

For example, if you were to hold a CCI primer up to another, you'd see something like this:





Executive Director's Notes

Readers can be excused for thinking that too much is made through these columns of the importance of the Australian Trap and Skeet Championships.

Yet, when one realises the promotional value of the tournament perhaps we have not yet taken full advantage of the opportunity. Be that as it may, the 1980 Nationals held in Perth, Western Australia were an immense success. The prime reasons for the success can probably be covered in three items —

(a) The Western Australian Clay Target Association did its customary professional job as the entrepreneur.

(b) Various Western Australian Government Departments backed the project to the hilt.

(c) Competitors supported the match in record numbers.

However, outside of those three headings, there were literally dozens of other areas in which contribution and effort played a most important part, not the least of which being the Ford Motor Company (which provided a fleet of courtesy vehicles) Ansett Airlines of Australia (as the travel and accommodation consultants which moved and housed the record attendance) and the Westos Motor Inn, which became the Association headquarters for over two weeks.

Highlights of the tournament were numerous and will be covered in the tournament report which appears elsewhere in this issue.

Nevertheless, special emphasis must be placed on the importance, of the visit by teams from USA and New Zealand, the significance of the International Trap Match, and drama that was attached to the final part of the blue ribbon event, the 28th Australian double Barrel Championship.

Twenty five Americans attended, including a number of women competitors, and made their presence felt throughout all the events. Those of us who thought that the American "hot-shots" Loitz and Harrison would have difficulty in handling the vastly different Australian conditions were proved completely wrong. The most tangible evidence can be drawn from Leo Harrison's dual win in the Overall High Gun and the A Grade High Gun Awards, and Joe Loitz' amazing win in the Australian Double Rise Championship.

The large contingent of New Zealanders also enjoyed a measure of success when the Kiwi hero Gerry Messenger won the Australian Single Barrel Championship with the only possible. This performance was followed by John McMillan's second to Darryl Wiese in the Australia-New Zealand Trap Championship.

By far the most emotional aspect of the entire tournament was the mighty win by junior competitor Russell Mark (from Ballarat, Victoria) in the Australian Double Barrel Championship.

The 16 year old champion showed remarkable stamina, tenacity and poise to outlast the highly performed Doug Smith, who is widely accepted as one of the four best shotgunners in Australia (and proved his rating by winning the Champion of Champions Cup for the second successive year!). The match was won on the 349th target, and set Russell Mark on the way to creating a new National break record.


If that was the close to the story, it would undoubtedly be the clay target shooting highlight of 1980.

In an unfortunate side issue, the apparently inflexible immoveable Association management team allowed a situation to develop which many observers believe was not to the sport's credit. Doug Smith had been experiencing misfire problems and reached the stage where he was exposed to the consequence of Trap Rule 76 which states:

76. "Lost target" shall be declared on the competitor's third and subsequent cartridge misfire in any one event. This rule applies to both reloaded and factory loaded cartridges".

Many competitors felt that, as the basic purpose for which National Championships are held is to produce the most talented competitor as the National Champion — it is certainly not intended to solely be a test of equipment or consumables — management should have taken steps to waive or suspend the rule **BEFORE** it finally had to be invoked. There is no suggestion that the rule should have been broken to allow the match to continue. The time to move was when the possibility of a problem was first recognised. There was not a competitor on the Perth Clay Target Club ground who would have objected to an announcement that the match was to be allowed to continue without the fettering effect of Rule 76.

One of the problems confronting the decision makers appeared to be the possibility of discriminating against other competitors who in previous events, may have lost a target because of the use of the "offensive" rule. A spot check of score sheets would have quickly shown that this fear was baseless.

As it was, numerous impromptu informal meetings were held in full view of the gallery — referees, rules supervisors, shoot marshalls and jury were all there, but at no stage was any formal move made to **overcome** the problem. In fact, these gatherings tended to lower the whole image of the tournament, which otherwise was very efficiently and professionally conducted.

The only really positive move came after Smith's second misfire, when he was formally warned that a further misfire would cause that target to be scored as **lost**.

It is claimed that the rule was taken from the International Shooting Union rules, except that in the case of the ISU version, the effect of the rule is restricted to each bracket of 25 targets. It is highly significant that before the end of the Nationals, the Association's Rules Committee had met to consider changes to the now famous rule.

The real lesson to be learned from this experience is that for rules to be effective, they must be exposed to complete assessment prior to implementation. The Association is committed to the introduction of new rules on January 1, 1981. The proposal will be published in a future issue of CTSN, and all referees, referee examiners and shooting administrators generally are asked to carefully review the proposal, to ensure that clay target shooting can avoid a repetition of the Trap Rule 76 drama.

(The counter view to this is expressed in Pat Browne's "Shooting a Line" column, which will be found on page 72).

Meanwhile, back to the match itself. Doug Smith showed himself to be the complete sportsman by opening his gun after the third misfire, an action which automatically scored him zero on his 349th target.

Russell Mark showed himself to be a most worthy champion and demonstrated a maturity that must have made many adults envious.

As mentioned earlier, Russell then went on to establish a new National Break Record of 370, by shooting the first 21 targets in the next event. This broke the short break record of 355 established by Billy Iles earlier this year.

So that 1980 Trap and Skeet Nationals are now behind us. The record (for W.A.) attendance, the international support, the list of champions that included a veteran, an American, a first-timer, a junior, a New Zealander, a local hero and a defending champion, the riotous final night barbecue, the successful international trap match, ALL combined to make the 1980 series a most memorable one.

## NATIONALS '80

Well, Nationals time has come and gone again. In retrospect it could be described as being the most varied and one of the most spectacular of the last several. A lot of the big names were not there. This in itself opened the competition to all and sundry. The New Zealanders and Americans were there. This added a bit of spice to the competition. They were the unknown quantities.

So, with the weather in typical Perth form and an enthusiastic group of competitors, well warmed from an extensive pre-nationals program, Nationals '80 got under way. The program ran from March 3rd. to 9th. and was full of surprises.

There was something new every day. It was a veteran who took out the Skeet. Then a young American gave us a lesson in double rise shooting to take that championship. It was instant fame for a newcomer to nationals competition in the Handicap and drama of the Double Barrel when a junior took the title. He went on to break the Australian break record the following day. The New Zealanders got into the act when one of their number took the Single Barrel Cup back across the Tasman. Then a local won the Points Score and the drama of the double barrel faded as the runner-up in that unfortunate incident ended up as Champion of Champions.

Introduced for the first time was the shoulder to shoulder interstate teams match which was hailed as a great success. All the other teams matches between clubs and the participating countries were also held culminating in the Mackintosh team selection and shoot.

But as all this activity unfolded during the intense week of competition it was obvious that there was one outstanding competitor amongst the throng. When the hubbub had finally died down on the Sunday night it was 'big Leo' who was king. Whilst he had not won a single overall championship he was shooting so well he took back to the USA, both the overall and A grade (Trap) High Gun awards. He brought a touch of professionalism in the nationals scene that was hard to miss. Not professionalism in a money sense but a dedication to the game that takes one to the top in a week of gruelling competition.

#### SKEET

It was a great birthday present for George Biggs. From a field of 257 the rugged veteran of 69 summers wore them all down to become the 11th Australian Skeet Champion. It was a bit of an anti-climax for George. The shoot-off was in two squads and as shooters were missing out it looked as though it would not go a full round. Peter Caddy of Barmera S.A. was holding it all together until he dropped a high 4. George not knowing that he was sitting on the championship on this station took the target with his usual deliberate style. It was Bob Buchan who had to tap him on the shoulder to tell him that he had won. There were 7 possibles and the shoot-off only went a further 12 targets. For his trouble, George also won the veterans division and dare I say it, 'old faithful' Deserie Wakefield was tops in the Ladies division. Russell Mark, who was to cover himself with glory later in the championships was junior winner.



#### DOUBLE RISE

To say the double rise championship was a real eyeopener would be an understatement. Rumour had it on the day previous that there was a dark horse in the American contingent. Rarely have I seen a gallery following a squad through the traps in the qualifying round of a national championship like this one. They were there in their hundreds watching Joe Loitz. He did not disappoint them. The speed and authority with which he tackled the 25 pairs had to be seen to be believed. Whilst he only shot 47/50, that in itself was some sort of surprise. He had his last pair to shoot for a 49/50 and he missed them clean. Speaking to him after he said: "The left target curled a bit and sort of startled me. It got away and then so did the other one. The timing sort of went haywire". Not so in the shoot-off, he managed the first pair quite well to take the crown. Ray McDonald ran out winner in the A grade, Tom Meadows was B grade champion and John Marshall took C grade honours. It was two in a row for Deserie Wakefield and Russell Mark and Victorian Jack Harker took the veterans.

#### GRAND AUSTRALIAN HANDICAP

Protege of Graham Willett, Lyn Curtis was at his first nationals. He came face to face with a newcomer Colin Loxton. Both shot 50 and then battled out the overall title. Curtis, from the 18 metre mark ran to 74/74 when Loxton (11m) missed: To say that he was pleased with himself would be the second understatement of the nationals. Curtis, a panelbeater from Bairnsdale in Victoria has not been shooting that long and is coached by Graham Willett. You may remember Willett from the tense shoot-off at Griffith in 1979 when he just missed out on the DB title. 


#### **DOUBLE BARREL**


Only 364 shooters faced the traps for the blue ribbon event. Now that the dust has settled, it will probably go down as being the most dramatic DB shoot-off in the history of the sport. Without being melodramatic, it was probably the most emotion charged shoot-off that I have ever witnessed. It will be talked about for years to come. Russell Mark had been making noises in the first day or two of competition that he was in form. Doug Smith who is always a tough competitor at this level of competition had shot his 50 well. Gavin Searle, a New Zealander, local West Australians David Kevill and Ray McDonald were also in the squad. And so was Billy Iles.

When these five settled down to fight it out, it was wide open. First to go was Bill Iles who lost his 86th target. Just six targets later it was Ray McDonald who was back with the spectators. David Kevill did not quite make it to the century, he missed his 99th, then Gavin Searle his 131st. So we were left at this stage with the junior and the seasoned campaigner. Most thought at this point that it was only a matter of time, but the score kept climbing. Past the 200 then 300 and they could not be separated. The nagging doubt over rule 76 came about this stage in the match when Doug Smith had his second misfire. The drama erupted at the 349th target when the 'click' of Smith's misfire caused referee Scottie Gibson to call the target lost. Russell Mark became the youngest ever (16 years-old) to win the Double Barrel Championship and Doug Smith had to settle for A grade honours.

Kurt Schinzig was B grade champion and the same honour in C grade went to Queenslander Gavin Wright. Regular nationals competitor Ray Melville took the veterans division and Deserie Wakefield returned to the winning lists in the ladies division. Russell Mark was the junior champion.



#### SINGLE BARREL

It was a repeat of Griffith '79 in the single barrel. New Zealander Gerry Messenger ran a good 50 straight about halfway through the match. He then watched in amazement as the rest of the field failed to register a possible. A slightly bewildered Messenger told me after the match: "Over 300 starters and I've got the only 50 - 1 can't believe it!". Believe it or not, that was the case and just like Frank Smith's win in Griffith, he had won it outright.

Americans Joe Loitz and Leo Harrison III were in the placings in the A grade, Joe running first for the sash and Leo third behind Jim Smith from NSW. Eddie Humphrey (WA) was the B grade winner and Colin Loxton captured the C grade. We had our first look at one of the American ladies in Donna Urling in this event. Donna, from Alaska ran a fine 45-50 to take the ladies division and Ray Melville made it two in a row in the veterans.

Russell Mark won the Junior division and in the process of running his first 21 straight, broke the Australian break record set by Billy lles some three weeks earlier. The record now stands at 370.



#### CHAMPION OF CHAMPIONS

It was said before the event started that if there is anything new at the nationals, Doug Smith will win it. And so it was. Recovering from his traumatic experience in the DB, Doug put it all together in the 'new look' Champion of Champions Cup.

The event, revamped from the past years, was set up to be a real challenge. Consisting of 25 targets each double barrel, single barrel and points scoring from 16 metres it had a change in format before it even started. Due to time limitations the match was shortened to 20 targets in each discipline for each of the 293 competitors.

When the dust had settled it was Doug Smith who had made it two in a row. Something to tell the folks back home, he won the last of the old format and the first of the new. Certainly a great performance and the remarkable thing was that Doug was the first of the popularly recognized competitors at the nationals to take an overall title. Kevin Loy was gallant in defeat but had the consolation of taking home the A grade sash.

The first Tasmanian to make the winning dais came in the B grade. He was Richard Gardam from Burnie and it was two in a row for the C grader Ian Eichfuss.

The second of the American ladies in Judy Wegner showed the form that has taken her to many All-American ladies teams to win the division from fellow countrywoman Donna Urling. Young David Wright made it to the dais again for the junior crown and Queenslander Ken Cross was the veterans champ.



#### TEAMS

Whilst the individual battles were on there were a host of teams events under way.

The first of these was the Australia v New Zealand Skeet teams match. The Australian team of Biggs (23), Caddy (24), Gibson (23), Iles (23) and Cousens (24) ran 117/125 to defeat the New Zealanders by two targets 115/125.

The inaugural Interstate Trap Teams Match resulted in a win for the Queenslanders. The team consisting of Bill Stevens (24), Roger Dean (25), Doug Smith (25), Greg Stevens (25) and Bob Bryant (23) ran a score of 122/125 which was just one target too many for the N.S.W. team. The alsorans on 118/125 were W.A., S.A., and Victoria. Tasmania ran 117 and N.T. 116.

During the Points Score match the Alan Brown Club Teams Match is conducted. The hotshots from the Royal Aero Club in Sydney were the victors in this match. The team consisting of Barry Kable, Rex Northcott, Bob Smith, Kevin Loy, and Viv Watson racked up a points score of 714/750. Second was the Perth Clay Target Club and third was Melbourne Gun Club.

The 6th International Teams Match between Australia, New Zealand and U.S.A. resulted in a runaway win for the Australians. The Team consisting of Darryl Wiese, Tony Bradshaw, Ian-Holschier, Jim Smith and Bill Iles put a score on the board of 241/250 to win from New Zealand 233/250. Just two targets behind this was the American team with 231/250.

And so to the big one. The Mackintosh team is the one to make. There were some new names. Interestingly enough one of the borderline qualifiers in Bill Stevens came through in the team shoot to take the gold cup for High Gun.




#### IN RETROSPECT

So the story of the 1980 National Championships concludes. The results are on the board and go into the record book to be looked at in years to come. There are some comments to be made on the overall impressions gained. Attendances are always talked about so let us examine the figures in relation to this tournament. The last time the National Championships were in Perth there was an aggregate attendance of 1,637. This year the figure was 2,223, a quite significant rise. But compare this figure to Griffith last year of 3,083. This would seem to indicate that, with the high cost of travel, shooters will not go long distances to compete.

For example, skeet will be held on August 2, 4 and 6 while the trench event will be held on August 3, 5 and 7.

## **INTERNATIONAL** SHOOTING SCENE

The South Pacific Regional Championships are now concluded and it is a matter of record that Australia took a virtual stronghold on the series, in terms of medals.

For example, in the pistol matches, New Zealand didn't feature at all, while in shotgun, she won just one medal. In running boar and small bore rifle match, New Zealand fared a little better, but still was overshadowed by Australia.

Which leads to the question - what is the future of a regional competition, in which entry is limited by U.I.T. decree to Papua New Guinea, New Zealand and Australia?

Considering that, certainly in shotgun circles, Australia's shooting athletes need as much international competition as possible, observers can be forgiven if they develop the feeling that South Pacific Regional Championships are beginning to become only a little more "senior" than club matches.

Should Australia be looking to the Asian area for international experience? It is of interest to note that the Confederation of Australian Sport, to which the ACTA is affiliated, has recently hosted a conference of delegates representing sporting groups from the Pacific Basin. One of the purposes of the conference was to consider the possibility of establishing a Pacific Area Sports Festival. Sound great, eh?

In the meantime, Australia has received an invitation to compete in an international shooting competition to be held at Bangkok, Thailand during the first week of December 1980.

The International Sub-committee is meeting during late April to decide if the invitation can be accepted.

#### INTERNATIONAL SUB-COMMITTEE

As reported elsewhere in this issue of CTSN, a major change has occurred in the structure of the Association's international competition policy making group.

Previously the group was known as the ISU Sub-committee, and consisted of one representative from each state, chaired by Mr. H. Somers

The difficulties confronting the ISU Sub-committee were many, but none more serious than the difficulty of arranging a meeting of a group in which the members were so widely dispersed.

Secondly, the old committee had policy making responsibilities only in the area of Olympic shotgun sports, which lead to difficulties in maintaining a balance between the true international disciplines (Olympic Trench and ISU Skeet) and the Association's other forays in international competition.

In the Association's recent structural reshuffle, management addressed itself to resolving some of the problems. After careful consideration, a group to be called the "International Sub-committee" was formed and is comprised of four members, all from one state, and with responsibility for ALL the ACTA's international involvement

One of the first projects to be undertaken by the new committee will be the visit by a three-man Australian team to visit the U.K. in July to compete in the Great Britain Open Trap Championship.

The team includes Doug Smith, Ken Stevens (both of Queensland) and Kevin Loy (NSW). It will attend the final of the 1980 Mackintosh International Trap Match, after which it will compete in a 100-target match. The team was selected on the results of the Champion of Champions Cup, which was the final event of the 1980 National Championships program.

#### **OLYMPIC NOMINEES FROM SHOOTING SPORTS**

The Australian Shooting Association met late in February to name the nominees from the shooting sports for places in Australia's 1980 Olympic team.

In spite of the continuing controversy over Australia's entry at Moscow, the shooting sports are ready to take their place, should an Australian team take part in the competition.



WOMEN'S TALK??

It is Olympic year again, and hopefully by the time this edition of C.T.S.N. goes to print, the question will be resolved as to whether or not Australia will be represented at Moscow. Uppermost in our minds is who, if not all, of the shotgunners put forward to the Olympic Justifications Committee for selection in the shooting team will in fact be chosen, this team also includes pistol and rifle shooters.

After watching an excellent coverage on television of the Winter Olympics recently, the thought came to mind that there are very few sports where women can compete against men equally at an Olympics, there are the figure skating pairs of course, and apart from the Equestrian events, shooting is the only other one. Wangaratta are yet another club who are looking to the comfort of their members and families, the Committee have erected a good size club house, which although not quite completed when we were there, has utilised fittings from an old picture theatre which was being pulled down, including the seats which I feel sure came from the theatre lounge. I was pleased to see a number of new faces among the women shooting and it is more apparent with each country club that I visit that we are growing in numbers.

#### WEBLEY & SCOTT BOW OUT.

The old established gunmaking firm of Webley & Scott are to depart the British firearms manufacturing scene. Well known all over the world for their fine double guns the firm has been in business for over 120 years.

The most famous of their models was the series 700 and they are in the process of finishing the last 200 now. These guns will be reserved against orders and will be sold with a certificate to authenticate that they were from the last batch manufactured. They will sell for 1,148 pounds.

When sold the firm will close it's doors for the last time and another household name in shooting circles will retire to the history books.

#### NEW GRADING SYSTEM FOR BRITISH CLAY TARGET SHOOTERS

The CPSA, governing body of Clay Target Shooting in the UK has decided to scrap the '400 bird' rule. Introduced to deter 'sandbagging' it was found to be working against the regular shooter as well. In short, it required a shooter to shoot at 400 registered targets in any discipline before he received a classification. The system will be replaced with a computer averaging method of ALL targets shot and the classifications will be circulated to clubs every six months.

#### THEY ARE ALSO FACING HIGHER SUBS!

Affiliation fees are also rising in the UK. Equivalent to our ACTA subs the British shooter will now pay an annual fee of 7 pounds. He previously paid 5 pounds. Other classifications will also rise, some that have a parallel in this country. Club affiliations will rise from 14 to 20 pounds and juniors will have to pay 3 pounds per year, a rise of 1 pound.

The CPSA Executive pointed out that it was the first increase in three years.

#### ZZ'S A REAL FIZZER!

The British Grand Prix on ZZ targets was a real fizzer. Billed as a top prestige event with fierce competition the big event turned out to be a non event.

It drew a total entry of just 6 shooters.


ZZ shooting, an exciting form of moving target shooting which closely resembles the old live pigeon game (wash your mouth out with soap Brownie) was introduced at the Blanford and Dorchester GC last year in a blaze of publicity.

There was some optimism that the discipline would take hold as shooters became interested. But, it was not to be and it looks as though the future of ZZ shooting in the UK will be as erratic as the ZZ target itself.

It is interesting to note that none of these clay busters rate on the overall rankings, top spot goes to Lones Wigger the American smallbore shooter. He has an extraordinary record.


Now 42 years old he still holds ten world titles, five of them in 300 metre events. He has been Olympic Champion twice, has captured a World Championship and a World Record in his 15 years on the ranges of the world. He won his first Olympic gold in 1964 and just last year ran a 599/600 in three position at the Pan-American Games, San Juan, Puerto Rico. Incredible!





## CLAY TARGET POPULARITY

There is no doubt the popularity of clay target shooting is growing by leaps and bounds. "A booming sport," as one journal puts it. It is perhaps the fastest growing area of shooting today. And with

It is perhaps the fastest growing area of shooting today. And with good reasons. One reason is that clay target shooting, in itself, is a fine and interesting sport.

Another that clay target shooting is great practice for all shotgun shooting, whether at clay target competition, or game and pest shooting.

But, more than any other reason, because it is there and available without hassles and problems. There is no need to spend weeks travelling and searching for hunting areas. No need to seek written permission, and to spend many dollars telephoning farmers in vain. All that is required is that you have the necessary money to buy cartridges and clay targets at which to shoot. If you are not a member of the club at which you shoot you will be charged a daily "ground fee" which is quite nominal.

Many shooters who have not tried it think it could be dull. And nothing would be further from the truth. There are enough clay target games to interest any and all shooters. Skeet, trap, trench, double-rise, tower, auto & driven, simulated game targets. You can shoot for practice, simply for the cost of targets and cartridges, or you can compete in everything from novice championships to Olympic skeet and trench.

And the most impressive and satisfying part is that it is very much a business arrangement, completely out of the sphere of permissionseeking and all the hassles that have arisen in that sector.

I have, over the last few years, been invited to attend many small, social shoots all over the country. Some, of course I could not attend, due to pressure of work.

But at those I did attend, the general outlook and problems were the same. At some of these, I was told, other writers had been asked to attend. Perhaps I left too early, but I did not meet any of them. Nor indeed do I know if they attended. Perhaps they were smarter than I, and forgot about the invitations.

I say "smarter" because I quickly found all of these small groups of shooters had the same ideas, the same problems, and blamed the same set of circumstances. Yet each group didn't know the other existed, and sometimes they were not so very far apart. In some cases, startlingly close!

Few ever asked me for an actual opinion — my own opinion. And because I attended in my role as writer, I did not venture any opinion — just facts in reply to questions. This has always been my policy. I don't try to join the group as a guest. I am on business, for writing to me has always been a business, even though hunting and shooting have always been my particular sports and pastimes. So for a number of good reasons, I keep business and pleasure quite separate.

Some of the questions have been hilarious, but I have always had the ability to look dumb and serious in the face of such howlers — not too difficult a task for one who is fairly dumb anyway. And for the main part, through the years, my approach has been the right one. Because of the number of people I've met, of course, I've made some firm and wonderful friends. And had some wonderful invitations and memorable trips.

But for the most part, few of those people have ever said, "any time you'd like to call in and shoot a quail — rabbit, hare, duck, or what-have-you — John, we'd like to see you!"

And, I think, therein lies the main problem of the field shooter. He is selfish, distrustful of his own kind, and simply refuses to face the fact of a changed world. This he must learn to do if he is to continue his sport. For field shooting is so rapidly disappearing.

The field shooter has good reason to be distrustful. He has to cope with the vandalism of road signs, rubbish strewn by people in the out-doors — only a few of whom really are the shooters — who get the blame. The same can be said of bush and grass fires. The country firemen would like to stop all hunting and hunters, particularly during dry periods. And the great majority of police would disarm everyone immediately if that were possible, in the fond — and absolutely wrong — hope that this would keep firearms out of the hands of criminals.

Farmers don't want shooters on their properties, and for the most part they don't much care whether the shooter is a decent fellow or a lout. The answer is usually "No!" in any case. And the reasons again are readily apparent. (by John Monk)

Gone are the days of big private holdings. Most modern farmers have what the old graziers of my youth called "pocket handkerchief farms." If the farmer himself shoots and hunts there is barely enough for himself and perhaps a few close friends. Even in what was once the "backblocks", the situation is much the same.

And it will get worse when the mainstay for many shooters — the feral pig — is literally wiped out, a program now beginning to gain speed and direction.

And the vandals and "cowboys", together with spotlight shooters — legitimate and otherwise — have soured country people and decimated game animals and pests alike.

Swamps have been drained, grasslands heavily farmed, and generally habitat useful to game, ruined.

Changed game laws, whether it be later or earlier opening of seasons, smaller game bags or fewer species open for hunting, will no longer make much impact. In any case, many so-called "legitimate" shooters poach out of season and take more game than they need, or sometimes more than they are entitled to take.

And each group, in the face of being advised that shooters must band together to remain in existence, have replied with the same answer. "Shooting is by its very nature a solitary sport — we don't tell other shooters where we shoot, and we don't want to."

Selfish? Yes. But, unfortunately, true at the moment. The "other mob" could — and most probably would — shoot the area out without a thought for tomorrow or their fellow shooters.

My answer, and the only one that will be successful now, is preserve shooting.

Not the sort of thing we are doing in some farming areas, where farmers charge shooters to hunt the pests they have, and in some cases sell hunting of native duck and quail.

Instead preserves in the nature of overseas preserves, where game is bred for hunting and the preserve is big business.

Before this can happen in Australia, hunters will be almost out of huntable game and pests. That time is not far off.

We have always had a reasonable supply of pests, even if little game by world standards, but that has changed drastically in the last decade, We need space in which to hunt, ready access to it, and a reasonable supply of pests and game. The only way we will get these things is through a strong voice in our own affairs. Small, secretive groups fondly hoping to guard the remnants of pests and game for themselves will do nothing but harm to a concerted effort. For it has been a feature of all of those small groups — few have belonged to any hunting organization. Yet this is their only real chance of continuity in the sport.

I would be most interested to hear what others think of the situation, and I'm sure many readers would too. A letter to our editor is the best way to do this, and through the magazine, where we can all see how our colleagues view our present hunting scene.

I have watched the scene change, first slowly, then rapidly gaining momentum, like a runaway train at the top of a long grade. When I began shooting and hunting everyone owned a shotgun and a rifle with the same enthusiasm as that of football or Test cricket.

Country areas were open domain and large holdings plentiful. The open-handed, cheerful Australian countryman was indeed a fact of life. Today those gentlemen are very few indeed, and of those that remain, most are retired. The new breed are quite different.

I too, am close to retirement from this phase at least, of the writing game. A few years, maybe much less, will see me tossing the pen on the outdoor desk for the last time, and using my spare time — of which I'll then hope to have — with camera and gun for my own pleasure.

While I've remarked that so few of the smaller groups offered anything in the way of shooting, I must hasten to add that even if they had, in my case it would certainly have been something of a token gesture, as I reluctantly refuse many, many invitations to hunt, to visit people and areas, and to visit socially. Simply because time is not available. But the thought and the offer is always nice, and I greatly appreciate that, perhaps much more than most people realize. Because this was the stuff the old Australia was made of, and though we can never go back to those days it would be great to try to retain some of the best of them.

## CLAY TARGET ASSOCIATION JOINS WITH NATIONAL RIFLE ASSOCIATION - JOINT DEVELOPMENT IN JUNIOR TRAINING POLICIES (Staff Writer).

During recent months, the Association's National Director of Coaching, Newton Thomas, has been involved in assisting the National Rifle Association of Australia to set up guidelines for the establishment of its National Coaching Council.

It is encouraging to see improved co-operation and discussion between the various groups administering the needs of sporting shooters, and the ACTA is heavily committed to promoting such a policy.

One of the major areas covered in these early stages of discussion has been the subject of junior training.

This vital area of community service is also the subject of an investigation by the Victorian Ministry for Conservation.


John Collinson, National Secretary of the National Rifle Association of Australia told CTSN that a pilot scheme has already been introduced into selected Victorian schools, which are being used as a test bed.

A high class manual titled "The Australian Schools Firearms Safety Full Bore 7.62 Target Rifle Shooting Program" has been prepared by Mr. Murray Nankervis who is one of the driving forces behind the establishment of the NRAA Coaching Council.


behind the establishment of the NRAA Coaching Council. A "training of the trainers" seminar is to be conducted at Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology on May 10, to which fifty potential course leaders have been invited.

This is the first positive step in co-ordinating the in-school training projects which have operated on an "ad-hoc" basis to this time.

The main purpose of the May seminar is to provide a nucleus of trainers, who can be used to undertake the teaching of Education Department staff to enable them to control a "Hunter Safety Training" program in schools.

## FROM THE DESK OF THE NATIONAL COACHING DIRECTOR

#### by Newton Thomas

Over the past few issues of CTSN sections of a report prepared by Peter Quire, State Director of Coaching for South Australia, have been published for the information of readers.

Quire's report was prepared after he had been to an advanced coaching course, run by the USA School of Advanced Markmanship at its base at Fort Benning, Georgia.

The following is the sixth and final part of the report:

Part 6 - Coaching on the Range. Trap, firstly on straight away targets, as these are the targets that the American coaches felt needed the greatest attention. Angle targets require a smooth swing and a good follow through normally after a fairly extensive practical training two days competition is held.

The Skeet program is basically the same as the trap. Position and stance for skeet is with the body facing station eight with both knees slightly bent. Gun hold on address is well out from the traphouse and much emphasis is placed on keeping the gun moving. In practical training singles are shot first so that proficiency is achieved with these before attempting doubles.

This is also followed by two days competition.

Practice is 100 targets four times a week, and this is increased two months prior to a match to 150 targets four times a week.

The training period is normally spread out over 8 hours as in ma-jor competition a break of several hours is not unusual.

As 100 targets per day are the maximum that are shot in major competition, the shooters must practise on up to 150 per day to give them the necessary physical and mental endurance.

Physical training includes a daily 1/2 hour of stretching and body building exercises plus a two mile run. A lot of exercises are done using the shooter's gun as a weight.

Team members have a blood haemoglobin count check about 3 months prior to an event and a remedial diet high in protein with added iron is given if necessary.

During competition blood sugar levels are kept high with high carbohydrate diets.

The members of the USA team who have won major medals in world competition make themselves available for question and answer sessions. They describe their feelings and thoughts in major competition and what they personally do to overcome these pressures. The answers they gave were many and varied as there were team members.

These top American shooters are extremely self motivated, self organized, confident people. O

## **TRADE TOPICS**

One of the Association's strongest commercial supporters is Commercial Marketing Company of Artarmon, NSW. On opening the firearm from its factory packing, it was found that the firearm was a much higher model, valued at around \$4000.

The Association is deeply grateful for this, and all the other donations of trophies for the recent Nationals.

Commercial Marketing has recently outgrown its warehousing facilities at its original address in Artarmon and has now moved into a brand new building about a kilometer away on the Cnr Hotham Pde and McLachlan Ave.

Managing Director Geoff Rabbidge has just returned from overseas, where he had long discussions with the management of the East German based Merkel company, aimed at improving the promotion of the Merkel, Simson, Suhl range of shotguns in Australia.

The clay target industry lost one of its stalwarts late in March when Bill Williams, proprietor of "Truflite" Targets, died.

Bill had been in clay target manufacturing most of his working life, and has survived many commercial dramas. The worst occurred about seven years ago, when the entire manufacturing plant and buildings were destroyed by fire. Bill and his son Brian painstakingly rebuilt the business and the factory, and have been an important source of supply of clay targets since.

Bill is survived by his wife Phillys, and two sons Bruce and Chris. At the time of writing, Brian seems certain to keep the business going.

Still on the subject of clay targets, Graham Ash., the Victorian distributor for Olimpyc Targets has advised that, due to another severe hike in the cost of pitch, the price of Olimpyc targets has risen approximately \$5 per 1000, effective April 1, 1980.

However, he also points out that while nobody ever takes kindly to price rises, it is interesting to note that current prices are still lower than levels of four years ago. Furthermore, Graham Ash claims that the quality of the product being manufactured today is of a recognisably higher standard.



The fact that both were able to shoot relatively good scores throughout the series makes their performance even more remarkahle.


A 16 year old shot 370 targets straight to create a new National break record. In doing so, the competitor - Russell Mark - won the 1980 Australian Double Barrel Championship.

Russell showed great maturity in the shoot-off section of the match and must have made his Dad, Brian Mark of Winchester, a very happy man.


The family's closeness was demonstrated when Joan Mark flew from Victoria to share Russell's excitement, immediately she received the news of her son's win.

Very rarely has Australia seen the enthusiasm or the numbers in a clay target spectator gallery that was evident on Double Rise day.

The attraction was the American champion, Joe Loitz. He showed an uncanny speed and precision in his doubles shooting that Australians had not seen before. When one realises that top shooters in America can fire at well over 1500 pairs per annum, it becomes clear why shooters such as Loitz show such co-ordination.

The big shock of Loitz's round came on the last target when he looked a certain winner. He missed both targets in the pair, which dropped his score from what appeared to be a winning score of 49/50 to an actual 47/50.

The skill that Loitz had shown appeared to completely overawe the other two finalists, both of whom had finished on 47's. They were Ray McDonald from Geraldton WA and Rex Northcott from Sydney, both of whom dropped a target in the first pair of the tie breaker. This left Loitz only to shoot his pair to win, He did and he won!

What a popular win George Biggs had in the 11th Australian Skeet Championship. George is the holder of the Australian skeet break record at 213 targets, but had never won a National title.

He broke the drought this year and initiated one of the best crowd reactions seen for a long time.

Later, during the presentation of trophies, he suffered one of his few "lost for words" situations when being presented with the A & E Pedersen Perpetual Trophy by his long time friend and supporter, Mrs Enid Petersen.



, There were signs that the long standing vice-like grip that Deserie Wakefield has had on the Ladies Division of the Nationals series may be weakening.

"Little" sister, Christine Wakefield, is shaping up as a real threat. Spare a moment to consider the performance of Deserie - the Eley Ladies High Gun Award was introduced in 1975, and has been contested annually since. Deserie's name is the only name to be engraved on the trophy in its six year history.

The first Interstate Trap Teams Match to be held as an "eyeball to eyeball" confrontation was a complete success. All seven states were represented and the finish was a tight affair. The winning team was Queensland, by the very slim margin of one target over New South Wales.


This year Clyde received back-up support from the Queensland Clay Target Association, help which was very much appreciated.

Their efforts commenced well before the tournament started, when a lot of preliminary "softening up" of the W.A. media groups was done.

Brett Watts, the Tournament Director, provided much of the basic material, and made some of those early contacts.

Then during the series, by phone, telex and personal delivery, Wiese and Browne distributed the results and a general report throughout Australia AND New Zealand.

## **CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGE** — AT LAST!

(Staff Writer)

After years of planning and replanning, resulting in a series of proposals, the Association finally resolved constitutional change at the Annual General Meeting, held in Perth during the National Championships.

The major effects of the changes brought about by the revised Articles of Association (the legal name for the constitution or set of rules) relate to the size and structure of the Executive Committee and the legal identification of State Associations as effective, working sub-committees of the national body, to which certain authorities are delegated.

The Executive Committee now better reflects its national nature, as each state, including Northen Territory is represented by two delegates. Previously, some states had twice the representation of others, while Northern Territory had no representation at all.

A further change is reflected in a new system of electing the National President. Whereas previously the office was filled by ballot at the Annual General Meeting, the new structure is that the position is filled by a ballot conducted at the first executive Committee meeting after the AGM. In this way, the people best equipped to judge the abilities of the presidential nominees - that is, the members of the Executive - are the ones who cast a vote.

Insofar as State Associations are concerned, these have been operating for many years now, and have provided - in the main - decentralised administrative and promotional activities for the sport.

Some last minute drama occurred in relation to these groups, as the Victorian Corporate Affairs Office, which had to approve the Association's proposals before they could be legally accepted, expressed concern that insufficient controls existed over the authorities that could be delegated to State Associations.

Consequently, a slight change was made to the wording which clearly identified the connection between the National and State bodies. The change will avoid a situation where a militant State Association may have been encouraged to secede from the ACTA. Obviously, such a move would not be in the best interests of the sport in this country and the Corporate Affairs Office request was very timely.


A fringe benefit arising from the new Articles is that provision has been made for proxy voting at Annual General Meetings, provided that advice is lodged by clubs to a pre-advised address, the name of the person authorized to represent the club at an AGM can now be changed, BY WRITTEN ADVICE, up to 48 hours prior to the meeting

The Administrative Unit is working on the preparation of a series of explanatory notes, which, together with the new Articles of Association, will be published in book form and circulated to all member clubs.

The stage is now set for further controlled progress within clay target shooting as will be realised when the description of the new sub-committees is read. It appears elsewhere in this issue of CTSN

#### AUSTRALIA WINS MEDALS AT CHRISTCHURCH (Staff Writer)

Australia continued its dominance of the South Pacific Regional Championships when the 1980 series was conducted at Christchurch, New Zealand early in March.

This was the first occasion on which all shooting disciplines had been included in this match, although pistol and clay target events had been held in 1978 and 1979 in Australia.

The New Zealand Shooting Federation is to be commended for the effort it put into the organization and co-ordination that made the tournament so successful.

Over 40 Australians made the trans-Tasman trip to compete, and were rewarded with a good standard of competition.

In addition to New Zealand and Australia, the entry list included contestants from new Guinea and New Caledonia - the New Caledonians were able to enter only the Invitation Matches.

New Zealand had success in the small bore and running target events as well as winning the Gold Medal in the skeet. In all other matches, Australia dominated the medal scene.

This was particularly noticeable in the pistol events, and some of the Australian contingent bettered Australian record scores.

This would suggest that prospects for Olympic medals look better in 1980 than for some time.

The clay target matches were conducted at Christchurch Gun Club, which was the venue for the 1974 Commonwealth Games shooting events. Since then, the club has installed a 15 trap Olympic Trench layout - the testing of the equipment was completed only a few days before practice for the South Pacific tournament commenced.

The program commenced with two days of practice. The Australian shotgun team arrived in Christchurch in time to get in the second practice session, after a worrying time prior to departure, caused by a number of industrial problems in New South Wales and Victoria. The Air New Zealand flight from Sydney to Christchurch provided the customary high level of cabin service, and the team arrived "in good order and condition".

Then followed the Badge Match for trench, which consisted of 100 targets. Bruce Lassen the current New Zealand champion burnedoff the opposition to card a 99/100 - a remarkable effort, which won him the Gold Badge. Rumbel and Maxwell each shot 96's which also earned them each a Gold Badge, and Ellis and Long secured a Silver Badge each with 93 and 92 respectively.

The next two days consisted of 100 trench targets each day, to make up the South Pacific Regional Olympic Trench Championships. The first 150 targets were used to calculate the teams' match results.

The Australians started well, with Rumbel carding 25, Ellis and Maxwell 24's and Long on a nervous 20.

Allan Coniglio of New Caledonia, although not competing in the South Pacific Match, shot a very creditable 23, but was unable to sustain the pace.

New Zealanders Lassen and Collins (both of whom competed at the 1979 Australian titles) mustered 23 and 22 respectively, to give their country a quiet start in the teams' section.

As the match progressed, Rumbel set a cracking pace, with three 25's and a 23 on the first day for an overnight aggregate of 98/100. Ellis wasn't far behind with three 24's and a 25. Maxwell, from Illawarra, showed great poise in his first international match and closed on 94 after the first 100.

Lassen was the best of the Kiwis, with an aggregate of 91, and Graeme Geater finished on 90. Collins shot 21's and 22's to close on 87, the same aggregate score as McGowan.

Into the second day, and despite the cold wind, Ellis and Maxwell continued to see the fluorescent orange targets well, and started with 25's. These were to be the only 25's carded for the day. Collins and Lassen kept New Zealand's hopes alive with opening rounds of 24 - Lassen was able to score 24 in the second round but then faded to two 21's to finish on 181.

Rumbel shot 24 in his second round to have a progressive score of 147/150. In an unaccountable lapse, he fired a dismal 19 in the third round, recovered to a 24 to close on 190/200 - good enough for second place. Ellis shot 24's and 23's, in the last four rounds to record a Gold Medal winning score of 191. Maxwell shot 24 in the last two brackets to thunder home in third place, and take the Bronze Medal. Lassen shot 181, to finish two targets clear of Collins on 179.

Australia's fourth team member, Greg Long, in his first international match came in with a hard-fought 176, the same score as Graeme Geater.

Barry Nelis of Brisbane, who was also competing in the invitation match shot a 175, to finish three targets clear of Alan Coniglio of New Caledonia.

The teams' match result saw Australia on 561, finish well ahead of New Zealand on 514.

At the conclusion of the trap event, the grounds were made ready for International Skeet.

Scheduled for three days, the skeet included a 100 target badge match, then the Championships over two days, each of 100 targets. This was the same format as that employed for the trap match, and provided a marathon test.

The Badge Match elevated the Aussie's hopes tremendously when Boyd of Albury shot three 25's and a 23 to finish on 98, and Ian Hale shot two 24's, a 23 and a 25 to card an aggregate of 96. Woolley, the New Zealand medal hope, shot three 23's and a 25 to record 94, and showed glimpses of form that shrewd observers recognized as a real threat to the confident Australian Skeet team.

The championship match started under windy cold conditions, with most targets tricky. The concentration of every competitor was fully tested, and it quickly became evident that high scores were going to be few and far between.

In fact, there were only nine 25's shot for the entire match, which gives some indication of the difficulty of the targets.

Woolley of New Zealand and Nelis (competing in the Invitation Match) and Hale, all recorded 24's in the opening round. Boyd and Crikis, of Australia, and promising youngster Paul McGowan, from New Zealand, along with popular veteran Jim McKenzie, fired 23's.

Hale carded a second 24 in the next round, followed by a 25 then a disastrous 21 to close on 94 at the end of the first 100 targets, to be the overnight leader. Tied for second slot, on 93's, were Crikis who finished the day with a clean round, and the consistent Woolley. Graeme Boyd recorded four 23's to 'overnight' on 92, just ahead of Kiwis McGowan and Bruce Webber on 91's.

The skeet teams' match was far more interesting than in the trap section, and Australia was only 10 targets ahead with two rounds to go.

The final day saw no change in the weather, which allowed Woolley to exploit his "home ground advantage". He showed much greater patience and control in his technique and shot a very deliberate 25, 24, 25, 23 to aggregate 190, and take out the Gold Medal. It was a tremendous effort under the circumstances, and thoroughly justified his selection as New Zealand's sole shotgun competitor to be nominated for the country's team to contest the 1980 Olympics.

Hale and Crikis managed a collection of 23's and 24's, and going into the last round, Hale had to score 22 or better to secure the Silver Medal.

At the end of the round, he found it difficult to believe the scoreboard which showed 21 - he and Alex Crikis had to shoot off for second, which Hale won with a tie-breaker with a score of 24 to Crikis' score of 22.

Two 22's on the last day held Boyd's score back to an aggregate of 184, one target in front of New Zealand's Bruce Webber.

In only his second major tournament since taking up international skeet, Paul McGowan produced an aggregate of 180, to be the third highest Kiwi, and two targets ahead of Australia's 1978 National Champion, John Summers.

Barry Nelis won the Invitation Match with a total of 183, which included the only 25 shot in the final round.

The tight finish for the minor placings kept a degree of interest in the match, after Woolley's uncanny reading of the targets took him to a comfortable lead early on the second day.

The teams' match result reflected the overnight position and Australia led New Zealand in by eleven points.

Immediately after the conclusion of shooting, the "shotties" hurried to join the competitors from the other disciplines at an integrated trophy presentation.

Although the night was very successful, the continuous procession of Australians and New Zealanders high-lighted the inherent weakness of a regional competition, in which the total potential entry is restricted to three nations.

Australia is so geographically remote that every opportunity to secure a variation of international experience should be grasped with both hands, especially if such experience could be gained at relatively low cost.

Australia's shotgun nominees for Olympic selection produced reasonably good form in New Zealand, and should have gained match hardening from the experience.



### NATIONAL HEADQUARTERS INVESTIGATIONS CONTINUE (Staff Writer)

Clay Target shooting administrators are continuing the exhaustive search for a site for a National Shooting Ground which meets all of the listed requirements.

Earlier this year, members of the Core Group (now known as the Management Committee) visited Canberra to view a site that had been recommended by the A.C.T. Shooting Association, where Val Paral is the driving force.

There is little doubt that the land, which is located close to the northern boundary of the Fairbairn Air Force Base, is an ideal venue for a fully integrated shooting facility, on which each type of shooting discipline can be held.

Australia has an urgent need for a shooting stadium of international standard, a factor which is a serious restriction in a country which is already substantially disadvantaged by its geographic location.

One of the drawbacks of locating the ACTA competition headquarters in Canberra is that the number of tourist attractions is limited. This becomes a factor of some significance when one considers the number of families that use the annual championships series as their annual holiday.

For as long as the policy of conducting National Championships on a state by state roster system existed, the interests of the holidaymaker were preserved.

However, now that the Association is committed to establishing centralised competition facilities, one of the most vital factors to be considered is ensuring that the site chosen has sufficient general tourist interest to keep visitors coming to the area regularly.

Meanwhile, more recently a combined delegation from the New South Wales Clay Target Association and the ACTA met with officers of the Dubbo City Council to discuss the possibility of establishing on a block of land nearby.

The idea was greeted with great enthusiasm by the Mayor, Alderman Cox, and Council executive officers.

The central geographic location, combined with accessibility by air, road and rail make the area attractive, but it too suffers from the drawback of having insufficient multiple tourist appeal.

The search for an eminently suitable location continues, and there may be a major breakthrough shortly.

The Executive Committee decided at its recent meeting that the investigation team should step up its efforts, with a view to a final decision on location being made at the September meeting.


To be available in mid March, Winchester Geelong have announced the release of the new version of their ever popular 'Winchester 101'.



The other standard specifications common to all 101's are still there in the form of the single trigger and selective ejectors. The gun is only available with 28" barrels and a ventilated rib is standard. Receiver finish is black chrome.

At press time, no price had been announced but we are led to believe that the price will be around the \$900 mark.



• The standard "Winchoke" has been adapted to fit the 101. The Winchester system is similar to the new "Domino", soon to be available, shown here for comparison.





### AUSTRALIA IS SUCCESSFUL IN INTERNATIONAL TRAP MATCH

Although a form of international trap teams' match has been an integral part of the National Championships tournament since 1975, the status of the match was improved dramatically this year.

Late in 1974, Elgin Gates of USA, John McMillan of New Zealand and "Barney" Rooke of Australia donated a trophy to be used for international trap competition.

Since then, the trophy has been competed for at Nationals, and entry has been available to any country represented at the series, with no restriction on each team's structure.

After the 1979 Nationals, the Association's Executive Committee decided that the match needed an elevation.

The course was extended to 50 targets, and official invitations were sent out to potential entrant nations. One of the main purposes behind this move was to encourage teams of top trap shooters from overseas to attend — in this way, it was hoped to improve the standard of Australian trapshooting.

America responded with enthusiasm and two team members were jointly sponsored by "Trap and Field" magazine and Air New Zealand. These shooters were Joe Loitz and Leo Harrison III. The other members of the U.S.A. team were Alvin Ridge, Donna Urlinga and Don Wenner.

New Zealand has been a regular supporter of matches of this nature, which reflects its similar need to Australia's for international competition.

The New Zealand team included Murray Havill, Don Devcich, John McMillan, Gavin Searle and Graeme Webber. Australia was represented by Darryl Wiese, Tony Bradshaw, Tony Holschier, Jim Smith and Bill Iles.

However, the lack of further entries once again demonstrates how difficult it is to attract overseas countries to travel to the geographically remote continent of Australia.

In spite of the limited entry, the standard of the match was of a high quality. The competition was run over two grounds, with each team of five shooters firing at 25 targets per shooter at each of two visits.

America and New Zealand took the tracks first and started brightly. Both teams handled the first five targets very well, but in the next ten, really found the going tough.

At the half-way mark, New Zealand was on 112/125, trailing the Americans by two targets. It was interesting to note how quickly the

American competitors had adapted to double barrel shooting - in their own game, single barrel shooting dominates.

Meanwhile, Australia went out to put its first half together, and shot magnificently. Only two targets were missed in this round, the second one being the last target of the bracket. This left Australia 11 targets up at the half-way mark, having

This left Australia 11 targets up at the half-way mark, having carded 123-125. The gallery of over four hundred thoroughly enjoyed the display of top class trap shooting.

Into the second 25, and Gavin Searle of New Zealand continued to dominate the visitor's performance. He finished with a 49-50, and assisted New Zealand to a final score of 233-250. The Americans appeared to relax just a little in the second half, and it was the skill and experience of Loitz and Harrison that kept them in the game. The final score for the U.S. team was 231-250, just two targets in arrears of the New Zealanders.


This left Australia with a stranglehold on the match, as they took the field for the second round.

Although Darryl Wiese missed his first two targets and Tony Holschier missed two in the first fifteen, Australia ran out clear winners with a final score of 241. In this total, Tony Bradshaw and Bill Iles had both contributed 49's.

The match was a tremendous challenge to the three competing nations, and proved that a need exists for some sort of Pacific Basin trap competition to be developed.

### EDITOR'S MAILBOX

#### Dear Noel

Having been a member of the A.C.T.A. for some 31/2 years now I have finally decided to sit down and air some grievances concerning our Association. The first one I consider of vital importance is the lack of publicity our sport receives in the media particularly in the newspapers. Most other sports appear to have easy access to get their results published etc. A good example of this lack of coverage is the recently held National Trench Championships in Canberra. There was virtually no reporting of results and this also applied to the Nationals held in Griffith last year. There are many shooters who for varying reasons are unable to attend these events and unless we improve the communication between our members and other persons outside our association then our sport will eventually die. The great pressures being brought to bear on our sport though the anti gun lobby by way of legislation restricting the ownership of firearms can only be defeated by taking the offensive and showing the voting public that we are sincere and genuine sportsmen. There is further pressure being imposed on our ranges by residents who move into an area knowing full well that the range exists and once having moved in try to have these ranges closed down. We must go on the offensive to inform people outside our sport the true facts rather than the sensationalised rubbish being printed now. I feel the first move to improve the situation should come from the A.C.T.A. and the State Associations to encourage all clubs to advertise their shoots and to let other members know what is going on. A case occurred recently where myself and another shooter travelled out to the Hawkesbury Gun Club to participate in an event advertised in the Clay Target News. On our arrival we found the grounds deserted and a telephone call to an official of the club revealed that the event had been postponed for a week. Now this club may have had good reason to alter the date but the lack of communication in the press made for a wasted trip.

One other matter that is of great concern to me is the poor standard of report supplied by those teams that have travelled overseas to participate in international events. These trips which are being funded by the A.C.T.A. should be used for the education not only of those shooters participating but those that are left behind and who one day hope to improve enough to be able to make the teams themselves. The things that I feel could be included that would not only prove of benefit but also of general interest could include the guns and other equipment that the champions use overseas. This report could also include the training techniques and the number of cartridges used by these competitors in practice etc. Also further information about some of the interesting highlights could be included which affect the teams competing and also the controversies. I realise that there would be some problems involved in the publication of these reports but the benefit of these reports would be of immense value to other shooters.

I would hope that the criticisms I have made are not taken as a general criticism of the A.C.T.A. for I feel that our sport has been making wonderful progress in the time that I have been a member and been able to observe the workings of the association. However I feel that unless we improve in the matters that I have indicated all the hard work will eventually come to nothing.

With attendances at regular shoots dropping all the time I feel it is about time clubs and shooters drastically revise shoot programs. I feel a prime objective is to reduce the expenditure of the club in purchasing prizes while giving the top shooter a worthwhile "prize" to shoot for. My suggestion also covers the novice and intermediate shooters' needs by reducing their shooting costs while still retaining the competitive atmosphere so essential to the breeding of top class shooters. The proposed format for a general event would be:

50 target double barrel championship - cost \$6.00 plus \$1.00 ground fee. Prize — an overall medal.

Optional sweeps (not graded) — \$1.00 on each 10 targets, \$5.00 on each 25 and \$10.00 overall.

The Novice would then pay \$7.00 for 50 targets, including competition with top shooters for the medal. The intermediate shooter would probably pay \$1.00 on each 10 targets as he would have more hope of shooting 10 than 25 or 50. The top shooters would take all the sweeps therefore creating a handsome kitty to shoot for!

Many of you will know that this format is successfully in use in the USA, and of course the length of events can be altered to suit all trap layouts. The sweep money offered will add an air of professionalism which should help us breed top world class shooters in Australia. The clubs then will not be in danger of losing money on shoots and many problems of chasing up trophy donors would be eliminated.

One foreseeable problem is of course more work for the club Secretary, but with calculator in hand and accurate bookeeping I'm sure the job's expansion will become like clockwork just like the older systems. Surely all dedicated secretaries will put in a little more effort for the great benefit the club will receive?

Please think about the idea, discuss it at club and zone level to exchange further ideas - it won't hurt and you can't lose!

### **AUSTRALIA'S MOST PICTURESQUE CLUB?** (Staff Writer)

During investigations into suitable sites for the Association's National Headquarters, a call was made at the Terranora Lakes Country Club.

Situated on the N.S.W. - Queensland border, the Country Club sits atop a mountain peak, and commands an incredible view of the Gold Coast tourist area.

The Country Club offers a variety of indoor and outdoor sporting activities and has a membership of around 4,000. One of the sports listed is clay target shooting. Terranora Lakes Country Club Gun Club has been affiliated with the ACTA since November 1974 and is headed by President Stan Theobald. Stan is an old hand and is well known by many north eastern Victorian shooters, as this area used to be home.

Club Secretary is Bob Ridler, a successful real estate salesman, who is also making a success of administering the Gun Club.

Terranora Lakes Country Club Gun Club (what a mouthful), is located about 500 metres from the Country Club headquarters, and has literally been cut out of the side of a mountain.

The facilities include three trap fields, and a very comfortable clubhouse. The DTL fields are complete with concrete walkways, and beautifully manicured lawns and landscaping.

As competitors are shooting virtually into space, the Club does not have a serious background problem. However, changeable light can be a problem, and the Club uses fluorescent orange targets exclusively.

### **REPORT FROM** MARCH EXECUTIVE MEETING.

(Staff Writer)

The Association's Executive Committee met in Perth on March 1 and 2. It then held a further meeting on March 5, after the new constitution had been approved at the Annual General Meeting.

The main meeting saw the first occasion on which a woman has sat as part of the Committee. Following the resignation of Mr Spencer Angel from the Queensland section of the Committee, a re-commendation from the Queensland Clay Target Association that Mrs Bev Grice fill the vacancy was accepted.

Unfortunately Mrs Grice's term of office only lasted until the end of the meeting, but her appointment broke the ice.

The following is a brief summary of the decisions to come out of the two meetings.

#### 1. JUNIOR INTERSTATE TEAMS' COMPETITION.

Each state is to be invited to enter a junior team in a postal interstate trap teams' match. The format will be similar to that which applies to the Ladies Interstate Trap Teams' Match.

#### 2. RULES CHANGES.

In respect to the shooting rules revision that is due to be implemented in January 1981, the detailed proposal is to be published in a forthcoming issue of Clay Target Shooting News. This will give all interested parties an opportunity to comment, through the appropriate channels, before the Executive Committee meets again in September

#### 3. USE OF MOTOR CARS AS TROPHIES.

The matter of use of motor cars as tournament trophies was again discussed and the Association re-affirmed its policy of being opposed to such a move.

#### 4. NATIONAL CONFERENCE OF STATE ASSOCIATION PERSONNEL.

A conference of State Presidents and Secretaries is to be held in Canberra on June 8. This will be the day after an important Discussion Workshop, which is being convened by the Australian Shooting Association, so it will be a very significant weekend for shooting sports administrators.

#### 5. 1981 GRAND AMERICAN TOURNAMENT.

After successful ventures to the Grand American Tournament in 1978 and 1979, the Executive has decided to send another team in 1981. It will consist of five competitors, although the project will be

subject to availability of funding. As in the past, selection will depend on scores recorded at three events in the 1981 National Championships. Members of the 1978 and 1979 teams will be ineligible for selection.

#### 6. CAR STICKERS.

A new design of car sticker was submitted for approval. A quantity is to be obtained and will be offerred to registered shooters in about two months time.

#### 7. AUSTRALIA DAY SPORTS FESTIVAL.

Following the immense success of the 1980 Australia Day Sports Festival, which was held in Canberra, it was agreed that the ACTA would strongly support any future projects of a similar nature.

Advice has been received that a similar series of sports events will be held in 1981 and the Executive Committee hopes that international and standard forms of trap and skeet will be available.

Subject to the approval of the respective club committees, the venues will be ACT International and Queanbeyan-Canberra. 8. BROKEN HILL GUN CLUB REQUEST TO JOIN SACTA.

Broken Hill Gun Club currenty affiliated through the New South Wales Clay Target Association, has requested to be allowed to join the South Australian Association for reasons of geographic convenience.

The request has been passed on to the two State Associations to resolve.

Other matters discussed at the meeting have been covered in other reports, especially the election of President and Vice President for 1980, and the creation of sub-committees.

The next meeting of the full Executive Committee will be held in Melbourne during mid September. 0

## ASSOCIATION **UNDERTAKES ADMINISTRATIVE RE-STRUCTURE.**

### (Staff Writer)

Following the unanimous vote taken at the 1980 Annual General Meeting to accept a new constitution (legally known as Articles of Association), the Executive Committee has adopted a modern concept in management structure.

Certain responsibilities have been decentralised, and provision has been made to gain advantage from expert advice outside of the Executive Committee, where considered necessary.

Day to day management responsibilities have been delegated to the MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE, which consists of National President, Ern Hawkins, Vice-President Laurie Connors, G.R. Porter, QLD. and R.M. Holtfreter, W.A.

Provision has been made for the appointment, in time, of a General Manager. During the interim period, the combined functions of the General Manager and the Administrative Officer, have been vested in one employee, to be known as the Executive Director.

Five working sub-committees have already been formed.

Details of these committees and the make-up of each, follows:

1. International Sub-committee. Previously known as the ISU Sub-committee, this group has been renamed, and its structure has been drastically altered in an attempt to get it to meet more often.

Mr Laurie Connors is Chairman, and the committee includes Bill Abbott, Newton Thomas and Bob Buchan.

The group has been given much broader guidelines than the previous sub-committee, and has been listed as number one because of the importance and urgency of the issues confronting it.

2. Development Sub-committee. The purpose of this committee is to ensure that the forward planning function is adequately catered for. In an effort to inject some fresh thinking into this area, an in-vitation is to be extended to two top business identities to join National President Ern Hawkins to make up the Development Subcommittee.

3. Finance Sub-committee. Chaired by Mr Hawkins, this committee also needs specialist advice, and two of Melbourne's leading financial figures have been invited to join it. Such a move will guarantee that the Association gets the best possible advice on financial matters, especially in relation to money matters connected with the establishment of the Association's National Headquarters.

4. Rules Sub-committee. This group has a most important role to fill, as it steers the revised trap and skeet rules to successful implementation on January 1, 1980.

The size of the committee has been pruned, and it now consists of: Mr A. Rowe (Chairman), Messrs G.R. Porter, R.H. Bailey, T. Reschke and R.C. Mules.

5. Nationals Sub-committee. The purpose of this committee is to maintain some sort of continuity between the specific organizing committees charged with the responsibility of running the National Trap and Skeet Championships each year. Its structure includes the ACTA Management Committee, a nominee from the organizing committee of the series immediately past, and a nominee from the forthcoming series.

As the magnitude of each successive Nationals tournament increases, so the weight of responsibility on this committee also grows.





### **NEW PRESIDENT FOR INTERNATIONAL GUN** CLUB (S.A.) (Pat Browne)



Tonkin M.P. expressed some surprise at the extent of the involvement in clay target shooting. The visit was in response to a request from the club to inspect their Trench complex. The Trench had been opened earlier by the Minister for Water Resources and Land, Hon. P.B. Arnold MP.

The president of the club Mr. Bob Mules took Dr. Tonkin on a conducted tour of the extensive shooting facilities. He pointed out to him the differences between the various shooting disciplines and the number of members that took advantage of the club for recreation and sport. During his visit the Premier met many of the members who had spent a great deal of time at the club on a voluntary basis to dig the hole and install the trench complex.

Bob Mules pointed out to the Premier that the work was supervised by freelance engineer Gunther Drewing and that all the electrical work was supervised by Bob Dower.

The club had imported the traps from Rossini in Italy and the total cost of the trench was \$16,000. Bob also pointed out that the management committee of the club was very disappointed in the amount of sales tax charged on items such as sporting equipment. Whilst he could sympathise with the problem however, the Premier pointed out that sales tax was a federal matter.

Both Trench and Skeet were being shot during the visit and the Premier showed a keen interest in the mechanical and administrative side of the club's operation. So taken was he with his Minister Peter Arnold's handling of a round of skeet he expressed a wish to 'have a go' at a later date.

Bob Mules was quick to offer him an open invitation to return at any time.

# THE SAGA OF RULE 76

Probably the most talked about subject at the Nationals in Perth was the anti-climax of the Double Barrel shoot-off. All the ingredients were there for the emotion-charged scenes that developed during, when it happened and then in the aftermath of the incident.

There is no doubt that the shoot-off was shaping up into one of the classic confrontations in Australian clay target shooting history. The scenario was simple. It was normal shoot-off at the beginning, with some of the sport's more fancied competitors doing battle for the 'big title'. But as the event progressed, it became obvious that before our very eyes we were seeing something unique.

Doug Smith, almost a legend in national competition, was being challenged by a youngster, 16 year-old Russell Mark. The atmosphere became electric as the milestones were passed. But the undercurrent of feeling reached its peak when Doug Smith had his second cartridge mallunction. Both shooters at this stage were a bit on edge and they were well past the 300 mark and shooting well.

on edge and they were well past the 300 mark and shooting well. Then on Doug Smith's 349th target it happened. The 'click' sounded like thunder, and rule 76 suddenly became prominent and the discussions started.

"Scottie" Gibson, the referee, said later that it was the hardest decision he has ever had to make, but as he pointed out, "rule 76 is explicit and spells out the result in clear and precise terms".

Rule 76. "lost target" shall be declared on the competitor's third and subsequent cartridge mislire in any one event. This rule applies to both reloaded and factory loaded cartridges.

In the emotion charged atmosphere following the incident, there were many things said and discussed that perhaps bear some comment.

One point made was that the shoot-off should have been allowed to continue despite the misfires. An admirable thought and one that I must admit I agreed with. But, it was obvious that due to misfires that occurred in the first 50 targets, it was not on. In retrospect, one

It was something to see when Eley Ammunition let Sue Holman loose amongst the unsuspecting competitors during the pre national Eley DB championship.

Sue, a petite blonde, with the shortest of shorts, and Eley T shirt and cap and fully equipped with cartridge belt and game bag was dispensing all the little promotional goodies around the grounds.

Renowned for their keen eyesight, there were some interesting clashes when shooters started to walk into poles, trip over tent pegs and bump into each other. It was even said that for the first time ever, Tony Bradshaw was speechless. must pay tribute to the shoot marshalls and jury for their quick thinking and precise decision making.

Another point made was that Doug Smith was unaware of the rule and thought that each round of 25 targets was a new ball game. I find that hard to believe but will make the concession that the UIT rule does have that provision in it.

U.I.T. Rule 9.5 (d) (part)... "The Shooter is allowed a total of two (2) malfunctions per round of 25 targets regardless of whether he has changed his gun or ammunition. The third and subsequent malfunctions of either gun or ammunition are considered excessive. Each regular target attempted thereafter on which an excessive malfunction occurs shall be declared "LOST".

Keen observers of the shoot-off will remember that Doug in actual fact opened his gun before 'Scottie' Gibson had a chance to inspect it.

Also bandied around was the fact that the gun itself was faulty. This premise is again hard to accept. Whilst one can agree that most under & over guns, because of design limitations are susceptible to a light hammer strike in bottom barrels, the fact remains that the Browning used, and hundreds of others, used the same cartridges throughout the nationals without the problem occurring.

The fact must be faced that the cartridge in question had a bad track record and it was unfortunate that the problem surfaced in such a dramatic way.

The thing to remember was that in a subdued presentation ceremony, things were said and statements made that would seem to reinforce this comment. I find it difficult to accept some of the things that were allowed to happen at this presentation as it was inclined to take the gloss from the fine win of the youngster Russell Mark. After all he was the Winner, fair and square under the rules of the game and deserved the full kudos for the performance. The competition is a national one to find the best double barrel competitor in the country, and one got the impression that there were too many apologies being made. When was the last time you saw equal trophies given at Bathurst when Moffatt blew his engine in the last lap and Brock went on to win? The impression also left in the minds of many was that the politics of the situation were inclined to overide the competition. The key figures in the drama seemed to be a little bewildered by the whole performance also. Spare a thought for them.

So, as we ponder the result in the aftermath of the hustle and bustle of Nationals competition, I pay a tribute to both. Russell Mark won the competition, a 16-year-old who had got his game together showed a maturity in competition that will be talked about for years to come. Doug Smith, the bloke you have to beat in any shooting match, took his misfortune in such a sportsmanlike way.

These are the people involved, not the hardware. Both of them stood head and shoulders above the politics involved.

I leave you with one last thought. Clay target shooting is an intensely personal game. You alone make decisions as to what equipment you use. You make the decision, you wear the result.
