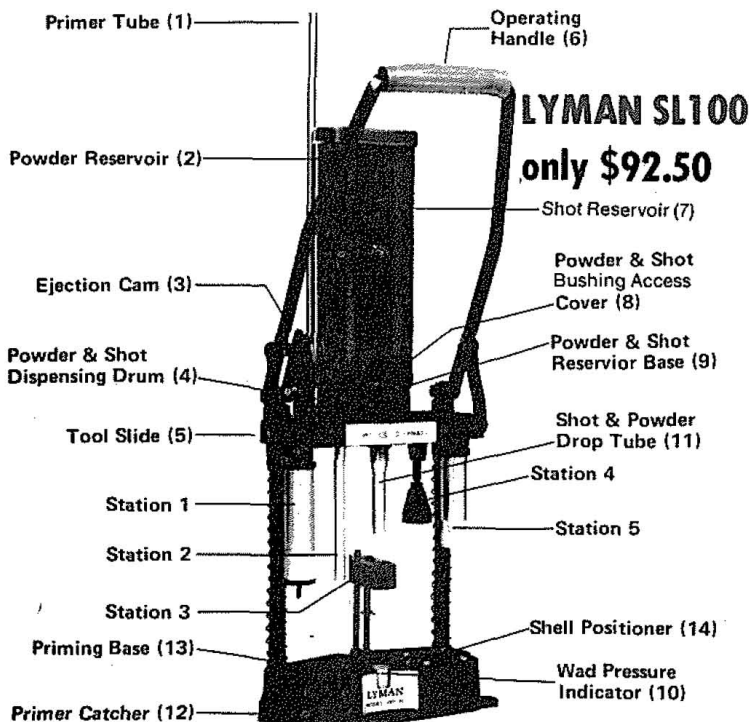
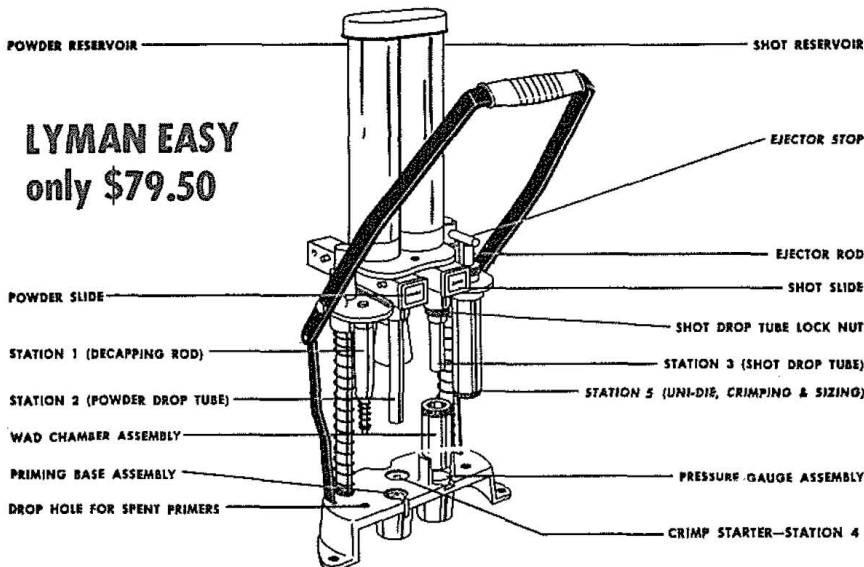

SECRETARY'S NOTES

Although vacations are meant to be enjoyed, the production of Clay Target Shooting News waits for no one. Consequently this column is being written while I am still "having a ball" in South East Asia with members of the Melbourne Gun Club. (A full report on the group's shooting activities commences elsewhere in this issue.)

Due to the nature of this trip, I have been encouraged to give some thought to Australia's involvement in international clay target shooting in both official and unofficial tournaments.

Since 1973, the Association has pursued a policy of entering teams in the top international competition, mainly world championships. Until 1978, only Olympic Trench and ISU Skeet shooters had been catered for.

While this is the result of logical thinking these are the ONLY forms of true international clay target shooting the policy was deficient in that it provided opportunities for only five percent of the Association's total membership.

It is fine to say that all members should be encouraged to switch to these forms of competition, the hard facts of life are that clay-busting is meant to be a sport and sport is for enjoyment.

Therefore, if 95% of members want to play the DTL game, or the American Skeet game, the Executive Committee realised that international opportunities had to be provided in these fields also. Consequently, thanks to the support gained from Air New Zealand, Australia entered DTL teams in North America and New Zealand.

Plans for entry of a DTL team in United Kingdom have been formulated and will be implemented within the next two years.

American Skeet shooters are not being ignored and it seems logical that as soon as this area of the sport is strong enough to support its own "Nationals Carnival" then selection of a team to compete at the North American National Skeet Championships should be considered.

Getting back to the Olympic disciplines, there can be no doubt that best public recognition will come from success in these branches. Therefore every effort must be made to achieve the best possible results from the Association's involvement.

The burning question is are we going about the matter in the correct way? Large sums of money have been expended in the period since 1973 in fielding Australian shotgun teams in World Championships. The money has come from three sources the competitors themselves, the Federal Government through special grants and Association funds.

The thought occurs to me that although Australia now has Jim Ellis and Terry Rumbel at the top of the Olympic Trench tree, our other aspirants for international selection are still very raw in terms of experience. Is it wise to give competitors who are still in the development stage their "blooding" in a world championship event? This question becomes even more relevant when one considers the costs involved.

The alternative is to look for a reasonable standard of competition closer to home. In theory the South Pacific Regional Confederation is Australia's rightful place for "local" international involvement, but since the region includes only Papua New Guinea, New Zealand and Australia (all of which are facing the same financial dilemma) the region has no depth.

What about the Asian Region? Although standards in the Asian region in general are not up to the levels one would find at World Championships, I am slowly beginning to realise that many lessons can be learned from what one could term "second level international competition".

The Asian area includes such nations as Thailand, Singapore, Indonesia, Malaysia, Korea, Philippines and others. Shooting in any of these countries demands the same preparation, dedication, acclimatisation and performances as in World Championships, and yet Australia could field teams in this area at a substantially reduced cost.

As an example, Graeme Boyd, who is currently representing Australia in the ISU Skeet event at the World Championships being held in Italy got his first taste of overseas experience in the discipline by attending the Pesta Sukan Shooting Festival in August, conducted by the Singapore Shooting Association. In company with Alex Crikis, who is also still learning international tricks, Graeme gained more experience in the ten days he spent at the Bukit Timah range in Singapore than he could hope to gain in twelve months competition in Australia.

Yet, had he not had the enthusiasm to arrange this private trip, he would have cut his "international competition teeth" at the 1979 World Championships. There has to be a better way!

This is an opportune time to point out that the opinions expressed in this column are not necessarily Association policies, and are intended only to be thought starters.

Before concluding my comments on official and unofficial overseas tours by Australian shooters, I would like to point out that the teams which represented the Melbourne Gun Club at the Pesta Sukan Shooting Festival held in Singapore, really represented Australia - AND DID IT WELL.

At all times the Australian reputation was uppermost and there can be no doubt that the nation, the National Association and all its members gained a tremendous boost in image as a result of the foresight of the Melbourne Gun Club.

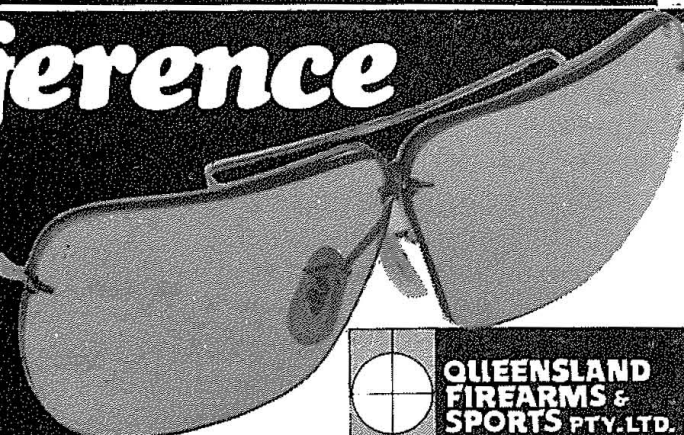

CTSN: Welcome to the CTSN recorder Alex, John and Ian. Can we spare a minute or two to talk about ISU Skeet Shooting in Australia.

CRIKIS: Thanks, it is good to have a talk to people about Skeet shooting.

CTSN: We are talking at the South Pacific Championships Alex. Do you regard it as a top tournament?

CRIKIS: Yes I do. The pressure is right on. It is our final qualifying round for Australian Team selection and with John Woolley here to keep us honest, yes it is a top tournament?

CTSN: This then is the culmination of a year's work for selection possibility. Are you looking ahead to Moscow?

CRIKIS: I sure am, that's the ultimate.

WOOLLEY: That's why I am here.

HALE: Yes, it is a continuing effort.

CTSN: John, you have come across from New Zealand for the competition then?

WOOLLEY: Yes that is so, I have come to Melbourne for an indefinite time to get close to top competition ISU Skeet, to improve my game.

CTSN: In other words you were not getting this type of competition in New Zealand.

WOOLLEY: No, the fact that I won a Gold medal for New Zealand has not made one bit of difference to the ISU shooting scene over there.

CTSN: Well what about the ISU scene here in Australia, is it any better?

WOOLLEY: Yes, at least there is more of it and there is some very healthy competition.

CTSN: What about depth of competition?

HALE: Well I think you can count the best in ISU in either of the shotgun disciplines on two hands, but the performances are there. We have some great potential in this country and the performances are improving almost weekly. There are youngsters coming into the sport now in the lower grades that like the game and the competition provided and are filtering up through the ranks. There is a constant struggle to improve your standard all the time, pressure is coming from the lower ranks. This must bring strength and depth into the sport.

WOOLLEY: The grading system operating here is a great idea, it attracts more shooters to the sport.

CTSN: Is there no grading system in New Zealand?

WOOLLEY: No, not really, in ISU it is straight open competition.

CRIKIS: It is a fact now that there are youngsters coming into ISU skeet that are learning more in three to six months as it took me years to learn. It is a sign of the times, we are coming of age. We have experienced shooters around now that can pass on their knowledge.

CTSN: What about standards in Australia, are they as high as we think they are?

WOOLLEY: Well, to be amongst the medals in World competition you would have to be shooting 97% to 98% and this is about the stage you are reaching in Australia.

HALE: Yes, that is a fair comment, we are around the 95% to 96% fairly consistently now and it will not be long before we get that little bit further. You must remember though that there is only one standard and that is 100%. Anything below that is just not good enough.

But once you are shooting around the 190's you are within striking distance of the big time.

CTSN: So, in world competition would it be fair to say a 194 or 195 would have you around the mark, anything above that becomes a matter of temperament.

CRISIS: Yes, it is those couple of extra targets under pressure that takes you to the top.

WOOLLEY: Condition at these big tournaments have a big bearing on scores. Take the trenches in Canada, a 186 won the gold there.

CTSN: Of the two ISU disciplines which is the harder of the two? We know you will say Skeet, but why?

HALE: Well, it is hard to talk for the trenches, but both games are perfection sports and I don't think there is a lot between them.

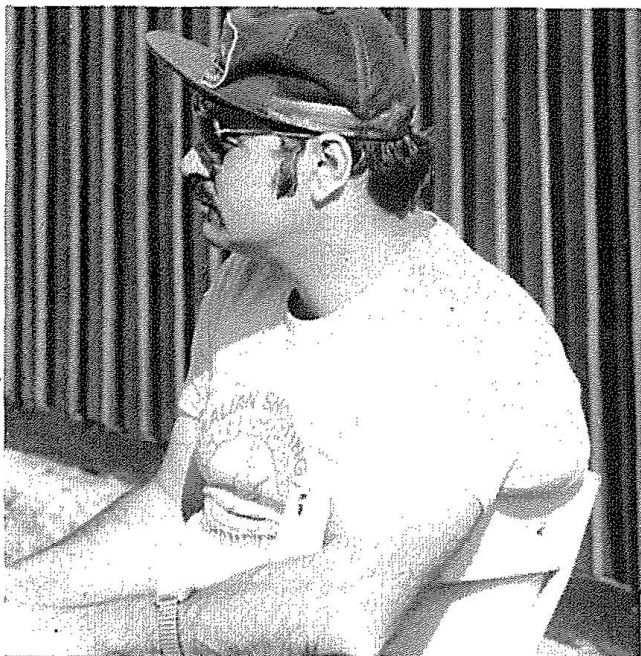
CTSN: That's being very diplomatic.

WOOLLEY: I think you will find that Skeet scores are more consistent than Trench, if that says anything about the differences in the two games.

CTSN: You have all shot overseas. Do you find this level of competition stimulating or is it a grind?

WOOLLEY: It's the top shelf. You cannot force yourself any higher.

HALE: It's the cream on the top, the most stimulating experience you can have in the shooting sports.

CRISIS: It's great, very friendly, pride in representing your country, it's great.

WOOLLEY: The Commonwealth games are great with most competitors speaking English and the atmosphere fairly relaxed. In World competition it is a bit more professional with much more at stake.

HALE: It is a bit difficult for the youngster representing your country for the first time.

CTSN: In what way?

HALE: You have a tendency to become a tourist rather than a competitor and become a bit overawed with the whole thing. This is where a good experienced coach is worth a million dollars.

CTSN: We hear both you Alex and Ian referring to Newton as 'the boss', you obviously have a good working relationship with him, is that so?

HALE: A total working relationship with him.

CTSN: Do you regard him as a good coach?

HALE: The best.

CRISIS: He has had a lot of experience overseas and knows the ins and outs. When you travel with people a couple of times, they talk to you and a lot of things they say do not make a lot of sense. It's like a puzzle, the things they tell you don't fit for a while. But when you understand what the coach is getting at it all begins to fit. Newton has solved a lot of puzzles for me without me knowing it. Yes, he is a good coach.

CTSN TALKS TO THE CHAMPIONS (Cont'd)

CTSN: You have not had access to coaching in New Zealand John, have you?

WOOLLEY: No, I had to work it all out by myself. Even for practice I would have to organize my own trapper boys and help. It was a hard grind to get where I have. No luxuries like hopper fed traps where I come from. The biggest problem was shooting on my own. It is nice to have some company and a sounding board for ideas. It was quite interesting the first time I went overseas, I had been practicing on regulation targets and the first ISU target I saw was quite scary.

CTSN: Do you practice a lot John?

WOOLLEY: No, not a lot. The only time I trained hard was a couple of months before a big tournament or overseas trip or any trials for team selection.

CTSN: Could you put a figure on it? Say a thousand shells a month?

WOOLLEY: No way, I would be lucky to get out twice a week to shoot a couple of rounds.

CTSN: What about you others two?

HALE: Well we have run about 1600 targets in practice and competition over the past couple of months.

CTSN: That is fairly intense if you have done this since Griffith.

HALE: Well yes it is but if you are interested it is worth it.

CTSN: There seems to be a lot of camaraderie between you skeeties. You are obviously a close knit team here at Melbourne Gun Club. Do you find this helps your training?

HALE: Yes, the thing I like about this club is the hassle-free environment that we can train under. We are expected to pull our weight but we get excellent shooting facilities in return.

CTSN: So there is a bit of work involved, we noticed that you were here at 7.30 a.m. this morning Alex organising things.

CRISIS: Well I am a member of the committee and my job is to look after the ISU Skeet. The rest of the boys give me great support and pull their weight and so we get good skeet shooting. All we really do is clean the traps and load them, it's not really that hard, but it is worth it.

WOOLLEY: It's real luxury.

CRISIS: I think another spin off is that before we used to shoot as individuals but now we seem to work as a team. The competition is still there but we are helping each other which is a good thing. We skeet shooters have always been the poor relations compared to the trenches and we have had to work hard for the recognition we have got.

CTSN: What is your status in World competition now John?

WOOLLEY: Since I competed for New Zealand at Montreal I am now a New Zealander and that cannot be changed.

CTSN: What then is behind this improvement in skeet scores in this country then?

CRISIS: I think it is the dedication and experience we have gained overseas. We have learnt a heck of a lot in the past year or two. The first time you go away you think you know everything. It is not until you get there that you realise how much you do not know. Like I say, every time you go away you learn something new.

CTSN: Have you been able to apply this knowledge gained?

CRISIS: Yes, but you must remember that although you can shoot world class scores, you must learn to become a world class competitor. To become a competitor is a lot different than becoming a good shot.

WOOLLEY: They are like chalk and cheese.

CTSN: Hows that? Is the pressure that intense?

WOOLLEY: Yet it is always right on from the word go in world competition, although when I won my Gold I felt very good and relaxed.

CTSN: Who do you regard as the top ISU Skeet nation at the moment?

WOOLLEY: I think the Italians are as good as you will see around.

HALE: That Garagani is a great Skeet shot.

CTSN: Are they a young team?

HALE: No, not really most are middle aged but you can shoot this game at any age as long as you are fit.

CTSN: How do you tackle your fitness John?

WOOLLEY: I play squash, it keeps me fit and sharpens the co-ordination.

CTSN: What about you Alex?

CRISIS: Perhaps a little weight work but not much P.T.

CTSN: You are a bit of a PT freak Ian aren't you?

HALE: Well yes, I do a lot of training, but my biggest problem is weight. I only have to look at a bottle of beer and I put on 10 pounds.

CTSN: Is skeet more physically demanding than trench?

WOOLLEY: Well yes, I think it is. We walk further and we are more susceptible to recoil with the gun being mounted after the target is released. And we have much more violent body movements with the closer targets.

CTSN: Is technique important?

HALE: Yes, but it all boils down to one thing, you must be able to pick the target up quickly and then shoot it confidently.

CTSN: That's a rather simplistic approach?

HALE: Maybe but it is the basis for good skeet shooting. You must be relaxed and have the barrels on the line of flight of the target to get anywhere.

CTSN: What about style, is it important? We notice you have a very relaxed style John, almost classic. Has this evolved naturally?

WOOLLEY: Well more or less. I did a lot of game shooting in England and it probably evolved from that. I think Alex and Ian have more aggressive styles, or they seem so to me.

CRISIS: I don't think it is more aggressive, but you must remember that John shoots his targets with a sustained lead, we swing through. As a result whilst we look aggressive it is mainly being alert for target exit.

HALE: Also most skeet is shot off the leading foot and this looks like it is aggressive.

CTSN: What about ordinance?

WOOLLEY: I shoot a Browning A grade.

CRISIS: Same here.

HALE: I shoot a Franchi Barrage.

CTSN: And shells

HALE: We all shoot Eley Quick Skeet 9's

CTSN: Well, we notice that you are due on to shoot shortly so thank you all for your time and best of luck in the rest of the tournament. One last comment from you Alex.

CRISIS: Well if I was to give any advice to a youngster coming into the ISU game it would be to work at it and the rewards will come. ○

FEDERAL BUDGET 1979/80 GOOD OR BAD NEWS FOR SPORTSMEN?

Staff Writer.

During August, the attention of most senior sports administrators centred on announcement of the 1979/80 Federal Budget.

Prior to "Budget Day" the usual rumours had been circulating as to how the sports development program would fare. These rumours varied from the most pessimistic — "Oh, there will be no increase over last year because Australia's financial position is so grim" — to the wildly optimistic — "Sport will get a minimum of \$5 million".

CTSN staff had a small "wager" with Departmental Officers in Canberra that the allocation would be at least \$2 million. In fact, it was \$2.7 million, which, when compared with the 1978/79 figure of \$1.33 million, shows a healthy increase.

Nevertheless before becoming over enthusiastic because of the increase, let's look at the other facts, the aggregate amount of the more than 100 applications received exceeded \$12 million (clay target shooting was seeking a total of \$85,000, including \$20,000 for the continued appointment of the National Coaching Director.) Consequently, it is quite obvious that \$2.7 million will not go far in satisfying the total needs of all sports.

The Government appointed Sports Advisory Council now has the tough job of making a responsible allocation, which not only meets the priorities of the applicants, but also protects the value of the Government dollar.

The Confederation of Australian Sport, which in the past few years, has played a major role in impressing upon Government the importance of sport in establishing national pride, has issued the following press release:—

"The allocation to sport provided in the Federal Budget announced last night is insufficient for the current needs of national sporting associations. This is the initial and immediate reaction of the Confederation of Australian Sport which represents 100 national sporting organisations with approximately 5.9 million members.

The total allocation of \$2.7 million represents a doubling of the amount provided for sport in the 1978/79 budget if the subsequent commitment of \$800,000 to assist the Australian Olympic Federation is not taken into account. After allowing for the committed funds to the Australian Olympic Federation, the increased allocation to general sport is \$667,000.

The total budget allocation of \$2.7 million now represents about 19c per head of population compared with 50c in England and \$1.29 in Canada.

The President of the Confederation of Australian Sport, Mr. Wayne V. Reid in commenting on the budget did see some cause for optimism. He said that the Confederation and Federal Government were working on the development of a Master Plan for sport in Australia and if the doubling of monies provided to sport by the Federal Government is repeated for the next 2 years resulting in sport receiving almost \$11,000,000 at the end of the 3rd year then Australian sport would be able to effectively carry out programmes that are so urgently needed.

The disappointment in the budget is that the \$5 million minimum level needed to effectively implement any master development plan immediately was not provided. In this light it would seem that in evaluating priorities, the Federal Government has not fully recognised sport as a contributor to national pride; for its value to the community and as a preventative measure to help curb the nation's increasing health bill." ○

AROUND THE TRAPS (from Laurie Connors)

Thursday 26th July, 1979

Jeparit Gun Club in the North West Zone is to host the 1979 Victorian Trap Carnival in October this year.

At a recent meeting of the State Council, it was resolved that Councillors from the South West and North West Zones, along with officials of Jeparit Gun Club, meet at the grounds on this day. The purpose of the meeting was to release different coloured clay targets in an attempt to decide what target was considered to stand out the best, and be easily seen by competitors, in what sometimes can be a difficult back ground. This system is adopted overseas on grounds where major tournaments are held and back grounds are difficult.

Now that manufacturers of clay targets make available a wide range of various colours here in Australia at reasonable cost, we should adopt a similar principle. It is often heard around the traps "If you can't see em, you can't shoot em". Coloured targets won out on this test and the recommendation from the panel to the State Council was that fluorescent banded targets be used at Jeparit for the State Carnival. Ken Miller, the President of Jeparit Gun Club indicated to me, the club would start using these targets at all shoots conducted there prior to the Carnival, giving shooters wishing to do so an opportunity to familiarize themselves with the site conditions and back ground.

Sunday 5th August, 1979

The newly formed Patchewollock Gun Club were having a practice shoot on this day. It is their desire to become affiliated with the A.C.T.A., and have made application to do so. I was invited to attend this day by their President, Bill Bourke, who is a keen shot gun enthusiast and a registered member of the A.C.T.A. Approximately twenty-five shooters were in attendance, with many of them being juniors, eager to learn the art of shot gun shooting. 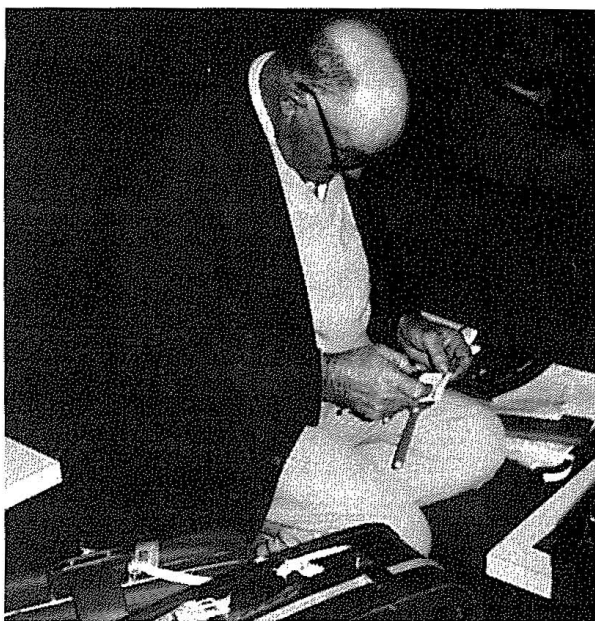

AIR NEW ZEALAND TEAM

After Australia's great showing at its first official appearance at the Grand American Tournament in 1978, where our Air New Zealand Trap Team filled third place in its International debut, expectations were that the 1979 team would learn enough lessons from the '78 team to come home with a gold medal.

What the expectant observers overlooked however was that in the intervening twelve months, other teams had also improved — improved to the extent where Australia's 1979 team was beaten out of a place.

The team together with a support group — total number 14 — left by Sydney Airport on July 30 by Air New Zealand. The team captained by Executive Member Robin Bailey, included Neil Berry (Victoria), Kevin Thompson (NSW), Bill Stevens (Queensland), Peter Telford (South Australia) and Jack Blake (Tasmania).

Arrangements had been made through the Association's official travel consultants Jetset Tours, for the group to have a 31-day holiday, which was built around the 1979 Grand American Tournament.

After arriving in Los Angeles, the party was whisked down the freeway to Anaheim, where all members enjoyed a day and night in Disneyland.

Then they travelled to Vancouver, where the group commenced a five-day bus tour through the beautiful and picturesque Canadian Rockies.

The enjoyment of this section of the tour was slightly marred by a traffic accident involving the ACTA bus — quite minor, but sufficient to force the coach out of service.

The accident occurred between Kamloops and Banff and resulted in the group being left in Banff for the weekend, without transport.

A replacement bus arrived on Monday morning and the group continued to Calgary where a further setback delayed progress. An airport truck had collided with the wing of the aircraft scheduled to take the ACTA party to Chicago.

Eventually, the passengers were flown to Chicago via Toronto, which gave the party a wonderful opportunity to see additional areas of Canada.

On arrival at Chicago, the group joined a Greyhound coach for what turned out to be a very quick transfer from O'Hare Airport to Waukesha, via Milwaukee, the American brewery capital.

Vic Reinders, his wife Tommy and the Waukesha Gun Club members repeated the standards of hospitality which the 1978 group had experienced. Also, Vic put on his usual "smorgasbord" of shooting events — the day was one of the major highlights of the tour.

The party moved on to Dayton and the "business" part of the trip.

After a series of eliminations, Australia's trap team for the International Match was — Robin Bailey (Captain), Neil Berry, Peter Telford, Bill Stevens and Kevin Thompson.

The actual match was conducted over 100 targets Continental from 20 yards, single barrel. Not an easy task, and the team knuckled down to their task with complete dedication.

However, on the day, the targets proved to be too elusive and the team finished with an aggregate score of 395/500, as opposed to the score of 443/500 produced by the 1978 team.

(Full details of the match will appear in a subsequent issue of CTSN).

The Grand American week was the usual colorful glamorous occasion. More than 4000 competitors crammed into the ground and were very professionally accommodated. The usual galaxy of trade booths and merchandise stalls provided more colour, and also gave shooters and visitors many hours of "entertainment".

The Aussies stayed at the Dayton Inn Hotel — the same hotel that was used by the 1978 group. It is truly a home away from home and was the base also used by a number of other visiting shooters.

Special mention must be made of the hospitality extended by the Amateur Trapshooting Association, and Roy and Betty Ann Foxworthy. Roy and Betty Ann are tour directors for the "South Sea Safari" project, which includes a visit to the 1980 Australian Nationals.

At the conclusion of the Grand American program, the Australians travelled to New Orleans for four days — mixed reports from this stopover — and returned via Los Angeles for four days in Honolulu.

Based at the magnificent Waikiki Beachcomber Hotel, the stage was set for a wonderful finale to a most enjoyable tour.

Honolulu turned on its usual charm and there can be no doubt that this is one of earth's most enjoyable resorts.

To complete the tour, members presented tour leader Robin Bailey (who had become known as "Mother Goose") and his wife Sue with small mementos in appreciation for the care and attention they had shown to the group. ○

AUSTRALIAN TEAM SELECTION POLICIES

(from Harry Somers, Chairman of the ISU Subcommittee).

In recent years, Australia has developed a more clearly defined policy on selection procedures leading up to international representation in the Olympic shotgun disciplines.

As with all evolutionary processes, mistakes are made, lessons are learned and changes to the policy result.

In spite of attempts to keep readers informed through the pages of CTSN, there was a significant anti-reaction to the announcement of the 1979 World Championships team.

Yet, the team selection was based on guidelines, clearly defined and published in November 1977 issue of CTSN.

Since the announcement, a statement on the deliberations of the Selection Committee, prepared by the Committee Chairman, Mr Harry Somers, has been published.

The following article has also been prepared by Harry Somers, and sets out the history of the development of the selection policies, making particular reference to some external factors, such as Australian Olympic Federation policies, with which the Australian Clay Target Association has to comply.

The report makes informative reading, and is a genuine attempt to stimulate some constructive and rational thinking on the subject.

(Appreciation of Mr Somers' time must also be recorded, as, similarly to his other colleagues on the National Executive, Harry gives his time to the administration of this sport purely in an honorary capacity. Few people will realise how much time is required to prepare an article of this nature.) Editor's Note.

PART 1 — BACKGROUND

The application of a rational approach to the selection of representatives to take part in shoulder to shoulder competition under ISU Rules is essential, if Australia is to gain and maintain the standing in World Championships Commonwealth Games and Olympic Games which the clay target shooting talent of this nation has the potential capability to achieve.

Apart from the abortive participation in the 1956 Olympic Games, the 1973 World Moving Target Championships in Melbourne were the first major involvement of the ACTA in international competition under ISU Regulations.

Our only experience in team selection up to that time (excluding inter-club team matches for various perpetual trophies) was limited to elimination on a miss and out or countback basis for State teams and the Mackintosh Team which are postal matches (apart from the Australia - New Zealand Teams Match and the International Teams Match conducted during our Nationals each year).

To arrive at an understanding of the need to adopt a different set of criteria for selection of representatives for ISU controlled overseas competition, it is firstly necessary to accept the fact that we have entered onto a global scene, and that the ACTA is only one of many national sporting bodies which are required to fit into an administrative framework which has been developed over a period in excess of 70 years.

This international framework involves all those sports which compete in Olympic Games and/or World Championships, and as a member nation of the British Commonwealth, we have a further complication to cope with in respect to complying with the requirements of the Commonwealth Games controlling body.

To simplify this assessment accept that the International Olympic Council is the supreme world body for the control of the majority of amateur sporting activities and that the IOC recognises the ISU as the authority on all shooting disciplines conducted during Olympic Games.

Each nation competing in Olympic Games has an Olympic Federation in some form, which is affiliated with the International Body.

The national controlling bodies of each participating sport are required to affiliate with the national Olympic body and to comply with the policies, directives and philosophies which emanate from the IOC.

To take Australia specifically, the national Olympic body is the Australian Olympic Federation (AOF).

As to shooting sports, under ISU Regulations, the AOF recognises the Australian Shooting Association (ASA) as the national controlling body.

The ASA is a duly constituted body made up by way of affiliation of each of the national Associations controlling the various shooting sports subject to ISU Regulations, as well as the National Rifle Association.

The AOF does not recognise the individual affiliates covering the various disciplines, it deals only with and through the ASA.

Each affiliate of the ASA has equal representation by the appointment of two delegates to the ASA Council.

A similar structure applies to the Commonwealth Games organisation, and the ACGA recognises the ASA in the same way as does the AOF.

The ASA is charged with the responsibility of ensuring that AOF/ISU Regulations are observed, and in turn, delegates that responsibility to each of the affiliates as to their specific discipline/s.

The ASA is also recognised as the national controlling body as to our participation in World Championships in non Olympic years.

The affiliation of the ACTA with the ASA to permit Australians to compete in World Championships and Olympic Games in clay target disciplines required the ACTA to accept and comply with a set of Rules and Regulations which are generally applicable throughout the world.

Whereas the ACTA can act autonomously with regard to the administration and regulation of our traditional DTL and SKEET competitions within Australia, the Association is bound by a differing set of requirements as to administration and competition in accord with international requirements, and cannot act autonomously in that field.

There are provisions in the Constitutions of both IOC and ISU which ensure that changes can be brought about by due democratic process; however the process is slow because of the need for agreement to be reached by all international affiliates, and the differing views and conditions which apply from country to country.

Reverting now to the Australian scene — the AOF must be acknowledged as the senior national controlling authority.

The AOF is concerned primarily with Olympic Competition (each 4 years) and delegates to the ASA, the responsibility for the control of the activities of the various ISU disciplines through the respective affiliates.

In non-Olympic years the ASA is responsible for Australian participation in World Championships (and Commonwealth Games as applicable).

The ASA delegates to the respective affiliates, the responsibility for administration of their particular disciplines in accord with the policies and other requirements of the AOF and the ISU, together with those of the ASA.

It must be accepted that the ultimate goal in international competition is to take part in Olympic Games and to perform creditably.

World Championships provide the means by which to maintain continuity of international competition, as well as the opportunity to build up the experience and performance record of competitors and to develop the potential of promising talent.

The funding of participation in World Championships is the responsibility of each discipline. However, it is vital to appreciate that the funding of Olympic Games and Commonwealth Games is the responsibility of the AOF and the ACGA respectively, and much of the money comes from government sources.

The AOF and ACGA administrators are quite properly accountable for the best possible use of those funds in every way, including results achieved in return for the expenditure.

In view of the above accountability, those administrators reserve the right to the final say in team and individual selections, and have established "Justification Committees" which are charged with reviewing the recommendations of each affiliate, they have the power to accept and/or reject all or any individuals or teams in all the sports participating.

It is important to appreciate that, in our ISU disciplines, we are not only competing against other shooting disciplines, we are in fact competing with all other sports for the desired number of places in the Games contingent.

The justification tribunals have available the most up to date and comprehensive global data relevant to national and international performance levels and measure the likely performance of potential competitors against those standards. A great deal of emphasis is placed on previous experience and performance in overseas competition.

It is an acknowledged fact that, as far as the shooting sports are

concerned, competitors without adequate overseas experience stand no chance of being accepted for inclusion in Olympic or Commonwealth Games, irrespective of the level of performance achieved within Australia.

There we have the background — our particular field of interest is a miniscule part of the complex global structure — independent action by the ACTA as to ISU disciplines is impossible — if we wish to continue to compete in these disciplines on an international basis we must be prepared to conform with the requirements of the global structure — the alternative would be to disaffiliate from the ASA which would mean withdrawal from the international scene — an option which would set us back over 20 years and deny future generations of potential international representatives the opportunity to compete for Australia in World Championships and/or Olympic Games.

Surely we do not want to see history repeat itself — the ACTA Executive of the day took the latter decision after the Olympic Games in 1956, and thereby denied many of us the chance to achieve the ultimate honour in our sporting field for a period of 17 years — an incredibly parochial, small-minded, short-thinking blunder.

There are undoubtedly a number of shooters who have no interest whatsoever in the ISU disciplines, and would be quite happy to see the ACTA withdraw from the ISU involvement. However, the ACTA has a responsibility to that minor but growing percentage of the clay target shooting fraternity who have the dedication, interest and ambition in the ISU disciplines, and believes that it has a major obligation to provide those shooters with the opportunity, to represent our nation in competition against the best in the world.

The loss of freedom is a small price to pay when considered against the opportunities prestige and honour which can accrue to competitors, our sport, our Association, and our nation. ○

INTERNATIONAL SHOOTING SCENE

The Australian shotgun team to compete in the 1979 World Championships left Australia on September 26. The team arrived in Rome on September 27 and used the period before the commencement of official practice to become acclimatised.

The team is the best to ever leave Australia and under the direction of manager Newton Thomas, should acquit itself well.

The preparation of the team was dominated by the visit of Jim Ellis to Moscow, Helsinki and Great Britain. During this trip, Ellis ran twelfth with a 191 in the Spartakiade competition in Moscow, fifth with a 192 in an international match at Helsinki, and third in the British Grand Prix.

Meanwhile, Alex Crikis and Graeme Boyd competed in the International Skeet match at Singapore, with Crikis winning the match with a venue record of 186, and Boyd coming in third on 180.

When one considers the incredibly difficult nature of the Singapore Gun Club's ground (see full report elsewhere in this issue) these scores are extremely good. The experience gained during this campaign will stand the two "skeeties" in good stead in the World Championships, especially Boyd who has been shooting ISU for only a short time.

The South East Asian Games were conducted in Jakarta, Indonesia, during September. The clay target matches attracted entries from Malaysia, Thailand, Philippines, Singapore and Indonesia. It is hoped that a report of the match will appear in November issue of CTSN.

New Zealand has scheduled the 1980 South Pacific Regional Championships for the last weekend in January. As this is the Australia day holiday weekend, when a major sporting fixture including shooting is to be held in Canberra, it would seem unlikely that Australia will be represented in the shotgun events.

This is a very unfortunate development, as the Region is already severely limited because of lack of numbers. However, the Region has been plagued with a communications problem for almost its entire existence.

At Australian Shooting Association level, the ACTA delegates have made repeated attempts to bring about some usefulness in the relationship, but continues to be a voice in the wilderness.

(from John Doyle)

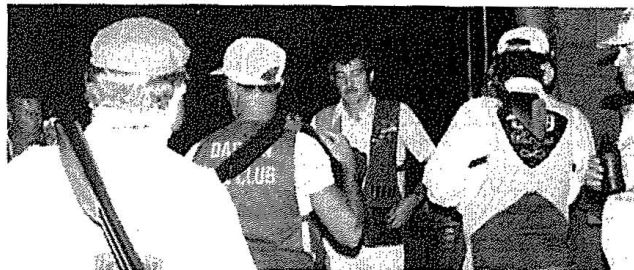

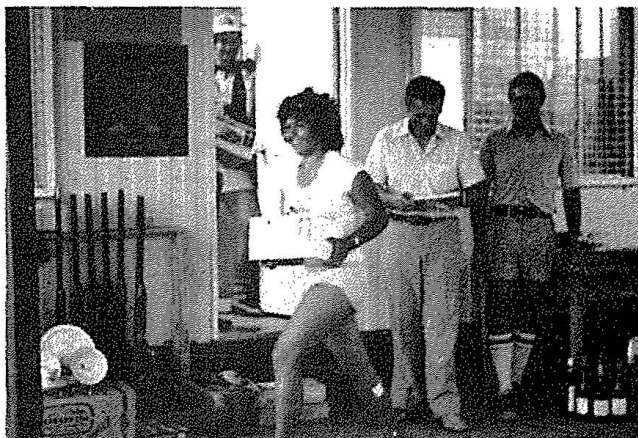

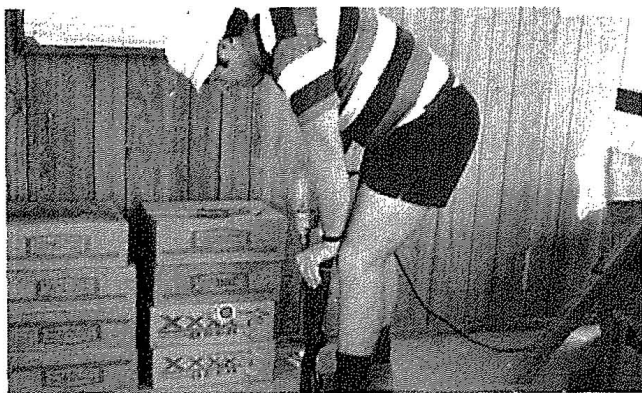

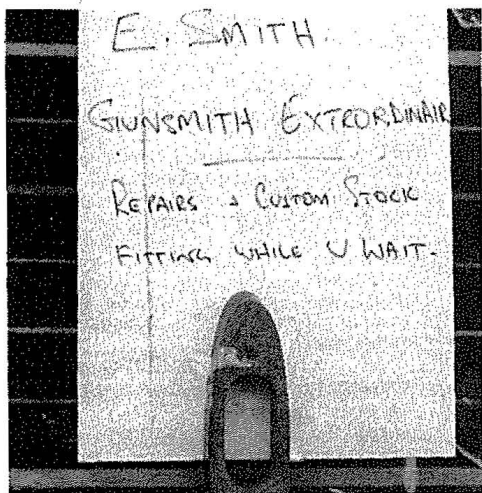

Bob Vandersman, with another fifty break gained 15-18, Chris Mahoney 11-14, Gordon Worrall 19-25 trophies. Mary Stacey accepted the Ladies, with daughter Brenda the Junior, and Leo Jessop again took out the veterans award (donated by Fishing World).

Overall High Gun, a digital alarm watch, went to Ray McDonald with 170/185, Mary Stacey had an easy triumph in the Ladies section, with 150/185. Peter Bowring came home slowly, but won the Junior award. Ray Viney, after a tussle with Leo Jessop, took the Veterans High Gun.

Local President, Kev Bowring and the National President, Ern Hawkins presented the trophies, with Ross Baillie and Dick Ayres doing the honours for Winchester. For those mystified by the names of the events, I am assured by the Programmer that all these people played an important part in the history of the Northern Territory, Sir Staniforth Smith being the Acting Administrator in 1919-1921. ○

On November 11, a further 100 target match will be conducted to provide true international conditions.

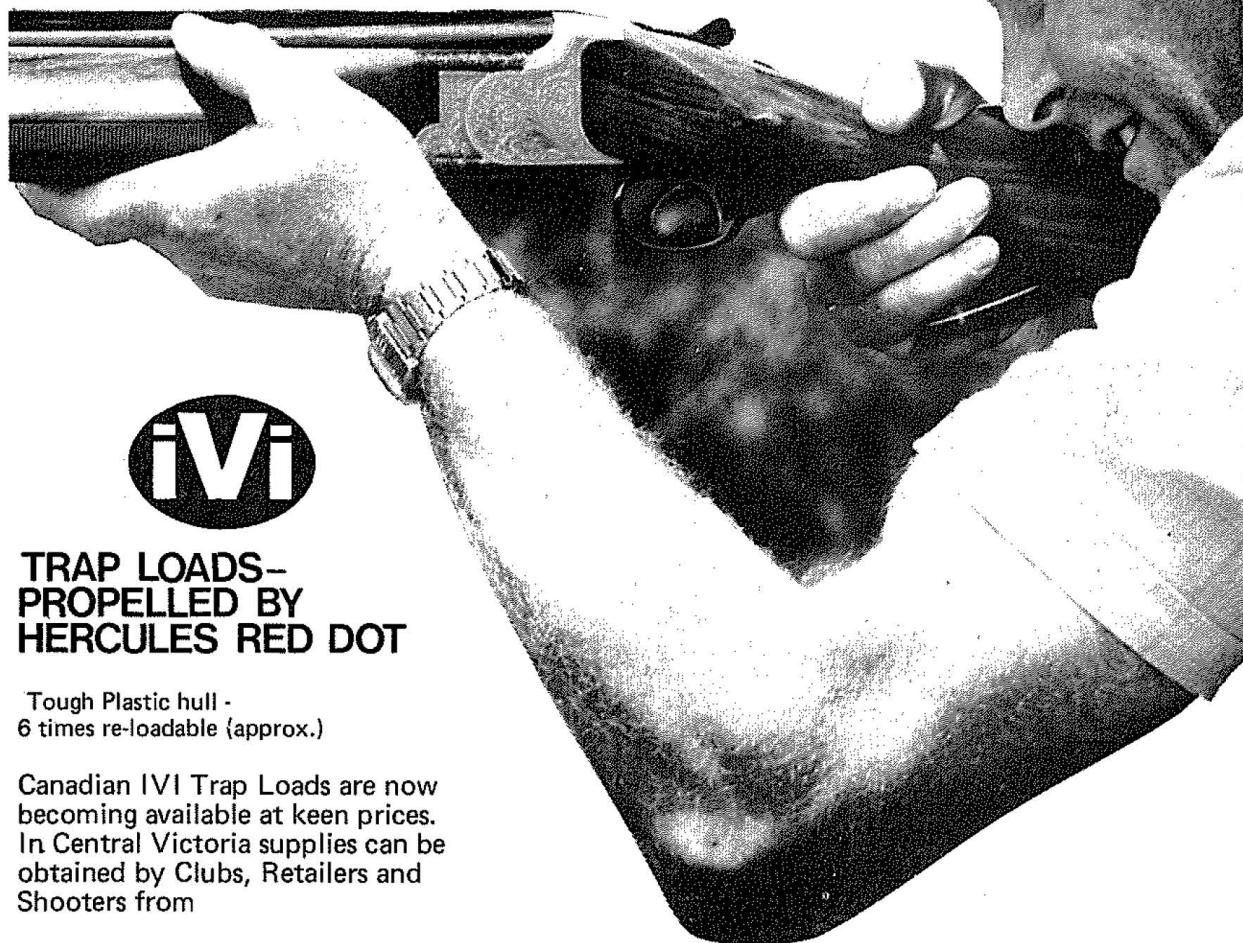
The club has been very active in promoting the match and has programmed a number of 100 target matches during October to allow the local enthusiasts the opportunity to train.

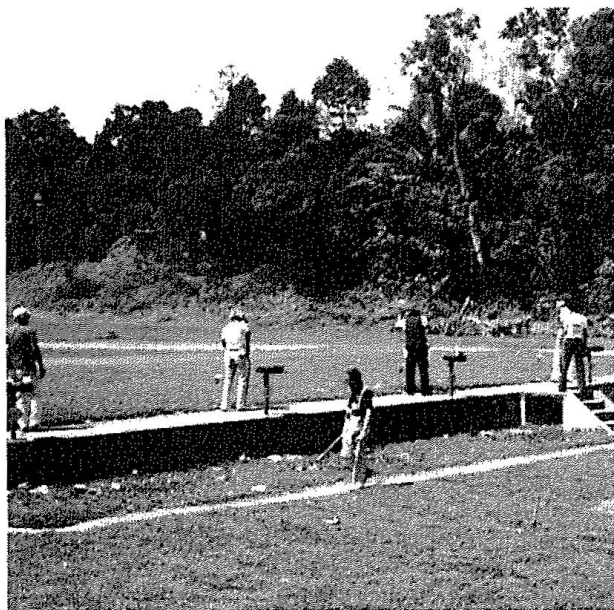

AUSTRALIA'S ASSAULT ON SOUTH EAST ASIA CONTINUED

The Melbourne Gun Club, supported by the Italian based Veneto Club, fielded teams in the 1979 Pesta Sukan Shooting Festival recently completed in Singapore.

Conducted on the shooting ground controlled by the Singapore Shooting Association, the tournament attracted entries from six nations in trap (Olympic Trench) and from five nations in skeet.

Australia had 11 shooters in trap and in skeet.

Attached to the shooting teams was a holiday group of wives and friends, travelling on an itinerary put together by Merv Whitelaw of Melbourne Gun Club.

Merv gave some ideas to the Association's travel consultants, Jetset Tours, which was able to convert the whole idea into a very worthwhile 24 days package. It should be mentioned here that Jetset Tours has extensive contacts in the Orient area, which results in not only most attractive accommodation rates being available, but also made provision for a local guide to be with the group on most days.

The outbound flight from Australia was by a British Airway Jumbo out of Sydney. The aircraft was eight hours late arriving in Australia, and in an attempt to reduce the turn around time, it was obvious that a lot of housekeeping jobs had been sacrificed.

The cabin still showed clear signs of the untidiness of the disembarking passengers, but at least the delay was minimised and the flight left Sydney only 1½ hours late.

The flight of almost eight hours was uneventful and the group arrived in Singapore just before midnight (local time). It was met by Stephen Yap, Secretary of the Singapore Shooting Association, Dr Leonard, Liaison Officer for the Pesta Sukan Tournament and a number of members of the Singapore Gun Club.

Because of Singapore's rigid controls on firearms, it was necessary to have the group's shotguns checked by Customs and then sent direct to the Club's armoury, together with a police escort. Stephen Yap's experience was invaluable, and the party completed customs and immigration procedures quickly and with no inconvenience.

Also at the airport to meet the Australian party was Jetset Tours local representative, George Maartensz. He arranged for the baggage to be moved to the group's home for the next 10 days, the Oberoi Imperial Hotel.

Practice was available at the range the following day so most of the men headed towards the club while the girls decided to get some shopping practice.

Singapore is still a shopper's paradise although some of the bargains are starting to disappear. Founded in 1819 by Sir Stamford

Raffles, Singapore has developed into the world's fourth busiest port. Now a republic, the rate of progress and development in this area is a real eye opener.

One of the most interesting areas of Singapore through the eyes of a tourist is "Change Alley" a pokey little arcade housing literally hundreds of small retail kiosks where one may buy anything from a pipe cleaner to a bedroom suite. The real thrill is to bargain, and one should never buy until the original quoted price has been cut by at least half.

This, and Singapore's many multi level shopping centres, kept the "girls" happy and occupied for the full period of the Pesta Sukan Tournament.

Before reporting the shooting match, a brief description of the ground should be written.

The field includes one skeet facility superimposed over a trench ground. Both are set in a narrow tract of land, flanked on both sides by thick jungle. Consequently, swinging trench targets or skeet targets from stations 1 and 2, and 6 and 7 proved under certain light conditions, to be unshootable. Since the jungle came right to the

sides of the two skeet houses, readers can develop a vivid picture of how tough some targets were — the task of shooting was made more difficult by the choice of yellow targets.

Nevertheless, in spite of the foregoing, the equality of the competition was unaffected, and the administration of the tournament was of a high standard. Club Secretary Stephen Yap was very well supported by senior referee Chan.

The trap match commenced at 8 a.m. on Monday, August 6. Thirty-four competitors faced the "starter's gun" with the most favoured being Lee Kum Cheok of Singapore, Gazaseni Pavitr of Thailand and Barry Nelis of Australia.

After the first 75 targets, Cheok led the field on 68, with Pavitr (20, 24, 23) on 67, only one point behind.

The second day saw the squadding order reversed and the shooters who were able to sleep in on the opening day, found themselves on the tracks at sunrise. Under hot, humid conditions, with the light varying due to the overcast, the field fought its way through the second seventy five targets.

Also of interest was the keen tussle which was developing in the teams section. Although teams consisted of up to six members, only the top four scores counted. Overnight, Thailand had lead in the teams' match on 253. Melbourne Gun Club was third on 238, six targets behind Singapore.

In the first round on day two, many of the Melbourne Gun Club team faltered, and the best score was Alex Crikis' 20.

Frank Cuartero was starring for the other Australian entry, Veneto Shooters Club and shot a 23. However, as the day progressed, the Veneto challenge subsided, while Crikis and Whitelaw carded 23's for Melbourne.

Thailand continued to dominate, although Singapore hung in there, and with the last squad to shoot, Thailand's Pachonyut Dunrong had to shoot a 21 or better to clinch the teams event for his country.

The ever cool Thai produced a champion's effort and a 24 appeared against his name. This gave Thailand the team gold medal with 506/600, Singapore retained second place on 503/600, while Melbourne Gun Club "staggered" into third place with 478, Veneto scored 433.

The individual match was brimming with interest after 150 targets. Tan Boon Huat of Singapore was leading on 133, closely followed by Pavitr (Thailand) on 132 and Dunrong (Thailand) on 130. Barry Nelis, of Brisbane and shooting for Veneto was on 128 and still had a remote chance of gaining a medal.

The field was cut by half before shooting the last 50 targets. Nelis shot a 22 and 20, Max Vipond 21, 23 but were left in the dust of Tan Boon Huat, who rattled on a 47 to take the individual gold medal — score 180. Thailand's Pavitr was second on 175 and Mui Sam Loong of the Royal Johore Shooting Association, with a score of 170 was placed third after a shoot off with Nelis.

By this time, it was Wednesday and the competitors and officials had been invited to a buffet dinner at the "Istana", the royal palace of the Tunku of Johore.

The report will be continued in November issue of CTSN, and a full report of the skeet will be included. ○

FROM THE DESK OF THE NATIONAL COACHING DIRECTOR...

TEAM SHOOTING

by Newton Thomas

To be a part of a shooting team, irrespective of whether the level is Club or International, is one of the most rewarding experiences that one can have in a lifetime of shooting.

Inter-club, District, or State Teams' Matches must become a major feature of clay target shooting, and will do much to improve the standard and development of our sport.

It is when one has been selected in a team and wants to perform above one's best that factors not apparent when shooting as an individual come to light. Firstly the thought that one cannot let the team down intrudes on one's mind and consequently the shooter has a tendency to try too hard and because he or she forsakes their natural style, runs into real trouble.

When shooting in teams, do not change anything from your normal routine, just realise that the stimulus of this type of competition, if used correctly, will give you all the impetus you need. If you concentrate and practice this, you will be most satisfied with the results.

One of the great problems encountered by both new and experienced shooters is that a miss becomes out of proportion as to its real value and becomes an effective force in creating a climate for further errors.

One should immediately think ahead to the next target — not backwards towards the miss as so many shooters do. The only thing that you can do by worrying about missing a target (we all have and will) is to make it harder for yourself to complete the round, putting an additional mental load on a mind that should only have one purpose, the next target to be shot.

When one shoots in a team one should be a true member of it, not an isolated individual and in most cases a very experienced shot can be a tower of strength to a team if he appreciates this fact and acts on it. He can quieten nerves (which by the way we all must have if we want to perform well); see that equipment and squadding, etc., is correct; and generally can assist in building morale.

A team should have pride in itself and what it represents, either Nation, State, District or Club. This pride is a key factor in team performance — you are shooting for something much greater than yourself, and must be aware of it, as it can have quite an astonishing effect on improving final scores.

Major team competition should lift individual scores by at least two targets per hundred fired at. This is a figure looked for by the major competitive nations taking part in these shooting sports.

Once a shooter is selected in a team, irrespective of its status, he or she then has an obligation to the background of that team — be it Club, District, State or National.

Take National teams as an example.

Once selected on a team at National level, you then have a responsibility to the people of your country, the Government of your country (because of funding) ambassadorial representation when you go overseas, etc., your National Association and all its members for selection and funding — (also local firearms and ammunition dealers for very beneficial handouts) in all quite a few organisations and people.

Unfortunately, we have shooters, luckily in a minority, who feel the other way. Because of their supposed abilities, they feel that it is owed to them and that they should be selected automatically.

There is also another type of shooter not unknown on the national scene, who puts great effort into selection trials and eliminations and once selected as a good trip at the expense of all the people who both selected and financed the team trip, but has little thought of major effort that is required from team members at this level.

The above types from the two preceding paragraphs do not make good team members. ○

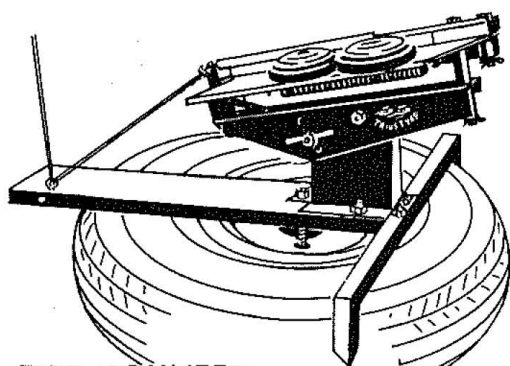

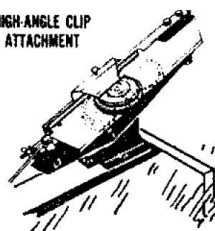

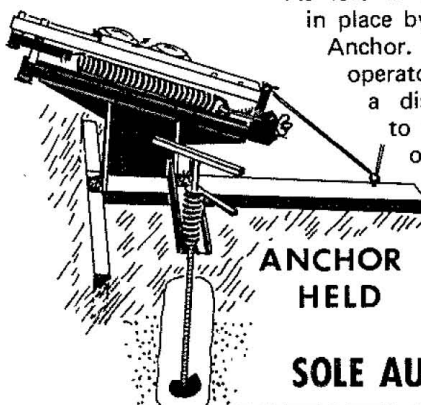

On Saturday, August 18, we travelled to Hamilton Gun Club in Victoria's Western District for the first South West Zone Carnival and a Winchester Tournament. Some 120 shooters attended this shoot including 6 women. The best lady trophy in the first event, the double barrel championship was won after a shootoff by June Gawith of Jeparit Gun Club, while the Ladies Division of the Winchester Tournament was won by Karen Williams after a shootoff with Margaret Pitt also of Jeparit Gun Club. I was very impressed with Hamilton Gun Club, it was our first visit there and I hope not our last. The club has 50 members, two traps and shoots once a month. The grounds are well cared for and I would say a great deal of work had gone into their preparation for this shoot. They have a comfortable club house, which is well heated, fortunately, as the only thing to mar the day was the rain which stayed with us fairly consistently. The club is to be congratulated on the conducting of the first South West Zone Carnival, particularly to their gravel voiced President who was also the shoot marshal.

This is starting to sound like "Around The Traps", on the weekend of August 25-26 we travelled to Downside International Gun Club just outside Wagga N.S.W. for their Champion of Champion's Shoot, and what a weekend it was.

Downside, who have only been operating for some 18 months have really done a great job with their grounds which are at present having the final touches put to it for the National Trench and I.S.U. Skeet Championships to be held there early in November. Their club house is a converted R.A.A.F. barracks, with partitions knocked out, some work done on the interior and a coat of paint, which the committee have turned into a comfortable club house, with a good

size kitchen, office and what was quickly pointed out to me, indoor toilets.

Visitors came from Sydney, Melbourne, southern N.S.W. and northern Victorian clubs, so many shooters in fact, that Event 5 and the Champion of Champions had to be shot under lights without too many hassles. Downside have 2 women shooters, who showed their style over the programme. The first event, a double barrel championship, gave a second place in "C" grade to Lynette Blake with a good score of 31,33. Joan Alexander, another local lady, won the 11-14 metre group in the Handicap with a score of 31-31 to win a very beautiful set of cut crystal long stemmed goblets, plus 1 metre, which takes her from 12 to 13 metres. Downside encourage women shooters by giving half nominations also to juniors, as do many clubs in the area. The ladies of the club are to be congratulated on their catering, particularly as the number of shooters far outnumbered that expected, and if there was any panic, when on Saturday the shoot went into the night, they certainly did not show it and everyone was fed with an evening meal.

A subject that was brought to my attention over my travels, and one which I feel very strongly about, is the handicapping of women shooters on women's events, where shooters may not have even shot a possible to win the ladies' trophy. I feel sure I speak for all of us when I say that in open competition no-one should mind being handicapped for trophies won, however in women's events where there are a limited number of competitors I feel the rule referring to minimum entry in a "class" should be interpreted to include divisions - i.e. junior division, veteran division and ladies division.

So girls get yourself a copy of the A.C.T.A. rules and be ready for the next time this occurs. I feel sure it is not intentional on the part of the Secretaries of the clubs you attend, but with more women participating in this sport, some secretaries may not be familiar with this rule.

Away from the serious side, my informant in Victoria tells me that we will be losing one of our women shooters to Queensland and Queensland will be repatriating one of their women back to Victoria. I am talking of the latest Winchester move, with Chris Lowry, wife of Ray returning to Melbourne and Brenda Dupuy, wife of Bob, moving to Brisbane in the near future, best wishes Brenda and welcome home Chris.

I hear the Jin Ellis's have produced a new future member to the shotgunning sport, Ann, who I think we can claim in this column as I understand she met Jim while shooting in Canberra, gave birth to a daughter recently, best wishes Ann and Jim.

Until next month, with a bit of luck, smile at that new face at your club, remember what it was like when you first joined. ○

One of the reasons for the increase is the developing interest being shown by sponsors.



5. Score sheets, signed by Club Secretary and referee should be forwarded to Mrs. E. Churches, 945 South Road, Edwardstown S.A. 5039, prior to December 13, 1979.

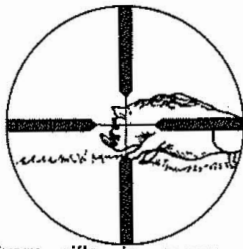

EDITOR'S MAILBOX

Dear Sir,

Re: A.C.T.A. Junior Shooters under the age of 17 years.

A lot of concern has arisen out of several incidents which have occurred in North Queensland involving registered members of the A.C.T.A. under the age of 17 years, with the Local Police Force.

In accordance to the Firearms Acts 1927 to 1959 section 14A(1), any person under the age of 17 years who discharges, carries, buys, sells or has in his possession any firearm or any kind of ammunition for a firearm shall be guilty of an offence. The Act also states (Section 14 (4) (a) that a Permit may be issued by a member of the Police Force for the time being in charge of the Police District in which such person resides or is employed.

As quite a number of shooters are unaware of this legislation, I have to request that you notify all members of its existence, as soon as possible. Perhaps in the next Journal!

It is a very important matter, as the local Police, under instruction from the Inspector, will be checking up on shooters who visit this district and could cause some friction between clubs, when other district shooters who may not appear to be over the age of 17 and have no permit and no proof of age, drive 600 miles for a shoot only to find they've not been allowed to shoot. It is noted that Registration Cards do not state the date of birth of the member.

We believe there should be harmony between clubs, but when these sort of incidents occur it doesn't help with interclub relations and as it is our aim to maintain such harmony, on behalf of all underage shooters and the well-being of all clubs, I once again request your urgent attention and reply in this matter. ○

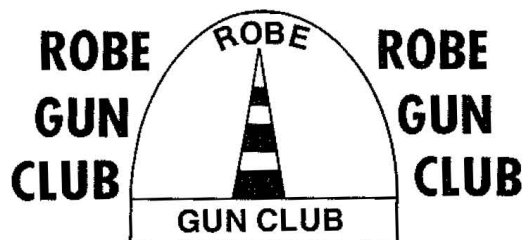
INTERNATIONAL SHOOTING SCENE (Cont'd)

At its recent Council meeting held at the grounds of the Bendigo Clay Target Club, the Victorian Clay Target Association discussed the controversy that arose out of the police raid on a live pigeon match near Benalla.

It was resolved by a majority vote that "the VCTA does not support the de-registration of ACTA members who are found live-bird shooting."

During the debate, the general feeling appeared to be that offenders should not be penalised twice for one offence however, it could be argued that this approach tends to ignore the image and status of the remaining 10950 ACTA members who have worked so hard to become accepted in the community.

The VCTA has asked that the matter be placed on the agenda for the next National Executive Committee meeting.

The subject of the venue for the 1981 National Championships was also extensively discussed, and the Chairman, Bob Buchan, asked his councillors to ensure that they were fully familiar with the details of all the applications received from potential host clubs.

A special meeting of the Council will be convened to confirm the decision. (This will be reported in the next issue of CTSN).

On the international discipline scene, the Victorian ISU Sub Committee is proceeding with a plan to establish a State training squad. The object of this exercise is to improve the standards of Olympic Trench and ISU Skeet shooters.

The State Association is entering a busy time with the Trap Carnival being held at Jeparit late in October and the Skeet Carnival being held at Geelong in November.

These are the major promotions of the State Association for the year, and are sure to be very well supported.

On the coaching scene, many clubs have named their nomination for accreditation as Club Coach, and the State Director, George Biggs, will liaise with the Zone Coaches to complete the training of each nominee.

Turning now to the possibility of developing a State Shooting Headquarters, a meeting of all interested parties was held during the first half of August.

The meeting was attended by almost forty people, representing seventeen organisations and companies which could become involved in the project.

Held on a potential site for the complex, on Commonwealth owned property at Tullamarine, just north of Melbourne, the meeting was chaired by Mr Tom Edmunds MLA for Ascot Vale, and the former Shadow Chief Secretary for Victoria.

The level of interest was extremely high, and a further meeting is to be held as soon as possible, at which it is expected that a formal planning committee will be formed.

In his guiding of the project to this stage, Len Hubbard, Secretary of Metropolitan Clay Target Club, has made extensive use of information prepared by the supporters of the ACT Shooting Association proposal, and the Monarto complex, already part completed in South East South Australia.

Len, who has been plagued by health problems in recent months, is to be commended for the dedication he has shown to this project.

The various shooting associations in Victoria have been in slight disarray since the disastrous political advertising campaign undertaken by the Victorian Firearms Owners Committee, and this project could provide the stimulus to again show a united front.

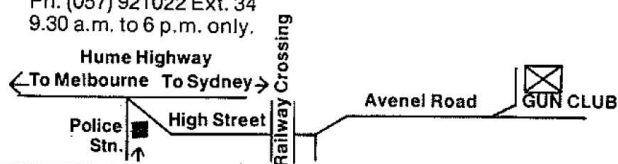

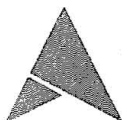

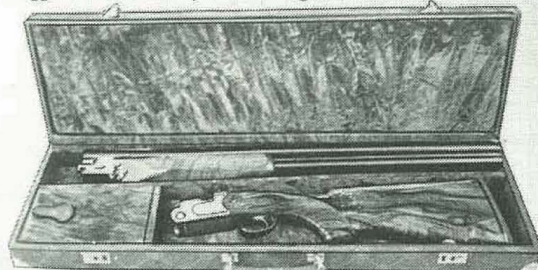
