


### Secretary's Notes

This month's column is written with considerable humility mainly because for the last three weeks it has been certain that it will

That miracles do happen has been proved by the fact that a seemingly irreconcilable difference between the Executive Com-

mittee and I has been resolved.

Whilst I don't believe in making a public issue of internal differences I do believe that there is some benefit to come out of facing those differences and working towards a solution to them.

here remains a tremendous amount of work to be done in promoting Australia's booming sport, and we will only achieve the

desired objectives by demonstrating complete unity.

One of the major problems confronting the Association and the one which contributed to the "growing pain" which caused my job to be advertised, is the dramatic growth in the amount of pressure being generated by the Association's incursion into business areas,

hitherto considered to be taboo.

The first reaction is to say, "Hey, slow down to a pace that I can not only understand, but also that I can cope with!" What the supporters for this theory forget is that it was that sort of management which caused the Association to have a minus figure in the column headed Accumulated Funds in the 1976 Balance Sheet. The fact is that after forty years, the Association had nothing.

Naturally, we cannot expect to make up for forty lost years overnight. Nevertheless, the Association's position at the end of 1976 required urgent and desperate action. Such action was taken and has brought the Association to a point where it has reasonable financial reserves, a healthy membership growth rate, and a business potential that is encouraging. WE CANNOT AFFORD TO LOSE MOMENTUM.

Any attempt to slow our rate of progress must result in an interuption to the Association's growth. It will be a lot more difficult to "move" the present body forward after a lapse, than it was in 1976 - simply because we are now 11/2 times the size we were in

The only solution is to maintain a controlled rate of progress. To achieve such an objective will require the right men doing the right jobs. This requirement puts heavy importance on decisions made by State Associations, as not only do State Associations depend on the right people at the top for their strength and progress, BUT it is also the State Associations which now make the appointments to National Executive Committee.

Changes in the Association's constitutional structure took another step towards completion at the 1978 Annual General Meeting. One of the direct consequences of the changes is that State Associations should start NOW to select the two people it wishes to represent it on the new National Executive Committee to be formed early in 1980. Twelve months is not a long time and it is vital in the Association's long term chances of not only growth, but actual survival, that the RIGHT PEOPLE BE GIVEN MANAGEMENT RESPONSIBILITIES.

Another area in which greater responsibility appears to be necessary showed up at the Annual General Meeting. The purpose of this meeting is to give member Clubs an opportunity to express opinions on policies - Club opinions, that is! As an additional courtesy, the Chairman encourages as many registered shooters as possible to attend and these observers are allowed to speak but have no voting rights.

So we have two categories - the Club delegate who has ONLY his Club view to promote, and the individual who can use the meeting to improve his personal understanding of Association activities and

policies.

At the meeting held in Griffith there can be no doubt that some Club delegates were forced to express their personal view on the subjects under discussion - this is the fault of the Clubs being represented in that the Club Committee failed to direct its delegate

in the way he should vote.

That, in itself, is bad! However, the situation becomes worse, when subjects are raised from the floor, are debated and then a vote is taken. Obviously, if a subject is not listed on the meeting notice paper, no discussion can have occurred at Club Committee level. To be consistent, it is equally as obvious therefore that matters arising from the floor of the meeting should not be voted on, but referred back to clubs for debate.

In recent times, firearms users have been the target for attacks from many misdirected "do-gooders" in the community. I guess the most serious level of attack is that that comes from parliamen-

tary sources and which can result in legislation.

It is these sorts of things that CTSN has a responsibility to discuss. However such discussion should be as unbiased as possible,

and should be based on fact.

Following the article on Victorian legislation, which appeared in the March issue, the editor of CTSN received a letter from an en-thusiastic reader in which the reader expressed a pointed political view. It is my belief that we do not want the pages of CTSN to become cluttered with either direct political propaganda or "I said this and you said" that sorts of debate. Nevertheless, we do intendto continue with a policy of airing political party policies in the interests of developing a better understanding of the subject amongst our readers.



### SKEET IT WAS JIM ELLIS' CROWN BUT WITHOUT SOME DRAMA


It was from a field on 259 hopefuls that we got our nine possibles in the 10th National Skeet Championship. In a day of fluctuating fortunes we saw many of the more fancied starters fall by the wayside. Woolley, Crikis and Hale were early failures and it was not until late in the day when defending champion Ken Lowry posted his 50 that we were able to get on with the shoot off. Nine started but only two made it through to 75. There were evergreen Jim Ellis, not highly regarded as a Skeet shooter and popular president of the Euroa Gun Club, Victorian John King. John's performance was all the more remarkable in that, prior to this championship, he had never run a 25 straight in a skeet match. Ellis and King were shooting in different shoot off squads and it was in the fourth round that they came together, shoulder to shoulder to decide the match.

But then came the drama. Ellis dropped his 83rd target, a low 2 double. King with the four station 2 targets to win proceeded to drop exactly the same target. Both then pulled it together and ran out the balance of the round to 100 targets. Perhaps it was the thought in John King's mind that you do not give a competitor like Jim Ellis two chances, that broke his concentration and it was a high one in the next\_round that relegated him to the runner up position. Jim Ellis, who recently gave up his job as a storeman to take on his own business as the Flick Pest control man, won with a Franchi 400 and used Eley "Quck Skeet" 9's. It was a Super-X Model 1 for John King and AA 325 "Skeet's, he is a farmer.

In third place was 31 year old poker machine salesman Bryan Liersch. He put his score of 63-64 together with his wife's 101 Pigeon Grade and Eley "Quick Skeet" 9's.





The International Skeet Teams Match, Australia v New Zealand resulted in a win for the home team of Ellis, King, Liersch, Berry and Catling. The Australians ran a score of 118,125 to the New Zealander's 110,125. The Kiwi's were represented by McGowan, McRae, Tuanui, Ball and Woolley.

### A SECOND DOUBLE RISE CROWN FOR DOUG SMITH

Perhaps it is when conditions are perfect that we see the top competitors to the fore. It seemed that we are not destined to have a shoot off in the double rise when all we could see on the scoreboard were mid 40 scores. But, Graham Willet posted a 47 and then late in the match it was evergreen Doug Smith popped up with another to give Graham some competition. The shoot off was some sort of anticlimax when Willett missed the second target of his first pair and Smith powedered both of his. Doug Smith, a chicken farmer from Brisbane gun club, and a fierce competitor, added this crown to an impressive nationals record. A previous winner of the double rise, this win makes two, to add to four previous Double Barrel championships, one Champion of Champions Cup, one single barrel and four wins in the overall high gun. He shot a Browning C2 and used Eley Special Trap 7's first barrel and Super Trap 7's second barrel to win the event.

Speaking to Doug after the event he said he was a little disappointed with his original score and mentioned a little trigger problem that cost him a target or two. Evidently a small piece of brass lodged in the sear mechanism and the second barrel would not fire. So fierce was his concentration, that as he put it . . damn near bent the trigger double trying to get that shot off!!"

It was so near, yet so far, for popular Seymour Gun Club President Graham Willett. Graham, a 40 year old station master also shot a C Grade Browning but fed it Eley Super Trap 7's in the first barrel and AA 375 7's in the second.

New Zealander Gavin Searle, after much trauma and many phone calls across the Tasman, eventually made it to the Nationals and was rewarded with the B Grade honors. Gavin, who hails from the Belfast Gun Club in Christchurch, had to survive a tense shoot off with Dudley Plummer from Bordertown in S.A. to win. He shoots a SKB 500 and feeds it Eley Special Trap 7's both barrels.

### 78 STRAIGHT WAS ENOUGH FOR DAVID COLEMAN

The magic 500 was surpassed when competitor's names were up on the scoreboard and it was in warm perfect conditions when all the 505 hopefuls tackled the 50 targets in the Grand Australian Handicap, the 30th running of the event.

When the dust had settled there were 21 possibles and they took to the tracks again to get a winner. In failing light it was the 29 year old Auctioneer from the Parkes Gun Club, David Coleman who stood on the winner's dais to get the goodies. David was obviously quite overwhelmed with his win in one of the most prestigious events of the nationals series. With a very relaxed style, he took each target as it came and put it all together with a Beretta \$58. His Beretta, choked, modified full was fed the recipe of AA 325 7's in the first barrel and his own reload in the second. He stoked this reload up with 26.5 grains of 473AA behind 32 grams of 7's. Taking a well earned break after the event, he mentioned that

he had some doubts about his gun before the event, having spent some time with it at the pattern plate. He thought it was shooting a

bit high . . . he was right, it shot him right to the top of Australia's handicap shooters. David won the event from the 17 metre mark.

Runner up honors went to Gary Fredrickson of Sydney. Gary, a 32 year old fireman stoked his Winchester 101 up with Eley Super Trap shells in his bid for the title. Not since Merv Pratt's win in Launceston some years ago have we seen a New Zealander in the placings, but Phillip Kingston came within a couple of targets of the coveted title when he came third with a score of 76, 77. Phillip, a 27 year old bar manager shot a Nikko Shadow and fed it Browning shells.

At this stage in the championships it was obvious that diminutive Deserie Wakefield was making a determined onslaught on the



Although the New Zealand project is now behind us, a brief description of the problems experienced in consigning cartridges to Auckland on behalf of members of the group may be of interest.

Firstly, travellers should know that it is asking for trouble to arrive at an international passenger check-in counter with three cases of shotshells. Such an approach is guaranteed to alienate the counter clerk. Yet, some of our members did just that!

Due to the high price of plastic hulled shotshells in New Zealand -- about \$8.00 for 25 -- the Association arranged to procure cartridges in Australia and transfer them to the Auckland Airport for collection on arrival by members of the official ACTA group.

The purchase of the cartridges was the easiest part - from there forward, the problems became progressively more complex.

For example, agreement was reached with the New Zealand Customs Department that no duty would be charged on the consignment provided that the cartridges arrived on the same aircraft as the group. Then it was found that Air New Zealand regulations limited the loading to three cartons per flight - the ACTA consignment was nearer thirty cartons.

Arrangements were made to have the consignment lifted by British Airways on the day prior to the group's departure date and a "gentleman's agreement" was reached with the NZ Customs authorities, confirming duty-free entry.

The cartridges were delivered to B.A. freight agents, Ansett Airlines at the appointed time. It was at this time that we learned that British Airways operate on the same regulations as Air New Zealand, so once again, we were "up the proverbial creek"!

After much shouting, finger pointing and all sorts of other

gestures, Steve Hart of Qantas was able to re-organise a jumbo to enable the Association's 500 plus kilos of shotshells to be uplifted.

One would think that by now, all was well. Not so. The next problem was that due to an Air Traffic Controllers' "work to regulations" campaign, the Melbourne group was four hours late departing, which got it to Auckland near midnight. As no-one was available to release air freight so late at night, arrangements were made to collect the cartridges very early the following morning, at which time a storeman's strike had commenced.

Executive Committee member Robin Bailey, who was delegation leader, did some fast talking and ultimately the cartridges were loaded onto the coach that was to take the group to Hamilton.





home.




### Saturday 27th, Sunday 28th January, 1979

### Wednesday 14th February, 1979



### INTERNATIONAL SHOOTING SCENE

Following the shock announcement that the shotgun section of the 1979 World Championships had been cancelled, the Association's ISU sub-committee has been investigating other possible competitions in which an Australian team could be entered.

It is considered that top line competition is vital in preparation for the 1980 Olympic Games, where Australia has a better than ever prospect in both trench and skeet. The base provided by the 1978 campaign needs to be developed by further international competition.

### **MOSCOW MANAGER**

In the March issue of CTSN, the position of Section Manager for the shooting section of Australia's 1980 Olympic team was advertised.

It can now be announced that the position has been filled by the National Secretary of the Amateur Pistol Shooting Union of Australia, Peter Anderson of Canberra.

Anderson was the "training co-ordinator" for the shooting section of Australia's 1978 Commonwealth Games team - a position which enabled him to gain vital experience under the experienced eye of Newton Thomas, the team manager.

Peter Anderson won the position after a series of ballots amongst the shooting associations' delegates to the Australian Shooting Association.

A number of people responded to the ACTA advertisement and the Association is most grateful for the support and interest being shown by these enthusiasts.

### INTERNATIONAL JUDGES

For many years, Australia's shotgunning competitions in the socalled international disciplines have been made more difficult because of a lack of accredited and licensed judges or referees.

Jules Steiner of Perth has been the only licence holder (for shotgun events) in Australia - at least until recently.

Advice has been received that after prolonged negotiations, John Summers (senior) of Melbourne Gun Club has been granted a Class B licence, with the possibility of having it upgraded to Class A after twelve months.

In view of the tremendous difficulty in gaining these appointments, John's achievement is of the highest order, and the writer congratulates you John, on behalf of all shooters in Australia.

This opportunity is taken to say a pulic thank you to the two major Australian cartridge manufacturers - Eley and Winchester.


The reason for this specific expression of gratitude is because of a generous gesture of both companies in providing cartridges for the use of the four shooters being coloquially called "the automatic selections".

At a time when Australia was a certain entry in the now aborted 1979 World Championships, Jim Ellis, Terry Rumbel, Alex Crikis and John Summers (junior) were announced as team members. The other places in the trench and skeet teams were to be filled by a process of qualification.

A training program was devised for these four competitors by the team manager Newton Thomas, and the two manufacturers have materially assisted the preparation of these shooters by a generous arrangment for the supply of cartridges, through the National Association.

Australia's chances of medals at Moscow must be enhanced by constant training for potential team members.

The match developed into a real cliff-hanger, with the winner being Jon Whittakers of Deniliquin (N.S.W.) from Graeme Willett of Seymour (Vic.). Jon shot the great score of 200 200 to win the Winchester Under and Over shotgun and the Perpetual Cup.

The series attracted an entry of 1945 participants, including 86 juniors, 78 ladies and 74 veterans. The average attendance per location was 88.4 which compares very favourable with past years.

The 1979 80 series "kicked off" at Sydney Gun Club on 22nd April. As was the case with Sydney Gun Club, most host clubs.

The nomination has been kept to \$20, which should prove to be a further inducement. It should be noted that Ladies, Veterans and Juniors pay a reduced nomination of \$12.





### IMPORTANT MESSAGE - Product Recall



### A.G.M. PASSES CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGES

The "Blue Hills" saga of constitutional reform took a massive step forward at the Association's 1979 Annual General Meeting when the Club delegates resolved to recommend a series of

changes to the Victorian Attorney General.

The meeting was held on March 9th, and was a complete "sellout". Under extremely hot conditions 123 Club delegates and interested observers tried to squeeze into the Clubhouse. The record crowd overflowed onto the verandah and Clubhouse surrounds.

The first major decision of the meeting was to re-elect Ern Hawkins as National President for a further term. Ern is now in his third term and continues to demonstrate a tremendous sense of fair play and dedication. It is a sign of the improving maturity and the influence of State Associations, that no ballots were required at the A.G.M. All office bearers were elected unopposed.

New faces include

Trevor Reschke from Coonawarra, South Australia, who takes

the position previously filled by Phil Mules.

Spencer Angel of Murgon, Queensland, who has filled the position vacated by Sep Stewart; and John Bull of Goroke, Victoria, who has filled the casual vacancy caused by the resignation of Angus McSween.

As was to be expected, the subject of constitutional reform stimulated a variety of opinions, and in addition to the official proposal, four amendments were listed on the notice paper for con-

The official proposal was moved by Roy Holtfreter of Western Australia and seconded by 'Pud' Burgess of Cobar. After some general discussion, the first of the amendments was tabled. This was a matter raised by Werribee Gun Club, the purpose of which was to preseve the individual voting rights of individual clubs. The official proposal made provision for each State Association to be represented at the A.G.M. by seven representatives. amendment was carried.

Port Lincoln Gun Club followed, with an amendment which introduced pro rata registration fees, and this was also carried. The effect of this amendment will be to provide for payment of half the standard fee by a new shooter who registers after the 30th June each year. (In accepting this amendment the meeting effectively removed the policy of "honorary membership" for the last quarter of the year, which has been so successful in the last two years)

The next amendment tabled was from the Melbourne Gun Club, and was certainly the most controversial of the meeting. The reason for the controversy was the very basic problem of whether the National policy making group should be structured to reflect the numeric strength of each State. The official proposal was based on the theory that at National level, State boundaries should not exist and that this view was the Clubs' view, was confirmed by an overwhelming 'NO' vote on the amendment.

However, the standard of the meeting suffered a deep dent because of the reaction to this vote, where it was apparent that a certain section of the meeting saw it as a "Victorian defeat" rather than a National decision. Such exhibitions of personal bias have no place at serious meetings, where, at least in a technical sense, the only view permitted is the Club view, all voting members in attendance are representing their Club, AND NO ONE ELSE.

The representatives of Victorian Clubs are to be commended for the way in which they demonstrated their responsible attitude by remaining silent, in spite of the raucous reaction to the vote.

The effect of this amendment failing is to preserve the equality of States at a National level, and will result in the new Executive Committee (at some time during 1980) consisting of two delegates from each State including Northern Territory.

At this time the final amendment to the Constitution proposed,

notice of which had been given by the Narrogin Gun Club was

withdrawn.

The amended constitutional proposal was then put to a vote and was carried. Although much legal and technical work remains to be done, this vote represented a successful conclusion to a long involved and tedious twelve years of debate on the topic. What should have been a momentous occasion passed almost without comment.

The meeting then moved on to General Business, where the first item was a motion foreshadowed by the Wagga Gun Club. In this motion, the Club called for specific investigations to be undertaken before new Clubs were allowed to affiliate with the National Association. The Motion failed to gain much support and when put to the vote, was lost.

Some discussion took place on the equity of the present grading system. It applies to trap events and the Chairman gave the meeting an assurance that the matter was under consideration by the

Sales Committee.

Amongst the topics raised from the floor was the vital matter of a National Headquarters. The Chairman brought the meeting up to date on the amount of investigative work that had been already done by his Committee, following which it was resolved that a referendum of registered shooters be conducted to establish "whether or not a policy of establishing a National Shooting Ground is supported". This referendum is now in the early plan-ning stages and readers shall be kept advised of progress.

During the discussion on a National Ground, Mr. Jules Steiner advised the meeting that a group in Western Australia is well advanced in developing a sporting complex of international standard. It is planned to cater for ALL shooting disciplines and a submission is currently being prepared to present to the Western Australian Government, in which approval in principle and finding

assistance is being sought.

For readers who are interested, the delegate attendance at the meeting was divided over States as follows: South Australia 8, Queensland 25, New South Wales 35, Victoria 36, Western Australia 14. Tasmania 4 and Northern Territory 1.

### EXECUTIVE REPORT **MARCH MEETING**

Traditionally, the National Executive Committee holds a Committee Meeting to coincide with the National Championships.

In the past these meetings have been mainly held for the purpose of solving any last minute hassles connected with the "Nationals". Such is no longer the case, and a total of 23 hours was consumed in full meeting, with an additional time commitment falling on the shoulders of those Executive member who have Sub Committee responsibilities.

The meeting agenda was quite extensive, and required a great deal of careful consideration. The following is a report of matters discussed:

**New Faces** 

Mr John Bull of Goroke joined the Executive, taking the place of Angus McSween, who had resigned because of continuing health problems.

Present as observers were Trevor Reschke of Mt Gambier and Spencer Angel of Murgon, both of whom took their places on the Executive at the Annual General Meeting. Kevin Bowring, President of the Darwin Gun Club, also attended as an observer, representing newly formed Northern Territory Clay Target Association.

**Core Group Recommendations** 

A meeting of the Core Group (Messrs Hawkins, Porter and Holtfreter) had been held last December, from which a number of recommendations had come forward.

These were submitted to the full Executive Committee for confirmation. Those of interest to readers included:

Trap Rule 20. This rule has existed as a constant threat to those ACTA members who like to also shoot "fun" targets at other locations. It read, in part, "Registered shooters who shoot at un-registered or unaffiliated Clubs render themselves liable to disqualification".

This reference has been removed from the rules.

International DTL Competition. Following the instant success of the Association's "Vandalia Project", it has now been resolved to enter a three man National Trap team in a Great Britain competition, probably around July 1980. The conditions of selection will be devised by a Sub Committee, which is to report back to the full Committee in September.

Income for Travel Activities. Since the Association involved itself in co ordinating members' travel requirements, some income has been generated by means of advertising and donations.

It has been resolved that the income derived from these sources should be used to create Junior Scholarship fund.

Interstate Teams' matches. The Executive Committee believes that one of the most important steps in the development of top level competition is to initiate "shoulder to shoulder" teams com-

It was resolved that a DTL competition for representative State teams be added to the 1980 National Championships program. Each State is to enter a team consisting of the top five scores from its previous Interstate Trap Teams Postal competition match, with State Associations being responsible for travel costs.

The actual details of the match, and creation of conditions and trophies has been deferred until the September meeting of the Na-

tional Executive Committee.

General Business

The following items of interest have been extracted from the minutes of the meeting:

Mini targets, for many years a "bone of contention" have been deleted from the Commonwealth Championship roster.

Referee Examinations, in cases where an applicant fails in his or her first attempt to become a referee, it is now mandatory that the applicant undertake subsequent tests from the SAME EXAMINER. In this way, It is hoped the standard of newly appointed referees can be maintained.

National Shooting Ground. This matter will be covered in detail in a later report, as a general referendum on the subject is to be undertaken.

However the Executive Committee aproved plans for the Core

Group to continue to investigate promising sites.

1980 National Championships. The dates and venue for the 1980

National Championships have been set. The details are:

Venue: Perth Clay TargetClub, W.A. Dates: 3rd March '80 to 9th March '80

The host club will conduct a three day pre Nationals tournament commencing on February 29th.

Rules matters. A number of rules matters were discussed, and in all cases, the subjects were referred to the Rules Committee. The Rules Committee held a number of discussion periods during the Nationals and a full report is being prepared. It should be remembered that the Association is committed to a revision of the rules to be announced late in 1980, with implementation being con-

sidered for 1st January 1981.

New Association Badge. The new badge which was approved last September has now been coloured and has received final acceptance. Arrangements are already in hand to issue a badge to every registered shooter from 1st January 1980. The badge will be distributed at no charge and will be posted direct to the shooter, together with his or her 1980 registration card.

National Skeet Championship. In view of the growth of interest in standard skeet it is apparent that more shooting has to be provided for skeet enthusiasts at the Nationals Tournament. It has been resolved that the number of targets comprising the National Skeet

Championship will be increased as soon as possible.

Loans and Grants to State Associations. For some time now the Association has been grappling with the problem of whether it should provide interest free or low interest loans to Clubs, Zones or States for development purposes.

One of the major problems has been to define a policy that will be seen to be fair to all parties, and still provide the National Associa-

tion with a certain degree of security for its funds.

As the total funds available for such a purpose are severely limited, combined with the fact that the National Association may experience an urgent need for liquidity when its "Headquarters" project gets under way, it was resolved that no further consideration would be given to the subject of loans and grants until the "Head-quarters" project is completed. International Match at 1980 Nationals. There is a strong possibility

that a contingent of U.S. competitors will visit the 1980 Nationals to be conducted in Western Australia. The group will probably include at least two representatives who will have received funding assistance from the Amateur Trapshooting Association (our Air

New Zealand team, in reverse!)

Assuming that a group does arrive, the Executive Committee has altered the conditions of the International Match (already on the program) to extend it to a 50 target double barrel event, with

teams of five representing each nation.

Peacemaker Australia. A new company has recently been formed trading as "Peacemaker Australia". Although the company plans to eventually manufacture and distribute a wide range of shooting oriented products, its initial activities revolve around the distribution of a security key operated wall mounted gun rack. (One was provided as a trophy at the recent National Tournament)

### ASSOCIATION BUDGETS FOR ANOTHER **HEALTHY SURPLUS IN 1979**

At the Executive Committee meeting held in Griffith in March. the Administrative Unit submitted a financial plan for 1979 for consideration and approval.

INCOME

Advertising

The plan was accepted and makes provision for substantial increases in spending, mainly in three areas. These are staffing costs (where the appointment of the National Director has made a measurable difference, although his salary is funded from a Federal Government grant; the rapid growth of the Association has necessitated provision for an additional staff member to be appointed later in 1979), production costs of CTSN (the development into four color processing is mainly responsible); and International competition.

In a new cost development, provision has been made to return to State Associations, \$1 for each registered shooter in each State.

However, estimated increases in income make it certain that the

association will again return a significant surplus, forecast to be in excess of \$30,000. Should this be achieved it will lift the Association's accumulated funds at the end of 1979 to around \$120,000.

### **BOOK REVIEW....**

### To lead or not lead..?

Browsing among the shooting books in McGill's stock I came across "Shotgunning, The Art and The Science" by Bob Brister, published by the Winchester Press.

In the past I have found that this publisher has a good idea of what interests a shooting man and that opinion was confirmed when I glanced through the pages and subsequently walked out

Bob Brister is the shooting editor of the U.S.A. magazine "Field and Stream" and is a fellow with an inquiring mind who not only acquaints himself with the theories of shooting but tests them to see whether they work, which is a practice I like to follow myself.

When the V.F. & G.A. was in its formative years, the Port Phillip Region, having no ground of its own, held several shoots a year at the Australian Gun Club at East Burwood and many of its members showed they needed more gun handling. As I was always responsible for looking after the skeet activities I quickly found that some shooters had no idea of the amount of lead necessary to hit crossing shots or indeed that any lead was necessary

I recall watching one member missing repeatedly and saying to him, you are shooting behind them, get in front. After a further miss he turned around to me and said, well I was in front of that one, I missed it in front. As I had been looking over his shoulder and saw exactly where he was shooting I said, you missed it behind, like the others, and getting a bit impatient, "if you are not going to get in front of them you needn't pull the trigger, as you are only wasting cartridges".

There was no reply, but on his next shot, he really did get in front, enough, so he thought, to ensure a miss when, to his amazement, the target broke.

"Well I'II be blowed" he said, "he was right, I never would have believed it.

I formed the opinion then that a lot of time could be saved, when the Port Phillip Region had its own ground, if a very large white moving pattern plate was rigged up with, say, the outlines of a duck in the centre so that shooters could see at once where their shots were going and what leads were necessary.

Brister had something of the same idea when he fixed a large pattern board on to a trailer which he had towed behind a car at speeds approximating that of a duck in flight and at the various ranges he expected to shoot, while trying out different leads and methods of getting those leads. It might be as well to look at our

1. We can use the sustained lead, that is to swing the gun along ahead of the target at a constant speed. This is sometimes called pointing out.

A number of swing through shooters maintain that this method is the least successful but the best duck shot I know used it exclusively. The important thing here is to have the experience to know how much lead is required at the various ranges.

2. We can put the muzzle on the target, swing with it, then flip the gun ahead to give the lead. Some good duck shooters find this method useful.

3. There is the swing through, that is the gun starts from behind the target but accelerates past it and the trigger is pulled when the gun is far enough in front. I find that using this method that the apparent lead required is only about half that of a sustained lead. 4. We have the very fast swing through when the shooter pulls the trigger as soon as his muzzle catches up with the target. Using this style the gun has always swung past the target in successful shots although the shooter may not be aware of this.

If the shooter succeeded in pulling the trigger at the exact moment he caught up with the target his shot would pass behind it.

If you look at the diagram you will see the reasons for this. The diagram is for a range of 21 yards which is the range of a right angle shot on a skeet ground on No. 4 station but if we were duck shooting the range could be twice the distance or more.

A duck maintains its speed but shot keeps getting slower so that

the need for lead is much greater as the range increases.

Robert Churchill a London gunmaker whose name is preserved in the firm of Churchill, Aitkin, Grant and Lang was one of the early advocates of the fast swing no lead idea and as he was a great correspondent to the sporting papers and a good debater, his ideas received a lot of acceptance.

Brister put those ideas to the test with his travelling pattern board and found that to hit the target he had to show some daylight between gun and target before he pulled the trigger, the greater the range the more daylight was needed.

This has been my experience also and though some shooters may believe they have pulled the trigger on catching up to the target, the effectiveness of this style depends on a conscious or unconscious delay in pulling the trigger while the gun is still swing-

Some time ago I was listening to a group of fellows discussing leads when one said "I don't lead them I just shoot them". As he can be shoot them in the shoot in and in was a good shot, both at the various games of clay shooting and in the field, I made a point of looking over his shoulder, when he was shooting, lining up his barrel in relation to the target, he had a beautiful swing but there was no doubt that every time the gun went off, that, although he apparently did not know it, he was well out in front.

Now to answer the question posed previously, yes lead is necessary on crossing shots though with some styles of gun handling it may not seem to be so.

Addendum. Some shooters believe that the shot is thrown sideways with a fast swing, this does happen but only to a negligible degree.

### Man and his First Weapons

Man, the last new-comer among the dominant species on Earth, although lacking in physical strength for offense and defense, succeeded in overcoming this deficiency, thanks to his intelligence, the best possible endowment that nature bestowed on him.

The first manifestation of his superior intelligence was the use of weapons, which enabled him to defend himself, to secure the necessary food, and to survive.

The progression of weapons devised by man becomes a fascinating study. Surely the first weapons were natural ones, like stones and branches firmly held in his clumsy hands.

Gradually man developed better weapons and likely devoted all his spare time to their construction and use.

The club was undoubtedly the first deliberate weapon devised and made by man.

Man, during the paleolithis age up to about 15,000 years B.C., lived a nomadic life as a hunter and a fisherman, taking shelter in natural caves and covering himself with skins of animals.

His weapons and implements were made of natural crudely chipped stones. Mesolithic age man (from about 15,000 to about 5,000 years B.C.), besides improving on the chipping of stones, learned how to carve bones, to make needles, spikes, daggers, and arrow tips for use with primitive bows, etc.

Man, of the neolithic period (from about 5,000 to about 3,000 years B.C.) besides shaping and polishing stones, mastered the art of making pottery, of weaving flax fibres, of cultivating useful plants — mainly graminaceae — and began worshipping the dead. By this period, he lived in permanent, elevated dwellings. As time went on, he gradually made more use of axes, knives, daggers, lances and arrows, mainly made of hewn flint stones. During the eneolithic period he also began learning how to make use of metals; in fact the bronze age started in various lands at different times between the years 4,000 and 2,000 B.C.

The same applied to the iron age, between the years 2,000 and 1,000 B.C.

The main obstacle to the use of iron was the high temperature necessary for the smelting of the iron ore to get the pure metal. It was with this utilisation of the iron, enabling man to manufacture offensive weapons, agricultural tools and various instruments for the working of stone, wood and metals that our civilisation originated. The spreading of the use of metals resulted in a large variety of weapons extending the range of both defence and offence.

About the year 1,000 A.D. the most important weapons were the lance the sword, the long bow, the mace and the crossbow, besides the incendiary and burning devices and the various launching or thrusting machines (catapults, battering rams and the like).

Men were divided into rigidly separated classes; the peasants' task was to farm, the clergy to study but only the nobles were entitled to handle weapons.

In the medieval strifes the knight's figure, austere and impetuous, rose to be a symbol of dominion, justice and order.

Everything was committed to the results of sword and mace blows, to the skillfulness in the use of the lance and to the undauntedness of the assault almost always face to face with the opponent in an encounter in which life itself was at stake.

Man therefore, chiefly relied on cold steel to settle social aggresion with his fellow-men, to expand and protect his possessions, to impose duties and enforce his rights.

This is the historic period which was inspiration to the poets and gave life to epics of glory.

But a new period opened for mankind when the first firearms appeared as a result of the invention and utilisation of the propelling properties of gunpowder.

#### FIREARMS DEBATE HOTS UP IN VICTORIAN **ELECTION**

There have been a number of developments in the Victorian political controversy surrounding firearms control since the discussion commenced in these pages in the March issue of "Clay

Target Shooting News".

Mr. Wilkes, Leader of the Parliamentary Labour Party has written to the Victorian Firearms Traders' Association. In his letter, he states, "I would like Association members to know that, in the view of the Victorian Parliamentary Labour Party, the present Firearms Act is adequate, providing it is properly policed'

Strange but that statement ties in exactly with ACTA policies. So where are the hassles? Well, try this for size - Clause 151 of a document titled "Civil Rights and Law Reform" and said to be part of the official policy of the Victorian Labour Party (note the omission of the word "Parliamentary") reads: "All firearms to be registered and possession of firearms to be restricted to those requiring them for essential occupation and limited supervised and recreational purposes.

Mr. C. T. Edmunds is the shadow Chief Secretary in the Labor Party and was asked for an explanation of the so-called policy statement. He replied that clause 151 has been on the statement for some time and is currently under review by a sub-committee. Be that as it may, the State Labour Party seems to call the shots to be played by the Parliamentary arm, and therefore this matter will need to be closely monitored.

During the discussion with Mr. Edmunds he expressed personal opposition to firearms registration, but confirmed his leader's view that the present legislation, IF EFFECTIVELY ADMINISTERED, is adopted.

is adequate.

Mr. Edmunds, himself a firearms user, also said that if elected to Government, his party would look at the subject of Sunday shooting, with a view to obtaining community opinions on the advisability of changing the present legislative prohibition, except in the case of controlled competition.

Meanwhile, a letter written to Liberal Party Leader, Mr. Hamer, Premier of Victoria, dated February 20th, in which a statement on his party's forward policy on the subject of firearms control was sought remains unanswered at the time of going into print. Furthermore, Victoria has just seen the appointment of its THIRD Chief Secretary (the Minister responsible for firearms control legislation) in nine months. These constant moves make it very difficult to develop any rapport with the responsible minister or engage in continuing discussions.

To those electors in Victoria, who are firearms users (300,000 of them) and who intend to cast a vote at the State Elections on May 5th, please contact ALL the candidates in your electorate and seek their views on these subjects - as some of the people you talk to will be formulating the policies that may wreck our recreation.

The need is urgent, the time is now!

The following letter has been received from Gordon Smith, Secretary of Hamilton Gun Club, who recently attended a meeting addressed by Mr. F. Wilkes, leader of the Victorian Parliamentary Labour Party.

Dear Noel,

The Hamilton Gun Club received an invitation to meet Mr. Frank Wilkes Leader of the Labor Party in Victoria when he visited Hamilton on March 7 this year. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss any matters that may affect our Club.

Leigh Howlett and myself attended representing the Gun Club, we took with us a copy of your article "What is the Future of Firearms Legislation in Victoria?" to discuss the points you raised.

Mr. Wilkes stated that the Labor Party did not have a Policy on Firearms Legislation, but would welcome any proposal submitted by our Organisation. Any such proposal would receive consideration by the Party and a reply would be given.

The Labor Party would be looking for Legislation that would not be costly to administer, would not affect members of shooting organisations, or take away the right of Clubs to shoot on Sundays.

Mr. Wilkes said that he did not make the statement attributed to him in the 'Age' and the statements made in parliament were the personal opinions of the Members concerned.

The Ladies trophy for this event went to Christine Bowman of Wyong Club.







#### CLAY TOPICS by Norman F. Cooper What kind of Gun?

Although to the experienced shot it may appear somewhat naive, one of the commonest questions I get asked in the course of my business is "What sort of gun do I need?" Sometimes the intending purchaser does not actually use those words but this is only because he is perhaps reluctant to reveal that he is in ignorance of the basic requirements of an intending shooter. By polite and friendly questioning the degree to which he is ignorant can beestablished without upsetting him and then one is on a pleasant footing and can help him. At the same time it is possible to establish what sort of financial commitment he wants to make and this can save us both time, for as I often put it, it is pointless showing a man a Rolls-Royce if he has a Mini in mind and of course the reverse is true. So often the intending purchaser has no idea of current prices of even the cheapest gun and where he has some knowledge, it is very often out of date. Occasionally he will ask about a specific make or type of gun, either because he has seen it advertised or more likely because someone he knows has one. The easiest possible person to deal with is he who will admit his ig-norace, place himself in our hands and even provide a rough guide as to how much he has to spend. If in addition he provides us with some idea concerning his possible use for the gun, then it is highly probable that he will leave the shop a satisfied purchaser, if not on that occasion, at some time in the near future.

The most difficult person to deal with? He who is quite obviously ignorant on the whole subject of guns but will not admit it, or worse still, has had some peculiar ideas inculcated by perhaps a friend of his who also knows little or nothing on the subject. Sometimes such a person has a very set idea in his head, based on false information, and it becomes almost impossible to help him -in fact one can waste an awful amount in time and effort with such people to no avail for if the truth be told, it is almost beyond anyone's capabilities to gauge just what it is they do want, for they do not know themselves. Then again there are the ones, fortunately few in number, who will spend a long period looking at a selection of guns, sometimes ask if you can provide credit facilities or a part exchange deal, which of course we can, decide that a particular model is what they are looking for and then go off and say that they will be back "this afternoon' or "tomorrow" or "on Saturday" and then one never sees them again. Whether it is some ego trip for them to say this or whether they live in cloud cuckoo land I never know, but they are probably the same kind of people who waste a car salesman's time on a demonstration run or a house agent's time and effort showing them property when in reality they are not in a position to buy anything of that nature. I never mind a person saying that they are "just looking" and fail to see why the former type need what can be quite an elaborate charade to justify what is in truth probably only idle curiosity, which is no real fault after all - but at least you know where you stand when it is ad-

Three main types

If we take the man who places himself in our hands, having given us some indication of what he wants the gun for and the price that he is prepared to pay, then he may fall into one of three main types of potential gun user. The first one is the man who has been attracted to shooting because of a latent interest in the sport which may well go back to his boyhood. The chances are that he lives in a rural or semi-rural area and has seen some shooting or has some friends who shoot. He may well have tried his hand at one of the small clay shoots that are held in the summer in connection with village flower shows and the like and has been bitten by the bug. Realising that without his own gun he is handicapped to say the least, he usually has no real idea of what he wants but has some hope of not only some clay shooting but also some pigeon and rabbit shooting, either with a friend or because he knows a local farmer who has indicated that he will give permission to shoot. Because it is his first gun he is usually happy with a non-ejector, as this obviously reduces his initial outlay.

Side by side
So what do we sell him? Because any shooting friends are more likely to have side by side double guns than over and unders, he is probably disposed more to the former and even if he has sampled the local clay shoot, there again many of the locals will have the same type of gun. Sometimes the weight factor enters into it, and on average the over and under tends to be heavier than the side by "side, and of course it is also true that at the cheaper end of the

He therefore on our advice will we hope buy a side by side non-ejector, of as good a grade as he can afford and if possible with the right barrel bored Improved Cylinder and the left about Half Choke. If the gun he likes does not come from the factory like this, then we open the chokes for him, as usually the borings are tighter than this. He can add a cleaning kit and a gun cover and still leave the shop with change from \$200, and quite a lot of change if we have a second hand gun that fits the bill.

With this gun he can operate successfully at his field shooting and also make a very reasonable effort at the sort of clay shoot that he is likely to attend, where he is likely to get a variety of clays to shoot at, at least one kind of which is almost certain to be some kind of going away bird and quite probably another will be a climbing target usually called a "Springing Teal", although the amount of spring often varies a great deal! In any case his right barrel will cope quite well with it and if he needs a second shot at the going-away target, then the left barrel has all the pattern he is likely to need.

Over and unders

Customer No. 2 is rather different. He may have already done a little shooting of some kind but having sampled some clay shooting, has decided that this is to be his main interest. He has perhaps been to one of the larger competitions with a friend and noticed that the great majority of the entrants were shooting with over and under guns. If he owns a gun already it is often one of the run of the mill Spanish side by sides, pretty tightly choked in both barrels or one of the cheap Russian ones, even more tightly choked. On the other hand, he may wish to buy his first gun, and on his own admission will hopefully be shooting mostly clays but also has the chance of a little rough shooting from time to time. His price bracket may stretch somewhat higher than the first man. On our recommendation, he will therefore be inclined to buy an over and under, with similar borings to the first man's side by side. As an incipient clay shot he does not usually mind the extra weight involved, although if this does brother him, he may settle for one of the guns with alloy actions which usually emanate from Italy. Because he also wants the gun for field use, the automatic safety catch appeals to him and the fact that he can get an over and under with this and also with 26in barrels which save a little weight as well sometimes leads him to spend a larger sum than he may have intended in order to get these features. Although the vast majority of such guns will have single trigger actions and half pistol grip stocks, if he has been used to a double trigger gun, he may seek this feature and in both the cheaper non-ejectors and the more expensive ejectors he will find not only the double triggers but also at least one straight hand stock.

A skeet gun

The third man who is looking for a gun is on his way to a severe attack of "clayitis." He has shot before, probably pigeons and rabbits or even some game, been taken by a friend to a skeet or sporting clay shoot and suddenly realises that whereas in the past he has been lucky to let off his gun half a dozen times in an afternoon, here is the chance to fire as many as one hundred cartridges in a day. He has always had the idea, quite logically, that the prime purpose in owning a shotgun is to be able to let it off. Now not only can he do this as often as he chooses but also enjoy some good fellowship into the bargain and as a spin-off, perhaps make some new friends who can introduce him to some more field shooting.

Looking round, he notices that nearly all his new acquaintances have over and under guns. If he lives in the South of England, the chances are that he will find more facilities for shooting skeet and sporting clays than he will for down-the-line or automatic ball trap

Joan Mills P.O. Box 39 Yallourn but in the North the trap and trench shooters will be in the majority. So in the former area he is likely to buy a skeet gun, which will serve him equally well for 90 per cent of his Sporting clays, and in the latter maybe his first purchase will be a trap gun. If he has any preference, he will prefer a free safety, which is not likely to cost him the odd lost target that failure to push off an automatic safety may do. If he finds that an over and under suits him well, he may even buy himself such a gun to shoot game with, although in fact the skeet gun will often double very satisfactorily for most of his game shooting. On the other hand, he may, like myself, by one of the thousands of shooters who use the superposed barrels for clay shooting but still prefer the lighter weight and classic lines of the side by side for the live quarry.

Of course, in any case he is more likely to have moved away from the bottom price bracket and is among the ejector guns, simply because almost none of the makers produce a competition gun as a non-ejector, Valmet being one that immediately springs to mind. If No. 3 gets bitten badly enough by the clay bug he (or she) may well finish up with skeet, trap, sporting and game models, and even a spare one or two (just in case one breaks down at any time!) I have left to last one category of customer that is a joy to deal with. He is an experienced shooter who has got on well with a certain type of gun, which as long last has succumbed to the ravages of time. He knows what he wants, has a shrewd idea of market prices, will take advice and has the money in his pocket to pay for his choice. He is even wise enough to know that a session Cont'd on page 80




Melbourne Gun Club President, Bob Buchan also entered this event and took out "B" Grade with a very creditable 91/100.



Bill Stevens followed this with a short talk on the four different


methods of shooting -

We would like to thank Robinsons Sports Store for again supplying the fine trophies for the grade winners which consisted of a shooting jacket for first and an ammunition case for second.



## Coaching Director Says . . .

I am often asked by shooters about the requirements a person needs to be a coach, is it essential that he is a champion shot?

The answer to this is NO he does not have to be a champion.

There are two reasons for this:

1. All our coaching in the A.C.T.A. National Coaching Scheme should be done from the Basic Coaching Manual and so it becomes most important that the coach should both study. know, and use the methods shown in this manual and should be able to explain the reasons for each position of gun holding, stance, etc., illustrated in it.

The champion shot is often very prone to feel that his way and his alone is the reason for his success and consequently should be used by all. This is not so, as some segments of his style may be totally unsuitable to other shooters because of

several factors, mainly physical.

Irrespective of shooting ability, as long as one is interested in clay target shooting in its various forms and is willing to conform to the basic coaching manual's method of instruction, he or she can prove of great value to the sport.

at our Shooting School will accustom him to the new gun quicker than anything and will quickly profit from such a session. In recent years such a man has sometimes been one who has owned a good English gun (or even a pair) and who has sold them to us, buying in return one or more good quality imported guns from us with the remark that the difference in price is going to pay for his shooting for the next two or three years! I am happy to say that in all this type of sale not only has the man been satisfied with the actual purchase but been delighted to find that he has shot as well or even better with the new gun as he did with the old one and has been pleased to tell us so.

As for the exact opposite of him, the man who delights in extolling the virtues of some gun which we do not stock and boasts of how he has succeeded in grinding some other retailer into the ground on price for his last purchase and tries to do the same for us, these are so few in number that any self-respecting trader can write them off - this type of man falls under the classic definition of a cynic — one who knows the price of everything and the value of nothing. They are numbered among the very few rotten apples in the very large barrel which is the world of shooters.
