finish two targets behind Ian 185-200. Graeme Boyd after having a bad first 100, shot 23,23,22 and 24, to finish with 179-200 targets, and to encourage club members to compete, a sash and trophy was provided for best club member and also second and third trophies. Bill Drew won the sash and trophy scoring 161-200, Robbie Robertson was second 153-200 and Jim Finis third 151-200.

Scores in general were not high and it was evident, by the results that shooters lacked match competition. **O**



Small Pressure Groups Attack Responsible Recreation

As mentioned in the column titled Secretary's Notes in the March issue of Clay Target Shooting News, a serious attack is being made on Clay Target Shooters and their sport in the Shire of Sherbrooke an outer South Eastern Melbourne suburb. For some time now a small group of local residents, living near the shooting school operated by the Port Philip Region of the Victorian Field & Game Association, has been quite vocal in its complaint against the noise being created by the shooting school.

the noise being created by the shooting school. The shooting facility, which until a year or so ago, was shared by the Australian Gun Club, was built back in 1968 to be used as a shooting school for community training in the safe handling of firearms, together with a recreational facility for the members of the Field and Game Association.

It has been reported that in all cases, the residents who are now complaining have moved into the area since the creation of the shooting facility and on this point alone common sense directs that they should be disqualified from lodging any official complaint. About three years ago, an Association titled "the South Riding Abatement Group" was formed which subsequently became known as the Association to control shotgun noise from Field and Game Association range. The Chairman and Secretary of this latter Association are both Councillors on the Sherbrook Shire Council and have gained sufficient support within Council - mainly due to the poor public image which firearms users have created for themselves — to reach a point late in 1978 where a By-law was successfully introduced to restrict the levels of noise emanating from the shooting range. A copy of the By-law is published in full for readers information, from which you will see the serious discriminations contained therein. It will also be readily understood that should this attack on our sport be successful, there is a serious risk of other municipalities being encouraged to apply the same sort of restrictions.

By-law 159 of Sherbrook Shire Council reads as follows:

"A By-Law of the Shire of Sherbrooke made under the Local Government Act 1958 and numbered 159 for suppressing nuisances from noise and in particular for suppressing nuisances from noise from the firing of guns.

In pursuance of the powers conferred by Section 197(1)(xia) of the Local Government Act 1958 and every other power it thereunto enabling, the President, Councillors and Ratepayers of the Shire of Sherbrooke hereby Order as follows:—

- No person shall create a noise on any public highway or on any land or premises so as to cause a nuisance to any other person on any adjacent or nearby land or premises.
- The owner, occupier, lessee or licensee of any land or premises permitting or suffering any person on such land or premises to contravene the provisions of the preceding clause shall be guilty of an offence against this By-Law.
- 3. Without limiting the generality of the preceding clauses herein, for the purposes of this By-Law where a noise is made as a result of a person discharging a firearm or firing a gun the noise so created shall be regarded as causing a nuisance to another person if that other person complains of the noise and the peak level of the measured maximum impulse level of any single impulse, measured at the boundary of the land or premises occupied by the person complaining exceeds the relevant value as set out hereunder:

Without limiting the generality of the preceding clauses herein, for the purposes of this By-Law where a noise is made as a result of a person discharging a firearm or firing a gun the noise so created shall be regarded as causing a nuisance to another person if that other person complains of the noise and 10% of the measured maximum impulse level of the impulses,


- 5. For the purposes of this By-Law the measure of noise referred to in the preceding clauses hereto may be proved by any scientifically accepted method whatsoever, including measure by an impulsive sound level meter complying with Australian Standard ASA 1259 (Part 3) - 1976 and used in substantial compliance with the provisions set out in Australian Standard ASA 1055 - 1973.
- Any wilful contravention of the foregoing clauses by act or omission shall be an offence against this By-Law.
- Every person guilty of an offence against this By-Law shall be liable to a penalty of \$100.
- 8. Every person guilty of an offence against this By-Law shall also be liable to pay in addition to any penalty any expenses incurred by the Council of the Shire of Sherbrooke in consequence of the breach of the By-Law, including any costs incurred in obtaining accurate noise measurements of the noise in respect of which the prosecution or prosecutions are launched.

9. This By-Law shall have force in and apply throughout the municipal district of the municipality of the Shire of Sherbrooke.

10. If any part of this By-Law shall be invalid, that part shall be severable from the remaining part of the By-Law which shall have full force and effect."

The National Executive of the Australian Clay Target Association has expressed its concern at recent developments and has given the Executive Committee of the Victorian Field and Game Association an assurance that wherever possible full support will be forthcoming from the A.C.T.A. Furthermore the recently formed Confederation of Australian Sport has discussed the matter at a recent Council meeting and it too has pledged its support to the Victorian Field and Game Association.

Responsible recreational pursuits will always make some noise and therefore create a nuisance to those who are particularly sensitive on these matters. Surely it comes back to a matter of priorities — is responsible recreation good for a community or should recreation be removed from our lifestyle completely! If the answer to that question is that recreation is a desirable aspect of the Australian way of life, then I suggest that the dissidents leave those of us pursuing our interests alone and occupy their minds with something more productive. After all, if there were involved in some productive activity it is quite likely that the noise about which they complain would not appear to be so intrustive.



The S.A.C.T.A. conducted its first ever trap carnival during the weekend of 24th and 25th February. The attendance exceeded 100 on both days, establishing it as one of the largest tournaments yet held in South Australia.

Taking advantage of the opportunity offered by the Carnival, State President Barrie Arnott convened a general meeting of the State Association. Twelve of the 22 Clubs in the State were represented and a great deal of constructive discussion took place.

A recommendation came out of the meeting to be submitted to Winchester Australia for approval, that Winchester Tournament locations for the 1979-80 series be Robe Gun Club in the South East, and International Gun Club in the Central Zone.

However, the major item on the agenda was the matter of preparing a constitution. Till the present time, the S.A.C.T.A. has been more a rather loose fraternity of Clubs, than a constituted state association. A further factor in the situation has been that the National Association, in a legal sense, has never before recognised State Associations.

In the current changing times, Barrie Arnott has worked hard at developing a constitution suited to South Australian conditions. He has looked at constitutions in effect in other states, and has produced a draft proposal that, after gaining acceptance at the State Carnival meeting, has been distributed to every Club in South Australia.

The constitution makes provision for the creation of three zones - the recommended distribution of clubs is:

All clubs have been requested to discuss the draft constitution and its likely consequences. Also, arrangements are in hand to arrange for zone meetings to be held prior to the next Special Meeting of the S.A.C.T.A., to appoint zone delegates.

After what appears to be the certain acceptance of the draft constitution, which will occur at the special meeting of the S.A.C.T.A. to be held late in April, these zone delegates will then be the State Executive Council, and South Australia will have a state structure that will rate with the best in Australia.

Once the streamlined structure becomes effective not only will a dramatic improvement in communications result, but also a better integrated approach can be made to the State Government on matters relating to development and funding assistance.

Speaking of State Government funding assistance, applications are being sought for facilities development assistance. Closing date is 30th April and project details should be forwarded to the South Australian Clay Target Association.

Edmonton Gold Medallist in Australia

John Woolley from New Zealand has arrived in Australia to obtain more intense competition in ISU Skeet shooting.

Woolley, a 28-year-old barman from Christchurch, has set himself for the South Pacific Regional Championships to be held at Melbourne Gun Club during Easter.

He won the Gold Medal in the ISU Skeet events conducted during the 1978 Commonwealth Games held in Edmonton, Canada.

Shooting since he was 12-years-old, Woolley came into prominence in 1974 when he was placed second in the New Zealand National Skeet Championship. The event was won by Australian "Barney" Rooke from Wagga.

"Barney" Rooke from Wagga. In 1976 Woolley secured a win in the New Zealand Skeet Championship and went on to win the Overall High Gun Award over the skeet and trap program, indicating his prowess as a trap shooter as well.

Later in 1976, the Kiwi was placed 10th in the Montreal Olympics match, a very creditable performance against a world class field.

Woolley attended the National Championships recently staged in Griffith, New South Wales where he shot in skeet AND trap events. Keen ISU Skeet observers say that Woolley has one of the best

styles seen around in years. Maybe John can be influenced to remain in Australia.

May I submit another progress report on our negotiations for suitable land for the Canberra International Shooting Centre.

The all important Department of the Capital Territory, has accepted our formal application for suitable land. At present we, the shooters of Canberra, operate under the title of the A.C.T. Shooting Association, which represents no less than 13 different shooting clubs. We are making provision in our constitution (yet to be ratified) for the acceptance of National Associations as members, should they wish to join this venture. Our objective is to create the first ever I.S.U. Complex to international standards, as we feel that this installation is sadly lacking and is of much importance to Australia.

In addition to I.S.U. needs, we are conscious that "Down the Line" is running out of suitable venues; equally, Simulated Field is gathering in popularity and needs to be catered for. In our submission to the Department, we emphasised our proposal to develop a first class Country Club, with facilities which would attract non affiliated shooters and their families. Considering that 90% of shooters in this country do not belong to competitive clubs, we feel that social facilities would bring them together with the competitive element on a social basis.

The Department understands our desire to become a financial and thus independent body. Tentatively, several parcels of land have been identified for further study. As residents of the National Capital, we are preparing the ground for National Associations to exercise their options in choosing Caliberra as their National Grounds.

The Australian Shooting Association has given approval to our Association to develop plans for a National Training Camp, to be attached to the Canberra Shooting Complex. In practical terms this means provision in the overall plan for a caravan park, low cost motel accommodation and catering facilities, which can be utilised throughout the year, not only once a year. We believe that part of the national training effort must be a junior training scheme, an advanced training scheme for all disciplines and finally, top level coaching for the international competitors and instructors. We believe that such an installation, offered to all shooters "proughout the country, would benefit and enhance our national image. It would also foster friendly inter-relationships between shooters of various associations and their administrators. We are also making provisions for accommodating National Head Offices on the grounds.

Whitst, we recognise the prerogative of National Executives to guide the destiny of their respective fields of endeavour, we nevertheless feel proud that as residents of the National Capital we can assist the sport. The opportunities of incorporating a complete shooting centre with the proposed facilities and incorporating them into an overall design of a city, do not come every day. Permanency of land tenure, based on a firm long term lease, is essential if our sport is to prosper.

Our proposal has created interest among shooters, as our invitation to become a Foundation Life Member is open to all shooters. A prospectus will be issued soon after our incorporation.

The National Capital Development Commission has indicated it's willingness to assist with the proposal, providing that the sport would derive benefit on a national basis. However, they are not keen on separate developments on individual shooting facilities scattered throughout the territory, so a unified approach is the clue to success.

We feel encouraged by the discussion on National Grounds in your "Clay Target News", and we believe that Canberra should be seriously considered as the National Grounds for clay target shooters in combination with all other codes of shooting. The viability of the Complex depends on the social facilities operating every day of the week rather than on Sunday Shoots.

May I also express my thanks to Len Bird from Cowra for his support and contribution.

Pat Browne Speaks

Continuing our discussion on Match Pressure from last month, let's look now at some of the methods used to get it under control

PRIOR MENTAL DETERMINATION. This is the most helpful factor that is available to you. By thinking through the correct procedure for firing each shot, just before you shoot, you can virtually eliminate distractions in the actual execution. If you fail to do this and approach the shot without a preconceived plan of attack, your results at best, will be erratic.

CHANNEL YOUR THINKING TO THE MORE IMPORTANT FUNDAMENTALS. You must continually think fundamentals and review them in your mind. Train yourself so that as many of these fundamentals as possible are executed automatically without tedious effort on your part. When you do this, you have only the most difficult fundamentals to contend with in the actual firing. This will enable you to direct all of your mental and physical efforts toward keeping your eyes focused on the target and complet-

fortis toward keeping your eyes focused on the target and complet-ing your swing-through smoothly. ESTABLISH A ROUTINE. From routine comes boredom. What is boredom? The lack of excitement. What are we trying to do? Keep from becoming excited. In a more serious vein, however, in establishing a routine, you eliminate the possibility of forgetting some trivial item of preparation or technique that may throw you off balance.

WORK ON EACH SHOT INDIVIDUALLY. Each shot must be treated as an individual task. In reality there is no reason to believe that because your first shot was a miss, your next one will be the same. Nor is it los cal that if your first three shots were hits, you have a guarantee that those to follow will also be hits. Each one is merely a representation of your immediate present ability to apply the fundamentals correctly or incorrectly. Your performance will vary considerably if you let it.

WIN THE HIGH GUN, NOT JUST ONE EVENT. Why should you become excited or worry when you have fired a straight round or won an event on the program? Go right ahead and keep break-ing each individual target throughout the tournament. You must train yourself and strive to become the tournament high gun.

TRAIN YOURSELF TO THINK PERFORMANCE RATHER THAN SCORE. Employing this technique, a 23 or 24 becomes not a round that subtracts two or three points from your aggregate, but 4 one or two shots where you allowed yourself to deviate from pro-per employment of the fundamentals. Rest assured that if you

perform properly on the tracks, the score will take care of itself. RELAX YOUR MIND. Right from the time you get up in the morning. Nothing will put you in a greater state of mental agita-tion than to have to rush through breakfast, rush to get to the range just in time to make your squad. If this happens, your score is ruined at about the third red light you hit. Take it easy. Shooting is fun, enjoy it.

PRACTICE TRANQUILITY. Are you the guy that loses his temper every time he has a bad shot? With whom are you mad? You are doing nothing more than admonishing yourself for your vacillation in the execution of a shot. If you had worked a little harder on applying the control factors, the shot would have been better. On the other hand if you do everything within your power to make the shot good and for some reason or other it isn't good, you should have no cause for undue irritation. Although you must exert all of your mental and physical ability toward shooting a good score, infrequently you will fail to do this. Needless to say when this happens, if you chastise yourself severely, or fall into a fit of depression because of a poor score, you will hurt your performance for the rest of the match. It is not intended that you laugh off or treat lightly a poor performance; however, you must possess the presence of mind to accept the bitter with the sweet. Preparing, planning, relaxing, care in delivering the shot, careful analysis and positive corrective measures, is the cycle of action you must force yourself to conform to without deviation. You can then be assured that the next shot can be delivered under

the most precise control you are capable to exerting. MATCH EXPERIENCE. Without question, competitive ex-perience is one of the ingredients necessary in the making of an accomplished competitor. However, experience alone is of no value. You must flavor your experience with an accurate and honest evaluation of your performance. You must experience an increasing degree of mental control. It is often left out of training until your physical ability to shoot far exceeds your ability to exercise control when the chips are down.

PHYSICAL CONDITIONING. There is no doubt whatsoever that you can shoot better if you are in good physical condition. Your
