Since commencing this column back in 1976, I cannot recall the present.

Ironically, the danger comes from within our own ranks, rather than from legislators or law enforcers or any of the vocal "dogooder" groups.

Before looking at the immediate problem, let's look at the recent history of the sport.

About four years ago, after a number of years in which one branch of the shooting sports didn't want to know too much about another, the Australian Shooting Association elected a new President. The 'new boy'' was Peter Papps, and he brought to the position a willingness to grapple with the problem of uniting the various sectional interests within the ASA.

At about the same time, similar changes started to occur within the ACTA. Our Association began to realise that it could no longer survive in elitist isolation, and became aware that the Field and Game Federation of Australia was really a kindred group and needed to be nurtured, as did a number of other associations.

In the ensuing few years, managements of all shooting associations in Australia have recognised the need to improve communications with each other, and the standard and image of the Australian Shooting Association has improved accordingly

This improvement climaxed in Canberra on June 6 and 7, 1980 when the ASA acted as host to over a hundred representatives of all busting. sections of the shooting sports when it conducted a major Discussion Workshop. Although the workshop is reported elsewhere, it bears repeating here that the unanimous resolution to come out of the projeet was that the ASA should be restructured to become the top voice an Australian team uniform with a clear conscience after claiming Federation and the Australian Deer Association are not affiliated outburst, Mr Hollister. with the ASA, which concentrates only on the shooting sports in which there is international competition).

Now, back to the present problem, which has developed as a result of the continuing Olympic Games controversy

As you read in the July issue of CTSN, the ASA withdrew the shooting section from Australia's Olympic team (the exception was Mrs Yvonne Hill, who had protected herself from being withdrawn by securing an interim injuction in the Supreme Court of South Australia. The effect of the injunction was to restrain the ASA from withdrawing Mrs Hill.)

Subsequently, the Australian Small Bore Rifle Association obshooting sports being in greater danger of disintegration than at the tained a Supreme Court injunction, which had the effect of overturnng the ASA decision to withdraw the shooting section from the Olympic team - at least in relation to the small bore competitors.

> In my opinion, and I might add the opinion of many others, the ASBRA has by its selfishly motivated legal actions, placed in jeopardy the total unity of the shooting sports.

> But there is worse to come - the second small-bore nominee in the Olympic team was Mr David Hollister.

> Now, Mr Hollister is quite a performer. Not as a sportsman, but as an amateur politician. He has appeared on national television and has been reported in daily newspapers as a very vocal opponent of the system that had successfully promoted the competitive shooting sports in Australia, at least to this point.

> Some of Mr Hollister's more profound statements include a claim that in withdrawing the shooting section, the ASA had not considered the athletes' position (this is blatantly untrue because the section manager Peter Anderson has a diary record of discussing all aspects of the boycott with every member of the shooting team) and culminated with the statement recorded in the "Adelaide Ad-vertiser" dated June 24, which read: "If you can fight the Australian Government and win, the Russians are nothing".

> The ACTA is so incensed by Mr Hollister's public statements, that It took the unprecedented action of asking the ASBRA to "quieten him down" — this was done for the good of shooting, not just clay-

> I challenge the ASBRA to state its position in relation to national sports shooting unity.

Further, I challenge Mr Hollister to explain how he can now wear in Australia for the development and promotion of all shooting to have beaten the Australian Government, which really means the sports. (It should be noted that currently, the Field and Game Australian people - that is, you and me. You won no points with that

NEW GAME TO BE **PROMOTED IN** AUSTRALIA

(Staff Writer)

One of the major initiatives to come out of the formation of a new International Sub-committee is the promotion of a new clay target game in Australia.

Known as the ATA single barrel, angles and distances that targets are thrown are made easier.

The Association's Management Committee met early in June and agreed that while no rules changes would be considered AT PRESENT in relation to this match, all clubs are to be encouraged to include events of this nature on their regular programs.

The purpose behind the move is "double - barrelled" firstiv the introduction of rules similar to those used elsewhere in the world will expand Australia's opportunities for international competition. Secondly and probably most importantly in the short term - the heavier emphasis on "one cartridge per target" type competition has an instant effect on costs.

However, management realises that it would possible destroy the sport's appeal if the degree of difficulty was increased, as it would be if present single barrel conditions were maintained.

After all, breaks of fifty straight aren't all that common in single barrel, are they?

The Amateur Trapshooting Association of USA has very successfully conducted all of its regular tournaments on a single barrel base for many years.

It is refreshing to see that at last the ACTA is prepared to implement proven ideas from overseas - at least they should be given a chance to work here.

The new deal is that, for ATA single barrel events, the target angles will be reduced to 22°, and targets will be thrown to a distance between 44 and 48 metres. (This compares with 45° angles and a range between 45 metres and 55 metres for the official single barrel events.) Shooters will compete from 15 metres.

At a time when costs are again becoming a major talking point around the clubs, this refreshing new approach should be enthusiastically received.

Already, the iden has been in operation at the Melbourne Gun Club (Victoria) for two months and Club President Bob Buchan reports that the move has met with instant success.

Meanwhile, the Association's administrative unit is entering negotiations with national clay target associations in other countries with a view to developing this "new" game to a point where ex-tensive international competition is available for Australia's DTL shooters.

Another interesting point to arise from this development is on the question of equity. For many years, the purists have argued that there is no equity in giving a competitor the same score for a second barrel as is given to the competitor who regularly breaks targets with his first barrel. It was this anomaly that led to the development of points scoring.

Management intends to give ATA single barrel a reasonable trial, and will regularly monitor its acceptance.

Let's make ATA single barrel another challenge of the eighties!

shorter ones," he added.

The whole clay target game is this point in a nutshell he said: "The ability to be able to point precisely and accurately." "The shorter barrel is a little faster to point but the accuracy is not there and it's no damn good if you are the fastest pointer around and you can't hit anything," were the wise words from somebody who knows.

George shoots his skeet carefully, he has a point on the skeet

field where he breaks his targets and this is generally about the centre over station 8. As he pointed out, this is where the target still has its true flight trajectory and if let go any further, wind conditions start to interfere and the job of breaking it becomes harder.

"The longer you follow the target the more apt you are to slow down and run out of swing," he said. He also went on to say that:

'I do not subscribe to the American theory of shooting outgoers fast and incomers slow.

"This was designed for subgauge but we only shoot 12 gauge here so I even out my breaking points to the centre area of the field over station 8.1

"It is simpler and more precise and using this method you can develop a much better style."

There are a couple of exceptions, though, according to George. High 1 and high 2 are a couple of targets that need to be shot a little quicker and these two usually get the Biggs treatment before the centre.

Always an Eley man, George has very definite views on cartridges, having shot countless thousands and put together countless millions in the years that he sold his 'George Biggs Custom Loads'.

"I have always shot Eley cartridges," he said. "Nines for skeet."

"We make a cartridge in Australia that is as good as anything in the world. They are consistent and dependable, in fact they are damn good whichever way you look at them."

said: "I stopped making my custom loads when Eley ceased making components in Australia."

"I am getting on and it was about time to retire so I

thought that was as good a time as any. You know I

made and sold in excess of five million cartridges while I was in operation, this was a lot of shells and a lot of work.'

"They were loaded on a commercial machine that I bought from the old ICI company and when I wound up I sold it back to them. It was capable of turning out between 1500 and 2000 per hour but demand was getting to the stage that I was spending all my time loading shotshells."

MIND OVER MATTER is everything in life, so is shooting, it must be given some thought, the basics learned and understood and then practised until mastered.

Wise words from a 70-year-old George Biggs who had quietly applied these principles to win the 1980 National Skeet Championship in Perth.

"I have been after it for 10 years," he said following the event. "It is an event that is close to my heart and I have managed to

win it in the very place that the first ever National Skeet Championship was shot in 1970."

George has been involved in the administration of clay target shooting for 23 years and he said it was one hell of a job getting skeet accepted as a national event.

Ten or so years ago, there was very little interest in skeet shooting amongst the executive but with support from Tex Wells and a dedication to the cause, skeet shooting finally came of age.

Questioned on his involvement in skeet shooting George said: "It means a lot to me, it's more of a challenge and less mechanical than trap shooting.

"You only have one shot per target and you only have to make one mistake at this level of competition and you're gone. But I also think it is more skilful and thus it is harder to shoot big scores at skeet," he said.

According to George the lack of very high breaks in skeet shooting in Australia seems to prove that more skill is required for this particular game.

George Biggs the administrator has been involved with the game for 33 years in some capacity or other.

He spent a long period of time on the Executive Committee and is currently involved as the Victorian Director of Coaching.

He has the idea, very creditably, that if you like a sport and get a bit out of it then you should be prepared to put a bit back into it.


The game is intensively competitive but you also get a lot of fun out of it, so I do my best to promote it in every way that I can," he said.

Speaking of his technical equipment and technique George is of the opinion that the ideal skeet gun has 28' barrels. He shoots a Browning U/O with this length.

He feels that shooters were wrongly advised in the early days of skeet shooting in Australia when the rage was for 26" barrelled guns.

As he puts it: "It is hard to pinpoint exactly where these trends start but it was obvious when we started to shoot skeet in earnest that we quickly learnt that the Americans shot with 28" barrels and sometimes with 30" tubes.

"The same thing applies to trap shooting, the longer barrels prove more accurate in that they are easier to point more precisely than



matters.

"It was becoming quite a chore so I had to make a decision either to expand or get out. I got out, but if I had been a bit younger I would have gone on with it."

The future of clay target shooting has a deal of interest for George. He thinks it is in good hands.

"I think the word is out now that the sport is not for just a select few people. It is not a wealthy man's sport these days, you need some money but it has become a young persons sport," he said.

Warming to the theme he said: "Young shooters today are very keen and in my job as Victorian Coaching Director, I see ample evidence of this trend."

"If we could only subsidise the youngsters some more we would have a big crop of world standard competitors."

"Look at Boyd, Summers and all the other younger competitors, all dead keen and appearing more and more in the winning lists. Right throughout the high schools there are some very capable teenagers that will leave their mark in the future."

"Just look at these young Americans here in Perth, Harrison and Loitz, they were top shots at 13 and 14-years-old. Loitz in the Double Rise the other day was amazing. We would be hard pressed to get to that standard because we do not shoot enough of that type of event."

George visited America in 1978 and was most impressed with their competitive shooting scene. He has some quite definite views on the subject.

When quizzed on it he said: "The Americans concentrate on the important events and so develop better shooters, younger."

"We go in for a lot of fun events that do nothing for our competitive shooters. If we want to improve we would be better off adopting the American system of single barrel shooting."

"Double barrel shooting is a waste of time and cartridges and only prolongs the agony of the result. Their system is much more definite, 100 targets, 100 cartridges and in most cases a result."

"Another thing, if we shot single barrel events shooters could buy single barrel guns cheaper than double barrel guns and this would be a big factor in attracting more people to the sport."

"I was impressed with the American style when I was there in 1978 and whilst we have probably a few things to learn from them they probably could learn a thing or two from us." On the subject of improving our standards George thinks we should shoot more targets.

When it was put to him that this would increase costs to the shooters it sent him off on another subject, that of cartridges, a subject that he knows a little about.

"If we want to improve our standard then this is what must happen, we must shoot more targets," he said.

He has obviously thought about it as he continued: "It was most surprising to see that in America the ammunition companies sell direct to clubs who buy in big quantities at a special rate."

"The shooter gets the benefit from this in lower prices and this situation should exist here. The firearms trade will probably hang me for saying this but it has to come sooner or later. The trap and skeet shooter is using so much ammunition of a specialist type it seems logical to supply them this way."

"Our cartridges are far too heavy here for the games of trap and skeet. We should have a maximum of three dram equiv. for target shooting in the required shot sizes. After all that's all they use in the States even for 27 yard shooting."

"Tailor a load for the competition shooter and supply the clubs direct and you would see the game progress," he concluded.

George turned 70 on May 9 and as he put it has had a wonderful life in shooting and with a twinkle in the eye was quick to point out there was life in the old boy yet.

Nationals are great in his opinion, it is the time of the year when you can get together with old friends and the comradeship is one of the great things that this sport has to offer.

He comes from the cradle state of trapshooting and looks back fondly to 1927 when it all started in the quarry at Tottenham. "We have come a long way since those days," he said.

"We came of age at Melbourne Gun Club in 1973 when the World Championships were held there. It was a long time coming after we blew our big opportunity at the Melbourne Olympics in 1956."

Asked to explain this he said: "Foolish people in power, due to selfishness let the opportunity to develop internationaly shooting slip by. It was a terrible shame."

"But we have now proved that we can come up to world competition standards, our only problem is that we are so far removed from

The Winchester team was made up of Bill Iles, Ken Rose, Alan Blease and P. Baldock.


The following event was the Melbourne June S.B. Graded Championship, reprogrammed from Saturday and an experiment by the

They were ahead of their time as the wide-spread use of cartoon characters to catch consumer attention for commercial products did not occur until the 1970's.



With a collective clearing of throats, Presidents and Secretaries of all the state associations sat down with the ACTA's Management Committee and the national Executive Director for the first ever ACTA planning conference.

The conference was convened in Canberra on Sunday, June 8 at the Parkroyal Motor Inn and followed th ASA "Shooting in the 80's" conference held the previous day.

Proceedings commenced at 8.30 am and there was a 100 per cent roll up. All states were represented by either their President or Secretary and in some cases both.

Chairing the meeting, ACTA President Ern Hawkins made mention of the excellent attendance and introduced the members of the Management committee, Vice-president Laurie Connors, Ron Porter and Roy Holtfreter together with the Executive Director, Noel Southey.

Representing the states were, Bob Buchan (Victoria), Barrie Arnott and Vicky Bridgland (S.A.), Vince Phillips (N.S.W.), Horrie Mills (N.T.), Geoff Hayward and Brett Watts (W.A.), Paul Cains and Ken Coppleman (Tasmania), Neil Hardy and Bev Grice (Queensland). With preliminaries out of the way business proceeded to state reports.


Each state outlined its progress since inception and how far they had proceeded along the road to top administration. There were varying success stories but it was most noticeable that all states were very open and candid in their evaluation of their successes and failures.

It was a candour that was to set the tone of the whole day and resulted in what one delegate described as 'the most important gettogether this association has ever had'.

As state reports were received, points that required clarification were dealt with immediately but specific suggestions were noted for in depth discussion later. It was evident that the pacesetter states were Queensland and Victoria, both showing firm administration and a good deal of shooter promotion.

A highlight of this session was the most professional presentation by the livewire secretary of the Queensland Association, Bev Grice.





Her capacity for ferreting out the bits and pieces that make an association tick certainly raised a few eyebrows around the table.

One of the more significant Queensland proposals listed was a scheme to go from part-time to full time administration through a grant from the state government and an expansion of the Administration Seminar program which was instigated last year.

This program, researched and written by Bev Grice is aimed at improving the standard of gun club administration, a point made by all state secretaries. Copies of this program will be made available to all states in the near future.

All states mentioned that they were having a problem with getting zones recognized and all mentioned that costs were becoming a major problem, some solutions to this were discussed later in the conference.

Emphasis then moved to the structure of the ACTA for the benefit of new members to the association. It was outlined by Noel Southey and covered the new chain of command with reference to the constitutional amendments passed at Perth.

Australia's sporting organisations were discussed and it was explained how and where the ACTA slotted into the overall scene together with our links with International sporting and shooting bodies and the Confederation of Australian Sport. The ACTA Structure itself was explained in the light of the new constitution. A surprising fact to emerge was that the members of the ACTA are the constituent clubs and not individual registered shooters.

It was pointed out that this put a lot of pressure on state associations to make sure that the concept of zones be kept to the fore to allow the normal democratic process to occur.

Streamlining of the ACTA structure was explained and the role of each committee and sub-committee explained. These committees are as follows:

*MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE — National President and vice-president together with two senior members of the executive committee (at present Ron Porter and Roy Holtfreter). The Executive Director sits on this committee in a nonvoting capacity.

*DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE - Chairman is Ern Hawkins and two businessmen from outside the executive committee by appointment.

*FINANCE SUB-COMMITTEE — Chairman is Ern Hawkins, Mal Hastie and Sir Leslie Price have been invited to sit on this committee also.

*RULES COMMITTEE — Chairman is Arch Rowe and members come from within the executive and consist of Ron Porter, Robin Bailey, Trevor Reschke and Bob Mules.

*NATIONALS SUB-COMMITTEE -- Chairman is Ern Hawkins and the aforementioned management committee together with a member from the state which last held the Nationals and one from the state next holding the series.

*INTERNATIONAL SUB-COMMITTEE — Chairman is Laurie Connors and the committee consists of Bill Abbott, Newton Thomas and Bob Buchan.

There is provision for the forming of more committees as required.

In summarising the role of the ACTA, Executive Director Noel Southey said: "The quality of our sport depends on quality decision making. This quality depends on effective communication. All the data required must be in the hands of the decision makers — be it club, zone, state or national, without these lines of communication we cannot progress".

From the morning reports then came the afternoon session, a think-tank for want of a better word. At this time the participants in open conference kicked around all the ideas put forward at the morning session.

The ideas came thick and fast and included such diverse subjects as: A separate national skeet carnival, a club operations manual, a poster to promote the sport, the question of commercial trading and the making of a promotional film.

Other subjects to receive attention were ways and means of making shooting fun, how to develop better communications, the trophy value in ISU shooting and ways to get better liaison with other shooting organisations.

Of these subjects the most concern was expressed on promotion and the need to put the sport to the members and the public. Concern was expressed that whilst we had been able to sell the sport, as shown in the remarkable membership figures over the past year or so, we were finding it hard to maintain the interest.

It seemed generally accepted that the price of shooting may be becoming an inhibiting factor. There was much discussion on ways and means of overcoming it. It was generally agreed that at club level some effort should be made to start introducing the American style of single barrel shooting with the easier angles and slower targets.

Another thought to gain some acceptance was the setting of a basic low nomination with a greater variety of optional sweepstakes to allow competitors themselves to set the level of competition they wished to enter.

ISU shooting came in for a lot of discussion and again there seemed to be consensus in the fact that there should be more emphasis on the performance than the trophy value. This particular subject was passed to the ISU sub-committee for consideration.

When it came to the level of club administration there was a very strong feeling around the table that things could be improved. Concern was expressed that the level of club administration in a lot of cases was abysmally low and that the administration course prepared by Bev Grice for the Queensland association should get as wide a circulation in each state as possible.


It was surprising to listen to state officers complaining of a lack of communication from their executive officers. Feeling was quite strong on this subject and it was generally agreed that a written report from executive officers to the state council after every executive meeting was the minimum requirement from them all.


All in all it was a 'mind bending' conference. Never before have we seen such an open and frank discussion on matters pertaining to the middle administration of our sport. The spirit at the meeting was one of extreme co-operation and friendliness.

Recommendations from the meeting will travel back through the system and will filter through to the overall scene, all will be beneficial.

With such a feeling of well being it was no wonder the meeting as one of its final recommendations made the point that the state presidents and secretaries should meet each year in this format to follow up the ideas generated at this first historic meeting.

It was a great exercise and reinforces the strides forward into the 80's that clay target shooting is making.





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

AUSTRALIAN CLAY TARGET SHOOTING NEWS-AUGUST

In a most realistic look at its role in shooting sports administration on the Australian scene, the Australian Shooting Association convened a 'discussion workshop' in Canberra on Friday and Saturday, June 6th & 7th to examine the question of "SHOOTING SPORTS THROUGH THE EIGHTIES".

In a most professional approach to the exercise, it invited a panel of experts to address the conference and allowed the participants to question these experts and then discuss with each other the future role of the A.S.A.

Participating in the Workshop were the five affiliates of the A.S.A.

*Amateur Pistol Shooting Union of Australia

*National Rifle Association of Australia

*Australian Clay Target Association

*Australian Small Bore Rifle Association

- *Sporting Shooters Association of Australia together with
- *The Field & Game Federation of Australia
- *The Firearms Industry

In all over 100 delegates from these organisations and other interested persons participated.

From the outset it was obvious that the A.S.A. had discovered that it needed to become more representative of the shooters in Australia. This trend started to show from the very first words spoken in what was to become a war of words.

Delegates were wary but prepared to listen as all of the individual organisations had been experiencing some problems in the promotion and defence of their particuar shooting discipline.

The opening dinner on Friday evening was the time that the stage was set. Peter Papps, President of the A.S.A., introduced by conference chairman Clay Frederick, spoke first on the 'Role of the A.S.A.'

Papps outlined the history of the A.S.A. from the 1950's through to the end of the 1970's. He outlined how the various affiliates came to band together with a common goal — the promotion of competition shooting.

"Apart from our involvement in international competitive shooting the A.S.A. is strictly avoluntary organisation. Funded only by affiliation fees of its five affiliates, it recognises the need for more active involvement in areas such as those to be presented at this workshop — legislation, political and public image, noise pollution, relationship with policy makers, policy etc.", he said.

Coming to the crux of the matter, he continued: "Whilst it is possible to continue the level of operation the way we know it today, if we are to broaden our field of interest and become active and effective in the areas mentioned, it would require the appointment of a full time secretary or director".

Commending the workshop to participants he said: "We trust the workshop will give all who attend the opportunity to discuss and become better acquainted with the national shooting scene and provide a stimulation for new ideas on improving our organisations from within or outside the A.S.A.".

Officially opening the conference was Hon. R.J. Ellicott, Q.C., and he spoke warmly of the association he has had with the shooting sports, particularly at the last Australia Day games in Canberra.

He spoke in broad terms on the Federal Government's policy on sport but swung his comments well away from the Olympic question to the amusement of the gathering.

The Australian Sports Institute was given a good airing by the Minister and he emphasised that the thrust of the Federal Government would be in 'the pursuit of excellence' in all sport.

He mentioned the new course in Sports Administration being offered at the Canberra College of Advanced Education and said that it was to be hoped that in the next few years a more professional type of sports administrator will be filtering through to all sporting organisations.


The new \$5 million Sports Institute was spoken of in glowing terms when he said: "the sports institute will have a federal aspect and will relate to the national bodies of all the sports involved. I hope that it will capture the imagination of Australia's sportsmen and women".

"You will understand that it is a program adopted by the Federal Government in providing the basis from which we can develop excellence for the future", he said.


He then declared the conference open.

In his keynote address to the conference, Graham Dempster, Assistant Secretary of the Sport and Recreation Branch of the Department of Home Affairs laid the question of sports funding right open.

Sports administration, according to Dempster, is in a sorry mess with a good deal of confusion and very little sound business streamlining.

He cited examples of sporting bodies within the national scene that separate men and women participants, the young from the old, and amateur and professional competitors into very different bodies.

Even more divisive was the practice of having different disciplines of the same sport in a variety of organisations, or the same sport represented by several administrative bodies, he said.

All of this is bad administration and "unless sport has a sound administrative structure on which their activities are based, it is going to fall by the wayside", he added.

"It is so much more important to most Australian sportsmen, that N.S.W. defeats Victoria or vice versa, than it is that Australia beat anybody", he said when talking about the state rivalries in Australian sport.

All of these divisions, according to Mr. Dempster, made it very difficult for the government to decide who was speaking for whom.

Three major questions were put to the conference by him which need to be answered by all sporting organisations before they can hope to expect recognition from the Federal Government.

Firstly, he posed the question of whether sporting organisations were being run on sound business lines, and said: "I put it to you, that a lot of businessmen accept in their sports, things that they would not accept in their business"

"Do our sports make the best use of existing resources?" was his second question and he cited the common occurence of freezing out innovators and good coaches. If we continue to waste talent in our sporting organisations, it was Mr Dempster's opinion that we would never progress.

Developing this theme and throwing in the third point of whether or not our sports structures were adequate to meet the challenges of the 80's and beyond, Mr. Dempster was quite critical of the election structure within non-progressive organisations. "In most business, the boards elect or select the best people to do

the job, but half the sports in Australia still have their president and secretary going in rotation around the states", he said. "With some sporting bodies on a national level, their main aim in

life is, every year or two years, to choose the national team".

"Then they try and raise enough money to get it overseas. It is a great big job for these volunteers to raise the \$40,000 to \$50,000, but I put it to you that this is doing nothing to develop the sport, it is doing a great deal for those 6 or 8 at the top but absolutely nothing for the sport as a whole", he said.



Government funding is not a panacea, nor was it designed to solve all of sports' problems according to Mr. Dempster. It was more of a catalyst, designed to help organisations to take the plunge, he said.

Funding should be used to complement an ongoing expansion program within the sport and to help expand the scope of the sport into areas such as coaching and better administration, he added.

"I put it to you that the government is not interested in maintaining the status quo in any sport. I also put it to you that government funding is not the be all, end all, it is not the final answer. In our view, there are a tremendous number of things that can happen from within sport before these changes, that make for moves forward, can take place", was his message to those who expected handouts.

Look to wider areas for sports funding was his message. Look at levies on participants, look to marketing the products that the sportsmen use, look to publishing to put the story across and above all, look to local government for help, he said.

In challenging the A.S.A. to look at this wider role in the shooting sports he said: "You need a structure that can react to problems, that can go to government at whatever level and beat on the door with authority, with knowledge and a good case. This is the way the game will be played in the future".

Government funding to the shooting sports according to Mr. Dempster is running at about \$1.20 per head. Considering the fact that there were 46,000 registered competition shooters the sport is doing, as he put it "very nicely thank you" in relation to other minority codes, and cited Rugby Union as an example.

His message as far as the A.S.A. was concerned was very clear. Speaking about national bodies and the problems facing the shooting sports, he said: "I make no apologies for being a nationalist or a centralist, because in Australian sport I believe we will get nowhere until we have clearly defined and accepted national goals'

"At the moment we are just going, I believe, at sport level, and atgovernment level, on good ideas and I am not sure just how long the good ideas and the good-will can last'

"I challenge you to look at all the things that join you together in the A.S.A. and see whether in fact what is happening, is to the benefit of your sport in Australia".

"I have to say that the government's present approach to shooting has been, there are five affiliates, they are doing alright, we can't really afford to help all five of them with a full time administrator. However we will help those sports, who out of their own resources find their own full time executive director, with a coaching director as a measure of recognition of their self help. An example of this is the Australian Clay Target Association"

The problem you have at the moment, as we see it from a government point of view is that you have five affiliates which could have size problems...there would be more value in our view of coming to us with a more concerted and more direct approach", he said.

Concluding his most thought provoking address to the conference Mr. Dempster left with the meeting a quote from a recent newspaper column which stated: "The meek shall inherit the earth because they didn't have what it

takes to knock it back"

It was an apt quote from a public servant who called the shots as he saw them, honestly.



Addressing the conference, Ross Baillie put an industry view from his company's position. He has been involved with the firearms trade for a period of 15 years, the last five as Managing Director of Winchester Australia Pty. Ltd.

He was full of praise for the concept of the A.S.A. conference but pointed out that whilst he was putting an industry view, he was by no means speaking for the whole of the firearms industry.

Speaking of his own company he put to the conference figures that were interesting when he said: "At the end of 1979 the total assets employed in our business were almost \$13 million. Capital investment and retained earnings almost \$4 million. Expenditures through 1980/81 on new plant and facilities are presently planned at around

\$1.75 million. These facts clearly demonstrate Winchester's confidence in the future

But he said: "In this room today there are industry representatives who through their combined respective organisations are responsible for the supply of perhaps 90% to 95% of all firearms and "The industry is dealing with a consumer market of approximately

\$50 million at retail level

Thus," said Mr. Baillie, "there is a great deal to be gained from a constructive understanding between the shooting sports and industry. He sees Winchester's relationship with the sport something like a one way street with: "The industry in one lane and the sport in the other — both travelling in the same direction — towards a somewhat common goal but with distinct functions and interests in the achievement of that goal".


Describing this course of action as synergistic or a 'working together', he saw the role of industry as more broadly based than it is at the moment. Winchester he said was not just a source of trophies for the shooting clubs but more of a partner in the faster development of the sports as a whole.


"After all," he said: "If, by the supply of suitable goods to those who desire to shoot, and if satisfaction comes to them from the use of those goods, and as a consequence the sport of shooting expands in all of its legitimate forms, Winchester will receive not only satisfaction from its part in this but will be strengthened as the company in its ability to research and develop further excellence in shooting products of its manufacture."

According to Mr. Baillie, Winchester has been very active in the promotion of the shooting sports and listed items such as making available experts to give evidence to government departments, financial help for further education in wildlife management, the sponsorship of student shotgun shooting and the Winchester Tournament.

He and the company have an optimistic outlook for the future despite some pressure from anti-firearms legislation: "No doubt emanating from abuses with firearms by criminals and by international insurrection and aggression; actions which the general public is being encouraged to believe are caused by the guns used rather than by the people using them", he said.

In a scathing attack on the uninformed Mr. Baillie made the point that no individual or corporation objected to soundly based and sensible laws but pointed out that persons in well-run organisations sometimes became complacent about legislation that did not affect 'them. But he said: "It behoves us all to be vigilant in the interests of all legitimate shooting activities, not just our own. There must be unanimity of action from all shooting associations and interested groups. No longer is the 'I'm allright Jack' syndrome viable''.

The biggest problem in his opinion with a contracting of the shooting sports is the reduction of manufacturing volume. If this was to happen, the prices would make the enjoyment of the sport prohibitive.

As an indication of his company's faith in the future Mr. Baillie promised positive support and said: "This is probably the appropriate time and place to announce that Winchester has made provision in its operating budgets to make available to Australian shooting organisations a sum of \$50,000 over a five year period starting in 1981".

The use of this funding he indicated would be left to discussion but would be available to organisations within the A.S.A. as well as others.

Mentioning some desirable projects, he said that provision of permanent shooting facilities, the publication of shooting rules and the propagation of shooting as a sport would be ways in which Winchester could be of assistance.

Winchester was particularly interested in the impact that the age of electronics would have on the shooting sports and it was Mr. Baille's opinion that there would be great strides forward in this area in the future. His company was not intending to market this type of equipment in Australia but in his opinion it would become an aid to make shooting more accessible to the media and the public.

Concluding his address, he said: "We see the continued development and strengthening of efficiently organised shooting bodies such as those present at this workshop. We see even better products becoming available to participants in shooting and we see electronics being introduced to aid shooting and to entertain and inform the public. We see rationalisations occurring in the industry by, changing economic and technological circumstances. However onething we see as not changing is Winchester's position in the Australian industry and its willingness to participate with shooting sports administrators in efforts to make shooting an even greater sport than it is today".



Putting the users point of view on behalf of the S.S.A.A., Field and Game and the Firearms Traders was Geoff Rabbidge. In his opening comments he said, "I am sure you all agree much

In his opening comments he said, "I am sure you all agree much must be done to improve the present controls for firearm ownership, possession and use in all aspects; recreationally, as a pest control tool, law enforcement, property protection, criminal and vandal misuse."

"Those responsible for legislation and the administering of it, those who sit in judgement and pass out the penalties for misuse, those on committees to care for the interests of the firearm users, by the end of the seventies had moved far away from the rapport that existed in the sixties. A rapport that allowed sensible negotiation on matters of firearms legislation and administration".

He traced the history of firearms control from the 1920's and quoted extensively from Chief Inspector Colin Greenwood's book "Firearms Control".

Using Greenwood's summation of the relationship between legitimate and criminal use of firearms and the fact that Greenwood, said; "attempting to deal with criminal use of firearms by placing, more restrictions on legitimate users is not likely to achieve anything", Mr. Rabbidge took a swipe at the media, the government, unions, police and the magistrates for not heeding Greenwood's warning.

According to Mr. Rabbidge, the media sensationalised the question, union leaders used it as a platform for higher wages, the police did not want to disturb the status quo and magistrates took an ostrich like approach hoping that the problem would go away.

The same people he said were responsible for the ill-will that has developed between the legitimate firearm user and the people that make and administer the laws.

In a very forthright statement on the subject he said: "Lack of imagination or one could even say incompetence by government, public service administrators and police commissioners in the appointments of the wrong people to submit reports and administer departmental sections — the biased or pig-headed approach of many of these people has caused much of the ill-will".

Care must be taken he said to make sure that when new laws are framed, the rights of the lawful firearms user are not infringed by ill conceived and hasty legislation aimed at the criminal. It had been evident over the past few years that the ordinary citizen was being ignored.

Turning to the economic benefit that properly controlled hunting can offer to the community, Mr. Rabbidge quoted extensive figures relating to rabbit control and said that if the rabbit kept surviving the various strains of myxomatosis, in 20 years we could be hunting rabbits in Australia that were as big as the family dog!

"The value of the recreational shooters in controlling feral pig, goat, dog, cat etc., is enormous, and remember, the farmer gets the labour, the tools and the ammunition free", he said.

Touching again on the economics of restrictive firearms laws he pointed out that we in Australia have a great variety of control, from easy in Queensland to very restrictive in Western Australia. This, he said, should give us some answers as to the effectiveness of the control of recreational firearms users.

"It is a statistical fact", he said, "that where populations are larger and more concentrated, crime is higher, so if firearms controls of responsible citizens worked, Western Australia's crimes of violence with firearms should be the lowest but it is not so".

Proponents of tighter gun controls suggest that if only one life is saved by the controls, then it is worth it, a fallacious argument he said. The money could be better spent in educating youngsters in the safe handling and use with greater saving of life and a more responsible citizen as a result.

Looking to the '80s he put a series of suggestions to the conference that might help in the fight to save the sporting shooter.

The first thing he said was to improve our public image and impress on the media at all times that those who promote fear of the gun for their own gain are a blight on the community as a whole.

The recreational shooter must be fully utilized in the control of noxious animals with the resulting economic gain and reduction of stupid waste in the National Parks services throughout the country.

Economic methods for the education of young people must be introduced and he cited the example in Victoria where hunter ethics were being taught in schools. It was the best example of enlightened thinking on the subject for many years according to Mr. Rabbidge. The same program will dramatically reduce vandalism with firearms in that state also, he said.

Criminal mis-use was a subject that had a lot to do with the judiciary he said and whilst "no one wants to see the judiciary's flexibility impaired", "if magistrates and judges, are not realistic in their handing out of penalties, then minimum penalties for firearm mis-use must be introducted to prove a real dettent".

Concluding his address, he listed a number of good books that outlined the approach taken to restrictive gun laws overseas and mentioned briefly the problem of hoise pollution. He made mention that he was amazed, "how we Australians bury our heads in the sand and do not learn and profit from overseas research and experience", and urged all to become better informed and more critical of any moves to restrict the lawful use of firearms.



Opening the thrust of the conference to the sensitive police attitude to firearms legislation was the Secretary of the Police Federation of Australia and New Zealand.

In a hesitant start to his address. Mr. Bob Page related to the conference the sorry spectacle of the Miami riots in the U.S.A. and related them to the problems associated with easy access to firearms in an urban environment.

He pointed out that the members of his association were not opposed to the right of responsible people to own firearms and he added "Nor do we seek to inhibit lawful use".

"What we do believe however, is that the community as a whole is entitled to be protected from the misuse of firearms and that those that do own them should be properly aware of how to handle their firearms and also to ensure their safekeeping so that they do not readily fall into the hands of others, be they inexperienced members of their own families, or people with criminal activities in mind".

Outling his association's policy on the private ownership of firearms, Mr. Page listed the Federation's four platform decisions. Quoting them to the conference, he said: "Firstly, all firearms should be registered and recorded in a similar manner to pistols. Secondly, the registered owners of all firearms should be required by law to provide proper security for the weapons. Thirdly, that there be a form of control on the number of weapons which each individual can own and anyone requiring more than 3 weapons be called on to show good reason. Finally, that uniform legislation and penalties be enacted by the Various Governments of Australia to assist in the control of firearms".

Stressing the point that current estimates put the number of privately owned firearms at 4 million, and that the police were not so naive to think that registration would stop the criminal misuse, he believed that some sort of start had to be made to make weapons more traceable.

"An effort must be made also", he said; "to enable more effective enforcement of our desire that owners of weapons should be held legally responsible for their proper security".

Quoting N.S.W. armed holdup figures and the increasing use of sawn-off weapons, Mr. Page told the conference that his members in that state were agitating for the issue of an automatic shotgun to each police vehicle.

"Some of our members are so concerned about the risks they face of criminal attack by offenders armed with shotguns and rifles that they have resorted to carrying their own privately owned shotguns in police vehicles, which, although not a satisfactory practice, helps to place them on an equal footing with armed offenders", he said.

Again quoting N.S.W. figures, he stressed the requirement of the Federation that there should be police powers to force people to ensure greater security for their firearm, which as he said: "Is after all a highly lethal weapon designed to kill living things".

Talking about the Federation's policy on the 3 gun limit, and again quoting market survey figures from N.S.W., Tasmania and Victoria that some 700,000 people own 3 guns or more and 300,000 own 5 guns or more, he said: "We chose the nominal limit of 3 weapons on the premise that a keen shooter may wish to have a light calibre rifle, a heavy calibre rifle and a shotgun".

Mr. Page expressed alarm at the gunshot mortality rate in Australia. From figures quoted, he drew the conclusion that novices in the handling of firearms (of less than 4 years experience) were responsible for the majority of accidental and deliberate unlawful shootings.

"The training of people who are buying weapons is an area of reform that has been virtually ignored by all of our governments. I believe that the shooter, like the motorist, should have to pass some tests of his basic knowledge and ability to handle a firearm", he said.

Commenting on current legislation, he said that the new firearms laws in the Northern Territory and South Australia were welcomed by Federation members. He compared both with some aspects of the Western Australian laws insofar as registration of firearms was concerned.

In a scathing attack on the eastern states, he said: "So far as the legislation in New South Wales is concerned we believe it is almost farcical and in its present form of requiring a person carrying a firearm only outside his own property to have a 'shooters licence', has virtually no effect upon the control of firearms and is in fact an imposition on shooters. Victorian legislation has almost identical provisions".

"Tasmania has virtually no controls on firearms other than the usual controls on pistols and in Queensland, as long as you can stand up straight, and are 17 years-of-age, you can buy anything that you like as long as it is more than 57cm in length".

Concluding his address, Mr. Page, in very blunt terms, told the conference that his Federation in pressing for tighter gun laws, did not think that they would have an immediate effect on criminal misuse.

"It is a long term project", he said, "which because of the long delay in introducing satisfactory legislation in the most populous parts of Australia, has already allowed millions of firearms to circulate in the eastern part of our country virtually unchecked and uncontrolled".

"However, if it results in compulsory training of shooters and compulsory safe keeping of firearms, in the short term such legislation must be viewed as worthwhile in the lives it saves injuries it prevents", was his final comment.



BOOK REVIEW JOHN CLSON'S BOOK OF THE SHOTGUN

(By Pat Browne) Published by Jolex Inc.

Distributed in Australia by Begonia Book Supply.



The Jolex range of shooting and outdoors publications is relatively new to the Australian scene. In the typically American style of soft covered, magazine size this book joins the range of Follett Publications on the Australian market. This publication joins 'John Olson's Book Of The Rifle' to make a pair.

The book is 256 pages of good information, quite a lot of it is very American orientated particularly the chapters on trap, skeet, waterfowl hunting and upland gunning. The rest however is good information. The book is profusely illustrated with line and halftone and the printing is crisp and easy to read.

In nineteen chapters Olsen covers most basic topics to do with smoothbores, starting with the barrel and covering actions and stocks. The shotshell itself gets a good going over with chapters on the shell itself, the reloading of the empty and patterning techniques. Other chapters cover the basics of wingshooting, the youngsters first shotgun, cleaning and maintenance and some excellent gunsmithing tips. There is a section devoted to the muzzle loaders and another on special purpose guns and accessories. Finally there is a sketchy catalogue section that deals with a fair range of the guns available on the American market.

In all, this book is a good one to have on the shelf for someone who wishes to have a general overview of the shotgun and its uses, whilst written for the American reader, it has enough solid information to make it worthwhile for the Australian reader.

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This classic Trap model with 30" barrels and medium stock is an excellent opportunity for a discerning purchaser to obtain this rare masterpiece.

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Shooters who reload everything from 12 gauge goose loads to 410 gauge skeet loads will find plenty of versatility in the 155, in addition to fast, easy operation. Pacific's 155 is a top-quality reloader, carefully manufactured of finest materials to provide many years of heavy service.



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At the Grand American Championships this month a most prestigious event will take place. It is not a shooting match, but a ceremony to induct several new members into the 'Trapshooting Hall of Fame'.

One of these inductees will be Betty Ann Foxworthy, a person well known to a lot of Australian trapshooters. She and husband Roy have visited our shores on several occasions. The last time we had the pleasure of a visit was at the last Perth Nationals.

Americans have a great belief in honouring persons who do things for them. The Hall of Fame concept is one way of thanking people for their efforts as well a preserving vital history.

Betty Ann of course is known to us as past Editor of 'Trap & Field',

the official publication of the Amateur Trapshooting Association. Her citation reveals a depth of commitment that belies that eversmiling walking encyclopedia of shooting knowledge.

An honours graduate of Butler University in Indianapolis, Betty Ann started with 'Trap — Field' in December 1956. Since that time she has spent countless hours making the magazine a top quality publication. She has travelled thousands of kilometers a year to report shooting achievements in a bright and forthright manner.

Her work in preserving records and photographic material has formed the very broad base on which the history of trapshooting rests in the United States. She has served on nearly all of the committees of the ATA, the Hall of Fame selection committee, the Biographical committee, set up the Hall of Fame inauguration and dedication ceremonies and served on the Youth governing board which is involved with college shooting programs.

Her deep knowledge of shooters has made her a valuable member of the All-American Team Selection Committee and her collaboration with Jimmy Robinson saw the publication of the book "All-American Trapshooting Teams" in 1979. Through her association with 'Trap & Field' she implemented and

Through her association with 'Trap & Field' she implemented and promoted 'Operation Red Wagon' to help Vietnamese children. This effort earned for the ATA a Marine Corps Commendation.

On the public relations front, Betty Ann ran a 3 year ATA new membership contest, boosted trapshooting with PR mailings to gun clubs and produced the first four-colour ATA promotional brochure.

A champion of private gun ownership, she has appeared at Congressional hearings in Washington on more than one occasion to protect shooters Constitutional rights. Her editorials on American rights have been widely sought by non shooting publications and she has written thousands of words on the sport for other publications. She is widely sought as a commentator on radio and television and is often consulted by local sportswriters (including this one!).

We know Betty Ann and husband Roy (1960 Grand American Handicap Winner) from the trapshooting tours they have promoted to this country. The tours have initiated a wonderful exchange of views and visits between the USA and Australia and it is hoped that they will continue for years to come.

When Betty Ann was named at editor of 'Trap & Field' in 1960 it was said of her, "Betty Ann is dedicated to the sport and is fast becoming a walking Who's Who on the people behind the gun'. In the intervening 20 years she has become the sport's premier journalist and the pulse of the trapshooting world through the pages of Trap & Field.

Betty Ann retired from her publishing role in 1979 and now acts as a consulting editor but her success in a field that has been traditionally known as a man's job has led her to being named in "Who's Who Among American Women".

So on August 19th when she receives the highest accolade her sport can bestow, we 'Down Under' will be thinking of her.

Being a student of the Aussie vernacular she will appreciate a 'good on yer mate' ... 'yer bloody well deserve it'.

You get another type of shooter who will endeavour to win by talking their opponents out of it, again these shooters show a lack of confidence in their own skills, the need to win is above the requirement of sportsmanship and shooting etiquette.

I found over many years of shooting, that bad decisions were always offset by good ones and that the referees in the main did the best they could.

I was more than prepared to let the referee do the refereeing while I did the shooting. I felt that I had enough to do concentrating on each shot, without trying to referee it too.

NATIONALS '81...

Whew! We no sooner tie off the loose ends following the successful 1980 Australian Trap and Skeet Championships, and it is time to undertake detailed planning for the 1981 series.

The tournament, to be held at Melbourne Gun Club in Victoria, is expected to attract over 700 entries from all states of Australia and from overseas

The organising committee has recently announced the appoint-ment of Mr Brian Clark as Tournament Director. Mr Clark is a Melbourne solicitor and a keen member of Melbourne Gun Club. He has had extensive sports administration experience and was Tournament Director for the 29th World Archery Championships, conducted in Canberra in 1977. This match was hosted by the Australian Archery Association of which Brian Clark's brother John is the National Secretary.

Chairman of the organising committee is Mr Bob Buchan, who is also President of the Vistorian Clay Target Association and President of Melbourne Gun Club. Mr Buchan has recently told CTSN that shooting facilities for the '81 Nationals will include six skeet fields and nine trap fields. This maintains the club's position as the best equipped in Australia - it also provides two Olympic trenches and four ISU skeet grounds.

Mr Buchan went on to say that he was hoping to see a very large display of shooting and hunting equipment and accessories installed at his club during the tournament. In addition, "day use only" caravans will be available for rental on the ground, at a moderate fee. (IT SHOULD BE NOTED THAT NO CAMPING WILL BE AL-LOWED ON THE GROUND).

For the first time in recent memory, the Nationals tournament is to coincide with Easter. This should make it easier for families to attend, and the organisers are hoping to provide many suggestions for alternative attractions for the non-shooters.

The program schedule is as follows:

Friday April 17, 1981 - Practice only, during limited hours. (Good Friday)

Sat. April 18 - Australian Skeet Championship

Sun. April 19 - Australian Single Barrel Championship

Mon. April 20 - Australian Double Barrel Championship

Tues. April 21 - Australia/New Zealand Trap Championship

plus Interstate Trap Teams' Match Wed. April 22 - Mackintosh Match & Australian Double Rise C'ship plus Comark Deauville Doubles Trophy Thurs. April 23 - Grand Australian Handicap

Friday April 22 - Champion of Champions Cup. On the evening of Friday April 24, a Presentation Dinner will be held. This will follow a similar format to the one used so successfully at Adelaide in 1978 and Griffith in 1979. More details, including venue will be announced as they become available.

The program next year will include a novel additional event. Sponsored by Commercial Marketing Company of Sydney, the event will be a deauville doubles match, and entry will be restricted to family pairs. Conditions are that the two shooters in each team must be blood relatives and must be at least one generation apart.

For example, a man and his father could enter — likewise a woman and her grandson would be eligible. This is a great idea to promote family involvement and the management of Commercial Marketing Company (the Rabbidge clan) is to be commended for its initiative.

Accommodation is already being placed under great pressure by early bookings. In the next issue of CTSN a detailed summary of available accommodation will be listed. Once more, Ansett Airlines of Australia is providing a travel and accommodation service for those travelling by air and enquiries should be directed to your local Ansett booking office.

"Super Apex" and "Apex" airfares can dramatically reduce travel costs, particularly in cases where competitors are travelling alone. Savage increases in car running costs have meant that discounted air fares can be made to look quite attractive.

There can be no doubt that the 1981 Australian Trap and Skeet Championships will be the biggest clay target tournament ever conducted in Australia - will you be part of it?



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MOSCOW GAMES – DAMNED OR BE DAMNED?

Some readers may remember my article titled "Shooting In Other Places", which appeared in a previousissue of CTSN. At the time of its writing, I was high up in the Labour and Union movement in Victoria. In the article I omitted that I visited the USSR, Poland and Hungary as well as other Soviet dominated countries. The reason for not mentioning these visits is too complex to list. However, I now discuss the issues because I back the Prime Minister in his boycott of the 1980 Olympic Games. However, I don't agree with the Prime Minister's running of the country as it stands, but it is not for me to criticize him or his Government in our "Politics-free" shooters' magazine. The reason for my opposition to an Australian entry in Moscow is complex but as I have been there recently, maybe I can throw some light on the subject.

On entering East Germany at check point Charlie, my wife and I with others on the bus (47 in all) had firmly stuck in our minds the dreadful sight of the Berlin wall which all of us viewed standing on a platform on scaffolding. This has been erected by the west to show the wall and the wire loops and mines and machine gun posts to the tourists. I even saw what appeared to be children's graves - reportedly shot while trying to escape to the west . On approaching the check point, one was astonished why any Government could fence in its citizens so cruelly. At check point Charlie it became a James Bond type of situation for me as I had in my passport my shooters licence and this didn't go over too well with the dedicated young communist guards who spoke and looked at me and all on the bus as if we drank lemon juice for breakfast, dinner and tea.

What the guards would not accept was the fact that I didn't have the gun with me. We were all bundled off the warm bus and searched, including luggage. The bus was subjected to the "pit of mirrors" before we were given the "all clear". After putting the fear of the devil in me, my view of 4 hours earlier was accepted and we were pushed out of the room with a "100 rounds a minute stick". They reported me on official paper to the British Embassy in East Germany for being unhelpful. I will never forget check point Charlie with its huge white lights everywhere, guard dogs, machine gun posts and side-car guards carrying machine guns patrolling its perimeters. One must remember that all this is to keep people in the country, not out. Maybe one day, Australia may do this to keep people from coming into the lucky country when the USSR takes over the rest of the world.

On leaving Germany and entering Poland one was amazed to find a check point on the border. Who would want to escape from Poland into East Germany? It's all the same and just as bad! One thing that struck me was the fact that at the Polish check point, not even a bird was heard to be whistling. It was as if even they knew!

Poland has a sad and depressing history. Hitler had his concentration camps there and murdered millions there. She has suffered from war more times than enough and now the Russians have the population mainly Catholics, living like peasants. They are subjected to rules and doctrine enforced on them by Moscow.

Passing through Poland on the way to view a concentration camp, was a very depressing experience - no fences, bad roads, houses and shops dilapidated.

Once while in Warsaw, I was doing a calculation on a pocket calculator in a subway (American dollars to Polish currency). Within seconds, office workers finishing work crowded around in such numbers that Polish Police told me to put it away and move on. Apparently, they had never seen one, but knew what it was, so it gives you some idea of "big-brother's" efforts to stop the native population from knowing too much.

The shops in Poland stocked really outdated rubbish, and most of it was Russian. Drab old footwear (all the same kind, women's and men's) perfume one brand same smell all types, and of course, you form a queue to buy, as all items are scarce. At times I watched queues of a hundred people waiting to get meat and tobacco — something our wives would not do, even be shocked at the thought.

I felt sorry for the young women in Poland as some of them had the prettiest faces I have seen, but lacked the happy facial expressions and eyeshadow, and western clothes and shoes, which my wife and other women in our party had. Everywhere we went, these girls would openly stare at my wife's clothes. I suppose they would have been prejudiced towards us.

Hungary was similar to Poland, although the people were more willing to mix. They are "supervised" by three Divisions of Soviet troops which can be seen strolling down the shopping areas, chatting and laughing amongst themselves. It is an offence to talk to Hungarians or collaborate with the Hungarians in any way.

It amazes me how the International Olympic Committee could give the Russian Government the Games with all the suppression it's got on these people, mainly the Baltic States - Poland, Hungary, Rumania and now Afghanistan, with East Germany of course.

On leaving Poland, one was left with an almost stunned numbness, in relation to how could it happen - how can I get them out, how could I get the Hungarians out with them?, were questions that raced through the minds of all our group.

At a place called Smolensk in Russia, we had our first taste of the Hammer and Sickle - it had to be seen to be believed!

Saturday afternoon, hundreds of people mingle around the shopping centre shops with hardly anything in them, no cars to be seen at all, and only two young men on a motor cycle and side-car roaring up and down the street. I later tried to speak to them but they wouldn't stop. This was the place where we saw women carrying water in large bottles. I suppose it was for drinking purposes as there didn't appear to be any house plumbing here either. On leaving Smolensk, we noticed huge advertising boards which our guide said were propaganda (these terms are my words of course). Passing through the countryside, women were seen to be washing clothes in small dams next to the family home because there is no piped water here and no plumbing.

On arrival in Moscow, after passing through many towns similar to the above we viewed for the first time the capital of the most suppressive country in the world today. Its leaders not being happy with the "top half" are very quickly and expertly taking over the "bottom half"

Their forces are expertly trained and fed, and the size is frightening. As we viewed the Revolution Day celebrations, we realised just how large the number of personnel and the equipment was. Huge rockets, tanks, planes flying overhead, but not just one of each. Hundreds of each, in my opinion, enough to take the world!

One thing that occurred to me about this equipment was that it was for taking free countries, peace loving people, and taking their rights and freedom of movement.

While in Moscow, one could bridge the gap left by being a Socialist in a Democratic country i.e. Australia, Canada or United States. My intention in Moscow was to see the Metro rail system and rail locomotives (I am a train driver with Vic rail). The guides from the rail system seemed restricted in their views, but showed us a lot, although we were not allowed to take photos of some military convoys.

Well, now one wonders what all this has to do with the 1980 Olympic Games. Let's look closely at why Moscow should have been allocated the Games in the first place. It is a country which at the moment, denies people either a telephone or freedom of travel. Once left the country, you are a "traitor" to the people. It is a country



where I believe that outspoken citizens are sent to a mental institute and experimented on with drugs. The alternative is to be sent to an industrial town where one is separated from every one else, except in labour camps.

Why should we as Australians, entertain this country, which has people in their millions locked in against their will. In places such as Poland, Estonia, Armenia, Ukrainia, Rumania, Hungary, Czechoslavakia, East Germany, Latvia, Bulgaria and now Mongolia and Afghanistan, the same situation exists. Who is next - Iran, Africa? Make no mistake about it, out go telephone, newspapers, car, pop record, modern household items, consumer goods of all kinds, meeting places banned, tattslotto, horse racing, poker machines and holidays without a pass, all for the cause of the people and State! How can we compete and enjoy ourselves in the USSR when all these things are going on under our noses.



So I think you can see what it's like by now. As I said before, I agree with the P.M. that they have gone far enough. Let's stop them otherwise we will be shooting for the USSR, carrying the "Australian" flag. C

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




• Neil Berry (right) Winner of the West Darling Double Barrel Championship, pictured with Bruce Gilby.




The club wishes to thank all competitors especially those who travelled vast distances, and hope they will return for the silver city championships in September.

Special thanks to the ladies committee, and Tom Davis who excelled himself by cooking the pig and sheep for Saturday night's dinner.



In an interesting development, Eley has introduced a quarterly newspaper, known as "The Eley Report".

In the inaugural issue, clay target topics dominate with a detailed report of happenings during the 1980 National Trap and Skeet Championships.

The issue also shows an organisation chart of the total IMI operation in Australia. It is interesting to note that Eley Ammunition is one of FOUR wholly owned subsidiaries. IMI also holds a majority shareholding in a further four Australian companies.

The only remaining manufacturing activity controlled by Eley in Australia is the lead plant, from which lead shot and "Wasp" air rifle pellets are still produced.

In another recent addition to the range, a finely-made Australian produced high performance .22 rimfire cartridge is now available. Marketed under the "Supreme" brand name, Eley is expecting to secure a substantial market share with the new product.

In another initiative, Ron Clarke, general manager of Eley Ammunition, has written the first of a series of monthly newsletters, directed at retailers.

It is interesting to note the final paragraph which read: "Stocks rely upon balanced predictions — unfortunately in 1979/80 we were too conservative and budgetted our expected sales at well below what we actually achieved. Naturally stocks constantly ran out.

I must accept full responsibility. My only excuse was that it was, after all, my first year and I just did not know what to expect. We underestimated the loyalty within Australia for the longest established brand on the market.

1980/81 will be different. No one is infallible and there will be some delays. But these will be minimal — I guarantee it.

Above all, we will be persisting with our pledged corporate responsibility to help our customers sell more Eley products, quicker without over-extending themselves."

There has been a further change in agency management in the eastern states for Perazzi shotguns. Under the banner of International Arms, Peter Wray had been selling Perazzis' for the past couple of years.

\$22,000 Clubhouse Opened (Staff Writer)

JUNE 16, 1980 - a big day for Wangaratta Gun Club, located in the Ovens Valley in North Eastern Victoria.

The occasion was the opening of the club's new clubrooms - a project valued at over \$22,000.

Formed in 1914 as a combined live target and clay target club, the Wangaratta Gun Club has experienced the usual "ups and downs" that affect all clubs.

After having to cease operations during World War I, the club reformed in 1919 as the Wangaratta North Gun Club, and was located on a site at the rear of one of the area's most historic hotels, the "Vine'

Over the years, the club committee has from time to time considered re-establishing the operation on a new site. Each time, the convenience of the site combined with the very cordial relationship that the club had developed with the owners of the "Vine" Hotel (who also owned the ground on which the club was based) proved to be a telling argument for remaining on its present site.

More recently, the club, which by now had changed its name to Wangaratta Gun Club, was offered a most attractive option of a long term rental of the grounds. The club immediately accepted and then decided to build a permanent club room. This was to replace the rather ramshackle shelter that had been used as a combined clubhouse and office for many years.

The official opening was the culmination of tremendous sacrifices by various of the club's energetic members led by the dedicated President, Ray Lawford.


The new building houses a fully equipped kitchen, the club office and a large social area with a glass wall that provides an excellent view of the shooting ground.

The opening ceremony was performed by the Hon. L. Lieberman, the Member for Benambra in the Victorian Legislative Assembly. Mr Lieberman was introduced by President Ray Lawford who made particular reference to the dedicated efforts performed by so many individuals in the development and erection of the building.

In his address, Mr Lieberman made special mention to the selfhelp program that had been used so effectively by the Wangaratta Gun Club. He also acknowledged the significant contribution the club is making to the community with its regular student training sessions in safe handling of firearms. This was an interesting comment, as such programs should have the long term effect of improv-

ing the general public attitude towards firearms, which in turn may take some of the hysteria out of the "anti-firearms" policies. Mr Lieberman also said that the establishment of such a fine social facility in North Eastern Victoria should have the effect of attracting large attendances to future tournaments, which will improve the tourist industry as well.

Australia's first ever official entry in the Home International DTL Tournament conducted by the Clay Pigeon Shooting Association of Great Britain, is currently still overseas.



NEW ZEALAND, 1981

The New Zealand Clay Target Shooting Association has advised that the 1981 New Zealand Nationals will be conducted at the Hamilton Combined Gun Club on the North Island from March 14 to 20, 1981.

Meanwhile, the other important news to come out of New Zealand is that Ivan Boyce, of Christchurch, is the new NZCTA President.

Earlier this year, a Presidential ballot resulted in a tied vote — Don Frewin of Palmerston North and Ivan Boyce were the two nominees to fill the vacancy left by the retirement of Colin Stott.

Mr Stott had been president for a number of years during which the sport in New Zealand improved considerably.

However, one of the areas in which there remains room for improvement is the level of co-operation between New Zealand and Australia. Issues such as standard rules, development of international competition and common handicapping arrangements all need attention, and the Australian Clay Target Association will continue to press for consideration to be given in these matters.

In fact, there is no reason why the two associations shouldn't convene a meeting of top executive people once a year to promote the theme of greater unity. This suggestion was first made in 1977, but was discarded because of high costs.

Since then, air fare structures have changed significantly, and perhaps the idea should be resurrected.

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PESTA SUKAN 1980

A team of privately entered Australians has left to compete in the annual Pesta competition in Singapore.

This year, a large international entry is expected and the numbers of individual entries has been limited to ensure that the program runs smoothly.

Mr Stephen Yap, Secretary of the Singapore Shooting has advised that the standard of the local competitors has improved quite noticeably since last year, and visitors will find medals hard to come by.

NEW CALEDONIA 1980

The Seventh Open Ball Trap Championships of New Caledonia will be hosted by the Club de Tir Caledonien from October 10 to October 18, 1980.

The official program will be issued shortly, and details should be available from the ACTA office.

The tournament will include events for I.S.U. Skeet, Parcours de Chasse, Universal Trench and Ball Trap. This is an exciting mix, and will be conducted under the banner of FITASC, as major international controlling body.

ACTA members who are considering travelling to this tournament should contact the nearest office of Jetset Tours. Remember to ask about travel grant applications when booking — these are only available through offices of Jetset Tours.

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In the Asian Shooting Championships conducted in Manila earlier this year, some excellent performances were recorded.

MAJOR CONFERENCE OF EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS HELD IN NATIONAL CAPITAL

(Staff Writer)

Thirty of Australia's top sports associations were represented by their full time administrators at a two day conference held in Canberra late in June.

The Federal Government, through the Department of Home Affairs hosted the conference, known as the National Executive Director's Workshop.

The Sports Advisory Council, which acts in an advisory capacity to the Minister, The Hon R.J. Ellicott, was represented by its Chairman Mr Jim Barry and two other members – Mrs Audrey James of Western Australia and Mr Gus Staunton of Sydney.

The Department of Home Affairs was represented by Paul Brettell, Geoff Strang, David Lalor and Jack McGee, although all staff made a point of joining the conference from time to time. This provided all concerned with a wonderful opportunity to put faces to names. In this way, general relationships are improved quite markedly.

The discussion ranged over a long list of topics related to sports development and promotion. Fortunately, the bitter controversy over Australia's involvement in the 1980 Olympic Games was a "taboo" subject, and the group stuck to more constructive and productive matters.

Many of the attendees had been appointed as a result of Federal Government funding assistance. It is of interest to note that the Government now has an annual commitment exceeding \$800,000 for full time administrators and directors of coaching. (The Australian Clay Target Association receives an annual grant of \$20,000 to assist in the funding of its National Coaching Director, Newton Thomas.)

Two major resolutions came out of the workshop. The first commended the Confederation of Australian Sport for its initiative in establishing the South East Asian and Pacific Region Committee of the International Assembly of the Confederation of Sport.

the International Assembly of the Confederation of Sport. The second was promoted by the ACTA' and called for the establishment of a national club administrator's training and accreditation course. The motion read: "...that this conference recommends to the Department of Home Affairs, and through it to all State Government Departments responsible for sports development, that an urgent action be taken to liaise with the Confederation of Australian Sport in the establishment of a standard club administrators' training course.

Further, that the above group define and prepare standard "sport general" material, to which all interested participating sports can then add the "sports specific" content before implementation."

Both these subjects have exciting and far-reaching consequences for the shooting sports. For many years, the high cost of securing international competition for shooting athletes has been a severe burden.

The development of an alternative competition theatre in the near Asian and Pacific areas will substantially reduce travel expenses and still provide international "hardening" for competitors. (It is interesting to note that the ACTA is already well advanced with a plan to enter an official team in an international tournament to be conducted in Bangkok, Thailand, in December this year.)

Turning now to the second matter, that of club administrators' education, there has been a serious need to upgrade sports administration standards for many years.

The Federal Government started the ball rolling when it implemented a policy of providing financial assistance to National sporting associations for the employment of full time executive directors.

Additionally, some states have designed and implemented training programs for club secretaries. The most successful of these courses are running in Western Australia and South Australia, where tangible benefits are being shown.

However, two things have become patently obvious. One, there needs to be some sort of co-ordination so all courses proceed along the same basic path, and two, sports need to add their own "peculiar" content to make the basics applicable to their needs.

Already, clay target club administrators are being trained in Queeensland by the Queensland Clay Target Association. Further, at the recent ACTA Conference for State Association Presidents and

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Editor's Mailbox...

Dear Sir,

I have just read the July edition of the ACTA news, and was very interested in the Pat Browne column "Shooting a Line" about the ATA type of shooting. Mr Barney Rooke of Wagga Gun Club has been running some ATA events at Wagga, including the American angles which would have to be brought in with this single barrel type of shooting. I think that Barney with his wealth of experience in this type of shooting in America, can see this is the answer to the high cost of double barrel shooting here in Australia and is gauging shooters reaction in this area. Also, Ganmain Gun Club has been running these events fairly frequently. I have not heard of any complaints from shooters of either club.

With the high cost of buying a double barrel gun coupled with the high cost of reloading components, I see many shooters giving this wonderful sport away as they simply cannot afford to keep on shooting. Some only shoot once a month.

 \overline{I} think if Australia changed over to the ATA style of shooting you would find it would encourage numerous shooters back into the sport, as well as attracting new members and tourist shooters from overseas.

The cost of a single barrel gun would be negligible compared with even a cheap superposed gun and the cost of one shell at a time instead of two would tend to cut in half the cost of shooting, to many shooters.

I think Pat Browne is definitely on the right track here and I hope you publish this letter in your fine magazine to gauge the reaction of other shooters who I am sure would be in favour of this type of shooting.

Dear Noel

The following quotation appeared in the 'Australian Clay Target Shooting Magazine Volume 33 – No. 5 May 1980, page 36.

'One of the drawbacks of locating the ACTA Competition Headquarters in Canberra is that the number of tourist attractions is limited. This becomes a factor of some significance when we consider the number of families that use the annual championship series as their annual holiday.'

Such a statement indicates very little research on the part of the author and as might be expected warrants reparative comment.

To make such a statement suggests that the staff writer or other party acting on his behalf has made a survey of Canberra's tourist attractions. However, there is no record of a delegate or other representative of the ACTA ever having held discussions with the ACT Government Tourist Bureau. Therefore, how can such a sweeping assertion about the number and variety of tourist attractions or lack thereof be made?

A quick study of Canberra's tourism statistics certainly proves the fallacy of the ACTA staff writer's statement, inter alia:

- a. Canberra, the Nation's capital, is classified as a non industrial city; accordingly, it has the added attractiveness of fractional noise and environmental pollution by comparison with the State capitals and provincial cities. Canberra's one big industry is tourism. As it is sponsored by the Federal Government, it is better funded, organized and promoted than local or State Government competition. The product is readily available information on all the attractions and better value for money with each tour or activity selected.
- b. Canberra's tourist facilities and attractions are constantly being expanded and improved. Now there is the High Court of Australia Building to inspect and the Black Mountain Telecommunications Tower to contemplate as an engineering masterpiece and from which one can take in the full panorama of the city and its environs as you enjoy the cuisine in the revolving restaurant or look from the viewing platform. Foremost of the many other attractions in Canberra are:

Government House Australian War Memorial Parliament House Prime Minister's Lodge Royal Australian Mint National Library American War Memorial Royal Military College Duntroon Australian Science Academy Australian Institute of Anatomy Embassies and Diplomatic Residences Civic - Woden - Belconnen - City Centres Blundell's Farmhouse The Carillon Commonwealth Park **Botanical Gardens** c. Around Canberra there are many other locations of equal in-

 Around Canoerra mere are many other locations of equal meterest with scenic variety en-route: Tidbinbilla Nature Reserve Gudgenby Nature Reserve Snowy Mountains — Kosciusko National Park Lanyon Homestead — Sidney Nolan Art Collection Cuppacumbalong Arts and Craft Centre Gundaroo Pub Ginninderra Falls Mount Stromlo Observatory Ororal Valley and Tidbinbilla Tracking Stations Cockington Green Miniature Village Cotter Dam and Reserve

Most of these locations include points of historical interest and are served by bus tours on a regular basis. Self drive tours are available and cater for those wishing to remain independent.

d. In terms of accommodation, Canberra is amply served with

top class guest houses, hostels, caravan parks, hotels and motels. This has resulted from a fast growth in the number of visitors to the Territory — 2.5 million in 1978/79 and rising faster than most other places in Australia. Cahberra's visitor accommodation potential is way in front with a population per available hotel/motel room ratio of 116. Comparative ratios are:

QLD 150, NSW 180, VIC 259, TAS 114, SA 206, WA 159, NT 75. National Average 182.

e. Similarly, Canberra is well served with restaurants. Aside from the numerous take-away food outlets and BYO restaurants, in 1979 Canberra had one licensed restaurant for every 1300 head of population. This compares favourably with NSW - 1:4000 and VIC - 1:7500.

The above details were supplied by the ACT Government Tourist Bureau and extracted from the Parliamentary Hansard. Should there be further concern by the ACTA National Executive over the aspect of tourism in respect of the best venue for the 'ACTA Competition Headquarters', the merits of Canberra in relation to every other city are readily available from the Department of Home Affairs — Sport and Recreation Section.

However, the quotation under discussion begs the question in respect of principal criteria when choosing a site for a National Shooting Headquarters. Is it the tourist consideration or the availability of a suitable parcel of land at a price Clay Target shooters can afford and get in as close proximity to all the amenities desired by interstate and international visitors? Driven by cost constraints and the requirement for well drained, flat land with good background and aspect for year round day and night multi discipline shooting, free of urban encroachment and consequent disturbance complaints, and large enough to enclose 32 DTL Layouts, 7 Skeet and 4 Trench, surely the principal criterion is the LAND and not the TOURIST ATTRACTIONS. An analysis will show that not only can Canberra satisfy the land requirements — for a comparatively negligible outlay and upkeep — but also that the location of the land will be closer to the desired amenities and 'tourist attractions' alluded to in the quotation. Furthermore, the proposed National Shooting Complex — combining all the shooting disciplines — will result in far better social amenities at the grounds than would otherwise be possible if it were solely for Clay Target shooters.


The land set aside in Canberra for the proposed National Shooting Complex is 8 km from the GPO, 13 km from Queanbeyan and 2 km from the airport. The area is approximately 500 acres – more than enough to accommodate all the shooting disciplines.

As with all the land in the ACT, land tenure is leasehold. Advice to hand is that the land to be granted will have a lease of at least 50 years and most probably the usual 99 year tenure. In accordance with the Department of Capital Territory policy, the rates payable on the property over the years will be minimal as we shooters, the lessees, are a self help, non profitable, sporting organization.

Then of course there is the need for development subsidies. Our research indicates that a National Shooting Complex in Canberra will attract far greater sponsorship and subsidies for its initial development and later in support of the shooting activities than elsewhere in Australia. Together with the requirement for serviced land at the least cost, methods to minimize operating costs must not be overlooked.

Accordingly, where else in Australia can there be such a bright future for National and International shooting competition at a price the average shooter can afford?

Narrogin Shooter Wins Cup Again









My feelings on the Olympic boycott are fairly well known. In fact I have put in words some fairly forthright statements on the subject as far as the shooting sports are concerned. In a nutshell, I don't think we should be in Moscow. But then again there are those that disagree, and I respect their opinion.

However I find that when people ride roughshod over the time and effort that other people put into making organisations work, I get fairly stroppy.

I refer, of course, to the debacle of the smallbore smallminded mob and the disgraceful exhibition of taking their parent organisation to the Supreme Court to stop them withdrawing Ms Hill and Mr Hollister from the Olympic Team.

This action probably in one fell swoop has torpedoed years of work by many dedicated people to get the shooting sports to a level in Australia that we can all be proud of. What an incredible arrogant and selfish attitude.

Sitting at the recent ASA conference in Canberra, I watched as over 100 people sat through interminable hours of talking and discussion, doing the hard yakka to see that Australian shooting sports can go into the 80s with some sort of confidence.

I listened with amazement as the smallbore man Frederick, told the conference that shooting organisations with strong administrations were an impediment to the shooting sports and went on to say "that we should start to move away from isolated little self centred incestuous relationships that we have got at the moment into something that is approaching an organisation such as the NRA in America".

Gee, I would have liked to see the smallbore people in America pull the same act that our smallminded mob here have pulled. I reckon the result would be different, but no, Americans have much more national pride than to do such a despicable thing.

The point that worries me, however, is that the statement was made to a conference of all the shooting affiliates at a time when the smallbore mob were planning to undermine an ASA decision. Smacks of dishonesty or worse a conspiracy.

the top competition required to give us the fine edge needed to win the big ones," he added.

The National training squads being set up now are a great step forward in George's opinion and in a year or two when things develop further the injection of a top international coach will open up new vistas on the world shooting scene for Australia.

"The best thing that has happened to this sport in my lifetime is the National Coaching Council and if we are to progress it must be given every support," he said.

For a 70-year-old who, these days, says he is getting old and lazy and finds it hard to get to work on his game, he sure put it together at Perth.

In his career, an illustrious one, over 400 championships of all levels, club, district, state and Commonwealth have fallen to his expertise.

He can now add a National Skeet title to his Champion of Champions, Double Barrel and Single Barrel National wins.

How do you like that statement 'isolated little self centred relationships' in this context, when the chairman of the smallbore mob said of the injunction, "we should not be bound by political considerations, but should uphold the Olympic ideal ... We were saying that the Australian Shooting Association had no right to pull out our shooters after they had been selected".

That sort of statement coming from a person who was at the time of this conference, secretary and public officer of the ASA (with the full knowledge of what the ASA was all about), is sheer arrogance and a complete denial of everything that the ASA stands for. And the smallbore organisation had the audacity to stand in front of the other organisations such as the Clay Target shooters, the Sporting Shooters, the Pistol Shooters and the Big Bore shooters and tell them that they had an isolated, self centred and incestuous attitude.

All through that conference, I was assured by the smallbore mob that the Supreme Court injunction was simply a personal action by Ms Hill. Like hell it was, it was an action by a group of small minded, arrogant, and selfish people who wanted to thumb their nose at the rest of the shooting sports in this country.

I will not bore you with the fact that the rest of the shooting fraternity accepted the decision of the ASA to withdraw except to say that in my side of the sport, there was one bloke who dearly wanted to go, while the other two and the manager had consciences.

But having shot my mouth off now about it, there are a few things that must be said about selfishness and elitism.

Ms. Hill and Mr. Hollister are but two shooters in the umbrella organisation of the ASA, an organisation that represents 46,000 competitive shooters in this country. These 46,000 persons in their own quiet way are making sacrifices every day to pursue their chosen sport at various levels of competence. I know one that loves clay target shooting so much, he works part time as a barman to earn enough money to shoot. These 46,000 make it possible for the likes of Ms Hill and Mr Hollister to go to international shooting events.

These 46,000 are the little people that build the ranges, run the shoots, clean the toilets, write the letters, sit on their backsides at meetings and do the million and one jobs that allow our better shots to compete at a higher level.

No one will deny the fact that top competitors make huge sacrifices to make the summit of their chosen sport. The real good ones however, that I have met, know, understand and respect the infrastructure that backs their rise to prominence. I have a feeling that Ms Hill and Mr Hollister do not.

Ms Hill was puzzled that the ASA fought hard to have the Supreme Court injunction set aside — perhaps it was because they realised there were more than two people in the ASA!

By the time this column is read, the Games will be over and both Ms Hill and Mr Hollister will be back in Australia. Both will have to live with the rest of us, not as traitors, as some will have you believe, but as two smallminded smallbore shooters that told the other 45,998 of us to "get stuffed".

Mr. Hollister will also have to live with his famous statement that "If you can fight the Australian Government and win, the Russians are nothing".

Words fail me on that one.

Secretaries, there was a unanimous agreement that a real need existed in the sport for a system to make life easier for club administrators. The best way to make life easier is to improve understanding and confidence through education.

The ACTA already has a submission before the Federal Government in which it seeks financial assistance for the introduction of a formal administrators training program within this sport, and the Association is certain to slot into whatever overall scheme is introduced nationally.

Ultimately, the training program will lead to some form of accreditation, similar to the system that is now established in the coaching area.

The Executive Directors' Workshop was a most successful project and should become an annual feature of the sports development program.
