



Executive Director's Notes

MAY — what a month! A Royal Visit, the Australian Olympic Federation's Executive decision to enter an Australian team in Moscow, a major break-through in relation to the funding of the 1982 Commonwealth Games shooting facilities.

There appeared to me to be a curious contrast between the timing of the Royal Visit and the decision to submit an Australian entry in the 1980 Olympics — were there different loyalty values represented in the comparison? (The subject of the Olympics is discussed in detail elsewhere).

Turning now to the subject of establishing shooting facilities for the 1982 Commonwealth Games to be held in Brisbane, there has been a long standing "feud" between, on the one hand, the three levels of Government, and on the other, the Commonwealth Games Foundation and the shooting sports.

During the last week of May, at a meeting where all parties were present, the Queensland Minister for Culture, the Honorable Ivan Gibbs advised that some solution to the problem would be found within a few weeks.

Mr Gibbs is to be congratulated for the way in which he led all parties to conciliation, and naturally the shooting sports representatives are anxiously awaiting decisions.

Special mention should be made of the contribution being made by Ron Porter, Executive Committee member for Queensland, in relation to the promotion of the 1982 Commonwealth Games.

Assisted by past president of Brisbane Gun Club, David Evans, Ron has represented clay target shooting on the sub-committee created to plan the upgrade of the Belmont range to Commonwealth Games standards. When one considers that over half a million dollars has been requested for the upgrade project, \$120,000 of which is for the shotgun range, isn't it a pity that insufficient area exists to allow the ACTA to establish its National Headquarters there? Still on the subject of Queensland developments a delegation

Still on the subject of Queensland developments a delegation representing clay target shooting met with representatives of the Police, Education and Sports Departments of State Government with a view to having a plan for the training of students in the safe handling of firearms accepted for introduction into the secondary school system.

The Queensland delegation consisted of State Vice President Ron Porter, State Secretary Bev Grice (who had prepared a very professional submission on the proposal) State Director of Coaching, Bill Stevens, and National Coaching Director Newton Thomas.

Student training is becoming quite fashionable, and on the same topic, the Victorian Ministry for Conservation recently conducted a training course which was directed at preparing shooting sports personnel to go into the schools system to train teaching staff to become "safe handling of firearms" course leaders. A full report on the project appears on page 12 of this issue.

In a first for clay shooting, a national conference for State Association Presidents and Secretaries was held in Canberra during the early part of June. It was attended by representatives from all states and all agreed that the exercise was very worthwhile.

Sports administration is certainly becoming a diverse activity, and every effort must be made to keep clay target shooting at the top of the heap! Good shooting,

LOITZ — SHOOTING WIZARD

Joe Loitz, the 22 year-old doubles dynamo from Illinois found Australian targets different from what he is used to. But he liked them as they were very predictable in their flight.

He was competing at the Australian National Championships at Perth in the third South Seas Safari team to visit the tournament.

With co-captain of the American team, Leo Harrison III, Joe Loitz secured his place in the team by running fourth in the Grand American Handicap with a score of 99-100 and by running second in the All-Around Aggregate (393-400).

Starting as a 13 year-old, Loitz has developed a doubles style that took him to the champion's dais at Perth in a display of double-rise shooting never before seen in this country.

Talking to Joe after the double rise event, he said that when he practises, it is usually on doubles targets.

"Back when I was a youngster people saw me shooting and said I was a heck of a doubles shooter. Being young I took some notice and this is what I specialised on. It has worked out real well for me, it's got me a great deal of my high guns or as we call them, the high overalls and the high all arounds. So if you can come up with a good score in doubles it always helps out in these overall trophies", he said.

Speaking of the targets thrown in Australia he said: "I found the handicap targets a bit difficult but then I have not got my handicap gun with me. I am using my doubles gun and while I can shoot singles with it OK, when those faster handicap targets come out I just don't know where to shoot".

"It just does not feel right, I cannot handle the targets back that far (25 metres) with that particular gun."

"If I had my single barrel I think I would have done a lot better even with only one shot at it. But yes, the targets are different but mainly they are just that bit faster. They climb a lot faster here especially into a head wind, they just soar. Our targets do not have that initial speed, we seem to lob them out."

"One thing though, they fly a lot truer than ours. In the States we get a real arc to the targets but yours go more in a straight line and so are more predictable. I like that a lot about your targets here", he said.

Joe, when asked about his thoughts on guns said that he shoots a Perazzi for doubles and pointed out that: "It's an old one, they don't

"Most of them you see have 2934" barrels, but mine has 32 inch barrels, one of the few around. I bought another one as a back-up gun but I have never shot it, it just sits in the case. The one I have here has just about been shot out, it really needs to be rebuilt." "For a singles gun I shoot a Ljutic, they are as heavy as hell but they are a beautifully balanced gun", he said. Perazzi was the boom gun in the States at the moment according to Joe. He said that back in the 40's, 50's and 60's the Model 12 Wienbetter prior d surgers but new the Depresented surgers when here the surgers when here there there the surgers when here the surgers when here

Winchester reigned supreme but now, the Perazzi was such an accurate gun and better set up for competition. It was taking the market by storm.

"You can see the English and European influence with the number of Brownings being used but I can see a lot of similarities in the Australian and American attitudes to shooting in general. After all we have very similar lifestyles". He said.

Joe first shows up in the ATA record books in 1973 when he got an honourable mention in the sub-junior All-American Teams selection. In 1974 he made the Junior first team, a year that Leo Harrison III was the co-captain.

It was in 1975 however when he burst upon the scene in a big way. Apart from being in the Junior All-American team again, his overall performances were quite spectacular.

The junior section of the Ohio Handicap at the Grand American that year fell to him after a shoot-off and he went on to take out the Junior High Over All with a score of 959/1000.

It was in the same year that he was the first Junior ever to win a men's State Doubles Championship with 100 straight. He did this in his own state of Illinois.

In 1976 he was captain of the All-American Junior team and in 1978 was named in the second senior team.

Quizzed about his start in trapshooting Joe said; "I started back when I was 13 years old. When I started there were a lot of real good

junior shooters around. They were real good! Just like this young Russell Mark here at this tournament. But where you have just one, there were dozens in the States that could hold their own with the senior shooters."

"Not so today though", he said. "We would be lucky to produce one good junior a year at the moment, there are not a lot of real champions like Leo Harrison coming through the ranks these days", he added.

When asked why, he said that most shooters seemed to take up the game when they were older, in their 20's and 30's. The reasons were mainly economic, he added.

THE SHOOTER AND CONSERVATION

Recently I have been involved in some detailed discussions with Max Downes and Peter Stuart, who are both conservationists and involved with the Australian Deer Association — Peter is National President.

Since joining ELEY, I have been astonished at the totally wrong impressions I, and most of my friends, had in regard to the shooting fraternity. As is usual, the actions of the small, but well-publicised minority, damn the whole group even though the vast majority of shooters are responsible, law-abiding citizens whose concern is as much for the continued prosperity of the game they are hunting as it is for a good day's sport.

The Deer Association, in particular, has been constantly thwarted in its attempts to cajole governments, especially in Victoria, into sensible and practical deer management programs.

Instead, the Victorian Government, and their contemporaries in other States, seem bent upon allowing and even encouraging commercial deer farming with its repercussions in the trapping of game animals.

The issues are clear — but the easiest path for the Minister seems to be to legislate for farming and not bother with the complications of conservation and sport.

I really believe that these actions stem from a natural abhorrence to the killing of any animal and the somewhat tenuous connections of gamehunting as a blood sport as against commercial farm killing as a controlled, economic necessity that nobody worries about.

In the future I shall be doing all I can via my newspaper columns and personal contacts to correct this attitude.

THE OLYMPICS

At the time of writing, Australia is still going to the Olympics — although with all the fuss one wonders if they will ever make it, and young lan Hale, from the ELEY sales staff — a key member of which, he is — will be among their ranks. We all hope lan and his team-mates perform well and can close their minds to the tremendous pressure that the Government and the media has exerted upon them. They are going to complete in fair competition against other young men and women, as is the practice of sport.

It is not their duty nor responsibility to make political decisions, nor does their patronage imply acceptance or even knowledge of the policies and actions of the governments of their opponents. If a political decision is necessary, then governments must make them, not dilly-dally and then hide behind the ideals of sport to excuse their procrastination.

The government certainly has a point — they should act on it and most Australians will then support them provided they are equitable and just in the actions they undertake. Whatever your feelings it is unfair to brand our Olympians as traitors.

NEW PUBLICATIONS

If the sport is to continue its growth within the present world-wide climate of the uninformed but constant stream of criticism, there is a great need, as we at ELEY see it, for simple yet comprehensive technique books which especially the beginners can readily read and comprehend.

Additional information includes references to shooting and the laws, instruction and the major disciplines in clay target competitions.

The hard cover book will be available from ELEY dealers, the ACTA itself, or from me directly here at Port Melbourne for \$9.95 postage included. We only brought 1,000 copies into the country so, if you are interested, please place your order without delay.

Our second venture into shooting instruction was in co-operation with the Department of Education, Queensland, in their correspondence school.

This includes a 10-minute tape, and a complete book on firearm use and safety for all the shooting disciplines. Although it was designed for the youngster who could not gain direct class-room instruction, it is an excellent kit and one which could readily be used to augment the schooling of youngsters in the safe and effective use of firearms in the class-room or the club.

ABOUT RELOADING

For those reloaders among you, the drop in lead prices must have been a welcome relief from the never-ending chain of price increases which have become the "norm" nowadays.

ELEY is dropping an enormous quantity of shot at present, and I do not expect the price to remain this low for too long, so we recommend you buy up whilst you can at these prices.

Incidentally, we have just received a huge shipment of NOBEL powders, unfortunately at new prices, so there will be plenty of powder around for some time.

And any centre-fire shooters should be aware that our new extensive range of ELEY bullets will hit the market shortly. More about this later.

"You are either born into it like I was or get introduced to the game by a friend. My grandfather and father ran gun clubs, so I sort of grew up with it," he said. "There is another reason", he added, "there are getting to be

"There is another reason", he added, "there are getting to be fewer and fewer small gun clubs with the one and two trap layouts these days. This means that the casual shooter and the youngsters find it more difficult to get simple shooting to encourage them".

Joe has some interesting thoughts on what makes a great shooter. In his opinion it is being able to keep it all together over a big program that separates the men from the boys.

"These days", he said, "I cannot shoot really super in any event other than doubles. But I can hang in there with those good-good scores all the time in every event. So, I am always around the mark on the High Over All and this is the judgement of who is the best shooter overall'.

"Among the good shooters these high guns or high overalls are the trophies that are coveted the most. They keep track of their scores

all week long. The big money is in the handicap events but the prestige is in the High Over All" he continued.

Specialisation in events is a big factor in ATA shooting according to Joe. When a shooter is hot, there is nothing you can do to beat him. There is a trend in the States he said, to specialise, be it doubles, singles or handicap. This specialisation is inclined to make it difficult for the likes of him to compete successfully in the major singles and handicap races but conversely it leaves the specialists out of the High Over Alls and the High All Arounds.

Single's that handle the second structure of the secon

"Take some fellows, they go all year and break nothing better than 93's then one day they go out and BAM! break 100. Geez, how can you call him a great shooter if he only does it once in his life," he added.

"Leo Harrison is a great shooter", said Joe. "He is going to win one or two events every week. He is never in the background, he is always in the foreground, coming real close in every event. He is a great HOA shooter. Talk about a great record, in one year he only lost 2 HOA's. One of these was at the Grand and the other was at his own State shoot".

On his own shooting prowess, Joe said that he could only win a couple of singles events in a year. He would however be good for four or five good doubles events and perhaps a handicap. When he was in form, however, it was not unusual to pick up a HOA every week or so at the chain shoots in the States.

A pragmatic approach is needed to keep up with shooting in the States. The trend is to more specialisation and this is the reason why not a lot of trap shooters shoot skeet or the international disciplines.

"The main reason," he said "is that you can't afford to own all of the guns required. If you want to shoot skeet, trench, trap or anything else for that matter you would need to be a millionaire to keep up with it. Also if you try to shoot everything there is no way you can handle it, shooting against the specialists." He continued: "For instance, shooting a 16 yard event, one of

He continued: "For instance, shooting a 16 yard event, one of these specialists is going to go out there and win that event every time but they are not going to be in the top 5 of the HOA, no way. They are not even going to come close. In handicap events their speed is too slow and they will probably shoot low 90's if they are having a good day. Us all-rounders can shoot in the mid to high 90's on a consistent basis".

Joe has a firm grasp of the ammunition requirements of his guns and had some interesting thoughts on the subject.

"Use of ammunition is all in the head", he said.

"I think some shells, depending on your gun, will pattern better than others, there is no doubt about it. My gun, the under/over likes 3 dram 8's in Federal Paper and my single barrel likes heavy $7\frac{1}{2}$'s. If I shoot a light 8 or a heavy 8 in there it just does not seem to do the job."

"The shells I am shooting here are very good, I have not had any complaints. I do not think I need the power I am shooting with the 350's in the second barrel. I think I would rather have the tighter pattern of the lower power. Just looking at it, your shooters do not need the higher power, the 300's are quite adequate. All we ever shoot, even for handicap is the 300's, they are as good as you need." "I don't like the 275's that much as I like to really grind them up

"I don't like the 275's that much as I like to really grind them up when I hit them. Your targets don't smoke as easily as ours and I found out right away that you have to make a real effort to 'smokeem'". he added.

Double barrel shooting caught his fancy.

"Hell...its a lot of fun...great to be able to shoot the pieces you know. The speed you throw your targets over here is OK", he said.

"But if you threw an American target here...geez...you would never miss. The Nationals would go on forever. It would become an endurance race. It would be who ever got tired first would lose. It would not be a matter of shooting ability", he concluded.

From a very personable young man who has a lot of shooting ability, that was a very perceptive comment.

Talk About Travel

Advice has been received from the Association's international carrier, Air New Zealand that the regulations controlling the carriage by air of arms and ammunition have been received.

The advice reads:

"Following a review of these regulations the conditions applicable to the carriage of ammunition as baggage on international flights have been adopted for carriage within New Zealand. This means that small arms ammunition for sporting purposes in quantifies not exceeding 5 kilos per passenger may be carried as baggage within New Zealand provided the ammunition is securely boxed to be:

(a) protected against shock

(b) secured against movement and

(c) packed so that it cannot function accidentally under normal conditions.

Quantities in excess of 5 kilos may be carried as cargo provided the requirements of the IATA Restricted Articles Regulations are complied with.

There has been no change to the regulations concerning the carriage of firearms."

The IATA regulations state as follows in regard to quantities exceeding 5 kilos (10lbs) gross weight but not exceeding 25 kg (50lbs) — "when such ammunition is carried a written declaration shall be made by the passenger confirming that the ammunition is packed in a strong outer packaging made of wood, metal or fibreboard, and that the ammunition inside the package is protected against shock and secure against movement. The declaration shall also confirm that the passenger is not carrying more than a total of 25 kg (50lb).

Passengers may not carry ammunition in their hand luggage."





AUSTRALIAN CLAY TARGET SHOOTING NEWS-JULY

TO SEND OR "UNSEND" AN OLYMPIC TEAM?

The long delayed decision on whether Australia should field a team in the Olympic Games to be held in Moscow later this month has now been made — AUSTRALIA WILL BE THERE, along with about 80 other nations.

After months of indecision, sitting on the fence, and then putting the decision in the hands of people with a known bias towards Australia's "need" to attend, the Australian Olympic Federation Committee recorded a close decision in mid May, when it voted 6-5 to enter an Australian team.

Even at that stage, is seemed, that a clear objection to the entry had been registered by half the AOF Executive, (excluding the Chairman). Earlier, I mentioned bias in relation to the members of the Australian Olympic Federation Executive Committee — this bias was created by the fact that almost without exception each member had a 'vested interest' in attending because he or she had an official berth in the team.

Consequently, the sub-conscious response would be based on a personal desire and this makes rational decision making that little more difficult. There is no suggestion that there was any deliberate personal motivation — simply that the possibility of pressure on that basis was not removed.

The situation becomes worse, when one reads the press reports that followed the AOF decision. In these, President Syd Grange is reported as saying: "I must make this point clear, that there has always been a conflict as to our loyalties to the Government, and on the other hand, our loyalties to amateur sport."

There is a clear inference in that statement that the AOF Executive now believes that sport comes before loyalty to the Australian Government.

If this is a reasonable assumption, it leaves me feeling sick inside. After all, it is only a few months since the Australian Government, the AOF and Shell Australia combined to promote the first Australia Day National Sports Carnival.

The purpose of this carnival was to assist in the development of a national pride through sport, and the results were considered at the time, to have been an overwhelming success.

A similar project is under way for 1981, presumably with the same objectives, and once again, shooting will be one of the strongest supporters. But whaf of the AOF — can it now claim to be motivated by the same purpose?

How do readers feel about the Australian flag flying in Moscow? How do you feel about the National Anthem reverberating around the Moscow Olympic Stadium?

Remember the deep pride we all felt when Jim Ellis stood on the victory dais at Seoul, Korea in 1978, after winning the Bronze Medal in the World Championships? The Australian flag was raised to the mast head as the medal was

The Australian flag was raised to the mast head as the medal was presented to Ellis — a very proud moment in Australia's shooting history, and one that will live in my memory for a long time.

But it will be a different feeling in Moscow! I don't profess to understand the political situation in Afghanistan, and frankly it should't affect sports' decisions.

The real issue seems to be — "should we support the decision of a democratically elected National Government?" I say that we should!

This is more especially the case when one considers that all sports groups, including the AOF, have depended on the same government for significant levels of assistance, mainly financial.

Readers may ask why the Australian Člay Target Association has been so tardy in entering into the controversy. It would be a reasonable question and brings a reasonable answer — the ACTA first formulated its policy of supporting the Australian Government at a Core Group meeting held in Canberra on (purely coincidental) AUSTRALIA DAY, January 26, 1980.

This decision was conveyed to a meeting of the Australian Shooting Association on Sunday, January 27. The ASA supported the AC-TA policy, but made two further decisions:

The first was that the discussion and subsequent decisions, would not be publicised until after the AOF decision was announced, and the second was that if at a full AOF delegates' conference, a decision was made to field a team to Moscow, then the shooting section would take its place. This decision was made on the basis that if, after democratic discussion, the AOF still believed that participation was necessary, then the ASA would be bound by such a decision. by Noel Southey

All of this ASA commitment occurred at a time when it was generally believed that the eventual decision on Australia's entry was to be made at a national conference of ALL AOF affiliates. As it turned out, the decision was deferred at the full meeting, and was delegated to the AOF Executive.

It is vital that readers recognise how this move changed the "ground rules". For, as long as a decision on participation in Moscow was in the hands of an AOF General Meeting, it meant that delegates representing national sporting associations would determine the result.

Delegating the decision to the AOF Executive placed the responsibility in the hands of 11 people, six of whom were elected by State-based Olympic Councils. Another two were the International Olympic Committee delegates, then came the President and Secretary and one other (I think he was known as a financial adviser).



Readers will see from this list that there is no link between the Executive and national sporting bodies, and yet the deliberations were being undertaken on our behalf.

Is it any wonder that during the week after the announcement of the AOF Executive decision there were mass withdrawals from the team?

WHY? Because the communications system was non-existent. The AOF Executive thought it knew what sports wanted, but guessed wrongly.

Look at the consequences of that break-down in communications. Australian sport has never been in worse disarray. Never before have we seen such fragmentation in sports groups — damage that will take a long time to repair.

Since the AOF Executive's decision has been announced, there have been a number of rumours circulating regarding outside pressures being involved, one of which reflected on the financial involvement of the major sponsor, Shell Australia.

It appears that the rumour resulted from confusion arising from the fact that two of the AOF Executive have commercial connections with the giant oil company. However, the rumour has since been effectively stifled through Shell's withdrawal as a major sponsor of the AOF's marketing program.

Herb Elliott, one of Australia's greatest Olympians, summed the situation up well when after being advised of the AOF decision, he was reported as saying: "It was almost as if I'd been told a friend had died, when I heard the news." He continued: "I'm sure most of the athletes, who are very young people, don't realise the consequences of their going to Moscow, and the way they are going to be used to the detriment of our country."

Immediately after the AOF Executive Committee decision was announced, the ACTA began moves directed at getting the Australian Shooting Association to withdraw the shooting section of the Australian team. It was supported in this move by the strong Amateur Pistol Shooting Union of Australia and the result was that a special meeting of the ASA was convened on Sunday, June 8, in addition to the regular meeting, the following press statement was issued by Peter Papps, President of the ASA:

"an extradordinary meeting of the Australian Shooting Association was held on June 8th 1980 to discuss the decision of the Australian Olympic Federation in relation to the Moscow Olympic Games.

"After careful consideration of this most complex matter, it was

resolved that the Australian Shooting Association inform the Australian Olympic Federation that the Shooting team is withdrawn from the Australian Olympic team, with the exception of Yvonne Hill.

"The Association received copies of documents shortly before the meeting, indicating that Yvonne Hill had obtained an order in the Supreme Court of South Australia, which appears to have the effect of restricting the Association from withdrawing her from the Olympic Team. The Association is taking legal advice and will act accordingly.

ingly. "The members of the council share the disappointment of all team members but call upon them to understand this difficult decision." shooting

Prior to the meeting being held, the team coach, Mr Newton Thomas, demonstrated that he had no hang-up with his loyalties and announced his resignation from the team — this reflected his respect for Federal Government decisions.

Newton's withdrawal was followed by the resignation of Ellis and Rumbel, repeated two days later by the pistol representative John Tremelling.

STUDENT TRAINING GETS OFFICIAL SUPPORT

A fully integrated approach to the subject of student training in the safe handling of firearms came a step closer early in May, when the Victorian Ministry for Conservation sponsored a training program for selected senior personnel.

The project was held at Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology. Its purpose was to equip shooting sports coaching people to go into the secondary school system and train teaching staff to become course leaders for hunter safety training courses.

About 50 people attended the seminar, with each of the shooting disciplines being represented.

Clay target shooting was represented by George Biggs, Victorian Director of Coaching, Harry Brooksby of Warrnambool (South West Zone Coach), John Green of Korumburra and Ian Hale of Cranbourne. Green and Hale are joint zone coaches in the South East Zone.

The seminar was opened by Mr Sid Cowling, who is Deputy Director of the Fisheries and Wild Life Division of the Conservation Ministry. In his opening address, Mr Cowling acknowledged that a serious need existed for community training in the safe handling of firearms and paid due credit to the extensive work that had already been undertaken by most of the shooting organisations.

He explained that his department realised that some form of coordination was required, and it was this integrating role that the Division was anxious to fill.

The next speaker was Detective Sergeant Bob McAllan of Victoria Police, who spoke on the more important provisions of the Firearms Act and its consequences. He placed heavy emphasis on one or two apparent shortcomings in the Act, and left the impression that these will be corrected in the recommendation arising from a current departmental review of the Act.

The next session was on the subject "The Choice and Effective Use of Training Aids". This discussion was led by Mr Tony Dare, of the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology Education Unit.

This part of the program was of particular interest, because it gave the attendees an opportunity to be brought right up to date on the new types of sophisticated training aids.

It quickly became apparent that the impact (and therefore the effectiveness) of training programs can be substantially enhanced by the use of such equipment — especially as most secondary schools now have a range available.

However, the lecture which had the most visual impact must surely be that presented by Sergeant Brian Thompson of the Victorian Police Forensic Branch. Sergeant Thompson is involved in firearms testing and identification — particularly those used in either crime or accident — and demonstrated some extremely unsafe examples of modern firearms.

The vital subject of game conservation, and related topics was covered by Geoff Clarke, a senior officer with the Fisheries and Wildlife Division of the Ministry for Conservation.

All in attendance noted the day a complete success and proudly walked away with a "Hunter Safety Training Instructor" indentity card.





Nikko, that fine gun from Kangmatsu-Goshu is making its third run at the Australian market, this time under the banner of Eley Ammunition.

One could pose the question of is it "third time lucky" but the Nikko has a lot more going for it than luck.

The original Nikko was marketed under Mal Fuller's banner and some trigger problems back in those days had the gun behind the 8 ball. Keith Herron then had a try with the "new look" Nikko and found they would not sell. It seems that old reputations die hard.

Now the gun has returned, again with a new look, and with a larger range of models and chokings.

The gun we are looking at is the flagship of the range, the "GOLDEN EAGLE" Mod II, a skeet gun par excellence.


The variety of guns offered by Eley fits neatly into the medium price slot of field and competition guns ranging from around \$650 to \$1000.

⁷ There are available some sensible choking combinations, particularly in field guns. Apart from the usual 71 cm modified/full combinations some better class models in 66cm barrel length have improved cylinder/modified barrels.

That is a far better configuration for the average Australian hunter.

The gun delivered to us by Eley is a very well finished box lock set up for skeet shooting. A Sid Bell creation of the "screaming eagle" is mounted on both sides of the receiver in 14ct gold. It really makes the gun stand out in the gun rack.

A single trigger is standard as are selective automatic ejectors. Lock-up is the traditional under locking rear lug, the bite being engaged by the tang protruding through the action face.

Hammer strike is good, both hammers being powered by coil springs. Firing pins have a good angle of attack and are spring loaded. The action operated smoothly and opened to a full gape and held there with no problems.

The safety is tang mounted and contains the barrel selection. This option is not required on the skeet gun but the action is obviously common to all models and would be essential on trap and field models.

Triggers are inertia operated and let off at a little over 21/2kg, a little heavy for a competition gun but easily fixed by a competent gunsmith.

Finish on woodwork, which is a dark, nicely grained walnut, is lacquered. Checkering is hand cut and neat. There is no grip cap and only a black plastic butt plate. This is not a criticism as most competition gunners like to fit their own, particularly skeeties. Recoil pads are fitted at the factory on trap models.

The gun sports a 15mm ventilated rib and both a front and mid rib ivory bead. Side ribs are ventilated as well which gives the gun a very snappy appearance. Blueing and polishing are excellent, the gun is very well presented for sale.

In firing tests a full range of cartridges were used but tests revolved mainly around the 32g skeet shell, both factory loads and reloads.

Choking is skeet/skeet and on measuring it was found that both top and bottom barrels were .730" which gives them just a modicum of choke. Patterns were very wide but also most even in their distribution. Both barrels shot true to the point of aim.

Ejection was crisp and even and there were no misfires in firing tests.

The gun was given extensive testing on the skeet field and it proved to be reliable, easy to mount and it pointed truly. It handled all the normal competition fodder with no problems but would require a properly designed and fitted recoil pad for long international matches. The gun was also given a run on quail and performed very creditably.

As an overview, the Nikko is a very well made gun, well up to the standard that we are expecting these days from the factories in Japan. The design is fairly standard but the manufacturing is excellent and finish good. The Golden Eagle motif is a nice touch and enhances the guns appearance. Highly recommended.




Popular electorate member, Noel Padgam-Purich presented the trophies and the pig was rapidly demolished. Festivities continued late into the night.









The meeting was convened at 7 pm with the National President Ern Hawkins and National Executive Director, Noel Southey in attendance. From the meeting it appeared things were well on the move and items of interest were that nine traps would be available for the Nationals and six skeet lay-outs. A Core Executive group was formed to handle day to day decision making on matters requiring urgent attention. The group would be VCTA President, Vice President, Secretary and Tournament Director. As the Sub-committee needed a representative on the 1981 ACTA Nationals Sub-committee, Bob Buchan, State President and also Melbourne Gun Club President was elected

By reports I received everyone in attendance had a great time. Sunday 27th April 1980

Another day of the State Carnival which when completed brought us to the V.C.T.A. Annual General meeting. This was held in the Geelong club rooms at 8 pm. Twenty-six clubs were represented at the meeting. General items were discussed, with the new handicapping system and rule changes being implemented in 1981 coming in for indepth discussion. Suggest all shooters and clubs be aware of the fact that the July C.T.S.N. will carry a lift out section that will apply for 1981. All interested personnel should study these, and if they feel an improvement can be made to any rule change, they must act quickly and responsibly through their club, zone and state body for action. The treasurer produced his report at this meeting and showed a balance sheet depicting a credit balance of \$9255 in our favor.

Monday 28th April 1980

This was the wind up day of the State Carnival. One could sit back and ponder the problems that had erupted over a well attended and successful shooting tournament. It was evident from this shoot that administrators MUST in futute pay more attention to our paying customer, the shooter, and endeavor to build in our program organising a minimum maximum shooter attendance, number of events, targets to shoot at traps available at host club and possible time required to complete daily events.

Tuesday 29th April 1980

This day was spent with an early morning visit to the National office to talk with our National Executive Director, Noel Southey. The afternoon was spent with State President, Bob Buchan, to further investigate premises to conduct the 1981 Nationals presentation night. Saturday 3rd May 1980

Kerang Gun Club was conducting a day and night shoot. I was unable to get to the day program through other commitments but arrived in time to shoot the last event on at night, and attend presentation of trophies to the winners. Shooters to be amongst the winners were Ray Wilkinson and Les Saunders from Kerang, Alf James, Maryborough; Glen Castellara, Griffith who won the Loddon Valley Double Barrel Championship, shooting 86-86, as well as being the High Gun winner of the program 76-79. 
Tuesday 6th May 1980

Only two shooters, one in each discipline were able to record the original percentage set, to qualify for the State training squad. EDITOR'S MAILBOX

To the Editor.

Having read your Executive Director's Notes in the May issue, I am moved to write and comment regarding Trap Rule 76 and the National D/B Championship.

Noel, to try and apportion blame to anyone or anything does very little for our sport.

To suggest that no other shooter had lost a target because of this rule shows very little understanding of shooters and the pressures of "big time" competition. The psychological effect of one misfire is often enough to play on the mind of a competitor, leave alone two misfires and anyway a "lost" scored after the second misfire is scored only as a lost target and the score sheet does not record the reason for that lost target.

So your quick check of score sheets would really prove nothing at all.

Also to suggest that unanimous support would have been forthcoming to an announcement that shooting would be allowed to continue without Rule 76, is an assumption you should in the interest of our sport, not be making.

I have heard many comments regarding this happening from other shooters, as you can well imagine, and not once have I heard it suggested that any change to what happened should have been made.

We must, and should, shoot under the rules until such time as they are changed, and that is exactly what happened, and I truly believe this is in the best interests of our sport. Also Referee Scotty Gibson assures me that Doug Smith opened his gun after the third misfire on his request.

That is why I believe Pat Browne's comments in "Shooting A Line" came as a breath of fresh air at the end of the May issue, putting a little commonsense back into the whole business.

In conclusion, I hope that any shooter who was not present at the time, will well and truly read Pat Browne's column, and I congratulate Pat on a fine summing up of an unfortunate happening. Yours sincerely,



New International Sub-Committee Meets

(Staff Writer)

As a result of the administrative restructure of the Association. the group previously known as the I.S.U. Sub-Committee has been re-named the International Sub-Committee, and has been given broader responsibilities.

Its responsibilities now cover ALL International involvement in clay target shooting, which should result in a better balanced program for top shooting athletes in the four major clay target dis-ciplines. (These are Olympic Trench, International - or I.S.U. -Skeet, Standard Trap - D.T.L., and Standard or American Skeet.

The new group held its first meeting in April, in the National Office

The first action taken was to formalise the position of Chairman, and Mr L. Connors was endorsed on the motion of Messrs Abbott and Thomas.

Mr Connors then requested that his Committee address itself to defining the basic components of the group's policies.

The following list was prepared, not necessarily in order of priority.

- Development of a National Training Squad for Olympic Trench and I.S.U. Skeet.
- Development of a National Training Squad for standard trap and * skeet.
- Establish guidelines for selection of squad members.
- Establish lists of possible sources of funding and open lines of communication.
- Prepare cost estimates, which can then be used for the prepara-* tion of funding applications.
- Critically assess Australia's position in relation to international competition in standard clay target disciplines.
- Plan a forward competition schedule.

After preparing this list, which could be termed the setting of objectives, the Committee then discussed each subject in detail. It will be readily seen that a fair amount of overlap is unavoidable, particularly because of the heavy dependence on funding.

National Training Squads.

Agreement was reached that the creation and development of a national squad of Olympic Trench and I.S.U. Skeet competition was a matter of urgency - a similar development in respect to the standard discipline is not yet warranted, but MUST be kept under review

The initial size of the squad is to be six competitors from each discipline, although the International Sub-committee reserves the right to add to or subtract from this recommended strength, dependent on circumstances.

As previously mentioned, the first push will be in the disciplines of Olympic Trench and ISU Skeet, and will be heavily dependent on responsible involvement by State Associations.

Squad Selection Policy.

It is intended that nominees for the national squad will come from State training squads.

The Committee's recommendation to State Associations is that in each State, a policy be implemented as soon as possible to create a State Training Squad to include the two Olympic disciplines, and based on the following minimum qualifying criteria:

(i) To be eligible for selection for the State squad, a competitor must compete in 3 - 200 target events and 3 - 100 target events in a 12 month period.

Included in this series of events must be the State Championship conducted in the nominee's State of registration, i.e. a Western Australian shooter must shoot in the Western Australian State Olympic Trench or I.S.U. Skeet Championships, as one of his (or her) qualifying events.

In cases where a competitor exceeds the minimum competition requirement, the first scores recorded, but including the State Championship, will be those used for determining that competitor's eligibility for selection for the squad.

(ii) The minimum qualifying average for selection on State squads will be 88% - i.e. 88/100 or 176/200.

(iii) It is a matter for individual State Associations to determine the training policies to be applied to the squads. One would expect this to be done in consultation with the State Coaching Council.

Selection to the National squad will be based on:

Nominees must have been already included in a State squad.

(ii) Nominees must have competed in the National Olympic Trench

or I.S.U. Skeet Championship in the period under review.

(iii) Nominees must have an average of 94% or better.

The International Sub-committee appreciates that it is important that provision be made for the consideration of juniors, and will readily listen to any recommendation placed before it by State Associations.

In principle, the Committee accepted advice from the National Coaching Director that the activities of a National Training Squad should include:

(i) Two five-day training camps - one soon after new members join the squad, and one three to four weeks prior to the major competition for the year.

(ii) Two or three weekend camps, to enable management to monitor the standards of squad members.

(iii) Two overseas competitions annually. Naturally, funding restraints do not permit the Association to act on this sort of plane at present, but the Committee felt it was important to set a policy.

Insofar as funding at a State level is concerned, the Committee felt that more effort could be shown by the State Associations in planning the raising and distribution of funds in the Olympic discipline area.

New South Wales has set a great example with its regular fundraising competition tournaments, conducted on a Zone by Zone basis.

Competition Schedule.

To simplify discussion, and to make any resolutions more easily understood, the Committee decided to treat the two categories -Olympic types and standard types - separately.

Before looking specifically at forward programs, the group discussed at length the difficulties Australia faces in trying to promote international competition for those A.C.T.A. members who play only the standard trap and skeet game.

This difficulty is created by the fact that Australia sees unique rules for her standard disciplines, which are incompatible therefore with conditions of overseas competition.

The Committee felt sufficiently strongly on this subject to make it the topic of a specific recommendation, which is listed elsewhere in this report.

The following forward programs have been defined - they are neither binding nor exhaustive, but represent a genuine attempt to provide a starting point:

(a) Olympic Disciplines.

1980—July. Olympic Games, Moscow (or a suitable alternative). 1980—Nov. Australian Championships, Western Australia.

- 1980-Dec. International Match Bangkok, Thailand. (See separate note on this match).
- 1981-? World Championships. (Subject to funds availability AND performance standards being met).
- 1981-October. South Pacific and Open International Championships, Brisbane, Australia.
- 1981-November. Australian Championships, Melbourne, Vic.
- 1982-March. Benito Juarez International Championships, Mexico. (As a lead up to Commonwealth Games).
- 1982—April/May. Australian Championships, Brisbane, Aust.
- 1982-October. Commonwealth Games, Brisbane, Australia.
- 1982-November. World Championships, Caracas. (Subject to funds availability AND performance standards being met).
- Standard Trap and Skeet. (b)
- 1980—July. International Trap Match, Chester, Great Brit. 1981—March. International Skeet Match at New Zealand Nationals -Hamilton, New Zealand.
- 1981-Aug. Grand American Trap Tournament, Vandalia, U.S.A.
- 1982-March, International Trap Match (Glenn Cup) at New Zealand Nationals, Christchurch.
- 1982—July. International Trap Match, Great Britain. (Subject to favorable report from 1980 project).
- March. International Skeet Match at New Zealand Nationals -Hamilton.
- 1983-July. International Skeet Match, U.S.A. (including U.S. National Championships).

From the above, two changes in direction will become apparent -(a) an involvement in U.S.A. Skeet tournaments is now scheduled for 1983 (it is hoped that team positions will be filled as a result of the first National Skeet Championships to be conducted as the feature event of a Skeet Carnival; and (b) it is planned to expand the policy relating to trans-Tasman teams to make provision for trap and skeet teams in alternative years. The trap team would then represent Australia each year the Glenn Cup is contested in New Zealand, and in the "off year" for the Glenn Cup, Australia could send a skeet team to New Zealand to contest an international match, yet to be defined

Outfitting Policy

After a very detailed discussion regarding the apparently high cost of outfitting travelling teams, the sub-committee agreed to a resolution (moved Messrs Buchan/Abbott) defining the life of the gear which is issued.

The equipment, and the life span of each is: Blazer - permanent, Slacks - 3 years, Shoes - 3 years, Track suits - 3 years, Track shoes - 3 years, Shooting jackets - 3 years.

In cases where a competitor selected for a current team, has previously represented Australia within the last three years, he or she will have to provide all the clothing from the previous trip, or at his or her own cost.

Postal Competitions.

(a) Internal — the Ron and Leonna Sky Trophy, which was introduced to promote inter-club trench teams shooting has sadly been a failure. This is mainly due to lack of promotion particularly on the part of the National Office.

An attempt will be made to revive interest in the match, prior to the next National Tournament for the Olympic disciplines.

(b) Agreement was reached that an international postal competition in the two Olympic disciplines be introduced between Great Britain, New Zealand and Australia.

The Executive Director is to follow this up, in line with conditions set down in the minutes of the I.S.U. Sub-Committee meeting which was held in Perth during the first week of March, 1980.

Rules.

This subject was raised in an attempt to grapple with the international relations problems caused by the Association's total dedication to observing a unique set of trap and skeet rules.

Admittedly, our skeet rules are very close to those of U.S.A., and in terms of mounting an international team, very little change would be noticed.

However, in the case of DTL or standard trap, there is no country in the world where an Australian D.T.L. shooter can travel and play his "lone" game.

As a result of an extensive discussion on the issue, the committee was unanimous in its decision to recommend to the Executive Committee the following proposal:

(a) Implement a staged transition to standard trap rules observed by a major overseas clay target shooting nation, preferably U.S.A.

(b) In case of Single Barrel shooting, alter trap angles to say hole number 2 on the Winchester White Flyer Trap, and reduce the distance the target is thrown.

(c) Amend Association's priorities in relation to the importance of trap events to read: (i) Single Barrel shooting, (ii) Pointscore shooting, (iii) Double Barrel shooting.

(d) Delete double barrel shooting altogether.

Such a policy would have effects that were more far reaching than just giving Australia somewhere else to compete internationally.

The big plus would come from the significant reduction in cost brought about by the fewer cartridges being used, a reduction which could be important enough to alter the economies of the sport to be changed to a point where new members would be easier to recruit.

Furthermore, such a move would immediately improve the equity in the sport, because the system would place the appropriate importance on the result of the first shot at each target.

Women's Talk

Geelong Clay Target Club was the venue for the Victorian State Trap Carnival over the weekend April 26, 27 and 28. Two hundred and forty six shooters, including many women competed for the honor of winning one of the three State titles, as well as a place on the Victorian State Team. 

ASSOCIATION TO INTRODUCE NEW TRAP AND SKEET RULES

By Arch Rowe, Chairman, Rules Committee

The subject of Rules has been a major point of controversy with shooters for years and will always remain that way as, unfortunately, everyone does not have the same line of thought when the question of rules are mentioned.

Insufficient thought and rushed decisions on rule changes in the past has been the main factor in our rules having to be altered repeatedly, causing confusion and discontent with our Referees and shooters in general.

To try to eliminate this problem, all registered shooters, Referees and Referee Examiners, were asked on several occasions, through the pages of C.T.S.N. for suggested recommendations on rule changes for our proposed Rules Draft now being presented.

A number were received from those interested and were considered by the Rules Committee with some being implemented.

The Committee appreciates the interest shown by these persons who apparently were not happy with the present structure.

Considerable thought involving many hours has been involved by the Rules Committee in the preparation of the new Rules Structure to be introduced in January 1981, and it is hoped that they will be accepted and make the Committee feel that the many hours of deliberation have not been wasted.

The following is a draft of the new rules.

TRAP SHOOTING RULES.

TRAP LAYOUT

1. (a) A standard trap layout shall consist of five firing points arranged on the arc of a circle of radius 16 metres and whose centre is the trap, firing points to be 3 metres apart, numbered 1 - 5 from left to right when viewed from the firing points and facing the trap, with No. 3 firing point directly behind the trap.

(b) A horizontal line joining No. 3 firing point and the trap and prolonged indefinitely will be known as the "Centre Line" FIRING POINTS FOR HANDICAPS.

- 2. (a) These firing points are situated at intervals of 1 metre from 11 to 25 metres behind the trap on lines from the trap extended through the firing points for standard trap layout. These firing points may be referred to as "Handicap Marks" and each line of firing points shall be known as a shooting lane.
 - (b) The 11 metre mark is to be measured from the top centre pivot point of the trap.
- 3. This collection of firing points and shooting lanes, forming a fanshaped pattern, shall be known as the "Shooting Tracks" and on each lane distances should be clearly marked to signify the forward limit of each firing point.

SHOOTING SOUARE.

- 4. (a) When firing the competitor's feet must be behind any line indicating the firing mark assigned to him, must stand with both feet completely within 1 metre square: this square shall extend 50 centimetres either side of the centre of the shooting lane and shall extend backwards 1 metre from the assigned handicap mark.
 - (b) However, provided his front foot is as close as possible to the forward edge of a shooting square a shooter with a wide stance will not be penalised if his back foot extends beyond the rear edge of the shooting square.

TRAP HOUSES.

5. Trap houses shall be used to give full protection to the trappers. These houses shall be 1 metre high in front, tapering or sloping to 85 centimetres at the back, and shall be 2 metres from back to front, 2.5 metres wide. A tolerance of 10 centimetres either way is permissable on these dimensions. All height measurements shall be taken from the level of the centre lane. The trap shall be mounted in a manner which will bring the top centre pivot point of the throwing arm 35 centimetres above the level of the centre lane and 1.5 metres from inside back of traphouse and 30.480 centimetres left of centre. A tolerance of 5 centimetres either side of this dimension is permissable.

LEGAL TARGETS.

- 6. (a) Targets, to be legal, whether single or doubles, shall be thrown out not less than 45 metres nor more than 55 metres (measured horizontally at trap level) with a flight of 3 metres above the centre lane at a point 10 metres from the trap, with a margin of tolerance of not more than 50 centimetres above or below. Except in double target shooting, the flight of targets shall be at unknown angles, thrown within an area subtending an angle at the trap of 45 degrees right and left of the centre line.
 - (b) As an aid in determining the legality of targets, where possible three pegs at least 1 metre high are to be placed on the arc of a circle (known as the "Distance Circle") of radius 50 metres and whose centre is the trap; one on the centre line "The Central Peg" - and one other each 45 degrees to the right and left of centre line respectively. These two pegs will be known as the "Lateral Limit Pegs". Concrete blocks and measuring sticks for measuring target height are to be standard equipment at all clubs.
 - (c) Where practical, three minimum distance pegs shall be placed at 45 metres. (Diagrams included.)

LEGAL TARGETS DOUBLE.

- 7. Each double shall be known as a right and left quarterer respectively into an area subtending an angle of 25 degrees at the trap; each area having as one boundary a line to the lateral limit peg as defined, and as its other line drawn 20 degrees to the left and the right respectively of the centre line.
- 8. There is a tendency among officials to set the trap at 3.5 metres and say that they are within the permissable tolerance. This is not so. The trap so set has no tolerance above and has 1 metre tolerance below the 3.5 metre bar. In all cases the trap should be set to throw targets 3 metres high when 10 metres from the trap. and should be altered immediately weather conditions cause clays to be thrown outside these limits. All too few clubs set their traps so that they cannot lower them to cope with an oncoming wind.

9. The provisions of rules 6 and 7 shall apply to targets released in still air.

If in the opinion of the Referee, a target was legal when fired upon, but was blown out of bounds or fell short of distance due to adverse weather conditions it shall still be classed as a legal target.

- TARGETS.
- 10. (a) Standard targets shall measure not more than 11 centimetres in diameter nor more than 2.85 centimetres in height nor more than 110 grams in weight.
 - (b) Mini targets shall measure not more than 7.6 centimetres in diameter nor more than 2.7 centimetres in height, nor more than 56 grams in weight.

GUNS AND LOADS.

- 11. (a) The term "Magazine gun" applies alike to automatic guns, pump guns (so called) and other guns not directly dependent on hand loading and are permissable for clay target shooting.
 - (b) Release trigger guns shall only be used on registered ACTA ground, subject to the following conditions:-

(i) ACTA shooters suffering from some conditions which would make the use of a release trigger gun desirable shall obtain a statement signed by the President and Secretary of the shooter's home club, that the shooter suffers from such condition and shall present the statement to a Referee Examiner who shall satisfy himself that the shooter understands the use of a release trigger device.

having been so satisfied the Referee Examiner shall forward the club statement to the ACTA Executive Director who shall keep the register of shooters authorised to use release trigger guns.

- (ii) No ACTA shooter other than those authorised in Trap and Skeet Rules 11 (b) (i) shall use a release trigger
- gun. (iii) All release trigger guns used by ACTA shooters and overseas visitors shall be clearly labelled in red --"CAUTION RELEASE TRIGGER" -- in a conspicuous place near the breech. Such labelling to be consistent with 12mm width marking tape.
- (iv)Release trigger guns shall not be left in gun racks or in positions where they can be mistakenly handled but shall be constantly under the control and supervision of the user.
- (v) The user of a release trigger gun shall notify the Referee at each visit to the trap and skeet layout.
- 12. No gun whose guage is larger than 12 gauge is permitted nor shall any barrel(s) length be shorter than 63 centimetres overall.
- 23. For Championship events (Commonwealth, State, Zone, and District), the load is limited to 32 grams struck measure or equivalent, shot size not larger than No. 6. Re-loads are permitted in all events except National Championships.
- 14. For handicap events, load is restricted to 36 grams struck measure or equivalent, shot size not larger than No. 6.

CHALLENGE.

- 15. (a) A competitor may challenge the load of any other competitor. On receipt of a written challenge, with \$2 forfeit, the Management shall obtain a cartridge from the challengee, and if after public examination of it the Management finds the challengee has violated requirements he may be disqualified or not accordingly as the offence was wilfully committed or otherwise. In case the challengee is wholly innocent the forfeit shall be paid to him, otherwise it shall be returned to the challenger. The Management of any Club, or of any tournament has the power to examine any competitor's cartridges at their discretion, without involving themselves in any penalty.
 - (b) A competitor may appeal against the decision of a referee in regard to interpretation and application of these rules. The competitor shall advise the referee before he leaves the shooting track that he intends to appeal, and, immediately upon completing his run over the traps the competitor shall lodge a written appeal and \$2 forfeit with the management. The management shall enlist the aid of at least three, including any Executive Committee Members, Referee Examiners, Rules Supervisors, or official Referees on the grounds, to examine the matter, and should the competitors appeal be upheld, his forfeit shall be returned and the correct ruling shall be applied to the target appealed against. Should the appeal be disallowed the forfeits shall be paid to the Club concerned. There shall be no appeal against a referee's decision in regard to whether a target is legal or whether it has been missed.

MANAGEMENT.

16. The Management of any club holding a tournament or competition under these rules has the authority to reject any entry in the said tournament or other competition without giving any reason and to disqualify in whole or in part any competitor who acts in an ungentlemanly or disorderly manner, or who handles his gun dangerously.

- **COMPETITOR AND COMPETITION.** 17. Wheresoever the word "Competition" may be used in the following rules, it is to be understood to refer to each particular event, and must at all times be construed by the Management in whose charge the carrying out of such "Competitition" has been entrusted.
- 18. A competitor is one who has nominated for a particular event, and whose name appears on the official score sheets or score board. A competitor can compete only once in each event. Each

competitor shall carry and present his Handicap/Registration Card at all shoots before he is allowed to participate (see also Rules 74g).

- Every competitor entering competitions agrees to accept all official decisions, and to abide by the rules controlling the competition.
- All competitors must be registered by the ACTA before taking part in competition. Unregistered competitors are not permitted to compete at any time.
- Competitors must at all times use their correct names when entering a competition. Shooting nom-de-plumes are not permitted.
- 22. Any competitor who commences an event and withdraws or is disqualified from the competition forfeits the right to resume and any refund from the event.
- 23. The No. 1 shooter may request a target to be thrown at his first and subsequent visit to each trap.
- 24. All clay targets broken or otherwise shall remain the property of the Club and not the competitor. The competitor only pays for the privilege of shooting.
- 25. Should darkness, bad weather, or other cause interfere with the competition the Management shall have the right to decide when and how the competition shall be continued, provided that this is not postponed longer than one calendar month. Any competitor who defaults in respect of such postponed competition forfeits all his rights and standing therein.
- 26. Shooting for targets only, is a term which shall be held to define the status of a competitor in any given event, or events, or in an entire tournament program, and shall signify that a competitor is "shooting for targets only" and has no interest in any trophy or trophies, nor any interest in money or monies in any specific event or events or in the entire program. The competitor's name shall be placed on the squad board, signifying that he is shooting for targets only. "Shooting for targets only" shall be allowed in any event at the discretion of the Club.
- 27. (a) Open shoots, that is Commonwealth, State and District Championships and open competitions (cases where more than \$200 value is allotted for distribution in any one event), must have the approval of the State Association before being advertised or conducted. (This rule applies to the actual event and the date of holding).
 - (b) Clubs allocated Commonwealth Championships and Interstate Teams' Matches must advertise the event in the AC-TA "Shooting News" at least once, two months before the actual shooting date. Clubs failing to supply suitable advertising copy by the appropriate copy closing date will be charged a fee for an appropriate insertion, as made by the ACTA Executive Director.
 - (c) Clubs allocated State Championships are expected to advertise these events in the ACTA "Shooting News".
- 28. A manual, automatic or electric oscillating trap must be used at all open shoots.
- SAFETY.
- 29. All guns carried on or about the shooting ground must be held in a position of safety, with the breech open and unloaded at all times.
- 30. Shooting on the grounds at any place other than the firing point at legitimate targets only is prohibited except where a pattern plate is installed.
- 31. Holding the gun "Pistol" fashion, using one hand only, is barred. Any competitor acting in this way, is to be warned against continuance — if continued the competitor is to be disqualified from competition forthwith and the matter reported to the Executive Committee (Penalty, fine \$20).
- 32. (a) When it is his turn to shoot, a competitor shall close his gun only when at the firing point and facing the traps, He must remove the cartridge or cartridges from his gun before turning from the firing point on No. 5 lane and proceeding to No. 1 lane and shall not reload until standing of No. 1 lane. The cartridge or cartridges must be removed from any magazine gun between each lane.

Provided he is standing on the mark from where he is going to shoot, and there is no person on a more forward mark a competitor using a semi-automatic or magazine type gun may drop a cartridge into the barrel whilst he is waiting his turn to shoot. The breech shall be left open and the gun muzzle shall remain pointed in the direction of the traphouse. The competitor may only close the breech and load the second cartridge into the magazine when it is his turn to shoot.

AUSTRALIAN CLAY TARGET SHOOTING NEWS-JULY

(c) During any event, competitors must remove all cartridges from their guns immediately upon the red signal at the traphouse, or if any official approaches the traphouse concerned.

PROCEDURE.

- 33. A competitor must be at the firing point within two minutes after having been called by the official referee, scorer or a member of the Club Management. Failing therein, he may be disqualified or penalised with loss of targets or may be re-squaded in the last squad at the discretion of the Club.
- 34. A competitor is duly notified to compete when his name is called out by the referee, scorer or other person authorised to do so by the management or when his name appears on the score board. If a "Squad hustler" is furnished it is a matter of courtesy only and does not in the least relieve the competitor from responsibility. It is the duty of each and every competitor to be promptly on hand to compete when called up to do so.
- 35. Empty shells on the ground must not be collected by anyone whilst the shooters are on the tracks. Only those people directly associated with the competition will be on the ground whilst the shoot is in progress.
- 36. When at the firing point ready for competition, the competitor shall distinctly give the command "pull" or a similar command to the referee/puller and thereafter the competitor is in the competition (see also Rule 52).
- 37. Unless, in the opinion of the referee, it is contrary to the equity of the competition, a competitor taking part in the competition may shoot at pieces of his own target, if he so wishes.
- 38. No competitor shall make, negotiate or discuss any bet (either on his own shooting or that of any competitor) whilst he is at the firing point or shooting tracks, nor shall he leave the firing point or shooting tracks for the purpose of making, negotiating or discussing any bet. If any competitor infringes this rule, he may be disqualified by the referee.

HANDICAP SHOOTING.

- 39. (a) No competitor is permitted to shoot from other than his AC-TA handicap mark except in novelty events, common mark graded trophy events or commonmark open championships or eyeopeners preceding common mark events which shall be shot from the same mark as the common mark event. All common mark graded events must be shot within the common mark rules.
 - (b) Clubs may conduct trophy or sweepstake events to be shot from handicap marks with competitors divided into various handicap groupings. In these events tropies of equal value and distribution must be provided for each handicap group.
- SQUADS.
- 40. Competitors shall be in squads with a maximum of 6; where there are withdrawals from a squad or squads after the competition has begun, squads will be closed up before each run over any trap. No. 1 competitor in each squad shall always start the shooting. The Club, at its discretion, may require competitors to change starting lanes on each trap as follows:--- No. 1 competitor shall commence shooting from lane 1, on Trap No. 1, Lane 2 on Trap No. 2 Lane 3 and so forth over all the traps. This rule shall also apply to Double-rise.
- 41. (a) Managements have the right to divide the number of targets by the number of traps available, shooting 6, 7 and 8 targets per visit per trap. Illustration No. 1: 15 targets, 2 traps, 1 visit. No 1. competitor shoots 8 targets on trap No. 1, finishing on Lane 3. No. 1 competitor now starts on lane 4 on trap No. 2 and shoots 7 targets, finishing on Lane no. 5 Illustration No. 2: 30 Targets, 5 traps, 6 targets per trap, one visit. Clubs must preserve equality by lane changing between traps.
 (b) In events of more than twenty five (25) targets, manage-
 - (b) In events of more than twenty five (25) targets, managements of the Clubs with multi-trap facilities may start squad No. 1 on trap No. 1, squad No. 2 on Trap No. 2, squad No. 3 on Trap No. 3 etc., and shoot up to half the number of targets in the event per trap. For the second squad No. 1 will advance up to half the number of traps available.

Examples:

 For a three (3) trap layout, squad Nos. 1, 4, 7, etc., will shoot their first round from trap No. 1 and will advance to trap no. 2 for their second round, — squads 2, 5, and 8, will advance from Trap 2 to Trap 3.

- For a four (4) trap layout, squad Nos. 1, 5, 9 etc., will shoot their first round from Trap No. 1 and will advance to trap No. 3 for their second round, — squads 2, 6 and 10 will advance from Trap 2 to Trap 4.
- (c) Events of 25 targets but not greater may be shot in a visit to a trap.
- 42. (a) All competitors in a squad shall automatically change lanes, once having fired his shot, a competior may move back along his own shooting lane but he may not move off his shooting lane until the next competitor has fired his shot, excepting the shooter on number five (5) lane who having removed the cartridges from his gun before turning round may proceed to number one lane and not reload until on that lane. No competitor shall close his gun to fire until all persons on the shooting tracks have withdrawn to a handicap mark at least equal to his own.
 - (b) All members in a squad must remain at the shooting tracks until the last competitor has shot.

SHOOTING UP.

43. No shooter may be allowed to enter an event after the commencement of the second round of that event.

REFEREE.

44. (a) To become a registered referee, a candidate shall approach his Club Secretary and President, who (when they consider that the candidate has achieved a satisfactory standard) shall recommend in writing to the nearest Registered Referee Examiner on the prescribed form that the candidate be given a practical and oral examination. When the candidate has passed this examination to the Examiner's entire satisfaction the Examiner will then submit his recommendation plus the form to the ACTA Executive Director, who will issue a Referee badge to the candidate.

Any candidate who has failed and wishes to be re-examined must be re-examined by the same Examiner.

- (b) The Rules Supervisors will keep a record of all Referees in their State.
- (c) The Club Management complaint of any Referee or Referee Examiner shall be referred to the nearest Rules Supervisor within the State for investigation. The Rules Supervisor has the power to suspend the person concerned until the State Association Meeting. If justified the State Association has the power to further suspend and recall the Referee or Referee Examiner's badge and shall advise the ACTA Executive Director of the action taken.
- 44. (d) Referees shall be appointed for a period of five (5) years and are eligible for re-examination. Any Referee or Referee Examiner who fails to register in any year will have his name automatically removed from the Association Referee and Referee Examiner list.
 - (e) The Referees decision in all cases coming under his jurisdiction as set forth in the rules, shall be final. Referees must wear their official badge at all shoots.

DUTIES OF REFEREES..

- (f) The Referee, besides attending to special duties set forth in these rules, shall adjudicate the competition, he shall distinctly and loudly announce the result of each shot by calling out "one" when the target is broken, and "Lost" when the target in unbroken, except Points Scoring. He shall decide all other issues which arise in relation to the direct competition.
- (g) A check Referee shall be employed for Deauville Doubles and Double Rise competition with the chief Referee to give the decision.
- (h) If the Referee is negligent, or inefficient, impairing thereby the equity of the competition, the Management may forthwith remove him. This rule applies also to scorers, pullers, trappers and any other of the staff.
- (i) The Referee is empowered to challenge the ammunition used by any competitor.
- (j) The Referee has power to alter his decision. If altering his decision on "Lost target" or "Baulk," etc., during the competition, this must be done before the shooter in question shoots his next target or the shooter leaves the tracks should this be his last target.
- (k) The officiating Referee or the Management MUST adjust the trap immediately if it is not throwing regulation targets. Immediately following such alteration a target must be thrown and the competition continued.
- (1) He must have complete knowledge of the Rules of the A.C.-T.A. and shall adjudicate the competition at all times as set by the management.

- (m) It is his responsibility to announce the conditions as set out in the Rules for each event before the competition commences, also to displace shooters to their correct firing lanes.
- (n) As shooting proceeds he must observe that shooters are commencing on their correct mark, not shooting out of turn, handling their guns with safety, and using the correct shells as laid down for each individual event.
- (o) He must at all times observe the trap is releasing regulation targets and may at any time challenge the heights or angles thrown.
- (p) The referee must distinctly and loudly announce the result of each shot and decide all other issues which arise in relation to the direct competition.
- (q) The referee must be efficient and alert at all times and it is most important that he should gain the confidence and respect of each and every competitor.

DUTIES OF SHOOT MARSHALL.

- 45. (a) He must observe all the duties of the official referee.
 - (b) He must be present al all shoot-offs.
 - (c) He must see that all traps are checked for correct height and angles prior to shoot-off.
 - (d) The shoot marshall shall be in charge of all operations and personnel including referees relating to the shoot and may be responsible only to the management.
 - (e) He must instruct and roster the duties of all personnel prior to the commencement of each day's shooting.

DUTIES OF REFEREE EXAMINER.

- 46. (a) To examine applicants for Referee in trap and or skeet, who have been recommended as required in the A.C.T.A. shooting rules.
 - (b) To assess the applicants temperament, fairness, his ability to control a situation and his personal behaviour on the shooting tracks as a shooter before considering an examination.
 - (c) To observe the actions of existing Referees on the shooting ground and to discuss any problems or make any recommendations considered appropriate.
 - (d) To make themselves available when convenient to attend Rules discussions when required by clubs.

DUTIES OF RULES SUPERVISOR.

- 47. (a) To examine applicants, theoretically and practically, for the position of A.C.T.A. Trap and Skeet Referee Examiner and to advise the A.C.T.A. Secretary when the applicant is successful.
 - (b) To demand a degree of ability, before authorising new Referee Examiners, that will ensure a high standard of Refereeing.
 - (c) To observe the actions of existing Referee Examiners and Referees and to discuss any problems concerning their duties.
 - (d) To investigate the written complaint of any club management or Referee Examiner concerning the ability of existing Referees and to report to the appropriate State Association when action is considered necessary, with full facts so that the State Association concerned may recommend the action to be taken as detailed in trap rule (44C) and skeet rule (50C).
 - (e) To investigate the written complaint of any club management concerning the ability of any Referee Examiner and to report the facts to the appropriate State Association concerned necessary, so that the State Association concerned may recommend the action to be taken.
 - (f) To arrange or require the re-examination of any Referee Examiner or Referee. (When investigating complaints concerning Referee Examiners and Referees every effort should be made to correct the complaint by re-examination or retraining in preference to suspension).
 - (g) To control the number of Referee Examiners so that:
 - Referee applicants cannot shop around for an easy examiner.
 - (ii) The principle of common interpretation is maintained

 (The more examiners the more chance of interpretation becoming loose).
 - (h) Rules Supervisors should not generally carry out Referee examinations but may do so if requested or if there is no Referee Examiner in the area.
 - To make themselves available when convenient to attend Rules discussions when requested by clubs.

SCORER AND PULLER.

48. The scorer shall keep an accurate record of each shot, according to the referee's call. He shall mark the figure "1" for the call of "one" or the figure "O" for the call of "lost" for either single barrel or double barrel shooting. Double barrel denotes that two shots are allowed per target, each shot of equal scoring value. Double barrel "Points" denotes three points for a "score" on the first barrel, two points for a "score" on the second barrel and no points for "lost". These points score will be called by the referee and scored by the scorer accordingly.

- 49. All malfunctions, faulty cartridges or misfires must be recorded on the score sheet as "M" for malfunction.
- 50. The official score must be kept on a score sheet and be available for inspection by the competitor.
- 51. It shall be the responsibility of the competitor to check his score with the scores sheets before leaving the shooting tracks. Any protest on his score must be lodged with the referee immediately, i.e. before leaving the shooting tracks. Such protest can only be made against incorrect score.
- 52. The puller or referee shall release the target instantly in response to the competitor's acceptable call. (See also rule 36).
- The Referee/Puller shall have an uninterrupted view of the competitors at the firing points.

BROKEN TARGETS.

- 54. A "broken target" is one which has a visible piece or pieces broken from it, whilst in the air, by the shot from the competitor's gun.
- 55. A "dusted target" is one from which more or less dust is detached by the competitor's shot, but which shows no visible diminution in size therefrom. A dusted target is not a broken target and is a "Lost target".
- NO TARGETS.
- 56. After "No target" has been called by the Referee under any of the following conditions it thereafter plays no part in the competition and is irrelevant to it.
- 57. No target shall be called when:
 - (a) A target is released without the competitors call.
 - (b) a time interval occurs before or after the competitors call.
 - (c) a broken target is released.
 - (d) in single target shooting, two targets are released at the same time.
 - (e) a target does not conform to the definition of a legal target as regards height, distance or angle thrown (see rules 6, 7 and 9).
 - (f) when a competitor shoots out of turn or from the wrong lane.
 - (g) two competitors, or a competitor and a non competitor shoot at the same time, at the same target.
 - (h) a misfire or malfunction occurs in either barrel caused by the competitor's gun or misfire of a cartridge due to no neglect on the competitor's place. In the event of a misfire of the second barrel, the competitor must fire a live cartridge in the general direction of the target, and is permitted to score with the second barrel only. If the competitor accidently breaks this target with the first barrel, "No target" shall be called and another thrown, if he again breaks this with the
 - first barrel, "Lost target" will be scored. If in the opinion of the Referee the first shot was fired before the target was visible, "Lost target" shall be scored.
 - (i) a simultaneous or near simultaneous discharge occurs, i.e., from any cause both barrels are discharged together or nearly together. Simultaneous discharges shall be recorded as a malfunction.
 - (j) a round fired is faulty in the opinion of the Referee. Should the faulty cartridge occur in the first barrel in any type of event, and the competitor fires the second barrel where this is possible, the competitor shall, abide by the result of the second barrel (see rule 60).
 - (k) a cartridge with no primer is classed as a malfunction.
- BAULK.
- 58. (a) Any extraneous occurrence which, in the opinion of the referee, materially interferes with the equity of the competitor after he calls for his target constitutes a baulk.
 - (b) Under no circumstances will a baulk be granted unless claimed by the competitor immediately it occurs, or if, in the opinion of the referee, a baulk has occurred, he may restore the competitor's target.
- LOST TARGET.
- 59. Lost target shall be called when:
 - (a) a competitor fails to break the target.
 - (b) the competitor fails to shoot because his gun is unloaded, or uncocked or because the safety was faultily adjusted or jarred back whether from his oversight or not, or because of any other cause chargable to his oversight or neglect. Should

this happen in a double rise event, the first target only should be declared lost and a proof pair shall be thrown to determine the result of the second shot only.

- (c) the competitor has an apparent misfire or malfunction and attempts to open the gun before the referee examines it. A competitor having an apparent misfire or malfunction will forthwith call the Referee for his decision. The competitor must not turn around and must keep his gun pointed in the direction of the traphouse until the Referee has given his decision. (see rule 60) If a competitor's gun breaks down and it is necessary to seek a replacement the competitor is allowed three (3) minutes to do so. If this is not possible the competitor may leave the squad and finish the remaining targets of the round at a time decided by the Referee or when a vacancy occurs.
- (d) in single barrel shooting the competitor loads two cartridges into the gun. A competitor is allowed to load one cartridge only and is not permitted to load an empty shell or dummy cartridge.
- (e) a competitor shoots from his wrong handicap mark, or the competitor's stance violates rule No. 4.
- (f) on the fourth and subsequent malfunction in any one event.
- (g) a target is dusted (see rule 55).
- (h) in the opinion of the Referee, a target was legal when fired upon, but was blown out of bounds or fell short of distance due to adverse weather conditions.

ABIDE BY RESULT.

60. Should there be a faulty cartridge, misfire or malfunction in the first barrel, in any type of event, and the competitor fires the second barrel where this is possible, the competitor shall abide by the result and shall have no claim to a repeat target for the first barrel.

Where this happens in a points scoring event and the target is broken with the second barrel the decision shall be as follows:

- (a) If there was no detonation of either primer or powder with the first barrel the score shall be "3";
- (b) If there was a detonation of either primer or powder with the first barrel the score shal be "2".

In both cases if the target had been missed with the second barrel the score would be lost.

SASHES.

- 61. Sash colours for clubs to be any colour other than those designated for National, Commonwealth (both Royal Blue), State (Red) and District (White Championships, respectively.
- TYPES OF SHOOTING.
- 62. (a) DOUBLE BARREL. Double barrel shall be shot with two barrels permitted and a score on either barrel to be of equal value.
 - (b) SINGLE BARREL. Single barrel shall be shot with only one barrel permitted and the competitor is permitted to load one cartridge only in the gun. See rule 59 (d).
 - (c) POINTS SCORING. Points scoring shall be shot as double barrel where a score on the first barrel is scored three points, a score on the second barrel is scored two points, and no points for a loss with both barrels.

DOUBLE TARGETS.

- 63. (a) Double targets. Double rise shall be shot squad system and may be off handicap or championship marks and called by the referee, 1-1 or lost -1 or lost-lost, whichever the case may be, each target to count one point. In the event of a tie to be shot off squad system 5 pairs, total 10 points until finality.
 - (b) A competitor must shoot at a complete pair of targets on every occasion, each target broken by the competitor's shot shall score one point, two barrels must not be fired at one target.
 - (c) In the event or a mistire or maltunction on the first barrel the Referee shall declare "no targets both" and another pair thrown. In the event of a misfire or malfunction on the second barrel the Referee shall declare "no target on the second barrel"; the result of the first shot shall be scored "1" or "O" as the case may be and another pair thrown; the competitor then shoots at both targets, in the same order as the previous pair in which the misfire or malfunction occurred, and another pair thrown; the competitor then shoots at both targets, in the same order as the previous pair in which the misfire or malfunction occurred, and the result of the second shot will now be added to the score.

- (d) "No targets both" shall be declared when only one target is thrown.
- (e)"No targets both" shall be declared when both targets are not released simultaneously.
- (f) "No targets both" shall be declared when either or both targets do not conform to the definition of Legal Targets (see rules 6 & 7).
- (g) "No targets both" shall be declared when a target is released without the competitor's call, or a material interval of time before or after the competitor's call.
- (h) "No targets both" shall be called when a broken target is released.
- (i) "No targets both" shall be called when a simultaneous or near simultaneous discharge occurs; i.e., when for any cause both barrels are discharged together or nearly together. (Refer rule 57 (i)).

DEAUVILLE DOUBLES.

- 64. (a) Deauville doubles shall be shot with four competitors on the tracks at one time, the first pair using lanes 1 and 5 and the second pair using lanes 2 and 4. After shooting first round of 5 pairs, competitors then change lanes, first pair taking lanes 2 and 4 and second pair taking lanes 1 and 5. Tie shoots shall be conducted first miss-out from lanes 2 and 4, one team at a time. The competitors may arrange between themselves which lane they will take, and who will call for the release of the clay targets, which will be released on the competitors ac-ceptable call. In the event of a false call by either competitor they must abide by the result. Only pairs will count, and as 1 point. Either competitor can help his partner.
 - (b) Any faulty cartridge, misfire or malfunction in Deauville Doubles does not entitle the competitors to another pair of targets and they must abide by the result.

WALK UP.

65. Walk-up events shall be shot double-barrel from No.3 lane, squad system. The competitor shall load his gun at the 22 metres mark; when ready in this position he commences to walk at a normal walking pace, holding his gun in such a position that the butt of the gun must be level with his hip and cannot be mounted to the shoulder until the target is released. The Referee/puller shall release the target between the 20 metres and 15 metre marks inclusive, the mark being unknown to the competitor, having previously been determined by an indicator or dice. No. 1 com-petitor shoots at one target, he then returns to the rear of the squad, each competitor doing the same in turn.

WALK UP POSITION OF SAFETY.

- 66. (a) A loaded gun shall be deemed to be in a position of safety when it is the competitors turn to shoot and he faces and points the gun in the general direction of the trap house, having the gun in the gun-down position.
 - (b) Having fired at the target, or in the event of a no target, the competitor shall open his gun and remove all live shells and fired cases before attempting to turn around and return to the rear of the squad or to recommence his walk.

MIXED TARGETS.

67. A mixed target event shall be a combination of a series of double barrel, single barrel, walk up and double rise targets. Shot squad system under rules applicable to the appropriate section with target numbers and shooting marks in accordance with the appropriate championship.

TOWER EVENTS.

- 68. (a) Tower events may be shot double barrel, single barrel, points scoring and double rise 5 to 10 targets per competitor per visit to the tracks, squad system, competitors in a straight line left to right, with centre No. 3 competitor standing in front of the centre of the tower. Whilst at the firing point the competitor must not turn towards the tower, but must face directly to the front throughout the competition.
 - (b) Shooters stand 3 metres apart at the rear of the concrete track, as for down-the-line trap shooting. The track is 1.5 metres from the front to rear and each shooter must stand at the rear of this track until it is his turn to shoot. He then steps forward up to, but not over, the leading edge of the track which then puts him 1.5 metres in front of a vertical line from the centre pivot point of the trap. After shooting, he empties and breaks, or opens, his gun and returns to the rear of the track.
 - (c) When Number 5 shooter has shot, he walks to the rear of the Tower, around the number one station.
 - (d) The trap shall be 10 metres above the ground, plus or minus 1 metre, either way, mounted on a tower. Targets shall be -

thrown at standard angles, i.e., 45 deg. either side of the centre line. Tower targets shall be thrown within a minimum of 75 metres and a maximum of 85 metres, measured laterally from the base point of a vertical line from the centre pivot of the trap. The targets shall leave the trap as near to horizontal as practical.

CONTINENTAL EVENTS.

69. (a) Continental events shall be shot double barrel, single barrel and points scoring with the trap set as follows;

- low targets shall be thrown 1.5 metres above the level of (i) the centre lane at a point 10 metres from the trap, with a tolerance of 15 centimetres above or below.
- high targets shall be thrown 5 metres above the level of (ii) the centre lane at a point 10 metres from the trap, with a tolerance of 15 centimetres above or below.
- distance the low target shall be thrown a minimum 45 (iii) metres and a maximum of 55 metres.
- (iv) angles flight of targets shall be thrown at unknown angles a maximum of 45 deg. right and left of the centre lane. Applications to be made as in trap rule 27.

I.S.U. CHAMPIONSHIPS.

- 70. (a) Commonwealth, State, Zone and District championships may be conducted under International Shooting Union Rules. Applications to be made as in Trap rule 27.
 - (i) District I.S.U. Championships to be of 50 targets.
 - (ii) Zone I.S.U. Championships to be of 75 targets.
 - (iii) State I.S.U. Championships to be of 100 targets.
 - (iv) Commonwealth I.S.U. Championships to be of 200 targets.
 - (Note, I.S.U. regulations provide that no member counry can conduct a National (I.E., Commonwealth) Championship without prior ratification by I.S.U.).
 - (b)
 - All I.S.U. events shall be run as graded events and equal (i) trophies shall be provided for each grade.
 - Shooters shall be graded into four classes by their (ii) percentage performance at all targets fired upon in competition, and shoot-offs, from 15 metres at either I.S.U. Trench or U.I.T. Trap.
 - (iii) The grades shall be:
- $\begin{array}{l} AA 95 100\% \\ A 85 94\% \\ B 75 84\% \\ C all under 75\%; \end{array}$

 - (iv) It shall be the responsibility of a designated club official to progressively mark the shooter's card with his results and after each 100 targets and at November 30 annually when re-registering the card must be sub-mitted to the club secretary for correct classification and reporting to A.C.T.A. central records.
 - (v) In the event of 100 targets not being shot at by November 30 then the average shall be taken of the targets shot at up to that time.
 - (vi) Shooters may compete in one grade only.
 - (vii) Until such time as a shooter records his initial 100 I.S.U. or U.I.T. targets he shall be placed in the same class as his grading under A.C.TA. Rules.
 - (viii) Cards for recording results in I.S.U. and U.I.T. events shall be issued by the clubs conducting such events.
 - (c) I.S.U. Entrance fees -

Commony	vealth \$40
State	\$20
Zone	\$20
District	\$10

SWEEPSTAKES DEDUCTION AND CASH DISTRIBUTION.

- 71. (a) Possible deduction from sweepstakes by clubs, in contests, shall not be more than 50 per cent (inclusive of targets).
 - (b) No deduction is permitted by clubs in optional sweepstakes. (c) In all cash distribution handicaps or sweepstakes, the dis-
 - tribution shall be on the basis of 60% (1st), 30% (2nd) and 10% (3rd). A competitor scoring the only possible in the event wins only $60^{\circ}c$ first place. In these events division shall be compulsory unless the majority concerned agree otherwise. All optional sweepstakes shall be compulsory division as in the above formula.
 - (d) In all events for prizes or trophies advertised as other than cash distribution, the places shall be decided by shoot-off unless the shoot-off contestants unanimously agree to divide.

(e) In championships all optional sweepstakes shall be compulsory division. In the event of ties, to be shot off squad system first miss out. The management shall clearly indicate on the official scoresheet and score board those who have entered for the optional sweep.

TIES.

72. (a) Commonwealth, State, Zone and District championships shall be shot off squad system, first miss out. All competitors to commence on the same trap, competitors shall be squaded in the order they qualified. Competitors shall close up when commencing at each trap or at the recommencement of shooting after a break for ammunition where the shoot-off is being solely conducted on one trap. Shoot-off competitors shall carry enough shells for a complete run over each trap or for at least 25 targets where the shoot-off is being conducted over one trap.

Competitors shall be re-squadded at the commencement of each run over a line of traps or immediately there is only one survivor of a run over a particular trap (i.e., no competitor shall be required to commence a run over a trap on his own unless he is the last competitor in the shoot-off).

- (b) Double Rise. First miss-out, best of each pair until finality, from the squad sytem as in Rule no. 63 (a).
- (c) Deauville Doubles. First miss-out shot from lanes 2 and 4 as per Rule no. 64 (a).
- (d) Walk-up. To be shot squad system as per Rule 65, best of five targets until finality.
- (e) Mixed Targets. To be shot from No. 3 lane, 2 double barrel, 2 single barrel, 2 walk-up, 2 pair double-rise. Total 10 points until finality.
- (f) In double barrel, single barrel and points scoring shoot-off in Tower to be shot squad system, first miss out.
- (g) In all shoot-offs, competitors shall shoot in the order in which they qualified.

HIGH GUN.

73. The High Gun for a shoot shall be over the advertised program or such events as the club, at it's discretion, has advertised. In the event of a tie for High Gun, where such program included varied types of events, the shoot off shall consist of rounds of two of each type of targets (D.B., S.B., D.B. Points, DR. two pairs off the prescribed marks where applicable) on the High Gun program, all to be shot from the centre lane with the highest scorer, over the full round, to be the winner.

Points score events must count as points to determine High Gun. COMMON MARK SHOOTING AND CLASSIFICATION.

- 74. (a) All Championships and events shot from a common handicap mark other than eye-openers, Walk-up, Deauville Doubles and Tower events, and minor novelty events shall be run as graded events.
 HOWEVER, CLUBS SHALL HAVE THE OPTION OF RUNNING ALL CHAMPIONSHIPS EITHER AS GRADED EVENTS OR AS ONE CLASS EVENTS with trophies for first, second, third, with handicap group trophies. All appropriate 15 metre scores shall be recorded for percentage performance classification irrespective of how the event is r un. See Rule (74 (c)).
 - (b) A graded event is a competition common mark shooting event in which all the competitors shoot from the same mark and prizes are allocated for various classes of competitor.
 - (c) Shooters shall be graded into three classes by their percentage performance at all standard targets fired upon in common mark 15 metre competition, including shoot-off targets, in double barrel, and points scoring events with broken targets to count. Results in handicap events or off common marks other than 15 metres and the results of all mini target events shall not be included.
 - (d) Grades shall be:

"A" Class 95.1%	$100^{\circ}i$
"B" Class 92.1%	9502
"C" Class 9277 and	l under.

- (e) The grade earned by a shooter on his 15 metre results shall be his classification for all common mark events.
- (f) If he has not shot at 200 targets during the whole of the year, he shall be graded on the percentage based on the targets shot at up to the time of re-registering. When re-registering the shooter shall be placed in the ap-
 - When re-registering the shooter shall be placed in the appropriate grading indicated by his percentage at the completion of his last 200 targets.

(g) No shooter, other than those awaiting the issue of a card after registering for the first time, shall be allowed to enter in any competition unless he submits his card to the designated club official on each shooting day. However, if a shooter has lost his card he shall be allowed to compete providing his claim to being registered with the ACTA can be verified by another registered shooter.

He shall be allowed to compete in his grade in common mark events and shall be allowed to compete in handicap events from the mark he claims to be his correct handicap mark. Should he win prize money or trophies they shall be retained by the club until such time as the shooter finds his card or obtains a new one and presents it to the club for marking.

The fact that he competed without presenting his card shall be reported by the club on the prescribed form to the state Association together with advice on the mark from which the shooter competed in any handicap events. Should it be found that an unreasonable number of reports of no card are received concerning a particular shooter, or if the shooter has claimed the wrong handicap mark, the State Association shall advise the nearest Executive Committeeman so that the matter may be investigated.

- (h) A shooter must not shoot in a grade higher than his best performance. Once having attained a grade he may elect to remain in a higher grade at the time of re-registering or reclassification.
- (i) A new shooter, upon first registering with the Association shall be graded in "C" grade.
- (j) Any shooter re-registering after a period of non registration shall be placed in the same grade as when he was last registered.
- (k) Managements conducting graded common mark events shall provide a minimum of one equal value prize or trophy for each grade. In Championship events a sash or badge shall be awarded to the overall winner together with the trophy for his particular grade and the highest scores in the other two grades shall be awarded the class trophies for their particular grades.

Managements may award additional sashes, badges and/or trophies at their discretion provided the recognition given to the overall winner remains distinctive.

(1) Unless the management clearly advertises otherwise the optional sweepstakes on graded common mark events shall not be broken up into three classes but shall be compulsorily divided over the whole field.

CHAMPIONSHIP CONDITIONS — INTERNATIONAL TRAP TEAMS MATCH.

75. Team 30 members, 25 highest scores to count. 100 targets per member from 15 metres. Double barrel points scoring 3 and 2; 5 lanes squad system, 25 targets per trap over 4 traps, 5 targets from each lane per member before changing lanes. In the event of a tie for High Gun, to be shot off squad system first miss-out, points scoring. International load shells, 32 grams shot, No. 6 size or lighter, electric oscillating traps.

QUALIFICATIONS.

- 76. Each team member shall be an Australian citizen of at least 12 months' standing. In the event of a member being unable to take his place in the team, his place will be filled by another shooter, agreed upon by the Executive Committee.
- 77. The 30 highest scores over the National Double Barrel of 50 targets; National Single Barrel of 50 targets; and the Australian and New Zealand Championship of 50 targets, points scoring 3 and 2, shall become Australia's International Team. In the event of a tie, to be shot-off in the order of qualification, squad system, at full rounds of 3 targets double barrel, 5 targets single barrel, 5 targets points scoring 3 and 2, for a possible score of 25, from 15 metres.
- 78. Highest scorer in the Australian team will hold the special International High Gun Cup, (presented by the late J.M. Bauman, Esq., of Brisbane) for 12 months, (or until the next International match) and will be awarded a special trophy and the International High Gun Sash.

Second and third High Guns will also receive trophies.

- Every member of the Australian Team will receive the special "International Badge".
- 80. Only A.C.T.A. official Referees to officiate, scorer and check scorer to be provided, score sheets to be signed by scorers and Referees. The team members to be squadded in the order in which they qualify.

AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL DOUBLE BARREL

CHAMPIONSHIP.

81. This Championship shall be shot, as a graded event, at 50 targets from 15 metres, 25 targets per visit, two visits to the traps, each competitor to shoot from the five lanes, squad system. In the event of ties, to be shot off squad system, first miss out (refer rule 62 (a).)

AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL SINGLE BARREL CHAMPIONSHIP.

- 82. This Championship shall be shot, as a graded event, at 50 targets from 15 metres, 25 targets per visit, two visits to the traps, each competitor to shoot from the five lanes, squad system. In the event of ties, to be shot off squad system, first miss out (refer rule 62 (b).
- AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL DOUBLE RISE CHAMPIONSHIP.
- The Championship shall be shot as a graded event, at 25 pairs double rise from 15 metres. (refer rules 63 (a) & 72 (b)).
- AUSTRALIAN NEW ZEALAND CHAMPIONSHIP.
- 84. The Championship shall be shot as a graded event, at 50 targets double barrel points from 15 metres, 25 targets per visit, two visits to the traps. Each competitor to shoot from the five lanes, squad system. In the event of ties, to be shot off squad system, first miss out. (Refer rule 62 (c).)
- AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL CHAMPION OF CHAMPIONS.
- 85. West Australian Clay Target Association to recommend for 1980 Nationals.
- ENTRANCE FEES.
- 86. Entrance fees and trophies for all National Championships to be determined each year by the full Executive Committee.
- 87. NATIONAL TRAP, HIGH GUN TROPHY -- shall be determined from the highest overall scorers in each grade in the six major trap events comprising Grand Australian Handicap, National Double Barrel, Single Barrel, A.N.Z. Double Rise and Champion of Champions. "The actual overall scores to be counted, with the results of the points-scoring event to be counted as a figure within the overall result." In the event of ties, to be shot-off in the sequence of the program, five of each type of trap target on the high gun program.
- 88. J. NEWTON THOMAS OVERALL HIGH GUN TROPHY shall be determined from the highest overall scorers in the six major events of Grand Australian Handicap, National Double Barrel. Single Barrel, A.N.Z. Champion of Champions, Double Rise plus the National Skeet. "The actual overall scores to be counted with the results of the points scoring events to be counted as a figure within the overall result".

In the event of ties, to be shot-off in the sequence of the program, five of each type of trap target on the high gun program, plus a half round of thirteen skeet targets.

a half round of thirteen skeet targets. AUSTRALIA-NEW ZEALAND TRAP TEAMS' MATCH.

- 89. (a) Teams to consist of six shooters. Both teams shoot at 20 targets per shooter, double barrel from 15 metres. Each competitor to shoot from five lanes, squad system. In the event of ties, to be shot off ten targets per shooter until one team survives. Cartridges shall be the prescribed maximum 32 gram shot load as for all Championship series.
 - (b) Team Selection. when conducted in Australia; the six top Australian scorers in the Australia-New Zealand Championship comprise the Australian team. When conducted in New Zealand; the Australian team to be the six highest scorers in the New Zealand Single rise (D.B.) Championship.
- 90. Venue The match to be hosted, alternately by arrangement, in Australia during the odd numbered years and in New Zealand during the even numbered years, but when the Australian National Championships are in Western Australia then this event shall be conducted in New Zealand. Each five years in New Zealand the venue will rotate between selected North and South Island venues.
- 91. Empty shells empty shells on the ground at the National Championships are the property of the ACTA.

COMMONWEALTH CHAMPIONSHIPS.

- 92. (a) The Double Barrel Championship shall be shot at 75 targets from 25 metres (see Rule 41 (c) and 62 (a)).
 - (b) The Single Barrel Championship shall be shot at 75 targets from 15 metres (see Rule 62 (b).)
 - (c) The Double Barrel Points Score Championship shall be shot at 75 targets from 15 metres. (see rule 62 (c).)
 - (d) The Mixed Target Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 10 targets double, 10 targets single barrel, 10 pairs double rise and 5 walk-up. Total 45 points. (see rules 67 & 72 (e).)

- (e) The Walk-up Championship shall be shot at 25 targets (see Rules 65 & 72 (d).)
- (f) The Double Rise Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 25 pairs of targets from 15 metres. (See Rules 63 (a) & 72 (b).)
- (g) The Deauville Doubles Championship shall be shot at 20 pairs of targets from 24 metres. (See Rules 64 (a) & 72 (c).) Conditions: The Management shall provide four trophies – two for 1st and two for 2nd.
- (h) The Tower Championship shall be shot at 40 targets as per rules 68 (a) & 72 (f). Double rise to be shot at 20 pairs of targets.

STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS.

- 93. (a) The Double Barrel Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 50 targets from 15 metres. (see rules 41 (c) & 62 (a).)
 (b) The Single Barrel Championship shall be that as a graded
 - (b) The Single Barrel Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 50 targets from 15 metres (see rule 62 (b).)
 - (c) The Double Barrel Points Score Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 50 targets from 15 metres. (see rule 62 (c).)
 - (d) The Mixed Target Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 10 targets double barrel, 10 targets single barrel, 5 walk-up and 5 pairs double rise. Total 35 points. (See rules 67 and 72 (e).)
 - (e) The Walk-up Championship shall be shot at 20 targets (see rules 65 and 72 (d).)
 - (f) The Double Rise Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 20 pairs of targets from 15 metres. (see rules 63 (a) and 72 (b).
 - (g) The Deauville Doubles Championship shall be shot at 20 pairs of targets from 22 metres. (See rules 64 (a) and 72 (c).) Conditions: the Management shall provide four trophies two for 1st and two for 2nd.
 - (h) The Tower Championship shall be shot at 30 targets as per rules 68 (a) and 72 (e). Double Rise to be shot at 15 pairs of targets.

ZONE CHAMPIONSHIPS.

- 94. (a) The Double Barrel Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 30 targets from 15 metres. (See rules 41 (c) and 62 (a).)
 - (b) The Single Barrel Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 30 targets from 15 metres (See rule 62 (b).)
 - (c) The Double Barrel Points Score shall be shot as a graded event at 30 targets from 15 metres. (See rule 62 (c).)
 - (d) The Mixed Target Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 10 double barrel, 10 single barrel, 5 walk-up and 5 pairs double rise targets, total 35 points (See rules 67 and 72 (e).)
 - (e) The Walk-up Championship shall be shot at 20 targets (See rules 65 and 72 (d).)
 - (f) The Double Rise Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 15 pairs of targets from 15 metres. (See rules 63 (a) and 72 (b).)
 - (g) The Deauville Doubles Championship shall be shot at 20 pairs of targets from 22 metres. (See rules 64 (a) and 72 (c). Conditions as per 93 (g).)
 - (h) The Tower Championship shall be shot at 30 targets as per rules 68 (a) and 72 (f).

DISTRICT CHAMPIONSHIPS.

- 95. (a) The Double Barrel Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 25 targets from 15 metres (See rule 62 (a).)
 - (b) The Single Barrel Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 25 targets from 15 metres (See rule 62 (b).)
 - (c) The Double Barrel Points Score Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 25 targets from 15 metres. (See rule 62 (c).)
 - (d) The Mixed Target Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 5 double barrel, 5 single barrel, 5 walk-up and 5 pairs double rise total 25 points. (See rules 67 and 72 (e).)
 - (e) The Walk-up Championship shall be shot at 20 targets (See rules 65 and 72 (d).)
 - (f) The Double Rise Championship shall be shot as a graded event at 10 pairs of targets from 15 metres (See rules 63 (a) and 72 (b).)
 - (g) The Deauville Doubles Championship shall be shot at 20 pairs of targets from 20 metres (See rules 64 (a) and 72 (c).)
 - (h) The Tower Championship shall be shot at 20 targets as per rules 68 and 72 (f).

CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHY VALUES AND MAXIMUM ENTRANCE FEES.

- 96. (a) Championship trophy values (inclusive of badge and sash) for Commonwealth Championships is fixed by the Association at minimum \$60 retail value. Similarly. with State and Zone Championships, the amount fixed for trophies (inclusive of badge and sash) is fixed at minimum \$50 retail value. In District and Club Championships, the minimum retail value is left optional and at the discretion of the Club conducting the event.
 - (b) The maximum entrance fees for Championships shall be:
 - (i) C'wealth D.B., S.B., P.S., MT., D.R., Tower Commonwealth Walk-up and D.D.
 (ii) State D.B., S.B., P.S., M.T., DR., and Tower State Walk-up and D.D.
 (iii) Zone D.B., S.B., P.S., M.T., D.R., and Tower
 - 8.00
 (iii) Zone D.B., S.B., P.S., M.T., D.R., and Tower
 - Zone Walk-up and D.D. 7.00 (iv) District D.B., S.B., P.S., M.T., D.R., D.D., Walk-up and Tower - 6.00
 - (c) In all Championships where applicable the management shall provide a sash or badge for the overall winner as per rule 74 (e)

rule 74 (e). INTERSTATE TEAMS' MATCH.

- 97. (a) Team 15 members, 10 highest scores to count. 50 targets per member from 15 metres, double barrel points scoring, 5 lane squad system to be shot in two stages of 25 targets per visit, 5 targets from each lane per member before changing lanes. In the event of a tie for High Gun to be shot-off squad system, points scoring first miss out. International load shells 32 grams shot No. 6 size or lighter only. Manual — Automatic or electric oscillating traps to be used.
 - (b) Ladies to comprise of 6 shooters to shoot at 25 targets, double barrel points scoring from 15 metres, changing after each shot, and 3 scores to count.
 - (c) Results of the competition which must be completed by December 31 must not be publicised until all teams have contested. These results, including the scoresheets signed by both the Referee and principal scorer, must be sealed and lodged with the ACTA Executive Director by December 31. Weather conditions during the match are required. A check scorer should be used at each set of tracks. Final details of the Interstate teams' Matches to be published in the first available ACTA Shooting News.
 - (d) Should a tie occur between competing teams then the score sheets shall be checked, points scoring, with a count-back for the 15 members of each team and the 6 ladies, to break the tie.
 - (e) The qualifying event shall be conducted over either 50 or 100 targets. Teams are to consist of 6 shooters with the top 4 scores to count the course of the teams event is to be 50 targets.

QUALIFICATIONS.

- 98. (a) Each team member shall have registered in the State for which he represents.
 - (b) State Associations shall choose their team on the results of an elimination shoot or series.
 - (c) In the event of a tie for placings, the shoot-off shall be conducted over rounds of 2 targets of each event in the elimination from the centre lane.
 - (d) An appropriate High Gun shall be provided, and a souvenir badge shall be given to each member of the State Team (15, Tadies 6,) by the Club conducting the event. Badges are available on application from the ACTA. The program and venue of the Interstate Teams' Match shall be advertised by the Club conducting the event in the ACTA "Shooting News" at least two months prior to the State Teams Elimination shoot, and the State Teams Match, The winning open team shall hold the Great Britain and Ireland Trophy for a period of 12 months.
 - (e) Only official ACTA Referees to officiate, scorer and check scorer to be provided. Score sheets to be signed by Scorers and Referees.
 - (f) No other major shoot is permitted in the particular State on the day or days when elimination and State Teams' shoot is held. The team members shall be squadded in the order they qualify.

MINITARGET EVENTS.

 All rules and conditions are applicable to both Standard and Mini target events.

NIGHT SHOOTING CONDITIONS.

- 100. All rules and conditions are applicable to night shooting with maximum entrance fees \$1 extra.
- CARTRIDGES.
- 101. Shells used in all Open Championships (Commonwealth, State, Zone and District) are required to be restricted to 32 grams shot struck measure, or its equivalent, No. 6 size shot or lighter. Shells marked by reputable manufacturer as complying with this regulation are approved. Reloaded cartridges are permitted.
- 102. Home-loaded or reloaded cartridges may be used in all events excepting International Championships, National Championships.

ACTA TRAP HANDICAPPING FORMULAE.

103. (a) Handicapping to be percentage performance with percentages applicable to the various marks as follows:

83% or less	11 metres	88% 16 metres	93% 21 metres
84%	12 metres	89% 17 metres	94% 22 metres
85%	13 metres	90% 18 metres	95% 23 metres
86%	14 metres	91% 19 metres	96% 24 metres

- 87% 15 metres 92% 20 metres 97% or better 25 metres.
 - (b) Once having obtained a handicap by performance, of 15 metres or of 20 metres, no shooter shall come forward of those marks without the approval of a panel set up by the shooter's State Association, and the panel shall include at least one Rules Supervisor.
 - (b) Backward movement shall apply after each 100 targets shot from handicap marks, in handicap events, double barrel or points scoring with broken targets to count, with a maximum backward movement of one metre per 100 targets. Forward movement shall apply after each 100 targets, shot and scored as the fore-going with a maximum one metre forward in any six month period and then only if the scores on the 100 targets immediately prior to the end of the six months period still justify the forward movement.
 - (d) The 100 targets for calculation shall be taken after the event and not on the 100th target where a shoot-off is involved.

GENERAL.

- 104. Club Presidents and Secretaries are instructed that DURING ANY SHOOT, the management must immediately rehandicap each and every shooter, who, for any of the reasons prescribed on the ACTA Handicapping Formulae, qualifies for backward movement off his handicap. Such adjustments are to strictly comply with the Formulae. No shooter is to be permitted to compete in another event should he refuse to accept his new mark. Handicap details concerning on-the spot adjustments are to be forwarded within TWO DAYS, to the ACTA Official Handicapper for ratification.
- 105. If some clerical error appears on a shooter's handicap card, or if a shooter is re-handicapped after any event, it is the shooter's responsibility to have the mistake corrected and to shoot off the correct handicap mark.

Such errors and/or amendments may be corrected by the club Secretary or a member of the Executive Committee of the A.C.-T.A. or by the Association Handicapper.

- 106. Club managements, Rules Supervisors, or a member of the A.C.T.A. Executive Committee have the right to re-handicap or regrade any obviously under handicapped shooter immediately, providing the Association is notified within 7 days and the reason given on a handicap return form. If these details are not completed such handicap movement cannot be ratified.
- 107. Clubs when registering a shooter for the first time must clearly indicate whether the shooter is a complete novice gun handler, or has had field or other experience, before a 11 metre mark can be approved. Failure to provide this information will result in the shooter being placed on 15 metres.
- 108. Club managements are informed that a Handicap Return must accompany EVERY result sheet forwarded to the A.C.T.A.office within SEVEN DAYS for each shoot being held. (Handicap Return Pads are available on application to the A.C.T.A., G.P.O. Box 2038S, Melbourne, 3001.)

BREAK RECOGNITION.

109. (a) Break badges will be recognised in sequences of 50, 75, 100, 150, 200, 250 and so on, provided these are shot over automatic traps under double or single barrel conditions and in regular competition on one day only excepting over a program of two or more successive days.

- (b) non-oscilating traps are not acceptable within the rules.
- (c) break badges may also be similarly earned in Continental down-the-line events, or Tower events provided that the break is achieved from the events of the same nature.
- (d) no practice between events is permitted and breaks must be continuous.
- (e) shooting at not more than two sighter targets (not to count) prior to commencement of an event does not terminate a break in progress.
- (f) to shoot in other than a specific type of event, as named above, immediately concludes a break.
- (g) clubs must submit form number 17, duly completed, to the A.C.T.A. Secretary, with the prescribed fee for each requested badge, before recognition can be considered or granted. Break badges once they have been obtained, will not be repeated. Badges for "25 metres" will also be available to those attaining this as their registered handicap.
- (h) break badges may also be similarly earned from the "25 metre" mark.

PENALTIES.

 After investigation by the appropriate authorities the following penalties may apply;

- (a) A shooter repeatedly attending a shoot without his card may be penalised 2 metres on his handicap and/or placed in "A" grade after consideration by the State Association.
- (b) Any shooter giving a false grade or handicap shall forfeit any nomination fee or prizes won from the incorrect grade or mark and be liable to suspension after consideration by the State Association.
- (c) Any shooter commiting an ungentlemanly or unsafe act on the shooting grounds shall be liable to suspension or disqualification.
- (d) Any shooter deliberately firing at any fauna on any shooting ground shall be immediately suspended by the club management and shall remain suspended until the incident is dealt with by his State Association.

SKEET SHOOTING RULES.

FIELD LAYOUT

- 1. A skeet field shall consist of eight shooting stations arranged on a segment of a circle of 19.2 metres radius, with a base chord 36.8 metres long, drawn 5.49 metres from the centre of the circle. The centre of the circle is known as the target-crossing point and is marked by a stake.
- 2. Station 1 is located at the left end of the base chord, and station 7 at the right end when facing the centre while standing on the periphery of the segment. Stations 2 to 6 inclusive, are located on the periphery at points equi-distant from each other (the exact distance between stations 1 and 2, 2 and 3, etc. is 8.13 metres.) Station 8 is located at the centre of the base chord.
- 3. Shooting stations 1 to 7 inclusive, are a square area, 91 centimetres on a side, with two sides parallel to a radius of the circle drawn through the station marker. Shooting station 8 is a rectangular area 91 centimetres wide by 1.83 metres long, with the long sides parallel to the base chord. The location of each shooting station shall be accurately disignated by a suitable marker, not easily removable, not more than 76 centimetres high and so constructed as not to interfere with the free swing of a shooter standing on the shooting station. The marker for shooting stations 1 to 7 inclusive, is on the centre of the side nearest the target crossing point. The marker for shooting station 8 is on the centre point of the base chord.
- 4. A shield should be installed at the target opening of each traphouse so that the trap operator is not visible to the shooter when he is firing from any station. This precaution is desirable as a safety factor for the protection of the trap boy from possible injury from direct or ricocheting shot.
- 5. One target should emerge from a traphouse (called High House) at a point 91 centimetres beyond Station Marker 1 (measured along the base chord extended), and 3.05 metres above the ground level. The other should emerge from a traphouse (called Low House) at a point 91 centimetres beyond the Station Marker

7 (measured along the base chord extended), and 76 centimetres from the base chord extended (measured on side of target crossing point), and 1 metre above the ground.

- 6. Suitable markers shall be placed at points 40.23 metres and 50 metres from both the high and low house measured along the flight of a regular target. The first marker shall indicate the shooting boundary limit and the second marker shall indicate the minimum distance a target shall travel in still air. (INCLUDE DIAGRAM)
- 7. As a safety precaution, a safety fence (rope, wire, rail etc) should be erected running parallel with the base chord line and at least 3 metres behind No. 4 Station, extending from the High to the Low Traphouse. No spectator to be allowed in front of this fence.

TARGETS.

- 8. (a) Standard targets shall measure not more than 11 centimetres in diameter, nor more than 2.85 centimetres in height, nor more than 110 grams in weight.
 - (b) Mini targets shall measure not more than 7.6 centimetres in diameter, nor more than 2.7 centimetres in height, nor more than 56 grams in weight.
 - (c) All rules and conditions are applicable to both standard and mini target events.
- 9. A legal target is one that is released instantly in response to the competitors acceptable call, and passes "within 50 centimetres" horizontally or vertically of a point 4.51 metres above the target crossing point. The target in still air must carry to a distance equivalent on level ground to 50 metres and not exceed 60 metres.

REGULAR DOUBLE.

Two legal targets released simultaneously (one from each traphouse).

GUNS AND LOADS.

- (a) The term "Magazine Gun" applies alike to automatic guns, pump guns (so called) and other guns not directly dependent on hand loading and are permissible for skeet shooting.
 - (b) Release trigger guns shall only be used on registered ACTA ground, subject to the following conditions:
 - (i) ACTA shooters suffering from some condition which would make the use of a release trigger gun desirable shall obtain a statement, signed by the President and Secretary of the shooter's home club, that the shooter suffers from such condition and shall present the statement to a Referee Examiner who shall satisfy himself that the shooter understands the use of a release trigger device.

Having been so satisfied the Referee Examiner shall forward the club statement to the ACTA Secretary who shall keep a register of shooters authorised to use release trigger guns.

- (ii) No ACTA shooter other than those authorised in Trap and Skeet Rules 11 (b) (i) shall use a release trigger gun.
- (iii) All release trigger guns used by A.C.T.A. shooters and overseas visitors shall be clearly labelled in red – CAUTION RELEASE TRIGGER – in a conspicuous place near the breech. Such labelling to be consistent with 12mm width marking tape.
- (iv) Release trigger guns shall not be left in gun racks or in positions where they can be mistakenly handled but shall be constantly under the the control and supervision of the user.
- (v) The user of a release trigger gun shall notify the referee at each visit to the trap or skeet layout.
- 12. No gun whose gauge is larger than 12 gauge is permitted nor shall any barrel(s) length be shorter than 63 centimetres overall.
- For all Skeet shooting, the load is limited to 32 grams struck measure or equivalent, shot size not larger than 7 to be used.
- Re-loads are permitted in all events except National Championships.

COMPETITOR

15. A "competitor" is one who has nominated for particular events and whose name appears on the official score sheet or score board. A competitor can compete only once in each event. Each competitor shall carry and present his handicap and registration card to all shoots and shall present it to the nomination office before being allowed to participate. It shall be the responsibility of the club to enter the competitor's scores on his card and to calculate his handicap at the appropriate times. However, if a shooter has lost his card he shall be allowed to compete provided his claim to being registered with the ACTA can be verified by another registered shooter. He shall be allowed to compete with his handicap but the fact that he competed without presenting his card shall be reported by the Club on the prescribed form to the State Association Secretary.

Should it be found that an unreasonable number of reports of no card are received concerning a particular shooter the State Association Secretary shall advise the nearest Executive Committeeman so that the matter may be investigated.

A shooter repeatedly attending a shoot without his card may be penalised on his handicap after consideration by the State Association.

Any shooter giving a false handicap shall forfeit any nomination fee or prizes won from the incorrect handicap and shall be liable to suspension after consideration by the State Association.

- 16. (a) Every competitor entering competitions agrees to accept all official decisions, and to abide by the rules controlling the competitions.
 - (b) A competitor may appeal against the decision of the referee in regard to interpretation and application of these rules. The competitor shall advise the referee before he leaves the shooting tracks that he intends to appeal, and, immediately upon completing his run over the traps the competitor shall lodge a written appleal and \$2 forfeit with the management. The management shall enlist the aid of at least three, including any Executive Committee members, Referee Examiners or Official Referees on the grounds to examine the matter and should the competitor's appeal be upheld his forfeit shall be returned and the correct ruling shall be applied to the
- target appealed against. Should the appeal be disallowed the forfeit shall be paid to the club concerned. There shall be no appeal against a referee's decision in regard to whether a target is legal or whether it has been missed.
- All competitors must be registered by the ACTA before taking part in competition. Unregistered competitors are not permitted to compete at any time.
- Competitors must at all times use their correct names when entering a competition. Shooting nom-de-plumes are not permitted.
- 19. If a competitor who commences an event withdraws or is disqualified from the competition, he forfeits the right to resume and any refund from the event.
- 20. The competitor whose turn it is to shoot may observe a Legal Target from a trap-house where the trap has been adjusted or repaired or where several non-legal (irregular) or No Targets have been released.
- 21. No competitor shall unduly delay a squad without good and sufficient reason in the judgement of the referee in charge of the squad. A shooter who persists in deliberately causing inexcusable delays after receiving a first warning from the referee shall be subject to disqualification from the event.

SHOOTING UP.

22. Where a competitor has entered but does not present himself to start an event with his squad, he will not be permitted to shoot up after the first man in the squad has fired the first shot at Station 2. He may join the squad for all later rounds, but the round missed because of lateness must be shot on the proper field in the first vacancy, or after all other contestants have finished.

COMPETITION.

- 23. Wheresoever the word "Competition" may be used in the following rules, it is to be understood to refer to each particular event, and must at all times be construed by the Management in whose charge the carrying out of such "Competition" has been entrusted.
- 24. (a) Open Shoots, that is Commonwealth, State and District Championships and open competitons (cases where more than \$200 is allotted for distribution in any one event), must have the approval of the State Association before being advertised or conducted. (This rule applies to the actual event and the proposed date of holding.)
 - (b) Clubs allocated Commonwealth Championships and In-
 - terstate Teams' Matches must advertise the event in A.C.-T.A. "Shooting News" at least once, two months before the actual shooting date. Clubs failing to supply suitable advertising copy by the appropriate copy closing date will be charged a fee for an appropriate insertion, as made by the A.C.T.A Secretary.
 - (c) Clubs allocated State Championships are expected to ad vertise these events in the A.C.T.A. Shooting News.

- 25. At the beginning of each round when the squad is assembled at Station 1, the squad shall be entitled to observe a single target from both the High and Low Traphouses.
- 26. No member of a squad having shot from one station shall proceed toward the next station in such a way as to interfere with another shooter. The penalty for wilful interference in this manner shall be disqualification from the event. However, when in the opinion of the referee it is done unobtrusively the first competitor in a squad should be allowed to move across and stand at least three metres behind the next station from Stations 2 and 6 inclusive.
- 27. Should darkness, bad weather, or other causes interfere with the competition, the Management shall have the right to decide when and how the competition shall be continued, provided that this is not postponed longer than one calendar month. Any competitor who defaults in respect of such postponed competition forfeits all his rights and standing therein.
- 28. Shooting for targets only, is a term which shall be held to define the status of a competitor in any given event, or events, or in an entire tournament program, and shall signify that a competitor is "shooting for targets only" and has no interest in any trophy or trophies, nor any interest in money or monies in any specific event, or events or in the entire program. The competitor's name shall be placed on the squad board, signifying that he is shooting for targets only. Shooting for targets only shall be permitted at the discretion of the Club. In any event in which any competitor is shooting for a sweepstake or prize the scores of these competitors in the event who are shooting for targets only shall be used for handicapping purposes.
- 29. All clay targets broken or otherwise at all time remain the property of the club and not the competitor. The competitor only pays for the privilege of shooting.

TRAPS.

30. In all open events any trap which throws a Legal Target may be used, provided the target is released from a position in the field by mechanical or elecrical device (NOT released from within the Traphouse).

SAFETY.

- All guns carried on or about the shooting grounds must be held in a position of safety with the breach open, and unloaded, at all times.
- 32. Shooting on the grounds at any place other than the firing point at legitimate targets only is prohibited except where a pattern plate is installed.
- 33. (a) Holding the gun "pistol" fasion, using one hand only, is barred. Any competitor acting in this way is to be warned against continuance – if continued, the competitor is to be disqualified from competition forthwith and the matter reported to the Executive Committee. (Penalty – fine \$20).
 - (b) Any shooter committing an ungentlemanly or unsafe act on the shooting ground shall be liable to suspension or disqualification.
 - (c) Any shooter deliberately firing at any fauna on any shooting ground shall immediately be suspended by the club management and shall remain suspended until the incident is dealt with by his State Association.
- 34. When it is his turn to shoot, a competitor shall stand on the shooting station, load and close his gun. He must open his gun and remove the cartridges before turning or leaving the shooting station.

PROCEDURE AND DEFINITIONS.

- 35. A competitor must be at the firing point within two minutes after having been called by the official referee, scorer or a member of the Club Management. Failing therein, he may be disqualified or penalised with loss of targets or may be re-squadded in the last squad at the discretion of the Club.
- 36. A competitor is duly notified to compete when his name is called out by the referee, scorer or other person authorised to do so by the Management or when his name appears on the score board. If a "squad hustler" is furnished it is a matter of courtesy only and does not relieve the competitor from responsibility. It is the duty of each and every competitor to be promptly on hand to compete when called upon to do so.

SHOOTING POSITIONS.

37. The competitor must stand with both feet entirely within the boundary of the shooting station. However, provided his front foot is as close as possible to the forward edge of the shooting station, a shooter with a wide stance will not be penalised if his back foot extends beyond the rear edge of the shooting station.

GUN POSITION.

 The competitor may hold his gun in any position consistent with safety.

SQUAD.

- A squad for shooting skeet shall have a maximum of six (6) competitors. Under safety requirements this number must not be exceeded.
- SHOOTING BOUNDS.
- 40. For Stations 1 to 7 inclusive, to be an area 40.23 metres in front of the traphouse from which the target is released. (These bounds must be clearly marked on the skeet field with a suitable marker) see field layout. For No. 8 Station, to be from the traphouse from whence the target is released to a point defined on the field layout as the centre line. Note: Targets shot at and broken after they pass the centre from No. 8 Station are lost targets.
- 41. While shooting single targets, a competitor may load 2 cartridges. One cartridge only to be fired at each target (except from Station Nos 7 and 8 where one cartridge ONLY may be loaded). (It is suggested that clubs attach a suitable sign to the low house wall).

BAULK

- 42. (a) Any extraneous occurrence which, in the opinion of the referee, materially interferes with the equity of the competitor after he calls for his target constitutes a baulk.
 - (b) Under no circumstances will a baulk be granted unless claimed by the competitor immediately it occurs, or if, in the opinion of the referee, a baulk has occurred, he may restore the competitor's target.

BROKEN TARGET.

43. A "broken target" called by the referee as "1", is one which has a visible piece broken from it, whilst in the air and within the shooting bounds, by the shot from the competitor's gun.

DUSTED TARGET.

- 44. A Dusted Target is one from which dust is detached by the competitor's shot, but the target shows no visible lessening in size therefrom. A Dusted Target is not a Broken Target, and is a Lost Target.
- NO TARGET SINGLES.
- 45. After "No Target" has been called by the referee under any of the following conditions it thereafter plays no part in the competition and is irrelevant to it.
- 46. No Target shall be called when:
 - (a) A target is released without the competitor's call.
 - (b) A time interval occurs before or after the competitor's call.
 - (c) A broken target is released.
 - (d) In single target shooting two targets are released.
 - (e) A target does not conform to the definition of a legal target in the opinion of the Referee.
 - (f) A competitor shoots out of turn or from the wrong shooting station
 - (g) Two competitors or a competitor and a non-competitor shoot at the same target.(h) A misfire or malfunction caused by the competitor's gun or a
 - (h) A misfire or malfunction caused by the competitor's gun or a misfire of the cartridge occurs due to the neglect of the competitor.
 - If when double loading while shooting single targets a misfire or malfunction should occur preventing the competitor from shooting at the second target.
 - (j) A simultaneous or near simultaneous discharge occurs; i.e. from any cause both barrels are discharged together or nearly together. Simultaneous discharges shall be classed as malfunctions.
 - (k) A round fired is faulty in the opinion of the Referee.
 - All misfires or malfunctions or faulty cartridges must be recorded on the score sheet as "M" for malfunction.
 - (m) A cartridge with no primer is classed as a malfunction.

NO TARGET DOUBLES AND PROOF DOUBLES.

- 4/. (a) No targets (both) shall be called when either target in doubles is released broken.
 - (b) No targets (both) shall be called in doubles when both targets are not released simultaneously.
 - (c) No targets (both) shall be called when only one target is released in doubles.
 - (d) No targets (both) shall be declared if any allowable malfunction occurs on the first shot in doubles, and a proof pair shall be thrown to determine the results of both shots. If such
 - malfunction is excessive the Referee shall declare "first target lost, and no target on second barrel", and a proof dou-

ble shall be thrown to determine the result of the second shot only.

- (e) No targets (both) shall be declared if the targets of a double collide before the result of the first shot is determined, and a proof double shall be thrown to determine the result of both shots.
- (f) If the first target lost be the first target of a regular double, when the competitor is deprived of the opportunity of shooting at a second target then a proof double shall be fired upon to determine the result of the second shot and then the first target lost shall be repeated as a single and scored as the 25th target.
- LOST TARGET.
- 48. If a double be thrown but the shooter is deprived of a normal second shot for any of the following reasons, the result of the first shot shall be scored, and the second target only shall be declared "no target", and a proof double shall be fired to determine the result of the second shot only:
 - (a) Both targets are broken with the first shot.
 - (b) The wrong target is broken with the first shot.
 - (c) The first shot is lost and a collision occurs before the result of the second shot is determined.
 - (d) The second target collides with fragments of the first target, properly broken, before the result of the second shot determined.
 - (e) The result of the first shot is determined and a baulk occurs interfering with the equity of the second shot.
 - (f) An allowable malfunction occurs on the second shot. If such malfunction is excessive, not allowable, the second target shall be scored "lost".
 - Lost target shall be called when:
 - (a) a competitor fails to break a legal target.
 - (b) when the competitor fails to shoot because his gun is unloaded, or uncocked, or because the safety was faultily adjusted or jarred back from his own oversight or not, or because of any other cause chargeable to his own oversight or neglect.

Should this happen when shooting doubles the first target should be declared lost and a proof pair shall be thrown to determine the result of the second shot only.

- (c) The competitor attempts to open the gun before the Referee examines it. A competitor having an apparent misfire or malfunction will forthwith call the Referee for his decision. The competitor must not turn around and must keep his gun pointed in the direction of the traphouse until the Referee has given his decision, if a competitor's gun breaks down and it is necessary to seek a replacement the competitor is allowed three (3) minutes to do so. If this is not possible the competitor may leave the squad and finish the remaining targets of the round at a time decided by the Referee or when a vacancy occurs.
- (d) on the fourth and subsequent malfunction in any one event.
- (e) When the competitor breaks a target outside the shooting bounds.
- (f) if the first target lost be the first target of a regular double, when the competitor is deprived of the opportunity of shooting at a second target then a proof double shall first be fired upon to determine the result of the second shot and then the first target lost shall be repeated as a single and scored as the 25th target.

SKEET ROUND PROCEDURE.

- 49. (a) The squad shall start shooting at Station 1 in the order in which the names appear on the score sheet. The first competitor shall start shooting singles, firing upon the high house target first and the low house target second. Then he shall proceed to shoot doubles, firing the first shot at the target emerging from the high house and the second shot at the target from the low house, before leaving the station.
 - The second shooter shall then proceed likewise, followed by the other members of the squad in turn. Then the squad shall proceed to Station 2 and repeat the same sequence as on Station1. The squad shall then proceed to Station 3 where each competitor will shoot at a single target from the high house first and then a single target from the low house before leaving the shooting station.

The same procedure will be followed at Station 4 and 5. Upon advancing to Station 6 the first competitor will shoot singles in the same sequence as at the previous stations and then he shall shoot doubles by firing at the low house target first and the high house target second before leaving the station. The other competitors will follow in their turn. The same procedure will be followed at Station 7.

The squad will then advance to Station 8 where each competitor shall shoot at a target from the high house. The squad shall then turn and the first competitor will shoot at a target from the low house. If the competitor has broken his first 24. targets he shall repeat the shot at another low house target to complete the round of 25 before leaving the station. The other competitors will then follow in turn using the same procedure.

- (b) A round of skeet for one person consists of 25 targets. The object being to score the greatest number of broken targets.
- (c) The first target lost in each round shall be repeated im-mediately and the result scored as the 25th target and recorded in the 25th column on the score sheet.
- (c) Should the first target lost occur in a double, the Lost Target
- shall be repeated as a single and scored as the 25th shot. (e) A HALF ROUND OF SKEET consists of 13 targets as follows:

Station 1 = a single high house target = 1Station 2 = a single low house target = 1 = 2and one pair of targets (H & L) =2 = 4Station 3 = a single high house target = 1 = 5Station 4 = a single low house target = 1 = 6Station 5 = a single high house target = 1 = 7Station 6 = a single low house target = 1 = 8and a pair of targets (L then H) = 2 = 10Station 7 = a single high house target = 1 = 11

and a single low house target
$$= 1 = 13$$

REFEREE.

50. (a) To become a registered referee, a candidate shall approach his club Secretary and President, who (when they consider that the candidate has achieved a satisfactory standard) shall recommend in writing to the nearest Registered Referee Examiner on the prescribed form that the candidate be given a practical and oral examination. When the candidate has passed this examination to the Examiner's entire satisfaction the Examiner will then submit his recom-mendation plus the form to the ACTA Secretary who will issue a Referee badge to the candidate.

Any candidate who has failed and wishes to be re-examined must be re-examined by the same Examiner.

- (b) The Rules Supervisors will keep a record of all Referees in his State.
 - (c) The club management complaint of any Referee or Referee Examiner shall be referred to the nearest Rules Supervisor within the State for investigation. The Rules Supervisor has the power to suspend the person concerned until the next State Association meeting. If justified the State Association has the power to further suspend and recall the Referee or Referee Examiners badge and shall advise the ACTA Secretary of the action taken.
 - (d) Referees shall be appointed for a period of five (5) years and are eligible for re-examination. Any Referee or Referee Examiner who fails to register in any year will have his name automatically removed from the Association Referee and Referee Examiner list.
- 50. (e) The Referee's decision in all cases coming under his jurisdiction as set forth in the rules, shall be final. Referees must wear their official badge at all shoots.

SCORER.

- 51. (a) The scorer shall keep an accurate record of each shot, according to the Referee's call. He shall mark the figure "1' for the call of "one" or the figure "O" for the call of "lost", for each target.
 - (b) The official score must be kept on a score sheet and be available for inspection by the competitor.
 - (c) It shall be the responsibility of the competitor to check his score with the score sheet before leaving the skeet field. Any protest on his score must be lodged with the Referee immediately i.e. before leaving the shooting track. Such protest can only be made against incorrect score.

CHAMPIONSHIP CONDITIONS

AUSTRALIAN SKEET CHAMPIONSHIP.

- 52. (a) The Championship shall be shot at 50 targets, 25 targets per visit, in two visits. In the event of ties, to be shot-off squad system, first miss out.
- AUSTRALIAN CLAY TARGET SHOOTING NEWS-JULY

- (b) Entrance fees and Trophies to be determined each year by the full Executive Committee.
- (c) All sweepstakes to be paid out without deduction and shall be compulsory division. AUSTRALIA/NEW ZEALAND SKEET TEAMS MATCH
- (d) The five top scorers in the Australian National Skeet Championship comprise the Australian Team. Both teams will shoot at one round of 25 targets per shooter. In the event of tie scores, the result to be a tie.

OTHER SKEET CHAMPIONSHIPS

NUMBER OF TARGETS AND MAXIMUM ENTRANCE FEES

53. Commonwealth 75 targets \$12.00

- State & Zone 50 targets \$ 9.00
- District 25 targets \$ 6.00

54. I.S.U. CHAMPIONSHIPS

- (a) Commonwealth, State, Zone and District Championships may be conducted under International Shooting Union Rules using standard targets only. Application to be made as in Skeet Rule 24 (a).
- (b) Trophies for I.S.U. Championships should be limited to sashes, badges and similar. Clubs may provide additional trophies at their own discretion but the maximum entrance fees as shown in Rule 54 (c) shall not be exceeded.
- (c) Number of targets and maximum entrance fees shall be:
 - Commonwealth 200 targets \$40 State & Zone 100 targets \$20
 - District 50 targets \$10

CARTRIDGES.

- 55. (a) Standard shell for Championships. Shells used in all open championships (Commonwealth, State, Zone and District) are required to be restricted to 32 grams of shot, struck measure, or its equivalent, No 7 shot size or lighter. Shells marked by reputable manufacturer as complying with this regulation are approved. Reloaded cartridges are permitted.
 - (b) Home-loaded or reloaded cartrides may be used in all events excepting International Championships, National Championships.

CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHY VALUE.

- 56. (a) Championship trophy value (inclusive of badge or sash) for Commonwealth Championships is fixed by the Association at minimum \$60 retail value. Similarly, with State and Zone Championships, the amount fixed for trophies (inclusive of sash or badge) is fixed at minimum \$50 retail value. In District and Club Championships the value of trophies is left optional and at the discretion of the club conducting the event.
 - (b) Sash colours for clubs to be any colour other than those designated for National, Commonwealth (both Royal Blue), State (Red), and District (White) Championships respectively.

TIES

57. All tie shoots in Championship must be shot off squad system first miss out. Refer Rule 64 (b)

INTERSTATE TEAMS MATCH.

- 58. (a) Team 15 members. Best 10 scores to count, 50 targets per member, to be shot in two rounds of 25 targets. In the event of a tie for High Gun, to be shot off squad system, first miss-out. Standard load shells not to exceed 32 grams of shot, No 7 size or lighter.
 - (b) QUALIFICATIONS each team member shall have registered in the State for which he represents and may only represent one State in any one year.
 - (c) State Associations shall choose their team on the results of an elimination shoot or series.
 - (d) In the event of a tie, to be shot-off squad system, first missout.
 - (e) An appropriate High Gun trophy shall be provided and a souvenir badge shall be given to each member of the State Team (15) by the club conducting the event - badges are available on application from the ACTA. The program and venue of the Interstate Skeet Teams' Match shall be ad-vertised in the ACTA "Shooting News" at least two months prior to the State Teams' elimination shoot, and the State Teams' Match. The competition to be completed in each State not later than the thirtieth day of December of each year.
 - (f) The club conducting the Elimination Match shall provide compulsory division prize money of \$150 or 40% of the total nomination, whichever is the greatest. Where there are no tie scores, the distribution will be 60% for 1st, 30% for 2nd and 10% for 3rd.

- (g) Maximum nomination for the Skeet elimination match shall be \$10.
- (h) Only official ACTA Referees to officiate, scorer and check scorer to be provided. Score sheets to be signed by Scorers and Referees.
- (i) No other major skeet shoot is permitted in the particular State on the day or days when elimination and State Teams' Shoot is held.
- (j) Should a tie occur between any of the respective State Skeet Teamscores, then the count back system is to be applied to achieve a decision.
- 59. (a) The ACTA recognises BREAKS in sequences of 50, 75, 100, 150, 200, 250 and so on, provided the break is shot in competitition on one day only excepting over a program of two or more successive days.
 - (b) Break badges may be earned provided that the break is achieved from events of the same nature.
 - (c) No practice between events is permitted and breaks must be continuous.
 - (d) Shooting at not more than two sighter targets (not to count) prior to the commencement of an event does not terminate a break in progress.
 - (e) Clubs must submit form Number 17, duly completed to the ACTA Secretary, together with the prescribed fee for each requested badge, before recognition can be considered, or granted. Break badges once they have been obtained will not be repeated.

NIGHT SHOOTING CONDITIONS.

60. All rules and conditions are applicable to night shooting with maximum entrance fees \$1 extra.

SKEET HANDICAPPING FORMULAE.

- (a) A skeet shooter with no past performance or handicap rating shall shoot his first round on a zero handicap to establish a handicap.
 - (b) For his second round his handicap allowance shall be the difference between his score in the first round and 24.
 - (c) For his third round his handicap allowance shall be the difference between the average of his first two rounds and 24.
 - (d) For his fourth round his handicap allowance shall be the difference between the average of his first three rounds and 24.
 - (e) For his fifth round his handicap allowance shall be the difference between the average of his first four rounds and 24.
 - (e) For his fifth round his handicap allowance shall be the difference between the average of his first four rounds and 24.
 - (f) After shooting five rounds the lowest score of the five shall be discarded and the difference between the average of the other four rounds and 24 shall be his handicap allowance for his next five rounds.
 - (g) After shooting the first five rounds the shooter's handicap shall then only be adjusted after each successive five rounds as in (f) above.
 - (h) In all calculations fractions of ¹/₂ and above shall be taken to the next whole number.
 - (i) All full skeet rounds of 25 targets are to be recorded and used for handicapping (championship events, handicap events and any shoot-off full rounds).

Note: Practice rounds are not to be used for handicapping. See rule 28 concerning "targets only" scores that are to be used for handicapping.

- (j) It shall be the responsibility of the designated club official to progressively mark the shooters card with his full round scores and after each five rounds to calculate his new handicap. Any handicap adjustments as a result of these rules shall be notified, on the club return, to the ACTA Secretary within seven days.
- 62. Once a shooter attains an average of 24 targets off the gun, from these calculations, then his handicap becomes NIL.

SKEET SWEEPSTAKES.

63. (a) The normal method in a Skeet Handicap is to divide the sweepstakes amongst those shooters attaining twenty-five broken targets, with handicaps included. (Example)

Smith 25-25, handicap 3 total = 25-25 Jones 22-25, handicap 3 total = 25-25 Brown 7 total = 25-25

- (b) The normal method in skeet championships is to divide the sweepstakes using off the gun scores.
- (c) All sweepstakes must be divided 60%, 30% and 10%.

TIES.

64. (a) Each competitor will commence the shoot-off with a handicap allowance equivalent to the surplus of his ACTA handicap remaining after qualifying for the shoot-off and will continue in the shoot-off until he has lost one target in excess of the handicap allowance irrespective of the length of the shoot-off.

Examples:

- (i) 25 target event. A competitor whose ACTA handicap is 7 shoots 21-25. He will commence the shoot-off with a handicap allowance of 3 and will be eliminated immediately he loses one target in excess of the allowance. Should he shoot 23-25 in the first round of the shoot-off he will commence the second round with an allowance of 1 target.
- (ii) 50 target event. A competitor whose ACTA handicap is 7 shoots 40-50. He will commence the shoot-off with a handicap allowance of 4 and will continue in the shoot-off as in (i) above.
- (b) When shooting doubles in a first miss-out shoot-off, both targets shall be fired upon and recorded even though the first target may have been missed. The score on the second target shall be considered to be part of the competition and shall be used to arrive at a decision when the tied competitors all miss the first target of the double.
 - Examples:
 - Shooter A scores 0-1 in the doubles and shooter B scores 1-0. Shooter B is the winner.
 - (ii) Shooter A scores 0-1 and shooter B scores 0-0. Shooter A is the winner.
 - (iii) Both shooters score 0-1 or both shooters score 1-0. The shooters are equal and, if this was their first miss, both would return to the station and shoot at a repeat target.

GRADING.

- 65. Clubs shall have the option of running all Championships either as graded events or as one class events with placings of 1st, 2nd and 3rd. When run as graded events the grades shall be:
 - A. Handicap 0 to 1
 - B. Handicap 2 to 3
 - C. Handicap 4 to 10.





An accomplished competitor, Barbara has been at the game for 8 years and at present shoots her trap as a 15 metre C grader and has a skeet handicap of 1.


Quiet and unassuming, Barbara has that firm air of authority on a skeet field that engenders a feeling of confidence in the competitors.



The policy's success has already been reflected in two highly successful Easter Carnivals a success which is further emphasised by extensive support being given to the club's August two-day program.


At the Easter program, Seiko Time Fty Ltd combined with local jeweller Neville Gregory provided a valuable and most attractive range of watches as trophies.

The domestic travel scene is currently going through a shake-up, following the introduction of a number of new initiatives by the AC-TA's official domestic airline, Ansett Airlines of Australia.

Exciting new changes to conditions attached to advance purchase airfares, "Ansabox" snacks for economy class travellers and a hot meal for economy class travellers who are "guests" of Ansett at around dinner time (say 6 p.m. to 8 p.m.) all provide strong evidence to back up the airline's new advertising slogan, "the competitive one".

Incidentally, Ansett executives are in the final stages of establishing travel packages to assist competitors to get to the 1981 Australian Trap and Skeet Championships, and details of these will be published as soon as possible.

Duty Levels Firearms

This was the subject of an Industries Assistance Commission hearing conducted in Melbourne late in May.

The hearing revolved around the broad title: "Inquiry into products of the forging, foundry, die-casting etc industry", and the major firearms importers took the opportunity to oppose the current levels of duty, particularly those applying to .22 rimfire rifles with a dutiable value in excess of \$35.

A most detailed submission was presented by Geoff Rabbidge, Managing Director of Commercial Marketing Company of Sydney. The submission had been prepared by Brambles-Ruys Consulting Service Pty Ltd, and made specific reference to the nature of the many community services performed by firearms users. The submission then established a connection between these benefits, and the effect of duty levels on the demand for firearms.

The submission had the full support of the Livestock and Graziers Association, and purported to express the views of organisations, the total membership of which exceeds ¾ million. Other evidence was given by Mr M. Fuller, a consultant speaking

Other evidence was given by Mr M. Fuller, a consultant speaking on behalf of Fuller Firearms Group; Mr W. Andersen, manager of Firearms Distributors (the Brisbane based national distributor of Ruger Firearms); Mr R. Osborne, Secretary-Controller of Winchester Aust Pty Ltd.

The sole Australian manufacturer Fieldman Firearms, was represented by its managing director Mr Mervyn Naughton, who advised the inquiry that although the maximum number of rifles that his company had produced in any one year was about 750, the potential production capacity was around 150 units per week.

The company is currently concentrating on the production of .22 Magnum rimfire rifles, and had not at any time objected to "by-law entry" of similar products by importers.

Mr Naughton advised the inquiry that he had no reason to seek tariff protection through the imposition of duty. The Commissioner of the inquiry Mr J.R. Seear was told that

The Commissioner of the inquiry Mr J.R. Seear was told that about \$110 000 in duty was being paid annually to "protect" the jobs of four people working in the Australian firearms manufacturing industry. The Commissioner commented that he believed the estimate to be significantly on the low side.

The findings and recommendations of the inquiry are due to be finished in June 1981, therefore, it will be some considerable time before the results are known.



English shooting administrator Mike Harris was reported in 'Shooting Magazine'' some time ago as saying that there were some European clay target associations looking at the American style of shooting.

Their thoughts are based on the future development of the sport in Europe and he said . . . "In terms of the number of targets shot and the number of shooters, there may be some aspects of the ATA system that are both more manageable and more economical than those currently used in Europe.'

ATA Trap is shot in three distinct events - Single Barrel (16 yard), Handicap to a maximum of 27 yards (our 25 metres) and Double Rise from 16 yards. None of these events allow a second shot at any target. The targets are thrown 50 yards only.

"In discussing the American game Harris said: "At any ATA event, a shooter takes 100 cartridges with him at the start of his round. His squad will then go from the first trap to the last, shooting all their targets without interruption. When every shooter has shot the first event — normally the 16 yard Single Barrel — the entry is closed and the next event, normally the Handicap, begins.

"This encourages shooters to arrive early, because a late start could means missing the whole competition. It also makes it possible to attend two registered shoots at different grounds on the same behind the 8 ball when visiting these countries to compete. Perhaps day," he said.

clined to bypass this event. He informed English readers that pump guns and autoloaders were popular, often with shell catchers attached both to save empties and to stop flinging of empty hulls at the next shooter in line. He pointed to the popularity of reloading as a way of reducing shooting costs in America.

All shooters must be able to tolerate recoil and maintain careful control over their gun for shot after shot — but I have yet to meet the man whose shooting improves as he takes more abuse from his gun. A bad day at DTL (trap shooting in England) is invariably made worse by excessive use of second barrel hits. On a bad day at ATA shooting, however, you use no more shells and take no more punishment to your shoulder or face than the winner," Harris said.

In a wrap of single barrel shooting Harris said that it was of particular benefit to beginners who are developing the co-ordination required to compete successfully. Older competitors and those who are sensitive to recoil benefit from this type of shooting and he is of the opinion that this would also explain why there are so many good competitive women shooters in America.

On the administrative side Harris said: "Fewer delays are another benefit of the ATA system. The shoot organisers do not need to hunt for dawdlers before each stage, because each squad shoots its 100 targets straight off'

ATA shooting certainly seems to suit a great many shooters. It helps to keep the cost of shooting down, it ensures that grounds and traps are used as much as possible, and it brings more shooters both men and women - into the game. The naturals who may be capable of the more difficult forms of shooting can soon be spotted and encouraged to try Ball Trap or Trench, but many of them might prefer to stick to the ATA system rather than switch over. After all, it is the shooter's own time and money — and he should shoot what he most enjoys," Harris said in summary

The discussion is interesting in that shooters in Australia are all discussing the high cost of the sport. Allied with this is that the Australian game of trap shooting is different from both the English and the American versions.

At a time when we are discussing and actually competing in International competitions it sort of puts our overseas competitors it is about time we started to look at the ATA system in this country.

FROM THE DESK OF THE NATIONAL COACHING DIRECTOR

This month I have "lent" my column to Peter Quire, Director of Coaching for South Australia, who has written this article.

Communications in Clay Target Coaching

In clay target coaching the most important thing to communicate is interest. Interest in the person you are to assist. We all know if someone is really interested in us or not. Secondly encouragement, giving confidence. Demonstrating that you have confidence in their ability to become a proficient clay shooter, does not mean you have to faisely praise. All people need encouragement, especially when embarking on a new venture.

Building confidence often involves the coach in giving the shooter time to understand, and to see his own problems. When he can do this the shooter then has confidence in his own ability to rectify them. We can't cope with too many new ideas at the one time. It is better for the new shooter to master one new idea or instruction at a time. In a coaching situation the Coach must listen as well as talk, this is the only way the Coach can find out if something is worrying the shooter, and what it is.

In conclusion, always leave lines of communication open. Encourage the shooter to approach you with any problems he might have

Being a world champion clay target shooter is not a pre-requisite for being a good coach, on the contrary, the very attributes needed to be a champion are not necessarily those needed to be a good coach. To have reached the point where you want to share your enjoyment of your sport with others indicates a preparedness to help others and a confidence in your own ability to do so.

Coaching can be most rewarding, in helping to improve a shooter's standards and enjoyment, the coach gains pleasure from the pupils success as well as his own. 6
