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
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

AUSTRALIAN CLAY TARGET SHOOTING NEWS-NOVEMBER



Are clubs overdoing major tournaments? This is a question that is being asked more regularly, especially since it has now been accepted that it is IMPOSSIBLE to squeeze more than five weekends into any one month. The matter is being further aggravated by the predominance of four weekend months.

The number of major tournaments available to clay target competitors today is almost limitless. National championships, State Carnivals, Zone Carnivals, Inter Club Tournaments, Winchester Tournaments, Eley Waratah Classics and Teams' Premierships – where will it end?

But, should we growl? Surely, growth in our sport must be complemented by growth in the competition structure. Perhaps the problem is more related to administration. Maybe, some of these matches are being allocated to the wrong clubs.

Alternatively, perhaps insufficient support to host clubs is being offered by tournament organizers.

One thing is certain. Even stronger than the desire to win is the need to enjoy oneself at a clay target tournament. It is agreed that winning a trophy enhances still further the enjoyment aspects — nevertheless, it is the enjoyment factor that entrepeneurs should have uppermost in their minds during the planning stages.

More to the point, ALL Club committees should make providing enjoyment through recreation their prime motive. If this theme can be developed, it will soon appear obvious that each club is filling a very real community need.

Speaking of large tournaments and the enjoyment level that can be achieved, the Eastern States Gumtree Championship is one of the greatest examples of camaraderie that I have yet seen in this sport.

Run for thirteen successive years by the Boggabri and Gunnedah Gun Clubs, the match is a true "bush shoot" or to use the current European nomenclature, a "sporting clays" shoot.

The match spans two days, and consists of several rounds of 25 targets in combinations designed to simulate field shooting. Situated on the property of well-known northern NSW identity, Vic Eather, the location is on the steep banks of the Namoi River.

The 1979 event attracted almost 250 entries, and although the weather turned a little sour, the obvious enjoyment that the competitors derived from shooting these elusive targets was wonderful to see. Possibles were very few, but this did not seem to matter. Here, just for once, was a situation where the real event was man versus target, rather than competitor versus competitor.

Sure there were some very worthwhile trophies to be won, and winners were accorded their rightful and traditional respect. But the fun was still evident. At this match, there was no tension, no growls, no disputes. Just

At this match, there was no tension, no growls, no disputes. Just good clean family fun. No doubt, this was in part due to the perfect preparations that Stan McMasters (President) Stephen Brown (Secretary) Vic Eather and many other committee members had put in, prior to the match.

This standard was maintained throughout - every person who had been allocated a task was "on time all the time"!

During the same weekend, I was fortunate to attend a second major tournament. This time, it was a State Trap Carnival - NSW style.

Over two hundred and twenty entries were attracted to this match on the main day - it was a three day carnival. The host club -Queanbeyan Canberra Gun Club - had put similar effort into its planning and the match ran incredibly smoothly, from an administrative point of view.

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Here, we saw champion shooters from New South Wales and Victoria gather to do battle for valuable awards. In fact, one of the many good things done by the club was to prepare a "trophy donors' board", on which were listed the details of sponsors for the match. The list was quite impressive.

The list was quite impressive. The prime "trophy" was to win one of the 15 coveted places in the State Trap Team, both Open and Ladies.

In marked contrast to the "bush Shoot" (no-one has yet convinced me that comparisons are odious!), the atmosphere at the carnival was charged with tension. As tangible evidence of this, the jury was used to arbitrate on seven disputes during the last of the qualifying events leading up to selection in the State Team.

Further evidence came when one or two shooters expressed their disappointment (or was it frustration?) when, due to the distance to be travelled home, they called at the tournament office before the end of the program to collect sweeps or whatever, only to be told that the calculations were not at that time complete.

The whole point of this discussion is to provide a reminder that clay target shooting of all sorts is meant to be fun. It is meant to be a recreation, and recreation is meant to be synonymous with ENJOYMENT.

As our sport grows, we must not overlook the tradifion that has been established over many, many years — whilst winning may be important, SPORTSMANSHIP IS VITAL! Good Shooting


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CTSN: Well, Terry & Jim, welcome to the CTSN microphone. Bill Iles will be joining us shortly to make this a 'Three Way Trench Talk', but in the 'meantime lets go into your history as Trench shooters. Both of you are automatic selections in the Australian Trench Team, obviously you have worked hard for this honour, what are your opinions on ISU shooting in Australia? What are you records like to warrant this automatic selection.

ELLIS: When Terry picked up the Bronze at the Edmonton Games it gave the Australian public and the shooting fraternity an idea of how close we were to top world competition. It also gave us both a lot of confidence in ourselves to know we were there near the top. This was reinforced when I managed a Bronze at the World Titles in Korea with Terry placing sixth. I hope this momentum will continue. **CTSN:** That seems logical, we seem to be coasting along quite well in the ISU disciplines.

RUMBEL: Yes, that is a fair comment, my performance in Korea together with Jim's Bronze medal all stems back mainly to the tough match practice we had in Canada, it being so close to the World championships. I don't know about Jim, but I walked on to that ground in Korea comfortable. I had shot well below my personal standard in Canada, I honestly had, but it did me the world of good for Korea.

ELLIS: Match practice is what we need before we go out in any big event. It's like Terry said, Canada and Korea were two months apart and it gave us the big time competition we needed. I shot worse than Terry in Canada, the targets were not all that easy, but it was bad shooting all the same.

RUMBLE: Yes, that's right, they were not unshootable. We failed to adapt ourselves to a major competition that was all.

CTSN: Lets talk specifics; what were the scores in Canada?

ELLIS: 186 won it at Edmonton, 184 ran second and 183 ran third.

CTSN: We are shooting that here, and better, is that not so?

RUMBEL: It is so, in fact my Bronze was won with the worst score over 200 that I have ever turned in.

ELLIS: The standard was not all that high, I ran fourth, and it was eight targets back to fifth place.

RUMBEL: But, the competition was just not there in Canada. Jim and I were capable of taking out Gold and Silver, and I think that was what frightened us more than anything, because we knew we were capable of the performances required. We knew we only had to shoot to our mediocre best to finish on top.

CTSN: Well who got the better of you there in actual fact?

RUMBEL: Ourselves!

ELLIS: Fair comment, but it was Primrose and Leary.

CTSN: How do you rate them?

ELLIS: Well Johnny Primrose is a good shot, I don't think we are going to see much more of him, but George Leary will be around for a few more years yet.

CTSN: Why?

ELLIS: Because of the way the Canadians promote their top shots. They promote the individual shooter and make his path to the top much easier.

CTSN: We know that is one of your hobby horses Jim, we will touch on the subject of promotion later.

ELLIS: Well through this promotion, a bloke with the ability of George Leary will get the incentive to be around for a long time yet. Apart from the ability, he has the youth and more importantly, the time.

CTSN: What are your thoughts on the Canadian scene. How is Sue Natrass doing these days, she caused quite a stir out here in '73. Has she made an open Canadian Team since then?

RUMBEL: She made the open team this year for Korea, but declined the position because she had to shoot in the open, or the women's section. She chose the women's, because she was not allowed to shoot in both.

CTSN: She bolted in that section, is that correct?

ELLIS: She sure did, a 195/200 which broke her own world record. In fact the score would have got her into the shoot-off for the Bronze in Korea.

CTSN: Lets talk a bit about Korea, then we will perhaps talk a bit about the ISU scene here in Australia. Obviously the World titles in Korea were much fiercer than the Commonwealth Games in Edmonton.

ELLIS: They sure were. You have about ten more countries at the World Titles that were not at Edmonton and all of them better than the teams in Canada.

RUMBEL: Yes, there were only about twenty shooters in the Trench at Edmonton. Some of them from some fairly obsure Com-Cont'd over page.

monwealth Countries. In Korea the hot shots are all there, from Spain, Italy countries like that.

CTSN: Did the Russians eventually compete?

RUMBEL: No, but at Edmonton there were only really ourselves, England, Canada and New Zealand that had any chance at all.

CTSN: English shooters do not rate very highly in Trench do they? RUMBEL: They are improving very rapidly and their Skeet shooters are quite good.

ELLIS: Yes, their skeet shooters are rating very well lately but we have not seen a lot of their Trench shooters since we have been on the scene.

RUMBEL: Two British shooters shot 190's in Korea from memory. CTSN: Well who are the top International Nations in trench these days?

ELLIS: Italy, Russia, Spain, USA and France would be my pick.

CTSN: Have you ever shot with Carrega from France Jim?

ELLIS: Yes I shot off with him, he is a great shot!

RUMBEL: See, with Spain, France and Italy and even Russia and Germany, they compete against each other quite regularly. They know who they have to beat when they go to the World Championships. In other words they are meeting the other fellow, four or more times per year.

ELLIS: The hardest thing for us to adapt to when we go overseas is the three solid days of fierce competition. We can get away with a bad round here but its curtains in the top levels of competion.

CTSN: So the pressure is on all the time.

RUMBEL: Right from the first shot! And, that is what happened to me in Korea, I ran out of legs in the last round. I was not physically fit enough. Not fit enough for the three fierce days of competition. I had to run the last 50 clean or at least a 49 to be in it. But, I put so much effort into the first 25 of the 50 I was physically and mentally depleted for the last 25.

ELLIS: I had a bad first round on the last day with a 23 and felt a little flat, but I came good after that although the stamina was starting to fail. But I held on. The competition definetely drains you to a degree that you are not used to.

CTSN: Well Bill Iles has now joined us, welcome Bill. Lets get back to the local scene. You have come upon the scene in a big way this past couple of months Bill, are you happy with the way you are shooting?

ILES: Yes, quite happy.

CTSN: What sort of scores are you shooting in trench at the moment.

ILES: I shot off with Jim here yesterday with a 192. **CTSN:** A question for all three of you. What of the ISU scene at the moment in Australia, are you happy with it?

RUMBELL: I think it needs a boost at the moment, I think it has come to a bit of a standstill.

ELLIS: Needs more big competition rounds. More hard, tough, three day 200 target matches. But, this comes back to the fact of peo-ple being able to afford to shoot. There are not too many times in a year when you can run a three day match without having to take days off. It is a fact also, that most of our shooters who are good enough, have not got the money or the time to develop their skills to the required world standard.

CTSN: So we come back to the sponsorship question.

ELLIS: If we are going to raise Trench shooting in Australia to the level we would like, we not only need sponsorship for the top couple of shooters, but we need it further down the line to give the up and coming shooters some incentive to go after it. Representing your country is a great thing and it has come a long way in a few short years. But to practice, to compete and to eliminate for the Australian Team will run any shooter into thousands of dollars.

RUMBEL: Coming back to that Jim, do you feel that what we need in Trench shooting is more trophies or prizes? Take Trap shooting, why do shooters come up through the ranks as Trap shooters...because they have got the drive to get to the States for the Grand American or because they want to win and enjoy their shooting. I don't know what Bill thinks about this but I feel that to get the younger shooters involved, you are going to have to put more on the end of it.


ILES: A lot of the younger shooters? What do you mean by younger shooters?

RUMBEL: A new shooter to Trench.

ILES: Well I don't think they get enough out of it for the amount of money they put in. Trench shooting is a very thankless sort of shooting

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ILES: It's more the honor and glory section of the sport. Let's be honest about it. In a registered trap shooting population of ten or eleven thousand you would have only about twenty real dedicated Trench Shooters. This is interesting because the average bloke does not want to try trench. He doesn't want to go backwards. He doesn't want to go out and shoot an 18 or 16 when he is shooting Possibles down-the-line. But a new trench shooter is absolutely petrified of the game. They come to the club, and there is usually someone there who is a bit above the standard, like you come here to Melbourne Gun Club and you have the Henwoods, Lowrys and such like. Now, the new shooter has to compete against the likes of these and he thinks well I can spend ten bucks shooting the Trench or go into two down-the-line. Well I can tell you, he is not going to shoot Trench unless he has a bag of loot, and he is real keen I t comes back to money.

CTSN: Do you agree with that Jim and Terry?

ELLIS: Yes, I agree with that a lot. When I come back from shooting overseas there is not a lot of trench shooting about. More to the point there is not much incentive to shoot, as there is nothing on the end of it. You know, as a rough estimate I spend about \$7,000 a year on my shooting. Now in Trench, I cannot get any of that back, so I in actual fact spend my year's wages on shooting. But, if I shoot Trap I can get perhaps half of that outlay back in prizes, and that keeps me shooting although it is not the type of shooting I need for top competiton on the World scene.

RUMBEL: How true, after all most people are mercenary. They want something back for what they put into it. The average shooter says...how am I going to make an Australian Team, so why should I bother shooting Trench...but if they could see some sort of reward on a Trench match they will have a go.

ELLIS: At the moment you are fighting against your own money problems in shooting trench, then if you make the Team and have done well, thats it, you have the honour and glory and nothing else. **CTSN:** Can you see a change of attitude in the Association such as State Eliminations with the say, top ten, from each state coming to a central venue for selection.

ILES: Yes, but it will not come for a while yet, not enough money around.

ELLIS: Its a good idea, but as Bill says there is not enough money available. We cannot even fund our teams properly. At the moment we badly need a reserve in each team that we send overseas.

CTSN: Do you find there is a shooter reaction to the ISU disciplines? In other words do you find that the average bloke takes the attitude that the game is a bit out of his grasp. **ILES:** Oh yes! You go anywhere within 100 miles of a capital city, or up the scrub, and ask any shooter if he has shot Trench...he would not know what you are talking about. He is not interested, all he wants to shoot is a couple of events at his local club. He is not interested in who goes over to shoot against the rest of the world. You are up against a lack of communication. Look at the situation if Terry Rumbel was a cricket player, and he came to Melbourne from Albury with some promise. Well everybody in Australia would know that Terry Rumbel, the cricketer, had come from the country to the big smoke to make the Autralian Team. We get no media coverage at all and this is where our main problem lies. All the shooter does is pay and hope. We are under the hammer all the time, what with anti-gun legislation and everything else, I often wonder why we bother. **CTSN:** Thats an interesting comment, care to enlarge?

ILES: No, not really, but it seems to me that the lawmakers are determined to remove the right to use a gun from the hands of the sportsman.

CTSN: OK, let's get on to the attitudes you three take to the game. We notice for instance that you in particular Terry do not shoot any Down the Line these days. Is there a reason?

RUMBEL: No, I don't because I can't afford to. I gave it away for 12 months for a specific reason, to see if it would make a difference to my Trench shooting.

CTSN: And did it?

RUMBEL: It made a world of difference. I got to a stage where I was shooting Trench the way I used to shoot Trap. I had the same confidence and ease in both. But shooting Trench exclusively has put that fine edge on my Trench shooting that would not be there if I shot both.

CTSN: You came on the scene in 73, correct Terry?

RUMBEL: Yes, I started to shoot Nationals then, but didn't take up Trench until 75.

CTSN: You burst upon the scene in 70 wasn't it Jim?

ELLIS: Yes, I specifically went there to watch the top shots and see if I could learn something.

CTSN: Well that's one way of putting it !!! What about you Bill?

ILES: Well, I had shot before, but I came back into the game in 76 and started to shoot seriously again.

CTSN: OK lets talk about your approach to the game. All three of you are fairy aggressive shooters, correct? Do you all go out to win all the time?

ILES: Yes, but not to win at all cost.

ELLIS: You go out there to compete against the target you are facing. If you give it half a chance, it will beat you.

RUMBEL: Very true!

ELLIS: You have to be on your toes all the time. The only way to do this is to be aggressive and by being aggressive you can shoot under any conditions.

RUMBEL: Yes, I will agree with that. My degree of aggressiveness is only to the target, not to the other shooters.

ILES: That is very true, I disagree with some people who say they get to hate the other bloke during a match. I couldn't care less who I am shooting against, my battle is with the competition itself, and the targets being thrown.

RUMBEL: The only satisfaction I get after the match is the quiet pride in your own personal achievement of being able to break as many as was possible.

ILES: Very true, top shooting is a real ego trip, it honestly is.

ELLIS: One of the greatest things I learnt in shooting was in 69, which gave me a great boost in 70, and again in 73, when I first represented Australia. It came from an old gentleman named

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Manuels. He said ... "there is no other person to beat on the tracks but yourself, if you can beat yourself no other person can beat you" ... I always remember that. So, you are not competing against the other fellow, but only yourself. The other fellow can put pressure on you, but the end result is that your performance is entirely personal. CTSN: You are aware of the other fellow then?

RUMBEL: Sure, but as Jim put it, the other fellow is there to keep your performance honest. Take Bill here, he will talk you blind if you give him half a chance, but if you can beat yourself, you can beat Bill.

CTSN: True Bill?

ILES: Very true, I have an old saying ..."if you can be conned, something else can be done to you" ... You should not be able to walk up to a top competitor in any sport and say ... "You are going to grab a chair this time, because they are going to count the men"... Take yesterday, I said to one bloke ... "you are going to miss three next round," he missed four! It shouldn't happen ... you know if someone said that to me I would be so savage, I would eat the targets.

CTSN: Both you Terry, and Jim have had overseas experience, Bill has not. Does this experience help you in local competition. This South Pacific Championship for instance, do regard it as a lollypop match after what you have faced overseas.

RUMBEL: No, I don't. I put as much pressure on myself as I possibly can no matter when I shoot. What the overseas trips do for you is to teach you how to control yourself. Every trip we make means that we learn something new. Today for instance I went out with the purpose of shooting 100.

(Editor's Note: Rumble had shot the previous two days of competition with a borrowed gun as his was misplaced by the airline, it was found, and the day mentioned was the day after the South Pacific Trench Championship).

CTSN: Were you out there to prove a point?

RUMBEL: No, not really. I shot today with a normal approach, to shoot the best score I possibly could.

CTSN: That is hard to believe, you must have been bitterly disappointed over the last two days with your gun being lost and using borrowed guns.

RUMBEL: Fair comment, I came down here very keyed up to shoot well and it was a bit of a let down. But, if there was a point to be proved today, it was to myself only.

CTSN: What are your thoughts on this Bill, how do you handle high pressure shooting.

ILES: I don't know, I haven't come up against a lot of it. You can only wait and see. I don't usually get butterflys, in fact if I can get a bit nervous I usually shoot better. In fact the best I have ever shot is when I have been a bit toey. I always shoot with confidence and that is the key. I know when I miss, it is only me.

RUMBEL: But you suppress you nervousness with aggressiveness though, Bill.

ILES: Perhaps, I get nervous before I leave home sometimes. But when I really get aggressive, is when I am shooting badly. I am like a lamb when I am shooting well, call softly - all is peaceful. But if things start to go wrong I get very aggressive towards myself to pull myself into gear.

CTSN: When did you become interested in Trench Bill?

ILES: A year or two ago. I shot it here at Melbourne a bit, then I went to Canberra last year and shot it well, the first day. But I discovered that you can't shoot against the likes of Terry and Jim here if you are on holiday and get out on the booze. It's a full time job.

CTSN: Lets talk about coaching, and without loading the question how do you get on with Newton Thomas?

ELLIS: Newton is one of the very few people, perhaps the only person in Australia who can coach shotgunners to the level of world competition. He is probably the only person in Australia I listen to. Although he has never coached me in the real sense of the word, probably because I have the answers worked out before they become a real problem.

CTSN: So you use him more as a mentor?

ELLIS: No, not really. But I know he is going to ask me a question if I do something silly. I know I have got to have the answer. That's good because it makes you work at your own game. In other words, if I am not shooting up to scratch, I know he is going to have the answer. I also know I am going to have to work out what I am doing wrong before I meet him. He keeps you on your toes.

ILES: Well, I have never had a lot to do with Newton, so I could not really give you an opinion. But I will say that you do not have to be a top shot to be a top coach. I know that Newton has a great record and his results with these fellows speaks for itself.

RUMBEL: Newton is a man with a depth of knowledge and he knows each shooter better than they know themselves. He is able to read them. The only thing that Newton does, that I don't agree with, or more to the point, it is what he does not do, is to pick a shooter up and shake him a bit. But that is more than made up for that depth of knowledge of the shooter, and being able to analyse the shooters make-up. He has given me more than I would have ever thought possible. CTSN: In what way?

RUMBEL: In teaching me to look at my own game, and solve my own problems as a shooter. He is a hard man to work under because he does not give it to you on a plate. But, if you are prepared to work, it's all there and he will give it to you. But, like I say, you have to be prepared to work and if you listen to what he has to say to you personally you will be a much better shot for it. Again let me say though, if you want it on a plate, you will not get it from Newton.

CTSN: Is that such a bad thing? RUMBEL: Hell no! It't the only way in my opinion.

ELLIS: That's dead right.

CTSN: Are you happy with our standard in Australia both in performance and coaching?

ILES: No way. I have been shooting seriously for a couple of years and have not seen a coach. But then, we are just starting in this field. ELLIS: That's true, the only help I have had with my shooting is from Newton, we are only just starting to scratch the surface in the coaching field.

RUMBEL: The only thing that has really happened over the past year or two is that there has been more opportunity to bounce ideas around with Jim and Newton and Pud Burgess and others. But, no, we have a long way to go in the coaching field.

CTSN: But that is coaching, the implementation of ideas isn't it? RUMBEL: Well yes, I suppose it is.

ILES: Take me for instance. I had never shot at a trench target in my life when I first came to this club. I asked a top shot how to go about it and was told ... "well you just shoot them" ... and walked away. I was left there with my mouth hanging open, with nothing coming out of it for a change. Probably he thought I was having him on, but honestly I had never seen a trench target before then, let alone shot one. In fact it was some months later, whilst talking to Trev Byrne that I discovered that I did not have to cover the whole

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trench waiting for the target. He told me about the markers over each set of traps. I had been wondering what they were there for. CTSN: That's hard to believe Bill.

ILES: It's fair dinkum. That is the extent of my coaching in the game.

CTSN: What about the technical side. You all shoot Browning don't you?

ELLIS: Yes, I shoot a B2.

CTSN: And what do you feed it?

ELLIS: Anything I can lay my hands on! But mainly Blue Star Trench 7's.

CTSN: Bill what is you ordinance?

ILES: A Browning Trap gun, three quarters and full, and feed it anything from AA's to Rangers in the bottom and Red Rangers to Black Rangers in the top depending on how I am shooting. If things are going well I shoot the lighter stuff.

CTSN: Terry?


RUMBEL: I will shoot anything if it's cheap. But if I have to buy shells I shoot Red Ranger 7's out of my Browning.

CTSN: What about style, have you all developed your own?

ILES: About the only person I have copied over the years is Alf James. His style is one of the best I have seen for shooting under all conditions.

ELLIS: You watch all shooters, or at least I do, and you gradually work a bit of all these styles into your own. If you copy just one person, you only get as good as he has developed, because he has mastered his own particular style. So you take the best of the best and use it.

ILES: That's true. When I was in Canberra last year I noticed that fellows from around Canberra/Griffith area shot Jim Ellis style and Taree fellows shot Terry Rumbel style. But, when they started to miss, they got confused because they had no style of their own to fall back on.

RUMBEL: No doubt about the fact that my style has changed completely over the last year or two. But, it has come about after extensive talks with Newton and Jim and Pud Burgess. I shoot Trap with an entirely different style. When I decided to shoot Trench seriously I needed a different style, so I changed it. I took me 12 months to do it and a lot of hard work. **ILES:** Yes, you need two different styles, or at least I do.

CTSN: In what way?

ILES: Well I am short and fat, and have to favour the right hander a bit, so I position myself for that harder target for me. Most important in Trench.

CTSN: Well then, that's about it. Thank you for your time all three of you, any last comments?

ILES: No, it has been a pleasure talking to someone who will listen. ELLIS: No, its good to sit down and talk about something you are interested in.

RUMBEL: I will make one parting comment. We need more sponsorship in the ISU disciplines. You know, we learn a lot overseas, the Canadians have their 'Sports Lotto' the Yanks have it injected into them, the Spaniards are all wealthy men, the Russians have it laid on for them, same with the Italians and French so it seems that we have the quality here, all we need is the where-withall to bring it out. We have to be the best amateur shooters in the World. O



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NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS - 1980 PROGRESS REPORT

Planning for the 1980 Australian National Clay Target Championships is progressing steadily, with the West Australian Clay Target Association leaving no stone unturned to ensure that the project is a complete success.

Those members who attended the 1976 Nationals in Perth will still have vivid memories of a most enjoyable and efficiently run tournament. Well, the WACTA is determined to improve on that standard for 1980, so competitors are assured of a most rewarding experience.

The program includes some exciting new initiatives. For example, for the first time a shoulder to shoulder match will occur for trap teams representing each of the seven states. The winning team will be the inaugural holder of the ACTA Cup, which is a prestigious perpetual trophy to be provided for the match.

In a major programming change, the format of the Champion of Champions Cup has been altered dramatically. The event will now be conducted over 75 targets, shot at one visit to the traps, and consisting of 25 targets double barrel, 25 targets pointscore and 25 targets single barrel. The nomination for this event has been fixed at \$20.

The three top scorers in this event will win a trip to the 1980 final of the Mackintosh Teams Match to be conducted at Chester in Wales, on Friday, July 18, 1980.

The major individual trophy in the Champion of Champions event will be a Merkel under and over shotgun, donated by Commercial Marketing Company of Sydney.

In addition to the travel opportunities provided in the Champion of Champions Cup, return trips to New Zealand, flying Air New Zealand, will be offered to the top six of the seven competitors, one from each state, with the best aggregate score in the National Double Barrel Championships, the National Single Barrel Championship and the Australian-New Zealand Trap Championship. These are also the qualifying events for selection in Australia's 1980 team to contest the Mackintosh International Teams Trophy Match.

One of the Association's regular and enthusiastic supporters is Boustead Trading, the Remington agents. This company has donated the first two trophies to be used in the Grand Australian Handicap. For first place, there will be a Remington 1100 Tournament Grade trap gun and for second place, a Remington 572 BDL - 22 rifle has been provided.

In recognition of the Company's appointment as Australian agents for the Italian firearms manufacturer Antonio Zoli, a Zoli Model 74 Under and Over Trap gun has been provided for presentation to the winner of the National Single Barrel Championships.

Eley has dramatically improved its contribution and has made available for presentation to the winner of the National Skeet Championships a beautiful Franchi Barrage Under and Over skeet gun together with a leather case, valued in total at \$1600. In addition, a small but valuable Franchi statuette will be presented to the winner.

Eley has also donated a Franchi Eldorado automatic shotgun, for presentation to the winner of the National Double Barrel Championship. The traditional Ladies Overall High Gun Award will of course be continued as will the valuable Eley Silver Badges.

Winchester, and its overseas principals, have again been very generous. The impressive list of donations through this organization include the Presentation Model Browning to be presented to the competitor with the highest aggregate score over the skeet and trap events.

Additionally, a Beretta S680 and a Winchester under and over will be presented to High Gun Award winners (trap only) in the grades. Winchester Gold Medals will be won by first placegetters in A Grade of the trap events.

Fuller Agencies of Sydney, has increased its contrbution for 1980. In addition to the Miroku 3800 shotgun that will be presented to the

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MARATHON MEETING **IN MELBOURNE**

The National Executive Committee held its second conference for 1979 in Melbourne on September 21 to September 24. Spanning four days, the meeting covered many hours of gruelling debate.

The official sessions commenced on the Saturday, and were preceded by a series of Sub-committee meetings, including the Core Group, the National Championships Sub-Committee and the ISU Sub-committee.

The highlight of the conference which was held at the Hotel Australia, right in the heart of the city, was a luncheon with the Honourable Barry Simon, Member of the House of Representatives for McMillan in Victoria. Mr Simon performed the official opening of the 1979 National Championships held in Griffith, and promised then that he would be available to address this meeting.

Mr Simon spoke on the many ways in which the Commonwealth Government is aiding sports development in Australia. A detailed report of the address is published elsewhere in this issue.

Meanwhile, the main sessions of the conference saw a great number of topics tabled, many of which are of vital importance in the future growth of the sport.

In the following paragraphs, Clay Target Shooting News has tried to summarise the important items in a way that readers will find both interesting AND informative.

NATIONAL SHOOTING GROUND

The National President, Ern Hawkins announced the result of the referendum that has recently been conducted on this subject at club level. One hundred and fifty four replies were received (about half the total number of clubs affiliated in Australia). Of these 104 recorded votes for the establishment of a National Shooting Ground and fifty votes were recorded against the concept. Quite clearly, the majority of interested members are in favour of the project.

Such a resounding majority places the Executive Committee under a heavy obligation to get on with the job. Till now, members of the Executive could be excused for being a little cautious in their decision making on this subject. Now, with a clear mandate to progress the project further, members should approach decisions with a new-found confidence.

DISHONOURED CHEQUES

In view of an apparent increase in the number of dishonoured cheques being experienced by clubs, the Executive Committee decided to take strong action, in an attempt to stamp out this offensive and illegal habit.

Three shooters were deregistered and clubs will be notified of the details.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

Details of advanced planning for the 1980 National Championships, to be conducted in Perth in March, appear elsewhere in this issue.

However, it is of interest to note that approval has been given to a recommendation from the Victorian Clay Target Association that the 1981 National Championships be conducted at the grounds of the Melbourne Gun Club. A tentative date is during the Easter period.

On the subject of Nationals, the Executive committee confirmed plans to send a three-man team to Great Britain next July. Selection will take place at the Perth Nationals.

Also, it is intended to select a team at the Australian Nationals in 1980 to represent this country in the New Zealand National Championships, to be held at Christchurch commencing on March 22.

Selection will be made along similar lines to those used for the last two Air New Zealand Trap Teams which have competed in USA. This team will consist of the shooter from each State who records the best aggregate score over the National Double Barrel Cham-pionship, the National Single Barrel Championship, and the Australia-New Zealand Trap Championship. However, it should be noted that only six places are available in the team. Consequently, of the seven State leaders, the one with the lowest aggregate will fail to gain selection.

These team members will have their fares fully funded, from the capital city nearest their home, to Christchurch and return.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF STATE ASSOCIATION EXECUTIVES

The National Secretary Manager has been directed to undertake an investigation into the costs and possible benefits arising from convening an annual conference of Presidents and Secretaries of all State Associations.

The most immediate benefit would occur in the area of communications, but the idea prompts the writer to believe that the group could be developed into a planning "THINK TANK". It is quite possible that some exciting new ideas could come from a group that has such a depth of experience.

MEMBERSHIP AND CLUB POLICIES

The meeting decided to encourage ALL clubs to re-consider their policies on competition, with a view to providing more practice targets at lower cost, for club patrons.

There has been a lot of talk recently about rapidly increasing costs, and obviously, one way to reduce costs is to cut out trophies at certain times.

RULES

The Rules Sub-committee, under the leadership of Mr Arch Rowe, submitted a proposal for total rules revision.

After some minor changes, the submission was considered to be a good base for a new set of rules, to become effective on January 1, 1981

Meantime, the existing rules have been modified in the following way:

Trap Rule 125 "Procedure for conducting Interstate Ladies' Trap Teams Match. to become effective January 1, 1980:

- Team to comprise six shooters to shoot in one squad. (a)
- Course of event to be 25 targets from 18 metres. (b)
- The competitors to move one lane to right after each target. (c)
- Five best scores to count.' (d)
- Please amend your rule book.

RESTRUCTURING

To coincide with the streamlining effect of Constutional changes to be implemented next March, the Executive has also defined a new administrative structure.

This is to consist of the Executive Committee, as the broad policy making body; a Core Group or Management Committee to be used to expand the details of the broad policies and to guide the administration, and a General Manager who will have day to day decision making authority. He will be accountable to the Core Group. A Sub-committee of five has been created to define the parameters of the areas of responsibility for each of these levels.

The Sub-committee consists of Messrs Hawkins, Porter, Holtfreter, Somers and Connors. It has been directed to report back to the March 1980 meeting of the National Executive Committee.



TRADING

It is widely accepted that the Association must look to developing sources of income that are divorced totally from registration fees. It will only be by doing this successfully that a registration fee in-crease in the early 80's can be avoided.

The Association is enjoying quite reasonable support for its book sales activities and agreement was reached that this type of mem-bership service should be expanded.

AUSTRALIA DAY GAMES

The Federal Government, in conjunction with the Australian Olympic Federation, is planning a major National sports tournament for Canberra on Australia in 1980. It is hoped that the match will become an annual affair.

Designed to develop deeper national pride in Australia's top athletes, the tournament will span the three days of the Australia Day holiday weekend.

Shooting sports will be deeply involved, and shotgunners will have the opportunity to compete in Olympic Trench, International Skeet or regular Trap and Skeet.

This project is also tied in with the subject of developing tourism in the Australian Capital Territory through sports promotions - a topic in which the shooting sports are deeply involved.

MACKINTOSH TEAM CRITICISM IN "GUNSHOT"

In the June issue of the official journal of the New Zealand Clay Target Association "Gunshot", two references to Australia's pre-parations for the 1979 Mackintosh Team were made. In comments attributed to Russell McGowan, leader of the New Zealand contingent which attended the 1979 Australian National Championships, an inference was made that Australia's winning performances in Mackintosh Teams' Matches were due to favourable target settings, relating to angles and speed.

The Executive Committee has registered a strong protest with the New Zealand Association, and has asked for an ACTA letter to be published in the next available issue of "Gunshot". In the letter, this Association expresses its concern at the ambiguous wording of Mr McGowan's reported statement.

CO-OPERATION BETWEEN SHOOTING DISCIPLINES


In discussing a request for assistance received from the Sporting Shooters' Association of Australia, the Executive Committee acknowledged the long term benefits to come out of the various shooting disciplines working harder at co-operating with each other.

In its request, the SSAA has asked for financial assistance in defraying costs incurred in sending its Legislation Officer, Bob Mytton, to Darwin, to advise the Northern Territory Government on its planned Firearms Act.


Although the immediate need has passed, the Executive Committee approved an amount of money, should the expenditure become necessary.

The meeting concluded at 4 p.m. on the third day, after a total of 20 hours exhausting debate. The restructuring plan mentioned earlier in this report will, when implemented, effectively reduce the number of subjects on which full Executive Committee debate is required.

Consequently, the Committee will be able to spend more time and effort on making quality decisions on matters of major policy.

Saturday 31st August, 1979 Sunday 1st September, 1979

Mildura Gun Club conducted a 200 target Universal Trench event this week-end. It was the Commonwealth Universal Trench Championship. One hundred targets were shot on Saturday and one hundred on Sunday. Other trap and skeet events were included on the programme and a total of fifty-three shooters competed. A father and son combination took first and second in the Deauville Doubles Championship, Brian and his son Russell Mark from Sebastapol collected first with Ralph and Mark Dellar, Mildura, winning second prize.

Eley Ammunition invited me to attend a small cocktail party at the Batman Motor Inn, in honour of our shooters going overseas to represent Australia in the World Championships. With the exception of Ellis, Rumbel and Burgess, all were present to enjoy their hospitality.


The next day I journeyed to Tullamarine Airport to see them off and bid them farewell and good shooting in Monte catini in the World Championships. Good luck fellas.

WHEN THE FIRST CUCKOO CALLS - GRAB YOUR GUN (from Don Corstorphan)

SKAK. The old Lefever spoke/once. Down fell the snipe. SKAK SKAK SKAK. Up jumped five more. The second barrel roared.

Down fell three. Two barrels: four birds. Not bad shooting, you will say. Not bad, indeed; expecially when it is realised that the hunter is now in his mid-seventies. But, then, my old friend Blackie has been chasing snipe for sixty-three years and there is not much about this wily bird that he doesn't know. He did confess to me, however, that 'although he had dropped two with one barrel on several occasions, and had taken many double rises, this was the first time he had ever collected a triple. He graciously shared his success with me by stating it was one of my homeloads that did the trick - 32 grams of No. 10 shot pushed along by 22 grains of Nobel 60. Blackie uses a Grand Prix 10 in the first barrel, and has done so for many years; but he likes a little extra shot in the second. (I equalled his feat of dropping three snipe with one barrel two years ago when I fired into 50 or 60 as they flew by at extreme range).

The triple fall occurred last season as my friend walked a narrow soak, fringed each side by head-high tree scrub. Jackies mostly rise very quickly and flare away wildly, but on this occasion they flew straight down the corridor, with disastrous result.

Along the creeks and gullies, in parts of the Colac district there are areas where the tea-tree grows in dense thickets to a height of 12 feet. Birds flushed along the edges invariably seek cover, and when dropped, perhaps 20 yards in, are very hard to find. Some lodge in the tree tops; others part way down; and an odd one will even spear into the thick mud. Generally, it is my job to mentally mark the spot where a bird falls, while Blackie acts as retriever. Long experience has taught him exactly what to do. Quickly he disappears from sight, squelching through the knee-deep mud and water and indicating his progress by waving a long stick or shaking the tree tops, relying on my called directions. Perseverance is the name of the game and only on very rare occasions has he failed to retrieve. When we are shooting in hillside scrub he has the uncanny knack of knowing just where and how far a wounded snipe will run. On days when we have bagged 25 or so birds sometimes as many as one quarter of them have been due to his skill in retrieval. Always, we work as a team, placing ourselves strategically as the terrain' demands, and each taking the shot as it comes his way. O

The Melbourne Gun Club was represented at the 1979 Pesta Sukan Games in Singapore by teams of trap (trench) and skeet shooters. The group, led by Club President Robert Buchan, performed very creditably and promoted the image of Australian clay busters very well.

Last month's issue of CTSN carried a report of the trap event. In this issue, the skeet match is covered, together with a visit to the Tunku's palace and the official presentation dinner.

At the conclusion of the trap match, all competitors and their wives were invited by the Tunku to attend a buffet dinner at the "Istana" (the Tunku's residence). A coach was hired, and immigration procedures arranged to make crossing the Malaysian border as simple as possible. The "Istana" is located in Johore Baru about $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours drive from Singapore.

The "Istana" consists of a magnificent modern "A-line" home, together with staff quarters. The Tunku has an extensive automobile museum — the collection includes some most unusual American models.

The buffet meal was mainly Malaysian dishes, and was beautifully prepared and presented. The Australian ladies were entertained by the Princess, who is one of the most lovely ladies one could wish to meet. Very petite and gentle, she exuded great charm.

During the evening, the Tournament Liaison Officer Dr Teddie Leonard, presented all guests with an attractive embroided "Istana" handkerchief as a memento of the occasion. Bob Buchan, on behalf of his group, publicly thanked the Tunku for being such a wonderful host and presented him with a suitably

Bob Buchan, on behalf of his group, publicly thanked the Tunku for being such a wonderful host and presented him with a suitably embossed red white and blue sash. One of the most vivid memories of the trip is the sight of the Tunku proudly parading his Melbourne Gun Club sash.

The Australian group was very appreciative of the generosity and hospitality extended by the Tunku and his Princess.

The following day was Thursday and was scheduled for skeet practice. After the previous night's festivities, the competitors were slow to appear, and scores were only moderate.

Early favorites included Somchai and Pichit of Thailand and Crikis of Australia. In practice, Somchai averaged 24 in his three rounds, and Pichit averaged 23. Somchai was probably the most experienced skeet shooter in the competition, having shot a 196 in the South East Asian Championships in Bangkok in 1975.

Crikis and Boyd both performed reasonably during the practice sessions, but some observers thought that each had a little in reserve.

Friday was the first day of the skeet match, and the first 75 targets were to be completed. Remembering that the background and changing light made shooting conditions difficult (see photograph on front cover as evidence!) any round of 24 was a good performance.

The Australians were happy with the 70 carded by Crikis, although Boyd had a nervous start and finished the day on 64. Somchai tied the lead with Crikis, and sitting on 69 was Gan Teck Lee of Singapore.

The surprise of the first day was the commanding lead built up by Singapore in the teams' match. Finishing the day on 260, Singapore was nine points clear of Thailand, with Australia a further five points down.

The second 75 targets were programmed for Saturday. Conditions were still extremely hot and humid, and the visitors from the south were finding it very difficult to cope. However, in a day of changing fortunes, the big performance came from Graham Boyd, who shot a brilliant 71 including the first ever 50 straight carded on one day at the Singapore grounds. Somchai started with a burst and came in with a 25 after his first round. However, he crashed to an unbelievable 20 in the next round - a most uncharacteristic score from the great champion.

Crikis also ran into a "flat spot" to finish with 67 for the day, and an aggregate of 137. Nithi of Thailand was firing consistent 21's, and had an aggregate of 125.

Frank Oh of Singapore, who on the first day, had closed on 67, could only manage 17, 22, 20 on the second to aggregate 126.

After 150 targets, the leaders in the individual match were Crikis and Somchai on 137, Boyd on 135, and Pichit on 129.

A dramatic change had taken place in the teams match where Australia had swept to an eight point win over Thailand with

Singapore relegated to third place. The shooters from Melbourne were extremely elated with their win, as they upheld a prediction made by the captain, Bob Buchan, to the Singapore Press.

Going into the final 50 targets of the individual match, the stage was set for a tight finish. Boyd would need a lot of luck together with his skill to bridge the two target start he had given the joint leaders. No one else in the field was within striking distance.

Crikis fired a 25 in his first visit and established himself as the likely winner. Boyd managed only 23, which meant that his chances of a win were slim. Then Somchai produced a 24, which left him one target behind Crikis going into the last round.

In the final round, the tension was unbelievably high, and the crowd was on its toes as Crikis dropped a target to score 24 and an event aggregate of 186. This is a world ranking score when one considers the difficult conditions.

Somchai of Thailand could tie the score if he was capable of a perfect round - he missed high two, and after a lapse in concentration, came in with a 22 against his name.

Thus, for the second time in four years, Alex Crikis of Melbourne was the Pesta Sukan Skeet Champion. Somchai was second on 183, while Graeme Boyd, in his first ever overseas appearance in ISU Skeet, ran third with the great score of 180.

Pichit of Thailand was fourth on 171, the long gap demonstrating the value of the top three scores.

The Singapore Shooting Association held the presentation dinner at the high class Equatorial Hotel. The surroundings were plush, and the organization was slick.

There were no long speeches and the wife of the Minister for Law, Mrs Barker, presented medals and trophies to the worthy winners. Stephen Yap, Secretary of the Singapore Shooting Federation, act-

Stephen Yap, Secretary of the Singapore Shooting Federation, acted as Master of Ceremonies and put on the professional performance the Aussies had become so accustomed to.

In appreciation of the extent to which Stephen had gone out of his way to ensure that the Australians were well looked after, he was presented with a red white and blue sash by Robert Buchan, similar to the one previously presented to the Tunku.

The night was a wonderful finale to what had been a totally successful project.

Then 10 of the party proceeded to Bangkok, Pattaya Beach, Hong Kong and Manila whilst the remainder returned direct to Australia.



The Committee and other helpers are to be congratulated on the smooth running of the shoot - no mean feat with 160 shooters over 3 events in just six hours. Time ran out, however, and the skeet was decided by names in a hat in the office. The winners of course thought this was a most satisfactory way to hold a shootoff. Wangaratta Gun Club has 2 women shooters and 6 women competed over the program. A ladies trophy and a sash was made available for the best women shooter over the double barrel event and this was won by Jenny Young, Melbourne Gun Club. After the presentations some hospitality of the M.G.C. Committee was enjoyed by all prior to "pouring" a load of shooters onto their bus for the homeward journey to Wangaratta.

The comradeship between two clubs is just great and both clubs look forward to these 2 days each year as an important part of their shooting calendar.

On Sunday September 30, we attended the 5th Annual Rotary Charity shoot at Metropolitan Clay Target Club in conjunction with the Essendon Rotary Club. 125 shooters contested the 4 events and 23 clubs were represented at the shoot. It was a most successful day and gave an opportunity for the nonshooting members of our community to see what we shotgunners are all about. What a pity that this type of commitment shooters have with the community does not get more publicity. Many clubs throughout Australia support entrants in the state divisions of the Miss Australia Quest, Rotary and other organizations who support charities in the community, but little publicity is given to this. I realize that we are a minority sport, although some country clubs have a very good relationship with their local press. However, in the larger cities, our sport is lucky to get a mention in "Other Sports" in the daily newspapers. On Friday September 28, A.B.C. Television showed a segiment on skeet shooting in conjunction with the Prince Philip Prize for Australian design which featured 2 well known S.A. shooters in Ian Campbell and Pat Browne. 



If you think all primers are alike, you've got some learning to do.

To start with, you're not alone. It seems most reloaders tend to lump all makes of shotshell primers together. Much to the dismay of the good ol' boys at CCI, who happen to make primers unlike anybody else.

For example, if you were to hold a CCI primer up to another, you'd see something like this:



Observe how the CCI battery cup on the left tapers in. No one else does that. While it may not turn you into a trophy winner, that little tapered step does help align the primer and makes for easier reloading.



INTERNATIONAL REPRESENTATION SELECTION PART 2 - CRITERIA (by Hai

(by Harry Somers Chairman, ISU Sub C'tee)

The preamble to Part 1 outlines our limited experience in the selection of teams for shoulder to shoulder competition on an international basis under ISU Regulations.

It must be acknowledged that apart from the Team Bronze Medal won on our own ground in 1973, we achieved little of note in international competition overseas until 1978.

In 1978 we made our first move towards developing a set of rational criteria for the Selection Panel to work upon in the determination of teams.

The method is not claimed to be perfect — it is a reasonable foundation to build upon.

The method was introduced to provide a comparative basis for the assessment of individuals, and to eliminate the factor of personal bias from the selection process. Experience to date clearly demonstrates that, apart from the technical ability to break clay targets, the selection of representatives for international competition under ISU Rules requires a far more searching approach than the traditional first past the post elimination system.

The assessment of factors other than sheer technical ability is necessary from the following viewpoints:-

- a. The individual competitors must be able to lift their shootng performance under the stimulus of world class competitive pressure, simply holding Australian level scores is not enough, and needless to say, a single team member who wilts under top pressure means disaster overall.
- pressure means disaster overall.b. Each member of the team must be compatible with every other team member.

A single disruptive element is sufficient to cause friction and add unwanted stresses in an already stressful environment, with detrimental overall effect on performance.

- Each member must be totally dedicated to the team and team performance.
- d. Each member must be strongly self-disciplined as well as amenable to external discipline, and fully prepared to comply with instructions, orders, and directives from Coach, Section Manager and/or Team Manager.

These officials cannot be expected to devote valuable time and effort to bringing erring or wayward team members into line, their responsibilities and duties are heavy, and such time taken up, is time not available to devote to the positive benefit of the team.

e. Each member must without doubt be possessed of a personality which permits the performance of an ambassadorial role to the credit of our sport, our Association and our nation.

The assessment of these personal/psychological factors is the most difficult part of the selection process.

It can be reasonably argued that formal training in the behavioural sciences is an essential prerequisite to proper performance of these assessments.

However, we have not yet developed to that level of sophistication or financial capability.

A fully acceptable counter-argument is that a panel of experienced responsible individuals, well versed in our sport, as well as working with, employing, controlling, and/or managing people, can collectively assess such factors and arrive at logical practical conclusions.

These critera will require continuous review and/or refinement in the light of the development of our experience in international competition in the years to come.

PART 3 - TEAM COMPOSITION

Current Regulations limit international match representation to the following:-

Olympic Games : Maximum 2 per Discipline Commonwealth Games : Maximum 2 per Discipline World Championship : Maximum 4 per Discipline

The Selectors and/or Justification Committee may, in their wisdom, decide to reduce the number of the representatives below the maximum depending on the calibre of those available.

In the light of the fierce competition for berths in the national contingents for both Olympic Games and Commonwealth Games, it appears most unlikely that we will be given the opportunity to send reserves with those contingents in the foreseeable future.

However, since we are responsible for our own funding as to World Championships, we have freedom of action (within budget limitations).

Our experience in Korea clearly indicated the need to provide reserves, where feasible, to enable us to field a full team of form competitors at the critical time, thus providing protection against loss of form by one team member — such loss can occur at any time for any number of reasons.

Nevertheless, it would be clearly irresponsible of your administrators if they were to select say 5 shooters in each discipline and despatch them overseas at great cost, irrespective of their ability or potential to perform creditably against the best in the world.

Therefore it was decided by the ACTA Executive in March 1979 to adopt the policy to send up to 5 shooters in each discipline provided those of adequate standard or potential are available.

Depending on the build up in the depth of talent available, and subject to our financial capability, it may be possible to increase World Championship contingent size at some time in the future.

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

A TRIP TO THE WORLD SKEET CHAMPIONSHIPS AND THE U.S.A.

On the 13th July my wife Kathleen and myself, together with Cecil Herbert of Gunnedah, N.S.W. left Sydney for the U.S.A. with the main purpose of the trip being to compete in the World Skeet Championships which were held at San Antonio, Texas, and conducted by the National Skeet Shooting Association on their national headquarters ground. Firstly we visited Florida's Disney World, Sea World etc. Here we picked up our first rental car for a leisurely drive across three states and hundreds of miles to San Antonio. Our first stop was Tallahassee for some very enjoyable and interesting sight seeing. We went on to Mobile in Alabama for our first shot of skeet. This was their annual Shrimp Bowl meeting. It was a 400 target program, 100-410g, 28g, 20g and 12g plus the prelimineries. There were 125 shooters there. In the U.S.A. no shooter is allowed to shoot for money unless they have shot enough N.S.S.A. registered targets to be classified in to grades. This was to be our starting point for classification in to grades.

The Mobile trap range has 7 down the line and 7 skeet fields. Shooters are squaded 5 man squads and given the time when they will shoot, allowing $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours to shoot 100 targets per man all on the one field, so if your time is say 10 o'clock, the next squad will be on at 11.30. At no time did I see a squad exceed the $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours and most time the squad would be finished from 1 hour 10 mins. to 1 hour 20 mins. All traps used were Winchester Autos.

The first preliminary event was 12g followed by the 410g. Now this little 410g shotgun is the ambition of all shooters to be able to shoot the 100 straight with it, as a lot of their top shooters do. Using $2\frac{1}{2}$ '' shells and $\frac{1}{2}$ oz of shot our eyes were opened to the way this little gun could smoke the targets. One point I must stress here is that the targets in the U.S.A. are exactly the same as we shoot here, both in speed, distance and height.

The shoot offs for the 410g Championship saw 4 shooters with 100 straight. The shoot off was 1 round of regular skeet, and then doubles on all stations, and this is where the boys were really sorted out. The winning score was 145-145.

Day $\overline{2}$. The 28g and 20g Championships were held and here again these little guns were a delight to use. The lack of recoil has to be experienced, and these were the guns that really surprised both Cec and myself. Cec shooting a credible 97 with the 28g and 94 with the 20g. My scores were 99-100 for 28g and 97-100 for the 20g.

The last day of the Championships was the 12g event with about 20 shooters shooting the 100 straight. Cec shot a good 96-100 and my score was 99-100. Then came the shoot off, and also the High Gun shoot off in which two shooters had shot 398-400. The shooter who was very impressive was Wayne Maze of Tennessee. He had previously shot a break of 1657-1658, a world record - but more on this man at the World Championships.

We left Mobile early the next morning on our way to San Antonio, a drive of 650 miles with over a week to do it in. We were able to have a good look at all the attractions on the way and we even experienced 20" of tropical rain going across the Gulf of Mexico.

On our arrival at the National Gun Club we made ourselves known to Ann Meyers, the Executive Director of the Skeet Association, who helped us with our entries for the preliminary and championships. We sure needed Ann's help as this was a fairly complex procedure for us. We found that most shooters pre-nominated and most squads were full up. They run 6 flights per day, the first at 8.30 a.m. and then every $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours. Every shooter must take one 8.30 flight.

The 410g, 28g and 20g are 100 target events but the 12g is a 250 target event shot over 2 days. For the first time this year nonclassified shooters were allowed to compete in a N/C grade and also reloads could be used. Some 600 odd shooters attended the championships. The weather was great for those that like it hot, average was 96° with 96% humidity.

Industry was well represented by all companies in the shooting game. Entry fees per 100 targets was \$12.50 plus any optional purses. Cartridges were an average of \$4.25 per pkt. All shoot-offs would start at 7pm each day and in most cases would carry over until the next day, as they would go on and on. As an example of this Wayne Maze and Walt Bodorek broke 550-550 and the shoot off went for, another 28 rounds of skeet with Bodorek losing a target at high one in the doubles. Maze's break being 1229-1229 was a really fantastic performance for the winner of the World Skeet HOA Skeet Championship for 1979. The American Skeet shooters must be the best in the world at American Skeet. I believe the Australian skeet shooters have the ability to match them, but we lack the opportunity to get the competition that they have, and the small gauge guns have a lot going for them, especially in the cost of reloading the 410 g, which has only 1/2 oz No 9 shot. One thing for sure the American shooters knew that they had a couple of Australians among them. My in-dividual achievements were 3 Gold, 3 Silver and 3 Bronze in the various gauges, and what was so pleasing was that the scores I shot with the small gauges would have won most any 12g event in Australia. For instance my 28g average was 98.5%. Cec Herbert also shot some good scores which I will leave to him to write about.

I have ambitions to return next year I would like to invite our Australian skeet shooters to join me in a 3-4 weeks trip (approx) taking in the World Skeet Shoot at Savanna in Georgia, plus other skeet shoots while in the U.S.A.

I have been able to arrange to shoot N.S.S.A. registered targets in Australia so that each Australian shooter can be classified before reaching the U.S.A. I will also have guns and ammo available for anyone to use to shoot the smaller gauges. There is a big possibility

that the Executive Director of the N.S.S.A., Mrs Ann Meyers and other Executives will arrive in Australia in November 1979 to help us set up the shooting of N.S.S.A. registered targets. They will also be shooting in the N.S.W. and Vic. State Skeet carnivals, so fellows you best get in plenty of practice, as these people really know how to shoot skeet. We had to leave San Antonio before all events were finalised and at the time of writing have not received the final results.

In the weeks that followed the World Skeet Chapionships Kathleen & I visited Kansas City and while at their gun club managed to win a small trophy. Friends with a private club out in the country gave us a great day of fun type shooting at skeet and trap. Here I watched our host, Clint Thompson, shoot a full round of skeet in 1 minute 35 seconds.

From here we went to St Louis to visit friends for a few days which were wonderful, and then we had a 6 hour drive (in a big Cadillac) up to Vandalia where we met up with the A.C.T.A. group and team. There also, was Malcom Fuller and his wife Val, and sons John and David. John made history as far as Australians are concerned as he shot the 100 straight making the only father and son combination from Australia to do so.

Again luck was on my side, as using a borrowed gun from Winchester I recorded a 97-100 and 100-100 from 16 yds.

The results of the Australian Team will be written up separately so will not cover any of that.

We left the Grand with our friends and this time it was a 9 hour drive up to Madison and on the next Sunday drove 60 miles to Waukesha Gun Club as guests of Tommy and Vic Reinders for their Skeet Championships. Again the good lord smiled down on me. I lost the 410g shoot off on station 8 when I put the cartridge in the wrong barrel but I won the A class 12g Championship with 100-100. As I sit here writing this report I think back over the experience

As I sit here writing this report I think back over the experience that I gained from the world skeet shoot both in physical and mental discipline and the approach to skeet. I feel that in my job of Riverina Zone Coach, I will be able to offer far more to shooters who wish to attain a high level of competitiveness.

I would like to finish here by sincerely thanking all the American shooters who were such fantastic hosts. I would like to mention names but that would take pages (I don't think Noel would like that). The American shooters would have to be the best people in the world, and I find it impossible to put into words our feeling towards these people.

As mentioned previously I will be competing at the World Skeet shoot next year (end of July and first week August) and hope that we can make an official A.C.T.A. Team by holding N.S.S.A. elimination shoots in Australia. The U.S.A. National I.S.U. Skeet is shot straight after the World Skeet and on the same grounds, so the I.S.U. boys can be catered for also. I can guarantee anyone that goes there will have a fantastic time.

AUSTRALIAN COMPANY LEADS WORLD IN FIREARMS TRAINING SYSTEM RACE:

Staff Writer

Albury-Wodonga based firearms training systems manufacturer, Australasian Training Aids Pty. Ltd., is poised to take the lead in the world race to produce the "perfect" firearms training system for marksmen.

The SuperDart system, developed during the past five years, has wide international application in defence and law enforcement training and in competitive sports shooting.

It is estimated by its manufacturers that the new-technology computerised system could earn Australia more than \$50 million in export sales within the next few years.

Australasian Training Aids' co-founder and managing director, former electrical contractor, Mr Lindsay Knight, hails the new training system as a breakthrough which puts Australia in the lead against strong competition from the United Kingdom, the USA and Europe.

SuperDart is adaptable for use in accuracy training in systems ranging from 5.56 mm calibre bullets to 120 mm tank shells.

It consists of a completely automatic computer-controlled range system, a dynamic "projectile location" system and a firearm trainer mechanism which teaches correct firearms handling.

The SuperDart system uses a mini-computer which can control up to 500 targets grouped into the number of ranges requred.

The heart of SuperDart is the projectile location system. The targets are fitted with a revolutionary detector bar which senses the presence and exact location of a supersonic projectile in the target area.

The velocity of the bullet can be measured and its position in a vertical plane located to within an average accuracy of 4mm.

Within a second of each bullet passing through or missing the target, the marksman and his instructor know, via a video readout, the exact position of the bullet in relation to the target.

On conventional ranges, a bullet or even a stone blasted off the surface of the range and striking the target anywhere would be counted as a hit.

With the SuperDart system the marksman instantly knows exactly where his bullet hits the target and immediately begins to work on improving his specific accuracy.

This system saves expensive ammunition and the manpower needed to man the conventional targets on conventional ranges.

The third major element of the SuperDart system is a pressure sensitive firearm trainer, designed to teach correct handling techniques.


The trainer system centres around the four contact points between the marksman and his firearm.


- These are;
- ★ Butt pressure;
- Cheek pressure;
- Masterhand and trigger control; and
- * Forestock pressure.

The trainer allows conditions at the four critical points to be monitored at the instant the firearm is fired.

Using this system, it is possible to teach trainees to instinctively hold and aim a firearm correctly in a very short time.

Clay Target Shooting News recently visited the Company's establishment at Albury, New South Wales, to detemine whether it is

possible to modify existing systems to accommodate the needs confronting the A.C.T.A.

The Association is committed to a policy of expanding its student training programs as soon as possible. In view of rapidly escalating costs of cartridges and components, the economic factor involved in training programs is considerable.

Consequently, the National Director of Coaching has for some time been seeking an "electronics age" answer to the problem. Hence, when an opportunity arose to witness a demonstration of the Super Dart system, the Director, Newton Thomas and a CTSN staff writer quickly "got their act" together and used the chance to discuss with Lindsay Knight the possibility of developing a shotgun training system.

Theoretically, it is envisaged that the path of a simulated clay target should be projected onto a screen. The trainee would then use a conventional shotgun to project a signal at the simulated target. A hit or miss would be recorded and in the case of a miss, the margin would also be defined.

Sounds good? Well, before long it is to be hoped that Lindsay Knight and his company Australasian Training Aids Pty. Ltd., will provide a practical solution.

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

He has been with Winchester for three and a half years, during which time he has undertaken extensive student training activities.





In a report just received from Newton Thomas, Australia's shooting team manager at the 1979 World Shotgun Championships, he advises that the Australian scores are a little disappointing.

However in the ISU Skeet match, won by Justesen of Denmark, rising star Graeme Boyd of Albury, topped the Aussie list with a 190-200. Although he was rated only 48th, the score is one of the most promising seen from an Australian on the International circuit. John Summers of Melbourne fired a 189, and Alex Crikis recorded 182.

In the Trench match, World Champion Carrega of France was again successful, although with a lower than usual winning score of 194. Second was Asonov of U.S.S.R., on 193.

The Australian competitors' scores were: Ellis, 184; Burgess, 174; Rumbel, 173; Finis, 159. Trevor Byrne was reserve, following a final elimination conducted during official practice.

The team arrived back in Australia on October 20.

1980 Olympic Games

Selection procedures directed at nominating the shotgun members of Australia's team for the 1980 Olympic Games were defined at a recent meeting of the Association's ISU Sub Committee.

No further qualifying rounds are to be conducted as such, although scores recorded during the National Olympic Trench and ISU Skeet Championships, to be conducted at Downside International Gun Club, Wagga, will be taken into consideration.

Assuming that the proposed Australia Day Games matches are held in Canberra in January, performances will also be noted. At the conclusion of the Australia Day holiday weekend a selection committee comprising Messrs Hawkins, Somers, Connors, Thomas and Reschke, will meet and will prepare a submission for presentation to the Australian Shooting Association.

It must be recognised that one of the prerequisites for Olympic selection is that the competitor must have international experience.

The shooting events at the 1980 Moscow Olympics commence on Sunday, July 20 and conclude on Saturday, July 26.

The official opening ceremony will be held on Saturday July 19, and the closing ceremony will take place on Sunday, August 3.

The Australian allocation of seats for spectators at the shooting events is reported to be less than 200!

1980 South Pacific Championships

There has been a further amendment to the dates for the 1980 South Pacific Shotgun Championships, now to be held at the Christchurch Gun Club from March 7 to March 15.

1979 New Zealand National ISU Championships

The 1979 New Zealand National Olympic Trench and ISU Skeet Championships will be held at Dunedin Gun Club on November 24 and 25 - 100 targets in each discipline on each day.

Entry fee will be \$20 plus targets in each event. Practice will be available on Friday, November 23.

Australian shooters interested in attending should contact their nearest Jetset Tours Office, Air New Zealand or the ACTA's National Office.

Australian Junior in Headlines in Great Britain John Fuller, son of well known Australian firearms identity Malcolm Fuller, recently competed in the Eley-Glen Grant Whisky Southern Ireland DTL Grand Prix, and the British Open Trap Championship.

The entry in the Irish match was about 250, and the event was run over a distance of 100 targets pointscore.

Weather was fair, and the scores were of a high standard.

Overall winner was Tom Walsh who scored 300-300 points. John Fuller had been entered in A Grade and ran seventh with a score of 290-300 (97 broken targets).

It is interesting to note that Walsh was a B Grade' shooter and in winning this prestigious event, achieved his first ever 100 straight. Surely, this is tangible evidence to support the argument that top competition brings out the best in a sportsperson.

Just a few days later, 316 entrants lined up in the British Open Championship.

Winner was R. H. Carter (299/300 Pts) and runner up was A. A. Bell of Scotland (298/300 Pts). Once again, John Fuller finished in a place in A Grade, filling the fifth slot with a score of 293/300 points (99 broken targets).

The experience obviously stood John in good stead, as two weeks later, he shot a 100 straight single barrel in one of the events at the Grand American Tournament, Ohio USA.

His father, Malcolm Fuller, achieved the same distinction many years ago, making it the only time on record that an Australian father and son combination has performed such a feat. **Domestic Scene**

The Australian National Olympic Trench and ISU Skeet Championships for 1979 will be conducted at Downside International Gun Club, Wagga on November 3, 4 and 5. Full program details will be found on page 10 of October issue of C.T.S.N.

Meanwhile the Northern Zone of the New South Wales Clay Target Association has held a fund raising match at Tamworth Gun Club resulting in \$422.52 being paid into the ISU Travel Fund.

Just a short note with a request for a bit of help on a problem our Club has run up against.

On or about the week ending 22 Sep 79 some one broke into our Club building at Bonegilla and stole the Club's Loading Press. The door of the building was broken open and the press removed from its bench. The thing that annoys me is that the Club grounds are situated in an out of the way military area and only the shooters ever visit the area. None of the other more valuable items stored in the shed were touched, not even the cupboard containing the loading components was forced. This means that the thief knew exactly what he wanted, he even brought his own tools to remove the press. I hope who ever took it cannot work out how to operate it because he missed the drivers manual and a couple of other bits.

The Club carries insurance and the loader can be replaced but that's not the point. To think that our sport may be attracting this type of person really worries me. We don't need these people in our sport, it's getting hard enough as it is without them.

The loader was used to supply cheap cartridges to our junior shooters and other new shooters who have yet to purchase their own loaders. It is going to be missed until it can be replaced.

So I would appreciate it if you could place a note in the A.C.T.A. News which may help to track it down.

Because of the cost and size there is not that many around and maybe someone may get wind of it. The details of the loader are:-

Dear Noel.

I am always very interested to read in the Clay Target News, items concerning Firearm Control. This is a potential threat to our sport and if shooters' apathy to the problem is not broken, we are in for a shock.

•

Shooters do not realise the power of lobbying. It is a powerful political tool used to influence governments, and it is a legitimate form of "forcing an issue". I would like to see a monthly column in the Clay Target News dovoted to Firearms Legislation, covering all States, to keep members up-to-date on the current developments in this field and to advise shooters what to do; such as write a letter to Local or Federal Members, etc. It has been suggested to me that this is a State Association matter - it is NOT! The State Associations have not at present the administrative capacity to effectively communicate to all State members on these issues. This form of lobbying is quite effectively used in the United States; such as the NRA and notable gun magazines have a regular column on this subject. Possibly this may by a huge task on the National Offices' existing staff, but we must start soon. It may be possible to appoint a subcommittee to handle such a responsibility, and report regularly via the Clay Target News. Liaison with other firearm bodies, manufacturers, etc., would also be beneficial.

We must be kept informed and prepared for adverse Government. reaction to public outcry. Pressure groups (the Anti-Gun Lobby) are on top at the moment and the Association must have an effective policy and strategy to combat this threat. I may appear to be overreacting, but I do not want to be around when I can write to you again and say "I told you so".

We are currently in the middle of a technological revolution. The age of the mini-computer is here. I would like to suggest to the Executive of the A.C.T.A. that the feasibility of obtaining electronic data processing equipment be investigated for use at the National Championships. The necessary tasks of processing score sheets, rehandicaping, etc., by hand must take up a great deal of management's valuable time. A mini-computer could save the administration staff time and increase efficiency.

The followingc are a few tasks these excellent machines could take over:

Printing score sheets;

(h) Recording 1st and 2nd placing in each grade; etc.;

Handicapping; Sweep Divisions; etc.

(e) Nomination Payouts:

(f)

Automatic "Squadsort" in appropriate handicaps; (g) Score information for completion of handicap cards.

Some form of pre-printed computer stationery will also be required.

With the proposed introduction of a National Shooting Ground, the acquiring of data processing equipment is a must. Shooters do not like standing in long queues waiting for handicap cards; etc. They have numerous enquiries concerning their performance which could be answered immediately on video display units. Staff would have more time to devote to administration matters. These types of machines are usually portable and could be used for accounting functions during the rest of the year.

I have previously mentioned in my letters to you, ideas for fund raising. The cost of a National Ground will be high. An Art Union run by the Association may be the answer to obtain some funds towards this project.

If you have any suggestions, please forward them to the Assistant Secretary, VCTA, PO Box 86, Mitcham, Victoria 3132.



These grants provide further evidence of the improving acceptance of clay target shooting as a worthwhile and responsible recreational pursuit.


The Member who never came back ...

SCHOOL SHOOTING IN NORTH WEST VICTORIA (from L. G. Barr)

The North West of Victoria is a relatively sparsely settled area when compared to the rest of the state with excellent duck shooting in wet years, and all round shooting at other times with quail, foxes and rabbits.

It is an area of the state where most young men with a rural background handle guns from an early age.

In 1972 shooting was commenced at Rainbow High School with a gun safety course followed by practical shooting with a hand thrower. The reason for the commencement of such a course was the obvious need for gun safety in young students. My experience in this area dated to the earliest days of school claybird shooting when it commenced in the North East of Victoria and I had introduced the sport in Mansfield High School and later in Corryong High School.

In 1974 following approaches to Winchester and IMI both companies agreed to support the program and to provide for an in-terschool competition. Rainbow High School parents during this time provided a shooting ground development on the schoolgrounds using a Snipe trap, and since that time a further Snipe has been added to provide two traps and a pavilion for catering was provided. All of this development was undertaken using voluntary labor and traps provided by the Rainbow Gun Club which had been in recess for a number of years.

In 1974 informal interschool competition was commenced and this was followed in 1975 with the first major interschool competition.

At this competition 81 students competed and eight schools were represented. In 1979 at the most recent Wimmera Mallee Winchester championship 205 entries were received, 189 shooters actually took part and 16 schools were represented. The area covered by this interschool program was almost one third of the state, from Mildura in the North to Horsham in the south and Wedderburn in the east.

This competition now represents a major sporting event for schools in the Northwest of the state, and for the last five years competition has been held on the Rainbow High School shooting ground.

During that period Rainbow has dominated the competition winning the Winchester Junior teams event five years running and the senior teams event three out of the five years.

With the development of shooting programs in schools it is obvious that this record of achievement will not remain intact for very much longer, as challenges are now coming from schools such as Birchip High School, Ouyen High School, Nhill High School, Horsham Technical School and many others.

With annual competition schools are now taking great pride in the preparation of students and the development of safety and markmanship.

This development would place claybird shooting as one of the fastest growing school sports and one with a perfect record of safety.

Much of what has occured has been due to generous sponsorship. and the ability to allow students to compete at minimum cost. In the development of a positive program towards gun safety Winchester and ELEY can have a great sense of satisfaction in what has been achieved.

Much remains to be done including seminars for teachers on gun safety teaching in schools, and the provision of even more support for this program. Later in 1979 it is hoped in the North West to enter the area of teacher support and this will further increase the development taking place.

The future for gun safety programs and further development of positive attitudes in this area is endless, and perhaps with a sound development and publicity of such programs the image of the shooter and the role of education in shooting will lead to a wider understanding and increased public support.

NINETY-NINTH ANNIVERSARY AT NSW GUN CLUB

(from Charles Hlavaty)

N.S.W. Gun Club held its 99th Anniversary Club Championship on Saturday 8th September 1979. The event was remarkably different from previous years. The Club Championship has been held since the year 1880 (with the interruption of two world wars); originally and till 1939 as live pigeon shooting, and since 1951 as 20 targets 16 yards double barrel event.


This year, the Committee, on a recommendation of the President Charles Hlavaty, changed the whole concept of the Club Championship. The feeling was, that to shoot 20 targets 16m D/B event did not fit the present shooting facilities of NSW Gun Club. A suggestion was made to shoot 100 targets over four different disciplines. When this change was announced by the President at our Annual General Meeting on 30th June 1979, it was accepted by members with spontaneous applause.

On Saturday 8th September 1979, 33 members hurried to the Club for an early 10 a.m. start, to participate in a free shoot consisting of 25 targets Olympic Trench, 25 targets Skeet (ACTA Rules), 25 targets 18 metres S/B Trap and 25 targets 18 metres D/B Continental.

The whole program was well organised and finished with plenty of time and daylight to shoot another free shoot - the Dick Pye Memorial.

There were no "possibles" in Trench and S/B events, but in Skeet Reg Clarke and Dennis Mackie shot 25/25. In the Continental event there were three "possibles" — Peter Lee, Clyde Hawkins and George Hitchin.

Straight out winner with 93/100 was Clyde Hawkins, who is now our new Club Champion. There was a shoot-off for 2nd and 3rd place, which took place in shooting Trench full round. Eugene Kavanagh shot 113/125 to become a runner-up and third place was taken by Keith Biggs who shot 110/125.

The various disciplines shoot was appreciated by every competitor and our programming Sub-committee is planning to include a similar program as an open shoot next year.



Our thanks to the visiting shooters who made this a successful shoot and would like to see you all return again next year. O


MARCONI GUN CLUB MOURNS THE PASSING OF JUDY CREMA


Early in October, the death occurred of Mrs Judy Crema, wife of Marconi Gun Club President, Leni Crema.

Some years ago, old George and I were pot hunting some ducks on station dams up north. It was about this time that nature decided that our drier areas needed a drenching, and a good drenching at that. Nature does this on a fairly regular basis in our hinterland. Boy oh boy, did it rain. For the first couple of days it was soaked up but it was not long before the creeks started to run. They ran until they could run no more and the floodwaters started to spread across the land. In primitive times these great drenchings were a blessing of nature to fertilise the land and recharge the water tables. But in this day and age it is regarded as some sort of catastrophe. Modern man wants access to the backblocks and has constructed his puny roads and ribbons of steel to achieve this end. But mother nature sometimes upsets the balance. Station managers smile and shrug their shoulders and settle back to await the dry-out whilst the southerners wail cries of disaster. Old George and I thought it was a bit of alright too as we contemplated a bit of good duck hunting.

When the clouds had finally sniffed back their last drops, the view from the station homestead on high ground was awe inspiring. Picking a likely spot after a bit of reconnoitering we decided to see what transpired the following morning. Dead black pre-dawn darkness saw us pushing a decoy laden boat out into a vast shallow lake crested with the odd saltbush plume. The air, still heavy with moisture had that fresh clean sharp smell we all know so well. It was warm and the sweat ran freely as we inched the boat through the clinging mud to where it would float. The only creature having fun was Lab Suzy. She splashed joyously through the shallow waters in an orgy of fun.

The light came gently and slowly, we could see a little, it turned from a greyish blue to a dull glowing red. The water was like polished glass and the low overcast sky was mirrored in the great expanse of water. It was as if the water was charged with light tired after bagging only four teal and one black duck, but just the energy as the colour gradually changed to a luminous goldy colour that almost made our eyes ache. As the boat floated free, we were suspended in a dawn of morescent ochre with deep blue shadows that only the Australian outback can produce. Our insignificant activity caused ripples which as they moved away caused an undulating almost heart stopping glorious tapestry.

Out of the eastern sky the murmur of wings heralded hundreds of pelicans, giant, ghostly birds tinted with the ochre of the morning sunrise, plunging down in all their majesty to land in their own images in the molten gold of that flooded plain.

We saw them all, all through the day, big flights of black duck, teal, hardheads, cormorants, in fact nearly every type of waterbird you could think of coursed through the air around us. There was so much water the action was slow. These ducks had no need to decoy in with so much room to sit down. The overcast sky broke up as the sun rose, firstly gold then cream as the light grew stronger. The sky became the deepest of azure blue and the great areas of cumulus looked like great air sculptures as they floated in the crystal clear atmosphere. So clear, the bottoms of the clouds reflected the colour of the deep red sandhills all around.

By the middle of the day, thunder clouds started to gather and in the calm before the storm the water was so smooth that the black ominous clouds were reflected so perfectly it was as if you could look thousands of metres both up and down at the same time. A clump of dots in the distance resolved themselves into a flock of woodies. On they came, grey shapes with their dark heads, you do not realise how powerful they are as flyers until they sweep in one glorious pass over the decoys and settle in a flurry of spray some 200 metres away. The gentle quacking seemed to say that no man could get within cooee of them anyway. So, in their security they chatted away much to our frustration and pleasure for most of the afternoon. Near sundown the duck gossip got too much for Suzy who sent them packing with an indignant charge.

We slugged it back then, and it was a glorious starlit night after the thunderstorm had passed. I cannot ever remember being so same I cannot remember being so charged up with the glory of a great day.

The flood ran away quickly and not three months later when I was back at the same place all that there was was a dried and parched creek bed. I often wonder if I will meet some of those woodies on the dams up there. If I do I'll give them more than duck gossip. O

Phil Jost, Manager of Blue Dot Targets has just concluded his first twelve months in the crazy world of target manufacture.

He shared some thoughts with the editorial staff of Clay Target Shooting News in a recent letter. In part, it reads:

What a year. What we need is a calendar that goes backwards to cater for those clubs that want their targets yesterday. And remember the telephone difficulties of last year and this year? Communications taxed our ingenuity to the hilt. But, despite some close shaves, we managed to get all targets to all customers in time, made many friends and I hope lost very few.

The most pleasing feature of the year was the progressive reductions in prices. The accountant tells me we overdid it, but we certainly became a lot smarter in the manufacture and painting of targets.

Sales for the year were pleasing, and well over the budget and ahead of what Tom Hoult sold in the year before. Sales volume is one of the keys to lower costs and this played its part in the progressive cost reductions through the year.

The other key to cost reductions is mechanisation. We made many improvements during the year, but the most satisfying was the de-

velopment of our automatic target stacker. I went to a very ingenious local engineer with an idea, and in no time we had a machine in the factory, which over a couple of months, we developed into an excellent piece of equipment. Our major competitor has since purchased one, and the maker has sent a sample to the U.S.A. in response to interest from there.

Our satisfaction comes from seeing costs and therefore prices held down, and from the birth of a new Australian product. I shall be glad to put any other target manufacturers in contact, in the interests of lower costs in the industry.

For my second year, I have some mechanical improvements planned which will add up to about \$20,000 further investments, all in the interest of more efficient production, and better quality products. However, spectacular cost savings are nearly at an end, and cost increases are present in all directions. I fear that despite best efforts, prices will tend to be somewhat higher in this present year.

So thanks to clubs and shooters everywhere for a most interesting and enjoyable year, which has given me as much personal satisfaction as any year I can remember. I am looking forward to many more of same. My aim will remain to provide targets at the cheapest possible price." O

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
