

SECRETARY'S NOTES

Here it is, Christmas already and it seems only yesterday that we were talking of setting targets (of a financial and membership nature, NOT clay) for the calendar year 1979.

The year has seen some changes, especially in the area of costs of shooting clay targets. Although, as Phil Jost reported in November issue of CTSN, costs of clays have been kept steady, cartridge and component costs have increased quite dramatically.

We have seen Eley make the decision to change from a major local manufacturer to become a trading operation, sourcing most of its product range from overseas.

The novice coaching program has been implemented during the year and should be showing tangible benefits in a new membership sense by mid 1980.

Griffith Gun Club hosted the 1979 National Clay Target Championships, and attracted a record attendance.

Later in the year, the Downside International Gun Club hosted the 1979 National Trench and ISU Skeet Championships, which were also a resounding success.

However, in spite of all the good news, the Association failed to retain 2700 of its members, into 1979. This is quite a serious warning signal as it represents 25% of the 1978 membership. The percentage loss from 1977 to 1978 had been reduced 23%, so it is clear that more effort should be put into obtaining membership renewals, as early as possible in each new year.

INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION

Australia's entry in the 1979 World Shotgun Championships, held at Montecatini, Italy in October, returned to Australia at the end of October.

Team members shared our disappointment at the low trench scores, but this feeling was substantially offset by the performance produced by the young ISU Skeet team.

In an unfortunate development arising from the final selection of the trench team (readers will remember that, for the first time, the Association sent 5 trench shooters away, to ensure that the best four "in form" shooters were entered in the actual competition) the team manager, Newton Thomas, was subjected to a highly critical attack from a critic in Australia. The ISU Sub-committee also came under attack from the same quarter.

There are serious consequences possible from these sorts of attacks on Association officials and working committees, and every effort must be made to direct comments through the correct channels.

In fact as a whole, the Association has strong obligations to "protect" its honorary officers, at all levels.

And so the end of 1979 draws near. On behalf of the Administrative Staff of your Asociation, I wish to express our sincere gratitude for the way in which readers of CTSN have continued to support Australia's BOOMING SPORT. We extend to you best wishes for a Merry Christmas and good shooting through the 1980's.

Remember that we have a tremendous sport, one you develop quickest by introducing one new member each year. Share with your friends!

ASSOCIATION AGAIN BENEFITS FROM FEDERAL GOVERNMENT GRANTS

(Staff writer)

In an announcement in mid-October the Minister for Home Affairs in the Federal Government, the Hon. R. Ellicott advised that a total of \$63500 had been allocated to the shooting sports for the period 1979/80. Of this, \$29,000 has been granted to the Australian Clay Target Association, to be used for the following purposes.

- 1. \$20,000 to assist in the funding of the National Coaching Director.
- 2. \$5,000 for International Competition overseas.
- 3. \$2,000 for general administration.
- 4. \$2,000 for international competition in Australia.

This is the third successive year in which this Association has benefited from an allocation from Canberra.

The most important consequence has been the full time appointment of the National Coaching Director, and his development of the novice training program.

The contribution to international competition costs has also been very significant.

LEGISLATIVE THREATS CONTINUE TO WORRY SPORTSMEN

(Staff Writer)

Due to an unprecedented rash of media outbursts against firearms ownership, the Australian Clay Target Association is currently preparing submissions to be presented to all State Governments.

In a pattern that is now becoming very familiar, headlines like "Secret Gun Kills Boy, 16" and "We are a Gun Happy Mob", have headed articles in which responsible shooting sportsmen have been continually maligned.

In Queensland, where a new Act is at the first reading stage, a young man was recenty shot dead with a .22 rifle, a rifle he had bought illegally only an hour earlier. The rifle had been sold to the youth, who was under the legal age for firearms ownership.

Yet, in the public outburst which followed the accident, the clamour is for tougher controls. WHY?

The existing legislation covers the situation, and, IF ADHERED TO AND POLICED, may be considered to be adequate. Certainly, it is illogical to say that because a law is broken the law should be altered.

The situation in New South Wales is even worse, where in July 1978, the Hon Neville Wran, (now State Premier) said:

"Stricter licencing laws would do little to reduce the number of armed holdups. The Police Commissioner, Mr Woods, having examined provisions in other countries, thought that changes to the licencing laws would not achieve a great deal".

Despite this assurance, which was widely promoted amongst shooters, the Premier made a statement in the House at the end of October, in which he said: ".... I did have quite a deal to say about gun laws, which I think are totally inadequate in New South Wales".

Mr. Wran went on to say that an announcement will be made in due course by his Government as to its intentions with respect to gun laws, and the use of firearms in New South Wales.

It will be clearly seen that this statement is in direct conflict with the earlier remarks, and has left sporting shooters quite bewildered.

In an effort to impress on the New South Wales Government the extent to which ACTA members are concerned, a petition has been circulated to every affiliated clay target club in New South Wales. Clubs are urged to have members and visiting shooters sign it as soon as possible and return it to either the local State member or the Premier.

The true situation is that the present legislation is quite adequate, PROVIDED that it is administered effectively.

Nevertheless, if legislative changes are to be made, it is vital that "user groups" such as the ACTA, Sporting Shooters Association and the Field and Game Association, should be consulted BEFORE such changes are drafted. An assurance that this will happen is being sought from the Premier.

The time has arrived where ALL firearms users must shrug off the apathy that has been apparent to this time.

Every reader is asked to talk to any member of State Parliament possible, particularly your local member. This request applies to all States.



NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS, 1980 IN WESTERN AUSTRALIA, THE STATE OF EXCITEMENT

With the introduction of Super Apex airfares, it is expected that a record crowd will attend the 1980 National Clay Target Championships to be held in Perth, Western Australia.

In some most encouraging developments, the Association's official domestic airline, Ansett Airlines of Australia, has announced a

new range of travel and accommodation packages.

The accommodation ranges from the high standard of the Westos Motor inn, which is located about 15 minutes drive from the Perth Clay Target Club, the venue for the tournament, to the Kingslake Village at Guildford, which is only about four kilometres from the Club.

The Toorak Lodge Motel is almost as close, so it will be clearly seen that the accommodation has been carefully selected. Other motels at which accommodation is available are Brighton Lodge, Belmont Park and Arkaba Motels.

Accomodation houses will NOT hold block booked accommodation beyond December 31, so it is in the interest of intending visitors to move quickly. By doing so, one can be assured of the best choice of airfare and accommodation.

In another exciting development, the W.A. Department of Tourism has offerred substantial help to promote the tournament, and a visit to any of its interstate offices will result in readers becoming more aware of the wonderful range of tourist attractions

available in Western Australia.

On the subject of firearms control, most readers will be aware that all users of firearms need a permit for each firearm while visiting Western Australia. Agreement has been reached with the Superintendent in charge of the Police Firearms Branch to take out group visitors permits. For this move to be successful, shooters who are planning to attend the 1980 Nationals (other than those already resident in Western Australia) are asked to co-operate by filling in the permit application form which appears elsewhere in this issue of CTSN, and posting and completed form to the ACTA office. Just prior to the Nationals a copy of the appropriate group permit will then be posted back to the applicant. Your co-operation in this matter will overcome the risk of any inconvenience when you arrive in Western Australia next February/March. Meanwhile the Tournament Director, Brett Watts is well advanced with staff selection and training. Pre-match publicity is under way.

Reports have been received that a party of around 60 Americans will be visiting Perth during the Nationals. These will be part of the Third South Seas Safari, a project developed for US clay-busters by tour directors, Roy and Betty-Ann Foxworthy. The group is expected in Perth on March 4, and will include an official team to compete against Australia in an International Trap Match, to be run over fif-

ty targets.

Additionally, fifty New Zealanders are booked to attend, so it looks

like being a big tournament.

The Organizing Committee headed by WACTA President, Geoff Hayward, is still short of trap and skeet referees — an advertisement appears elsewhere in this issue.

HERCULES POWDERS SOMETHING NEW IN SHOTSHELL **PROPELLANTS**

Some would say that we have too many powders on the market. Others would say that we should have access to all the common shotshell propellants on the market. Be that as it may, we now have access to 'Hercules' Powders due to the importing policies of Mal

We like to keep an open mind on these things, but come down on the side of everything that keeps the price of shooting within reasonable limits. Hercules Powders do this if used correctly and we will look into the pricing structure later.

In the context of this review, the three most popular, in fact three of the four shotgun orientated powders have been made available for testing. Red Dot, Green Dot and Unique are coming under scrutiny. Blue Dot is on the way.

Red Dot is the fastest of the quartet for shotshell use and is used for light loads, 28, 30 and 32 grams. If you wish to compare it, it is in the same class as Nobel 78 and DuPont 700 - X and to some degree. Nobel 60 and AA 452. Green Dot is the mid range of the shotshell powders, handling the light and medium loads from 32 grams up to 36 grams. Compare this one if you like with Nobel 62, AA 473 and Du-Pont PB. Unique is the work horse of the range handling the all purpose loads from 28 grams through to the big 40 gram loads. It has a place also in the sub gauges, 16, 20, 28 and .410. In all a most useful

Blue Dot is the slow burner. We have not seen it yet but its forte is in the big boomers, the sort of thing handled by Nobel 64, Win. 540 and 571 and DuPont SR 7625.

Perhaps this is a long way of going about telling you there is a specific powder for a specific job. It is so, the subject has been canvassed by myself and others over many years. The clue for this is in the fact that the powder manufacturers such as Hercules offer several powders in their range so that you can match the ballistic package for the job you want to do.

An instance would be in the field where you in one case require a gentle load for the quail, a nice snappy load for the bunnies, a powerful load for the ducks and a screamer for brer fox. You can use up to four different powders to get exactly the right shell for the job.

Most settle for three varieties, others (the lazy ones) can scrape through with two. But, there is no way you can just shovel varying weights of powder and shot into one case and get the results. Oh, they will go bang alright but I have seen so many guns come apart from this practice that is scares me.

At the risk of boring you, let's get technical and feed you a bit of useless information.

Hercules Powders are 'double-base' powders. Now, I will bet that has made your day. But seriously, most modern propellants these days are a double based for several reasons.

The combination of nitrocellulose and nitroglycerin which make up the double base formula are stable at ordinary temperatures.

What is more important to us however is that they develop greater energy per unit of weight. In simple terms this means more loads

per kilo for a given performance.

Let's throw in another good word, nonhygroscopic. In layman's terms this means the double based powders ar less likely to absorb moisture and go bad on you. This does not mean you can leave them around in moisture prone places, but with normal, careful storage they will last virtually indefinitely.

Hercules Powders are also 'flake' powders, as distinct from 'ball' powders. Whilst we say that in the range there are slow and fast powders, you would be hard pressed to see the difference. In fact, there is very little difference between all the powders in appearance. The slow and fast rates of burning relate to the thickness of the flakes and the coatings that are applied to slow down initial burning rate.

Some reloaders confuse this coating on the flakes with the black gunk that gets over your hands when you have to handle the powder. Not so, the black gunk is a graphite glaze that is applied to aid press metering and flow and to minimise static electricity. The coating that slows burning rate is actually in the surface of the flake.

Identification is made fairly positive with Hercules Powders in that the 'Red Dot' has an odd red flake in the powder. The 'Green Dot' has a green flake, the 'Unique' no coloured flake. We will have to assume that the 'Blue Dot will have a blue flake.

But, off things mundane and into things more practical. What is going to happen when you load Hercules Powder. As a starting point we took 'Red Dot' and loaded 17 and 18 grains with various components and had a look at them in the pressure gun. We did the same with 'Green Dot', loading a couple of 18 grain loads. These were 32 gram (1 1/8 ozs.) loads and we tried one 21 grain load with 'Unique'. also at 32 grams.

We had at a couple of 36 grams loads with 22 grains of 'Unique' also. Shotshell load specification panels are included showing the results.

If you have a look at panels 1 and 2, this 36 gram load with 22' grains of 'Unique' points up the need for careful choice of components. In a high base Browning hull, fired up with a Vihtavvori primer and with a AA (red) wad, the shell returned MV of 1151 FPS at 10220 PSI Chamber pressure. It was a tight fit in the case. Changing to a Game King green wad and to a Win. 209 Primer we got the same MV but dropped pressure to 9820 PSI.

Panel three would be a choice for a good 32 gram trap, skeet or trench load. Whilst it is a bit punchy for my taste it would have a large number of devotees. We put the 21 grain load into a normal Winchester combination of AA hull, AA wad (white) and fired it up

with a Win. 209 primer. The load ran figures of 1170 FPS/8500 PSI, excellent pressure/velocity ratio, good speed with comfortable pressures.

For those who like the milder fodder have a look at panels 4 and 5. Feeding 18 grains of green dot into a Eley hull with a Mono wad and a Win. 209 primer, the results were surprising. Velocity figures at 1070 FPS belied the chamber pressure of 6580 PSI. Certainly this load for a youngster or lady shooter would be more than ample with the benefit of less shoulder punishment. Now, if we whip an 18 grain load of Red Dot into a RXP hull with a RXP wad, fire it up with a Win. 209 primer it is a different story. Whilst the load is quite mild, look at the pressure differences. Proves a point about component switching, does it not!

So much for the preliminary testing, the reason being that we have proved to our testing staff that not too much that is out of the ordinary will happen if Hercules Powders are used 'by the book'.

So, let us turn our attention to the hulls that we 'down under' scattergunners will want to put these Hercules Powders into. Most hulls that face the loading presses these days are of the compression formed variety, although the departure from the manufacturing scene of Eley, there may be some differences in the future. Be that as it may, there is a little known subtle difference in the Winchester and Eley cases now that needs some airing.

Next time you have a spare minute, run a knife down the outside of a Blue and Red Case. Peel the hulls open and have a close look at the difference in the collar that grips the primer. It is smaller in the Blue case and this allows fine grained powders such as AA 452 and AA 473 to lodge in that recess.

Result? the occasional blown primer when this bit of powder lets go in the big bang. Flake powder such as Hercules and Nobel should not cause a problem.

But, be aware of this difference.

Okay, with that off our chest lets look at what you can expect to get when you fire the Hercules Powders in your favourite load.

We have put some of them in chart form for easy reference.

We have not had time to work up loads in some of the more obscure hulls but reference to the Hercules 'reloaders guide' will give excellent loads for RXP and Federal Champion II cases.

Further into the practical side, we list a number of powder bushings that will give you the required weight of powder with different presses.

Using the above table and if you would like a comparison with other powders, take a D.E. Load. Hercules fits into the cheaper bracket. Loader 18 grains it will cost you 2c to load each shell. Loading Nobel and using 20 grains you will be up for 2.4c per shell and Winchester, loading 21 grains will cost you 2.1c per shell. So, as you can see the Hercules Powders are marginally cheaper.

In summary then, these Hercules Powders are OK. They add to the range of powders already available to the Australian reloaders at a slightly better price. They are backed up by a good manual which has plenty of good, indepth information.

They meter well in all the presses we tried them in (MEC and Pacific), and providing they are handled properly, are clean to use. All loads tested burned well in the gun. All powder to you Hercules, you will make your mark on the Australian scene.

Why Not Give Us A Go.

AUSTRALIA'S GREAT SHOWING IN WORLD SKEET TITLES

(Staff Writer)

A recent contribution to this magazine by Barney Rooke of Wagga reported the World Standard Skeet Championships conducted at San Antonio USA.

Now the full scale World Championships in ISU Skeet and Olympic Trench can be reported. These were finally conducted at Montecatini, Italy, after many "off-again, on-again" type decisions, which dragged on for almost five months.

As a direct consequence of the delayed decision, all of the arrangements for Australia's nine man team (5 trap, 3 skeet plus a manager) were made in haste. In spite of this, they were basically successful, and a tremendous credit to the team manager Newton Thomas and the Association's travel advisers, Jetset Tours.

Actual team selection was announced after the South Pacific Regional Championships, conducted at Melbourne Gun Club back in

March.

The teams were:

Manager - Newton Thomas.

Skeet - Alex Crikis, John Summers and Graeme Boyd.

Trap - Jim Ellis, Terry Rumbel, Trevor Byrne, Jim Finis and "Pud" Burgess.

Once the Association received advice that the championships were to be held in Montecatini, Italy, Jetset Tours was immediately asked to make all of the necessary travel arrangements.

Difficulties were experienced because of lack of response from ac-

commodation houses in the Montecatini area.

Meanwhile, Newton Thomas was busy outfitting the team, which was to be the strongest and best presented ever to leave Australia.

Eley and Winchester assisted in the supply of cartridges for training and competition purposes. In fact, both companies were prepared to supply Australian made cartridges for the team to use in Italy, but an airline quote of \$3000 for the air freight frightened the hell out of everybody connected with the project.

Special mention must be made of the role played by Ian Hale in these preparations. Hale had been disappointed by his omission from the team. Hale had developed extensive contacts in the sports clothing field during his years as a departmental manager with Melbourne Sports Depot, which were of great benefit to the team.

In company with Eley's General Manager Ron Clarke, Ian hosted a farewell cocktail party for the team, just before their departure. The evening was wonderfully successful, and was highlighted by a presentation to the ACTA of a cheque for \$400, made by Ron Clarke on behalf of Eley. This enabled the Association to give each team member an extra \$50 to cover out of pocket expenses.

The team departed on September 26, by Alitalia Airlines, and a large group of wellwishers was present at Melbourne and Sydney

Airports to see the National heroes off.

After arrival in Rome, the team immediately transferred its gear to a rented mini-bus and travelled the 300 kilometres to Montecatini, which is a holiday resort town situated between Florence and Pisa.

On the way, there was a moment of drama when it was discovered that the team had filled its bus with petrol, when in reality it was a DIESEL ENGINED vehicle. Fortunately, the problem was discovered and corrected before any serious mechanical damage was done.

Team Manager Thomas kept his charges off the shooting tracks for two days to allow them to recover from the long flight, and to become acclimatised. In some cases, it was found that two days was

insufficient and practice was curtailed on the third day.

In official practice sessions, the Australians' form was patchy. In fact, the team manager called his team off after only one or two rounds on the first day as it became obvious that many of the team were still suffering the after effects of the exhausting air trip, which was of 26 hours duration.

Friday, October 5 was the first day of the skeet competition, and 131 entrants from 28 nations started the 200 target race.

Amongst the Australian camp, morale was high, and Boyd and Summers carded 24's in their first round while Crikis started with a

Then the newcomer in the Australian team, Graeme Boyd, really got in the groove to shoot 50 straight and finish the first day on 74. This placed him equal third overnight with seven others, with Russian IMNAISHVILI and Czech HULA on 75. Summers was on 70 and Crikis on 65 after the first three rounds.

Boyd continued his world class shooting through the second day, carding two 24's and a 25 to aggregate 147. This was good enough to have him placed fourth overall going into the last 50 targets.

The eventual winner, Danish shooter Ole JUSTESEN, shot three clean rounds, as did Matt Dryke of USA and Claus Koch of West Germany. Summers shot another 70 for an aggregate of 140 and Crikis finished the second day on 133.

The teams section was contested over the first 150 targets, and USA team, consisting of Mat Dryke, Joe Clemmons, John Satterwhile and Jeff Sizemore were the victors, with a score of 586. Russia was second on 584 and the host country Italia was third on

Into the last day and at least twelve shooters had an excellent chance of winning - even Graeme Boyd had an outside chance.

Unfortunately, whatever chance there was disappeared quickly as the pressure of a World Championship event finally got to him and his first round on the third day resulted in a 22, followed by a 21, for an aggregate of 190. This is the best score ever produced by an Australian at this level of competition.

Meanwhile, a terrific fight had developed for the honour of being the 1979 World ISU skeet Champion, between Justesen, Karlsson of Sweden and Imnaishvili. Justesen went into the last round knowing that if he shot a clean round, he was the outright winner. The task evaded him when he shot a 24.

Imnaishvili had a worse experience and shot 23, his lowest round for the match.

Shoot-offs were required to resolve the match - the following are the official results:

1979 World Skeet Champion - Ole Justesen, Denmark 198 + 25.

Second — Lars Karlsson, Sweden 198 + 24. Third — Tamaz Imnaishvili, Russia 197 + 25.

Fourth - Matt Dryke, USA 197 + 24.

Boyd finished in 48th place (190), Summers in 51st place (189 including a great 49 on the last day) and Crikis was 73rd (182 - Alex also shot 49 in the last two rounds.)

While the skeet event had been on, the Australian Trench team was training steadily at a shooting ground at Cappanore, which was about seven kilometres from the championships venue, this was necessary because of the fact that the skeet fieds at Montecatini are superimposed over the trap fields.

As official entries for the trap match closed on October 9, it was necessary to also conduct a final selection trial amongst the "trenchies" as Australia had five competitors to fill four places. This resulted from a previous Executive Committee decision designed to overcome the problem of out of form shooters, reducing Australia's team performance.

The final selection trial resulted in the competition team being named as Ellis, Rumbel, Burgess and Finis. An unfortunate Trevor Byrne was omitted.

(Subsequently, a number of ill-founded criticisms have been directed at the team manager and the ISU Sub-committee over this

Not only do these put Trevor Byrne under undue pressure, but they also represent attacks on the Association's working commit-



tees, which should not be tolerated. If Australia is mature enough in shotgun shooting sports to be competing in World Championships, surely these disagreements can be handled in the proper and democratic way.

Oh, and by the way, it usually pays for critics to check their "facts" before making rash and mostly unsubstantiated claims! - Ed. note.)

The trench match commenced on October 11, and was a disaster for Australian shooters. World champion Carrega carried off the match with a score of 194 — low by Carrega's standards.

Second was Alexander Asanov of Russia on 193, while five shooters tied on 190 for third. After a shoot-off in which he shot a perfect score, Alberto Giani of Italy took the Bronze Medal.

First of the Australian team was Jim Ellis on 184, filling 23rd place. Burgess was 68th (174), Rumbel 74th (173) and Finis finished 97th (159)

In the teams' event, Italy won the Gold Medal with a score of 568/600, one target ahead of Russia on 567/600.

So the 1979 World Shotgun Championships came to an end.

This was to be the "year of the medals" in Trench for Australia. It was not to be! Instead the "skeeties" stole the limelight and produced a new international star in Graeme Boyd. Summers also shot his best ever overseas score, so there are some bright spots on the horizon.


It is interesting to note that the American trap team, which normally dominates could only manage an aggregate of 526 in the teams' event, compared with Australia's 509. These scores suggest that there was some sort of physical phenomenon which mitigated against those countries who had no prior experience on the Montecatini trap field.

The next challenge facing Australia in the shotgun field is the South Pacific Regional Championships to be held at Christchurch New Zealand early in March, 1980.





245 SHOOTERS AT N.S.W. TRAP CARNIVAL (Staff Writer)

Many months ago, due to excellent submissions from Merv Lyons, who was then the President of Queanbeyan/Canberra Gun Club, a decision was made to allocate the 1979 N.S.W. Trap Carnival to that Club.

The 1978 Carnival at West Wyalong, and earlier, the 1977 match at Guyra, had been enormous successes, and Q/C Gun Club would have to mount a super-human effort to achieve the same standards.

This is exactly what the Club did, and the results are now on the board. The 1979 Tournament attracted a record attendance and was most successful.

Decot Hy-Wyd Shooting Glasses

By Pat Browne

Bud Decot is celebrating his 30th birthday in the shooting glasses market. He has always made a fine product and the latest offerings are no different.

I have been using Decot glasses myself for many years, since 1974 in fact and the several pairs that I have in yellow, grey and photochromatic have seen a lot of targets and have served me well.

Things progress however, and it has been over the last year or so that we have seen quite a few shooting glasses offered to the shooting market from various manufacturers. Some are better than others but it would be fair to say that the Decot offering is amongst the best that you can buy.

It was with a deal of pleasure then that I received a sample of the latest offering of Bud Decot from Gordon Nelis of Queensland Firearms and Sports Pty. Ltd., the importers of these fine shooting glasses. We will proceed now to look at them and through them.

There are many things a pair of shooting glasses can do for your game in clay target shooting. The most obvious of these is eye protection. Not so vital in trap shooting, but essential in skeet and simulated field shooting. Another obvious gain is in the department of eye comfort, particularly in the summer months when our sunshine can be quite devastating. But, apart from these obvious points, the big advantage to the competition gunner is that he can choose his background environment. When you think about this, you realise how important the choice of a pair of shooting glasses should be. The basic points to watch when choosing a pair are firstly, make sure the glasses are light and comfortable (Decot glasses are the most comfortable I have ever worn). Secondly, make sure the glasses are rimless and sit high on the bridge of the nose. Decot glasses in the regular version are set up perfectly and the Hy-Wyd II version is just as good. Thirdly, for modern shooting conditions with the multitude of coloured targets we encounter these days, make sure you have a range of colours available and that they are easily changed. The Hy-Wyd II version with "spring changeable lenses" fits the bill here.

So much for what to look for, more importantly, do the Decot glasses give you the goods? Well, yes they do — as well as you will see in a long time. For the technically minded, the Decot glasses come in two models with an option. The basic model is the regular style which has screw mounted lenses. The Hy-Wyd II version has the option of interchangeable lenses and the option of Hi-Lo bridge.







We stayed at a quiet caravan park beside the Edward River, where we met a group of clay target shooters (not there to shoot clay targets). 



BIG TURNOUT AT WESTERN AUSTRALIAN SKEET AND TRAP CARNIVAL

October 13 and 14 was the weekend chosen for the 1979 State Trap and Skeet Carnival. The tournament program included the Interstate Skeet Teams Match and the Interstate Trap Teams Match.

One hundred and two competitors attended on the first day, when the feature event was the qualifying match for selection in the State Skeet Team.

Weather conditions were good, although a light breeze occasionally gusted sufficiently to alter the flight of a target. Notwithstanding the good weather, possibles were hard to come by.

Only four 25's were posted during the first round. These were shot by well known Ken Holman, Lloyd Brockman, Dick Burton and David Henthorn.

Scores picked up a little in the second round, where twelve possibles appeared on the board. Amongst these was 18 year old James Neve, from Kalgoorlie, who gained a place in the 1978 team — he missed by one target this year.

Only two fifties appeared, being carded by Ken Holman and Lloyd Brockman. After placing the five 49's, the eight 48's filled the remaining team slots.

Jim Honey of Leonora was one of the most suprised competitors on the ground and proudly took his place in his first ever State Team. Another surprise performance was Peter Woods from Bunbury, who in his first year of serious competition, gained a place in the skeet team and the trap team.

The 1979 State Skeet Team included, K. Holman, L. Brockman, D. Campbell, J. Eddy, R. Burton, D. Henthorn, C. Bertini, G. Hyder, J. Honey, P. Robson, P. Wood, C. Hinkley, I. Halbert, W. Kennamer, C. Shepherd.

The team took the field in bright sunlight, although the wind had lifted a little. The team score was reasonably good. Team High Gun Award was won by Lloyd Brockman of Bunbury after a tight shootoff with David Henthorn — they were the only two 49's in the team

The second event was a 25 target Double Barrel event and attracted ninety entries. It was a graded event with cash prizes going to first and second in each grade.

Considering that the carnival was "a match for the hot shots", it is interesting to see that the entry fell into the following grades — A, 33 competitors; B, 32 competitors and C, 25 competitors. Surely, this in an indication that graded shooting has merit. It was also of interest to see the way in which the "skeeties" supported the trap event.

Ties occurred in each grade, with Robin Bailey, John Eddy and David Henthorn sharing A Grade, on a perfect score. In B Grade, Andrew Charleston, Ross Silverster, Merv Neve and Steve Nunan shot 24 to share the cash, and three C Graders — Rob Eamer, George Ferrara and Ian Cargeeg — shared the prize in that section.

The weather broke just as Geoff Hayward, President of the Western Australian Clay Target Association commenced the presentation of trophies, and heavy rain fell. However, it was soon over, and the day finished on a high note.

Colorful character, and a man totally dedicated to the promotion of clay target shooting, "Big" Bill Kennamer had arranged a social function at the "Swan Valley" Restaurant for the evening of the Saturday and it was well attended by a happy group of shooters and their wives. (Actually it is the belief of most that it was Bill's attractive wife Margo, who did all the work in arranging the evening — well done Margo).

Further evidence of clay target shooting's support for charities came out of the evening. Perth's Channel 7 television station was conducting a fund-raising Telethon in support of the Children's Medical Research Foundation.

Ian Cargeeg, past President of Perth Clay Target Club, "took around the hat" and raised a total of \$172, which was donated to the appeal. (The appeal total at the end of the Telethon was \$909,000).

But, back to the shooting! Sunday saw a return to the fine conditions experienced on Saturday morning.


The organizors had squadded the first ten squads the previous evening, amid some conjecture that the program would be adversely affected by late arrivals. The shooters co-operated well, and only two late arrivals were recorded.

The event was a medley of double barrel, single barrel and pointscore shooting, and was designed to provide the basis for selection in the 1979 State Trap Team. Included in the total entry of 107 were eleven women, which speaks highly of the family support for clay target shooting.

Gusting wind conditions made shooting tricky, resulting in very few possibles. The stars were Murray Alexander of Azzurri Gun Club who shot 100/100 (20 DB, 20 SB and 20 Pts = 100 pts), Darrell Wiese of Narrogin Clay Target Club, 97/100 and Peter Wood of Bunbury Gun Club (who had also featured in the State Skeet Team the previous day) who shot 95/100, including a clean score in the 60 points section.

Tom Vodden, well known Nationals referee and expatriate Victorian, shot 94, and Winchester's new W.A. Area Manager, Wayne Pilkington carded a 93. Then came four shooters on 91, two on 90, and seven 89's shot off for the remaining four places in the team.

Showing admirable chivalry, John Harris as Shoot Marshall decided that the Women's Team should shoot first. This section consists of 25 targets and Julie Neve starred, only dropping two targets and using two second barrels to record a score of 67/75 points.

The great showing by the girls put the members of the Open Trap Team under plenty of pressure.

The Open Trap Team put up a fine showing, although the gusty winds did nothing to enhance the score. Bill Kennamer dropped only one point to take out the Team High Gun Award, one point clear of popular industry identity, Wayne Pilkington.

The final shooting event of the two days was a 25 target double barrel handicap, in which the trophies were cartridges donated by Winchester Australia Pty. Ltd. and Eley Ammunition.

After the qualifying event, eleven possibles proceeded to shoot-off. After a great tussle, R. Thomson of CMT Gun Club was first, with I. Richardson filling second slot and M. Mascio third.

Burly secretary from CMT Gun Club, Bruce Hopkins, won the $11\ \text{to}$ 15 metre trophy and Tom Vodden took the honours in the $21\ \text{metre}$ plus bracket.



Friday 12th October 1979



INTERNATIONAL GUN CLUB (S.A.) RECEIVES GOVERNMENT GRANT FOR ISU SKEET LAYOUT


News has reached the International Gun Club in South Australia of the approval of an application for financial assistance under the State Government Equipment Subsidy Program





There have been many interesting developments within the National Coaching scene in recent weeks.

Probably the most exciting was to have a member of the Association's National Coaching Council invited to attend an advanced course on coaching techniques, conducted by the World renowned USA Army Unit of Advanced Marksmanship, at Fort Benning, Georgia.

Peter Quire, the Director of Coaching for South Australia was selected to represent the ACTA. The opportunity has given Quire a chance to become one of the best equipped coaching administrators in Australian shooting circles, as he had already undergone two advanced courses conducted in his home State.

Quire is currently preparing a detailed report on his trip, much of which should be suitable for publication at some later stage.

More recently, the National Coaching Council held its second meeting for 1979 in Brisbane. Ansett Airlines of Australia played its usual effective role in assisting with travel and accommodation arrangements, and also made available its Executive Conference Room in Brisbane for use by the Council.

The N.C.C., to use its abbreviated name, consists of Newton Thomas as National Director, and six State Directors, including George Biggs, Victoria; Jack Blake, Tasmania; Tim Catling, Western Australia; Peter Quire, South Australia; "Pud" Burgess, New South Wales; and Bill Stevens, Queensland.


One of the most common misunderstandings encountered by the Council is that its members are regarded as coaches rather than as administrators of the coaching area. It is agreed that in all cases, the people concerned have a valuable depth of coaching experience, their purpose is to develop a total National plan rather than be tutoring groups of ten or so novice shooters. This is the task of the Club Coaches, who are now in the process of being trained.

The Brisbane meeting was a most productive one, although its value was adversely affected by the absence of Tim Catling and Jack Blake, whose business interests would not permit them to attend.

The Council confirmed its objective of having an accredited novice trainer (or coach) at every club in Australia prior to the end of 1980.

Although this target date may seem a long way off, it is vital that Zone and Club Coaches be fully trained in the requirements of novice training before being accredited.

Meanwhile, the Federal Government, in co-operation with State Governments, and the Confederation of Australian Sport Coaches Assembly (of which the ACTA is a strong supporter) has agreed on the establishment of a body called the Australian Coaching Council. This group has designed a National Coaching Accreditation Scheme, and the ACTA has applied for admission to this scheme. In this wy Club and Zone Coaches can be offerred an official standing, which should not only improve the degree of professionalism of the ACTA program, but also gives the individual a certain status in the general sports area.

INTERNATIONAL REPRESENTATION

SELECTION

by Harry Somers Chairman, **ISU Sub-Committee**

PART 4 — TEAM BLEND

There is an obvious need to vary the blend of tried/proven and developing shooters from year to year, depending upon the international competition cycle.

Critical factors are:-

- The need to meet the requirements of the AOF/ACGA justification tribunals.
- The need to provide the maximum possible exposure of our most experienced shooters to high pressure international com-
- The need to develop depth in the number of potential top line performers who gain experience by exposure to international competition, to ensure the healthy long term development of our skill and standards in the ISU Disciplines.

It should be self evident that within the basic 4 year planning cycle, it becomes vital to bring our best and most experienced shooters. to peak form in the period leading up to the time of selection for Olympic Games and/or Commonwealth Games to cope with factors 1 and 2 (above).

The World Championships provide the means whereby factor 3

(above) can be taken care of.

It should be understood that we consider that all representatives selected for overseas competitions are under a strong obligation to pass on knowledge gained on their return, as an input vital to future development of ISU discipline standards in Australia.

PART 5 - DEVELOPMENT

There is no doubt that the development of the true potential in the ISU disiplines in Australia is disadvantaged by our limited opportunities to compete against other nations.

Distance, time and cost are the limiting factors.

It is evident that it will be many years before we will have access to sufficient funds to be able to overcome the distance and time factors. We therefore need to devise some means whereby we can build up competitive standards and pressure within Australia.

The limited availability of suitable ISU trench and skeet installations initially restricted any broad constructive moves in this direc-

However, there are now sufficient facilities in most States to enable a feasible approach to be evolved.

The first basic move which has to be made is to adopt a 4 year planning cycle.

Within that planning cycle a programme can be structured to provide regular competition, incorporating matches such as the National ISU Titles, South Pacific Regional Titles etc, as well as nominated qualifying rounds, all integrated with the International Match calendar.

There is a solid argument for considering all 200 target matches as qualifying rounds, since in team selection we are seeking competitors who are consistently good performers.

Planning along the above lines will also lead to the optimisation of use of facilities and provide vital experience for referees, range officials and administration personnel, as well as enabling competitors to plan their own programmes as to build up of form, and the spread of travel and accommodation costs.

The logical extension of the above is to plan to generate competitive pressure by evolving a series of teams matches starting at inter-club level and progressing through the levels of inter-zone and inter-state to inter-national.

This approach leads naturally to the extablishment of club, zone, state and national squads with an inherent "distillation" of levels of performance, and competitive pressures, at each successively higher level.

It can be argued that not all clubs and/or zones possess suitable facilities, therefore the proposal is impractical.

Surely commonsense, sportsmanship and understanding will overcome that objection (and optimise use of equipment) by arriving at sensible arrangements to share facilities where necessary and/or practical?

It is patently obvious that the adoption of the foregoing proposals would go a long way towards overcoming the adverse effects of lack of fierce competitive pressure due to our geographic isolation.

The long range benefit should be a lift in performance standards at all levels of competition, spurred on by the incentive of the primary goal - to be selected to the National Training Squad.

The size of the National Training Squad would be determined by the calibre of the potential available at any time, as well as funding

Such a Squad would need to be under the direct control of our Team Manager/Coach and would be required to adhere to a strict training and competition programme.

The internal competitive pressures generated within such a group all working to the ultimate goal of selection as international representatives, would no doubt lift the standard of performance within the group.

Careful observation of such a group in training and in competition would reveal the various strengths and weaknesses as well as compatability or otherwise, and would furnish the Selection Panel with improved tools for the determination of international representa-

New members and terms of reference for Commonwealth **Sports Advisory Council**

Former swimming world record holder, Mrs Karen Stephenson (Moras), and leading Australian athlete, Mrs Denise Boyd (Robertson), have been appointed to the Commonwealth's Sports

Advisory Council, the Government's principal sports advisory body. The two women are amongst six new Council appointments announced today by the Minister for Home Affairs and Commonwealth Minister for Sport, Mr Bob Ellicott.

The others are former international hockey player and Australian team captain, Mrs Audrey Jan.es, former top tennis player, now coach, Mr Mal Anderson, M.B.E., Australian olympic athletics coach, Dr John Daly, and the Executive Director of the Surf Life Saving Association of Australia, Mr Gus Staunton, M.B.E.

Mr Ellicott said the Chairman of the initial Sports Council, Mr James Barry, M.B.E., had been appointed Chairman of the new Council which had been expanded in size from six to nine members. The two other members of the initial Council to be re-appointed were Mr Alan Davidson, M.B.E., and Mr Wayne Reid, O.B.E.

'The Council's terms of reference have also been strengthened to

give it an increased policy emphasis". Mr Ellicott said.
"Its new terms of reference require it to advise the Government on all aspects of sports development in Australia including sources of funding, research, sport in education and the development of talented athletes.

'The Council will continue to advise me on criteria and priorities for the allocation of funds under the Sports Development Program". Mr Ellicott said.

This year's Budget provided \$2 million for this Program in 1979-80 as well as \$700,000 for the Summer Olympics in Moscow and the Winter Olympics to be held at Lake Placid.

Members of the Council bring with them a wide variety of skills in the sports field including administration, coaching, active participation and sports research". Mr Ellicott said.

The first meeting of the Council would be held as soon as possible. A full list of Council Members and its new terms of reference are attached.

THE FIRST AUSTRALIAN GRAND PRIX UNDER F.I.T.A.S.C. BANNER

The Melbourne Gun Club, as only the Melbourne can, provided very challenging climatic conditions for the Australian Grand Prix.

A strong wind, direct from Antartica froze the marrow of the competitors bones; and passing through, stopped high house targets dead in their tracks whilst accelerating the low house targets on an evil, "super I.S.U." trajectory.

The trap shooters also had to cope with the inevitable black band of clouds in the background, as the rain ran off their shooting

glasses.

All this of course, did not explain the suprisingly low attendance of fewer than one hundred shooters. One might cite the traditional Australian resistance to change, but this must be a small component. Perhaps, the shooter was not given sufficient incentive to undertake the "big one". Many responsible and constructive suggestions were made over the two days. Perhaps the provision of two or more events within the two hundred targets could be tried! Perhaps the more comprehensive use of optional sweepstakes (Ken Lowry's idea). Perhaps better publicity along the lines that this type of event is, rightly or wrongly, regarded internationaly as a National Championship and the results, often ratification by FITASC, are published and circulated all over the world. It is in these sort of records that overseas companies seek a recipient for their sponsorship.

As stated, this was a National Championship conducted over a realistic number of targets and the winners certainly deserved the title. Trevor Byrne, finished like a veteran "Centurian Tank" as he destroyed the opposition with a crushing 125 break to finish 196/200. This is the stuff that world champions are made of and the pressure of a slightly shaky start added lustre to the finish. The Skeet was seettled by a shoot-off in which the sheer tenacity of Joe Muscat (200/208) was just too much for the highly regarded Neville Moore.

(200/208) was just too much for the highly regarded Neville Moore. The teams' event was a "Melbourne" monopoly. Again this is not unreasonable when one considers that the Skeet team could be composed of five world class I.S.U. Skeet shooters and that the Melbourne club team destroyed the National team in the regional international trap match at Easter. The concept of National titles sits easily upon them. (The Author must be forgiven the case of one eye!)

Several important points were made over this championship.

The Melbourne Club proved that it was possible to provide \$1,500 in kind in the form of trophies whilst reducing nominations to practical prices.

W. Isles Esq. proved his point that the targets were shootable (if you have real ability) by recording a hundred break and 122/125 the first day. He also made the point that the nominations were such that a day's practice was realistic in price.

Bob Buchan proved that I could be wrong — yet again — by dropping two successive low 7's immediately after I had reflected that he had travelled 146 targets destroying every low house target. Although this lapse cost him a place in the shoot-off Bob had the dubious satisfaction of breaking a personal record of some twenty years on station seven! He was heard to say "Oh Dear!" or words to that effect. Thus FITASC has become a reality in Australia in a most pleasant fashion. A genuinely happy band of shooters competed in a most sportsmanlike way for a magnificent array of trophies. No-one was forgotten by the management whose performances was immaculate.

Is FITASC here to stay? I think so. Next year the program will be modified to suit the shooter who can only manage one day or who does not care for prestige. Next year, we will be in the position to set our own date. What price such an event close to the A.C.T.A. "Nationals" A question of which is practice for which! Next year the Field and Game Federation will almost certainly be a direct affiliate of FITASC and perhaps a Parcourse de Chasse event can be added to the program. (Please note that it is possible under FITASC to conduct a major event over several shooting grounds Perhaps the federation feels it more realistic to divide a championship between several grounds which will all be used for the remainder of the year than to build one large ground, which, as American experience has shown, is used little, and is a maintenance monster!)

My personal thanks had the forsight and leadership to "break the ground" in this type of shooting. Courage not only requires guts; a sound bank balance is also an advantage.

The promotion by Eley Ammunition in the provision of commemorative key kings to all competitors was a fine thing.

Winchester recognised the event in the presence of their top executive, Ambassador and shot, in the form of Ken Lowry who recorded a very creditable score to run second to Trevor Byrne.

I was delighted to see Ken, only true National Champion material has a chance of beating him into a place.

Above all I appreciated the presence of the "majority without hope" who accepted the challenge of 200 targets, who by their presence made life worthwhile and who reinforced my idea that it is this majority who really matter.

The International Shooting Federation has the prime objective to force a bond between all shooters. Such a bond was obvious over the Championship. The Federation is also there to serve and protect the interests of the average shooter, and, what is more, fulfill this undertaking.

In closing I would request any shooter, present or not, to comment upon events of this nature. I am able to promise that a consensus of Australian Non-Olympic opinion would be placed before the General International Assembly of FITASC. All that is required is a few cents for a stamp and a few moments for a pen. All constructive comment will receive a reply. If sufficient opinion becomes available this feedback will be made available to whoever care enough to enquire.





FIRST COACH **ACCREDITATIONS UNDER ACTA SCHEME**

A major step was taken at Brisbane Gun Club recently in the development of the Association's novice training program, when four Queensland Zone Coaches gained full accreditation.

After a series of Zone training sessions, culminating in an intensive coaching seminar conducted by the Queensland Clay Target

Association, the appointments were announced.

The successful applicants included Stafford Smith from Gympie Gun Club, representing the South East Zone; Richard Dean of Roma Gun Club, representing the Western Zone; Col Ennis of Dysart Gun Club, representing the Central zone; and Tom Comerford of Townsville Gun Club, representing the Northern Zone.

These four, together with other people already nominated as club coaches, attended the full day "teach-in" conducted at Brisbane Gun Club. The date was selected as part of a fully integrated three

day project undertaken by the National Coaching Council.

The first day consisted of a full scale meeting of the Council - its second for 1979. The second day was designed as a "training of the trainers" exercise, to which Zone and Club coaches from all over Australia were invited, and the third day was a novice training day, which was intended to provide an opportunity for Club and Zone coaches to put into practice the knowledge and skills that had been learned on day two.

Although it was disappointing to see only Queensland people at the "training of the trainers" session - it was expected that Club coaches from northern New South Wales would have seized the chance to attend - great encouragement came from the fact that some of the delegates had travelled thousands of kilometres to be present.

As an example, Peter Hutchinson came from Weipa to attend, and similar dedication was shown by Bill Wilcocks of Mount Isa, and Arthur Kenna of Townsville.

The strong support from the Sunshine State further cements that state's claim to being the most progressive in Australia. On Sunday October 28, a good crowd of novices attended the basic

training course. Bill Stevens, the State Director of Coaching, is to be commended for the publicity he obtained for the project, with coverage being provided by television and the daily press.

The enthusiastic Zone Coaches put on a very professional display of training techniques and will now proceed to train the club coaches in their zone, pushing towards the objective of having a correctly accredited novice training instructor at every Club in Australia.

In some quarters, there has been mild criticism because of the apparent slow progress being made with the National Coaching Scheme. These people must be made to realise that the long term success of the whole policy depends very heavily on developing a strong base. Such strength can only be achieved by ensuring that accreditation is carefully controlled to ensure that the people are fully conversant with the system BEFORE accreditation is confirmed.

In recent weeks a Federal Government sponsored body known as the Australian Coaching Council has invited the Australian Clay Target Association to participate in an "all sports" National Accreditation Scheme. This scheme is based on three levels, and the ACTA's novice training program successfully slots in at level 1.

A total of 120 young girls and boys, ranging in age from 12 to 18, had chosen clay busting as their sport. Bill and his "staff" had to train these people in the safe handling of firearms, and then prepare them to compete.

Due to restrictions imposed by Queensland laws on the use of firearms by juniors under 17 years, Dalby Club President, Alwyn Flegler had to obtain a written approval from the local police to allow the project to proceed.

The "competitors" arrived in groups of thirty and were first given detailed instructions in safety. The teaching included matter related to field shooting, as well as safety and etiquette on a trap field.

The tremendously high level of interest of the students was clearly demonstrated by the quality and quantity of the questions asked during the "classroom" sessions.

The trainees were then squadded into groups of five and were given practical tuition. Each shooter fired on five targets as his

After this, teams of five were formed and each team member shot at 5 targets, which gave each team a possible aggregate score of 25. The winning score was 17, which shows the skill that can be developed in junior competitors relatively quickly.

The OCTA wishes to thank most sincerely the Condamine District of the Autralian Scouting for providing this opportunity to participate in another junior training project.

Dalby Gun Club did a magnificent job in presenting its grounds in tip-top condition.




