



Clay target shooting has made a grand entry into the eighties, with some tremendously encouraging news having broken in recent days.

Firstly, financial reports for 1979 have been completed and they show, that for the third successive year, the Australian Clay Target Association has recorded a useful operating surplus.

For 1979, the surplus was \$31,750, and accumulated funds have jumped to \$123,885. Most of the financial reserves are invested at reasonable rates of interest, resulting in a healthy contribution to annual income.

However, the really big news broke during the Australia Day weekend when the Australian Government announced that an ORDER OF AUSTRALIA MEDAL (OAM) had been awarded to the Director of Coaching, Newton Thomas.

This is a well deserved recognition for Newton, who has spent so much of his time and energies in community training, and it also brings great credit to clay target shooting.

You know, there are very few amateur sports in Australia which can match the tremendous improvement in public acceptance that clay target shooting has earned in recent times. This improvement can be measured in terms of State and Federal Government funding support, outside sponsorships, the appointment of the Coaching Director, and now an Australian Honour for one of the Association's senior officers.

Mr. Jim McIntosh of Canberra has also been awarded an ORDER OF AUSTRALIA MEDAL, for his services to the Canberra Rifle Club, and the National Rifle Association of Australia. To get two "gongs" in one Honours listing is a remarkable step forward for the shooting sports.

More good news came out of the Australia Day Sports Carnival, held in Canberra over the Australia Day holiday weekend. Eleven sports, including shooting disciplines, were included in a program promoted by the Australian Olympic Federation, the Federal Department of Home Affairs and Shell Australia.

Details of the match are reported elsewhere in this issue, but the important point to be noted is that every shooting discipline gained tremendous media coverage. One of the reasons for this was the convenience of the locations, where each type of shooting event was being conducted in the same area.


From the pistol range at one end to the full-bore rifle range at the other, was only a distance of one kilometre. Also of interest was the number of competitors who used the convenience of the facilities to "bone-up" on what was going on in other shooting sports. This togetherness is vital if the total body of firearms users is ever to be seen publicly as being completely united.

MARCH IS NATIONALS MONTH. Perth Clay Target Club will host the 1980 Australian Trap and Skeet Championships, which will be run by the Western Australian Clay Target Association.

A warm W.A. welcome awaits all visitors.

NATIONALS '80 COUNTDOWN.

Perth is a vital, exciting city. The excitement will be greatly increased in March 1980, when clay target enthusiasts from all over Australia and overseas, converge on the Western Australian capital for the Australian Trap and Skeet Championships.

Visitors claim that Western Australians are different; that their way of life is different. There is not the jostle and bustle that accompanies life in the eastern capitals.

The hospitality of Perth people is famous world wide, and visitors to the Nationals tournament will be given first hand evidence.

Friendliness is infectious in Perth, where the universal wish is "Enjoy Yourself".

On March 3, the curtain will rise on the biggest clay target tournament to be held in Australia for 1980 — "THE NATIONALS".

The tournament is enhanced by the addition of a major international match to the program - plus the Mackintosh International Trophy.

For the first time, a shoulder-to-shoulder interstate Trap teams' match will be held. It has attracted first class entries from the states and is sure to be a highlight of the series.

Prior to the commencement of the Nationals, Perth Clay Target Club will hold a three day tournament, which includes three matches featuring top line trophies, and a good preparation for the National Championships.

The first day of the Nationals is Monday, March 3. On this day, the 11th Australian Skeet title will be contested consisting of 50 targets shot in two rounds each of 25. Unfortunately, the defending champion, Jim Ellis is in doubt, as he is scheduled to leave for New Zealand to represent Australia in the 1980 South Pacific Championships.

However, such favoured contestants as Ken Lowry and Robin Bailey, together with Robert Buchan and Australian Skeet break record holder, George Biggs will all be there. An international skeet teams' match will also be held, and it is likely that New Zealand and Australia will be the only two entrants.

Day two is Double Rise day. The 20th Australian Double Rise Championship will be held over 25 pairs of targets. Defending champion, Doug Smith, of Brisbane, will be there, and is shooting so well that it will take a determined effort to topple him. It should be noted that this match carries only an overall sweep of \$1 per entry, which is apportioned over grades.

The second event on Tuesday is a breakthrough for teams' competition, with the introduction of a true shoulder-to-shoulder Interstate Trap Teams' Match.

All states will be represented by five man teams selected on a qualifying basis.

The following teams have already been nominated:-

Queensland — Doug Smith, Richard Dean, Bill Stevens, Barry Nelis and L. Tselepy. West Australia — Bill Kennamer, Murray Alexander, Ralph

West Australia — Bill Kennamer, Murray Alexander, Ralph Tomlin, Wayne Pilkington and Tom Vodden.


On Wednesday March 5, the 31st Grand Australian Handicap will be held. The 1979 winner was David Coleman, who is unable to attend this year.

The trophy list on this match is quite extensive, and it will be a proud winner who stands on the victory dais at the conclusion of the match.

Thursday March 6, is the day of the "Blue Ribbon" event, the 28th Australian Double Barrel Championship. Over 350 competitors are expected to line up on the five DTL fields to shoot two rounds each of 25 targets.

In 1979, this event went into the second day before the tie-breaker provided a result. The eventful winner was Jon Whittakers, who will again be there doing battle.



75 Targets to be shot in one visit as follows: 25 tgts double barrel (each barrel of equal value). 25 tgts point score (three points for 1st barrel and two points for 2nd barrel). 25 tgts single barrel (only ONE cartridge to be loaded into the competitors gun), shot from 16 m, graded. Noms \$20.00.

All competitors intending to enter 'B' or 'C' Grades MUST produce their 1979 and 1980 registration cards when nominating.

In National Skeet Championship, the nomination includes a sweepstake of \$3, to be divided \$1 for the first 25 and \$1 for second 25 and \$1 overall. In National Double Rise Championship, the nomination includes a sweepstake of \$1 overall, to be divided into grades, on basis of the number of competitors in each grade.

In the Grand Australian Handicap, the nomination includes a sweepstake of \$3 to be divided \$1 for the first 25 and \$1 for the second 25 and \$1 overall

In the Champion of Champions Cup the nomination includes \$4 representing sweepstakes to be divided into grades on the basis of \$1 for each 25 and \$1 overall.

In all other National events, the nomination includes a sweepstake of \$3, to be divided into grades, on the basis of number of competitors in each grade, and to be further divided \$1 for first 25, \$1 for second 25 and \$1 overall.

The National Double Rise Championship, the National Double Barrel Championship, and the National Single Barrel Championship, the Australia/New Zealand (Point Score) Championship, and the Champion of Champions Cup will be conducted as GRADED EVENTS. Team members in Allan Brown Match MUST be registered through the Club for which they are competing.

Day five - March 7 — Single Barrel day. The perpetual Trophy for this event is the Bill Rainbird Cup, which perpetuates the memory of a Tasmanian member of the Executive Committee. The prize for the overall winner is an Antonio Zoli shotgun. This is an Italian brand of firearm, new to Australia and marketed by Boustead Trading.

The 19th Australia/New Zealand Trap Championship will be held the first of a series of events on Saturday March 8. Kevin Thompson, who won the Gosford (NSW) "Sportsman of the Year" Award for his victory in 1979, will be trying to repeat that achievement.

In conjunction with this match, which is scored on a points basis, the Allan Brown Teams' Match for Club teams will be held. Team members must be registered with the ACTA through the Club for which they are competing. Teams consist of five competitors.

At the conclusion of points match, the big International Match will commence. It is anticipated that New Zealand, New Caledonia, Singapore, United States of America, New Guinea and Australia will enter. The match will be conducted over 50 targets per shooter.

The final day is another day of highlights — first, the Mackintosh Teams' Trophy will be run. This is an International Postal match in which most of the Commonwealth countries participate. Australia's team consists of 30 shooters selected by the aggregate scores produced over three National Championship events.

At the conclusion of that event, the 1980 Champion of Champions Cup will be held. A new format will be introduced — the event will consist of 25 targets double barrel, 25 targets pointscore and 25 targets single barrel. The entry fee will be \$20.00 including sweeps of \$4.00. This will be divided into \$1 for each 25 targets, and \$1 overall.

At the conclusion of the competition, a presentation night barbecue will be held. Several new awards have been added to the High Gun list, including a Junior Aggregate Award, donated by Bill Attwood of Australia and Trevor Everett of New Zealand.

An overall Veterans High Gun Award has been donated by Fred and Val Horton of Sydney. This is in addition to the Cec Herbert Award, which is presented to the veteran who has the highest aggregate score, in the Mackintosh Team qualifying events.

During the Nationals (with the exception of the Grand Australian Handicap) only specially branded cartridges available through the ACTA Distribution centre, may be used. Vouchers for cartridges may be collected at the Entries Office.

Tournament Director, Brett Watts, is confident that the tournament will be an unqualified success and has issued the following statement:-

"For some time now a group of Western Australians have been burning up the midnight oil to ensure that the 1980 Nationals will be "THE BEST YET". If you didn't come here in 1976 you will have heard of it around shooting circles. I can proudly say "an unqualified success, enjoyed by all".

Well, here we are again. Are you going to be in it in 1980? Give it a go - Why not? - we can now GUARANTEE enjoyment, fun and a good tournament. Think about it. You don't have to be a "Jim Ellis" or a "Terry Rumbel" to come here and win an event. Gosh, I nearly did it myself - not so long ago. Give it some serious thought, I am sure you will never regret it. And bring the "cheeze" too. We have got so many interesting places she can see while you are shooting. All organised by the W.A. Department of Tourism, she might enjoy herself more than you and want to move here permanently!?

More seriously now, as a shooter please give me your suggestions or comments on how we can improve. What can be done to make the sport more appealing?

Due to changed circumstances, the new plan is to entertain guests on a river cruise on the evening of Monday, March 3. A boat has been chartered for the night, and the passenger list is limited to the first 130 bookings.

Full details of the cruise, including times and cost will be available from either the Entries Office, or the ACTA Information Centre.

This should be a wonderfully relaxing night and a chance to shed the pressures of the day's competition, under the cloudless starfilled Perth night sky. The Swan River is one of Perth's most famous attractions, and this cruise will allow you to see it from "the inside!"

The Presentation Night Social will take the form of an outdoors barbecue, to be held at the Perth Clay Target grounds. It is planned to provide a dance floor and music and this should be a fitting finale to a most successful week.

High Gun Awards will be presented, and the names of touring team members will be announced.

For the holiday-maker, the Western Australian Department of Tourism has given the Association great support for the 1980 Nationals. This support will be very apparent at the tournament venue, where the bright yellow Departmental mobile Travel Centre will be on-site to assist in the planning of day tours and the distribution of tourist information.






If you think all primers are alike, you've got some learning to do.

To start with, you're not alone. It seems most reloaders tend to lump all makes of shotshell primers together. Much to the dismay of the good ol' boys at CCI, who happen to make primers unlike anybody else.

For example, if you were to hold a CCI primer up to another. you'd see something like this:



Observe how the CCI battery cup on the left tapers in. No one else does that. While it may not turn you into a trophy winner, that little tapered step does help align the primer and makes for easier reloading.



U.S.A. TEAM TO COMPETE IN AUSTRALIA

For the first time in recent Australian trapshooting history, the Amateur Trapshooting Association (ATA) of U.S.A., has lodged an official entry in the International Match to be held as part of the 1980 Australian Trap and Skeet Championships. The match will be held on Saturday, March 8 at Perth Clay Target Club.

The team will be selected from a group of 24 Americans travelling to Australia and New Zealand for the tournament and sponsored by Air New Zealand and "Trap and Field" magazine.

The group has been organized by Roy and Betty Ann Foxworthy, and follows the pattern of the 1972 and 1973 South Seas Safari programs arranged by them as co-directors.

The ATA will be officially represented by Dr. H.E. Hewett who is the delegate for New Mexico on the ATA Board, and is a member of the Central Handicap Committee.

Two members of the official team have already been selected. They are Leo Harrison 111 and Joe Loitz.

These selections arose from a series of qualifying events conducted during the 1979 Grand American Tournament, which is the largest clay target match in the world.

A total of $2\bar{0}$,591 entries were received during the week-long tournament and the major event, the Grand American Handicap, attracted an entry of 3,863 competitors.

Leo Harrison 111 is a young man who has been at the top of the trapshooting tree for some years now. From Missouri, Harrison has attended most major tournaments in USA during 1978-79.

He was "top gun" at the 1978 Grand American Tournament winning the overall champion's crown with a score of 396-400 from a record entry.

He almost repeated his feat in 1979 although his score of 970-1000 was good enough only to win the AA Division. Since that win in August 1979, he has also added another major "scalp" to his belt. In October, he won the first ever Mid Western Grand American, which was held at Linn Creek, Missouri. Harrison's home ground advantage assisted him to a winning score of 392400, from an entry of 500 competitors from 32 American States. Harrison shoots off the limit mark of 27 yards (USA) and will pose a tremendous challenge to Australia's leading clay busters. However, the American is used to firing only one cartridge at each target, whereas in most Australian events, two shots are allowed.

Joe Loitz secured his place in the team after being placed fourth overall in the 1979 Grand American Handicap (score 99-100) and second in the All Around aggregate score (393-400).

Loitz has been included in the 1979 All-American team, selection for which is based on aggregate scores produced over a long period a nominee must shoot at a minimum total of 6,000 targets before being considered.

Named as co-captain alongside Leo Harrison 111, of the team to compete in Australia, Loitz has deferred his graduation from University to accept this trip. He is the only shooter in American records to have shot 50 pairs of doubles straight, while still a junior, to win a State title.

Loitz is 22 years old, and has been competing since he was 13. In 1973, he won the junior division of the Grand American Handicap and was runner-up in the High-Over-All (tournament aggregate over 1000 targets), in the same tournament.

The 1979/80 Winchester Tournament is almost concluded and has been a complete success.

However, for some time there has been a need for a basis of grading which gives less experienced competitors a chance.

Consequently, Winchester management has put a great deal of effort into the planning of the 1980/81 tournament format, and has come up with a good looking deal.

The Tournament will be conducted as an open event between April 1980 and March 1981 at Club Locations in each State of Australia.

The Grand Final will be conducted in April 1981 at the Melbourne Gun Club concurrently with the 1981 National Double Barrel Championships.

All Location winners (overall high gun) plus Location winner Juniors, Ladies and Veterans will be eligible to compete in the Grand Final/s.

Number of Locations: Victoria 5, Tasmania 1, Northern Territory 1, Queensland 3, New South Wales 6, Western Australia 1, South Australia 2 a total 19 venues.

The event to consist of 50 targets DB from 16 metres, broken targets to count, shoot-offs under "miss out" conditions.

Prizes: The winner of the high gun at each location will receive a Tricolor high gun Sash plus 500 AA 325-7 shotshells plus the 1st trophy for the group such winner comes from.

The Tournament will be conducted over 4 groups 11-14, 15-18, 19-21 and 22-25. The winner of each group will receive a Sharps Portable TV-Radio Cassette Player A/C D/C plus location winner Sash Value \$323 the 2nd placegetter in each group will receive a case of 500 AA 325-7 shotshells value \$120.

The winner of each group which will include the overall high gun winner will then form a 4 man Location Team which will then shoot at a further 25 targets each 1 visit 1 trap (5 from each mark prior to moving) making a team total of 100 targets. Scores will be marked points but broken targets to count. The referee and a committeeman are to sign the score sheet which is then to be posted to Winchester Australia P.O. Box 776, Geelong, Victoria, 3220, within 7 days of the Tournament. A record of such score sheet to be kept by the Club Secretary.

If at the completion of the Tournament series 2 or more teams are tied on broken targets then the points score will determine the winning team. The winning team will receive 8,000 shotshells, eg. each member will receive 500 each of AA 300-7, AA 325-7, AA 350-7 and AA 375-7. Each member of the Location Team will be supplied free of charge 50 AA 325-7 prior to shooting in the team event.

The Ladies, Juniors and Veterans Location prize will be a unique Horse and Rider Cast Metal Statue furnished in antique bronze and suitably engraved value \$50.00.

Trophy value of each Location including Sashes is \$2100.

GRAND FINALISTS PRIZE - Open.

Winchester Grand European U. O Winchester Trap Gun complete with Case, plus Sash, plus perpetual Cup to hold for one year, plus replica Gold Cup to keep.

Clubs will retain \$7 of the \$20.00 nominations and \$4.00 of the \$12.00 nominations and remit the balance, eg. \$13.00 and \$8.00 respectively to the ACTA within 30 days of the event.

The ACTA will receive \$1000.00 from Winchester Australia Pty. Ltd. to cover Administration cost. All trophies will be supplied to the host clubs free of charge. 

FROM THE DESK OF THE NATIONAL COACHING DIRECTOR

(from Newton Thomas)

The following articles are the second and third parts of a series written by Newton Thomas and Peter Quire after Quire's visit to Fort Benning U.S.A.

Part 2 - Range safety, etc.

Range safety, plus rules and regulations of ISU trap are then gone through in detail as it is realised that both coaches and pupils should have a good general knowledge of both.

Basic fundamentals of Trap are next on the agenda and instructors give a demonstration, shooting twenty five targets a piece.

Foot position is stressed. Instructors feel that this is of great im-portance, on all tracks foot position is the same. The centre of the body faces the right hand top corner of the shooting pad, (this is reversed for left handers), with the feet apart, approximately shoulder width, with the knees fractionally bent. The gun muzzle is held below the top point edge of the trap trench so as the target can be picked up early

Part 3 - Positive thinking and goal-setting.

Positive thought is a must. Negative thinking becomes imprinted on the subconscious for example, worrying about a problem target creates doubts in the subconscious so that when this target is faced the subconscious expects to miss, this becomes a self fulfilling prophecy. To overcome this, the shooter is encouraged to practise mental rehearsal actually shooting the target in the imagination so creating positive thoughts.

If a problem target is missed more than three times in succession, that target should be left so avoiding negative imprinting.

Positive conversation is also encouraged. Self discipline develops mental control, the shooter practises making mental decisions and sticks to them. For instance he will decide to get up at 3 a.m. and does so, or he will decide to reduce his weight by 3lb in a week and he will do so, this creates confidence in himself that his mind will and can control his thoughts and body.

As you will understand, this in only touching the surface of a vast topic.

Goal setting - It is most important that shooters set themselves achieveable goals, with an ultimate goal and that this goal becomes the most important thing for them. Most shooters set themselves goals that are not big enough, that is making a team instead of aiming to win the ultimate medals, they let themselves have a mental let down after making the team, instead of continuing to strive for the ultimate score. An Olympic Gold Medal should be the aim of all competition shooting. O

There are good stories on Steyr rifles, Interarms Dragoon handgun, SKB shotguns and Heckler and Koch's model 770 rifle. For the history buffs, Honeycutt looks at Japanese semi-auto rifles from 31-37 and Wood looks at Beretta auto handguns from 1915 to 1978. Sundra has a close look at the 7 mm Mags amongst other stories for the ballistician.

SOME NEW FACES IN **AUSTRALIA'S 1980 SHOTGUN TEAM**

Immediately after the conclusion of the shotgun events, which were conducted as part of the Australia Day Sports Carnival in Canberra, the Selection Committee of the Australian Clay Target Association met to consider the names to be included in the team to compete in the South Pacific Regional Championships.

These championships will be held in Christchurch, New Zealand,

Scores from the National Championships, which were held in Wagga last November, and the Australia Day Tournament were used to determine the trap (or Olympic Trench) team. In the case of skeet, the second match had been conducted at Frankston/Australian Gun Club (Victoria) on January 19 and 20.

The selected team is as follows:-

Manager-

Newton Thomas, of Melbourne. Thomas has managed all the Association's teams to travel overseas since 1977, and is a very experienced coach as well. Newton received an Order of Australia Medal in the Australia Day Honours list for his services to clay target shooting.

Olympic Trench-

Jim Ellis - Canberra. Aged 39, Ellis is by far the most experienced trench shooter in Australia, and has recently been classified amongst the top ten in the world.

His record equalling 196 at Canberra during Australia Day weekend was truly a world class performance, particularly in view of the difficult weather conditions.

Ellis toured with an Australian Shooting team which was invited to compete at the Spartakide Games, Moscow in 1979, where he was placed twelfth. At Helsinki, just six days later, he was placed fifth, and then won a Bronze Medal in the Great Britain Grand Prix.

A pest exterminator by profession, Ellis is married, with one child.

Terry Rumbel - Guyra. Rumbel is twenty-nine, and has represented Australia on five previous occasions. His most impressive performances have been his Bronze Medal in the 1978 Commonwealth Games, held at Edmonton, Canada, and his Australian record of 196-200 set at Melbourne in 1978, when he won the South Pacific Regional Championships.

John Maxwell - Wollongong. John is a new boy on the Olympic Trench scene. However, he has established himself in the standard trap area as a tenacious competitor with excellent powers of concentration. He has exploited this factor in the transition to trench, and is steadily improving his average. His best score to date in top competition is 187.

The coming international competition will be a great boost to Maxwell in terms of experience.

Maxwell is married with one child.

Greg Long - Melbourne. Long was one of the stars of the Australia Day match at Canberra, and carded a personal best ever score of 194-200 to run second to Ellis.

Previously, Long had won an international match conducted in Melbourne at Easter in 1978, with a score of 190-200.

This competitor was considered by many observers to be unlucky not to have gained selection on the 1979 team, and now has a great chance to prove his value.

International Skeet -

Ian Hale - Melbourne. Hale has represented Australia overseas twice previously, both times being during 1978.

Since that time, he has worked the minor wrinkles out of his technique and is now by far the best skeet prospect in Australia.

He has had a heavy competition schedule in the past three months, and has carded three world class scores in the last three tournaments.

His personal best score was produced in the 1979 Australian Championships, which he won with 196-200.

This selection is a timely reward for literally hours and hours of fitness training and skeet practice.

John Summers - Melbourne. After setting a new National Skeet record of 197-200 at Adelaide in 1978, Summers went through a quiet period.

Although he has not been able to repeat that performance, his recent matches have been good, including a 189 in the 1979 World Championships, which were held at Montecatini, Italy.

Alex Crikis - Melbourne. This competitor is Australia's most experienced skeet shooter, and in the last two years has competed at Edmonton, Singapore (twice) Seoul and Montecatini.

Crikis holds the ground record of 186 at the Singapore Gun Club.

His best score in international competition is 195-200, produced at the South Pacific Championships, held at Melbourne in 1978.

Graeme Boyd - Albury. After only two years experience in in-ternational skeet, Boyd has an impressive record. He first competed in the "B" Grade of the 1978 Australian Cham-

pionships, which he won with a score of 183-200.

In Melbourne during Easter 1979, Boyd was second to Crikis, in the Pesta Sukan Shooting Festival, held at Singapore, and gained tremendous value from this overseas experience.

He then represented Australia in the 1979 World Championships at Montecatini, Italy and scored 190-200, which was the best score ever recorded by an Australian Skeet shooter in World Championships.

As the teams are due to leave Australia on March 8, there is little time for kitting and preparation. In spite of this, team manager Newton Thomas is hopeful that his team will continue the run of wins which was established in 1978 and 1979.

Meanwhile, at the same meeting, the four shotgun representatives were nominated for inclusion in the 1980 Australian Olympic Team.

In naming Olympic aspirants, the selectors had to observe different guidelines in the sense that international experience, and performances produced under top competitive pressure are vital factors.

It is widely recognised that the Olympic Games are not to be used as a training ground, and consequently, performances of each potential competitor are carefully analysed and assessed.

The selections are:

Olympic Trench - Jim Ellis, Canberra A.C.T., Terry Rumbel, Guyra N.S.W.

International Skeet - Ian Hale, Melbourne VIC., John Summers, Melbourne VIC.

These four names will now be submitted to the Australian Shooting Association, which meets on February 27 to classify all the shooting competitors.

Later on, in March or April, the Australian Olympic Federation's Justification Committee will meet to make the final decision on team structure.



Shell has been a strong supporter of the Olympic movement in Australia for a number of years, and is currently the sponsor for the AOF marketing scheme.





Eleven sports were included in the carnival. These were archery, athletics, cricket, cycling, equestrian, fencing, gymnastics, judo, shooting, soccer and yachting.

In the shooting category, there were five major venues of which two featured clay targets. These were ACT International Gun Club, where the feature event was the Australia Day Olympic Trench Championship, and the Queanbeyan/Canberra Gun Club, where the program included a number of major trophies.

The trench match was programmed over three days, with 75 targets scheduled on the first two days, and 50 targets on the final day.

An early highlight of the weekend was the arrival of the Minister for Home Affairs, the Hon. R. J. Ellicott, to fire the first shot. Accompanied by Departmental officers Graham Dempster, Paul Brettell and Ian Higgins, the Minister showed a tremendous degree of interest in the competitors, and the nature of the contest.

A similar level of attentiveness was demonstrated by the official party at each of the other shooting venues and a total of three hours was spent at the Majura Lane complex, which spans five shooting facilities.

Competitors and officials were surprised at the knowledge shown by the Minister, and were impressed by his display of natural ability produced at each of the venues.



At the Majura Lane site, the ACT International Gun Club attracted an entry of 38 shooters for the match, which was also a vital component in a team selection series.

Not only were the competitors shooting for valuable trophies, but places in a touring team, and nominations for the shotgun positions in Australia's 1980 Olympic team were to be announced at the conclusion of the event.

The ruling Australian Champion Terry Rumbel was entered, and Bruce Lassen travelled from New Zealand to test Australia's best. Lassen had won the 1979 New Zealand Olympic Trench Championship at Dunedin last November.

Strong winds and changing light marred the weekend, although there were some very good performances recorded.

The fancied competitors included Jim Ellis (ACT), Terry Rumbel (NSW), Doug Smith (Q'land) and Greg Long (Vic), and all started well with the exception of Rumbel who scored 22 in the first round.

It was Ellis' turn to crash in the second round, in which he recorded a 22 for a 2 round aggregate of 46. Billy Iles had started well, with a 24, but 21's in the next two rounds destroyed his chances, and he left overnight to compete at Cohuna and Bendigo.

Smith and Long maintained their concentration throughout the day, with Long finishing with an aggregate of 74 and Smith just one behind on 73. Ellis had recovered in the third round to card a 25, to give him an aggregate of 71.

In A grade, the first day was dominated by John Maxwell of Illawarra (24, 23, 22 - 69) and Barry Scanes (24, 23, 24 - 71). Bruce Lassen was having difficulty coping with the blustery wind, and battled on to close on 63.

Tony Rowe, Frankston/Australian Gun Club, recovered after a dismal first round of 21, to card two 23's and finish the day on 67, as did John Petriella of Canberra.

The competition in 'B' grade was tight with five shooters being within one point of each other at the close. They were Graham Bookallil (63) David Menck (64) Bruce Dent (63) John Williams (64) and Ian Buchanan (64).

The two entries in 'C' grade were performing very well, and were carefully studying the techniques of the star filled 'A' and 'AA' ranks.



Into Sunday and there was no change in the weather, except that the light was possibly even more changeable.

Greg Long had been suffering from 'flu, and was in poor shape for the start of Sunday's shooting. He was first shooter in the initial squad, and was further inconvenienced when a fault developed in the phono pull system. When the fault was finally resolved, he managed a 23, while Smith crumbled to a 22, his lowest round in trench for some time.

Rumbel shot 25, to close the gap, but his next round score of 22 did his chances no good at all.

Meanwhile, Ellis who had shot a 25 in his last round on the Saturday, was right in the groove, and carded three 25's on Sunday to have a six round aggregate of 146. Long shot 24, 23 to finish on 144, with Smith one target away in third place overall.

In 'A' grade Barry Scanes was hanging onto his lead, with scores of 23, 22, 22, for an aggregate of 138. John Petriella had moved into second place on 135 after John Maxwell had put in a first round 19, to finish on 133, tied with Tony Rowe.

The battle in 'B' grade continued, although Ian Buchanan of Victoria had extended his lead to 2 targets over Menck, who was on 129. Dent and Williams were still right in it, and a most exciting finish looked certain.




The last day provided an exciting climax. Greg Long knew that he had to keep hitting targets to have any chance of winning. He produced a perfect score of 50, to finish with an event score of 194, his personal best ever in Olympic Trench. Unfortunately for Long, Ellis was not planning to relinquish his hold on first place, and he also finished with a scintillating 50 to give him a break of 150 and winning score of 196.

This was an incredible performance, as, after dropping 4 targets in the first 50, Ellis still equalled the Australian record.

In third place was Doug Smith - this was his second impressive performance in only two trench matches he has competed in in recent years.

Rumbel hit another rough patch in the last round, when he scored a 22 to give him a match score of 186.

Barry Scanes finished very well in 'A' grade, scoring 24, 23 for an aggregate of 185. This left him five targets clear of Petriella, who finished with 22, 23 to clinch second place. Just one target in arrears was John Maxwell, whose last round of 21 cost him second place — Tony Rowe was one target further back on 178.

The battle of 'B' grade burst wide open when Ian Buchanan stumbled in the last round, to record a 20 for an aggregate of 174. This presented Dent and Williams with a great opportunity to tie or take the grade. Neither could take up the challenge, and Dent scored 22 to tie on 174, while Williams shot a very creditable 24 to close on 173.

In the subsequent tie-breaker, Buchanan could not climb out of the rut, and managed only 19, while Bruce Dent looked very promising in shooting a 23.

John Williams filled third place, three targets clear of David Menck on 170.





Jim Ellis was able to equal the Australian record in Olympic Trench. Alex Taransky, John Tremelling and Joanne Hill set new provisional Australian records in pistol shooting and some unbelievable performances were recorded on the full-bore rifle range.

The ACT Shooting Association was the co-ordinating authority, and is to be commended for the standard that was set. It is this Association that is promoting the theme of a National Training Centre for the shooting sports. If the Australia Day Weekend Carnival was any indication, the ACT Shooting Association is pushing a winner.


16 YEAR OLD HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT WINS GRAND AMERICAN

From a field of 3,867 entries in the 80th Grand American Handicap, it was first home for 16 year old Dean Shanahan. Shooting a Remington 1100 and Federal Paper shells, Shanahan shot 100x100 from the $21^{1}/_{2}$ line to win. It is hard for Australian Trapshooters to imagine the size of this shoot and the monetary awards that can be taken out. Shanahan, for instance picked up a Jeep worth about \$11,000 together with almost \$20,000 cash, and he was not in the optional \$50 sweepstake! Top money from this went to Californian Don Slavich who shot 99x100 from the 27 yard line. His 40% with sponsor options amounted to a little under \$27,000. And they call it the Amateur Trapshooting Association?

From big money to big scores, and it was Wayne Mayes of Tenessee who took out the 79 World Skeet Championship at San Antonio, Texas. Billed by the Americans as the World Champs, they are the most prestigious Skeet event in the country.

WHAT SHOOTERS ARE USING OVERSEAS

A perusal of the equipment list at the Grand American shows an interesting trend in Gun/Cartridge use:



Top shot is regarded as the High Overall winner, and deservedly so. Shooting at 550 yards in four gauges requires exceptional shooting. The event consists of 100 with the .410, 100 with the 28 gauge, 100 with the 20 gauge and 250 with the 12. From a field of 591. Mayes shot a perfect score of 550x550 to win. He becomes only the third Amateur in the history of the tournament to do so. The event has been running for 42 years. In the sub gauges (.410, 28g & 20g) Mayes shot a Remington 3200 fitted with Purbaugh full length tubes and for the 12 gauge event swapped to a Winchester 1400 autoloader. In his march to the overall title Mayes also took the outright 12 gauge title, but not without a struggle. There were 17 250x250's in the event and in 28, (yes!) shoot off rounds, Walt Badorek missed his 678th target to lose the match. Incidently, Badorek ran 550x550 in the previous year to win the title.

Mr Whitla and his wife, Jean, had nominated a Wodonga citizen for the award and he expected to talk about the nomination.

But Mr Rutkowski threw a spanner in the works when he told Mr Whitla: "Congratulations Chas., you are Wodonga's Citizen of the Year."

Mr Whitla later admitted that probably for the first time in 71 years, he was left speechless.

"I was working at the showgrounds when I got word that Andrew wanted to see me about the award.

"I walked in and said he had better make it quick because I had to get back to the showgrounds.

"For once in my life I was tongue-tied when he told me."

Mr Rutkowski said the award had been made to Mr Whitla for his community activities, particularly in the training of youth, his work with the Lions Club and his involvement in the Victorian Field and Game Association.

Mr Whitla, a retired schoolteacher, was responsible for introducing clay target shooting into the sporting curricula of secondary schools all over Australia.

Mr Whitla, always dedicated to helping young people, introduced the sport at Wangaratta Technical College in 1958 to promote safety with firearms.

In 1962 he transferred to Benalla Technical School and the program flourished.

And when he moved to Wodonga in 1969 the program became a part of Border sport.

Mr Whitla said one of his first pupils was Graeme Boyd of Albury. Today Graeme is one of the world's best skeet shooters.

Mr Whitla has also devoted a great deal of his time to helping the

scouting and guiding movements. A member of Lions, Mr Whitla has not missed a meeting since he

joined the organisation at Benalla 15 years ago.

He is a life member of the Victorian Field and Game Association and was responsible for the formation of a branch of the association in Wodonga last year.

One of his aims in forming the branch was to promote the need for shooters to become more conscious of the need for conservation of wildlife.


At the match held by the St. George Gun Club in Queensland on December 8, the Siddons family again dominated the results.

BIG BREAK FOR TOP ATHLETES IN OUEENSLAND

The Queensland Government recently announced major sponsorship to prepare Queensland sportsmen and sportswomen for possible selection in the Australian team for the 1982 Commonwealth Games.

The State Minister for Sport, Mr. Ivan Gibbs, said the scheme would give Queenslanders in every corner of the State the opportunity to reach peak standards of performance and fitness prior to the selection of the Games Team.

He said the State Government would allocate up to \$250,000 to finance a series of live-in coaching and training camps employing' top coaches in the various Commonwealth Games Sports.

The 10 sports in the 1982 Commonwealth Games are shooting, cycling, swimming (including diving), athletics, lawn bowls, archery, badminton, boxing, weightlifting and wrestling. Mr Gibbs said a special Advisory Council would commence plan-

ning for the Program immediately.

The Council would be chaired by Queensland's retiring Director of Sport, Mr. Ron Leahy. It would comprise senior representatives of the State Associations of sports on the Game Program together with the new Director of Sport, Mr. Stan Wilcox.

Mr. Gibbs said each sport would select a squad of Games aspirants to take part in the special training Programs.

"The State Government will meet the full cost of bringing competitors to the selected training venues and neet their living and ac-commodation expenses," Mr. Gibbs said.

"It will pay the cost of employing top-line coaches for each squad and import coaches from overseas if necessary."

Mr. Gibbs said the sponsorship would be in addition to the State Government commitment of \$10 million towards Games facilities and the assistance available to sporting organisations from the Department of Sport which totals \$2.9 million this financial year. O

The Queensland Government was represented by Deputy Premier and Treasurer, D.L. Edwards; Minister for Sport, Mr Ivan Gibbs and Mr Gibbs' predecessor in the Sport portfolio, Mr Tom Newberry.

All spoke in glowing terms of Ron Leahy's contribution to sports development, and all were in agreement that one of his greatest personal attributes was his ability to communicate.

As a small measure of their regard for the person, sports people presented Ron and his wife Roma, with a set of quality travelling cases, which the couple greatly appreciated.





The first match is the South Pacific Regional Championships, which is a tournament for most of the shooting disciplines and spans the period March 8 to March 16.

The second is the New Zealand Trap and Skeet Championships. This tournament will commence on March 22, and continue through to March 29.



The QCTA conducted a full Council Meeting at Caloundra on January 4, the attendance at the meeting was quite encouraging, and an extensive Agenda was administered.
