



Executive Director's Notes

By the time this column is being read, the 1980 Australian Trap and Skeet Championships will be behind us, and the first Executive Committee Meeting for the year will be over.

Hopefully, constitutional change will have occurred at the Annual General Meeting and the Association will be better structured to meet the needs of an expanding sport through the eighties.

One of the biggest projects yet undertaken by the shooting sports, through the Australian Shooting Association, will be the discussion workshop to be held in Canberra on June 6 and 7.

An impressive range of speakers has been assembled to lead discussions, and the project will be undertaken under the banner "Shooting Sports Through the Eighties".

The purpose will be to define the development and promotional requirements of shooting sports in the foreseeable future, and as a result (hopefully) devise the machinery required to implement any plan that may be developed.

The outcome of this project is critical, as it will be the first occasion on which ALL components of the sports shooting category—both the user groups and industry representatives—have been gathered for the same purpose at the same place at the same time.

The clay target group will be represented by five members of the Executive Committee and many delegates from State Associations.

Another important matter is fully covered in this issue — that is the Association's 1979 Annual Report. It is a worthwhile and informative document and should be read by all registered shooters.

The report confirms that the Association has recorded another reasonably successful year, and gives clear details of where your money has been spent, and how the surplus has been invested.

In these days of ever increasing costs, it is important that all claybusters have a sound working knowledge of what their Association is about, and where the income from registration fees is being spent.

Speaking of fees, this issue (April) of "Clay Target Shooting News" has been delivered ONLY to readers who have paid registration or subscription fees for 1980. Consequently, if some of your friends complain that their copy has not arrived, please remind them that there is a strong probability that their fees have not been received at the National Office.

The transition to the Association's revised computer system is now almost complete. Apart from a momentary problem which resulted in a small quantity of 1980 registration cards being duplicated (if you received TWO cards, please excuse the incident and destroy the second card), the change-over has been remarkably bug free.

The Association has now terminated its three year relationship with Adaps, which has been providing a bureau service. Adaps have performed very creditably, and the company's staff have taken an intimate interest in the Association's affairs and needs.

Although considerable establishment costs have been incurred in making the change, quite large reductions in computer operating costs are expected to come from the new system.

The next move is to place the financial accounting system on a computer base after which the consultant shall be asked to investigate the feasibility of developing a computer system to satisfy administrative needs of tournament management. It is remotely possible that the ACTA could be operating on such a system for the 1981 National Championships, which will be held at Melbourne Gun Club.

On the subject of Melbourne Gun Club, a sincere apology is offered through this column to all competitors who were inconvenienced by the omission of the Club's monthly program from the March issue of CTSN. The problem was entirely the fault of the editor, and no blame can be attached to either the administrative staff or the magazine printer.

These last few paragraphs have been written in the Ansett aircraft taking me to what will be an exciting and successful National Championships tournament. The National President, Ern Hawkins, will be extending a special Australian welcome on your behalf to the international visitors who are competing, including a large group of New Zealanders under the leadership of John Paterson (who is a new member of the Council of New Zealand Clay Target Association) and the "South Seas Safari - 1980" party all the way from U.S.A. This group is lead by Roy Foxworthy (tour director) and Dr. Hewitt a member of the Central Handicapping Committee of the Amateur Trapshooting Association.

Next month, CTSN will bring you a complete report on the Perth Nationals.



Saturday 5th January, 1980

Well, here we are into 1980 and it is a new year for clay target

shooting throughout Australia.

What will be our progress when it has passed? A new Constitution for us to work under? Further development towards a National Ground? Where? Headquarters we can call our own? Improved facilities at our own clubs for the benefit of our members? Gold medals in shotgun shooting for Australia? I wonder?

Melbourne Gun Club, one that is fortunate in having excellent facilities for the shooter, was the club I visited this day. Bill Iles, from Metro won the fifty target trench championship with 49-50. Ian Hale shot 49-50 to win the I.S.U. Skeet Championship. Ray Lowry, Winchester Rep. who is now back in Victoria after being in Queensland for some time, shot the only possible 75-75 to win the summer Points Championship outright. Bill Iles, the fellow who seems to be able to adapt to all types of shotgun shooting, won a double on this day by taking out the Summer D.B. Graded Championship. John Summers, one of our top I.S.U. shooters shot 49-50 to win the Summer Skeet Championship. Ninety-five shooters were in attendance. A good start for 1980.

Saturday 6th January, 1980

Frankston-Australian, another club going places with amenities for the shooter, had a five event program on this day. Barry Webley had to shoot 66-66 to win the Points Championship. Tony Rowe who concentrates mainly on trench shooting these days, won the Single Barrel Championship 20-21 and Mark Delorenzo shot a clean 50-50 to win the Skeet Championship.

Friday 18th January, 1980

Attended a Victorian I.S.U. Sub-Committee meeting at the residence of State President, Bob Buchan. Contra to what some shooters may think, I believe this body to be of value and working in a productive manner for the I.S.U. shooters. If you think you have something constructive to add towards the growth of this type of shooting you should contact someone on this committee, or write direct to Trevor Nash, the State Secretary, were it can be tabled at one of our meetings for consideration. One of our main ambitions is to get our State training squad on the go as soon as possible. A pamphlet, setting out details regarding the State Training squad and other items pertaining to I.S.U. shooting, is to be printed and made available for those interested in this discipline. It is another effort by the administration to endeavour to improve our communication level with the shooter.

Saturday 19th, Sunday 20th January, 1980

Frankston-Australian Gun Club hosted the final 200 target I.S.U. Skeet qualifying round, for team selection to go to New Zealand, for the South Pacific Regional Championships this day. Whilst this was in progress, a 200 target Trench State qualifying round was also being shot. The skeet attracted seventeen entries. After the first 100,

Ian Hale led the way with 96-100. His nearest rival was John Summers on 94, then came Alex Crikis on 93. Graeme Boyd who started with the only 25 could only manage 87. John Woolley, the New Zealander shot a 90. In final calculations, Hale came in the winner with 191-200, Crikis and Summers finished equal on 188-200 and Boyd 184-200. Woolley was next with 180-200. The 200 trench event carried 30 entries and their own club member Greg Long cleaned up the field breaking 184 targets out of the 200. John Green from Korumburra was the next best with 182-200.

Sunday also carried a D.T.L. program and Ron Clarke from Werribee won the Points Championship 123-123. Mario Fillipelli shot the only possible in the single Barrel Championship and won it with 15-15. Dimingo Diaz won the skeet with 25-25.

Monday 21st, Tuesday 22nd January, 1980

These two days were spent looking at reception centres in Melbourne on behalf of our 1981 Nationals Sub-Committee. It is intended to conduct a Presentation night and Dinner dance at the completion of the Nationals to be held at the Melbourne Gun Club over the Easter period of 1981. Tentative bookings have been made at various establishments, and a full report will be submitted to the Committee for their selection and approval of premises to conduct the venue. Should be a great spectacle if all goes to plan.

Also took the opportunity to call at the office and spend a couple of hours in consultation with our National Secretary, Noel Southey, on matters pertaining to our sport in general. The visit was quite informative and well worth the effort. Thanks for your time Noel. It is now Thursday and it is off to Canberra where the Australia Day

Games are to be held.



There were 38 entries on the board, and after the first 75 Greg Long from Victoria led the field with 74, Smith was on 73, Scanes and Ellis 71 and Rumbel 68. The first day was rather windy and kept scores low, however it calmed for the next two days and Ellis put the pressure on all competitors by shooting 150 straight to be first overall with 196-200. Greg Long from Frankston-Australia Gun Club in Victoria finished two targets behind on 194-200 and was second, Doug Smith, Queensland 191-200

Those to win a guernsey were in trench, Jim Ellis, A.C.T., Terry Rumbel, Taree-Wingham N.S.W., Greg Long, Frankston-Australian, Victoria and John Maxwell, Illawarra Gun Club, N.S.W. Skeet, Ian Hale, John Summers, Alex Crikis, Melbourne Victoria and Graeme Boyd, Wangaratta Victoria. As for Olympic selection, Jim Ellis and Terry Rumbel were recommended for trench and Ian Hale and John Summers for skeet. Good shooting in New Zealand "fellas", and I hope if not all, at least some of you will make Australia's Olympic shooting team.

Being elected to the panel which has the arduous task of investigating and looking at grounds that have been recommended and considered suitable for a National ground, the opportunity was taken to inspect a site near the Canberra Airport where an effort is being made to acquire and develop a shooting complex. Regardless of whether we think a National Ground is needed or not, it is obvious to me that our sport is suffering because of the standard of our present facilities, where some of our major tournaments are conducted. Clubs and administrators are doing an excellent job under the facilities available, but we all need to look at the future, if we are to progress and become a strength in our shooting. Think about it, and come up with an answer if you can.

Australia Day Sports Carnival QUEANBEYAN/CANBERRA GUN CLUB HOSTS D.T.L. SECTION

Sunday 27th January dawned bright and sunny. The committee arrived at the clubhouse apprehensively wondering how many shooters would travel to this, the Club's first Australia Day Championships. No-one need have worried — by 10.30 a.m. 85 shooters had nominated. They had come from Darwin, South Australia, Queensland, Victoria, all over New South Wales and the A.C.T. Total number of shooters for the weekend was 115, which was far beyond expectations.

With ideal shooting conditions there were 18 possibles shot in the eyeopener event. Event two was the Australia Day Points Score Championship, 50 Targets from 16m. First to win a New Zealand trip was Kevin Thompson from Wyong who shot 149-150. Second with a trophy valued at \$129, was Bill Stevens from Brisbane 148-150. Third with a trophy valued at \$65.00 was Barry Duncan from West Wyalong 147-150. Intermediate was won by John Topsfield of Queanbeyan/Canberra with 139-150, and front marker was Clarrie McCarthy from Berridale with 138-150. Both these shooters lost metres

There was a pause in the shooting whilst President Rob Parker welcomed the visitors to the club, and called on National President Ern Hawkins to present commemorative medallions to the participants that day. These unique bronzed medallions had been struck by the Australian Olympic Federation as a memento for all sportsmen at these Inaugural Australia Day Games. That was not the only task

Ern had that day — I also saw him refereeing! and with 16 squads for most of the events we needed every referee on the ground to lend a hand. The efforts of all referees and scorers were very much appreciated.

After the presentation came event three, the Grand Australia Day Handicap of 50 targets. Overall winner and winner of the second New Zealand trip was local club member Dave Zevan who shot

60-60. Dave scored two metres for his efforts, but that didn't wipe the smile off his face! In the 11-12 m group Alan Hateley won with 58-59 and lost a metre. Alan is a comparatively new shooter, and also a member of the host club. 13-15 m group saw another Queanbeyan/-Canberra club member, new shoot marshall Mark Kolstad win with 59-60. SOMETHING NEW IN LUBRICANTS

TRI-FLON, MAYBE IT WILL TURN YOUR **FAVOURITE PIECE INTO A** 'NON STICK' MIRACLE.

I must admit I am impressed with this product. Bob Oldfield, of HY-GUN products in Queensland, sent me a sample of the lubricant, together with some technical literature some time ago and I have been happily squirting it all over different things to get some sort of an idea as to its merits. In short order, I have stopped all the doors in the house squeaking, loosened a rusty gate, smoothed out a jerky linotype machine, cleaned and lubricated my typewriter and just lately have got around to using TRI-FLON on my guns.

Now, before you think this is just another lubricant in a spray can, it is not. A spin off from space technology, it is a 'teflon' based synthesized fluid that becomes a total lubricating system. The technical specifications of this product are impressive to say the least. Based on United States military specs, an acceptable gun lubricant must perform on friction surfaces loaded to 250 psi for four minutes without binding. This product knocked that spec into a cocked hat by performing at 1200 psi for 20 minutes. Another spec has the minimum requirement for protection set at 30 hours in a 5% salt solution. Tri-Flon went an incredible 165 hours!

The reason for this remarkable performance of Tri-Fion as a lubricant lies in the makeup of the material itself. TEFLON is the reason and in its form of microscopic particles suspended in a hydrocarbon solution, the minute particles fill the irregularities in metal surfaces to 'smooth out' friction surfaces. The end result of course is that the machine or weapon works that much easier and smoother.

There are some very noticeable spin offs for the gun owner that are worth noting. As an anti-corrosive lubricant it is a boon to the hunter who uses his gun in wet conditions. The product's ability to fill the surface of the metal with Teflon effectively removes the grit and corrosive particles from metal surfaces that cause scoring and binding in closely fitted metal to metal bearing surfaces such as you find in break-open shotguns in particular, and in other types of guns.

The fact that Tri-Flon has such very light viscosity, the lubricant can reach and protect surfaces that ordinary lubricants cannot reach, let alone hope to remain on the surface.


In a practical sense, I have now used Tri-Flon on several guns with quite remarkable results. After thoroughly cleaning a trap gun with the lubricant, I was amazed at the amount of gunk that was loosened and removed. Unburned powder and varnish residues (a by product of modern smokeless powders, that is impossible to detect in some places), primer fouling on action faces, and general grime and old oil just fell away and the gun looked and operated like new. More to the point however is that the gun is now much easier to clean. On a pump gun or auto loader the results have to be experienced to be believed.

NASA had a bit to say about Tri-Flon when it evaluated it and by way of explanation of some of the terms mentioned, the following are some excerpts from their publication SP-38

1. Adhesive or galling wear: This type of wear is produced by the momentary touching of adjacent, moving surfaces. A phenomenon generally known as 'stick-slip' occurs which can result in the sudden adhesion, then movement of often quite finite and localised areas. During adhesion, microscopic welding can occur which, when motion continues, tears minute bits of material from the surface.

When you see it, grab a sample and try, you will be absolutely amazed at what it will do for the operation of your firearm. It is without doubt the best lubricant I have ever used on my guns.

Editor's Mailbox

Dear Noel,

Re: National Shooting Ground Referendum

I suppose succeeding issues to the February C.T.S.N. will indicate the degree and depth among registered shooters to the controversy surrounding the method of conducting the above in compliance with the relevant resolution adopted by the 1979 A.G.M. held at Griffith. May I be permitted to ventilate my views?

My first thought is "how critical is the referendum result, obtained by whatever method?" The device of the poll of shooters sets out "to establish whether or not a policy of establishing a National

Shooting Ground is supported"

Assuming for the moment that no invalidity exists either to accepting the motion in its present form, nor to the method of conducting the poll (i.e. constitutionally) then what have we? The National Executive has been told by the membership that "a policy of establishing a N.S.G. is supported". Surely there is a long step between the adoption or ratification of policy and its implementation in terms of executive action to proceed with construction, without any further consultation with members. In my view, the Executive body has only a mandate to examine the proposal seriously, is authorised to expend funds to commission an expert feasibility study to evaluate viability, to determine the most suited location (after delineating the role envisaged), the proposed layout/s and facilities to service the Ground, means of overall funding etc, etc, and to present such proposal/s (there may be alternatives) to members for determination. If an affirmative emerged then the policy becomes a plan to be implemented as expeditiously as possible.

According to figures quoted in the February article, 57.25% of affiliated Clubs returned referendum results, a majority though a small one. The Editor in his note indicates that the aggregate club membership in those results was 2,446 – 68% of which was "for". I do realise that the 2,446 could be only 38% (a little less or more) of the aggregate membership of all affiliated clubs, but in my experience, anyone who expects a large majority response from memberships today is just not being realistic. Only 38.7% of clubs are known to be in favour of supporting the policy, perhaps some of the remaining clubs (115) have declined to vote on the issue - holding a franchise does not always imply an inclination to exercise it, some may have been apathetic, others victim of communication

breakdown.

To my mind the method of decentralising to Clubs to conduct the referendum of registered shooter members is fair enough, and the voting response likewise when one considers that in local government elections under non-compulsory legislation during recent years, councils have been elected to office on the results of the voting of as low as 17% of enrolled electors. The remainder were not disentitled to a vote - their non-attendance at the polling booth precluded it.

I support the action taken to conduct the referendum for these reasons:

 a) It was much speedier and less expensive than the "centralised" concept.

b) I doubt if "individual registered shooter" response would have been any more conclusive on presently available information.

Out of it the National Executive could only be commissioned to "support a policy" by exploring ways and means - albeit expeditiously.

d) I doubt that the A.C.T.A. Executive has the constitutional authority to by-pass its legal members, to wit; Affiliated Clubs, and go direct to registered shooters individually for direction and/or authority to act.

At A.G.M.'s heretofore Clubs' voices have been heard through their officially notified delegates - a decision taken was that of a majority of the Clubs represented at those meetings, not that of the total affiliated club membership of the A.C.T.A. It is a pity in order to avoid any misapprehension that the words "through their respective clubs" had not been inserted next after the word "shooters" when the motion was framed.

I most heartily commend Chris Penno on his interest and effort in presenting his club's objection, and unequivocally defend its right to

But I am concerned about the future of inter-school shooting because I feel it is becoming too commercialised, and the true

purpose of the movement is being lost.

In recent publications of the A.C.T.A. I have read with pleasure of State championships being held, but the pleasure has turned to concern because the essentials of the purpose of the events are being ignored.

Do these young competitors know anything of our trespass laws, of conservation of our wild life? Are they taught to respect the property

of other people?

I think it's time the A.C.T.A coaches got together with the Fisheries and Wildlife Department, the Victorian Field and Game Association, the Victoria Police and with teachers in the schools conducting classes in Safety with Firearms.

It's all very well having a champion shooter, but does that champion have the knowledge and responsibility to shoot under natural

field conditions?

The misuse of firearms is getting a bad name for the responsible shooter because of vandalism that is visibly rife through the country.

Admittedly many of these people come from city areas and don't

realise the damage they do.

With firm guidelines set for instructors to follow there'll be more responsible shooters and more competent young people using firearms

I feel the whole movement of teaching young people Safety with Firearms is being taken away from the teachers in order that business gains some kudos.

Consider that teachers have taught 'responsibility' along with marksmanship, and have done this for years with the blessing and assistance of Gun Clubs and Gun Club members.








The trophy was presented to Russel! Mark, who was named "Junior Sportsman of the Year".


The award is limited to sports people under the age of 16, and Russell's win came after his remarkable year on the trapshooting



BET A DOG! (by Tom Gannon)

Shootin' ain't shootin' without a dog and a mate.

Don Corstorphan and his mid-70's Victorian Western district mate (see November 1979 News) retrieve snipe from tall, dense scrub by sight - after reaching the spot that the bird went down, by shaking tree tops or waving a long stick.

A bird dog would save all that bullocking.

Even when a snipe is caught up in a tree, the dog will tell you by putting its front paws on the trunk and looking up.

Many snipe shooters will not use a dog because it flushes birds out of range. They don't realise that a snipe pays a dog no more attention than cattle, and invariably resettles within 50 metres.


A dog covers (at a guess) four times more country than a man. AND FINDS FOUR TIMES AS MANY BIRDS.

Snipe, like quail, will run out of a shooter's way. But it won't trick a dog. Not infrequently a dog sets snipe.


There are times when you can be looking at a dead or wounded snipe, but its camouflage is so good you can not see it.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE 1980 ANNUAL MEETING

This report has been much more difficult to write than my previous reports to the 1978 and 1979 Annual Meetings.

Because of the depressed state of the A.C.T.A. around the start of 1977 it was not difficult to improve and any decisions made or actions taken during 1977 and 1978 were very obvious to our members and registered shooters.

Having accomplished many things during that period, and having reached what might be called a plateau, then made it very difficult to obviously show that efforts were still being made during 1979 to improve our sport.

Unfortunately we have those people who, when something dramatic is not happening frequently, turn their attention to looking at ways to pull down the efforts of those who are trying to work on their behalf.

1979 was a year in which the true meaning of sportsmanship suffered in a number of instances; where self appointed do-gooders used their influences to cause disruption in matters that were being democratically handled by those people you have put in the positions to handle them.

I am certainly not saying that people do not have a right to criticise — in fact it would be a sad state of affairs if we had no critics — but what I am saying is that the criticism should be constructive and that we now have a chain of communication through clubs, Zones and State Associations through which the constructive criticism should be channelled.

Admittedly the democratic process is slow, but consider the alternative — how many of our members would be happy with a *Dictatorship*.

Now having disposed of the gloomy side of this report, let us look at things that are still going on.

The 1979 Annual Meeting approved amendments to the Constitution following deliberations extending over several years. Since that meeting our solicitors have written the amendments into the Constitution in the form required by the Victorian Attorney-General. When that document is formalised later in this meeting, one of the major changes that will come into effect will be the establishment of a new Executive Committee structure of 14 consisting of two representatives from each of the seven States. Congratulations will go to the Northern Territory, as this will give the Territory its first independent representation on the National Executive.

The new Executive structure will place a heavy responsibility on State Associations to see that they become involved in the affairs of the A.C.T.A. and that they ensure that their two National Executive Committee members are given the opportunity to be true representatives of the State Association and do not have to act as individuals.

The National Shooting ground situation has probably not advanced much further than where we were at this

time last year. Several promising possibilities were followed up during the year but fell through for various reasons. It could well be that by the time this report is being read, there may be further information on at least two other possibilities that are being currently investigated.

Because of a heavier than usual administrative involvement, I was only able to attend 21 different shooting locations during the year. All States were visited except South Australia and I am most appreciative of the welcome extended at all locations and I acknowledge and am grateful for the special hospitalities extended to me at Coffs Harbour, Melbourne, Mildura, Darwin, Cobar, Jeparit, and Katanning.

Shoot attendances was probably the most talked about subject during my visits and there did not seem to be any set pattern—in some instances attendances were up but in many instances the opinion was that attendances were falling off. What we have been unable to do is positively identify the reasons for the fall off just as we have been unable to positively identify the fall off in shooter registrations.

Increased shooting costs are considered the major contributing factor and there is no doubt that these increased dramatically during 1979. However, for those who can refer to records, the cost of targets and cartridges and the cost of nomination in a particular type of event, compared to the average wage, is less now than it was 20 years ago. This is not so evident because shooters probably have more things they need to do with their money now than they had 20 years ago.

Once again I thank the many commercial organisations for their assistance to shooters, clubs, State Associations and the A.C.T.A. There is no doubt that the commercial participation in the Griffith Nationals was one of the features that led to the success of that particular Carnival.

Now, to my fellow Executive Committee members. 1979 demanded more meeting time and involvement than any other year that I can remember. My personal thanks to each of you for the effort you have put into your responsibilities.

Finally I end this report with much the same plea as last year. What is there for the future? What ideas can you come up with? I am not satisfied that we are doing enough for the average shooter. Give this matter some thought and submit your ideas through your club, Zone and State Association so that we can do the things that you want.

ANNUAL REPORT 1979

December 31, 1979 — the end of a decade. A decade in which clay target shooting ebbed and flowed.

It is pleasing to report that at the end of 1979, the sport was "on the move". The Association finished the year with another moderate but useful financial surplus being recorded, and membership at a reasonable level.

Admittedly, the membership target of 12,000 was not achieved, but in view of the significant cost increases which occurred in the last half of the year, the actual

figure of 10,500 was encouraging.

Government recognition of the Association, and the community service role it fills, continued to be demonstrated in an easily recognisable way - this is in dollars and the appointment of a full-time Director of Coaching, in the person of Newton Thomas, saw another of the pieces of the Association's development jig-saw

"Clay Target Shooting News" continues to be one of the best sports communications systems around, but needs to be better utilised by State and Zone Associa-

tions.

The Association continues to attract sponsors from outside the sport and the strong support received from Ansett Airlines of Australia, Air New Zealand and Jetset Tours is seen as a valuable contribution to the development of "Australia's booming sport".

One of the biggest challenges confronting management is to develop sources of income other than registration fees. For too long, the Association has been totally rrelianton this source of funding, to the extent that de-

velopments in other areas have been stifled.

To take up this challenge, the Association needs to make dramatic changes to its management structure, and the first of these will result from the Constitutional changes to be approved at the 1980 Annual General Meeting.

A sub-committee of your Executive is also working on a project aimed at significantly improving the Association's ability in the day-to-day decision making area, and this will have a direct effect on developments in areas of forward planning.

1. INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION.

In recent years, the Association has dramatically increased its involvement in international competition.

Some diversity has been introduced, by offering opportunities to competitors in standard trap, as well as the Olympic disciplines.

During 1979, Australia chose its second Air New Zealand Trap Team, to compete in the International event programmed as part of the 1979 Grand American Tournament.

The team consisted of six members of whom five actually competed. The members were: Robin Bailey (Captain), Western Australia; Peter Telford, South Australia; Jack Blake, Tasmania; Neil Berry, Victoria; Kevin Thompson, New South Wales; and Bill Stevens,

With limited time available for preparation, the team performed quite creditably, and finished fourth in the

Earlier in the year, Australia had defeated New Zealand in the Glenn Cup (conducted in Australia), and for the sixth successive year, won the Mackintosh International Teams' Trophy match with a score of 7407 points.

Australia has dominated this match for the past de-

cade.

In the area of Olympic disciplines, Australia was again successful in the South Pacific Regional Championships conducted at Melbourne Gun Club during the Easter holidays.

After much confusion over a suitable venue, World Shotgun Championships were conducted at Montecatini, Italy during October.

Australia selected the following team to compete:

Manager - Newton Thomas; Trap (Olympic Trench) -Jim Ellis, Terry Rumbel, Trevor Byrne, "Pud" Burgess and Jim Finis; Skeet - Alex Crikis, John Summers and Graeme Boyd.

A certain amount of controversy followed the announcement of the selected team and continued even while the team was in competition in Italy. Such destructive reactions do nothing for team stability, nor do such attacks do anything to improve the image of clay target shooting.

The team's performance was below the standard expected, but each member gained a great deal in experience.

In July, Jim Ellis had been selected to represent Australia in the Spartakiade Sports Tournament, held in Moscow as a lead up to the 1980 Olympic Games.

Ellis travelled with fellow Canberra resident Peter Anderson as Manager, and filled 12th place. After Spartakiade, Ellis competed at Helsinki, and in the Great Britain Grand Prix, running 5th and 3rd respectively.

2. NATIONAL COMPETITION.

Bigger and better — that was the way the New South Wales Clay Target Association planned the 1979 National Trap and Skeet Championships, and so they turned out.

The series attracted the largest ever attendance, and, although the weather was extremely hot, the lack of accommodation in Griffith (the host city) was the major restricting factor.

An operating surplus of over \$16,000 was produced. and the Griffith Gun Club, the New South Wales Clay Target Association, and the many commercial sponsors are all to be commended for the contribution each made


The 1979 Olympic Trench and International Skeet Championships were held at Downside International Gun Club, located just outside of Wagga, NSW.

*The Western Australian team scores were calculated over 100 targets per member, whereas the match is scheduled for 50 targets.

CONGRATULATIONS TO THE WINNING STATES.

4. ADMINISTRATION

With the appointment of a full-time Director of Coaching, the Administrative Unit took on a new look during 1979.

Furthermore, due to growth in the club and member services area, another member was added to the clerical staff.

Unfortunately, the staff stability that marked 1977 and 1978 left us in 1979, but by the end of the year, the previous teamwork was re-appearing.

It is of interest to note that the cost of salaries and allowances, expressed as a percentage of total income or expenditure, has dropped dramatically in recent years, as a quick look at the following figures will show.

(The increase in 1979 reflects the appointment of the National Coaching Director).

During the last half year, an attempt was made to launch a trading operation based on mail order. Although the project has met with encouraging results, postage

costs are inflating operating expenses to the point where profits are limited.

The other development also occurred late in the year, when the Administrative Unit introduced a hard-covered binder to facilitate the storage of CTSN.

However, these developments pale into insignificance when compared with the magnitude of the major project—the change from a bureau based computer system to a system based on "in house" equipment.

This change required a complete re-write of the Association's computer programs, which has been a most daunting task. Nevertheless, the transition has been made, and it is a credit to the technical advisers that very few problems have arisen.

This change has brought to an end a three-year relationship with Adaps Limited which has previously supplied the Association's computer time needs.

We are very grateful for the assistance that has been forthcoming from the Company, through its consultants and operations staff.

5. MEMBERSHIP

As mentioned in the introduction, membership for the year totalled 10,500, which is just over 400 below 1978, and 1500 below forecast. Nevertheless, the incentive provided by super low prices for cartridges and components during the last half of 1978 disappeared with a vengeance during the latter part of 1979.

Consequently, the firearms and ammunition industry flattened out a little, with a corresponding effect on clay target shooting.

It is interesting to note that many other sporting associations, all unrelated to each other, have also recorded a lowered membership in 1979.

For some time, there has been a clamour for pro-rata membership fees, and such a move has occurred in 1980. It will be interesting to watch its effect.

New clubs to affiliate during 1979 included the following: Singleton BBC (NSW), Por't Hedland (W.A.), Leinster C.T.C. (W.A.), Kingsborough (Q), Ouyen (Vic), Coonamble (NSW), Tallawalla (Q), Thursday Island (Q), Darr River (Q), Top End (N.T.), Patchewollock (Vic), Robinvale (Vic), Moulamein (NSW).

6. PROMOTION

During 1979 management continued to promote the sport at every opportunity. However, to a measureable extent, the value of these promotion activities is diminished by the constant knocking from within the membership of the Association.

The National President has visited all States during the year. The highlight of the year was probably the attendance of the National President, Ern Hawkins and the National Vice-President, Ron Porter at Darwin Gun Club, on the occasion of the first Winchester Tournament ever conducted in the Territory.

The Association continues to endeavour to develop closer relationships with other shooters' organisations. This policy is one which deserves much more tangible support from senior administrators.

7. NATIONAL COACHING COUNCIL

The appointment of a full-time Director of Coaching became effective on January 1. The appointee was Newton Thomas, who came to the job with ideal qualifications and a yen to return something to the sport he had enjoyed so much over a number of years.

Together with members of the National Coaching Council, the Director has initiated the Association's Novice Training Program, supported by a properly structured organisation and two training publications.

Two meetings of the Council have been held during the year — one at Griffith during the 1979 National Trap and Skeet Championships and the second in Brisbane during late October. Both these have been extremely rewarding, because of the standard of input.

During October, the South Australian Director, Mr Peter Quire, attended the USA Advanced Marksmanship Unit School at Fort Benning, Georgia, and brought back to Australia some fresh ideas on "training of the trainers".

The objective of the Coaching Council is to have at least one fully accredited Novice Club Coach at EVERY club in Australia before the end of 1980.

Meanwhile, work has been continuing on the production of training aids. The most urgent is a combined tape and color slide unit, which depicts aspects of stance and gun fit for trapshooters. This aid was due for completion in July 1979 and is still not finished. This has been a frustration to the Council, but the delays are mainly a reflection of the need to do these things for the lowest possible cost. The cheapest is NOT the quickest.

As the Council enters its second year, it has defined its priorities, with all efforts being devoted to the completion

of Zone and Club Coach accreditation.

8. STATE ASSOCIATIONS.

Until constitutional changes are completed, the legal position of State Associations remains in limbo.

However, practical support continues to be forthcoming and the State Association structure became complete with the creation of the Northern Territory Clay Target Association early in 1979.

The National Association introduced a policy of per capita repayments from registration fees during 1979, and paid out a total of \$10,056 to State Associations.

This regular form of income should encourage State Associations to prepare Development Plans for the next five to seven years. In this way, the interests of shooters will be protected, and each State Association will be assured of getting the best possible value from any expenditure it embarks upon.

9. GOVERNMENT SUPPORT.

The Australian Clay Target Association continues to get valuable support from the Federal Government.

Late in 1979, grants totalling \$29,000 were made to the

ACTA from the Sports Development program.

Additionally, the Australian Shooting Association had been allocated a substantial sum, of which \$2,600 came to the ACTA. Of this, in excess of \$2,000 resulted from funding assistance given to potential Olympic aspirants by the Australian Olympic Federation.

In a first for clay target shooting, Jim Ellis was given a training grant of \$2,000 to directly assist in his prepara-

tion for the 1980 Olympics.

Most State Associations are now submitting funding assistance applications to their respective State Governments, and are meeting with worthwhile recognition and success.

In concluding this section, the warning from 1978 is repeated — any group benefitting from a grant from outside sources has a very heavy responsibility to ensure that the funds are effectively used, and properly accounted for.

10. LEGISLATION

1979 has been a frantic year in so far as legislative pressures are concerned.

Not only have the "do-gooders" intensified their push towards greater firearms controls, but the "anti-noise" group have also been making their presence felt.

It is unjust to attack a wholesome responsible recreation, simply because some minority groups feel inconvenienced. However, the ability of shooters to defend their

rights is severely limited by a lack of unity within the shooting associations.

The Australian Clay Target Association is trying to play a co-ordinating role in this field, although not yet with a great deal of success.

The threat is a continuing one, and its seriousness can-

not be overlooked.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS.

It is always dangerous to single out supporters for special thanks. However, one of the most significant gestures received by the Association during the year under review came from Eley, which arranged to supply all of the Australian Team's cartridge requirements. Most of the team members took the opportunity and the A.C.T.A. is very grateful for Eley's support in this way.

Other important support came from Winchester Australia, which donated \$1 per entry from its 1979/80

Winchester Tournament.

Support for the Association's travel activities continued to come from Jetset Tours, Air New Zealand and Ansett Airlines of Australia, all of which meets with the deep appreciation of the A.C.T.A.'s Executive Committee.

The contribution to the development of our sport from Club managements, members of the coaching team, and other elements of the administration cannot be too

highly commended.

The same comment can be made about the Executive Committee. Each member is acting in a purely honorary capacity, and makes a considerable time commitment to the Association,. This is even more true of the three man Core Group, which consists of President Ern Hawkins, Vice-President Ron Porter and Committee member Roy Holtfreter.

The Association's working committees are slowly becoming better structured, and therefore more functional, and 1980 should see some significant advances in

this area.

12. CONCLUSION.

One of the predictions made in the 1978 Annual Report was that constitutional change would be completed in 1979.

It wasn't, but most certainly will be during 1980. Dependent upon the completion of the constitutional changes, is an administrative re-structuring which should streamline the functioning of the Executive Committee and the Administrative Unit.

Serious cost challenges developed towards the end of 1979, and entry into a new decade heralds a fresh ap-

proach to problems of this nature.

Legislative pressures continue to be very evident, particularly insofar as noise pollution is involved. Every member has a serious responsibility to ensure that his recreation is not unduly restricted by the illogical ramblings of a vocal minority.

Such comment also applies to the area of restriction on the sporting use of firearms. Although legislation relating to this matter is largely a State matter, the National

Association must be ready to help at all times.

The subject of a National Headquarters again seemed to bog down during 1979, in spite of an affirmative vote to come out of a referendum conducted amongst registered shooters.

"CLAY BUSTING — THE CHALLENGE OF THE EIGHTIES"

That is the catch phrase that takes us into an exciting decade — one in which great progress can be ours if we conduct our business properly.

10. Executive Committee - \$13,301

The expenditure in this category exceeded forecast by \$3,801, which was due to a decision made at the March Executive Committee Meeting, to fund the return fares of members attending that meeting.

Also, the Association has incurred additional expenses in being represented at meetings with other organisations.

11. National Coaching Council - \$5,074

This is the first year in which the Association has had a full-time Director of Coaching.

The total cost, excluding the Director's salary, of the National Coaching Council was \$10,074, which has been reduced by \$5,000 received in the form of Federal Government Grants.

This figure is made up of a grant of \$2,000 for specific projects, and \$3,000 which is the balance of direct grant to cover the Director's costs. The following is a summary of the costs incurred in undertaking specific projects:-

The General Travel Fund is used to offset costs incurred by teams travelling overseas, according to Executive Committee resolution. The I.S.U. Travel Fund is used exclusively to assist in the funding of teams competing overseas in the Olympic disciplines.



To say that clay target shooting is a way of life to the Mules family would be an understatement. The participation of this family underscores the wonderful family involvement that the sport provides, and Saturday February 9, must have been a red letter day in the long years of involvement for Bob Mules.

On this day, Bob captured the 1980 State Double Barrel Championship some 40 years after he won his first State title. He then had the pleasure of watching his son Phil Mules win the State Single Barrel Championship and his grandson Andrew Mules win the Junior ti-

tle in both the Double and Single Barrel Championships.

Bob Mules, in a career that spans more than 43 years, has crammed a lot of shooting into this time. From his first win some 42 years ago his record is impressive by any standards. At 58 years old now, he can boast of State representation 21 times, National representation in the Mackintosh team 5 times and first reserve in the Australian team for the '56 Olympics in Melbourne. He is probably one of the few top competition shooters in this country still using side by side guns. The guns, both Webley & Scott (he has two of them with serial numbers just 3 apart) have shot a lot of targets over the years and have taken him to long run breaks of over 200 on several occasions. Bob shoots from the from the 25 metre mark and has won championships in three states. He rates his biggest thrill as winning the '72 National Double Rise Championship in Griffith.

Grandson Andrew is a high school student at Gillies Plains High and at 14 years of age shows signs of becoming as good as his illustrious forbears.

FROM THE DESK OF THE NATIONAL COACHING DIRECTOR

FORT BENNING REPORT

This is the third column in a series of reports resulting from the recent visit of Peter Quire to the USA School of Advanced Marksmanship, located at Fort Benning, Georgia.

This month, we cover the nature of the training program, and the effects of drugs and alcohol.

Part 4. — Training Program (It must be understood that this is only a rough outline).


Training is split into two parts – skills and mental training. Always practise with good competition. List goals on paper, then keep a diary of all shooting, including weather conditions, how shooter felt scores, and targets missed. The shooter must analyse his own performance and be completely honest and not make excuses for himself. Never train when not feeling well, as training is to instil confidence, and if a shooter is unwell, he may shoot badly and thus affect his confidence.

Part 5. — Effects of smoking and drugs, including Alcohol

Smoking reduces the blood supply, reducing oxygen levels in the blood and so affecting eye sight and reaction times, because of the reduction in the supply of blood to the muscles and nerves.

All drugs affect the nervous system slowing reaction time, but the U.S. Army coaches stress that when training, their team members are encouraged to live a normal life, if they are used to having a beer or coffee with meals, this is to be continued, but not in excess.

If the shooter is used to going to bed at 11 p.m. then he does so. In other words, the shooter should continue a normal life style, any change takes time to be adapted to.
