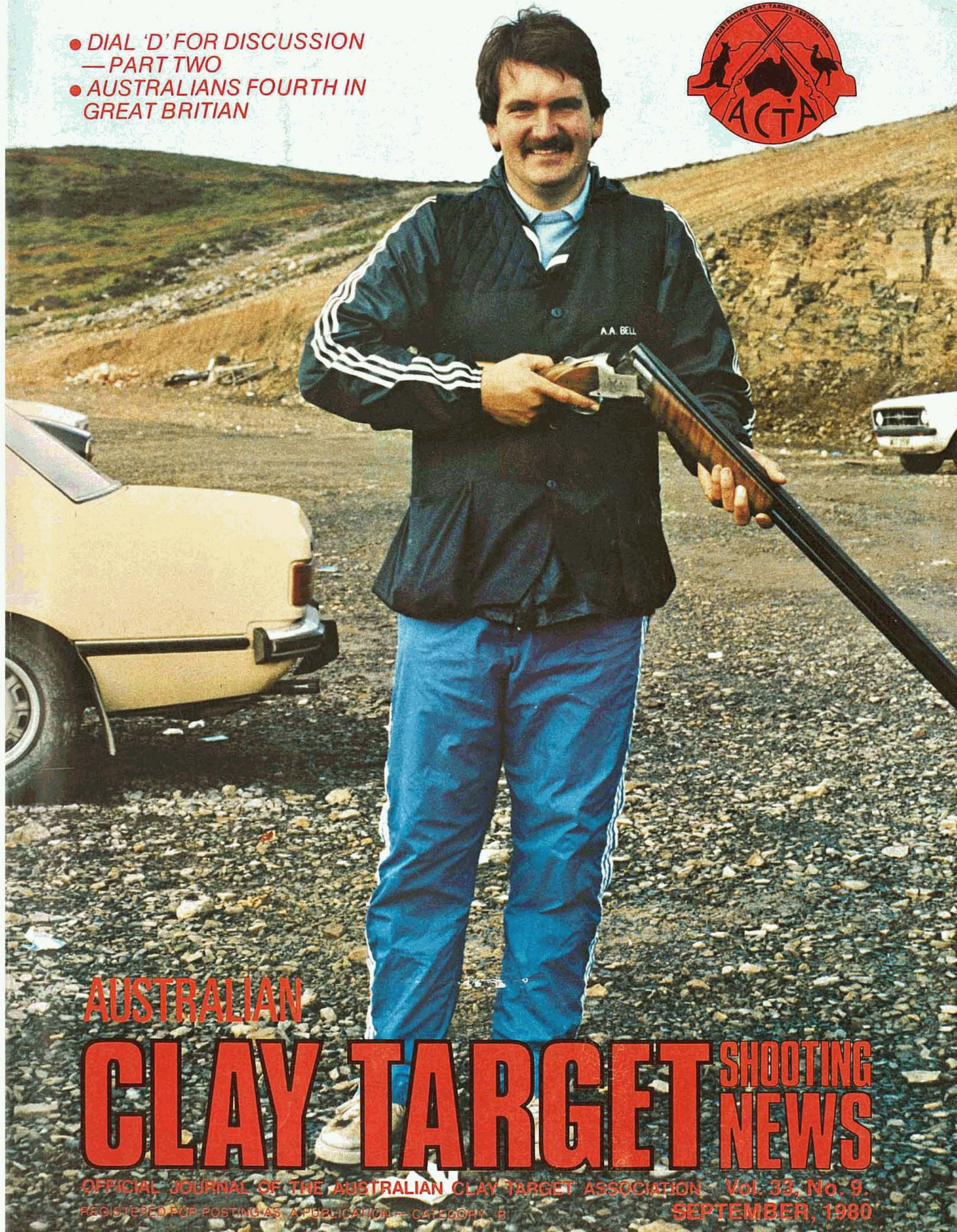

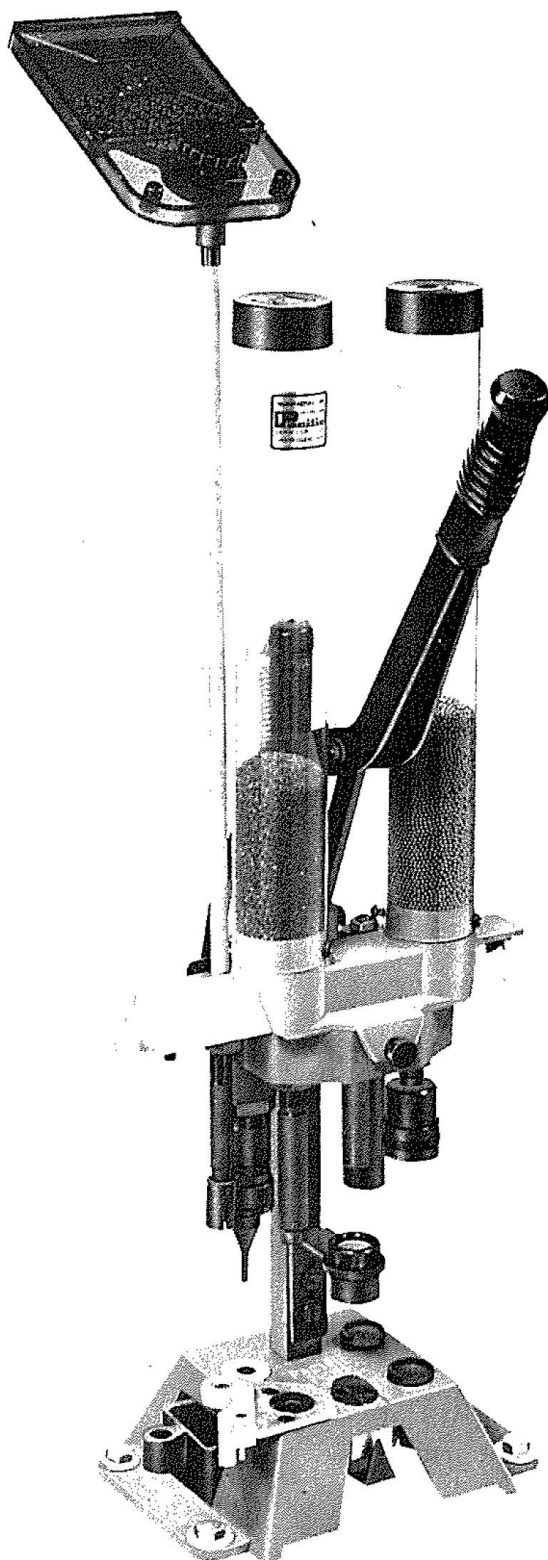

Executive Director's Notes

The last three years have been very good to the shooting sports in Australia. All forms have enjoyed an enlarged following and in general, competition scores have improved.

In clay target shooting, one of the growth factors that is most noticeable is in the area of major tournaments.

Improved administration at state level has encouraged the establishment of State and Zone Championship Carnivals. Moreover, the Winchester Tournaments have become excellent contests and many other major events crowd the shooting calendar.

One of the less pleasant aspects of the growth in clay busting has been the incidence of dissention that comes to the notice of the Administrative Unit.

Such matters as suspension or disqualification of members by clubs, ranging to disqualification by the National Executive Committee have become more commonplace, and this is a trend that brings no credit to the Association.

In the overall sports scene, participants are resorting to legal actions, in attempts to overturn sports management decisions which to the litigant are unacceptable. A recent example is the action which was taken against the Australian Shooting Association after it had reached a democratically based national decision, but which was a decision that was unacceptable to one of the affiliates of the parent body.

Closer to home, 1980 has seen at least two instances where registered shooters have sought legal advice in their efforts to resolve differences of opinion between themselves and either the club, the State Association or the National Association.

Whilst I don't suggest that these cases are anything more than a genuine attempt to put right what the individual sees as a wrong, I do see problems arising from any development which prevents a sport from administering its own matters.

There are many levels of policy making in clay target shooting, all of which are based on the electoral or ballot system. Use of such a system guarantees that the voters get the standards they require OR the people responsible for the wrong decisions are voted out and replaced by a more "popular" nominee.

I believe that the use of legal redress in the sports arena must be very delicately and carefully handled. If you accept that the ethic of sport is a combination of sportsmanship and fair play, it automatically follows that all participants should accept the umpire's decision.

The big question in times of dispute seems to be "WHO IS THE UMPIRE?"

This is an opportune time to quote Clause 27 of the Association's new Articles of Association, which states:

The Executive Committee shall be the final body to which any aggrieved Registered Shooter or member may appeal against the decision or actions of any member or person on any matters arising out of the affairs of any Club or of clay target shooting generally and its decision shall be final and binding.

From some of the recent developments insofar as legal queries are concerned, we all have a heavy responsibility to remember the sport ethic.

Is it possible that too much pressure is being generated by the number of big tournaments? We started this column by using this factor as a sign of growth — as a plus!

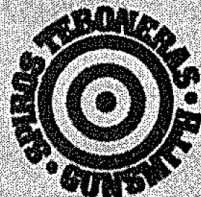
Wouldn't it be ironical if this same factor ultimately damaged the Association because of an over emphasis on winning at the expense of participating.

Let's put the fun back into clay busting!

President Hawkins Resigns His Office

(By Staff Writer)

In a shock move following a ballot at a zone meeting in New South Wales, the Association's President, Mr Ern Hawkins, has resigned from office.

As a consequence, Mr Laurie Connors of Mildura has moved from Vice-President to the position of Acting President, pending a new ballot, which will be held during the next meeting of the Executive Committee. This meeting is scheduled for September 27 and 28.

Mr Hawkins' decision ends a period exceeding 20 years, in which Mr Hawkins and his family have played a major role in the administration of clay target shooting.

The decision was announced in a letter to Vice-President Connors, which reads as follows:

"At a meeting of the Southern Zone Council of the New South Wales Clay Target Association on 5th July 1980, in a ballot for positions during which votes were cast by representatives of clubs within the Zone, I was replaced as a member of the Executive of the State Association.

The consequence of this is that I am no longer eligible for re-nomination as a member of the National Executive of the ACTA or as President of the ACTA.

Legally, I can stay in office as President of the ACTA until its next Annual Meeting in April 1981, but morally, because of my own belief in what I have been trying to do as President, I believe I should resign that position now.

In the 20 years that I have been involved in clay target shooting administration at all levels I have sought no rewards other than the satisfaction of trying to do the things that are in the best interests of the Association and its members and registered shooters.

One would not be human if there was not some opposition to one's efforts and I have always accepted this as a necessary part of a democratic organisation.

However, because of my own personal make-up, I find I cannot continue my efforts where the opposition is such that I am unacceptable in my own area and where action has been taken with the object of my removal as National President.

I request therefore that you accept my resignation as President of the ACTA and suggest that you take control of the Association yourself until the September meeting of the Executive Committee."

At a previous Executive Committee meeting, Mr Hawkins had announced that this was his last term of office. Constitutionally, regardless of the outcome of any "secondary" ballots, he was entitled to complete his term.

However, Mr Hawkins believed that the ballot held at a meeting of the Southern Zone of the New South Wales Clay Target Association, which resulted in him being removed from the **State Council**, reflected a National opinion which required him to vacate the office of Chief Executive.

Earlier in the 70's, Mr Hawkins had taken up an idea being promoted by Mr Mervyn Lyons of Queanbeyan/Canberra Gun Club, refined it a little, and then used it to form the basis on which the New South Wales Clay Target Association was built.

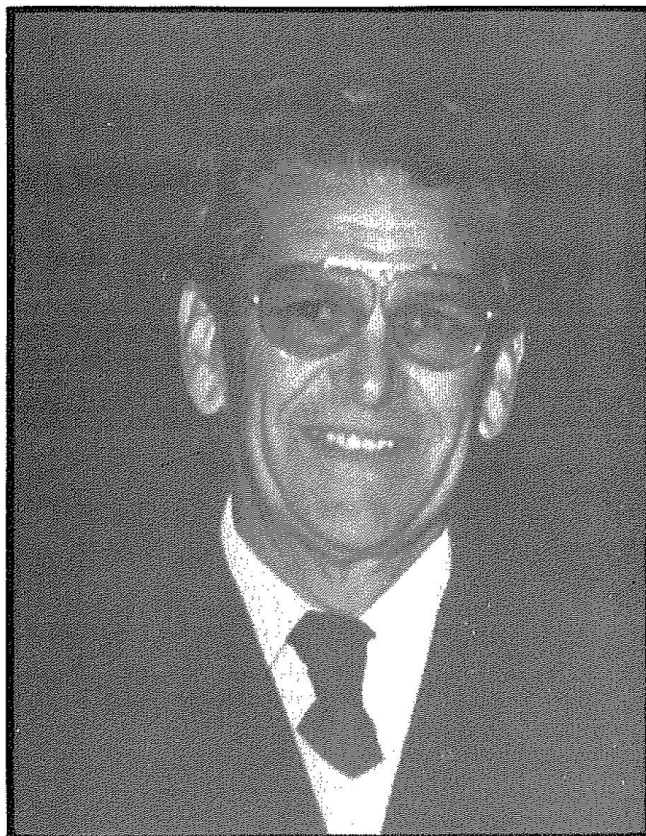
He became the first President of the State Association, and supported by his wife Verlie steered the embryo association through its formative years.

In recognition of the service given to the N.S.W.C.T.A. by the Hawkins' partnership, both Ern and Verlie were made Honorary Life Members of the State Body in a ceremony conducted during the 1979 N.S.W. State Trap Carnival.

On the National scene, Mr Hawkins took office as National President at the 1977 Annual Meeting, after spending nine years on the Executive Committee, including 1975 and 1976 as Vice-President to Mr 'Tup' Pedersen.

In his three and a-half years as Chief Executive, Mr Hawkins has steered the Association through a number of new initiatives, which have combined to have the A.C.T.A. in a relatively strong position.

His will be a hard act to follow!

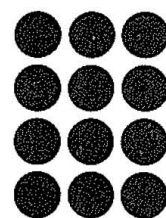

Australia's Team Fourth in Great Britain

Captain Kevin Loy and his team-mates Ken Stevens (Brisbane) and Ken Lowry (Melbourne) found the competition very hot during their recent Great Britain campaign.

Forming a three-man team, which was selected at the 1980 Australian Trap and Skeet Championships for the purpose of competing in a new form of international match, the group found similar teams from Scotland, England and Wales too tough and came in fourth. Ireland filled fifth place.

The international match was held at Llandegla, Wales, and formed part of the 46th Annual International Tournament. The match is used to produce scores for England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland in the Mackintosh International Teams' Postal Trophy, as well as being used for other concurrent events, including the Elliott Alves International Match (a contest between Ireland and Wales) and the Captains' Cup. (As the name implies, this is a match for the captains of the competing teams — in 1980 there were five).

The international shoulder to shoulder match for three-man teams was added to the program this year at Australia's request, a move which was strongly supported by the other four entrant nations.

Held on July 18, the Australians were approaching the match with a lot of confidence. Prior to leaving Australia, all the team members were carding top scores.

However, on a strange ground, and against tougher competition than was anticipated, the Aussies suddenly realised they had a real "tiger by the tail".

The Australian's chances were not enhanced at all when it was found that captain Kevin Loy was quite ill with food poisoning on the day of the match, and the extremely rough weather posed another problem.

Nevertheless, these are not excuses for Australia's defeat — we just are not good enough to contest these matches in a form of the sport foreign to Australia.

As is the case in USA, all the U.K. countries place all the emphasis on the first barrel — giving equal scores to both barrels is unheard of. Furthermore, all important events in the U.K. are conducted over 100 (or more) targets, whereas, in Australia, 20 target events are the norm.

The Llandegla shooting ground is located on a Welsh moor not far from the English border and close to Cheshire. The facilities include five DTL fields, which have been sited on a bench cut into the side of a hill.

Although at the time of writing a full score record is not available, it is known that Ken Lowry was the best performing Australian in the International Match, with a score of 295-300 points (100 broken targets).

As reported in the August issue of Clay Target Shooting News, the teams' match was won by Scotland, with England 2nd, Wales 3rd, Australia 4th and Ireland 5th.

Captain Kevin Loy, on his return to Australia, commended the other teams on their performance, and expressed the opinion that as a public relations exercise, as well as a new competition initiative, the project had been an overwhelming success.

Whilst in Great Britain, Australia's team members took the opportunity to compete in other events.

On the day after the International Match, the Australian trio, together with John Lee and Frank Bradwell, both of NSW, who were travelling with the team, were amongst the 250 competitors who contested the 40th Annual British Open Championship.

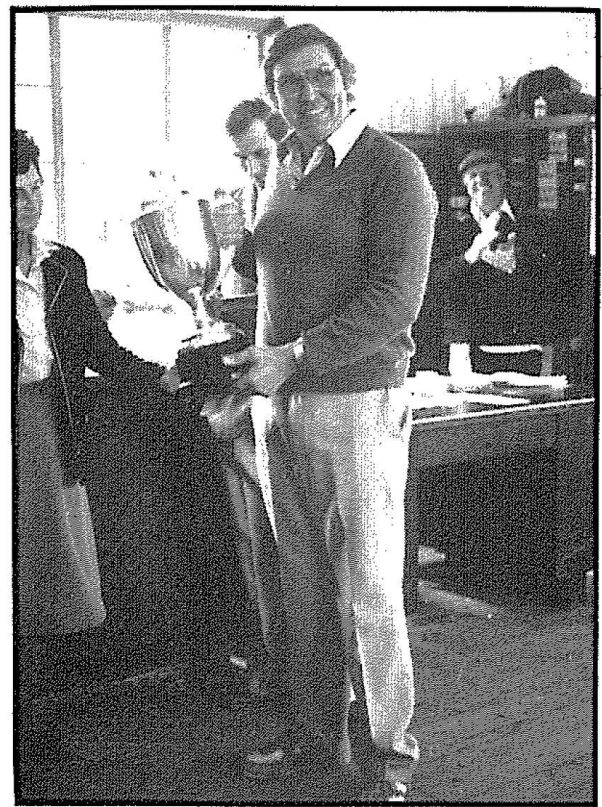
The match was run over 100 targets, and was highlighted by a magnificent shooting exhibition from A. A. Bell of Scotland. Bell, after dropping one point in his first 25 targets, completed the balance of the course without losing another point, and tied for first place.

In the subsequent shoot-off, Bell was the eventual winner on 371-375.

Again Ken Lowry was the best of the Australians, with a score of 297-300 points and John Lee also shot the 100 targets, with five second barrels to record a score of 295-300 points.

Ken Stevens shot 97 targets (282-300 points), while Frank Bradwell's and Kevin Loy's scores were much lower.

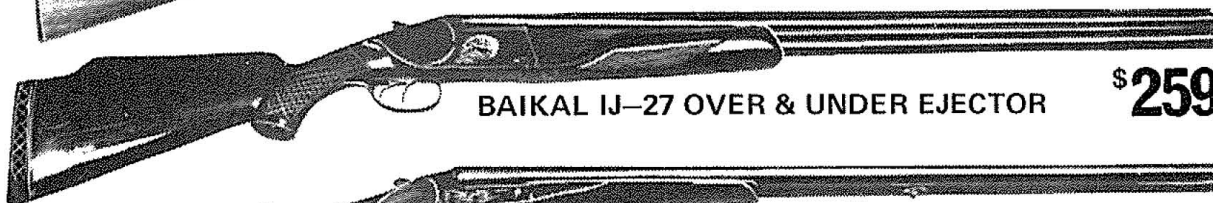

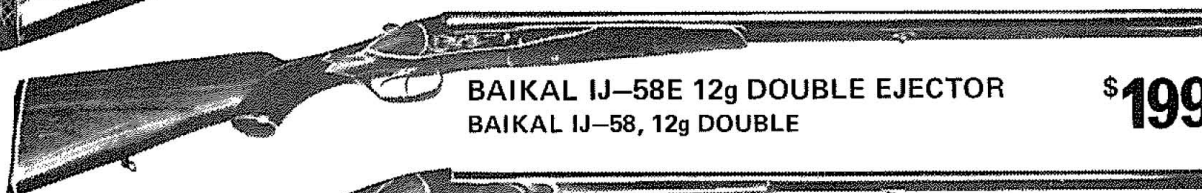

AUSTRALIA'S TEAM FOURTH IN GREAT BRITAIN (Cont'd)

Sunday July 20, was a special 100 target match, known as a Lager shoot! Stevens and Lowry were amongst the 160 entries, and Ken Lowry maintained his good form by again recording a 100 break for a points score of 295-300. The quality of the field can be gauged from the fact that the 299's shot off for the top placings.

Meanwhile, Kevin Loy had travelled the 35 kilometres to Sealand which is the home of the North Wales Shooting School. This is a privately owned shooting complex covering approximately 650 acres, the facilities include four Olympic Trenches, three International Ball Traps, three DTL fields, and three Skeet fields. There is also a top quality "Sporting Clays" or simulated field shooting installation.

The car park has a capacity of 15,000 vehicles, and was expected to be crammed full, when the British Olympic Trench Grand Prix was held there late in August.

This is the ground where Jim Ellis, Australia's top OT shooter, won a Bronze Medal in the 1979 British Grand Prix. Ellis created a very favourable impression here, reports Kevin Loy.

The match programmed on the day of Kevin Loy's visit was a Winchester Trophy Grand Prix, to be run over four rounds, each of 25 targets Olympic Trench.

The match attracted a large entry, including the Great Britain Olympic squad, which, similar to Australia, had not travelled to Moscow.

The winner was A. A. Bell of Scotland, who scored 95-100, and runner-up was the first of the Olympic squad members, Peter Boden with a score of 92-100. Third was D. Brown of Wales on 91-100.

Kevin Loy who by now was recovering from the illness he had been suffering, shot 88-100 to tie with the second Olympic squad member Bob Braithwaite. Peter Croft top squad member, and fresh from winning the European Gold Medal carded a score in the low 80's.

A week prior Loy and Lowry had competed in the English Ball Trap Championship, which had been shot at the East Yorkshire Gun Club, Beverley, Yorkshire.

Drawing 98 entries, the match which had originally been programmed to run over 200 targets was reduced to 100 targets, and held on one day only.

Loy, who had arrived in England a few days before Lowry, collected Ken from Heathrow and drove directly to the Beverley grounds.

The two Australians were able to secure two rounds of practice on the day prior to the match. At the same time, Ken Lowry discovered that the trip from Australia had dislodged the foresight on his gun.

Despite all their problems, the Australian pair commenced the match in high spirits. However, the weather was foul — certainly not what one would expect in the middle of an English summer.

A brilliant 99-100, shot by J. M. Crowthorpe of England, was the winning score. Second was another Englishman, R. Hey, with a score of 98-100.

Kevin Loy carded a very creditable 94-100 to finish 8th overall, while Ken Lowry, battling to overcome the difficulty caused by his missing foresight, finished with a 91-100.

Although it could be argued that the shooting performances recorded by the Australians did not reflect their true ability, it must be remembered that the Great Britain shooters are familiar with 100 target events and points scoring where the emphasis is on the first barrel.

In this light, the Australian performance looks good. Furthermore, as a public relations exercise, team captain Loy reports that it was a complete success.

The host associations, the executive of the clubs visited and competitors generally ALL went out of their way to make the Australians welcome — an effort for which the Australian Clay Target Association is extremely grateful.

BOOK REVIEW "SHOTGUN SHOOTING FACTS"

By Gough Thomas

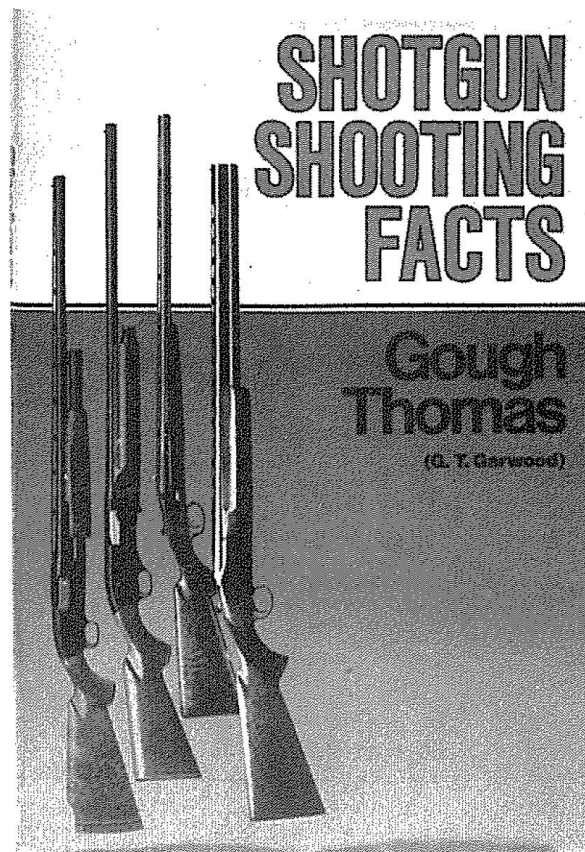

Gough Thomas, who writes under that name is in reality a civil engineer by the name of Gough Thomas Garwood. An Englishman who has made it his life's work to study the shotgun and all its idiosyncrasies and one has to admit he has a very good grasp of his subject. The author of several very fine books on the smoothbore this latest offering is in fact an update of some earlier writings on the subject. A lot of the material has appeared in his earlier discourse "Gough Thomas's Second Gun Book" which presumably came after his 'First Gun Book'.

However, publicity blurb in this case is fairly close to the mark. Gough Thomas has indeed got a flair for explaining quite complex technical problems involved in shotgun design and performance in simple terms for the layman to understand. He has the typical English approach to the subject that leaves you with the feeling that if you shoot anything less than a fine London gun you are somewhat inferior, but for all that the book is crammed full of most useful information.

In 84 short chapters, Garwood will take you through a bewildering array of information on general hints, the shotgun and shooter in action, the gun itself, special guns, the mysteries of patterns and ballistics, choking, gun handling and many other related subjects. The section on chokes is a joy to read and a must for anybody with a yen for learning how and why a smoothbore acts the way it does.

In hardback form and of 280 pages with just enough illustrations to make it interesting it is a book for the serious shooter or more to the point, a book for the shotgunner who likes to know 'why' rather than 'how', a shotgun acts the way it does. Highly recommended. ○

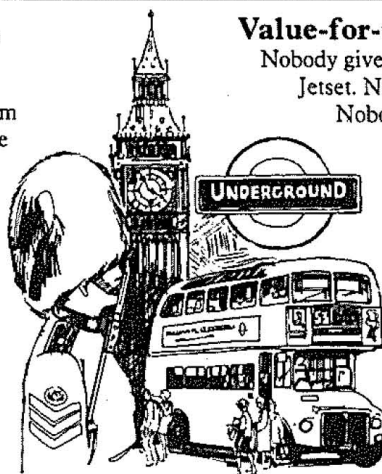

DIAL D FOR DISCUSSION

On June 6 and 7 the Australian Shooting Association conducted a discussion workshop in Canberra.

The project was attended by over 100 delegates representing all areas of the shooting sports scene.

The workshop has been reported for readers of CTSN by Pat Browne. The first part of his report appeared in the August issue. The following is the concluding part.

Criminologist David Biles put the academic view to the conference.

He outlined his history in the field of criminology and pointed out that: "Criminologists have lots of views on lots of things, they have information on lots of things but they are not necessarily experts on firearms policy and certainly let me make it perfectly clear I am not an expert on firearms policy".

Mr. Biles, however, put to the conference some very interesting research conducted by Professor Richard Harding of the University of Western Australia (Law School) on the subject of firearms ownership in this country.

Harding's survey showed that in Australia there are about 2.2 million guns in private ownership of 1.25 million persons and these are distributed through 1.5 million households, he said, and this was significantly lower than in the U.S.A.

Recommendations from Harding's detailed analysis of the scene in Australia encompasses five main points.

Firstly, all jurisdictions should have efficient registration systems for handguns, shotguns and rifles.

Secondly, there should be a licensing system for all persons wishing to own these registerable firearms and that the handgun inventory should be kept to a minimum and that demonstrable competence should be a prerequisite for licensing.

Thirdly, there should be uniform firearms legislation throughout the Commonwealth.

That special attention should be given to criminal use of firearms was his fourth point, and that police use of firearms should be examined was point number five.

An interesting comment made by Mr. Biles was that this work by Professor Harding has not been published because publishers think it will not sell. This caused some amusement from the floor of the conference particularly when he suggested that the A.S.A. might like to finance its printing!

The subject of an address given to the recent ANZAAS conference by Mr. Biles on the fact that Australia would be just as safe if, by a change in sentencing policy, the number of persons in prison was halved evidently brought him into conflict with a member of one of the shooting organisations.

Using this letter, which he took exception to, he canvassed the whole spectrum of imprisonment and crime rates.

He pressed the point that all work in criminology is carefully researched and fully documented.

Imprisonment rates in Australia, he said, varied widely from a low of 25 per 100,000 in ACT to 205 per 100,000 in the Northern Territory. Relating these figures to crime rates he said, "there is no evidence to suggest that the high imprisoning jurisdictions have lower crime rates. In fact, there is a slight tendency for the opposite to be true".

This aspect of criminology is not peculiar to Australia he said, figures he had processed indicated that the same result was noticed in the U.S.A. and Canada.

"I have never suggested," he said, "that serious offenders, particularly those that use firearms, should not go to prison, but the evidence is quite clear that our prisons have far too many non-violent offenders who could be dealt with just as effectively, and much more cheaply with non-custodial penalties".

Mr. Biles summed up his thoughts and research into crime rates and imprisonment by stating that there was no such thing as a 'crime explosion'. In fact he said that in the 1960's and 70's the rates were relatively stable.

The fact that he felt strongly about being challenged by a shooter on his apparent 'softness' towards criminals came through in his almost petulant defence of his academic stand on the subject.

Stressing that he was not an expert in firearms policy Mr. Biles concluded his paper with some personal observations.

"First of all", he said, "and I should be quite honest with you, I don't like guns and I think personally that this country would be a happier and safer place if we avoided becoming like America with very high levels of private gun ownership, particularly high levels of ownership of concealable handguns".

He recognised however that many people enjoyed using guns and that some made a living from their use, and admitted that misuse could be minimised by well run shooting clubs such as were represented at the conference.

Registration he said was something that he held no firm views on but said that with cheap and efficient computers registration should not be a burden. Registration should help the authorities trace lost or stolen weapons.

"Finally", said Mr. Biles, "the calls that are occasionally made from shooters' associations for mandatory minimum sentences to be imposed on all offenders convicted of crimes using guns seems to me to be misconceived, even though I can understand the motivation behind the call".

"Mandatory minimum sentences, in the few places that they have been tried around the world, have been universally condemned and have encouraged the use of improper practices by the police and courts."

"I believe that it is essential for sentencing discretion to be left with the courts and I also believe that we can trust our judges and magistrates to appropriately reflect the mood of the public when they are dealing with serious criminals."

"For sporting clubs to try and tell judges how to do their jobs does not seem to me to be the best way to win friends and influence people".

"I think that what I have said should at least be sufficient to provoke some lively discussion", he concluded.

It sure did.



Lobbyist Ernest Marty, pressed for time by conference constraints, made a very brief explanation of what his role was in the legislative scene. "The function of a lobbyist is basically to try and help create workable laws", he said.

Warming to his subject, Mr. Marty said that we in Australia were rapidly becoming a greatly over regulated and over legislated society and that the lobbyist is sometimes the only defence we have against unworkable laws.

He was of the opinion that vocal minorities who style themselves as 'public interest' groups but are in fact 'specialty interest' groups have far too much sway in Australian politics. "The lobbyist", he pointed out, "reminds politicians that whilst this vocal minority makes the noise, it is the silent majority that has the votes".

Australian shooting, according to Mr. Marty, was a sport that is most vulnerable to public attack and constraining government legislation and regulation, but remains one which is probably the most politically under-represented of all the competitive sports.

Shooters, he said, must provide their own facilities whilst most other major sports such as swimming, athletics, football etc., operate with facilities made available by the community.

"In most cases they must pay licence fees and sales tax on hardware, in relation to which they can look to minimal financial support from federal and state governments for coaching and for

Australian and International competition, despite the importance of shooting events and the high success rate and medal count of Australian shooting competitors", he said.

Community attitudes were such that knowing little of the sport, when a crime was committed which involved a firearm, there was an immediate public outcry, echoed by the media, for more stringent regulation said Mr. Marty.

"A great deal has been achieved by representatives of the various shooting bodies in negotiation with police and other government departments. Police departments generally have been sympathetic, but legislators, responding to that vocal minority pressure have so far tended to ignore the growing importance of the shooting sports".

"This contrasts sharply with the situation in the United States, where the gun lobby has unique political effectiveness and a strong voice in national affairs.

This however, is achieved by a full complement of public relations advisors, researchers, lobbyists and attorneys", he added.

While the objectives of Australian shooters are substantially different to those of the American gun lobby, an operation matched to the Australian scale, on the assumption that there are some 100,000 organised shooters, according to Mr. Marty should be within the resources of the shooting sports. This course of action is essential in his opinion to ensure the sports long term development and survival.

Much of the problem lies in the fact that the shooting sports have not learned to harness the public information process. Decisions made by state and federal parliaments and governments are often based on totally inadequate information and insufficient research and at present the true facts about sport shooting do not reach these decision making groups.

"Parliamentarians do not have the necessary facilities to inform themselves fully on the many issues on which they must vote in the course of a parliamentary session", he said.

"Most make a genuine effort to inform themselves on at least a small range of subjects but this does not prevent a lot of bad legislation from getting through".

"In addition, parliamentarians have tended increasingly to be influenced or prejudiced by vocal opinions as well as by elements within the public service which provide ideology rather than facts. This makes it necessary to create pressures in the back benches and in the community to bring about vital amendments to existing and projected legislation", he said.



Mr. H. Vivian Taylor, an Architect and acoustic consultant in private practice for over 45 years, put some very pertinent points on noise pollution to the conference.

"As far as I am aware", he said, "in no states of Australia is there a definitive regulation controlling the quantity of noise that can be made in gun shooting".

"Nor would they be concerned how noisy it was, but more how the noise would affect a residential area or a residence".

Most problems over noise come from health departments according to Mr. Taylor and they are guided by codes set down by the Australian Standards Association. These codes set acceptable noise levels for rural, commercial, industrial and residential areas.

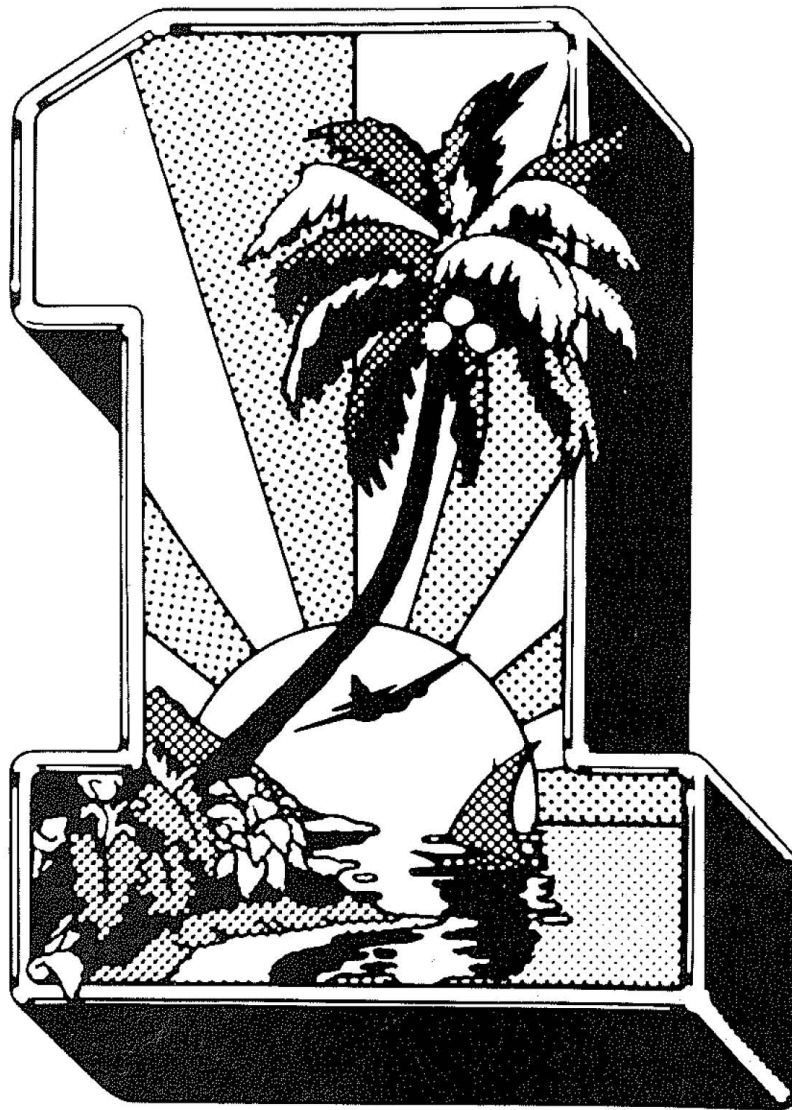

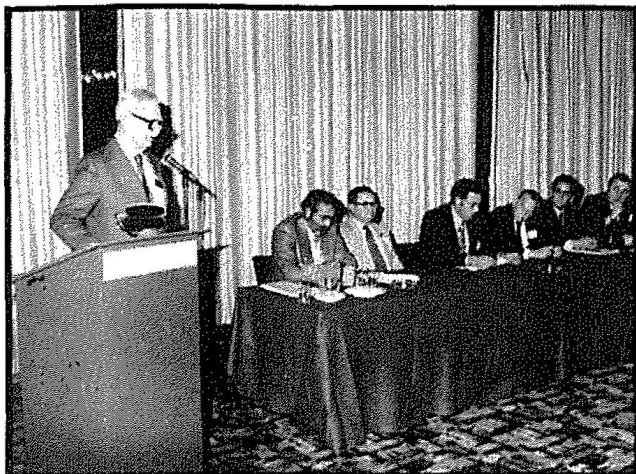

He canvassed the whole spectrum of noise pollution from every aspect and made some very valuable but also very technical observations on how noise could be controlled in a shooting club environment.

He made the important point that before new shooting facilities were established, a sound feasibility study of the effects of noise should be commissioned before any major decisions were made about siting the complex.

Mr. Taylor made several suggestions covering the selection of sites for shooting ranges and covered subjects such as topography and background noise together with open air acoustics and noise surveys.

He also covered the measures that could be used to reduce noise in existing installations using various methods such as orientation, full and partial enclosures, barriers, earthworks and the planting of noise absorbing shrubbery and trees.

There was a question time that had him fully occupied answering questions from Victorian delegates who are having problems in this area at the moment.



Discussion time came in the final afternoon session when Peter Papps outlined a personal plan for an expanded umbrella organisation retaining the name of the Australian Shooting Association.

Inviting the presidents of the A.S.A. affiliates to the panel table together with Mr. Phil Brown of the Field & Game Federation of Australia to comment and to answer questions from the floor, he said: "You can see that we have recognised the fact that there is a requirement to go outside the area of competition shooting".

Papps then invited the organisations to comment.

For the S.S.A.A., Keith Willman pointed that an expanded A.S.A. could certainly play a vital role in sporting shooting in Australia. He raised the question of autonomy and the question of affiliated bodies foregoing powers that they hold in national & state rights. Legislation was a particular matter that the S.S.A.A. had spent a lot of time on and he considered that they were front runners in this area. He could not see his organisation handing this power over to any new organisation.

The A.C.T.A. view was that they would retain their identity according to President Ern Hawkins. He was of the opinion though that the A.C.T.A. executive would look closely at the concept because it was this association's opinion that the A.S.A. should be a body controlling more than just competition shooting. There is a distinct advantage of speaking with a strong voice in matters such as legislation and other national matters he said.

"In unity we get strength", was the opinion of the N.R.A. but their President Mr. Arthur Penworn was of the opinion that the shooting sports had gone too far down their own tracks to go back. He did see, however, that the A.S.A. was the ideal place to represent the whole

of the shooting sports on matters such as legislation, conservation and to some extent coaching.

Phil Brown from the Field & Game Federation put a very forthright view in that representing a non-affiliated organisation, the A.S.A. in its present form held no interest. But, he said, as a wider based organisation it would be a different matter.

Pistol shooting through the A.P.U.S.A. would be "wholeheartedly behind any system that would be directed to safeguarding our sport and the sports of similar people with similar ideas", in the opinion of their representative Mr. Jack Morris.

The Small Bore Association in a strange reaction thought the expanded role of the A.S.A. a good idea according to their spokesman Clay Frederick. But he then took a backhand swipe at the organisations within the A.S.A. that had developed strong administrative units and concluded by saying that, "we should start to move away from our isolated little self centred incestuous relationships that we have got at the present time into something that is approaching an organisation such as the N.R.A. of America".

The conference concluded with a resolution that the A.S.A. consider a recommendation that the expanded role be investigated and that if feasible be implemented.

A most interesting weekend and one that will have repercussions throughout the shooting sports for many years to come.



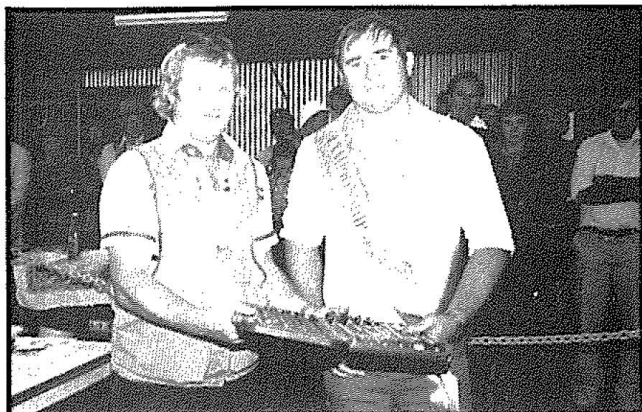

Included in the submission were monies for I.S.U. training, full time State Executive Director, Coaching Kits, training equipment, State Training Squads, Coaching administration, State Championships and teams matches. A sum was also being sought for the assistance of the 1981 Nationals at Melbourne Gun Club. The State training squad was also noted, with Long, Buchanan, Smith, Rose, Clay and Italia making the trench team. Crikis, Hale, Boyd, Summers, Woolley and Johnson, the I.S.U. Skeet squad. A strong recommendation was made to try and encourage all States to develop a Schoolboy Champion, similar to what now operates at the Victorian State Trap Carnival, sponsored by Winchester. Each State Champion be sent by his or her State to the Nationals to shoot off for the National Schoolboy/girl Champion. This would be a winner in the publicity department for clay target shooting if developed.

Thursday June 5, 1980. What is now known as the International Sub-committee, met on this day at the A.C.T.A. office in Swanston Street, Melbourne. Its responsibilities cover rather a large area in clay shooting, but I believe this committee, although small in numbers is exceptionally active in creating new ideas, which in the long term will be an advantage in assisting in developing and increasing the interest of the sport to our many competitors. An attempt will be made by this committee to get official accredited I.S.U. referees in both Olympic, Trench and I.S.U. Skeet in Australia. With our ever increasing involvement in I.S.U. shooting it is evident we require a greater need for referees trained and recognized officially in this area.

Friday June 6, 1980. Canberra was the city of action for clay target administrators, and on this day a management committee meeting was conducted at the Canberra Parkroyal Motor Inn. The committee consists of Ern Hawkins, National President and Chairman of Management committee, Roy Holtfreter, W.A., Ron Porter, Queensland and myself. This committee along with others has been created by the instigation of our new Constitution and although only in operation a short time, will no doubt prove to be beneficial to our general administration.

Saturday June 7, 1980. For the first time ever, a discussion workshop for the shooting sports administrators was held at the Parkroyal Motor Inn in Canberra. The discussion workshop actually commenced on the Friday night with a dinner being organized for those attending. Guest speakers attended the dinner with Hon. R. J. Ellicott, Q.C. Minister for Home Affairs and Minister for Capital Territories in the Australian Government, speaking on "Government Sports Development Policies". He was followed by Mr. Peter Papps, President, Australian Shooting Association, giving introduction to actual workshop. Mr. Graham Dempster, Assistant

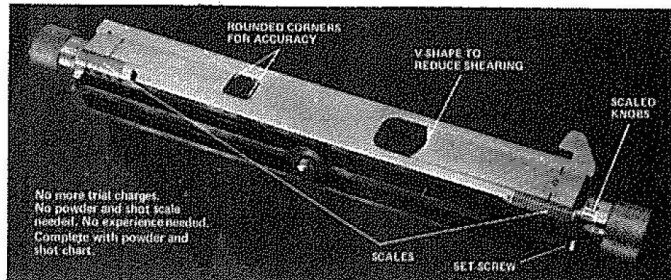

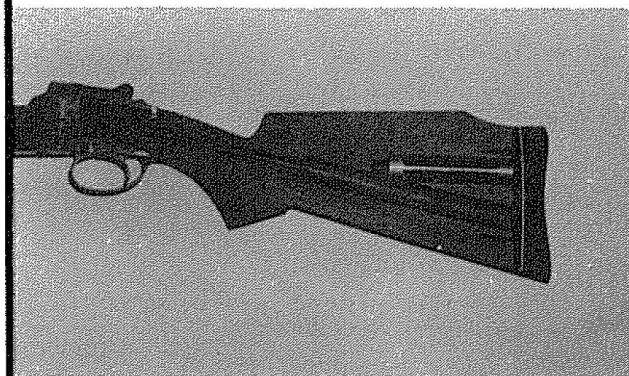

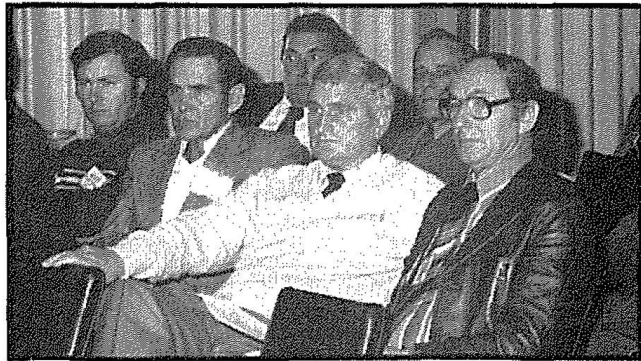

Commercial Marketing is now located in a new two-storey warehouse, situated on the corner of Hotham Pde and McLachlan Avenue in Artarmon NSW.

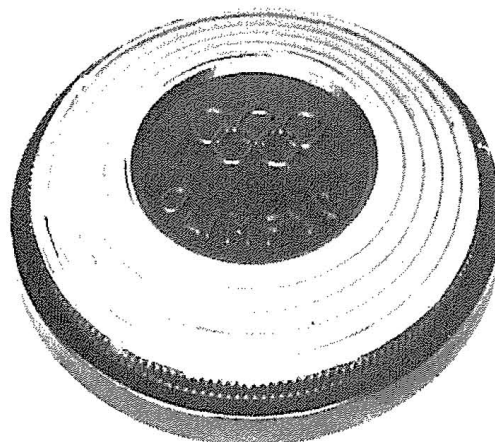

National Coaching Council Meets in Melbourne

Two new faces appeared at the mid-year meeting of the National Coaching Council. They belonged to Kevin Bowring of Northern Territory and Bob Morgan of Tasmania.

The meeting was held in Melbourne, and attracted a full attendance. Mr Ern Hawkins, who was then still National President, also attended the two days.

Chaired by Director of Coaching, Newton Thomas, the meeting was a complete success, to a large extent due to the contribution made by two outside speakers.

These were Mr Brian Nettleton, from the Department of Human Movement Studies at Melbourne University, and Mr Ron Clarke athlete extraordinaire, newspaper columnist, and also general manager of Eley Ammunition.

Mr Nettleton's address was most interesting, as he applied general human movement principle to the specific application of clay target shooting.

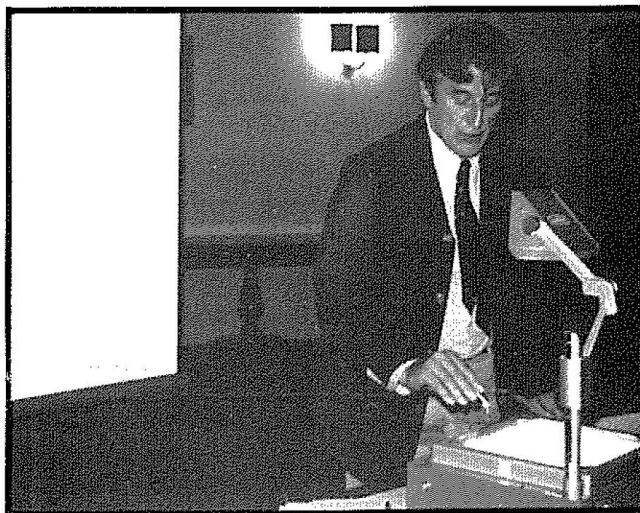
Mr Clarke spoke on the subject of motivation, with particular reference to the particular requirements of individuals within teams.

The "work" part of the conference covering an extensive agenda, including the subject of obtaining accreditation of the Association's coaching scheme from the Australian Coaching Council.

A detailed proposal, covering what is known as level one of a three stage structure has been submitted for consideration, and approval should be forthcoming before the end of 1980.

Major decisions to come out of the meeting were:

1. Acceptance of an audio-visual training aid. This aid consists of a set of color slides depicting do's and don'ts of trap shooting. The set of slides is supported by a taped commentary, and the complete unit is to be offered to State Associations and clubs on a shared cost basis.

2. Club and Zone Coach Accreditation Certificates were approved and are to be awarded to coaching personnel who have completed accreditation.
3. The Basic Coaching Manual is considered to be a most useful aid, and is to be reprinted.
4. Agreement was reached that coaching personnel must develop a close liaison with clubs in the promotion of "safe handling of firearms" training courses within the community. This is specially important insofar as student training is concerned.

The meeting closed late on the second day and the next National Council meeting is to be held during June 1981.

INTERNATIONAL SHOOTING SCENE

With the 1980 Olympics now over, the shooting sports in this country need to "get their act together". The deep divisions that have appeared between affiliates of the Australian Shooting Association need to be repaired, as a matter of urgency.

Part of the repair operation will require a legal resolution of the actions taken in the Supreme Court of South Australia by the Australian Small Bore Rifle Association, and one of its members.

Amongst some affiliates of the ASA, there appears to be a feeling that all existing problems should be forgotten, and let business continue as if nothing unusual had happened.

In theory, this sounds fine because such a policy avoids much unpleasantness and further divisions that may occur.

Be that as it may, to pursue such a suggestion would be pure suicide, as the ASA would continue to operate under the constant threat of another attack.

The legal challenge to the autonomy of the ASA must be resolved. In our opinion, such a move is the only way that the ACTA could regain its ability to trust and fully co-operate with the Australian Shooting Association in its future operations.

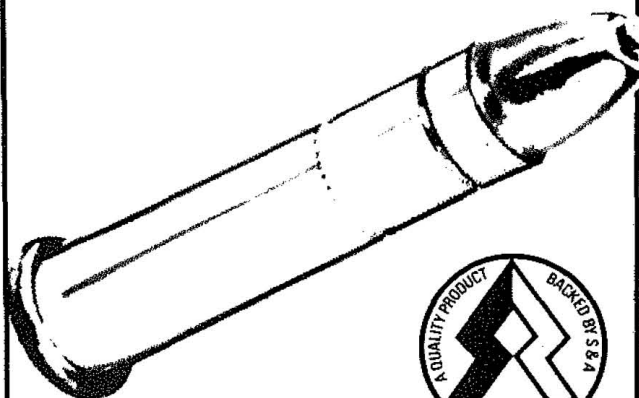

Federal Government Announces Australian Sports Institute

(By Staff Writer)

At last, one of the reasons for Australia's top athletes to move overseas to complete their education is being removed.

To this time, Australia has had no facility where an athlete can successfully combine training AND education.

The problem is being resolved.

At the Discussion Workshop conducted in June by the Australian Shooting Association, the Minister for Home Affairs, the Hon R. J. Ellicott, announced the formation of the Australian Sports Institute.

It has been established to give Australian sports people the opportunity to pursue their interest to the highest level without necessarily sacrificing their education or careers.

The ASI will also provide international standard sporting facilities and sports science support for elite athletes.

All the sporting facilities will be located in and adjacent to the Bruce Stadium in Canberra. Just a few hundred metres away, the Canberra College of Advanced Education will provide the educational services.

The whole concept is an exciting development in Australian sport. The Institute is scheduled to be complete by the end of 1980, and will be officially opened during the Australia Day Sports Festival in 1981.

Initially, the Institute will concentrate on eight sports. These are basketball, gymnastics, netball, swimming, tennis, weightlifting track and field soccer.

Leading international coaches are expected to join the staff of the Institute. In a recent statement on the subject, Minister Ellicott was negotiating with Mr Don Talbot, a leading Australian swimming coach, with a view to his appointment as the Director of Swimming.

He said that a leading former Australian Davis Cup player currently coaching overseas was being considered for appointment as the Institute's Director of Tennis.

All other senior staff positions have been advertised internationally and the Australian Government is hopeful of a most successful launch to the project in January 1981.

From The Desk of the N.S.W. Coaching Director

(By A. M. Burgess)

Next to a person's natural talent perhaps the greatest attribute to success is motivation. In all aspects of life unless we have a strong motivation towards our goal we will seldom reach it. To have successful clay target shooters and active well patronised clay target clubs, we must give our shooters this motivation.

Perhaps a shooter is motivated by his or her family, their club, a champion shooter they may wish to copy or by a coach. It is motivation from coach to shooter that I wish to expand on.

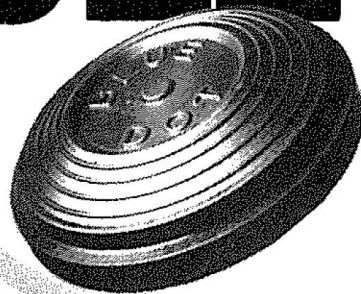
It is important to remember that the expectations that a coach projects will have a decided effect on the performance of the people he coaches. He does not have to announce what he expects verbally, his attitude and the tone of his voice will convey this to them. So a coach must at all times give a feeling of confidence to his pupils.

I feel that a beneficial way to encourage a youthful shooter is to put before him the achievements of a particular person he recognises as somebody who has reached a high level of shooting ability. It is much easier for him to relate to somebody he knows rather than a would-be champion whom he has never seen shoot. As his coach you must make the pupil feel that he can attain, with hard work and dedication, the same level of success as the person he admires.

If we expect the people we coach to do poorly they usually will. If we make them believe that they can do well they usually will.

Each individual is motivated by many different things in many different ways. Coaches must learn to find the things that will help them to reach the level they are striving for.

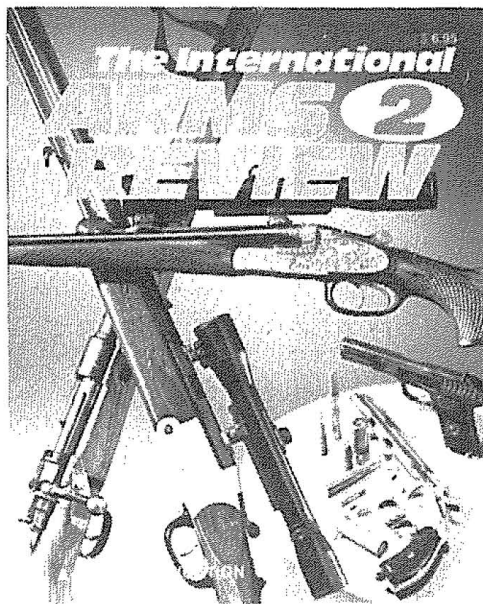
Although no great scores were achieved, all the boys seemed very keen to return.

The club team included Neville Butt, Steve Harding, Craig Hardy, Dave Rowlands and Mike Ricketts, and its winning score was 86-100.

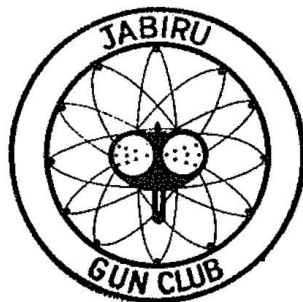
