The result is that club secretaries are going to suffer some inconvenience in recording handicap scores, and each shooter is asked to co-operate to the fullest extent possible.

It will assist club officials considerably if you could write in new sub headings on the panel titled AUSTRALIAN HAND-ICAP SHOOTING as follows:

Column 1 — Old Heading 'Prog Total' - New Heading 'Event Targets'

Column 2 — Old Heading 'Retail Trophy Value' - New Heading 'Event Score'

Column 3 — Old Heading 'H'cap' - New Heading 'Progress Total'

Column 4 — Old Heading 'Score Verified by' - this column is to be divided into two — the first of the new columns is to be headed 'Percentage' and the second is to be headed 'Handicap'

After you have amended your 1981 card, it shood look like this:



AUSTRALIAN SKEETIES DOMINATE THAILAND INTERNATIONAL

(STAFF WRITER)

- **★** The Association skeet team won the Gold Medal at Bangkok
- * Alex Crikis reinforced his position as the best skeet shooter in the Asian Area.
- **★ John Maxwell's Bronze Medal in the trap match resulted** from a very consistent performance.

December 1, 1980 — a special day in the history of the Australian Clay Target Association

This was the day Australia's team of rising shotgun stars departed to complete in an international match in Bangkok. Thailand.

The project was the brainchild of the International Subcommittee, which was looking for a means of giving "up and coming" Olympic Trench and ISU Skeet shooters an opportunity to gain some worthwhile international experience, and at the same time, keep the cost to modest levels. The selection of the team was made through reports and recommendations submitted by State Directors of Coaching. and included John Maxwell. Greg Long and Ray Collinson (shooting trap) and Graeme Boyd in skeet.

The group was under the watchful eye of manager Bob Buchan. It assembled in Melbourne prior to flying to Bangkok with Thai Airways International on the Royal Orchid Service.

THE ELEY REPORT



MORE SUCCESSES

ELEY, along with all Australian Clay Target shooters I am sure, would like to congratulate Alex Crikis on his latest triumphs in Thailand which added to his remarkable record overseas during 1980. In all he won —

Bronze Medal S.E. Pacific Titles
Gold Medal Singapore ISU Skeet
Championships

Gold Medal Asian Skeet Championships and was a member on all these occasions of the Gold winning Australian team.

There doesn't seem any doubt we can hold our own in standard with any country in our immediate region — if only more competition in Europe and North America could be gained for our best people.

TALES FROM THE CAMPFIRE

At the time of writing, there has been quite a hoo-ha from the Cowboy camp about its possible closedown. Actually, when it is all sorted out, one factory — at New Haven, on the East Coast of America — may be closed during the last quarter of 1981 (12 months off yet) only if it cannot be sold in the meantime. It would seem the whole exercise was more of a publicity exercise to advertise the sale of a firearm plant than anything else.

The brand will still sell world-wide no matter who manufactures the actual firearms and that, in itself, is no bad thing as, despite their faults, they are a most vital force in the industry and an integral part of it the world over. Like ELEY.

PRICES

What upsets me is the efforts of the same organisation to raise prices by having the Industries Assistance Commission (IAC) recommend a tariff increase for all types of ammunition.

On the one hand, their M.D. gave sworn testimony on how difficult it was for them to manufacture in Australia, viz. —

"If we are to continue to operate a viable Australian manufacturing complex we need the level of protection requested."

Then, within a month, a circular under the same gentleman's name, is distributed to the trade claiming —

"The operation continues to increase in strength with the 1980 year establishing new records in ammunition production volumes, total sales and net profit."

Hardly the type of enterprise, one would think, which needs of 15 to 30% in tariff protection in order to "continue to operate."

Now we, at ELEY, would certainly like to see more profit for our capital investment and, as an organisation, we have taken all sorts of steps to trim costs, streamline systems, locate product sources, extend turnover and such, all designed to achieve this end.

What our American friends have asked for is virtually a doubling of tariff protection levels so that retail prices can be raised, with sales tax, by 30/40%.

If ELEY had adopted this stance, it would have been so much easier; instead of trimming costs, perhaps we should have hired ourselves an expensive Public Relations Consultant/Lobbyists (they retained one of the best in Australia — Mr. P. J. Anderson of International Public Relations in Canberra) and put our prices up by gaining extra tariff protection. It was our decision that this policy in the long term, would be counter-productive, that it was up to us to make ourselves competitive and not be propped up by any government.

The final judgement as to which is right lies in the hands of you, the end user. I hope you come down on our side.


At the same time, a team representing Frankston/Australian Gun Club and two skeet shooters from Melbourne Gun Club also travelled to compete in the match.

Frankston/Australian Gun Club was represented by Graham Ash (Captain), Tom Lucas, Bill Iles and Stan Collins. The Melbourne Gun Club representatives were Alex Crikis and Peter Blackmore.

On arrival, the team was met by representatives of the Skeet & Trapshooting Association of Thailand, who assisted with the entry of firearms. For reasons that are still obscure, the authorities would not allow the firearms to be taken from the airport, and this caused leader Bob Buchan (and the Thai shooters) considerable embarrassment.

After about 90 minutes of "negotiations", there was no alternative but to leave the firearms, and this factor was a serious worry until Bob B. sorted it out 48 hours after arrival. Ironically, no other international team suffered the same inconvenience. This is known as "the luck of the draw!"

As a means of getting team members to completely relax after the relatively long flight, arrangements had been made for a half day tour of Bangkok's world famous floating market.



 Prior to the international match, the Australians relaxed for a day by cruising Bangkok's extensive waterways. This was one of the few times anybody got ahead of Alex Crikis — Ray Collinson from Townsville boards the boat in front of Alex C.

The boys appeared to enjoy this immensely, as it provided them with an early opportunity to observe the completely different life style that applies in South East Asia.

The second day after arrival had been left completely free, and many of the team took advantage of the chance to develop their bartering techniques with local traders. All sorts of "bargains" were claimed, and it seemed that the group was moulding itself into a very happy unit.

Manager Bob arranged a team conference prior to the commencement of practice, and this was a major factor in the introduction of a form of self-imposed discipline, which, over the period of the competition, made the Australian team one of which its country should be very proud.

Day three — December 4 — was the first day of official practice. This gave the team its first view of the competition facilities, which are located on the Huo Mark range, about 7 kilometres from the centre of Bangkok city. It is part of a major sporting complex, which was developed by the Thai government for the 1975 South East Asian Peninsula Games. and was last used for a major international shoot during the 1978 Asian Games.

The facilities consist of two skeet and two trap fields, superimposed, together with a comfortable clubhouse. Equipment was La Porte, manually loaded and cocked.

The Skeet and Trapshooting Association of Thailand (known as STAT) had made a great job of preparing the range, after serious flooding had inundated the area for almost two months. The water subsided only three weeks prior to the scheduled commencement of the match, which left little time in which to complete the renovation and repairs that were necessary. Throwing machines had to be stripped down, cleaned, and all the electrics checked.

The clubhouse and traphouses were repainted, and the shooting tracks had to be cleaned up. When teams arrived for the first day of official practice, the ground was presented in the best possible condition.


However, a further complication arose — again, it appeared, because of restrictive Government policies — when no cartridges were available for practice. After a long wait, a small quantity of 9's arrived, which permitted skeet practice to commence.

Just before lunch a similar quantity of 7's arrived, and trap practice got under way. However, the Australian team manager, Bob Buchan, had already made a mental note to obtain sufficient cartridges to see his team through the competition, as soon as possible.

The early practice sessions allowed the Aussies to become acclimatised. (The discussion between Grahan Ash and Greg Long about the muzzle velocity of the Fiocchi cartridges provided great entertainment for the rest of the shooters).

The cartridge situation became critical after the first day of practice, with the result that manager Buchan sent his scouts out overnight to locate as many trap shells as possible. Bob was in an awkward position because the shortage placed the \$10,000 Australian investment in the team in jeopardy. The search resulted in six crates (each of 250) of Fiocchi cartridges being found, and this guaranteed that the official Australian team would have sufficient ammunition for the competition.

Unfortunately, this cache created a problem in that other teams which had not been so enterprising, then complained that the Aussies had stockpiled cartridges. Much of this inconvenience could have been avoided if clearer instructions regarding cartridges had been issued by the organisers. Australia is very grateful for the assistance it received from members of STAT, especially Mr Pichit Burapawong.

The cartridge problem was ironic in that Winchester Australia had made a very generous offer to donate cartridges to the Australian team, but it was impossible to make satisfactory arrangements for the importation into Thailand.


By the end of the second day of official practice, skeet cartridges had also become short, and these continuing problems reflected in increased tensions amongst the competitors and officials.

It should be made quite clear that the Organising Committee did its best to alleviate the inconvenience and with the assistance of Stephen Yap (Secretary of the Singapore Shooting Association) worked late into the night to "scrounge" as many cartridges as possible. By the time competition commenced, Bob Buchan had also been able to procure sufficient cartridges of assorted brands to satisfy the needs of competitors in the Frankston/Australian and Melbourne squads.

Practice scores fluctuated wildly on the trap fields, with the fluorescent orange targets proving to be difficult to see under certain light conditions. The background on the two trench fields was also a factor, as it included many industrial buildings amid clumps of dark green trees.

It quickly became evident that the skeeties were going to make their presence felt. Led by three times Pesta Sukan champion — Alex Crikis, the Australians recorded excellent practice scores, with most rounds producing a score of 23 or better.

Although not in the official squad, Peter Blackmore was showing immense improvement as a result of hard work and application.



 It was a matter of "all shoulders to the wheel" due to a shortage of skeet referees. Australian team manager Bob Buchan happily took his turn.

The trap shooters were finding things a little different, and a combination of nerves, difficult background and the extremely hot conditions (it was hard to believe that it was the northern "winter") kept scores averaging around 21. The exception was John Maxwell who shot 23's and 24's through the entire practice period. Stan Collins of F.A.G.C. managed a 25 in his first practice round, then dropped to a 22 in the next.

Ray Collinson of Townsville was the "baby" of the team, and this was his first ever competition outside of Australia. Consequently, he had more difficulty than his more seasoned team mates, but stuck to his task very well.

The first competition day was December 7 — Sunday, which was the first 100 targets of the two day First International Skeet Championships of Thailand.

The commencement of the match was preceded by an official opening performed by the President of the Olympic Committee of Thailand, Air Chief Marshal Darwee Chullasapya. He commended the committee of STAT for its initiative in staging the tournament, and also sincerely thanked overseas competitors for their support of the concept.

After being presented with a special memento to commemorate the occasion, the Air Chief Marshal fired the first shots, and the skeet competition was on.



Prior to the match. Bob Buchan had consulted with various of the Australians and had been able to arrange to enter a four man team as an Australian Clay Target Association entry. The team included the member of the official Australian squad. Graeme Boyd, and Alex Crikis (Melbourne Gun Club). Billy Iles (Frankston-Australian Gun Club) and Peter Blackmore (Melbourne Gun Club).

The team was given a great chance in the race for medals, and got off to a great start when Alex Crikis recorded a perfect score. Then Peter Blackmore fired a 25, Graeme Boyd a 24 and Billy Iles (using Peter Blackmore's Perazzi) shot 21.

Japan was represented by its National Squad and was expected to pose a real threat to the Australians. The team consisted of K. Dysuka, K. Takahasi, H. Kobayashi and R. Shimo. After all squads had completed the first round, Australia was already four points clear of host country Thailand, with Japan just one target behind on 91.

Australia held its premier position through the second round, where Peter Blackmore looked certain for a 50 break, then stumbled to lose his station eight low house target.

Meanwhile. Billy Iles continued to grapple with the relatively heavy triggers of the Perazzi — he is used to silky smooth triggers on his own Browning — to give the team very good support.

Alex Crikis had dropped his station two low house single target in round two and repeated the feat in the third round. He then lost the double on station five to card a 22. Showing a true champion's tenacity, he recovered to a 24 in the fourth round for a progress total of 95. This was two behind the world class performance of Boyd and Blackmore, each of whom shot 97-100.

The Australian team score overnighted on 374-400. 11 points ahead of the crack Japan squad (363-400) with Thailand in third slot with a score of 353-400.

Somehai (Thailand) and Carreyre (New Caledonia) were sharing equal third place with Crikis on 95's and K. Takahasi of Japan went into the second day on 94.

As the scores show, the standard of competition was extremely high, and each of the 29 competitors knew that he

had to earn every target.

On the second day, with conditions still blistering hot, but now with a breeze to contend with, the Japanese turned on the pressure with Kobayashi and Shimo carding 25's in round five, while each of the other Aussies shot 23's to allow the Japan team to edge a point closer. Somehai's 22 for Thailand in the same round left Thailand on 445, going into the sixth round — the last round of the teams' section.

At this point, Japan's team was still ten targets in arrears of Australia's. but Otsuka's 24 against Peter Blackmore's 22 gave his team fresh heart. This was Blackmore's worst round of the match, but still a worthwhile contribution to the team total. 23's from Boyd and Iles and a 25 from Crikis gave Australia a total of 561 points to win the Medal. while Japan took the Silver with 553 points. and the Bronze was won by Thailand on 544.

After the field had been reduced due to some competitors withdrawing at the conclusion of the teams' section. 25

shooters contested the final 50 targets.

Crikis, after being two targets clear of the field at the 150 mark, suffered an unexpected setback in the seventh with a 22. Boyd, Carreyre each moved within one target of the leader with 23's while Somchai fired a 24 to be two targets away, sharing the same slot as Blackmore.

In round 8 — the last round — Boyd and Carreyre carded 24's to close on 190, which meant that Crikis (in the last

squad) had to shoot 23 to tie and 24 to win.

Showing top concentration. Crikis blasted all 25 targets to take another international Gold Medal with the top class score of 192. Because of Asian region policies, each country is eligible for only one medal in teams and individual events, and this made Boyd (190) and Blackmore (188) ineligible, after Crikis had won the gold. Consequently, Carreyre was the Silver Medallist (190) and Somchai (Thailand) won the Bronze Medal with a score of 189.

R. Shimo (187) was the highest placed Japanese shooter in the individual match, and Singapore's top score was recorded

by Lee Kum Cheuk, who aggregated 172.

A day of trap practice followed the conclusion of the skeet match, but most competitors were limited to two rounds.

because of the serious shortage of cartridges.

Once again, the Japanese who had finally recovered their cartridges which had been tied up in Customs for three days due to a National holiday for the birthday of the King of Thailand, showed that they would be difficult to toss.

The whole squad, which was managed by Mr Tetsujiro Igucki, was very professionally presented, and a fine example

to be copied by other nations.

Wednesday December 10, was the first day of the trap match, and the weather was again (or still) very hot. It quickly became obvious that good scores were going to be difficult to achieve. Furthermore, probably due to changing light conditions, the scores produced by individual competitors varied dramatically. As an example, Greg Long fired a fantastic 25 in his first round, and followed it with rounds of 21, 18 and 16 to close at the end of the first 100 on 80. Greg's team mates in the official Australian team were Boyd (20, 23, 17, 21). Maxwell (23, 23, 22, 23) and Collinson (18, 15, 18, 22).

Maxwell's performance was one of the few consistent efforts for the day and was all that kept Australia in the match. Ray Collinson had difficulty in adapting to the difficult conditions and appeared to reach the stage where he was in fact trying too hard. His team mates gave him tremendous moral support and this no doubt played an important part in his improved performance in the second 100.

Japan's seasoned trap shooter. Mr Obara, was quickly into top gear and shot a series of near perfect rounds to overnight on 97, six points clear of Maxwell and team mate Y. Suzuki.

Thailand's main hope in the trap match was Pavitr who could only manage 21, 21, 19, 21 for an aggregate of 82, to be overshadowed by Dumrong who scored 85 (20, 23, 19, 23).

Lee Kum Cheuk proved to be the mainstay of the Singapore team and after performing very creditably in the skeet match. shot rounds of 22. 21. 23. 23 to close on 89.

In the teams' match. Japan was a "country mile" ahead of the rest of the field, with a first 100 aggregate of 354. In second place was Australia (325 points) just two points ahead of the team entered by the Frankston-Australian Gun Club.

The final day provided an exciting tussle for the minor placings in both the teams and the individual sections, and in both cases Australia was unable to show the tenacity needed

to score well in international competition.

With Obara and his Japan trap team coasting to a very comfortable team win, scoring 524, the fireworks were provided by the Frankston-Australian Gun Club team (Ash. Collins, Iles and Crikis). All lifted their game in the sixth round to draw level with the Australian National team on 490. A count back system was used to separate the two, and the Silver Medal was won by Frankston-Australian Gun Club.

In line ith the local custom. Australia was ineligible for the Bronze Medal, which was awarded to Thailand — score 477.

The last two rounds of the individual match got under way with Obara comfortably placed on 143 or nine points clear of Australia's John Maxwell. Lee Cum Cheuk (Singapore) was in third place on 131, and Japan's Suzuki was fourth on 130.



While Ray Collinson's game had lifted dramatically in the second hundred - his scores were 21, 21 23, 23 - John Maxwell suffered an unaccountable lapse and in the seventh round, produced a 20 which was his worst round since arriving in Bangkok.

Continuing the "up and down" nature of the general performances, Greg Long carded a 25 in the seventh but dropped back to a 21 in the last round, for a match aggregate of 168.

Suzuki could only manage a 20 in the seventh, but diminutive Lee Kum Cheuk found an extra kilo of talent and scored a brilliantly shot 23 to go into the last round tied with Maxwell for second spot.


With these two shooters in the same squad, a large gallery gathered to watch the all important last round. Maxwell started disastrously by grassing his first target for the round and needed to call on second barrels regularly before dropping his ninth target.

Meanwhile, Lee had been smacking every target right in the middle, and when Maxwell dropped his 23rd, it was all over.

The results in the individual trap match were: Gold medal - M. Obara, Japan 186-200 Silver medal - Lee Kum Cheuk, Singapore 179-200 Bronze medal - John Maxwell, Australia 176-200

It was an exciting end to the match, and in no way was Australia discredited. The team members stuck to the job remarkably well and performed as well as they were able on the day.

As is customary in this part of the world, the presentation of prizes was the focal point of a glittering buffet dinner, which was held at Bangkok's New Imperial Hotel.

As a gesture of the appreciation of the Australians for the way in which they had been received, Bob Buchan presented STAT with a "BIG RED" kangaroo skin to be hung in the Association's club rooms.

The gift was very well received by Dr Tipp representing STAT, and he complimented the ACTA squad for the way in which they had approached the competition.

The level of hospitality of the Thais was of the highest order and the match was conducted very well. This is quite an amazing thing when one considers the numerous obstacles which had to be overcome before the match could commence.

Manager of the Australian team, Bob Buchan, when interviewed on his return to Australia, said that he was very proud of the way in which his team had worked together, and felt that the project had been an important element in the development of the Olympic disciplines in Australia.

The value of the project will now be assessed by the Association's International Sub Committee, after it receives a full report from Mr Buchan. Each team member has also been asked to furnish a report, to ensure that all possible lessons are learned



Sport Australia Awards - 1980

(Staff Writer)

One of the biggest projects undertaken by the Confederation of Australian Sport in its short but active life has been to initiate an annual series of awards for leading identities across the entire sports spectrum.

With TAA as the major sponsors, well supported by seven other Australian companies, the presentation of the awards was made at a glittering dinner held in Melbourne on

December 6, 1980.

One of the highlights of the night, which was televised nationally by the Seven Network, was the humility shown by the famous sporting heroes who were asked to make the presentations.

Predictably, Alan Jones was presented with the award for MALE ATHLETE OF THE YEAR — he has since received SPORTSMAN OF THE YEAR award for 1980 presented by the Australian Broadcasting Commission.

Over 100 sporting associations were represented at the dinner by their National Presidents, which would make the gathering one of the greatest shows of "Sports Power" yet seen in Australia.

The A.C.T.A. was represented by its National President, Ron Porter, who combined his attendance with the Confederation's Annual General Meeting, held earlier in the day.

Eleven awards were established, and each was sponsored by a specific supporter. In addition to its award sponsorship, TAA also assisted substantially in offsetting the cost of the function itself.

Girls Singles Championship.

The 1981 Australian Trap and Skeet Championships, to be held at Melbourne Gun Club at Lilydale in Victoria, look like drawing a large international attendance.

A mass invasion is being planned by the Kiwis and great interest is being shown in Wales, Ireland, England, New Caledonia, U.S.A., Singapore and Thailand.

Preparations for the tournament are proceeding well, and the match should be one of the best yet staged in Australia.

The host club has completed the installation of seven skeet fields, and already has nine trap fields.

Provision has been made for a large outdoor display of firearms and related products, and sponsors have been very generous in terms of trophy donations.

CARTRIDGES








RECREATIONAL NOISE — ACCEPTABLE OR NOT?

(Staff Writer)

Early in November the Port Phillip Region of the Victorian Field and Game Association staged the first "Grand Prix of the Pacific" under the auspices of the international body known as F.I.T.A.S.C.

The match consisted of 200 targets over a testing simulated field circuit. It was held at the Lysterfield shooting range located in the outer eastern Melbourne suburbs.

For some time now a small pressure group consisting of disenchanted local residents has been actively agitating to have the range closed, because of noise nuisance.

Supreme Court writs have been issued against many officers of the Field and Game Association and generally the pressure group's activities have been directed at denigrating the shooting sports.

Resistance reached a peak during the "Grand Prix" of the Pacific Tournament when representatives of the pressure group stopped competitiors as they were entering the shooting club and handed out leaflets in which the "selfish interests of shooters" were clearly enumerated.

Subsequently, a letter of protest was delivered to the headquarters of the Australian Clay Target Association, the contents of which clearly demonstrated the ignorance which exists amongst the so-called "do-gooders".

A photo copy of the letter of complaint follows, together with the text of the Association's reply.

Dear Sir,

RE: Noise Distress Caused by Clay Bird Activity of Vic. Field & Game Association.

We are shocked that you have allowed the Port Philip Region of the V.F.G.A. to conduct an International Shoot at Lysterfield this weekend 14/11/80. You must be aware of the public outery against Gun Shot Noise emanating from the range, and the fact that residents and the Shire of Sherebrook have served Supreme Court Writes on the Office Bearers of the V.F.G.A. You must therefore now bear part of the blame for some of the distress which the Port Philip region is causing to residents and for which it is becoming increasingly well-known through recent articles in the Sun, Age and Local Press.

We will now inform all International Shooting Bodies of the failure of the Field and Game Assoc. to properly conduct its range; and of your own associations failure to exercise adequate control over your affillated organisations. We are outraged that the Shoot obtained approval by your organisation and the F.I.T.A.S.C. and we will make every effort in the future to ensure that International Shooting Bodies are aware of the disrespect and problems surrounding the V.F.G.A. range at Lysterfield.

We are aware of the exceptionally poor representation of other countries at the Grande Prix of the Pacific Shoot and we hope that you are aware that firing started last Wednesday and continued until Honday night making a total of (6) consecutive days noise. Clearly the V.F.G.A. have no consideration for the people of the area.

ACTA Letter.

Dear Mr Crook,

Your letter dated November 18, on the subject of sporting activities being conducted at the Lysterfield facilities operated by the Port Phillip Region of the Victorian Field and Game Association, is a rather surprising conglomeration of venom, emotion, inaccuracy and guess.

Coming from a group which purports to be representing a genuine community concern, its lack of basis on fact makes it a rather laughable document, and one which is hard to take seriously.

However, because of the courtesies which all sporting people extend to their neighbours, we shall try to assist you to gain a better understanding of the situation relating to the operation of the Australian Clay Target Association. We shall keep the facts simple, to avoid any risk of further confusing your Association.

- The Australian Clay Target Association like the Victorian Field and Game Association, is another community group created to provide an administrative machine to attend to particular recreational and sporting needs.
- 2. The Australian Clay Target Association (like the Field and Game Federation of Australia which is the National parent of the Victorian Field and Game Association) is responsible for the control of an international form of sporting activity, and is fully recognised and accredited by the Australian Government, and State Governments in the performance of this role. This Association is one of one hundred and seventeen such National sporting organizations.
- 3. Because the Field and Game Federation of Australia (which is the controlling body of simulated field shooting in Australia) is completely autonomous, it did not NEED to seek approval for its "Grand Prix of the Pacific" from the Australian Clay Target Association. My Association was in no way involved, except to wish the Federation every success in the difficult area of international sports promotion.
- 4. We are aware of the existence of Supreme Court writs and we are aware of regular and determined efforts by officers of the Victorian Field and Game Association to discuss the apparent problems associated with the Lysterfield Shooting School with you — ALL TO NO AVAIL.
- In no way do we bear some of the "blame" (your word, NOT ours) for the activities of the VF & GA, which most responsible people believe is filling a genuine community need.
- 6. If you wish to be regarded seriously in your desire to obtain a solution to the problem you believe exists, we respectfully suggest that you stop making rash claims about the improper conduct of the Lysterfield range.
- 7. Although it has already been said, we will repeat the statement that there is no affiliation between my Association and the Victorian Field and Game Association. However, being sister sporting organizations, we are naturally concerned that the VF & GA and all sporting associations obtain the community support that they so richly deserve.
- No approval for the Grand Prix match was granted by this association, nor was any such approval sought.
 In connection with the "poor representation of other
- 9. In connection with the "poor representation of other countries" at the match, this is further evidence of the difficulties encountered by all sports in Australia in attracting international athletes to visit such a remote geographic location, such as Australia occupies.

Mr Crook, it is deeply disturbing to find other Australians knocking an attempt directed at putting Australia on the international sports scene. It seems to me to be a non-patriotic act, and one which is not in the best interests of the community which you are claiming to represent.

Furthermore, I ask when was the last time that a location in the Shire of Sherbrooke was used for an international sports tournament.

SAFETY STARTS WITH YOU!

TAKING UP CLAY BUSTING

by Newton Thomas

So you want to take up clay target shooting; many people have done so and even if they have not become champions, have had many years of pleasant recreation. Much of the enjoyment comes from sharing a common interest in guns and shooting with people with the same interest.

What you get from a sport is resultant from what you put into it. One does not have to record a win to have a pleasant relaxing day. Far from it, many people, (far more than is realized) do not really like the stresses and effort required for competition and really look for a relaxing day with friends in an atmosphere that they enjoy. This particularly applies to people with very demanding jobs and a lot of responsibility. They want and must have relaxing week ends where their responsibilities are in part forgotten.

One does not have to have an expensive outfit to perform well, standard model trap or skeet guns are far superior in ability to what we are. Consequently, we can forget that side of it, and we can perform adequately with the standard cartridge produced for trapshooting by an reputable manufacturer.

With cartridges though, keep away from the heavier loads, as they add to the stress factors created by blast and recoil.

One needs comfortable clothing — a well fitted shooting jacket, good substantial shoes and a cap or hat to keep the sun from one's eyes or face.

Hearing protection is essential and this comes in the form of muffs or ear plugs, the muffs being the most effective.

Skeet shooters should always use glasses for eye protection and most shooters will benefit by using anti-glare glasses of some kind.

Early shooting days have a great bearing on future abilities and care should be taken to adopt a comfortable simple shooting style, exaggeration here will only cause future problems.

Take time out to watch the best shots in action and learn from what they do and how they do it. Most of them are very approachable and will be very willing to help one who is interested enough to ask questions relative to the sport.


Set yourself goals for improvement, and work steadily towards them — when you achieve one, look to the next.

Always compete against your best score and not the other fellow.

Correct thinking plays a far greater part in competition shooting than most people realize. One must bring the sport down to its most basic level and build a score as one would build a wall of bricks — one at a time and each one of equal value. Shoot twenty matches of one target each instead of one match of twenty targets.

If you have a coach at your club, make yourself known to him. He will be able to help you in many ways.

1981-82 WINCHESTER CLAY TARGET TOURNAMENT

The format for the 1981/82 Winchester Tournament has been approved by the Association's Management Committee.

The Tournament will be conducted as an open event between April 1981 and March 1982 at Club Locations in each State of Australia.

The Grand Final/s will be conducted in 1982 at the Brisbane Gun Club concurrently with the 1982 National Double Barrel Championships.

All Location winners (overall high gun) plus Location winner Juniors, Ladies and Veterans will be eligible to compete in the Grand Final/s.



Number of Locations: Victoria 4, Tasmania 1, Northern Territory 1, Queensland 3, New South Wales 4, Western Australia 1, South Australia 1; 15 venues.

The event to consist of 50 targets DB from 15 metres, broken targets to count, shoot offs under "miss out" conditions.

Prizes: The winner of the high gun at each location will receive a Tricolor high gun Sash plus 500 AA 325-7 shotshells plus the 1st trophy for the group such winner comes from.

The Tournament will be conducted over 4 groups 11-14, 15-18, 19-21 and 22-25. The winner of each group will receive a Phillips AC/DC 10" Portable Color Television Set plus location winner Sash Value \$420; the 2nd placegetter in each group will receive a case of 500 AA 325-7 shotshells Value \$120.

The winner of each group which will include the overall high gun winner will then form a 4 man Location Team which will then shoot at a further 25 targets each 1 visit 1 trap (5 from each mark prior to moving) making a team total of 100 targets. Scores will be marked points but broken targets to count. The referee and a committeeman are to sign the score sheet which is then to be posted to Winchester Australia P.O. Box 776, Geelong, Victoria 3220, within 7 days of the Tournament. A record of such score sheet to be kept by the Club Secretary.

If at the completion of the Tournament series 2 or more teams are tied on broken targets then the points score will determine the winning team. The winning team will receive 8,000 shotshells, eg. each member will receive 500 each of AA 300-7, AA 325-7, AA 350-7 and AA 375-7. Each member of the Location Team will be supplied free of charge 50 AA 325-7 prior to shooting in the team event.

Trade Topics

The "BIG TWO" have again made the news. Winchester Australia has just announced another expansion plan estimated to cost \$1 million.

Meanwhile, Eley has further consolidated its operation and now has the "Lyrebird" Division - general sporting goods sharing common management with the ammunition opera-

The Winchester announcement follows record sales and profit figures set in 1980.

Mr Ross Baillie, Managing Director of Winchester Australia said the Factory would be expanded to increase production of existing ammunition lines and to manufacture new lines for introduction during 1981.

New products to be introduced this year would include centrefire rifle, pistol and revolver cartridges in popular calibres as well as compression-formed plastic shotgun cartridges in 410 and 20 gauge.

Mr Baillie said the expansion has been undertaken to meet the increased demand for ammunition in Australia. Already in the past year Winchester had added 70 people to its Geelong workforce and more job opportunities would be created with the new expansion.

Ballistics and quality control facilities were also being significantly expanded to ensure that product quality and consistency of performance were maintained at standards equal to the best in the world.

Mr Baillie said that the security warehousing, gunsmithing and spare parts control functions at Winchester's Geelong facilities were all being expanded. This move will further strengthen Winchester Australia's role as the major Australian distributor of leading overseas firearm brands.

During December 1980 Winchester's parent company, Olin Corporation, U.S.A., announced plans for the sale of the Company's United States Winchester sporting arms business. The Winchester trademark is not for sale but may be licensed to a new owner. The Japanese firearm plant will remain as an integral unit of the Winchester group activities.

Meanwhile, the U.S. firearms plant will continue to produce through 1981, and a spokesman for Winchester Australia says that sufficient stock should exist to permit the sale of U.S. built Winchester arms well into 1982.

Turning now to the Eley news, a new company has been formed to provide the management structure for the two divisions of IMI Australia Operations Pty. Ltd. which are active in the sports area.

The company is to be known as Ron Clarke Sports, and will control two divisions, namely 'Lyrebird' and 'Eley'.

Ron Clarke is Managing Director, and he will also manage the Eley Division. Rob Hamer, previously 'Lyrebird' Merchandising Manager for N.S.W., has been transferred to Melbourne to manage the general sports division.

Extensive alterations are being made to Eley's Port Melbourne warehouse, to accommodate the 'Lyrebird' product range.

In another new release, Eley have announced the introduc-

tion of a range of new packs for the trap and skeet cartridges. 'Quick Skeet' and 'Olympic Skeet' are being replaced by 'Special Skeet' and 'Super Skeet'. This will allow the skeet products to share recognition benefits with 'Special Trap' and 'Super Trap'. A feature of the new packs is the bold use of the 'Eley Twelve Dot' logo.

Mr Steve Parker, Sporting Travel Consultant for Ansett Airlines of Australia, kindly provided the following information:

"Ammunition without explosive or incendiary projectiles up to a maximum weight of five kilos may be carried as personal baggage. The total weight of such ammunition may not exceed 45 kilos per flight. It must be properly packed for protection against shock and secured against movement so that it cannot function accidentally under normal air transport. It must be declared at time of baggage check-in.





Sandgropers Celebrate Royal Birthday

On 18th November a party of 19 Western Australians left Perth for Singapore on a joint holiday/shooting expedition, the main aim to attend the Tunku Mahkota of Johore's birthday shoot and celebrations and to have a good time, and I can vouch for the fact that they did just that.

The group left on time, under the leadership of Roy Holtfreter, after a farewell hosted by the President of the Perth Gun Club, John Eddy, a gesture appreciated by all travelling.

They were met at the airport in Singapore by Dr Leonard, chairman of the Royal Johore Shooters Association, Stephen Yap, and Des Moore known to many shooters in W.A. and a long-time friend of Roy Holtfreter. It did not take long to settle into the Oberoi Imperial as all arrangements went smoothly.

However the next day of practice got off to a bad start when the bus did not arrive at 8 a.m. as arranged and the alternative car transport for 10 o'clock could not seat us all. The three stragglers in Kevin Hopkins, Mike Wells and Roy Holtfreter eventually made it to the Tebrau range in Johore, by means of several taxis, in time to go to a lunch of hamburgers and root beer, appreciated by most, if not all. The following practice did very little to help select the two teams required as most had shot very little, if any, Trench and ISU Skeet. 





One wonders how potential international guests would have reacted to the harrassment of contestants in the tournament which occurred when they were stopped at the gate of the shooting ground by people claiming to represent your group, and were handed leaflets, some of which were not in the best interests of Australian sport.

In conclusion, let it be quite clear that my first reaction was to ignore your letter dated November 18, because its contents

were so far from the truth.

However as I became aware that it represented a point of view that was so far from the truth as to be dangerous, this reply became necessary as a means of putting to rest some of your obvious misunderstandings.

We feel sure that, after developing a better understanding of the circumstances relating to this Association, your group will tender to us a sincere apology for the statements contained in your letter.

Australian Association

This has been an eventful year for Clay Target Coaching in South Australia and Australia as a whole.

Sports coaching has moved to a more professional basis. Sport is now studied at an academic level and this study includes not only the physical skill components of sport but also the effect of psychological attitudes on the performance of that skill. This has meant in turn the raising of the standards of sports coaching and the establishment of an Australia wide scheme of accreditation.

In South Australia we have been lucky from the outset in having our Department of Recreation and Sport as an

instigator in this move to improve coaching.

The programme to be implemented for Clay Target Coach accreditation is comprehensive and I am hopeful that when a coaching course is held for new Coaches, those who are already accredited will avail themselves of the opportunity to

All of our Zone coaches are accredited and many club Coaches have passed the tests required.

Praise must go to Newton Thomas our first National Coaching Director for his work in setting up the Clay Target Coaches basic accreditation program. Newton Thomas has been a great help to myself and I am sure to all other state directors, not only in a technical sense, but like the great coach that he is, in giving us confidence in our ability to run our own State schemes.

I will personally miss Newton and wish him a speedy and complete recovery. The appointment of a new Australian Coaching Director will see. I am sure continued happy relations between the state and Australian Directors of Coaching, with as always the willing help of Noel Southey, A.C.T.A. Executive Director.

STATE COACHING ACTIVITIES:

In the past 12 months 900 shooters have been coached and many High School classes have had gun safety and basic shooting instruction in shot gun and rifle.

I have received great support from Zone and club coaches and it is pleasing to see them taking responsibility for their Zone and Clubs and using their initiative in implementing coaching programs.

Club Officials must also receive my thanks for their continued co-operation.

During the year I have tried to visit as many clubs as -possible and coaching clinics have been held at Mt. Gambier. Pt. Lincoln. Pt. Pirie. Norlunga and Southern York Peninsula

A Seminar for Coaches was held in Adelaide and 23 Club and Zone Coaches attended. Much benefit was gained, not only from the lectures and demonstrations but from the interchange of views.

John Byrnes retired as Central Region Zone Coach during the year. His efforts were much appreciated. Brian Hill has been appointed as Central Region Coach and is working hard

Carriage of any type of ammunition etc. other than that specified above is prohibited without the permission in writing of Ansett Airlines of Australia."

It should be noted that there is a "per flight" limit of 45

Turning now to the subject of airfreight, the conditions which apply are worded sufficiently ambiguously to allow the receiving clerk to make one of many possible decisions.

In most cases, he will decide that the pack is not acceptable. Frankly, the hassle involved in airfreighting cartridges either domestically or internationally is so incovenient that the policy is not recommended.
