

SECRETARY'S NOTES

With the euphoria following the successful 1979 National Championships slowly wearing off, the Administrative Unit is still striving to "get on top" of the backlog of work.

One of the most important exercicises of the year has just been completed, and this is the preparation of the Association's 1979/80 application for funding assistance from Federal Government

Someone (that vague ghost who gets the blame for so many statements) 'leaked' the information that sport can expect to receive an increase of 8% on the 1978/79 budget allocation of \$1.3 million. Regardless of the authenticity of the 'leak', such an increa will leave the Australian Clay Target Association and all other national Sporting bodies in very poor circumstances, in so far as development is concerned.

Like many other sporting associations, the ACTA has produced a Development Plan, the successful implementation of which depends very heavily on a responsible approach to the funding fac-

tor.

In 1977/78 the Federal Government re-introduced a policy of financial assistance with a budget allocation of \$1 million. This was distributed between about 100 National sporting bodies, therefore it will be clearly seen that the money was spread thinly. In 1978-79, the amount was increased to \$1.3 million, and the then

responsible Minister, Mr Ray Groom (it is now Mr R. Ellicott, Minister for Home Affairs) made quite a feature of the 33% increase. What he failed to accept is that it is not difficult to improve on nothing!

Well, here we are coming up to 1979 budget time and the word is an increase of 8% - now, that will take the total to \$1.45 million. Divide that sum amongst the 117 organizations which have sub-

mitted applications for a share of the allocation.

The ACTA's application calls for an allocation of almost \$65,000, in addition to the forward commitment already received, through which the Association has funded the appointment of its National Coaching Director, Newton Thomas.

It is estimated that the total of all organizations' applications will be in excess of \$12 million. Quite obviously, \$1.4 million is of such small significance that it would be an embarrassment to the Sports Advisory Council - which is the Government appointed body that recommends that apportionment to individual associations.

Clay Target shooting is making it presence felt. However, the growth of the sport can be accelerated if further development projects can be initiated. This will happen if the chance of effective financial assistance is increased. Such an increase is most likely

only if voters make their feelings known.

The major proportion of readers of CTSN consists of voters, so an urgent plea is made to each of you to make contact wth your local Federal Member. Make him aware of the needs of sport. Put him in the picture as to what clay target shooting is, and the effort our sport makes to fill a community need, both in a fundraising and a training sense.

Elsewhere in this issue, we have published the text of a speech delivered in the House of Representatives by the Hon Barry Simon following his visit to the 1979 National Championships. It is on this type of base that we must build, and quickly. Let's see just how many of our members are ready to "put their shoulder to the

A Case for the Experts

It is an unfortunate fact of life that human beings repeatedly fall for the trap of wanting to sound knowledgeable on matters where in reality they are quite ignorant of the facts.

Such a situation exists in relation to the selection of Australia's 1979 Olympic trench and ISU skeet teams - a decision reached by the Selection Panel on April 17, at Melbourne Gun Club.

Since details of the teams composition have become known, there has been considerable "expert" comment which, if one believed

ten per cent of it, would suggest that the integrity and mental ability of the selection Panel were at zero level.

It never ceases to amaze me that our sport has so many 'experts' who lack so much in confidence that their opinions have to be expressed in secret.

Team selection is never an easy matter, and it becomes even more difficult when factors other than straight shooting ability becomes involved. That these other factors should be considered can not be doubted - after all, shooting sports are investing up to \$70,000 per year in funding team activities. This sort of investment places on the shoulders of all selection panels a very heavy responsibility to ensure that the TEAM has the best chance of success. An aggregation of good individual performances can be completely refuted by selection of a 'hot shot' whose inclusion destroys harmony in the team.

Mr Harry Somers, Chairman of the selection panel, is preparing a report on the 1979 team selection deliberations and the report

will be published when it is completed.

Our members must not relax their efforts in recruiting new members. At this time in 1978, the membership total was 8200. Today, it is 8800, which is an increase of 7.3%. As the target figure for this year has been calculated on the basis of a 15% increase, we must keep talking about "this great sport of ours".

The novice training program is getting under way and will ul-timately provide the means by which new shooters will have the opportunity to "iron out their wrinkles" at a very early stage of

their development.

In cases where Club coaches have been appointed, the Club should be implementing a policy of conducting regular novice days, where an invitation is extended to the community at large to come along and enjoy the hospitality available at our clubs.

Before closing, I will take this opportunity of issuing a reminder that bookings for the Association's two major travel promotions for 1979 - USA or Singapore etc - CLOSE early in June. Don't be left

Perhaps it can be said that International Shooting has 'come upon the scene' in Australia. In the Clay Target shooting it could be said that it was a painful birth. But it has had a good midwife in the Melbourne Gun Club.

Every International shooting event since the World Championships in 1973 has been held at this club. Easter 1978 saw the first of the South Pacific Regional Championships and it was repeated this year. Whilst the attendance was a little dissappointing the spirit and the scores were of a very high order in both disciplines.

Of course the final qualifying rounds for team selection in both Trench and Skeet were hanging on the results and this obviously added some tension for the local shooters.

Representatives from Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, New Caledonia and Tahiti were present and the whole carnival took on quite an international flavour.

It showed also that Melbourne Gun Club is prepared to sponsor the ISU disciplines and it is most obvious that they have realised that to make the top in these very demanding codes, our top shots need the extra edge that only top international competition can give. They also realise that these large programmes are the only way the top shots can develop the mental and physical conditioning to handle world competition. We are sure that in the back of the minds of the administrators is the thought that there is a great depth of competitive and organisational ability behind the top ISU Nations. The only way to overhaul the start they have on us is to stage these international events. Full marks to them for accepting the challenge.



• oh hell!... I wish they could find my gun thinks Terry Rumbel. They did, the night the South Pacific finished. Terry by way of celebration came out the following day with it and shot a brilliant 98/100 in the City of Melbourne Trench Championship.

Perhaps also in the back of their minds is that you do not have to have a broad base in numbers of shooters to produce world champions. If you go back over the years when the Soviet Union, Italy, Spain, The Two Germany's, Poland and France virtually donimated the events each year, it is obvious that we had a lot of ground to catch up. But it was proved that even countries with narrow based ISU disciplines could topple the greats. Canada and the USA are examples. Both Countries have very limited ISU facilities and they have gradually pulled themselves into the circle of international shooting. The same can be said for Australia. From our team's Bronze medal in '73 through to the Rumbel bronze in Edmonton and the Ellis bronze in Korea last year, it has been steady progress. Progress nurtured by the Melbourne Gun Club and other Clubs with enough foresight to put in ISU shooting facilities and the National Association's attention to a strong coaching commitment and administrative support from the ISU sub-committee. The lessons have been learnt well and it is obvious that we are going places in the world of ISU shooting. Watch it happen.

In 1978 during Easter the Melbourne Gun Club acted as host for a dual International Match, in Olympic Trench and ISU Skeet, known as the South Pacific Regional Championship, and the First Pacific Open International Shooting Championships.

The project was so successful that the Club decided to repeat the Open International again in 1979 - this was necessary because of the provision of a Perpetual Cup by the major sponsor Carlton and United Breweries Ltd. Then, when advice was received that the New Zealand Shooting Federation had decided to drop the 1979 South Pacific Regional Match, the Committee of the Melbourne Gun Club quickly stepped in and offered to also add this event to the tournament.

Thus the 1979 program closely paralleled that of 1978, except that the daily schedule was altered to accommodate any entrants who wanted to compete in both disciplines.

An Organizing Committee was establised, headed up by dynamic Club President, Robert Buchan, and with the indefatigable Russell Fox as Secretary. "Rusty" as he is affectionately known, was one of the driving forces behind the 1973 World Moving Target Cham-Cont'd on page 6

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
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

pionships, which were conducted at this Club (and still spoken about on the international circuit as one of the most successful ever staged) and therefore had had extensive experience in promoting internatonal events.

Invitations were sent out to all shooting organizations in the countries within an area loosely known as the Pacific Basin.

Replies were received from many nations, including an encouraging number of acceptances. Then, as the competition dates came closer, the problem experienced by ALL promotors of international events in Australia reared its ugly head - that is the geographic isolation of the continent, and its effect on team expenses

Finally, competitors arrived from New Guinea, Tahiti, New Caledonia and New Zealand, to join the Australians. Once again the Victorian Government acknowledged the importance of these international matches by staging a State Reception for the over-

seas visitors.

Brian Dixon, State Minister responsible for sport, acted as host and extended a warm welcome to the International and Austrálian delegations. All nations then gathered at Melbourne Gun Club on Good Friday, April 13, for the official opening, which was performed by Lilydale Shire President, Councillor Gill de Pury.

In his address, Councillor de Pury made particular reference to the important part being played in the development of international shooting in Australia by Meloourne Gun Club and the significance of this activity to the Shire of Lilydale.

The opening was accompanied by a well prepared smorgasbord luncheon, after which the overseas visitors were taken for a visit

to one of Australia's best known wildlife sanctuary at Healesville, about 60 kilometres east of Melbourne.

And so, the cream of Australia's ISU shooting talent gathered at Easter 79 to do battle. From the outset it looked on paper to be a battle of the big guns. Ellis and Rumbel were there and whilst assured of their place in the Australian Team, were there to break as many as possible. Terry Rumbel started behind the 8 ball however when the airline lost his gun. More about this later.

Burgess, Byrne, Iles, Lowry, Wray, Finis, Long, in fact anybody who had any pretentions of being a top class Trench shooter was there. On the Skeet side there was Crikis, defending South Pacific Champion and John Woolley, Gold Medallist in ISU Skeet from Edmonton waiting to topple him from the pole. Summers, Hale, Boyd and many others were there also to keep the pressure on.

For a change Melbourne turned on perfect conditions and the Trench got under way in bright sunshine and very still conditions. The event was over 200 targets, 100 per day and targets were fluorescent red. It was obvious that scores would be good. Rumbel was having some trouble with borrowed guns and gradually fell out of the race. Ellis and Iles however got locked into a real battle early in the piece and it was to continue right throughout the match. At 150 targets when teams scores were posted. Jim Ellis was sitting on 47-50-40/144. Hot on his tail was PUD Burgess who had shot a 49-48-46/143 but it was Ken Lowry who led the field with a fine 48-49-49/146. Co leader in with the same score was Bill Iles, High Gun winner from the Griffith Nationals.

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


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

But at this stage all eyes were on the teams scores. It was Australia out on top for the second year in a row. With a score of 555-600 we were represented by Rumbe, Ellis, Burgess and Collinson. Ray Collinson, one of the top qualifiers for the tournament is a youngster with a lot of potential, keep an eye on him. With a score of 529-600 the runners up were New Zealand. They were represented by Cummings, Cave, Pratt, and Bennett. We have seen Merv Pratt here many times before and in particular when he won the Grand Australian Handicap at the Launceston Nationals. Maolalo, Clough, Norris and Giddings represented Papua New Guinea, they ran third with a score of 485-600.

A interesting sidelight of the teams match was that the Melbourne Gun Club No. 1 Team in the club teams match shot a score of 556-600, one target better than the official Australian Team. This club team consisted of Lowry, Mollica, Henwood and Wray.

The last 50 Targets were interesting in that a lot of the front runners fell by the wayside and with his last 25 shot, Jim Ellis was on the board with 192-200. In the last bracket of squads to shoot were Lowry and Iles, both needing 25's to tie. Ken Lowry did not make it but Big Billy did, running as good a 25 straight as you would see anywhere. Whilst there was no shoot off required as Jim Ellis won the Regional Championsip and Bill Iles the Open Championship they had a shoot off anyway. Both shot 24's in the first round and then Ellis ran a 25 to Iles 24 in the second. So if one could say there was an overall winner (and one can not really) it was Ellis.

On the Skeet side it was Crikis who was dominating the scene. Fierce pressure was coming from Hale, Woolley and Boyd in the preliminary events. Alex Crikis ran a brilliant 97 in a preliminary 100 target event as did Ian Hale. But it was Alex that outlasted Ian in the shoot off to take the honours.

In the South Pacific Regional Skeet Teams' event, Australia emerged comfortable winners, with New Zealand in second place.

The individual section of the Skeet match was keenly contested with New Zealand Woolley trying desperately to reverse the 1978 result where he was toppled by Crikis.

However, the two of them were almost overtaken by young Albury star Graeme Boyd, who, since entering the ISU Skeet "fold" in the second half of 1978, has certainly made his presence felt.

Alex Crikis was the eventual winner on 192-200, and 1978 National Champion John Summers was second.

Three shooters, namely Boyd, Woolley and Hale tied for third, and it was in the subsequent shoot-off that Boyd showed his maturity. He fired a perfect 25 to secure the bronze medal and left Woolley and Hale reeling in his dust.

Following the conclusion of the shooting match, competitors, officials and their friends assembled at the plush Veneto Club for a Presentation Dinner. As usual, the Club was immaculately prepared, and the night had all the ear marks of being a resounding success.

The presentations of medals were made to the individual and team place getters. As is customary, all the right things were said, with the host Club receiving its rightful share of commendation.

Because of the hig standards set during the tournament, one would have expected the finale to by "spot on". But it was not to be

Just as the guests were starting to really relax, details of the Australian teams to compete in Trench and ISU Skeet events overseas were announced. Naturally, tremendous interest centred on the name of the successful qualifiers. Equally as obviously after four days of top pressure competition, a number of tensions had Cont'd on page 10

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
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



developed. However, none of these explanations excuses the demonstration which greeted the announcement of team members' names, and it was disappointing to see such a successful international tournament down graded by the type of exhibition put on by a small section of the guests.

Details of the team are shown in a separate report elsewhere in this issue of CTSN.

And so the 1979 South Pacific Regional Shotgun Championships drew to a close. Successful? Yes, most definitely. However, there are lessons to be learned (as is usually the case!)

Firstly, Australian administrators must learn to plan further ahead. The costs of moving overseas teams to Australia is high and potential entrant nations must be given the chance to budget for the expenditure their entries cause.

Secondly, it is debatable whether shooters really benefit from a program which provides the opportunity to compete in both trench and skeet. At this level of international competition, there is strong support for simultaneous programming.

In conclusion, special reference must be made to the professionalism of the Melbourne Gun Club presentation. It continues to add to its reputation of being Australia's senior Club by always being seen in top shape, and with a strong administrative back-up. Can the 1980 match be bigger AND better?


 Deserie Wakefield - a very happy girl after almost winning a trench match outright.

1979 INTERNATIONAL TEAM NAMED

Following Australia's successes internationally in 1978 in Olympic trap and ISU skeet tournaments, the Association's ISU Sub Committee initiated a series of qualifying events aimed at selection of a 1979 team.

A feature of the 1979 planning was that, for the first time in Australia shotgunning, a squad was named to form the nucleus of the team. The reason for this decision was to protect the investment the Association already had in these people. When one considers that around \$20,000 to \$25,000 per annum is being spent on teams competing in events we know as "international disciplines", it will be clearly understood that some guarantee had to be provided that the world class competitors which had been developed as a result of the policy, needed to be used as the base for current teams.

The purpose of the 1979 team was to compete in the World Moving Target Championships (shotgun division) which were scheduled to be held in Vienna, Austria during the last half of

It is now a matter of history that the scheduled match has been cancelled. In a report arising from the meeting of the International Shooting Union, held in Wiesbaden on February 26 & 27, the cancellation was announced as follows: "We herewith must imform you that because of organizational difficulties the World Championships Trap and Skeet, scheduled for 14th - 24th August 1979, Austria, will not take place. The members of the Administrative Council have already been informed about this on the occasion of their last meeting, held in Wiesbaden on 26th & 27th February".

This information reached the ACTA Executive Committee on Saturday, March 10, (right in the middle of the National Championships!) Consequently, the ISU Sub Committee had to establish if any other suitable type of match was available.

A number of possible venues were selected, the most interesting of which were Rumania and Great Britain. Enquiries were placed in both countries - at the time of going to press, no replies have been received.

Now, moving back to the matter of team selection, the qualifying conditions required all aspiring team members to compete at the international match conducted by Melbourne Gun Club over the Easter Holiday week-end.

The Club provided a total of 400 targets in each discipline - that is, trap and skeet - although it was only the international match scores that were taken as the final qualifying round.

At the conclusion of the matches, the Selection Committee, chaired by Mr Harry Somers, commenced its deliberations. The committee included in addition to the Chairman, Laurie Connors (Vic), Bill Abbott (Vic), Trevor Reschke (SA) and Bob Buchan (Vic). Available to it in an advisory capacity was the team manager, Newton Thomas.

Selection panel deliberations will be covered in more detail at a later time - this information is to be provided by the panel

Chairman, Harry Somers. However it can be confidently said that the ultimate decision reached by the panel was designed to be in the best interests of shotgun shooting sports in Australia!

The panel's decision was announced at a Presentation Dinner held to provide a social atmosphere to conclude the International matches.

The 1979 team are: Manager: Newton Thomas; Trap (Olympic Trench): Jim Ellis (ACT), Terry Rumbel (NSW), Trevor Byrne (Vic), Jim Finis (Vic), 'Pud' Burgess (NSW); Skeet (ISU): Alex Crikis (Vic), John Summers (Vic), Graeme Boyd (NSW).





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Man and His First Weapons

It is difficult to say who invented gun powder; the famous dark powder which, as it is well known, is obtained by the mixing of saltpeter, sulphur and charcoal. Many a scholar has devoted time to research this subject and found little accurate information. As is usual in such circumstances, many people have been credited with this discovery since it is a matter of great universal importance. The invention has been attributed to Salmoneo, king of Thessaly, to Caligola, to the Sicilian Salios about 700 A.D., to a German Monk, to the Chinese, the Indians, the Saracens, The Spanish Moors, the Egyption Moslems, the Persions, the Arabs; also to a certain Graecus, who lived sometime about 1000 A.D. to Brother Ruggero Bacone, to the Archbishop of Ratisbona, Albert the Great etc. It now appears certain that almost all the above mentioned people had largely made use of incendiary compounds and fireworks of various kinds, which were not described in detail by travellers and chroniclers, with the result that they became confused with gunpowder. Some present day scholars, mostly Americans, attribute Francis Bacon with discovering gunpowder. As Bacon anticipated use of gunpowder he guarded the secret by the use of destructive substitutes in the receipt, but it did not apparently take those inquisitive experimenters long to sort out the non explosive sub-

Becon, however, did not divulge the quantities of the ingredients necessary for obtaining gunpowder. This leads us to think that he was not familiar with the propulsive features of black powder but only knew its incendiary properties. Actually one has to know that if the three ingredients are not mixed in correct proportions, and the ignition is not correctly applied, gunpowder will react un-

satisfactorily.

Musciarelli, in his history, "Storia Universale delle Armi da Fuoco" (Universal history of firearms), having devoted many pages to this subject comes to the following conclusion: "Although the discovery of gunpowder is still wrapped in mystery, various documents serve as justification for the assumption that Italy was the first country in which such chance discovery was perfected and applied for firearms. This assumption is based on records so far. available to us.

Summing up, it is not important to establish who invented gunpowder but the person or persons who discovered its propulsive features and how to compound its components in the right propor-

A NEW EPOCH ORIGINATES WITH THE APPEARANCE OF FIREARMS

Obviously the first user of gunpowder must have discovered its propelling features, and coincidentally the oldest records which refer to firearms are of Italian origin. Among the most important ones, there is the Florence Decree dated February 11th, 1326, reading as follows: ad fatiendum at fieri fatiendum pro ipso comuni pilas seu palloctas ferreas et canones de metallo. This is authoritative since it is dated, and it does mention iron balls and metal cannons. Present day scholars agree that iron projectiles were used long after the invention of firearms and at any rate after the use of stone projectiles. The same applies to cannons which, at the beginning, were made of wood. In trying to locate the Italian area where the first firearms were manufactured, Musciarelli in his above mentioned work attributes the fatherhood of such arms to the territory of Gardone Valtrompia since he writes as follows: "In the upper part of the Mella valley, located north of Brescia and named after its early inhabitants who were offspring of the Triumplex tribe and the strongest of the retiche peoples, there are galleries, ruins and archaelogical remains testifying the working in pre-roman time of the local iron deposits used chiefly for manufacturing arms" . . .

The Valrompis forges were so renowned that already as early as the year 1000 A.D. were given orders for any types of weapons from almost all regions of Italy and also from many foreign

seignories.

About the end of the year 1100, for instance, a large order for weapons was placed for the 3rd Crusade. In 1311 bombards were used against the troops of Arrigo V11 who were bewildered by this

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A Blood and Guts History of Unity, Pride and Elan - When will we Ever Learn?

"The sand of the desert's sodden red.
Red, with the wreck of the square that broke.
The Galtling's jammed, the Colonel dead,
And the Regiment blind, with the dust and the smoke."

"Vitae Lampeda."

Part 1. THE RATTLE OF THE ASSEGI.

If it were possible to put a supported troop of leopard tanks into a time machine and transport them back about one hundred years to Isandhlwana where the world's worse defeat of a modern army, by men without guns was being suffered by the British, the early decision would have been reversed. Such a tactical solution is indeed a tribute to the might of the Zulu. History would be changed a little, but nothing would dim the superb record of leadership and fighting spirit of the Zulus, under Chaka, their paramount chief.

History has shown that Chaka was one mean machine who united a mass of sqabbling clans into an army which, pound for pound, was the most devastating military organisation the world has ever

known.

Let us not be fooled by the movie and eleven, well deserved, Victoria Crosses. The Zulu army which harassed the defenders of Rorke's Drift was not really trying; Orders had not included the aquisition of that mission station on the 'wrong side' of the river. Zulu generals who both exceeded their orders and expanded their regiments were subject to an 'interview' with the King who, after pondering their future for a time would probably order their eyes to be gouged out and death by driving wooden stakes up their nostrils.

Rather than mentally retreat in horror it behaves us to examine the Philosophy and techniques of Chake the King. We might learn

something and, God knows, we could not do worse!

Before the coming of Chaka, Zululand was technically nonexistant; a chaos of warring tribes, rampant disunity, a feeble concept of loyalty and primitively traditional notions of organisations.

From his youth Chaka had learnt the the Zulu fought better for the honour of the iziLwe (the regiment) than they did for the King. An elan could, and would, be milked from such tightly knit and polarized groups that would never spring from the mere membership of a clan.

Chaka's first step was to raise a regiment from each tribe, keep most of them celibate (favouring his own taste), teach them how to fight, generally by example - and above all instill that deadly in-

gredient, the concept of regimental pride.

He arrived at this idea separately from the British Army who had known 'all about it' for years but only at this point of time had a rank of file emerged as fighting men, rather than the jailbirds of the immediatly preceeding era; like the Zulu, they fought harder for minor regimental variations of uniform than an all too distant, Queen. Although gallant, the British officer still purchased his commision and arranged his own movements. Tea and cricket seemed more important than blood and guts and most of them were not true professionals or survivors. For instance they did not use or carry the ten pounds of hand burning, shoulder smashing Martini Henry. Technically, the weapon was excellent on trials and 'police actions' but in this campaign hundreds of rounds would be shot by each man until barrels glowed dully in the twilight and ballistics, shoulders and hands suffered the effects of a fouled bore. A .45, 480 grain slug in front of 83 grains of black powder was not a pleasant load at even the first volley! They should have known this limitation of the 'thin red line' and that Zulu courage, although not stopping the slug, would nevetheless maintain the impetus of a 'shock wave'. The lessons of Crecy and Agincourt, hundreds of years earlier, were forgotten or never

In contrast, Chaka's officers were taught and did know, all the lessons of their nations short history. In the heat of battle they were possessed and inspired; not 'super-cool' like a cricket captain. In Chaka's army the regimental concept was pretty extreme.

Although regiments were identified by the patterns on their shields; and Chaka encouraged these trimmings, his particular delight was the fiercely individualistic spirit of his regiments who would certainly fight if camped within 'spitting distance' of each other. On the other hand, most British regiments had shared some long forgotten battle honour and were accordingly polite to each other.

Chaka developed a short stabbing spear with a long wide blade. He showed his soldiers how to knock away the enemies defence by a swipe of the shield and sink his patent spear into the left side of the chest, twist, and pull. This manoevre produced a sucking or clicking sound which could be reproduced verbally as 'usuthu' or 'iklwa' respectively. Both were used as war cries of the various regiments. Usuthu, was the most favoured and 'Chaka's own' This, repeatedly hooting from 20,000 throats was quite frightful for the enemy. The enemy were weakened and the Zulu mesmerised by the song before a blow was struck. One day a modern soldier will 'invent' this idea and be hailed as a military genius! The British soldier of that era was generally recruited by 'Jack Frost and Unemployment' but Chaka suffered non of these by-products of democracy or climate. Perhaps it was co-incidence, but Chaka arrived at the same end when he cheerfully raised regiments of 'hard men' from tribes of ratbags. Sensibly, he reasoned that it was a far harder road to buck the system than to meekly 'toe the line'. Ambassadorial quality counted zero in his team selection!

Neither did he worry much about physical fitness. A Zulu had to be fit to survive; every regiment could run fifty miles a day and

fight a battle afterwards!

Above all, Chaka sought the 'killer instinct' allied to experience and a warrior was not eligable for marriage until he had washed his spear in the blood of battle and the regiment had otherwise distinguished itself. It followed that his 'crack' regiments were the old men of 40, the dreaded amaWombe, wearers of the isiCoco. (Head Wedding ring).

Chaka did not balance youth and experience within a regiment, the 'bleeding heart' concept was not in his makeup, he just sent the right team to do the job - which was total extermination of the enemy. (Napoleon was probably the only civilised King to anticipate Chaka with the 'old guard' and met with similar success

with the idea!)

This then, was the Zulu force which anhilated a divided British regular army at Isandhlwana where red tape strangled the ammunition supply and where the officers captained a cricket match, rather than a war. This also was the army that charged to the death a quadruple line of rifles supported by cannon and gatlings (generally jammed) at Ulundi a few months later. Undaunted, they gave their all.

To this day, Zulu bones are to be found, mixed with corroded bullets and boxer cases on the Mahlabatini plain around the site of Chelmsford's Square. A man would have to be dead from the neck up not to respect them and not to learn from them. It is easy to visualize a suitable nostril for the 'stake of death' but do we truly percieve the desperate need for unity and 'esprit de corps?'

Part 2. THE SNAP OF THE FLINTLOCK.


It is well documented that the Zulu Nation was reasonable well supplied with firearms but apart from the odd fact, the story is very hazy indeed. (No pun upon 'Chaka's own' regiment, the Fasimbu, 'the haze', intended.)

The Zulu's collectively owned many thousands of Trade Flintlocks (Birmingham Gas Pipes), usually earned by a season's work in the white man's mines, a few Sniders and 'Monkey Tail' Westley Richards and very few magnificent double guns. Chaka acquired a few cannon but there is no record of their use and, true to tradition, they were recaptured after Ulundi. (The Zulu was not partial to the Martini - Henry; they were too 'hard' on the average man, and thus anticipated a recent infantry small arms directive!)

Perhaps it was the practical experience of the 'gas pipe' which was a poor imitation of the 'Brown Bess' and frequently lethal to the shooter, that swayed Chaka infavour of regiments of spearmen in the classic head, horns, chest and loins formation. The preferred view is that he accepted the research of his inDunas (generals) who were conviced that the shock of a determined charge could overcome a square - provided some initial casualties were accepted. (They were dead right at Isandhlwana.) The only time Chaka's faith in the Assegi was shaken was the well known incident when a sailor (probably drunk) dropped an elephant with one ear shot from a .69 muzzel loading smooth bore flint lock!

In the author's view, the rather stupid, if sporting, attitude of the British officer who declined to 'dig in' but rather meet the Zulu on his own terms was a tradgically expensive means of confirming Chaka's faith in the Assegi impi. And 'The little branch of leaves' ... 'extinguished the fire' of a thousand red coats.

Like the American Indian, the Zulu had a problem over ammunition and little practice was possible. Leaving no stone unturned as usual, Chaka decided that developing shooting as a sport would increase efficiency with the white mans weapon but there is little documented history of his shooting team. An attempt will be made to correct this oversight after the recent recovery of painted mats at the site of the camp on the white umfolozi.



The Team (in the forefront is Dalbuamanzi the high gun. He was the half brother of a King - it obviously helps to have an inexhaustable supply of shells and a Westley Richards.)

Knowing no better, the King gave the job of team manager to the commander of one of his 'crack' regiments. This was not a coincidence, or a favour, since a regiment cannot become 'the best', in any army, without excellent officers. The general chosen was Ugebula who was famous for the regard his men had for him and this was not won by regular mail, pay, food, or even the extra visits to the 'maidens' kraal; but rather by the kind of love Ugebula had for his men which made their battle song a tune of glory. Naturally Ugebula received this appointment with mixed feelings since he knew his team would get the medals and he, the spear, should he fail. Chaka would not accept the excuse that his soldiers were of inferior quality; (And Ugebula would have it no other way.)

Of course the Zulu's ran the usual eliminations withing the various regiments but the final selection did not result from half baked formulae derived by a big 'committee' of tribal elders but rather Ugebula was expected to 'know' and only the King discussed the matter; and a pretty one sided discussion at that! (Chieftains could only reply with the customary 'Vuma' - we agree.)

The question of selection of the team was based only upon the ability to shoot; Ugebula knew no better. 'Prima Donnas' were relegated to the Udibi boys, carriers of cooking pots and sleeping mats and the problem of a mixture of regiments, who would certainly fight amongst themselves was left to poor Ugebula. The general could, of course, solve any strife by sending home an offender with an assegi in his guts but Chaka would probably take a dim view of this and 'eye off' the generals nostrils. In this, Ugebula's leadership was to be tested more in sport, than any scrambling battle.

Once selected, the team had vey primitive training for the big match. Ugebula was only a soldier - and an 'assegi man' from way back - so he presumed his shooters knew the sort of guns they needed and the loads they literally stuffed into them, far better than he did. Ugebula also knew his men were fit and experienced, they would not have come so far if they were not, so he just let them regulate their own amount of training. Ammunition cost about 3 cows a case and like their choice of guns, his team members were expected to know how much shooting, sleep, booze and sex they individually required.

The only point on which Ugebula stuck in his oar, or his assegi to those who whinged, was the place and time of official training. It was Ugebula's way to choose the rottenest part of Zululand were conditions were atrocious. (Rather like Chaka's 'burning of the shoes') In this way no-one could ever make excuses in the big event quite apart from the teams psychological 'one up' state when things got rough at an away match. Why, they actually chanted

happy songs during a dust storm or when mosquitoes the size of vultures darkened the sky and descended upon unprotected flesh

Chaka, as always, was ambitious and the first, and only, event to which he sent his national team were the Cape championships. He was up against the British army team who had all the finance from Her Victorian Majesties Govenment, the best of equipment and were in fact a bunch of well paid professionals. The King was undetered, he knew that in terms of pure competitive spirit - which was another way of putting blood lust - his mob made the opposition look like a bunch of Sunday - school teachers. Part 3. NGADLA

On arrival of the shooting team at the village Ugebula had an instant problem for he knew his team would wither and die in a barracks, quite apart from the moral certainty that they would butcher any other competitor who looked 'sideways' at them. So Ugebula found a spot by a river, rather like the Royal Kraal, where his men could sleep under their shields in a manner to which they were accustomed. He tried to let them live a normal life, if M'Bopa was accustomed to his mug of ox blood each day, then he must have it. Ugebula did not worry about discipline - again his blokes would not have made it without tremendous self discipline - but rather left matters to the regard the team had for him and their own sense of justice. There was the story about youngUhamu who crept outone night and ruined nineteen of the local maidens before the match and the team 'cured' his haemhorroids with a hot assegi, after all, had not Ugebula promised them a hundred virgins after the shoot?

Naturally the 'Authorities' complained about security and in fact a terrorist did find his way into the peaceful little camp, but the team ate the best parts of him for breakfast. Two other incidents strengtened Ugebula's hand. In a preliminary match a successful Zulu was deprived of his trophy - because his skin was not the right colour - or some such flimsy excuse. Ugebula cut the hearts out of the offending organisers on the spot and when told 'he was in their country' explained that he was doing their country a favour by fertilising the earth with a little blood and bone. There was also some racist strife about letting the Zulu's compete but a message in a cleft stick to Chaka had an army on the border and the King politely suggesting that politics should not come into sport as the morning sun blushed upon 20,000 spears. The complaining government at once saw the fallacy in their arguement and the team's morale soared with the knowledge that their manager and their nation were solidly behind them.

Chaka and his generals had good reason to trust the technical excellence of their men but it was appreciated that the men were human in knowing fear and some psychological treatment was the order of every evening. Ugebula would regale them with tales about the other teams; how the opposition were rustlers of cattle, despoilers of women, scornful of the Zula and whispering about the manhood of Chaka. The deep humming murmur of the team would change to the battle chant of Usuthu!, Usuthu!, and was punctuated by the stamping of feet and the crash of spear against shield. Mounting to a crescendo like an express train populated by hornets this terrible sound would murder sleep for the opposition, penned in barracks miles away. On the other hand, the Zulu's slept blissfully beneath their shields with minds, so totally split, that they could not argue with themselves.

The outcome of the match was a foregone conclusion. The Zulu's all shot their best; which was not very good but the 'professional'

opposition fell in a heap.

There were a couple of slight incidents at the presentations however. A Zulu, enraged that a placegetter should degrade the ceremony by clutching a little girl's doll, persuaded with razored spear, the offender to eat the toy (forever placing the name 'chuck' into the American language.)

Later, as if to demonstrate the real meaning of national pride, they put some 'also - rans' to the spear and as the victim's limp body slid from the assegi, uttered the cry of Chaka - 'Ngadla' - I

have eaten. Their spears had been 'washed'

The critics claim that the only 'lady shooter' swayed the verdict. Mjanji, chieftainess of the baBelu and the Susan Natrass of the 1870's was a truely awesome woman. 'Queen of the Locusts', she was not only reputed to direct a swarm at will but was also immortal. She had four pendulous breasts which she slung over her shoulders and suckled an infant carried on her back. It was death to look upon her and indeed many 'officials' were pretty sick. In fact she did not put up a very good score, she tended to be badly

It is a matter of history that were was never a return match for in the next year the Zulu army was decimated by the hot lead of the British Infantry and the cold steel of the 17th. Lancers.

The real defeat and destruction of the 'team' came at the hands of Sir Garnet Wolesley who weilded the colonists political weapon of Partition. Cheap and expedient, this manoevre divided Zululand into 'zones' which completed the fall of the nation by returning it to the disunited and squabbling state before the coming of Chaka. Part 4. THE DEATH OF AN IDEA:

A blood and guts his of unity pride & cont.

The glaring inaccuracy in this story is the fact that Chaka was assasinated by his half brother in the afternoon of 22nd. of September, 1828, and his body had been laid to rest in a grain pit for some fifty one years before the battles of the Zulu war.

The King was long dead, but the land was pervaded by his spirit to such an extent that event the various degrees of incompetence of his successors had failed to tarnish the Ideal. It was not by error or chance that this story was written as if Chaka live, for in-

deed he did.

Without apology, this point laboured in that the 17th. Lancers who charged at Ulundi and destroyed the remnants of the Zulu army had earlier themselves been wrecked at the Charge of the Light Bigade on the Balaclava Heights. I like to believe that the dead rode with the living, and as the red and white pennants on the lancers became dyed claret, the ghosts became a reality, to inspire the Regiment in many battles yet to come.

This fierce elan must be separated from stagnant tradition. the Zulus assembled more regiments at Ulundi tha their history had ever seen, and yet again the British formed a square, each side at battalion strength. Fire power won the day, and yet again, the

formula of escalation appeared to be proven.

Even today at a staff conference the suggestion that "There must be a better way" encounters "agreement in principle" from closed minds.

The Zulus fought in their great tradition and did not look beyond the fight. The Zulus permitted the colonists at Port Natal to trive until such strength was gained that, with soft words, the war was started. "The British Government has no quarrel with the Zulu started. "The British Government has no quarrel with the Zulu people." Thus was the ultimatum introduced; the ultimate threat that should be into our memories.

The fruits of victory appear to be the establishment of outmoded ideas. The price of defeat the fragmentation of unity. Nothing can affect the ideals of a regiment which can be reborn like the Phoenix in the flame of leadership. Thus in victory or defeat the Regiment can be restored. Unity must then return unless revolu tionaries, mercenaries or fools divide the enormous power that is inherent in the concept of an ancestoral fraternity.

What has this to do with trapshooting today? Noting! Nothing unless the leaders of our sport are prepared to admit the possibility

that events and mistakes of the past might be repeated.

It is a fact that a young Zulu boy could have started life herding a couple of scrawny cows, have risen to command a division of great army and finished his days watching a similar couple of cows whilst the bones and assegles of his regiments mouldered in the scrub.

It is my private nightmare that, through cause, I end my days standing in the mud shooting five bird events over an ancient snipe trap, whilst a hundred traps at some future National ground point

dead and accusing fingers at the sky.

This story has been told by a dreadful mixure of metaphores in order to avoid offence to the majority of enthusiastic amateurs who regulate our sport. Those who see even a vague resemblence to the state of our sport in the decline and fall of the Zulu Nation are invited to read "The Washing of the Spears" by Donald R. Morris, there is so much more.

At every major tournament, some unusual occurrences are noticed. One of the most unusual EVER happened during the 1979 Nationals Tournament.



Pat reports that the effect of the wind gust was dramatic and immediate - the control tower at Wagga Airfield was alerted and all air traffic in the area was warned of the danger.



From Nationals '79 to House of Representatives

Barry Simon is the Liberal member for McMillan in the House of Representatives. Married, with three children, Mr. Simon has had a lifelong interest in community affairs, specialising in sport.

His own sporting talents (apart from his instant success at clay target shooting) were demonstrated in tennis, swimming and football - the Victorian type!

Mr. Simon graduated from Melbourne University in 1963 with a Law Degree. After some years as a partner in a Melbourne law firm, he commenced his own legal practice in Berwic (Victoria) in 1972.

In the 31st Federal Parliament, Mr. Simon has been connected with the following Government activities:

Member of Federal Affairs Committee.

 Victorian Representative for the Municipal Association of Victoria on the Canberra Committee for local government. Secretary of that Committee.

•Chairman of the Prime Minister's Tactics Committee.

Secretary Parlimentary Reform Committee.

Member of Ministerial Committee on Youth Affairs.
 Member of Ministerial Committee on the Arts.

The official opening of the 1979 National Championships was performed by the Hon. Barry Simon M.H.R., Member for McMillan

Victoria in the House of Representatives.

The Association was most fortunate to obtain the services of Mr Simon, who was asked to stand in for the Minister for Home Affairs, Mr Ellicott, at very short notice. Mr Ellicott is the Federal Minister responsible for sport, following a Ministerial reshuffle which occurred last December, and had accepted an invitation to be the guest of the Association for the opening.

Only days before the event, advice was received that the Minister had been asked by the Prime Minister to undertake a special task involving a high-standing Chinese delegation. The Minister offered his apologies to the Association and quickly found somebody else to "fill the breech".

And that's where our good fortune came in. The "someone else" was Barry Simon, who, since joining Federal Parliament in 1975, has been connected with a number of Committees including one that investigated sports development in Australia. He has maintained a close interest in Australian sport and had been well briefed in the status of the Australian Clay Target Association prior to arriving at Griffith on March 10th to open the Nationals.

In his official address, Mr Simon made repeated reference to the Association's recent growth and its ability to demonstrate a policy of self-help. He spoke of the effect of financial assistance coming from Government sources, especially the funds that made possible the full time appointment of the National Director of Coaching, Newton Thomas.

Mr Simon also paid tribute to the enviable safety record built up by the Association. He explained that, having had a chance to see the way in which competitors conducted themselves at all times, under the watchful eye of referees when on the shootig tracks, he could more readily understand the reasons for wanting to introduce a "Safe Handling of Firearms" course into secondary school systems throughout Australia.

After declaring the Championships officially open, Mr Simon was then offered the National President's "Brno" shotgun, which had been successfully used in the past two years by the person performing the opening, when he tried his talent at shooting targets. The combination of Simon and "Breda" worked beautifully and the first target broke right on cue. Mr Simon enjoyed his instant success and continued to break a few more targets.

President Ern and his Core Group then played host to Mr Simon at lunch, which provided a wonderful opportunity to give the guest an insight into some of the ACTA's development plans. Equally as

importantly, the meal enabled the members of the Core Group to seek advice from Mr Simon on some of the long term projects, such as facilities development.

Towards the end of the meal, Mr Simon had become so enthusiastic that he promised to deliver a speech "in the House" on the subject of clay target shooting.

Little did the people present realize that such a speech was to be presented only a little over two weeks later.

Speaking during the adjournment debate on March 28, Mr Simon said the following:

(The report is an extract from Hansard, Page 1273)

"I should like to spend the last few minutes of this debate by talking on a subject on which I have spoken on other occasions. It relates to sport and recreation policy in Australia. I know that the honourable member for Higgins (Mr Shipton), the honourable member for Dundas (Mr Ruddock) and the honourable member for Phillip (Mr Birney) are very interested in the Government's commitment to this area. We can be rightly criticised in some respects because only \$1.3m is made available through the sports development program. I will not go into the millions of dollars which have been made available for the Commonwealth Games, the "Life Be In It" campaign and so on.

I shall deal with the sports development program and talk about the Australian Clay Target Association which has made good use of a very modest contribution from the Commonwealth Government.

The Australian Clay Target Association, for those who do not know, is made up of 280 affiliated shotgun clubs throughout Australia. It has approximately 11,000 registered members. It has a long term plan to increase that membership over the five-year period to 1983 to 21,000 members. It has an incredible safety record. Since 1928 it has not had one fatal accident in any of its affiliated clubs or at any of its shoots. The clubs shoot about 40 million cartridges each year. That safety record is one which should be acknowledged. The Association also has ambitions to introduce this sport to senior students in secondary schools. Having regard to the shooting accidents which now take place throughout Australia, this would be a first class idea. The people who will introduce it are excellent people who are safety conscious. They are engaged in a very healthy outdoor sport.

In the current financial year the Australian Clay Target Association received \$16,500 - a very modest sum. What the Association has done with it will have enormous benefit for its present and future members. For example, it has spent \$10,000 on appointing and paying a national coaching director who commenced work in January 1979. I had the pleasure of meeting him at the national championships at Griffith recently. Six hundred shooters attended those championships for a week's shooting. I have no doubt that the national coaching director will do an excellent job in encouraging young people to take up the sport, and in encouraging safety in the way in which they handle shotguns and approach the sport. The Association is using \$12,000 for other coaching projects. It is using \$3,000 for international competition overseas. For example, it has to travel to the United States of America for the Trap tournament. An amount of \$11,500 has also been spent on other international meetings.

This is an example of what can be done with very small sums of money. I know that the honourable member for Higgins to whom I have referred would like to see much more money allocated to sport and recreation. But the advisory group currently giving information to the government is doing a first class job in recognising those national sporting associations which should be encouraged, those which have a good record and those such as the Australian Clay Target Association which are prepared to establish long term programs."

The management of the Australian Clay Target Association is extremely grateful for the support and publicity so enthusiastically given by Mr Barry Simon, from the Nationals '79 to the House of Representatives.



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AUSSIES SUCCESSFUL AT **NEW ZEALAND** NATIONALS

Clay Target shooting must be experiencing buoyant conditions in New Zealand also. The New Zealand Clay Target Association recently conducted its 1979 National Championships tournament at the Waikato Shooting Complex under the control of the Hamilton

Gun Club (North Island).

The series attracted record attendances, including over 60 Australians. The first event was the New Zealand Ball Trap Championship, over 50 targets. This commenced on Saturday March 24, and continued March 25. In fact, most of the scheduled events continued into a second day, due to the unexpectedly high overall attendance. (It is of interest to note that the best daily total was around 450, which compares very favourably with the record 600 plus at the recent Australian Nationals).

Returning to the Ball Trap Championships, it was won by Harry Fyers, who scored 150-150. Australians in the shoot-off included Bill Iles, Tony Bradshaw and Doug Smith, all of whom exceeded 100 before starting to drop out. Smith missed his 5th target in the fourth round of the shoot-off to finish second with a 149-150. Third place was filled by Tony Bradshaw, after a further shoot-off with Bob Parker (NZ) and Bill Iles, all of whom missed the same target

in the original shoot-off.

Monday March 26 was skeet day. The incredible attendance figure was 319 and there was no way the ground's facilities could cope. At the close of shooting, only about 200 competitors had completed the two qualifying rounds, from which there were eight possibles recorded.

Tuesday March 27 - and the skeet marathon continued. At the end of the qualifying round, the eleven "possibles" included 1974 winner C. F. "Brickie" Gunn (the NZCTA Coaching Director), Graeme Webber, Brian Webber (no relation), Merv Cook and Merv

Whitelaw (Australian).

The shoot-off continued into the second round, where Cook (winner of the 1977 Australian Double Rise Championship) missed his ninth target and Whitelaw missed his eleventh to leave Brickie Gunn the proud winner of his second New Zealand Skeet Championship.

The Double Rise event was held on Tuesday also, and was won by New Zealand shooter, Alan Hughes from Taranaki, with the only possible of 15 pairs (30/30). This was after he had participated

in the skeet shoot-off, which demonstrates his versatility.

350 shooters contested the event and Australians to show out included Doug Smith (Brisbane) who finished second after dropping one target in the qualifying round. Third place was filled by Frank Fyers, who visited Australia in 1974 and 1977.

The remaining event scheduled for Tuesday was the National Clay Sparrow Championship (Mini Targets) for which the Doreen Memorial Cup is the perpetual trophy. This event saw the Australians burst through for their first outright victory of the series. Tony Bradshaw of Victoria outlasted seventeen competitors with possibles to win his first NZ National title - score 55/55. Merv Cook (Ashbert NZ) was second and Dennis Hansen

(Wellington NZ) was third. Australians to shoot possibles in this event were Doug Smith (Brisbane), John Byrnes (SAGC), Tony Bradshaw (Werribee) and

Ray Melville (Tamworth).

The National Single Barrel Championships was conducted on Wednesday March 28 and attracted an entry of 377 shooters. The New Zealand team consisted of: K. Osman, W. Brunton, G.

Scott, B. Lassen, W. Parker and K. McSweeney.

In conjunction with the National Single Barrel Championship, the Deb Oliver trophy was conducted. This is a perpetual trophy donated by Mr Deb Oliver of Canada in recognition of the part women play in sport.

It was won by Joan Longmore of Junee NSW - the writer believes this is the first occasion that an Australian girl has won

the trophy.

The week continued into Thursday, which was Pointscore day. This proved to be another big day both from the point of view of attendance, and for the Australian contingent.


Three hundred and sixty seven competitors faced the "starter's gun" and eight hours later, only three possibles were on the scoreboard.

National Coaching Scene

(CTSN Staff Writer)

The third meeting of the National Coaching Council was held under the chairmanship of the National Director, Newton Thomas, at Griffith during early March.

All States were represented, with the exception of Tasmania, where the State Director Jack Blake could not be in Griffith due to a medical appointment. Of particular interest was the attendance of Mr. Kevin Bowring acting as an observer representing the Northern Territory Clay Target Association. The National President, Ern Hawkins was also present.

The meeting approved a financial plan for 1979, in which a total expenditure on "domestic" coaching projects of \$6,000 was envisaged. The major part of this expenditure will be incurred in conducting "training the trainers" sessions for Zone Coaches, in conjunction with State Directors.

An item of major interest arose from the submission of State reports - that was the extent to which clay target manufacturers have so strongly supported novice training activities. Blue Dot, Eley and Olimpyc were all recorded as major donors, and the future of the program is greatly enhanced by this sort of support.

The main point on the agenda related to the establishment of a coaches accredittion scheme. It was considered vital that some control be exercised to ensure that Club Coaches all over Australia are using the Basic Coaching Manual and other coaching aids in a consistent way.

The Council believes that the best way to exercise this control, which is in the best interests of the coach as much as the system, is to implement an accreditation scheme based on a brief training session followed by a written examination combined with a personal assessment.

On completion of the qualifying conditions, the accredited coaches shall be issued with a "certificate of accreditation" and a jacket hadee

Accreditation of Club Coaches will be conducted by Zone Coaches in consultation with the State Association councillors for the appropriate Zone AFTER a Club recommendation has been received.

On the other hand, Zone Coaches will be accredited by the State Director in conjunction with State Association Council.

When listing priorities, the National Coaching Council resolved that it is vital that Zone Coaches be effectively and fully trained before the Association proceeds too far along the path of training Club coaches.

Meanwhile, the contents of the Basic Coaching Manual have now been fully tested, and it was agreed that the manual should be produced in printed form. (Supplies should be available towards the end of June.)

The Council approved the preparation of a combined "slides and cassettee" training aid, which will be offerred to state Associations on completion. The purpose of this initial aid is to demonstrate the importance of a correct stance in trap shooting. At a later time, a similar project will be undertaken using skeet as the subject.

During the closing stages of the meeting, the Chairman made a strong recommendation that all State Directors endeavour to encourage every Club in his state to conduct at least one novice training day annually, to which the community at large should be invited.

The next meeting is to be held in Queensland, probably during the last weekend in October, and will also include a major seminar for Zone Coaches. The dates will be comfirmed later.

I was talking to a number of shooters who had not made accommodation arrangements and paid the penalty, others were fortunate enough to get somewhere to bed down without having made prior arrangements.



USA Project 1979

The Air New Zealand trap team to tour USA later this year was reported in May issue of CTSN. The team includes:

From the Desk of the National Coaching Director.

One of the major requirements in shooting clay targets, either trap or skeet, is to develop the ability to swing a shotgun correctly.

To swing correctly in shotgun shooting involves two distinctly separate functions. The first is known as "maintained swing" or "follow through.

A common fault with more shooters than one would imagine is that, when he swings to the target, the shooter reaches it, stops his gun and pulls the trigger - consequently shooting behind the moving target.

This fault can be caused by several factors, including bad foot position (which curtails movement to the left or right), shooting with the arms only (and not turning the shoulders to the shot), pulling the stock away from the face with the arms (which consequently means not looking down the centre of the rib). This list includes the most common of the known faults.

The second item is the shooter's inability to swing a gun in a straight line. This again can be due to several factors, of which the main ones are - a crouched position, gun stock too low on shoulder, gun on too much angle across the body, restrictive foot

positions, either for left or right hand swingers.

An interesting experiment can be carried out by getting one's gun, putting it to the shoulder and then trying to follow a straight line with the muzzle. It is more difficult than it sounds. The more one extends himself to the left, the more the shooter tends to lock and force the muzzle down by pushing the shoulder against the butt. In doing this, the shooter depresses the muzzle and undershootes. Conversely, in extending himself to the right, the shooter locks in his turn and tries to force the muzzle to the target with the front hand, which forces the muzzle up and causes overshooting. In the case of left hand shooters, these comments should be reversed.

Important things to Remember Regarding Swing

Swing should start from the knees.

The shooter should turn his shoulders to the shot. (b)

An upright simple style lends itself to a good swing.


A stance involving one foot behind the other or feet too wide apart will result in restricted turn and consequently faulty swinging of the shotgun.

(e) Keep the muzzle of the gun moving when you pull the trig-

er.

(f) It is better to miss in front of a target than to be behind it.

Editor's Mailbox

I'm not sure that it's in oreder to make the following suggestions or that its your responsibility to receive them, but, someone has to start somewhere, so it's you and I once again.

Let's be honest and face it, our Trench and Skeet eliminations for this year's team were a shambles!! they came as a complete surprise at the last miniute and shooters were expected to come from "cold" to their peak, with no practice, in a week. They started the last weekend in January, then one every weekend in February, one sandwiched between our Nationals and New Zealand Nationals in mid March, and the last ones at the end of March. Unless you lived fairly close to Melbourne, and could shoot all your eliminations at either Melbourne or Frankston, it turned out to be a very hectic, expensive period trying to fit in the required 600 targets.

Surely some system could be devised where the eliminations for next year's team are started now. This would enable the current team, members to continue shooting 200 targets competition at least every month and allow people who want to try and qualify for the next team an opportunity to space their attendances to occasions when it is suitable time wise as well as financially. This would also give the various clubs time to program the eliminations around their normal events.

Probably the general reaction to these suggestions will be that I.S.U. shooters should leave D.T.L. shooting alone and specialise in I.S.U. At this time there is not enough I.S.U. events being held to satisfy the shooters in regard to the amount of shooting they wish to do. Perhaps if the clujbs were to program 200 I.S.U. targets each weekend, on a roster system, example - Melbourne, Canberra, Frankston, Downside, International, Sydney, Griffith (when installed), Brisbane, Taree Wingham, Cunderdin, Townsville etc, there would be more opportunities for people to shoot I.S.U. In this way each Club would have an elimination every 11 weeks or so, 4 or 5 a year, and let's face it, there are quite a number of shooters who would shoot I.S.U. if there were more opportunities available.

I realise it's a bit much to expect all the Clubs to co-operate, and not all the shooters would attend each location, but at least the opportunity to shoot I.S.U. targets would be more readily available. Shooters could then reach and maintain their peak performance throughout the year instead of being expected to "peak" within a couple of weeks, for a couple of weeks, and then layoff for months at a time.



almost guaranteeing the surprise element.

3. If purchased installed on a rack or in a cabinet manufactured by the same manufacturer, the system is completely self contained and as such does not require any additional installation expense.

4. Operating costs are minimal being annual replacement of the

D.C. power pach at a cost of approximately \$5.00.

5. The complete system has been designed to function on an individual firearm basis ie. the system may be alarmed with all firearms in place or with any number removed prior to it being switched on.

- Ease of operation, when compared to any mechanical locking device, is particularly noticeable. To activate the system for any number of firearms the operator simply inserts a key and turns the system on then removes the key. When compared to the cumbersome procedures often seen in retail outlets and collector's homes, of chains padlocks and the like, this system is a great ad-
- 7. Sensitivity of the switches is quite amazing in that the firearm has only to be moved 3.16" and the system will go into alarm. Once in alarm it may only be reset by use of the key mentioned above

One would expect the purchase price of this system to be in the "out of reach of my pocket" category. However with the use of printed circuitry and skilful design, the cost has been kept at a very attractive level and according to Ian Ritchie "when basis on our standard 6TD - 6 Gun Rack the system will retail for approximately half the cost of comparable mechanically operated locking systems based on only 3 guns.

When compared to the value of the firearms and their insurance, if obtainable at all, this cost seems quite reasonable.

Naturally the person able to derive most benefit from this method of pricing will be the person with a number of expensive firearms. firearms. However this does by no means preclude its use by any shooter with any number of firearms he or she feels is worth protecting in any way against unauthorised or unlawful removal from their place of storage or display.




1979/80 WINCHESTER SEASON COMMENCES

THE ILLAWARRA DISTRICT GUN CLUB

Since the turn of the century the Illawarra District which surrounds the City of Wollongong, New South Wales, has seen the formation and cesation of several Gun Clubs. The earliest being at Brownsville where live birds were shot.

On the introduction of Clay Target shooting the live bird club at Brownsville closed due to obvious reasons. Some years later a clay target club was formed at Fig Tree which at that time was just outside the City of Wollongong. However, the urban sprawl and development of a hotel near the club saw the closure of the Fig Tree site.

Not until the early 60's did any serious clay target shooting take place. The Illawarra Branch of the S.S.A.A. formed about that time and conducted small and informal clay target shooting on Mr. Tulloch McPhail's property at Dapto. In 1967 a group of the S.S.A.A. shooters at the Dapto complex wishing to shoot more seriously and also gain affiliation with the A.C.T.A. formed a club now known as the Illawarra District Gun Club. This new Club leased land at Albion Park, 25 kms south of Wollongong, quickly developed a three trap complex and affiliated with the A.C.T.A. The club ran smoothly and soon boasted a membership in excess of 100 members.

However once again the urban sprawl took its toll with a housing development going on right up to the club's boundary.

Subsequently in 1976 the club's committee convened a meeting and invited members and/or friends, relatives etc to "dig deep" in their pockets to raise sufficient funds to purchase a suitable alternative parcel of land.

Considering the great interest shown by 36 persons a Company was formed and adequately financially backed, instructed the club's committee to seek out suitable land. Many sites were inspected before the committee's attention was drawn to an acreage, portion of which was occupied by the previously mentioned S.S.A.A. Shot Gun Range.

Contracts were drawn up and after a considerable time, which stretched the patience of all those concerned, settlement and ownership was finally reached.

The advantage to the "Company" purchasing this parcel was that it provided the Illawarra District Gun Club with an already existing two trap and one skeet Clay Target complex. Whilst the club house (fibro shed) was inadequate the grounds were well developed. A third D.G.L. layout was then installed, the property fenced to comply with firearms law, over 200 native trees planted and plans were then drawn up for the new club house.


The new brick two storey club house was quoted at \$80,000 by local building contractors. However, with the committee obtaining building materials at better than competitive prices and a certain amount of scrounging, the club house was erected in majority by club members. The original cost was better than halved and under the expert direction of Ron Reid, Builder and Club Member, he has provided the club with a magnificent asset.

Although club finances are presently strained plans are at hand for further D.T.L. layouts, a Trench complex and I.S.A. skeet facilities.

The Grand Club House Opening Shoot will be held over the Queen's Birthday weekend June 16th—17th, shooters will be pre sented with immaculate fully grassed trap shooting complex complete with double storey brick club house. The elevated front patio will give full view of all shooting plus panoramic views of the bush countryside.

The club is situated on Bong Bong Road, three kms west of Dapto which is 15 kms south of the city of Wollongong. Lake Illawarra and many beautiful beaches, scenic spots and tourist attractions are within a short distance from the club. The opening shoot program is an exciting list of events (refer elsewhere in this issue) and the committee is looking forward to a great weekend of shooting and entertaining.

kind of weapon (as mentioned in the Polistoria Fratis Bartholomei Ferrariensis ab anno 1287 usque ad annum 1367) . . .

The perfection of firearms that were built in that area at the beginning of 1500 reveals that such a degree of craftmanship could only be the result of a tradition of workmanship that had stood for centuries. In fact we should reflect on the basis of reliable records, that at the start of 1500 the Brescia craftsmen already had produced more than 400 arquebuses a day, besides other arms such as armor, helmets, shields, crossbows, etc., the latter numbering some thousand a year. With their appearance, the firearms put an end to almost all previous fighting techniques and changed radically the principle that had guided all war vicissitudes up to that time. In other words the symbol of the knight declined. Firearms stressed the value of the individual and democratised the fighting that until then had been confined to combat among noblemen thus creating — as one might say — equality among the belligerents, since they were all put on the same level. The strongest from then on would be the fighter armed from top to toe and making use of the most effective weapons or the best physical strength. Firearms spread so rapidly that about 1350 every seignory or state possessed at least a few specimens both for prestige because of their novelty and for the power of their effectiveness. The Roman Catholic Church declared that such machines were too murderous and unpleasing to God and put them under the ban of the Christian World in the same way as some time previously the Lateran Council had banned the crossbows. However, the excommunisations and oaths could not prevail against the natural course of things.

Revolutionary gun sight designer and innovator.


In 1959 Don Burris left the aerospace industry and put his talents to work in the field of hunting and shooting. His first major innovation was the revolutionary non-magnifying constantly centered reticle in variable power scopes. It was not long before every major scope manufacturer had adopted his design.

Other breakthrough designs include the world famous 'Hi-Lume' coated lenses and the wide angle field or view concept as well at many other design improvements in scopes, mounts and open

sights.

This month we will continue our discussion on mental discipline in competition shotgunning. It deals with TENSION, how it comes about and the steps you as a competitor can take to reduce its effects on your game.

TYPES OF TENSION

Normal tension is a blessing to mankind. Without tension most problems would not get solved, the world's work would not get done and championship scores would not be fired. Normal tension is the prevailing condition of any organism when it is mustering its strength to cope with a difficult situation. All animals, including man, tense in situations which involve the security of themselves and their loved ones. But there is a kind of tension that is bad for you: Pathological tension. This is an exaggeration of normal This type of tension usually requires that the subject be put under the care of a physician. The vast majority of people who worry about tension have nothing more than normal tension. All they need is a technique for relaxing. You should know what tension is and a few hints on how to minimize its effects.

Pathological tension is not only hard to terminate, your whole body over-reacts as if the difficulty confronting it were a life or de-

ath matter.

It's the kind of reaction a normal person would have only in a dangerous situation. In pathological tension, blood pressure, heartbeat and pulse go way up and stay up. Excessive adrenalin may result in jitterness, flushing and trembling. The digestive actions of the stomach usually stop entirely and will not resume, causing loss of appetite or indigestion. Muscles tense for action but may end by cramping. There is rapid, shallow breathing to the point of dizziness. The inevitable, and often swift result is a sense of deadening fatigue. Normal tension may make you feel exhausted too, but not to this degree.

What happens to you when you are faced with a challenging situation in shooting? Psychologically you become slightly anxious. This is a highly civilized counterpart of the "flight or fight" reaction of the primitive animal when it perceives danger. This reac-

tion is not anxiety in the pathological sense.

In normal tension, your body undergoes certain definite changes. Adrenalin pours into your bloodstream and your liver releases sugar, giving a plentiful supply of energy to your muscles. Your entire nervous system shifts into high gear. It causes your sense of smell, hearing and sight to become sharpened and all your mental faculties to become razor keen. Your stepped-up nervous system also causes the large voluntary muscles of your legs, arms and torso to contract, ready for action. The involuntary muscles of your digestive tract cause your digestion to slow down for a while. Your chest and arterial muscles contract so that your breathing becomes shallower and your blood pressure increases. When all these things are happening, you are experiencing normal tension. Most of us experience this kind of tension one or more times a day. When the problem which caused you to be tense has been solved, your tension will subside and you will return to a normal state of relaxation. It may leave slowly but it will leave. Normal tension is self-limiting, it does not continue unabated after you need it. The simple, tension-ending techniques described below, apply only to reducing normal tension.

TENSION REDUCING TECHNIQUES

Take a Breather.

Breathe deeply, three times, very slowly, at the end of each exhalation, hold your breath as long as possible. When you have finished you should feel noticeably relaxed and more calm.

Here's what has happened. By forcing yourself to breathe deeply, you break the tension of your voluntary breathing muscles. This

causes the involuntary muscles of the lungs, gastrointestinal tract and heart to relax too. This is the simplest method of relaxing. For some, it can be used to end tension completely. It can be used by others for temporary relief when they do not wish to "let down" completely.

Let Go.

Sit down and let your head droop forward. In about a minute raise one arm and drop it in your lap as if it were a limp rag. Do the same with the other. Now let your legs go completely limp; now your stomach muscles. Stay in this position for at least ten minutes. This technique, too, is aimed at first relaxing the voluntary muscles. It is especially effective when you've had to maintain normal tension for several hours on end.

Shift into Low.

When you have been overstimulated by highly demanding, protracted mental exertion, taper off at the end of the day by becom-

ing involved in a diverting activity.

If you like handiwork, pick a kind which is interesting but not too creative. Soap sculpture, finger painting, woodworking, and gardening all are excellent low-gear activities that will help you to simmer down. This kind of tension-remover is aimed at changing your mental set. It is helpful for those who have to operate at top capacity such as the better shooters and those people who are in enforced contact with others all day long. After stimulation, a part of your mental capacity will continue to be aroused. To slow you down when you're in this state of mind, you require something which is engrossing but which demands nothing of you intellectually. Television entertainment and simple handicrafts are ideal.

Take a Break.

This is a "Remote Control" technique for dealing with normal tension. Simply take a break for ten full minutes every hour. You may find that this allows you to ease out of your working tension more quickly and easily when the day is over. Since you have not allowed tension to develop fully, your organism doesn't have so far to go on the road back to normal relaxation.

Stop and Think.

When the tension-making job allows a respite, sit down and calmly review the things in your life that you value highly. Think of the long range purpose of your life, of the people you love, the things you really want. In a few minutes you may notice that you have involuntarily taken a deep breath. This is a sign that tension is dropping away rapidly.when you tense to face a difficult situation, you tend to exaggerate its importance. Judgement and reason can quickly change this mental state when it's time to relax again.

These techniques are based on the fact that tension can be ended in two distinct ways: Through the relaxation of your voluntary and involuntary muscles; and by changing your mental "set". If you achieve either, you set off the other and hasten the process of normal relaxation.

YOU CAN WIN!

Confidence

Furnishes the alloy to stiffen the will to win and not give up or compromise. Confidence is based on a full grasp of the complete technique of controlling employment of the fundamentals.

Confidence combined with knowledge, exacting skills, good physical condition and a seething, consuming determination to win, will provide you with an edge from which you can deliver a shattering blow to the composure of the competition. When your competitor realizes his maximum effort is falling short of that necessary to win, the result is no contest.

Be a hungry Shooter.

The slashing onslaught of a voracious appetite for victory from the first shot onward destroys the resolve of the lesser competitor.

The crushing effect of steamroller technique.

Your opponent will sense the approach of disaster. To know that your best effort is not good enough to win is a demoralizing experience.

Chance at greatness lies in each man's grasp.

Performing at or behind your potential will catapult you into the lead. Retain the lead by counting on your competitor's inevitable mistakes and gaps in his knowledge of controlled shooting techniques. You must have confidence that you are capable of a performance exceeding any previous level of personal accomplish-

That now tidies up our discussion on the mental side and next month we will have a first look at the physical side.

Wad Seating Pressure

Wad pressure on AA Wads is not critical.

Any pressure from zero to 40 pounds is acceptable-the only criteria is that the wads must be seated on the powder. (No air space should exist between wad and powder.) A safe level to use is 20 lbs.

10 Commandments for Reloaders

- · Never load in haste-avoid distractions.
- Never smoke whilst handling powder or primers.
- Handle primers carefully.
- Store powder in a cool dry place.
- Never use a powder you cannot identify.
- Never mix powders.
- Never exceed recommended loads.
- Keep powder and primers out of the reach of children.
- Store powder only in its original container.
- · Develop a loading routine to avoid mistakes.
