Hot on the heels of last month's column which was on the subject of fair play, two State Associations are expressing concern at the lack of courtesy a growing number of competitors show for referees.

If one watches television at all, it will be very obvious that ours is not the only sport in which the problem exists. Nevertheless, clay target shooting IS the sport where we can do something about the problem.

Referees are a vital part of our sport, and are used to ensure that each competitor receives one or two fair shots, whichever the case may be, at his target.

Being human, referees occasionally make mistakes. Such occasions are not sufficient reason for the abuse we hear directed at referees.

Is it co-incidence that, in the main, such criticism comes from competitors who rarely take a turn at refereeing — in theory, their lack of involvement in refereeing activities disqualifies them from the right to an opinion.

Admittedly, there have been occasions where refereeing standards have not been of a standard required — in those cases, club managements are required to take immediate action.

No way have such occasions been frequent and when they have arisen, prompt action by the host club has limited the consequences.

The Association because of the number of different types of clay busting it controls, administers a complex set of rule, which tends to make the referee's problems more difficult.

In part, some of the anomalies are being removed in the present redraft of the rules.

State Associations are also able to play a role in improving the confidence of new referees by conducting regular discussion sessions. These sessions can be most valuable in allowing groups of referees to share experiences, an exercise which also results in more consistent decisions on the shooting tracks.

I reflect my comment of last month — we must not let the desire to win override the enjoyment of participation. This will become increasingly important as our sport develops still further.

1980-81 Federal Budget

The 1980-81 Federal Budget announcement became something of a non-event because of the substantial leak that occurred three days before "budget day".

BRISBANE GUN CLUB MAKES TV COMMERCIAL (Staff Writer)

As a direct result of the rapport which has recently developed between the Brisbane Gun Club and QTQ Channel Nine television network, a full colour television commercial depicting Brisbane Gun Club has been produced.

The commercial was used to promote the Club's annual two-day "Exhibition Tournament" which is conducted in August to co-incide with the Brisbane Exhibition.

A large viewing audience was exposed to the feature, and the club Publicity Officer Tom Meadows has reported a measurable increase in the number of spectators visiting the ground.

The relationship between the Brisbane Gun Club and the television industry goes back two years, when Ron and Muriel Porter donated a perpetual trophy to be used in a match known as the "Challenge of the Channels".

This year, three television channels took part in the match, which was attended by over 100 people.

At a time when clay-busting is crying out for publicity, the Brisbane Gun Club is to be commended for its initiative. All clubs whether located in the city or the country, have an opportunity to copy the Brisbane idea — all that is needed is EFFORT! However, sports people had to wait until the detailed budget papers were released before they discovered that an amount of \$2.885 million had been allocated to the Sports Development Program. This is an effective increase of \$885,000 over the allocation of \$2 million in 1979-80.

Of particular importance is the allocation of \$500,000 to assist athletes, who were selected to compete, but did not attend the Moscow Olympics, to compete in alternative high level international competition.

A further \$115,000 has been allocated for special pre-event training in connection with the 1982 Commonwealth Games.

Shortly, National sporting associations should know what their share of the total will be. In the case of clay target shooting, we are already in receipt of a grant of \$5000, part of which has been used to offset the expenses incurred in sending a three man team to Great Britain and the balance will be used to assist the Association to field a squad at an international match in Bangkok, later this year.

One of the most important omissions in the Federal Budget, in my opinion, is the total lack of assistance for sporting facilities of international standard. (It could be argued that the \$2.5 million allocated to the 1982 Commonwealth Games facilities comes into this category).

Clay target shooting is one of the few sports in Australia where facilities have been established — with rare exceptions — exclusively from funds developed within the sport.

As we develop more and more activities directed at filling community needs — for example, the student training scheme, then greater pressure must be placed on all levels of government, as the keepers of the public monies, to make a larger contribution.

Before leaving the subject of the Federal Budget, one should report that the newly formed Australian Institute of Sport, located in Canberra, has been allocated \$902,000 to assist in its establishment.

The Institute is an exciting concept, and provided it develops along the stated guidelines, the shooting sports should work long and hard to gain acceptance within the Institute.



BUDD STARS IN TRENCH

The 1980 Pesta Sukan Shooting Festival attracted a large attendance and provided first class competition. The match was held at the range of the Singapore Gun Club which must surely be the most difficult shooting range in the world,

A large Australian contingent attended and included teams entered by Melbourne Gun Club and the Australian Clay Target Association.

The entry included teams from Indonesia, Johore, Thailand and Singapore, plus an individual entry from New Caledonia.

The trap (Olympic Trench) match attracted a capacity field of 48 shooters and the skeet field numbered 24.

The organizers introduced a new innovation when skeet and trap segments were held on alternating days. In general, although the Singapore Shooting Association is to be commended for its willingness to try fresh ideas, competitors indicated that they would prefer to complete one match before commencing the next. This was particularly the case in instances where competitors had entered both skeet and trap matches.

The range itself comes as something of a shock to competitors seeing it for the first time. It is located in a valley, with the skeet ground super-imposed over the trap field. Jungle grows right to the boundaries of the skeet field, and forms a most difficult background.

The shooters' problems are further aggravated by rapid changes in the light, especially during the first few squads each morning.

The Australian party arrived in Singapore in two parts, one having travelled direct from Australia and the other arriving from Jakarta after having spent six days holidaying in Indonesia.

Customs and police formalities were quietly dispensed with, mainly due to the work done by Singapore Shooting Association Secretary Stephen Yap and his colleagues.

After leaving the airport, the Australian group was taken to the Holiday Inn, which was to become 'home' for the next eleven days.

The standard of the accommodation was up to international specification, and the shooters arose on the first day of practice feeling fully refreshed.

ing fully refreshed. While general practice was in session, Max Vipond and Merv Whitelaw represented Australia and Melbourne Gun Club respectively at a team captains' briefing meeting.

The hosts found it a little confusing to see Mervyn Whitelaw in the Australian list, when he was the official captain of the Melbourne Gun Club squad, but it all went to prove the good comradeship that existed in the Aussie camp.

Early favourites in the teams' matches were Thailand to win the skeet and Singapore to win the trap. In individual events, the Thai skeet champion Somchai was highly favoured, while the trap event was fairly open.

The Aussies were quietly confident that they could upset some of these early predictions and worked very hard during practice.

The first competition day was skeet, and shooters in the first three squads sufferred incredible vision problems due to the bright sunlight. Graham Guy was probably worst affected and recorded a 12, while Whitelaw could only manage a 19, and Peter Blackmore 17.

Somchai and Viroj, both of Thailand made a good start, carding 21 and 22 respectively. Pichit (Thailand) started badly with 18 but shot a brilliant second round to score 25, one of the only three recorded during the entire competition. Tareets continued to be elusive through the second and third



The real surprise of the first day was Melbourne Gun Club's Peter Blackmore who recovered from his disastrous first round to score 22 and a brilliant 24 to close on 63, only three targets off the pace.


Lo Vun Vui performed very well with a gun he had taken delivery only a day prior to the tournament. His 20, 24 and 21 put him in equal second slot after the first day.

Crikis was already showing the form which had taken him into the winner's circle in the event for the two previous years, and carded 21, 22 and 23 to lead on 66/75.

The second day of skeet was overcast, with thundery showers and wind gusts adding to the shooters' difficulties.

Somchai was quickly into gear and showed that good scores were possible by carding 24 in his first visit. Lee Kum Cheok (Singapore) also started well with a 23, slipped to 19 in the second and then returned an amazing 25 to finish his 150 with a score of 130.

Lo Vun Vui lost concentration momentarily and started the second day on 21, recovered to a 23 and then slipped again to 20 to close on 129.

Meanwhile, Peter Blackmore was showing tremendous skill and tenacity and carded 23, 22 and 23 to finish the day on 131. This left him only one target behind defending champion Crikis, who had scored 23, 22, 21 during the day's shooting.

It was becoming quite obvious that the shooter who could perform consistently was going to be successful. Graham Guy had been shooting very well with 23, 20 in the first two rounds on the second day. However, his 13 in the third round was a disaster and wrecked any chance that the Melbourne Gun Club team may have had for the gold medal.

Viroj, of Thailand, who had been in equal third place after the first day, had withdrawn. His departure severely weakened the Thailand team's chances, and it eventually finished in third place with a score of 448/600.

The real surprise was the performance of the Singapore team. Traditionally Singapore has been strong in trap but its skeet team of



Lee (130) Lo (129), Gan (126) and Tang (120) amassed a winning score of 505/600 to win the teams' gold medal. Melbourne Gun Club finished twenty four targets behind on 481/600, and secured the silver medal.

The final 50 targets of the individual match were shot under brutally hot and humid conditions.

Overnight leader Crikis was in an early squad and carded a comfortable 23 to keep plenty of pressure on the competitors still with a chance. Lo and Lee of Singapore destroyed their winning chances with scores of 21 each, and Somchai retained a small chance for the gold by recording 22.

Peter Blackmore, who at the start of the match was unknown internationally, was showing wonderful skill and mental strength. However the "seventh round horrors" got hold of him. After staying clean to station four, Blackmore's nerves caught up with him and he crashed to an 18, leaving Crikis comfortably clear of the field.

The last round became something of a formality with Crikis firing a 24 to take the gold medal with a score of 179/200. Although seven targets lower than his ground record set in 1979, it was a very creditable performance and confirmed his position as one of the top ISU Skeet shooters in the Pacific Basin.


Peter Blackmore recovered to fire a 22 in his last round for an aggregate of 171 to fill fourth place overall.

Somchai scored 23 in his last round to win the silver medal with a total of 175/200. Third place was filled by Lo Vun Viu, who scored 172/200.

The trap match was destined to be as full of surprises as the skeet match, with shooters experiencing great difficulty in producing consistent scores.

With 75 targets being shot on each of the first and second days, the organizers found it necessary to commence shooting at 7.45 a.m. This was due to the size of the field.

David Menck (of New South Wales Gun Club) competing for Australia, was the first shooter in the first squad. He started well, and carded a 19, for the round. Jaques Brisson of New Caledonia recorded a similar score.

Other Australians to get a confident start in the trap match were Terry Budd, Max Vipond and Alex Crikis, all of whom shot 21's.

The 'veteran' Thai shooter Pavitr, gave an early warning signal to all competitors when he shot a 24, and his team captain Dr Tipp recorded 23.

By the end of the first 75 trap targets, Pavitr had stormed to the head of the field to close on 71/75 (24, 23 and 24). Lying in second place overnight was Lee Kum Cheok of Singapore on 66 (22, 24, 20) just ahead of Terry Budd on 65 (21, 23, 21).

In the Melbourne Gun Club team, Alan Blackmore (20, 19, 21) and Brian Bond (19, 21, 20) both overnighted on 60's.

Dr. Tipp had been unable to sustain his strong start, and aggregated 59, after a third round score of 15.

The second day of trap was again full of weather problems. The light changed dramatically, due to passing storms, and scores fluctuated wildly.

Gilbert of Indonesia assembled three consistent rounds - 21, 22, 21 to score 64 for the day for a progressive score of 119.

Singapore's trap ace, Lee, slipped to a 19 in the third round to give him 60 for the day and a progressive of 126.

Dr Tipp experienced mixed fortunes and carded 20, 22 and a magical 25 to close on 126, but was still 11 targets behind Pavitr who appeared to be coasting.

Terry Budd was in second place at the 150 mark, sitting on 131, but still six targets off the pace.

The teams match was won comfortably by Thailand, which scored 497/600. However, the fight for silver medal honours between Singapore and Australia was extremely tight. In fact the Aussies are quite convinced that it was some sort of Yap "black magic" that gave Singapore victory by a margin of one target. (Stephen Yap is the Secretary of the Singapore Shooting Association and was acting as manager of the Singapore trap team.)


He was a very determined shooter, and reached the last target with a clear score, only to experience a premature release. The repeat target continued to the boundary unbroken and it was a very dejected Terry Budd who signed the score sheet that showed 24.

This gave Budd a match aggregate of 175, and meant that Pavitr

had to fire a 19 to tie on 20 or better to win. After a sound start, Pavitr "stumbled" in the middle of the round to drop two targets in three, but recovered to card a 23, leaving him the 1980 Pesta Sukan Trap Champion with a score of 178.

The function was held at the high class Equatorial Hotel, and it was extremely well supported.

The Australians featured regularly in the presentation of awards, and Terry Budd received a tremendous ovation when presented with his Trap Silver Medal.

As a token of the solid relationship that has developed between Singapore and Australia, the Australian Clay Target Association presented Mr Milton Tan with a piece of Queensland petrified wood, on which an appropriate inscription appeared. The Melbourne Gun Clubs team captain Mervyn Whitelaw also made a presentation.

The six-day tournament had been marked by excellent organization. However, good scores were elusive, both in trap and skeet, thus again proving that the Singapore range is a most difficult ground to shoot on.





Many complaints were heard about the method of shooting off five target E/O events, Territory style. Everyone starts Indian file, on walk 3, on a miss and out basis. 




Waugh, another 12 metre shooter, with a nerve-racking 43-44 shootoff with David Bowring 42-44.



MACK THE MEDIA MAN by Pat Browne

Newspaper sporting editors, television personalities and leading footballers got a taste of the joys of clay target shooting at South Australian Gun Club on Tuesday, July 7. The exercise, set up by Eley Ammunition state manager Ray

The exercise, set up by Eley Ammunition state manager Ray Mack, was aimed at familiarising the media to the game and its benefits to the community.

Sporting Editors from both "The Advertiser" and "The News" accepted the invitation together with the anchorman from "Channel 9 News".

Leading sporting personalities from the major league football clubs were also there.

All were impressed with scope of clay target shooting as a disciplined sport.

Speaking to Ray Mack about the day, he said: "We had a couple of people not come along, but generally speaking we have quite a few identities here, particularly from the press and football world".

"Notable football personalities, Neil Kerley, John Cahill and Barry Robran are here together with the sporting editors from both daily papers, Geoff Roach (The News) and Merv Agars (The Advertiser). Channel 9 news anchorman Roger Cardwell has arrived and football commentator Wally May is also here. Wally is a keen shooter anyway and he has been a big help".

When asked how the visitors had reacted to the game, he said: "They were delighted at the opportunity of being able to have a go. Most of them had never seen clay target shooting before and they were impressed with the facilities here at S.A.G.C. and the safety aspects of the sport".

It was obvious from the roars of delight when targets were broken that the game had certainly caught their fancy as they ran the full gamut of DTL and Skeet shooting.

In fact quite some rivalry developed between the various league football teams as their coaches tackled this new sport.

During proceedings, State Coaching Director Peter Quire outlined to the media men the various facets of the clay target shooting sports, complete with plenty of facts and figures.

They were most interested and surprised that the sport had such a big following throughout Australia.

Geoff Roach from the "News" was so impressed that he devoted his whole sporting column on August 7 to the day.


He wrote of the sport in glowing terms, pointing out that shooters: "are not an irresponsible covey, blazing away at everything in sight".

sight". He went on to say that club shooting could be an enjoyable family sport, as safe and rewarding as say golf. "Now in my case", he added, "it was not going to be easy to convince me. I have always regarded guns with the same mixture of fear and loathing as I have snakes".

It was an unashamed exercise in public relations, one that had a fair measure of success.

"I think that our future growth in this sport depends on introducing outsiders to the sport. You only have limited growth amongst your own people, so the more outside influences you can get in, the better it will be, and there is no doubt about it, people enjoy it when they come along", said Ray Mack at the conclusion of the day.


It is his intention to run another such day as soon as time and circumstances permit.

ROYAL JOHOR MATCH TO AUSSIES

As a follow-on to the Pesta Sukan tournament, the Royal Johor Shooters' Association had programmed a two-day international trap and skeet match.

Johor is the most southern Malaysian state, and shares a common border with Singapore. The host association is led by Dr. E. Leonard, and has as its Patron, His Highness the Tunku of Johor, Tunku Mahkota.


The organisers had arranged buses to transport the international competitors from their base in Singapore, to the shooting grounds a distance of about 60 kilometres.

The Australians had great difficulty in adapting to the weather, which was incredibly hot and humid on the first day and wet and windy on the second day.

The second day was further complicated by a massive traffic jam on the causeway which connects Malaysia with Singapore - a religious festival and a public holiday precipitated a major "retreat" from Singapore. This delay caused the late arrival of competitors at the shooting ground, which in turn delayed the start of the second day's program by about two hours.


The club facilities were extremely good, and the ground was presented in immaculate condition (a second Melbourne Gun Club). The skeet and Olympic Trench fields are superimposed, so the organisers had their hands full getting the program completed.

Still hot from successes in Singapore, Alex Crikis dominated the skeet and his score of 96 paved the way for an Australian runaway victory in the teams' event.

Once again Somchai of Thailand was closest to Crikis, but his two 21s on the second day did nothing to maintain pressure on Crikis who produced a magnificent 25 in his last round to win by 7 targets. Gideon of Indonesia was the surprise of the event. He performed remarkably consistently to aggregate 88 to take the individual Bronze Medal.

In the trap (O.T.) event, Pavitr of Thailand copied Crikis' example to win the individual Cold Medal very comfortably -- his score of 90 left him seven targets clear of the other placegetters.

Melbourne Gun Club carded a very good score in the trap teams event to take a Silver Medal after the Australian team was severely depleted by the withdrawal of Max Vipond. Max had collapsed in the hotel the previous night, and had all of his team mates very worried. (Latest reports are that Max Vipond, following extensive medical checks after his return to Australia, is quite O.K.)

The MGC team finished on 316 (Crikis 82; A. Blackmore 81; Lucas 71; Bond 82.) to trail Thailand by 10 targets, with the Australian team (Budd 76; Menck 78; Briggs 71; Whitelaw 81) a further 10 targets behind on 306 to take the Bronze Medal.

The presentation of trophies was done during a lavish party at the Istana (the Royal Palace) on the final night. Alex Crikis and Pavitr (Thailand) were presented with beautiful gold watches, complete with the Royal Crest in gold inlay, for the individual wins.

Other trophy winners received their medals in front of a large crowd which included many influencial Malaysian "neighbours" of the Tunku.

The presentations were made by Her Highness Princess Hajah Shiriah (wife of Tunku Mahkota), who has been tremendously hospitable to the Australians on each occasion they have visited Johor). And so the international trap and skeet circuit of South East Asia

came to a close.

The Aussies performed very well, with the official teams representing Melbourne Gun Club and the ACTA being accepted as first class competitors.

Equally as important, the exercise proved to be very worthwhile Australia and clay target shooting in the best possible light. Congratulations, fellas, you did a great job. О

Near-perfect Shooting with Winchester Super X Wins International Skeet



Waektare. "Mr Meyer from West Germany was 2nd with 957, Mr Bjork from Sweden was 3rd with 950, and Mr Loftum from Norway was last with 937.'

• Ray Burrill and Henry Weitzel ponder the fine scores recorded by SAGC in the skeet teams' match.


(24) and Peter McVicar (24). Their 118/125 was a good score but in fact the match was over on station 4 when the fifth target was missed.



INTERNATIONAL DISCIPLINE SCENE IN AUSTRALIA

The Australian entry of three trap (O.T.) and one skeet competitor in the First Asian Clay Pigeon Championships, to be conducted in Bangkok in December is seen as a major breakthrough for the international disciplines in this country.

To date, Australia's clay target shooters — certainly those with international competition aspirations — have been hamstrung by a total dependence on the South Pacific Shooting Federation for what may be called "local international competition".

Membership of the SPS Federation is restricted to New Guinea New Zealand and Australia. Competition between these three countries has always been good, and matches have been of a high standard.

But one can never quite get rid of the feeling that one is competing in his own backyard.

In recognition of this factor, the ACTA recommended to the Australian Shooting Association that Australia seek affiliation with the Asian Shooting Federation — in this way, not only would a greater competitor depth be developed, but ACTA management felt that something extra could also be offered to the Asians. In other words the suggestion was seen to have benefits each way.

The ASA threw the idea out, and asked all its affiliates to more actively support the South Pacific Shooting Federation, to develop it to a position of greater strength.

The ACTA responded to this request — to the point where it offered to provide secretarial service in an attempt to improve the slow moving communications system within the SPS Federation.

The offer was declined, but the ACTA is still TRYING to play a role in the strengthening of the SPSF. As evidence of this, clay target events have been a most important part of all recent South Pacific Championships — Australia has acted as host in two out of the last three years, and will again be host in 1981.

Notwithstanding all of the above, the Association's International Sub Committee realised that a new competition theatre was required — one which provided a worthwhile standard of competition, but conveniently located in terms of cost and accessibility.

South East Asia fills the specification, and negotiations for official access commenced in 1979. Bob Buchan of Melbourne Gun Club and a member of the ACTA Administrative Unit had personal discussions with Stephen Yap, Secretary of the Singapore Shooting Association (and one of the most senior shooting sports administrators in the Asian area) and officials of the Skeet and Trap Association of Thailand.

A full report was presented to the ACTA Executive Committee, including a recommendation that Australia actively seek acceptance in Asian shooting tournaments.

Such has now come about, at least insofar as national associations are concerned. No official request has yet been made to join the entry list for the top level Asian Games.

The ACTA is taking the opportunity offered by competitions in Asia to "blood" some of its rising stars. In other words, instead of sending shooting athletes to World Championships for their first taste of overseas competition (where a poor performance destroys their confidence!), up-and-coming competitors are now being offered a worthwhile opportunity to gain international competition hardening, but still in their own league.

Turning now specifically to the Bangkok competition, Australia has chosen Graeme Boyd of Albury to represent it in skeet. Boyd performed incredibly well in the 1979 World Championships held at Montecatini Italy when he scored 147 in the first six rounds of the skeet match, only to suffer from the "seventh round jitters," which destroyed his medal chances!

Trap representatives include Ray Collinson of Townsville, who is considered by many to have been most unlucky not to have gained selection in 1979, John Maxwell of Woolongong and Greg Long of Melbourne, both of whom competed in the 1980 South Pacific Championships in Christchurch.

The team will leave Australia on December 1 and return on December 15.

New South Wales Training Squad

Good news department — Kevin Loy, Terry Budd and David Menck, with the support of other OT and ISU Skeet enthusiasts have jolted the NSWCTA into accepting a proposal to create a state training squad in the international disciplines.

A series of qualifying events is to be held during October and November, after which the nucleus of the squad will be named. Early planning suggests that squad members will be encouraged to form a state team to compete in the National titles, to be held at Cunderdin Gun Club, W.A. in mid November.

Host clubs will include NSWGC, Downside International and possibly Taree-Wingham. Interested shooters should watch the NSW section of CTSN for details and dates of events.

When the state squad is formed, New South Wales will join Victoria as the two states with the foresight to provide some sort of incentive for competitors in international disciplines.

1980 National Titles — W.A.

Competitors intending to contest the National Olympic Trench and ISU Skeet Championships being held in Western Australia in November have very little time to book their air travel, if they are planning on using concession fares.

An approach to your local Ansett sales office will show that the Super Apex fare offers travellers a 40% discount — however, the number of seats available is limited and the traveller must also comply with certain conditions.

An alternative means of travel is by coach. Operators from the east coast of Australia include Pioneer (an Ansett operation) Greyhound and Olympic East West Express.

MACKINTOSH TEAM CONDITIONS TO ALTER IN 1981

The Clay Pigeon Shooting Association of Great Britain had advised that conditions relating to team size in the Mackintosh International Teams' Match have been altered.

Commencing in 1981, the number of competitors to be included in the team has been reduced to 20 (previously 30) and the best 15 scores will be used to calculate the national score.

Each team member will still shoot at 100 targets from 16 yards, and scoring will be 3 points for a break on the first barrel and 2 points for a break on the second barrel.

The total possible score for any team will be 4500 points.

The new format will be first used in Australia during the 1981 Trap and Skeet Championships to be held in Melbourne, during Easter.

FROM THE DESK OF THE NATIONAL **COACHING DIRECTOR**

WHY DOES A SHOOTER EXPERIENCE A SORE FACE WHEN COMPETING?

This is a relatively common question and was specifically raised in a letter which recently arrived on my desk.

It occurred to me that the answer may be of interest to readers and so arrangements were made with the Editor to reprint it, as follows

"I am sorry to hear of the problems you have when shooting your Brno 0 & U shotgun when fitted with the 28" barrels.

There are many reasons for a gun hurting a shooter's face but I will start with the most common, that of holding a gun incorrectly.

When a gun with a standard, not Monte Carlo, comb is fired, the front of the comb being higher than the rear, it is progressively higher as the recoil shifts the gun to the rear, consequently engaging the cheek bone on the way back, causing bruising and sometimes even breaking the skin.

If this is your problem, you should try to mount the gun as far in onto the shoulder as possible. In other words, get more square to the gun, practising putting up the gun one-handed will help here. When the gun is on the shoulder, lift the face and place the chin against the stock, then run the face down the comp picking up a little cheek-flesh on the way as padding. If you can feel the comb hard against your cheekbone it is incorrect and you should try again.

Another cause is altering the angle of the head to the comb-forward or back in trying to look flat along the rib. This is a common fault, particularly where the shooter pulls his chin back allowing the cheekbone to bear directly on the comb.


A shooter should look down on the rib, not flat along it. When shooting clay targets one should have at least the width of two twenty cent pieces above the breech where the line of sight crosses it. I shot for thirty years with my line of sight crossing the height of my little finger when laid on the breech!

Too much positive (up) or negative (down) pitch can also be a cause of the problem. This is because the gun muzzle will throw upwards with too much positive pitch making the comb more progressive as it comes back. In reverse, too much negative pitch will allow the butt to slide upwards on firing, consequently also bumping the cheek bone.

Get a friend to watch the muzzle of your gun when you fire, the muzzle should come back in a straight line or depress slightly. If it (the pitch) is correct it (the muzzle) should not have any exaggerated up or down movement.

Placing the gun too low on the shoulder is another cause of a bruised face. The shooter has to lower his face into the comb and the head being on an angle to it (the comb) allows the cheekbone to lie directly on it with painful results.

I would like you to work on the above and see if any of the items given help your particular case. If they do not, come back to me and we will take the matter further." O

TRADE TOPICS

When one visits South East Asia, the relative freedom of Australian firearms dealers and users is brought into stark reflief.

The experience of Australia's entry in the recent Pesta Sukan tournament in Singapore makes interesting reading.

Before the team could even consider taking their own shotguns with them, an import licence had to be obtained from the Singapore Police Department, and then had to be presented to Customs on arrival at Singapore Airport.

Then, after processing through Customs, the shotguns were loaded into a locked van and, under police escort, were taken direct to the armoury of the Singapore Gun Club. Apart from use during practice and competition, the guns were not able to be removed from the armoury until the team was due to depart from Singapore. Again, the transfer was only approved if done with a police escort. Meanwhile the sale of cartridges is very restricted, with local shooters and visitors being totally dependent upon imports.

Strict control on import licences has a very limiting effect, although the range of brands available is reasonably extensive.

The Australians had a choice of Remington or Fiocchi — other brands used by competitors included Winchester and KFC (Japan).

Many other Asian nations are similarly affected by rigid police and customs controls. As a further example, take the case of Indonesia. Competition shooters here are able to shoot only one or two rounds of trap and skeet weekly in practice, to preserve their meagre allocation of targets and shotshells for competition.

The message surely is that manufacturers, importers, dealers and users in Australia must continue to act in a responsible fashion, if the present acceptable legislative position is to be preserved.

It seems that actions such as the importation of replicas of current specialised military automatic and semi-automatic weapons is NOT in keeping with such an attitude. One wonders whether such importers will be the first to scream when public pressures force the legislators to jump on the "controls" bandwagon again.

In a major reshuffle of senior sales staff, Eley General Manager, Ron Clark has announced several new changes.

Geoff Kilgour who has been sales manager for Victoria and Tasmania for the past two years, has been appointed National Distribution Manager and Sales Controller. With Eley following a policy of centralised warehousing activities, this will be a most challenging position, and Geoff Kilgour's 28 years in the Eley machine will provide a firm base for his activities.

Bruce Southgate will fill the vacancy created by Mr Kilgour's promotion. He was originally recruited from Evans and Balfour in 1975, and has been one of Eley's most enthusiastic and productive outside sales staff in recent years.

Meanwhile, popular Peter Peacock is heading west to fill the vacancy created by the sudden resignation of David Henthorn, who had been Eley's W.A. sales manager for the last five years.

Peacock has been with Eley for a number of years, and has filled many sales posts including his most recent appointment as Product Manager - Rimfire.

Henthorn's resignation came as a shock to Eley, but as Ron Clarke says, "...new blood never hurt any organisation..."

Co-inciding with the staff changes, a number of new products have appeared on Eley's sales range. These follow the instant success of the Nikko firearms range, and include Norton ear protection products (which supplement the existing Silencio range), Eley shooting glasses, and a new 12 gauge cartridge known as "Trainer".

The 65mm (21/2") cartridge is made in Great Britain and consists of a two piece plastic hull, with low steel head. It is loaded to give good velocity with light recoil, and contains one ounce of shot.

It has specifically been introduced to assist in the development of community training projects in the safe handling of firearms, hence the name "Trainer".

The shooting glasses are multi-lens sets, each frame being supplied in a heavy duty cover with three sets of lens — green, yellow and vermillion are the standard colors. The frames are supplied with arms that clip around the ears — a must for competitors in windy conditions — but causes no discomfort.

The fitting of the lens is a simple but effective press-in arrangement, and changes can be made quickly. The lens are large, and comfortable fitting, a must for competition use.

The product is available through Eley dealers, with a recommended price tag around \$20.

Australia's Mackintosh Trophy After Scores Mix-Up!

The Clay Pigeon Shooting Association of Great Britain has announced the results of the 1980 Mackintosh International Teams' Postal Match.

The announcement was made at the conclusion of the 40th Annual British Open Championships, a match which for the first time had an official Australian team in attendance.

New Zealand was announced as the winner of the Mackintosh Trophy with a score of 7357 points. However, a subsequent recheck of the scores showed that errors had been made in the New Zealand records.

PRODUCT REVIEW by Pat Browne **EXPANDER CLEANING** ROD

Story by Pat Browne

Latest thing in cleaning rods.

From Norway and via Eurocut in Sydney comes the EXPANDER cleaning rod for shotguns, described as the ultimate in 'complete shotgun cleaning systems'.

Modern shotguns, with their sophisticated choking, better cham-bering and accurate forcing cones, together with a preoccupation with better target breaking patterns, demand care in cleaning.

Ordinary cleaning rods have difficulty handling the various diameters one encounters in the bore of a modern shotgun.

The EXPANDER rod consists of a steel cored, one piece plastic tube shaft 100mm in diameter. The 12 gauge version available in Australia is 100cm long with a useable shaft length of 86cm allowing the cleaning of barrels up to 84 cm in length.

The cleaning end consists of several spacing collars and a couple of soft rubber rings that expand under the influence of a wheel in the handle at the other end.


Expandable jags are not new but it is claimed that this system is the first to have control of this feature from the handle end.

Pre-cut cleaning strips are supplied with the rod. There are two varieties, a cloth strip and a cloth backed fine steel wool strip. Both

are pre-punched in three places to allow maximum use. Fine steel wool is the very best method of removing accumulated leading and plastic fouling from a barrel and this strip method is a lot more efficient that wrapping wads of steel wool around a jag.

The strips are held in position by a soft plastic cap that prevents them from dislodging in the barrel. Supplies of the strips we are told will be readily available.

With this one rod you can scrub the chambers and forcing cone, do the bore properly and then the chokes without changing the tip or jag. For the modern skeet gun with 'jugged' or 'recessed' chokes, this rod is a must.

Australian Shooting Assn. President's Policy Statement

In view of the controversy surrounding the entry of two Australian small-bore rifle shooters in the Moscow Olympics after the Australian Shooting Association had officially withdrawn the shooting team, ASA President Peter Papps set out the chronological sequence of events for the information of the Confederation of Australian Sport.

The following is the text of Mr Papp's letter:

Just prior to the departure of the Australian Olympic Team to Moscow, the Australian Shooting Association went through a period of challenge from one of its affiliates, the Australian Small Bore Rifle Association.

The Australian Shooting Association, after many meetings and much soul searching, decided to heed the call of the Australian Government to boycott the Games and came to a decision to withdraw its nominated team from participation at the Olympic Games.

It is of great concern to us, as the parent body for shooting in Australia, that the effect of this challenge might have far reaching repercussions throughout the whole sporting movement in Australia. The concern that unity must be protected is shared by all of the other affiliates of this Association.

The following is a brief account of the events which lead to the inclusion in the Australian Olympic Team, of two small-bore rifle shooters, Mrs Yvonne HILL and Mr David HOLLISTER.

Following the Australian Olympic Federation decision, in late May 1980, to send an Australian Team to Moscow, the Australian Clay Target Association and the Amateur Pistol Shooting Union of Australia requested that a special meeting of the ASA be held, to discuss the position regarding the ASA's attitude to the Australian Government's request for a boycott of the Games.

ernment's request for a boycott of the Games. At the conclusion of the ASA Seminar "The Shooting Sports Through the Eighties", which was being held in Canberra from 6-7 June 1980, a Special Meeting of the ASA with representatives of all the affiliates present, was convened on 8 June 1980.

At the end of this long and protracted meeting the following press statement was issued by the President, Mr Peter Papps.

"An extraordinary meeting of the Australian Shooting Association was held on June 8th 1980 to discuss the decision of the Australian Olympic Federation in relation to the Moscow Olympic Games.

After careful consideration of this most complex matter, it was resolved that the Australian Shooting Association inform the Australian Olympic Federation that the Shooting team is withdrawn from the Australian Olympic Team, with the exception of Yvonne Hill.

The Association received copies of documents shortly before the meeting, indicating that Yvonne HILL has obtained an order in the Supreme Court of South Australia, which appears to have the effect of restricting the Association from withdrawing her from the Olympic Team. The Association is taking legal action and will act accordingly.

The members of the council share the disappointment of all team members but call upon them to understand this difficult decision."

On the Thursday preceding this meeting the ASA had a writ issued against it through its Public Officer, Mr David Hillan, in Adelaide. The President was informed of this action on the Friday when it was too late to arrange representation at court and on that same day the Supreme Court of South Australia issued a temporary injunction against the ASA which prevented them from interfering with the nomination of Mrs Yvonne HILL to the Australian Olympic Federation.

This writ was the reason why Mrs HILL was the only shooting member who was excluded from the withdrawal of the team by the ASA.

During the foliowing week there were several media reports on television, radio and through newspapers in which both Mrs Yvonne HILL and Mr David HOLLISTER, the two small-bore rifle nominees, were featured. Neither of these two people sought advice from the ASA during this period, although they had both been contacted by the Section Manager and informed of the current situation.

The following Friday, June 13, 1980, the Australian Small Bore Rifle Association issued a further writ on the ASA which was to restrain the ASA from interfering with either of the two small-bore nominees to the Olympic Games, Mrs Yvonne HILL and Mr David HOLLISTER.

This second writ was presented in court the same day, but the ASA sought a deferment to the following Monday, 16 June 1980. The writ was heard in front of Mr Justice Mohr in the Supreme Court Chambers and not in the normal Supreme Court manner. The ASA was represented by the President and one other but both were prevented from presenting any evidence on behalf of the ASA. There was no reporting from that hearing and Mr Justice Mohr handed down a mandatory interlocutary injunction, which basically restrained the ASA from interfering with the two small-bore nominees.

Meanwhile, time rolled on and the date for departure of the team to Moscow was drawing close. A decision had to be made immediately. All of these extra problems placed a great strain on the resources of the ASA and those of several affiliates and many, many hours were spent by the honorary members of the ASA. Whether it was convenient or not, several of the officers of the ASA made sacrifices of their time and private jobs to follow this matter through.

Mrs HILL's case has still not been heard, so that the injunction that was handed down by Mr Justice Mohr took precedence over her original injunction that was placed against the ASA. The ASA was left in the position of having one of its affiliates, the Australian Small Bore Rifle Association, claming action by invoking one of the clauses of the ASA Constitution which states—

"Any of the constituent organisations may refuse to accept a resolution relating in whole, or in part, to its own field of interest, and shall not then be bound by such resolution."

The ASA was then faced with the dilemma of determining whether the ASA would contest the decision handed down by Mr Justice Mohr, or whether the Association should decline to carry the matter any further as far as the court was concerned. The decision to seek further legal advice and go back to the South Australian court and appeal against the decision of Mr Justice Mohr was taken.

That appeal was heard before the Chief Justice of South Australia and was not granted because of the lack of time involved before the team departure for Moscow.

The only option then left open to the ASA was to take the matter to the High Court in Canberra and have the matter brought before Mr Justice Mason. However, before such action was initiated, the ASA would have to seek the approval of all the affiliates.

A further Special Meeting of the ASA was then convened in Sydney on 28 June 1980, with delegates present representing all the affiliates. All aspects of seeking further legal action were discussed, including the financial problems associated with such a procedure. Several of the affiliates indicated that they were not able to do so but indicated that they agree in principle to the matter.

When the matter was put to a vote the motion was lost and the ASA ceased to take any further action.

That Special Meeting also saw a change in the ASA Secretary position when the resignation of Mr David Hillan was accepted.

The Australian Shooting Association remains concerned that such actions by one of its affiliates has caused considerable unrest amongst its other affiliated bodies. Of particular concern is the retention of the ASA as the nominated parent body to the Australian Olympic Federation and other like organisations and the repercussions which such decisions, handed down against the ASA, might have to other parent sporting organisations.

Amateur sport in Australia is at a threshold and needs the security and backing of the Australian Government for all such matters.


A happy group of clay busters has just returned from South East Asia after sharing in a Jetset Tours — Australian Clay Target Association travel project.

The group toured Bali, Jakarta, Singapore and Malaysia, with a smaller party taking an optional four day visit to Northern Sumatra.

A total of twenty people participated in the project, the feature of which was the Pesta Sukan Shooting Festival in Singapore, and an international trap and skeet tournament conducted by the Royal Johor, Shooters' Association. (Both these events have been reported elsewhere).

The driving force behind the project was Mervyn Whitelaw of Melbourne Gun Club. He is a veteran of five visits to Pesta Sukan, and is dedicated to sharing the sheer enjoyment of the match with as many other Australian clay busters as possible.

It is difficult to identify any particular highlight of the tour, as various people react differently to changing circumstances.

However, the three days spent on Bali were sufficient to prove that the island is idyllic — many of the group intend to return there privately at some later stage.

The party stayed at the Bali Beach International Hotel at Sanur, which is about six kilometres from Denpasar, Bali's capital city.

The traditional dancing was a feature of the visit, and the group sat entranced through performances of the Kechak Dance (the Monkey Dance) the Barong Dance (dance of good and bad spirits) and the Legong Dance, which was performed by a company of young girls, whose ages ranged from four to twelve.

The stay in Jakarta proved to be most interesting, and included a day tour to the mountain resort of Bogur. One of the main attractions at Bogur was the magnificent Botanical Gardens, which featured sections of horticulture from all over the world. The girls were left breathless by the display of orchids — literally, thousands of varieties.

The group was based at the Borobudur Inter-Continental Hotel for its sojourn in Jakarta — it proved to be a most satisfactory choice.

Then onto Singapore where the Holiday Inn Hotel-was to be "home" for the shooters in the party for the next ten days.

During this time, the "tourists" flew to Medan, the capital city of Northern Sumatra. It was like entering an entirely different world, with European tourists still being a most unusual occurrence.

One of the prettiest spots in the world would have to be Lake Toba, which has formed in the crater of an extinct volcano, about one hundred and seventy kilometres from Medan.

In the centre of the lake is Samosir Island, the home of the Batak tribe, reputedly one of the most aggressive tribes in Sumatra. However, during the Aussies visit, the handcraft skills of the local people became the most outstanding feature.

Although the small touring party had originally intended to visit Padang (capital of Western Sumatra) before returning to Singapore, a cancelled flight, combined with messy re-scheduling, forced the group to return direct to Singapore.

The last few days were spent as guests of His Highness, the Tunku of Johor and the Royal Johor Shooters' Association.

Although the weather was a little unkind, the warmth of the hospitality more than offset the effects of rain and cold winds.

The stay in Johor culminated with a "party" at the Royal Istana (Palace), to which were invited about five hundred local identities and all the shooters and their families.

It is impossible to describe the standard of the surroundings, the food and the hospitality at this function — the nearest word that may be used is SUPERB.

The only real hassle of the trip occurred when the party was leaving Singapore Airport to return home.

Everybody had been over enthusiastic in their duty free shopping, which resulted in the baggage being a whopping 150 kgs over the limit. (This was AFTER Singapore Airlines had kindly agreed to carry the firearms at no excess!)

After a long tussle an acceptable rate of payment was established, and members of the group hurried on to the Singapore Airlines 747 jet which returned them to Australia.

USA INTÉREST ENCOURAGING

The same enjoyment as that experienced by members of the group that travelled to South East Asia awaits members who join the AC-TA group which will tour America and Hawaii for 30 days in July and August 1981.

One of the big advantages of joining a "common interest group" is that the traveller can get all of the convenience and economic benefits of group travel, but be assured of travelling with friends.

Until the dates for the 1981 Grand American Tournament have been announced — it is to be the feature of the ACTA tour — the tour itinerary cannot be finalised.

However, the price will be around the \$3000 mark, which for 30 days and in times of dramatic airfare increase, is quite modest.



A very good friend of mine who shall remain nameless is a farmer in the mid-north of South Australia. He has little or no interest in clay target shooting. His son however over a number of years had been putting in some time as a trapper boy at the local gun club.

The young fellow, as he got older showed some interest in the game. It was not long before his couple of dollars earned from putting targets on the traps went towards the requirements of breaking targets coming out of the traps. Probably this sort of story can be repeated hundreds of times throughout this country.

Father, who only had an old rusty single barrel on the wall and a .22 rifle for vermin control could see that he was being lined up for a decent smoothbore for the boy. Being a cautious fellow as men on the land are known to be, the lad's grandfather's old side by side came off the top of the wardrobe as the first trap gun.

I happened to be there at the time of the presentation. Believe me, the look on that lad's face was worth a million words. The gun was no old clunker, but a mint condition Remington side by side trap gun, used by his grandfather in the good old days for you know what. It had been given tender loving care and it showed. I can also report that since it has been in the hands of the youngster, that care has continued.

Before long, the trapper boy from a year or two back became the junior shooter of today. Following his progress, I had noticed him shooting better and better scores. On my rather infrequent visits, I would listen to the stories of the gun clubs visited and the targets missed, of the good days and the bad. A junior version of us all.

He certainly worked hard on his game, the frequent phone calls for a couple of kilos of powder, shot, wads and primers to be put on the train attests that. He would spend hours at the loading press put-

EDITOR'S MAILBOX

Dear Sir,

I am writing this letter in the hope the Association will consider giving Veteran shooters a better deal. By Veterans I mean shooters over the age of 60 who have been members of the Association and regular shooters for 25 years or more. My Father is one of those and 1 know how much he looks forward to going to clay target shoots, but his financial position now keeps him down to about one shoot every 5 or 6 weeks depending on the cost. My suggestions are...cut nominations for veterans to half and go a bit easy on the handicapping of them. When an oldie shoots a possible it is more good luck than management, so why not handicap them on performance over a period of say 100 or 200 birds from handicap marks, something like the 16 yard graded principle. Recently, my Dad won a gun from 16 yards and was immediately told he would go back to 19 yards as the gun was worth so much (Retail). He has since told us he would never be able to afford to shoot in handicaps again as it would be a miracle if he could hit 10 straight let alone 20 off his handicap now, he just cannot afford to throw \$10 or \$20 down the drain when he knows he has absolutely no chance of getting a cut by shooting a possible.

Hoping you can do something about it because a consistent old shooter must be worth something to the Association. There has been a lot said and written about the need to attract new shooters, which is a good thing, but you must know most new shooters only last a year or maybe two and you never hear or see them again, while the keen old shooter takes his punishment and keeps coming back for more. ting his shells together for a game that he had become very involved in.

Noticeable also was the fact that father and mother were taking to running him to the shoots and occasionally sticking around to watch him compete. The young fellow's shooting prowess suddenly started to bob up in conversations with them. I even started to get the odd phone call to tell me how he did at such and such a shoot.

Then, just before last Christmas, whilst on a visit, dad took me aside and asked me to get the youngster a new gun. He told me that the boy had spent the whole of his holidays on the header helping with the harvest and as he put it, never had he seen boy work harder. So, the brand new gun was to become a reality, but something that was earned the hard way.

Day was not sure what he wanted but he had overheard him talking about a pigeon grade something or other. That was enough for me and with some help from debonair Dick (Dick Ayres of Winchester Aust.) and Bob Fisher (of Fisher Firearms) the brand new Under & Over with some other goodies was duly dispatched to go under the Christmas Tree. I was not at the second presentation, but I am led to believe that it was as good as the first.

Well, it was if you had opened the barn door. That boy's shooting improved to a degree that was nothing short of amazing. The maturity was not there but by crikey could he hit targets. I settled back with that satisfying feeling that here was another kid growing up in the self disciplined world of clay busting and all was well.

Then I got a couple of phone calls. The first was two weeks ago. The young fellow was on the phone to tell me that he had shot 60 odd straight and had won a gun in the C grade division of a trophy shoot. I was a couple of hundred kilometers away but the excitement came through, he just had to share that triumph with somebody.

The second call came almost exactly to the minute, a week later. It was father, asking for some advice. At his local club, the lad had' nominated in the junior shoot for the day. Three youngsters had shot 17-20, his boy being one of them. Come shoot-off time he was told he could not shoot on because he was 'too good'.

Dad wanted to know if this was allowed. My reply was that I doubted that it was, but I have since been informed by a referee examiner that clubs can do what they like at club level shoots. Oh well ... It will give me something to think about, the words that is, when the youngster asks me WHY?

So, if there is anybody out there in the wonderful world of clay target shooting land who would like to buy a slightly used trap gun, drop me a line. I will put you onto a very disillusioned 14-year-old. Don't expect a bargain though, that lad has been through the mill. He worked damned hard for that gun and the success he had with it and it is very likely he will drive a hard bargain. What a shocking wastel
