

Two pieces of exciting news have happened since my last column. The first is exciting in a constructive and progressive way and relates to the next step in the development of the Association's National Headquarters.

The Core Group met in Melbourne late in June and resolved the procedure to be followed in conducting the national referendum. The referendum will be conducted within the club structure during

July and August and registered shooters are encouraged to participate as fully as possible.

The second cause for excitement resulted from a totally different stimulus, and was of a very destructive nature. A group of sportsmen (if that is the correct term) was attending what has been widely reported in the National media as "a live pigeon trap shoot", when it was "visited" by police and wild life officers.

In the following two days, the media coverage very effectively destroyed the public acceptance and credibility of the 11000 responsible trap shooters in Australia - a credibility which has taken 40 years to develop.

And so we again saw a demonstration of the power of the press -ademonstration which added further weight to the policy of not providing any opportunities for an often proved "anti-shooting" press to press additional attacks against responsible firearms owners

Since the late 1950s live pigeon shooting has been illegal in Vic-toria, which is where the "pinch" took place. It has been widely rumoured since then, that the enthusiasts have continued to follow their chosen "sport."

The Australian Clay Target Association does NOT condone organised illegal live target shooting. It is considered that such ac-tivities reflect poorly on Australia's hundreds of thousands of law abiding shooters, especially the 11000 plus responsible inanimate target trap shooters.

It will be a long time before the "legal" trap shooter regains his position of "social acceptance."

CORE GROUP MEETING

The Core Group of the Association, which consists of Messrs Hawkins, Porter and Holtfreter, met in Melbourne for two and a half days at the end of June.

Its role is to prepare recommendations on policy matters which are then submitted to the full Executive Committee for endorsement. In cases of urgency, a postal vote may be taken - however, in normal circumstances, the topics are placed on the agenda of the next Executive Meeting.

This sequence of events highlights one of the most serious weaknesses in the Association's administrative structure; that is that a growth organisation such as ours cannot continue to develop when restricted to only two decision making (Executive meetings) meetings per year.

In addition to the matter of the referendum to be conducted through Clubs on the subject of the National Headquarters, some other matters of reader interest arose from the meeting.

These include:

(a) The Association's Development Blueprint is to be updated, with a number of new initiatives to be included. Many of the fresh ideas are aimed at improving communications.

(b) For the first time, some responsible action was taken to recognise the importance of the National Training Camp policy being promoted by the ACT Shooting Association.

(c) The Core Group expressed an opinion that a minimum requirement of nine trap fields and five skeet fields should be considered by the Victorian Clay Target Association when considering its decision on the venue for the 1981 National Championships. Early estimates of the attendance vary from 700 to 800 competitors on the main days.

(d) Considerable discussion took place on the much debated problems resulting from the policy of regrading of competitors during A recommendation is to be presented to the full Executive in which

it is suggested that the practice be discontinued.

(e) The appointment of Newton Thomas as National Director of Coaching was re-affirmed for a further term. In doing so, the Core Group expressed its deep satisfaction with the way in which the Director has implemented the novice training program.

(f) A long discussion occurred on the possible adverse consequences to arise from night shooting. Although no recommendation came from the talks, there is mounting evidence to suggest that all clubs with night shooting facilities would be well advised to carefully consider the possible ill effects on its neighbors to arise from regular shooting noise at night.

Although a number of other areas were also covered, it would be discourteous and unwise to discuss them publicly before the full Executive Committee has had the opportunity to debate them.




shooting sports. This opportunity is taken to thank Mr Holler and his staff for the tremendous hospitality and assistance which was extended to the Core Group during its stay. General

JON WHITTAKERS

winner of the National Double Barrel Championship 1979 from a Record Field of 607 Shooters.

This is the second in a series of interviews with Australia's top clay busters. The interview was conducted soon after Jon had won the 1979 National Double Barrel Championship at Griffith, N.S.W.

CTSN: Well Jon you are top dog in a record field, a score of 200/200, all the goodies and probably thrilled to bits.

WHITTAKERS: A big thrill, yes it has really made my nationals.

CTSN: Is this your first big tournament win?

WHITTAKERS: Well, I got up in a Winchester Tournament during the past year but in fact this is the first Nationals I have ever been to.

CTSN: Your first Nationals ... not a bad way to start?

WHITTAKERS: No, not bad is it.?

CTSN: It was an interesting shoot off Jon. You ran out of light last night. How did you tackle the overnight break?

WHITTAKERS: Well, we shot on well into the dark last night, the main reason being that we did not want to sleep on it. But anyhow we did. It took a little while to get to sleep but I made it eventually. Came out early this morning to see what conditions were like and we got back into it.

CTSN: When you say we, you obviously mean Graham Willett.

WHITTAKERS: Yes, Graham is a good shot and one not to be taken lightly in a shoot-off like this. This mornings re-start of the shoot-off was obviously a danger period for both of us. Perhaps I was a little bit lucky. I have run up against Graham a lot of times before on the club circuit but I have only got down to a shoulder to shoulder shoot-off with him once before and I rolled over like a dog on that occasion about five targets later. So now it's one all.

CTSN: The score got to exactly 200, is that your highest break?

WHITTAKERS: No, my best winning break is 203, but I got involved in a shoot-off with Vin Ryan some time back and ran a 270 break before Vin rolled me.

CTSN: You picked a tough customer there.

WHITTAKERS: I sure did.

CTSN: You shoot a Winchester 101 we notice?

WHITTAKERS: Yes I do.

CTSN: And cartridges?

WHITTAKERS: Well, thats an interesting one, I was using Eley Special Trap in the first barrel and AA 325's in the second.

CTSN: What sort of choking have you in the 101?

WHITTAKERS: Actually it is straight out of the box, improved modified and full. Nothing at all done to it stock wise, in fact there is a interesting story behind the gun. I had a 101 previously that had some small thing go wrong and in the interim, Richard Allen of Echuca lent me this present 101. Well, I went to Mildura and had a heck of a good session with it so I never gave it back to him.

CTSN: Richard may have the job in front of him to get it back now.

WHITTAKERS: I would say he has no hope.

CTSN: You are from Deniliquin and a member of that club?

WHITTAKERS: Well yes and no. I am a member of Deniliquin in fact I am the president. But being so close to the border and NSW being as big as it is I have registered through Echuca and this gives me access to State shoots in Victoria.

CTSN: That's interesting. You are single we believe, what about some personal details?

WHITTAKERS: Yes I am not married, am 35 years old and am a grazier.

CTSN: Let's talk about your approach to the game Jon. You have a very easy style. Do you shoot each target as it comes?

WHITTAKERS: Well I think the whole performance is for fun. You know if the whole thing becomes serious that you can't enjoy it, it's a bit sad.

CTSN: That is a very refreshing approach.

WHITTAKERS: Perhaps so, its very nice to win of course but if you lose well so what, there is always next time. You know, I never shot at a clay target until I was over 30 and I can say that these last years have been the best of my life. The number of friends that you make and the nice people that you meet make this a great game.

CTSN: So you like to shoot it for fun.

WHITTAKERS: I sure do, and its been great fun today!

CTSN: Let's go back to the shoot-off Jon. The gesture that you and Graham Willett made last night of going on into the twilight when you both could have given it away 25 targets before was a fine one for the crowd. What were your thoughts then? Cont'd over page

CTSN talks to the Champions - Cont'd

WHITTAKERS: I don't know really. I think we both had an equal chance but the thing in my mind was that it would be better to get it over with and not have to sleep on it. There were some hilarious theories floating around that have since come to my notice. One was that Graham being shorter and myself being taller, Graham would have an advantage in the dark in that the targets would get to the skyline earlier for him. I can't say that that theory makes a lot of sense.

CTSN: We were aware of a lot of talk around the dinner tables last night. The main concensus was that if Graham got dug in today you may have had a real tussle on your hands. As it turned out, it only went another 5 targets this morning. Any reason for this?


WHITTAKERS: Oh, there is no doubt in my mind that if Graham had got a start today the result could have been different. But, as I mentioned before, the first few targets the two of us faced today were the danger targets. Perhaps I was just a little lucky but being a new day its a whole new ball game. Another shoot if you like, and as it turned out it was only a 5 target event.

CTSN: How true. Let's move onto the targets. Have you found them difficult at all? There has been some talk that the light in the mornings makes them a bit difficult.

WHITTAKERS: Well, I don't know. I pulled a hairy second barrel on one this morning that I seemed to lose. But overall the targets have been excellent. Nice and even, and that is all a clay target shooter can ask for. I know there has been some talk around the grounds about the hardness of the targets but I have no complaints, they have broken as well as any I have shot at, in fact better than a lot I have shot on the Victorian scene earlier this year.

CTSN: On to technique Jon. Do you have any personal approaches to the game that differ from what is taught generally?

WHITTAKERS: No, not really. I point the gun at the normal places, call normally. Oh, I have tried all the little things that people tell you

but basically it is your own style that suits you that is the best. For example, I was told that it was not good form to watch other people's targets. So I started to look at the ground between shots. It did nothing for me or my scores so I watch every target that is thrown, and that makes sense because you understand the trap and any peculiar targets.

CTSN: You are an interesting shooter to watch Jon. What with all the facial expressions and the gestures, you are obviously very involved in the event and are thoroughly enjoying it when you are out there.

WHITTAKERS: I love it! You must react in some way or you become a machine and thats not for me. If you take a lean one with the second barrel it's a natural reaction, you are pleased to still be there in the shoot. If you start worrying about that last shot well the next one is going to be that much harder isn't it?

CTSN: That is a very valid comment Jon and thank you for sharing your Double Barrel win with us. We feel sure that it will be not too long before we are talking with you again. Best of luck for the rest of the program.



\$40 000 PROJECT AN IMMENSE SUCCESS

What a great day it was for clay target shooting! What, you may ask?

The occasion was the opening of the Illawarra Gun Club clubhouse. This magnificent two-story building caps off three years of dedicated effort by the club committee.

Led by bustling aggressive president, Bill Jones, the club now has tangible evidence of the success available to those who believe in team work.

The clubhouse consists of a bar and entertaining area on the first floor, which opens onto a spacious terrace, from which the spectator gets magnificent views of the shooting grounds and surrounding country.

On the ground floor, there is a well equipped kitchen, the shoot manager's office and administration area, an extensive store and toilets. Provision has also been made for a children's creche.

An indication of the enthusiasm of shooters generally for the club's project can be taken from the long distances covered by many people, just to honor the opening.

Probably the best example is that of National President Ern Hawkins, who had committed himself to a function at Mildura Clay Target Gun Club on the Saturday. He then drove the 600 plus miles through Saturday night to attend the official ceremony at Illawarra on Sunday.

Past Illawarra and District Gun Club secretary, John Burrow, drove from Adelaide to be present - he brought with him the "wild" man from International Gun Club in South Australia, Peter Marcionni and Claude Verbis.

Bill Iles, the Overall High Gun Award winner at the recent National Championships, made the trip up from Melbourne. Many prominent New South Wales clubs were represented by either their president or secretary, all of which helped to add lustre to the occasion.

The attendance confirms the belief that where clubs provide the facilities AND the program, support from competitors and families will be strong.

Saturday night's smorgasbord dinner, combined with the drawing of the Calcutta was a most successful social function. Special mention must be made of the sterling effort put in by "auctioneer" Geoff Salmon, the Winchester sales rep. Geoff roared himself hoarse all night, and the only medicine he took was Coke.

Turning now to the shooting part of the weekend, the Club's four trap fields were fully extended to cope with the crowd – in fact, a minor part of the program had to be cancelled.

One of the greatest shooting efforts recorded in recent times was produced by Illawarra and District Gun Club secretary, John Maxwell.

John, along with his president Bill Jones, and many others on the hard working committee, had put in long hours putting the finishing touches to the clubhouse.

He then assisted Jean Chodat to run the shoot-office, and still found time to win the overall high gun award, only dropping one programmed target for the weekend.

Another good performance was carded by Rex Northcott, who shot 30 targets from 24 metres to not only win his group, but also gain the coveted "25 metre shooter" badge.

Kevin Perkins, an Illawarra committee member, won his second Winchester Tournament for the year, when he outlasted John Maxwell in a shoot-off that finished when John grassed his 94th target. Barry Duncan of West Wyalong was third, and Col Spence won the Veterans' Division. The junior section was won by G. McAllister and the Ladies division by Fay Quirk.

The overall winner of the Calcutta event was John Maxwell 95-95, who beat off a strong challenge from young Wyong shooter Kevin Thompson.

The conclusion of the Calcutta event spilled over into Monday (a public holiday) and the club added an extra scratch event to satisfy the 70 shooters who still hadn't had sufficient competition. What a great weekend!



TEAM SELECTION PROCEDURES

As reported in previous issues of Clay Target Shooting News, the Chairman of the Association's ISU Sub Committee, Mr Harry Somers arranged to prepare an explanation of the Association's team selection procedures for Olympic Trench and ISU Skeet competitions overseas.

The report is as follows:

- 1. The final selection qualifying rounds were conducted at Melbourne Gun Club in conjunction with the South Pacific Regional and Open Matches at Easter.
- 2. Selection Panel
 - 2.1 ISU Sub Committee Members
 - L.G. Connors, T. Reschke, H.S. Somers (chairman), J.N. Thomas, was present in his official role.
 - 2.2 Co-opted Members
 - In view of the absence of other members of the ISU Sub Committee the writer decided to expand the panel by co-option. Messrs W. Abbott and R.F. Buchan agreed to act on a co-opted basis.

3. Selection Basis

- 3.1 The panel applied the basic selection formula which was used in Ranking for the 1978 Team Selection.
- 3.2 However, in the light of the last few years experience, much closer attention was paid to the personality/psychological aspects.
- The selection of representatives of our sport a. and our Nation in International Competitions under ISU rules requires a far more searching approach than, for example, the traditional method we have used in the selection of State and Mackintosh teams for postal matches.
- b. It is the writer's view that as our development of involvement in other shoulder to shoulder overseas matches grows, eg USA, we will need to apply similar selection criteria to ensure worthy representation, to justify the expenditure and to uphold the image of our Association and our Nation as competitors and sportsmen.
- .c. The assessment of these factors is necessary from the following viewpoint:

(a) The individual competitors must be able to lift their shooting performance under the stimulus of world class competitive pressure, simply holding Australian level scores is not enough, and needless to say, a single team member who wilts under top pressure means disaster overall.

(b) Each member of the team must be compatible with every other team member.

A single disruptive element is sufficient to cause friction and add unwanted stresses in an already stressful environment, with detrimental overall effect on performance.

(c) Each member must be totally dedicated to the team and team's performance.

(d) Each member must be strongly self-disciplined as well as amenable to external discipline, and fully prepared to comply with instructions, orders, and directives from Coach, Section Manager and/or Team Manager.

These officials cannot be expected to devote valuable time and effort to bringing erring or wayward team members into line, their responsibilities and duties are heavy, and such time taken up, is time not available to devote to the positive benefit of the team.

It is acknowledged that assessment of these personal/psychological aspects is the most difficult

part of the selection process. It can rightly be argued that none of the panel are trained in the behaviourial sciences, however, as mature, responsible men who have had years of experience in our sport, as well as in working with, employing, controlling, and/or managing people, who debated each individual assessment out to unanimous agreement, we believe our judgements have been objective and scrupulousy honest.

4. Automatic Selections

The ISU Sub Committee accepted the recommendation of Newton Thomas in December, 1978 and nominated Rumbel and Ellis (Trench), Crikis and Summers (Skeet) as 1979 team members without the need to take part in qualifying rounds and this decision was endorsed by the full ACTA National Executive in March, 1979. (It is intended to formally cover this whole subject in a separate report).

In essence these four shooters are the nucleus of a National squad, all in fact took part in qualifying round.

Ranking scores of these shooters are included in the tables following for comparative purposes and include their performances in National and Overseas matches.


5 Performances Considered

In view of the need to assess shooter's performance under pressure as well as the problem we ran into this year in being forced to conduct qualifying rounds over a very restricted period - an occurrence we must not repeat, the following

- performances were taken into consideration: 5.1 1978 National ISU Titles (Adelaide)
- 5.2 1978 Commonwealth Games (as applicable)
- 5.3 1978 World Championships (as applicable)
- 1979 Qualifying Rounds 5.4
- 1979 South Pacific Regional and Open Titles
- 5.5 1979 South Pacific Regional and Open Titles
 5.6 Best and worst scores were also looked at as well as performance trends.
 - Note: In analysing qualifying round performances it was disturbing to note that a few shooters dropped out of 200 target matches after a poor performance over the first 100 targets thus nullifying that performance for

consideration. 6. 1979 ISU Team Selection

All members of the ACTA National Executive have been fully informed of the detailed deliberations of the Selection Panel.

The panel acted in accordance with a motion carried at a full executive meeting in March, 1979.

Their decisions are regarded as absolutely responsible and in the best interests of our Association and Australia's participation in shooting sports under ISU rules.

The selections are wholeheartedly endorsed by the National Executive who extend their congratulations and best wishes to those selected.

Experience of the last few years clearly demonstrates that factors other than the basic technical ability to break targets must be taken into consideration in formulating teams for this type of International competitions. These factors are to a large degree personal, the ACTA executive considers the evaluation of these factors to be confidential and will not enter into any correspondence or public debate relevant to such evaluations.



Monday, June 18, the day the committee had worked and planned for to be the "one day of the year" had arrived.














A sash and \$100 gents' watch donated by Francis Latus was the high gun trophy over the four rounds with trophies for top score over each individual round.

tion in his profession, Geoff is now stationed in Melbourne where he intends to continue with clay target shooting. INTERNATIONAL SHOOTERS

Australia is not the only country to be affected and disappointed over the recent cancellation of the world championships. The following is an extract from Shooting Magazine May 1979, published in England.

"The article is headed World Championship Sensation and is as follows — SHOCK — that is the universal reaction to the news that this year's World Championships have been cancelled.

The Championships were due to be held at Vienna in Austria from August 14-24, and the news that the Austrian Federation had withdrawn came without warning on March 8. Keith Murray, the chairman of the International Board, was one of the first to hear the news — and it has obviously upset his plans considerably.

news — and it has obviously upset his plans considerably. "We had heard nothing at all," he says, "and we even received the printed program for the event earlier this year. They already have the ground — so I can only assume that fairly desperate financial troubles have led them to cancel the Championships. Now we have to sort out how to replace them."

Apart from being important in themselves, the World Championships were also crucial to the British national squad's program leading up to the 1980 Olympic Olympic Games. Britain, like every other shooting nation, is now looking for some way that the Championship can be staged at another ground — or to replace them with some other major Grand Prix.

"I think some other country will pick the event up — although this sort of thing is normally organised three years in advance" says Keith Murray. "It is even possible that the World Championships could be combined with the European Championships at Montecatini in June — although even then we would still be looking for some other major competition at the same time as the World Championships were due to be held."

Our own view is that Britain could apply to shoot in the Mediterranean Championships later this summer in which most of the leading European clay shooting nations compete. Whatever the outcome, Austria's last minute withdrawal has dealt a savageblow to the international shooting season. We certainly hope that a satisfactory solution can be found.

Will Australia come to this?

I read an article by a shooter from England visiting a club in Nigeria, Africa's largest country and he quotes "25 targets cost 5 pounds and shells sell. at 25 for 10 pounds."





WOMEN'S TALK ...

My family have been rather spoilt living in Melbourne as we shoot at Melbourne Gun Club regularly, and, perhaps, have taken for granted the excellent facilities at this club, now we also have the new Frankston-Australian Gun Club with their beautiful new club house, television, 2 pool tables, table tennis and a large blackboard with plenty of chalk for the children to draw on, as well as a playground outdoors to keep junior occupied while Dad and in our case, Mum, shoot.

In the six years I have been shooting it is interesting to notice the changes at the various clubs; SAGC Adelaide with a new club house, also Griffith with Perth and Brisbane well catered for, along with many country clubs such as Mildura, Illawarra, Ballandean, Gold Coast, which have updated their club houses for the comfort of the shooters.

I feel the days of the old tin shed and the temporary outhouse have gone, thank goodness, and even some of the old diehards, begrudgingly, will agree with me. Shooting is no longer just for the men, better facilities make for family involvement and that I feel is what our sport is all about.

Over the Queen's Birthday weekend, we travelled to Mildura for four days of serious shooting and four hectic nights of fun. We had, as usual a caravan on site at the club and I can recommend a visit there as it is a real family weekend.

Visitors came from far and wide and as there were no women's events programmed it was interesting to see how the women shooters shaped up against some of the heavies who attended to shoot the Victorian Universal Trench Championship. It took two junior women shooters to show us all how it is done.

Leica Andrews, 17 years, from Bordertown Gun Club SA shot extremely well to win the handicap on Saturday with a 44-44, Leica also won Overall and C grade in the Night Single Barrel with a 24-25, but was unplaced in the 100 target event after shooting a 91-100.

A local Mildura lass, Christine Wakefield won C grade in the Night Double Barrel with a 24-25. Fine shooting by both these girls.

On Sunday, just to get us ready for the dinner dance that night, the club programmed a 100 target event, shot American style over 4 layouts, 25 targets each layout and 5 targets on each station. Most shooters were of the opinion that the 100 target event was most successful and except for a few stunned faces after trap 4, everyone appeared to enjoy this style of shooting. I must admit that I retired gracefully after just 50 targets, put it down to too much Mildura hospitality or my age???

Ron Clarke the athlete, that is.

Well shooters are about to get to know Ron Clarke, the business man!

As announced as a late news item in the July issue of Clay Target Shooting News, ELEY Ammunition has appointed Ron Clarke to the position of National Marketing Manager. Clarke's reign in this position will be short-lived, as it is planned that he will become General Manager on the retirement of the present incumbent, Ian Cook. Cook is reported to be retiring at the end of August.

Book early to avoid disappointment

Editor's Mailbox

"Thank you Shooter's Wife for the constructive criticism in your letter in June CTSN.

You are absolutely correct with regard to the short time span allowed for the qualifying matches this year.

There is little to be achieved by raking over dead coals, suffice to say that some of the contributing factors were beyond our control, however, in hindsight, we could have carried out a much better job, notwithstanding these factors.

The only attitude to be adopted in circumstances such as these is to ensure that there is no repeat, in fairness to all concerned.

The fundamental problem is a lack of long range planning, we have tended to look only to "next year." The ISU base their planning on a four year cycle — Olympic Games Cycle? — and there is no doubt that we need to do likewise, as well as taking into account the Commonwealth Games as an extra complicating factor.

It is worth noting that a number of the overseas teams we expected to be at the South Pacific Regional and Open Matches, gave "lack of adequate notice" as the reason for their non-participation.

Within the framework of the four year planning cycle it should be possible to develop a roster of 200 Target Matches during each year, so arranged as to provide regular competition, optimisation of the use of facilities, the opportunity for shooters to plan their match programs to build up their peak, as well as vital experience for Referees, Range Officials, Administration Personnel and the like. Furthermore it will provide the opportunity for travel and accommodation costs to be optimised and spread over a reasonable time span.

Another basic reason for adopting this approach relates to the assessment of performance history as a factor for Team Selection. The roster would be framed to include National ISU Titles, Nominated Qualifying Matches as well as International Matches such as the South Pacific Titles (from time to time).

These major matches would impose additional competitive pressures, as well as establishing bench marks against which shooters could plan their build up. International competitions require consistently high average performance with the ability to lift that performance under pressure. Data collected from rostered matches on a continuing basis will reveal those who are possessed of the right characteristics in this regard.

The roster should be able to ensure avoidance of clashing of major matches to the benefit of all concerned.

Our ISU Sub committee will be working toward thrashing out detailed proposals as far as practicable at their September meeting.

Thank you once again for your constructive approach - a ray of sunshine indeed!!"

Naturally, the locals have watched Ray's progress with interest, with none being more interested than Ray's wife and four children.


After his discharge from hospital about the beginning of June, Ray started to feel this peculiar itch in the index finger of his right hand. He failed to recognise the reason until, as part of his rehabilitation, he visited Heathcote Gun Club on June 16.

Although not intending to shoot, mainly because prior to leaving home, he just "didn't feel like it!" the nervous twitch in the index finger suddenly manifested itself as a need to shoot at clay targets. Ray borrowed a gun and immediately demolished a pair of doublerise targets.

This is a tremendous show of courage from anybody, particularly somebody who only a few weeks before had undergone open heart surgery to remove a bullet from his heart.


So it was a true hero's return. Clay busters all over Australia are delighted to see you back on the tracks, Ray.







FROM THE DESK OF THE NATIONAL COACHING DIRECTOR Reaction Time

Because of the realisation that shooting is dependent on reflexes many experiments have been carried out in this field.

Numerous scientific experiments have been carried out attempting to ascertain the extent and scope of this reaction in terms of time.

Instruments can be devised that give a signal, either by sound, sight or touch. This signal is usually called the Stimulus.

The earliest movement made by the person under observation as a result of the Stimulus is called the reaction, and the time between the Stimulus and Reaction can be measured electrically and is called Reaction Time.

In many countries, candidates who wish to learn or are being taught flying are subjected to psychological tests with a view to ascertaining their quickness in reaction under varying and different circumstances.

Similar tests are carried out for intending drivers of racing cars, and the various armies have many of their men put through these tests as well.

The above is mentioned merely to show that what the shooters know as Reaction time is something real and definite, not just theory.

It has been found that not only does the time between Stimulus and Reaction vary very considerably between individuals, but it can vary on different days with the same individual. Further, reaction time is affected differently in different persons by such influences as food, alchohol, tobacco and fatigue, both mental and physical.

So, if it is accepted that Reaction time has an influence on shooting, it will now be seen why some men can shoot better after lunch and others worse. It also shows why some shooters shoot better if they smoke and others who perform poorly after smoking.

Out of all this main fact emerges that Reaction time can be a constantly varying factor and this variation adds to the difficulty of being consistent in shooting performances.

It boils down to the fact that you should know yourself and what improves your performance. A little thought in this direction can yield good dividends.

Shooting at the Melbourne Gun Club prior to 1940, it was coming lunch time and taking my courage in both hands, I asked Mr J. Sutherland or "Calrossie" as he was always known, one of the finest shots we had in those times, if he would care to have lunch with me. He said "I would be delighted my boy, but we will not have lunchwe will have a cup of tea and a biscuit. Before we go in, I would like you to check the scoreboard. Then, after lunch, check it again, after two more rounds have been completed."

The point was so illustrative that from that day on I never ate lunch if I was competing. If I felt hungry, I would have a cup of black tea with plenty of sugar.

There is a little saying applicable to most shooters — "A hungry dog will always hunt better than one that has just been fed!" O



INTERNATIONAL SHOOTING SCENE

The top news currently under this heading is the release of Harry Somers' report on 1979 team selection procedures. This report is published on page 10 of this issue of CTSN.

However another exciting piece of news relates to an invitation from the School of Advanced Markmanship, Fort Benning, USA, to send three delegates to an advanced coaching workshop, being held during October 1979.

This invitation is very opportune as it comes at a time when the development of the expertise within the National Coaching Council can benefit greatly from further technical education. The emphasis is heavily accented towards training of the trainees - the purpose of the course is NOT to improve any attendee's shooting ability.

The Association's planning for the project has been made difficult by the confusion that reigns in the area of arrangements for the 1979 World Shotgun Championships, because of the three delegates chosen to attend Fort Benning, two are members of the 1979 Australian team. These are Newton Thomas and "Pud" Burgess and the third member of the group is Peter Quire.

Australian shooting should reap great benefits from this project, which it is hoped can be repeated each alternate year.

1979 WORLD SHOTGUN CHAMPIONSHIPS

The never-ending saga of the "off again, on again" 1979 World Shotgun Championships continues to drag on.

The latest rumor is that the new venue will be Montecatini in Italy with the dates being some time in October.





TASA REPORT

At the Annual General Meeting of the Tasmanian Amateur Shotgun Association held on 9th June, the following officers were elected:

President Dr. P.F.T. Cains

Secretary/Treasurer: Miss. Cheryl Price

Vice-Presidents: Messrs. L. Toyne and D.R. Taylor

In addition to these elections, the association nominated its Executive Committee members for the term commencing in March 1980 to be:

Mr. D.R. Taylor and Dr. P.F.T. Cains.

Mr. L. Toyne, in declining to accept nomination for a further term and proposing Dr. Cains for the position, said he had been honoured to represent the State, but in view of other commitments believed that new blood was needed at Executive level at a time when the Association was in an exciting phase of development.

It was decided at the meeting to invite the first five place-getters in the interstate team to represent the State at the 1980 Perth Nationals. In addition, a package tour for all Tasmanian members had been negotiated with Ansett Airlines to attend these Nationals, thus becoming the first State Association to organise such a venue.

It was resolved to hold the State Carnival at Hobart on November 29 and 30, 1980 using the same program as this year. The 1980 Commonwealth titles allocated to the State have been distributed thus: Day Mixed Targets — Hobart Gun Club 26th October Night Double Rise — Burnie Gun Club 19th April

The Commonwealth ISU Skeet title has been returned to the ACTA for re-allocation as no club in this State felt it could do justice to this event.

The State Association approved all the amendments to the rule changes to take effect in 1981.

A scheme to instruct all secondary students in the basics of gun safety and clay target shooting is to be formulated by the President and State Coach, Jack Blake and be presented to the State Education and Recreation Department. This has aroused considerable media interest and CTSN readers will be kept fully informed of the developments.

To encourage the pursuit of the two Olympic disciplines, an ISU Committee has been set up under the Chairmanship of Mr. W.R. Morgan to co-ordinate an intrastate coaching program. It is envisaged that it will be possible to shoot trench or ISU Skeet every weekend using the facilities at either Hobart or Launceston.

As the Association enters a new era, the stirling work undertaken by Don Taylor and Len Toyne for TASA will be remembered with gratitude.

Training of junior shooters recently took a set back in northern Queensland, when a regional paper carried a photograph of a 13 year old student after he had won his section at a Clay Target Shoot at Silkwood Gun Club. A diligent policeman saw the press report and threatened to lay charges against the lad because he was under the age of 17. Queensland law states that people below the age of 17 years cannot discharge a firearm.

Naturally such a response met with tought opposition from Club personnel in the area, as all of the Northern Queensland Club's are pursuing a firm policy of training juniors in the safe handling of firearms.

The matter was reported to the Queensland Clay Target Associa-tion, which was able to seek advice from various Government agencies in the Brisbane area. The result of all of this was that the threat of prosecution was removed, and assurances have been received that the proposals for amendments to the Firearms Act, which are currently under review by the State Government, will make provision for juniors to be able to legally use and possess firearms under certain conditions. When more details of the proposed amendments are available, they shall be listed in these columns.

It is interesting to note that during the financial period 1977-78, ten Queensland Gun clubs shared grants totalling \$14 465, which were allocated by the Queensland Government.

The projects undertaken as a result of these grants ranged from drainage of the Ballandean Gun Club to a major upgrade at the Gold Coast Gun Club.

This type of funding assistance is vital to the success and growth of any sport and the Queensland Government is to be complimented for the tangible way in which it is assisting the development of Clay Target shooting







Editors Note: It should be noted that the appointments of "referee examiners" in the above context is a worthwhile move to improve standards, but does NOT carry full international accreditation.







#### **TRADE TOPICS** FEDERAL CARTRIDGE — 56 Year's of Ammunition Experience

Fuller Firearms is importing a wide range of Federal ammunition products. In view of the availability of the products, the following historical information will be of interest to readers.

April 27, 1978, marked the 56th Anniversary of the founding of the "Ammo Only" company, Federal Cartridge Corporation. On that date in 1922, Mr Charles L. Horn became managing partner of the new company, located in the town of Anoka, Minnesota, 20 miles northwest of Minneapolis. Now, 56 years later Mr Horn,

Chairman of the Board of Federal Cartridge Corporation, has his own 56th Anniversary with the company. Federal Cartridge Corporation was founded on the remains of an earlier venture. In 1916, the Federal Cartridge and Machinery Company (later Federal Cartridge Company) was established in Anoka. After an ambitious beginning, the company failed and the facilities sat idle for several years until the reorganisation. By late 1922 the new corporation was selling its "Hi-Power" shotshells. In 1924 rimfire 22's were added to the line. The years since have seen Federal Cartridge grow from a small

company into one of the world's major producers of ammunition. Mr Horne attributes the growth of the company to the development of an experienced force of people dedicated to making the best ammunition available.

In addition to producing sporting cartridges, Federal Cartridge at Anoka began to manufacture ammunition for the United States government during World War II. However, Federal's major military production has been centred 10 miles east of Anoka at New Brighton, Minnesota.

There in 1941 the company contracted to build and operate a large government-owned plant for the manufacture of military small arms ammunition.

This facility, now known as the Twin Cities Army Ammunition Plant, was operated through World War II, with peak employment reaching 25,000 and production reaching 10 million rounds a day. Deactivated in 1945, the plant was reactivated in 1950 for the Korean War and again in 1965 for the Vietnam War. Cartridges produced include .50 calibre, .30 calibre, .45 calibre, 7.62 mm and 5.56 mm. Through this production the head-stamp of TW became known to hundreds of thousands of American servicemen.

Federal's line of ammunition was completed in 1963. With experience gained from production of military small arms ammunition, the company introduced its brand of centrefire rifle and pistol cartridges in that year. O







in that same proportion carry oxygen. This results in 'cutting the wind' or breathlessness, whenever there is exertion.

These combined effects of nicotine and carbon monoxide explain why the shooter must avoid smoking if he is to shoot with the greatest possible skill. This conclusion does not mean that an individual or a team whose members smoke may not win, if it is competing against inferior opponents. The top competition today does not allow a margin of indulgence if you expect to win. Denying yourself a quick drag on the weed is not a sacrifice, it is a necessity for victory.

#### Effect of Drugs on the Human Body

Some shooters have probably tried a sedative drug or tranquilizer to see what effect it would have on their shooting. Drugs affect people in different ways, so dosage would be a problem in addition to accomplishing the desired reduction in anxiety, nervousness, etc. Also, anytime medication or drugs are used that affect the body functions, the side effects may do more harm than good to the shooter's performance.

Some shooters no doubt prescribe certain remedies for themselves when they have a cold, a stopped-up nose or a headache. Most of the effects are not conducive to good shooting. In no way do we wish to imply that any shooter would resort to narcotics.

A depressant slows reflexes, lessens the desire to win, promotes carelessness, causes loss of concentration and co-ordination.

A stimulant causes nervousness, hypertension, increases heartbeat, loss of sensitivity in the touch of the hands, trembling, etc. Most drugs are habit forming and all are a deterrent to good health if used frequently without proper medical advice. There is no substitute for a healthy body and just plain GUTS!

The habitual use of alcohol, coffee, tobacco and various drugs is harmful to the average person and in no way promotes better body coffee pep-up. action. We can be easily fooled by misleading information that such things are helpful. For example, someone may tell us that cigarettes are an aid to digestion. Cigarette smoking after meals does cause the saliva to flow more freely and the heart to beat faster, aiding digestion.
