

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

from the late Ron Porter

Just prior to his untimely death President Ron Porter had prepared the following note, as the first of a series of columns being produced by members of the Association's Management Committee

The article places heavy emphasis on the need to select Executive Committee members with great care, and then to ensure that these members get the full support they deserve. Ron has written:

"During the early twenties the A.C.P.T.S.A. was formed because our Forefathers realised this great sport of ours could not continue to grow unless a National Body was formed.

From this small beginning we have grown to a Nationally accepted Body we now recognise as the A.C.T.A. In the early period a few dedicated people gathered together, and with a lot of hard work, and at their own expense, set the foundation stone upon which our Sport has been built.

It has not been an easy task, as a great many changes have been necessary to keep up with the times; for example changes in the Rules, Constitutional & Management formation of State Associations, etc.

All this has been achieved by the few willing and hard working members who give their time so generously towards operating this Sport so successfully.

In our time we have visible proof that the A.C.T.A is a very strong and well managed Association, the envy of many other sporting bodies, but we still have our problems. It would appear there has been a lot of discussion among certain members who are not quite familiar with the Constitutional Rights and have not bothered to check on these points. It is also disappointing to note that some of these members fill a responsible position within the A.C.T.A.

Constructive criticism and new ideas are always welcome. and you have the constitutional right to voice your comments in the regular manner. The correct way to voice an opinion is through the Club Zone State system. However you may also contact State Councillors, or use your magazine to spread your message. After all it is your right to choose the men to represent you from club level through to the Executive Committee.

It is indeed sad to say the members who are subjected to the greatest amount of criticism, are the ones you have chosen to represent your State, at national level. Most of these are successful business men, who are prepared to give up their spare time and money to follow their chosen sport. They are also required to be experts in all matters put before them. from rule changes to national politics. Quite often the members ask these men to place matters before the Executive without the back-up support of their State Association, and then offer only criticism, if they are not successful.

Now is the time to support our men. and try to decide what is best for shooting as a whole. rather than confine the choice to your home State. Your representative is required to be loyal to his colleagues on the Executive Committee; be willing to support the decisions made at Executive level, even though this means a loss of his popularity within the State. The responsibility you place on these men is enormous, and I would like to suggest that at your next State Meeting you choose the men you wish to represent you with great care, and then give them all your support, which they will need on the National Council.

Remember we are all shooters working for the sport we love best.



EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S NOTES

How does one describe the void left by the death of such a dedicated administrator like Ron Porter (Ron Porter died on March 4, aged 53. See Report in liftout supplement).

Ron came to the top office in clay busting on September 27. 1980, and brought to the job a flair of being able to resolve problems without the usual penalty of leaving somebody feeling that they had lost face.

Ron Porter had a wonderful philosophy - give everybody a fair go!

The Porter family has a similar history as that of many other past Presidents - a total family commitment to the sport.

The man has gone but his memory. his influence and his family live on. Unless one has worked closely with Ron. am one who has had such a priviledge - it would be completely impossible to fully appreciate his dedication, and the multiplicity of ways in which he has helped the development of clay target shooting.

Ron Porter's death has left many people totally devastated. In fact, at the time this is being written, I fully expect to see Ron come through the door with a cheerful grin, pipe in hand, and an offer of help in relation to whatever is on at the time.

Spare a moment's thought for Laurie Connors - for the second time in six months, he has been thrust into the position of Acting President without warning. This is a pretty tough challenge for anybody and Laurie is to be commended for the way in which he accepts the challenge.

As a parting thought - who else do you know where the worst criticism that can be found is that he is "too loyal!" That is the only criticism I have heard about Ron Porter in our years of association.

RON PORTER WAS A BIG MAN. IN EVERY SENSE!

April is "NATIONALS" month. About 800 of Australia's keenest and most enthusiastic clay busters will assemble at Melbourne Gun Club, east of Melbourne between Easter Saturday and Friday April 24 for seven days of top class competition.

Six National Championship events will be decided and the 1981 Grand Australian Handicap will result in the winner being presented with a \$5000 Remington Model 3200 Premier shotgun.

Over \$60,000 value in perpetual trophies, cash awards. team positions and general trophies will be keenly contested in the nation's top shooting competition.

At about the same time, an official Australian shooting team will be returning from competing in the Benito Juarez tournament in Mexico. In that squad will be Jim Ellis and Terry Rumbel, who have recently been awarded financial assistance for training and competiton to a value of \$7000 -\$3,500 each. (see story on page 10).

These awards are further examples of the way clay target shooting is emerging from the "dark ages", and makes it seem all the more important that all aspects of our sport be maintained at the highest possible level.

I'm sure that shooters all over Australia will join me in congratulating Jim and Terry on their achievements,

particularly as they received two of only thirty awards so far announced — a very good effort!

Last month's report on the resolution of the funding problems in connection with the shooting section of the 1982 Commonwealth Games to be held in Brisbane, was premature to say the least

Although it was accurate at the time, more recent developments lead me to believe that there are forces at work in Brisbane which are opposed to the inclusion of the shooting events in the 1982 program.

If this feeling is correct, somebody is behaving incredibly stupidly because, as I understand it, there is a contractual obligation to stage shooting as a integral part of the Games' program.

The way things are shaping up, shooting sports administrators will shortly run out of patience, and the XII Commonweath Games Australia (1982) Foundation, which is the tournament organizer, will be told TO STICK IT!

Last month's reference to lack of respect and support for referees brought a most interesting response from readers. Everybody who has gone to the effort to comment has agreed

that referees do NOT get sufficient recognition or support. Yet, the solution to the problem seems to be more elusive. Perhaps the Association should embark on a well designed referee training program. Such a move could be justified because of the recent introduction of revised shooting rules.

Certainly, it is fair to say that the better trained our referees are, the more confidence they will display in their decision making.

Much of the criticism directed at referees is connected with alleged slow or fast pulls. A Queensland designer has come up with a device that may put an end to this problem

The device is an updated version of the phonopull equipment which is normally associated with Olympic Trench shooting. Robbie Rehbein of Bundaberg has refined a voice controlled target release system to the point where final testing at Brisbane Gun Club has left onlookers quite amazed at its performance.

A full report will appear in the May issue of Clay Target Shooting News, by which time three Queensland clubs will already have sets in operation.

Anything that is going to make a referee's life easier should be welcomed!

The "Duck Fever" nights conducted by the Victorian Field and Game Association were, if anything, even more popular than previous years. Films, trade displays, a duck-calling championship and, finally, the duck reports were all enthusiastically received at both venues — the Camberwell Civic Centre and the Geelong Town Hall — by capacity crowds. Ross Alford, the winner of the duck call brought the house down with the accuracy and variety of his calls, all done without any artificial aids. Ross is a talented Australian Rules player with VFL Club, Fitzroy, so one wonders how he fits in both activities come Duck Opening each year. The nights are certainly a most innovative and demonstrably successful way in which to promote the sport.

Acclaim for the new ELEY Trap and Skeet range continues to pour into our offices in each State. The reception for the new shells has been beyond expectations. So much so that we are having considerable trouble keeping up with the demand. In fact, we cleared our stocks completely of virtually all our shotshell cartridges in the lead-up to the duck season - an unprecendented occurrence in recent years. One of the most pleasing reports came back to us from H.P. White Laboratories in Maryland, U.S.A., where we often seek independent and authoritiative reports on various products in the ammunition field - both ours and others. White's are the most prestigious ammunition laboratory in the world, and do a remarkable job in analysing products. Their summary on the new range that "the performance of the SUPER TRAP ammunition is comparable to - or exceeds - that of comparable commercially marketed ammunition" was high praise indeed, considering the conservative tone in all other reports.


During my pilgrimage in recent weeks to U.S.A., Europe and the East, I was struck by two major aspects. Firstly, there were the difficulties of the U.K. in all manufacturing industries, but especially

engineering, incurred by the very tough economic policies of the Thatcher government and the artificially high value of the pound sterling against the U.S. dollar; the second outstanding impression was the efficiency and enthusiasm of the Philippines in their industrial advance. After the war, it was the Japanese who commenced the Eastern invasion of our markets with cheap products; then, as the Japanese gained respectability, it was the Taiwanese who took over their mantle of cheapness. Now it is recognised that the Taiwanese workmanship can be the equal of any, and the Koreans and Filipinos have taken up the "cheap" tag. I would predict that "Made in the Philippines" will soon outgrow the automatic consumer response of "it's cheap so it can't be any good". ELEY has a vested interest as a lot of our rimfire ammunition is currently being sourced there. In the beginning, we had considerable trouble ensuring that the manufactured product met our specifications. Now, the latest shipment actually tested better than that made previously by ELEY at Deer Park, which we keep as a comparative standard. And, when you see over their factory, and note the cleanliness and obvious intelligence of the work-force, the quality control procedures and the utmost desire of the management team to learn and surpass that which can be produced elsewhere, you can readily see that, given a few years to consolidate their reputation, the Philippines will be on a par with Taiwan and Japan for quality of workmanship.

The duck coasters sold out within a few days there may be some around at the odd retailer, but they proved to be extremely popular. Our next series on hunting dogs will be ready by the middle of the year.

As well, Geo. Biggs' great book on Trap and Skeet shooting has gone particularly well — as it should, as it has been praised far and wide by all who have seen it. We are about to run a second printing so, if you are having trouble getting a copy, put your name down and be a little patient.

In a scintilating shooting exhibition it was Bill Iles' weekend from first to last shot when he took the 1981 South Australian State Titles by storm.

In a carnival dominated by record attendances, high scores and plenty of activity, shooting excellence was the order of the two days, Saturday & Sunday, February 7 & 8, 1981.

No less than six major events were scheduled for the full week-end in a program to suit the most avid of trapshooters. They certainly responded, with aggregate attendances exceeding 300 on both days. The big events however were the State DB, SB and PS together with the selection of both the mens and ladies state teams. (See page).

It was on from the word go when 155 shooters faced the traps after the eye-opener for the 50 target State Double Barrel Championship from the 15 metre mark. Some 17 possibles were recorded which included John Fuller (son of Mal), Tony Bradshaw and Bill Iles from interstate, together with Jim Finis, Ron Whimshurst, Dick Ayres, Phil Mules and Danny Stefanato from the local scene.

The shoot-off ran quickly to the 100 mark and boiled down to Bill Iles and Ray Kimber. In a tense struggle it was Kimber who eventually dropped his 141st target to let Iles in for his first win of the weekend.

Speaking to Bill after the event, he ventured the opinion, in his usual straight forward manner, that he won the event "fairly easy".

"I would have liked to have shot a lot more", he said, "I was a bit disappointed, like people say they are disappointed when

someone misses, well I was because I wanted to go on, I was just starting to shoot a few".

"This was the first time I had come up against Ray Kimber. I had heard he was a good shot, he held a break record at Metro for many years. He is a bit of a tactician, he tried early in the thing so I said to him — if you want to go fast I'll go slow and when he slowed down I went fast".

"You know, I play that game too, but he seemed like a very good sport, didn't cry and had no excuses like a few of them that you beat, some of the so called 'hot shots' we have about", he said.

History was made when two of the considerable ladies talent in June Gawith from Victoria and local lass Sue Byrnes battled it out for B grade honours. June Gawith made it with a score of 61/61 in what was to prove the beginning of a good carnival for her. C grade victory went to C. Brammer and Andrew Mules took the Junior title. Andrew swept all before him in junior ranks in 1980 but he was to get some stiff competition at this carnival.

In contrast to the DB, the Single Barrel Championship, whilst it attracted 142 entries, there were only two possibles. The shoot-off brought together Phil Mules who was aiming for his second SB title in consecutive years and Bob Cook, a fierce competitior. But ten targets later Phil Mules had his second title and Bob Cook started a run of seconds that was to last right to the end of the carnival.

Joe Lavia was the top B grader from B. Ewell, he had to run a score of 58/60. C grade went to Ivan Maywald from the Riverland on 46/50 from local competitior G. Nelson 44/50. June Gawith made it two in a row by shooting 47/50 to take the Ladies trophy and a very good 48-50 by Ian Richardson was tops in the Junior ranks.

But it was Sunday that provided the thrills for the big group of shooters and spectators. As a run-up to the State Points Score, the Association scheduled a 25 target double barrel event from 15 metres. One hundred and sixty two hopefuls started and almost one third shot them all.

Again it was "Big Billy" Iles that came to the fore. In a two hour shoot-off with South East shooter Ian Medhurst, they ran through to 258 targets before the youngster missed one. Bill was looking ominous for the final event but full credit must go to Medhurst who had a best break of 60 odd before the event. It certainly said something for tough competition forcing up scores.


A big field of 160 tackled the Points Score Championship and as in the SB, there were only two possibles, Bill Iles and Bob Cook. In the shoot-off which ran just 18 targets Cookie faltered to let Iles in on 204/204 (points) and again settled for second place. Dropping only two points, Brian Growden took B grade honours with 148/150 from Frank Agostino just one point behind. Top C grader was another lady in Jill Curtis from the West Coast (144/150) from S. Edmonds (143/150). She also took out the ladies trophy.

• Gary Bollen, Air New Zealand trip winner.






AUSTRALIA DAY SPORTS CARNIVAL — CANBERRA

(from Norm Simms)

• Australia Capital Territory Australia Day Olympic Trench Championship 24, 25 & 26 January 1981.

Fifty would-be champions lined up for the Australia Day Trench Championship at A.C.T. International Gun Club and at 0900 hrs precisely, on 24 January 1981, John Fenwick from Victoria fired the initial shot.

After three days of fierce competition, Jim Finis from Mildura was clear winner with a world class score of 194-200 from his closest rivals, Greg Long and Terry Rumbel each on 190.

After the completion of round one, Australian Clay Target Association President, Ron Porter officially opened the shoot by firing the "opening shot" and giving a brief address to the gathered shooters and interested spectators.

Also in attendance over the three days were Executive Director, Noel Southey, Executive Members Roy Holtfreter, Paul Cains and Laurie Connors, (Nat. Vice Pres.).

In near perfect shooting conditions, round one of the championship got off to a tentative start. Only Jim Finis and Geoff Salmon were able to card 25's. Bruce Dent, Terry Rumbel, Bob Duncan, Greg Long, Terry Budd, Mrs Deserie Huddleston, Jim Ellis and Billy Iles each carded 24's.

Round two saw a settling of nerves. Dent, Long, Barry Scanes and Ellis each put together a perfect score.

Iles, Duncan & Rumbel were in the "horrors". Two 24's in a row.

Cliff Bailey, John Maxwell, Glen Castellero, Tony Rowe and Finis were into the act with 24's on their scoresheets.

At the end of round three on the opening day, the champions were flying their true colours.

Rumbel, Finis & Ellis each scored 25. Stan Collins Norm Simms and Ian Buchannan each scored their first 25 for the day.

One target behind on 24 were Budd, Frank Bradwell & Maxwell.

After 75 targets Jim Finis & Jim Ellis led with 74/75, followed by Rumbel on 73, Long on 72, Duncan on 71 and Maxwell & Collins Castellero & Salmon just in sight of the leaders on 70 a piece.

Peter Clancy led B grade on 65/76. In close pursuit were Chris Naudin and D. Curtin each on 63.

Cliff Brown led the small field of C graders with 59/75.

The first 25 targets on day two were contested in similar fashion to the first 25 the previous day. Shooting conditions could not be blamed for the rash of 24's.

Rumbel, Castellero & Bill Jones were the only shooters to score 25 in this round. Graham Bookallil, Bruce Noll, Kevin Perkins, Budd, Bailey, Scanes & Finis finished one off the pace.


The second round on day two saw Australia's leading trench shooters forge ahead.

Peter Clancy, Long & Budd carded the only clean rounds. Rumbel, Ellis & Finis were looking good with 24 apiece. Maxwell, Barry Hall and Kevin Rose too on 24.

The pressure on the competitors was beginning to "tell" as round six was the only round that no 25's were recorded. Roger Walker almost made it with 24. Finis and Ellis

finished the round on 23. After 150 targets had been shot at, Jim Finis on 145 was clear leader. Jim Ellis was within breathing distance one target behind. Rumbel and Long were still in with a chance with 143 and 141 respectively.

It was now obvious that the pressure of competition was making its mark and the competition was keen between the leaders at this stage.

Whilst the leaders were striving their hardest to stay in front a "battle royale" had developed in A grade.

While all eyes were on the "hot shots," Budd and Bailey had managed to keep pace with the leaders on 140 & 139 respectively. Duncan had socred 138 and Noll, Collins, Scanes and Castellero on 137. The ever consistent Deserie Huddleston (the only lady competitor) was on 136.

Peter Clancy was still in front in B grade on 133 and in C grade Brown was not troubled to stay in front with a creditable 133.

Day three and the last fifty targets to run. Collins, Long and Finis shot 25's in the 7th round and Brown (his first 25 in trench) Dent, Rumbel and Scanes 25 in the final round. Finis Maxwell and Long made it 24 also in the final round.

The intense competitive pressure in the final 50 targets was highlighted by the fact that "only" six 25's were shot on the final day.

When the dust had settled and the scores entered and checked, Jim Finis had emerged clear winner on 194/200.

A shoot off was required between Rumbel and Long for second and third place. Each had shot 190.

Another shoot-off was necessary between Collins and Scanes for A grade, each on a creditable 184.

NATIONAL ATHLETE AWARD SCHEME BENEFITS CLAY TARGET SHOOTING

Grants totalling approximately \$150.000 have been offered to world-ranked Australian athletes and teams under the Federal Government's National Athlete Award Scheme.

The National Athlete Award Scheme was established in September 1980 when the first grant under the Scheme was made to Australia's only individual gold medalist at the Moscow Olympics, Michelle Ford.

Announcing the new Grants recently, the then Minister for Home Affairs and Environment, Mr Bob Ellicott, said that a further thirty individual athletes and four national sports bodies had been selected for awards after consultation with the Sports Advisory Council.

"The recommendations were based on a review of performances of all current Australian sportsmen and sportswomen who have achieved international recognition in the recent past," Mr Ellicott said.

The athletes who should benefit from the grants come from fourteen different sports including clay target shooting. Jim Ellis and Terry Rumbel will each receive an award of \$3500.

Both Rumbel and Ellis have spent literally thousands of dollars in achieving their present markings. Each has reached a point where the money tin is emptying very quickly, and the announcement of the grants has been very timely.

Teams participating in basketball. men's hockey, netball and rowing have also been recognised for their achievements at the international level. Mr Ellicott said.

"Grants are being offered to individuals on the basis that those receiving them will undertake to use the funds to further their sporting careers. The financial assistance from the Government would help to compensate for the costs associated with the athletes' endeavours without affecting their amateur status". Mr Ellicott said.

"The Grants will be offered annually, and will depend each year on world ranking and the potential for performances to continue at a high level". Mr Ellicott said the National Athlete Award Scheme was still in its formative stages. "At the moment in order for the grants to be meaningful in amount they have to be restricted to athletes or teams ranked in the top bracket."

Mr Ellicott said the Scheme would be monitored closely by his Department in consultation with the respective national sporting bodies to ensure that the aims of the Scheme are being met.

He said that should any of the selected individuals be unable to meet the conditions associated with the grants. further awards would be made to other world standard Australian athletes selected in consultation with the Sports Advisory Council.

Since making this announcement. Mr Ellicott has resigned from Parliament, and the sports portfolio has been transferred to the Hon. M. McKellar, who is Minister for Health.


Sport has lost an enthusiastic and dedicated supporter in Bob Ellicott, and his standards and achievements are going to be very difficult to maintain.



C. Grade was won by P. Srbinovski 49/50, second M. Hodges 50/53 and third Mary Lou Parker from Queanbeyan Gun Club.

Event 2, the Luigi Franchi Graded Trophy, 22-25 metre group, first W. Iles 93/93, second R. Northcott 92/95, third L. Abela 59/60. 19-21 metre group, first G. Mark 65/65, second P. Muscat 64/65, third R. Ward 54/55. 16-18 metre group, B. Osborne 54/54, second C. Milner 53/54, third D. Facer 37/38. 11-15 metre group, C. Portelli 31/34, second G. Naggar 30/34, third G. Collaros 29/32.

On Sunday 109 shooters lined up for the **Eley Classic** — which is being conducted Australia wide for the first time over 100 Targets.

There was much drama, in addition to the Classic, as there were four shooters (Billy Iles. Geoff Mark, Louis Abea, Barry Kable) who had shot the 100 targets the previous day and were chasing the \$1,000 over the program. The fortunes of these shooters were followed by most of the shooters and spectators on the grounds.

After the first round of 25 targets there were 26 possibles and after the second round there were 15 who had shot the 50 targets including Billy Iles, Geoff Mark, Louis Abela and Barry Kable.


One of the biggest technical advances in clay target shooting in recent times comes in the form of a quality phonopull system developed by Robbie Rehbein and Russell Connaly of Bundaberg, Queensland.

Rehbein is the proprietor of Rehbein's Guns and is an avid clay buster. Russell Connaly trades as Technition Electronics, and the two have made a pretty formidable technical team in the development of the new product, which is called "PHONO-FLITE".

For many years, shotgun shooters have often been moved to comment on 'slow' or 'fast' pulls, to the point where it appears to affect their scores.

No more of those problems with "PHONO-FLITE", which is a system that electronically releases the target on the competitor's call. The system has been in use on Olympic Trench layout for many years, but has proved to be difficult to convert to DTL use because of the greater background noise that exists on a DTL field.

The Rehbein product has overcome that technical difficulty. In fact, it is claimed that "Phono-Flite" can discriminate betweeen the sound of a shot and a competitor's call — the


Dear Sir,





WINCHESTER SUPPORT FOR POSTER



RULES CORNER...

Rules Sub Committee Chairman Arch Rowe throws light on Rule 103(c):

The interpretation of Rule 103(c) seems to have caused some concern among shooters and club secretaries and it appears a

shooter competing in handicap events and completing his 100 targets in either events or shoot offs must be handicapped

shooter may have recorded 90 targets on his handicap card and enters in a 20 target event. Only the first 10 targets of the event are counted for handicapping purposes. All remaining targets of such event, including shoot off targets if any. do not count.

after completing 100 targets as in the foregoing. whose percentage is below that required on his handicap mark can further six months before any further inward movement is allowed

Any shooter not wishing to accept the one metre inward movement is entitled to remain on his original handicap.

Clay target shooting has lost another of its strongest supporters in Roy Fallshaw, of Moonee Ponds in Victoria.

Although it has often been said that there is no such thing as a "happy death" Roy came as close to one as is possible — he died doing the thing he liked best — SHOOTING. He had made his usual Tuesday visit to Metropolitan Clay Target Club to shoot a round of skeet.

He was shooting quite well until station six, where he missed the double. His mates chi-acked him by saying that if the targets had been wearing feathers he would never have missed them. Roy smiled and stepped to the rear of the ground. Immediately after placing his gun against the safety fence, he collapsed unconscious, and did not recover.

Gordon Lear, another well known clay buster from years ago, was with Roy at the time and commented that, although it was a very distressing experience for the other shooters in the squad, you could almost visualise a smile on Roy's face.

Roy Fallshaw had become known as the father of skeet shooting in Victoria, in view of the fact that he was the most senior of the pioneers of the sport. Other well known names in the group that developed skeet were George Biggs — who won the 1980 Australian Skeet Championship — Dud Edgerton, Ron and John Siede.

Although his name appeared regulary in winners' lists at club matches, Dave's biggest win was in the 1947 Champion of Champions Cup, which he won with a score of 49/50.



FROM THE DESK OF THE QUEENSLAND COACHING DIRECTOR

(from W.G. (BILL) STEVENS.)

Many times since the commencement of our coaching scheme I have been asked. "How important is the mental aspect in shooting clay targets." I would not like to state what percentage of targets are missed or hit because of mental discipline, but I am sure that it plays the biggest part of all, if one wishes to become successful in our sport.

In the next few paragraphs. I would like to touch lightly on **Mental Discipline** and the importance of **Positive Thinking**.

Mental discipline is the broad term used in describing the competitor's actions and reactions when facing pressure in competitions.

To become a successful competitor in our sport we must make a determined effort to acquire qualities of strong will and determination. We must stand on our shooting marks with one thought in mind. **"TO BREAK THE TARGET THAT IS IN THE AIR"**. If you are shooting a 50 target event. we must treat this as 50 events of 1 target. If you fire a bad shot. forget about it immediately, and when it is your turn to shoot. keep yourself under control. carry out your normal shooting procedure, call for your target, quickly assess its angle, swing SMOOTHLY through the target exactly as you have done at practice, and SHOOT THE TARGET. You may note I say "SHOOT THE TARGET" — THINK POSITIVE.

If you can treat every target whether at the practice trap. or your local club shoot. or the National Championships in the same precise manner and with the same determination. you will be well on the way to becoming a top shot. Too many of us treat our local shoots as a fun game. we walk out onto the tracks with nothing on our minds but to have a good time sure we have a good time — however it is **NOT** the way to become a champion shot.

Think positive. say to yourself "I can do it and I WILL do it." If the weather comes in bad forget it and say to yourself. "I can do it. — good scores have been shot in all kinds of weather someone else has done it — he only had two arms. two legs. two eyes and the same facilities as I have — AS A MATTER OF FACT I CAN DO IT BETTER."

How many times have you heard the saying "Don't stop your swing"? This is negative thinking. Think positive — tell yourself to keep the gun swinging and I will break targets.

Fill your mind with DO's and **WILLS** — completely wipe from your mind the **CAN'TS** and **DON'TS**. Of course you must have definite ideas about your task, being confident in your ability to successfully employ the basic skills produces a dependable performance under all types of stress.

THINK POSITIVE and you will be rewarded with GOOD SHOOTING in 1981.

'81 NATIONALS ATTRACT RECORD SPONSORSHIP

(Staff Writer)

An all time record value of trophies and awards will be available to competitors at this year's National Championships.

Each major event has a valuable under and over shotgun, as the winner's trophy. However, it is in the junior divisions where there has been a giant leap in industry support. Winchester Australia has provided a MEC 600 shotshell reloader as a trophy, to be presented to the winner of the Junior Division in all events except the Double Barrel.

For the first time, a separate National title is being conducted for juniors in the double barrel event. It will be known as the 1st Australian Junior Double Barrel Championship. It will be run on the same fifty targets as the Open Double Barrel event and carries a nomination of \$5.

Winchester has donated a Model 10195 under and over shotgun, to be presented to the first placed junior. The company has also donated a digital watch for second and a scientific calculator for third.

Brian Mark, Winchester's Advertising and Sales Promotion Manager told CTSN that his company was developing an extensive range of junior promotions throughout the shooting sports, of which this was a part. The total value of the Winchester donation of trophies for the junior divisions and events is over \$2000.

As a further evidence of the importance of the Double Barrel event, Eley Ammunition has sponsored the 1st Australian Women's Double Barrel Championship. The nomination will be \$20, although a woman may enter the open match as well as the women's event for a **total** nomination of \$25.

The first prize will be a Franchi Barrage shotgun plus leather case, donated by Eley Ammunition. This will match the Franchi Barrage Eley has donated for presentation to the winner of the open event. In addition to the shotguns, winners will also receive the traditional Eley Silver Badge.

Eley has also donated a cased Barrage to be presented to the winner of the 11th Australian Skeet Championship. The same company has traditionally sponsored the Ladies Overall High Gun Award and will repeat the gesture in 1981.

The Overall High Gun Award in the open section is a high grade Browning shotgun, donated by F. N. Sports, through

Ltd. which as the Australian distributor for Rottweil cartridges, is appearing at a Nationals tournament for the first time, has donated a PUMA Presentation Sheath Knife, beautifully crafted and engraved, and valued at \$650. This will be presented to the competitor who aggregates the highest score over the six trap events.



CAN SMITH MAKE IT THREE IN A ROW?

Doug Smith of Queensland has won the last two Champion of Champions events at National Championships tournaments.


In 1979 at Griffith (NSW) and in 1980 at Perth (W.A.) Smith has led the field in this premier event at the conclusion of the match, and followers of the sport are suggesting that he will repeat the feat in 1981.

The 1981 Champion of Champions event will be staged on the last day of the series, Friday, April 24. The tournament will be run at the Melbourne Gun Club

National Championships were last held on this ground in 1974, the year that Warren Charlton (NSW) had to shoot 620 consecutive targets before he won the Double Barrel event from Vin Ryan of Victoria.

With common mark events now being shot from 15 metres. one wonders what sort of scores may be recorded this year.

Another of Australia's top clay busters, Billy Iles, has been burning lately, with major wins in South Australia and New South Wales.



• Billy lies is currently in wonderful form, and will be hard to roll at the 1981 Nationals.

Iles clean-sheeted a recent two day program held at Marconi Gun Club in Sydney to shoot over 450 targets straight. He had to beat off a challenge from Geoff Mark of Victoria to do so.

After the success of the Americans in the 1980 series, another group of U.S. clay target shooters will attend the 1981 series, and it can be confidently predicted that they will make their presence felt.

The usual large contingent will arrive from New Zealand. and will enter the 50 target International Trap match which is to be conducted on Tuesday, April 21.

Australia won this match last year, but will meet a much stronger challenge from New Zealand at Melbourne.

Probably the greatest interest will revolve around the 29th Australian Double Barrel Championship. After the controversial finish to the 1980 event, in which junior Russell Mark (Victoria) held out seasoned Doug Smith, after Smith had experienced a series of cartridge problems, the Queensland champion has set himself to win the 1981 match. In the meantime, Mark has been concentrating on his studies for the past six months and has not had a lot of competition.

Well known shooters like Barry Kable (NSW) Robbie Smith (NSW) and Darryl Wiese (W.A.) will line up alongside lies and his fellow Victorians to make this match one of the greatest contests Australia has seen.

Organizers expect something like seven hundred competitors to enter the Double Barrel event, which will be a record entry.

Mr Robert Buchan, Chairman of the Organizing Committee has advised CTSN that shooting cannot commence until 10



a.m. on Sunday, April 18. This is Single Barrel Championship day, and the delayed start will make it difficult to complete the event in one day.

This year's tournament has attracted extensive sponsorship support, and the total value of perpetual trophies, cash awards, team positions and general trophies exceeds \$65.000. This makes for keen competition, and it is not surprising to hear that competitors are coming from a number of overseas countries

Australia is rapidly becoming the major promoter of top class clay target tournaments in the South Pacific.

The sporting goods industry shows its support for the tournament by installing an extensive and interesting display of products associated with shooting at the tournament location.

About twenty exhibitors will display their wares at the 1981 series, and this is sure to attract a great deal of interest from the general public.

The National Championships series will commence on Saturday April 18, and will conclude with a lavish Prize giving Banquet at "Rembrandt's" Restaurant on Friday. April 24. The program spans the Easter holiday period. the first time that the Australian Clay Target Association has scheduled its premier match over a holiday period.

Despite difficulties encountered in staffing, particularly in the catering area. accommodation bookings indicate that the organizers' attendance estimates will be fairly accurate.

Due to a generous donation from Winchester of a full set of competition numbers, all competitors in the 1981 series are being asked to wear their individual numbers whenever they are on the shooting ground.

This move will substantially ease the burden of the shoot marshalls by making competitors readily identifiable. However, it should also lead to much greater interest in the match. as visitors — and the competitors — will be able to instantly identify shooters who have carded possibles. or for a variety of other reasons


A small deposit will be charged when the number is issued. and it will be refunded on the return of the undamaged cloth patch on Friday. April 24.

So, who will be the 1981 champions? Will overseas competitors feature as largely this year as they did in 1980. when three major trophies were won by international entrants?

Can Doug Smith avenge his defeat in the 1980 Double Barrel event by winning it this year?

Can a New Zealander win the Australia - New Zealand Trap Championship? The first to do so will be presented with a Miroku shotgun, which has been donated by Fuller Firearms Company.


In a few week's time the whole of Australia will have the answers to all these gestions.



Last month, we introduced readers to the basics of shooting I.S.U. or International Skeet.

In this concluding segment. Ian Hale discusses other aspects of the art.

EQUIPMENT

The range of shooting equipment available today, is so extensive that you will need to study the range very carefully. Looking after your equipment and accessories can make IT last longer and YOU shoot better.

Hitting targets can be difficult enough. without the additional handicap of ill fitting or inferior equipment.

Good equipment is an important path to giving yourself the maximum chance of shooting well, I am not suggesting that you can buy a 200 straight in the Gun Shop, but, you should buy good quality equipment to suit your own needs. Nothing is worse than practicing with a gun for six months and you and your gun become compatible so that you are confident with it then the damn thing falls to pieces and you have to start all over again.

Your equipment must be pleasing to look at. nice to feel. well constructed so that you will feel confident using it. There are many skeet guns available, a careful choice right from the start will hold you in good stead for many years. There are Skeet guns made with different spreading devices. Retro choking, Bell choking, Tula choking. Rifled choking these all enhance the Skeet gun pattern and are good.

A minimum weight of around 7^{1/4} lbs. is good, more if you like. Too light a gun will tend to make you snap at the targets, because a light gun though it may feel comfortable to pick up will let your arms do all the work of swing when in actual fact it's the shoulders that give you that lovely fast smooth swing.

The barrels on your skeet gun should be around the 28" mark more if you like, around the 28" mark gives you a nice sighting plane, a nice length of barrel to swing and a barrel long enough that won't jump around everywhere.

Your triggers should have no drag, they should be nice and crisp on the let off. Don't get too technical on your triggers let your gunsmith have a look at them and let him set them to what you would like, take his advice as this is his trade and he knows. The pad on the I.S.U. gun should be flat and have a surface that will not catch on your clothing.

Just check the toe on the butt of your gun and if it has a tendency to catch you or make you a little tender after firing have a talk to your gunsmith and see if he thinks it will help your game if you remove it.

The last thing I do if my gun has one is to remove the centre bead, if you have to look at your barrels to see if they are correctly aligned then you are not concentrating 100% on your target.

CLOTHING

This should be comfortable and something that you like wearing, a check should be made to make sure there are no seams in your shirt that may cause chafing, that the collars on your shirt will not get in the way when you are shooting.

For gun down position shooting, your shooting jacket should be comfortably firm, when you are at your daily practise, see if the gun catches anywhere, if it does, get your jacket fixed. There is nothing worse than catching your jacket when you are chasing a target.

After practising the above basics, we will move into shooting some I.S.U. Skeet. I cannot over emphasize the fact, that if you have not shot skeet before, try the standard Skeet first, you will improve your basic knowledge, and arrive at the I.S.U. ground confident that you are basically correct.

Many of the top I.S.U. shooters shoot the standard skeet if they are having technique problems. YOU CANNOT OVER PRACTICE PRACTISING THE BASICS.

Let's have a look at the ingredients of shooting the I.S.U. target. With the gun held in the correct position (Butt of the gun visible below the lowest hang of the elbow) both arms should be relaxed, take a firm grip of the gun. don't choke it to death, an authoritative grip will do. The barrels of the gun are held just under the target flight. Feet are in the natural position, as I said before align yourself to where you are going to hit the target slightly bend the knees. head and eyes comfortably erect, then in one motion, bring your head, eyes. gun and body back to the Trap House, never closer to the trap house than about fifteen feet because the going away bird will get the drop on you and the incomer will cause you to slow your swing down. When you get back to the trap house. pause, relax, look hard for the target but don't tighten up, call when the target appears, see it. swing through it. shoot it and follow through.

These are the basics of shooting the skeet target, we will go through each target and station in the next article. In this article I have tried to explain the basics, the most dominant factor in confidence and percentage shooting. You should practice daily and become a good basic shot because the minute one has to think about anything else but seeing and shooting the target when you are in trouble.

To help yourself improve, try and look at as many people as you can, take a look at the good shots, and you will notice that even though the styles may differ, basically they are all pretty much the same. Don't copy their styles, watch their approach, pick out the basics and watch them being used. It is so easy to wander from the basics and many shooters blame their frame of mind for bad shooting when in actual fact most of the time it is bad basics that stops them shooting well. A constant check and strict adherence to the basics will help you get on top of the target hitting game.

COACHING DAY AT ECHUCA

February 21 at Echuca Gun Club saw one of the state's largest roll-ups to an open zone coaching day. The seminar was actually a Victorian north-east zone day — but adjoining clubs were also invited to join in.

Full credit for the big attendance must go to the Echuca Gun Club management for the business-like manner in which they handled the promotional side.

The Echuca Gun Club's new grounds are first class, and situated in an ideal location just a short distance out of town — there are three trap grounds and two skeet layouts — all have a beautiful clear sky background.

The new club house is spacious with air conditioning installed. A modern kitchen is situated at one end with the office adjoining. Access to irrigation water ensures a lovely well-kept appearance of the whole shooting field. the ladies' committee, as is with most good country clubs, does a first class job of providing refreshments and helping to make all visitors welcome.

A total of 119 very keen shooters came along to find out what they could learn about how to shoot "mud pies" that leave the trap at something like 100 feet per second.

Many of the more experienced shooters were keen to have their guns checked out for proper fit and correct gun mounting technique, etc.

In a $1\frac{1}{2}$ hour lecture, before shooting instruction began, we discussed and explained the basic fundamentals involved in shooting moving targets — at question time, questions came thick and fast resulting in many queries being put straight.

After a delightful midday lunch prepared by the ladies. everyone spent the afternoon shooting under coach instruction at both trap and skeet.

Kerry Treloar, (a 13 yr. old lass), one of six young girl shooters who came along to the clinic said, "The gun doesn't kick nearly as much now I know how to hold it and use it properly." This comment made my day. Of the 119 shooters who came along for the day's instruction, roughly 40 were beginners.

It was great to have local newspaper interest from Echuca and Deniliquin. Reporters from both papers visited the clinic during the day to take pics and report through their local papers. This is the type of promotion our sport needs and I'm sure that local newspapers are always happy to get this type of news — but we must be sure to seek their interest when a coaching day is planned.

It was pleasing to see a number of women shooters turn up for instruction practice. My only regret for the day was that I was not able to give more detailed instruction to everyone because we simply ran out of time.

TA tabout 6 o'clock after a very hot day we got the storm that had been threatening for the past hour, and so put finish to any further instruction. This was now an ideal time to relax and have a cool drink and answer a few more questions.

After a beaut tea. almost everyone stayed behind to view the shooting films. Judging from the enthusiasm shown I'd say everyone had a most enjoyable day.

I'm grateful to the many people who helped make the day the success it was and to my panel of coaches headed by Neil Berry, Frank James, Jeff Boote and John King. **O**

EDITOR'S MAILBOX

Dear Ron,

Congratulations on your being elected National President of the A.C.T.A. We have had very little opportunity to get to know each other, however I am sure your long experience with the affairs of the Association well qualify you for the position.

I am more than a little disturbed at the "feed back" I have received with regards to the Finance Sub-Committee's recommendation on shooters fees. Les Price is overseas, however I wish to express my personal recollection of the result of our one and only sub-committee meeting

Very briefly, if an increase in shooters fees is thought to be justified, then an increase of say \$10 should be considered. This pre-supposes a complete examination of the A.C.T.A.'s financial position. Without specific instructions and more time than we are able to provide, the Finance Sub-committee has no way of knowing if the association is living beyond its means, although we have our own personal views on this matter. Only the Executive after detailed examination can determine whether an acceptable level of expenditure and appropriations is being maintained having regard to the Association's income.

The reasoning behind this recommendation is twofold. Apparently any increase cannot be implemented before January 1982. It seemed to us that unless considerable cost savings can be made, up to half of a \$10 increase could be absorbed by then anyway. Secondly, "grasping the nettle" firmly now seems far more desirable than going back to the membership every few years for another increase. There was one further suggestion, that consideration be given to collecting shooters fees in two parts, rather than one lump sum. This may ease the burden, although I fancy collection costs will outweigh any advantage to the shooters.

Finally, I am of the opinion that submissions to the Executive from any Committees or Sub-committees should be tabled in writing having been approved by that group. This comment is purely personal, without ulterior motive or reflection on any person or persons. I do not know how the recommendation was presented to the Executive, but from personal emperience I do know that particular emphasis can be lost or gained, quite unintentionally unless it is presented in writing.

Re the proposed increase of ACTA registration fees. I would like to bring to the notice of the Executive Council the following facts. I am expressing views held by veteran shooters, not eligible for the concession already in force, that is — thirty years registration and over sixty years of age. Most veterans are retired, and some are pensioners, or part

pensioners, therefore their financial status is a low one.

Full pension is about \$53.00 to \$54.00 per week, and a part pensioner would only be made up to those figures. Every shooter wishes to see the movement on a good financial basis, and do not want the cost of registration, perhaps to force some to retire.

Trusting the Executive Council consider these persons, when their decisions are made at the Annual General Meeting.



THE PASSING OF A PRESIDENT

George Ronald Porter, President of the Australian Clay Target Association, died on March 4, 1981, aged 53.



THE PASSING OF A PRESIDENT

George Ronald Porter died on March 4, 1981, aged 53. At the time of his death, Ron Porter had been President of the Australian Clay Target Association for only five months. and in that time had developed a type of leadership which impressed all with whom he came in contact.

He was a man's man, with no frills or airs and graces. Ron Porter was the husband of Muriel, who is one of the small band of ladies that have been presented with a Life Membership for their contribution to the sport. (Muriel is a Life Member of the Brisbane Gun Club). He was the father of four children, all of whom are competent clay target shooters. Even the $9\frac{1}{2}$ months old grandson (Ronald) is registered with the ACTA.

This all builds to a picture of a man who is very devoted to his sport. Like many of the Association's Presidents, Ron was a strong family man, a very diligent and capable business man, and an effective administrator. Ron Porter's administrative career in clay target shooting began in 1962 at about the same time as his competition career. He had become a member of Brisbane Gun Club. and could see things that in his opinion, needed attention. Before he could blink, he was on the Committee, and has not ceased working for the sport at any time since.

Ron was President of Brisbane Gun Club for many years. During that period the club rose to be one of the finest in Australia. Visitors to National Championships which have been held there will attest to the quality of the hospitality.

During the time of Ron's involvement in the early stages, his wife Muriel was always his strongest supporter and, in recognition of the fact that she couldn't beat her husband's interest in clay busting, she joined it, and became a most valuable member of the Ladies Committee.

In 1975. Ron was elected to the NATIONAL Executive Committee and in 1979, was elected as National Vice Presi-

In the meantime, Ron had played a major role in establishing the Queensland Clay Target Association. and one of the most important moments of his sporting career. was May 19, 1978, when the QCTA was officially formed.

More recently. Ron Porter has played a dominant part in the planning for the shooting section of the 1982 Commonwealth Games, to be held in Brisbane. He had been named as Competition Director for the trap and skeet events, a job which his breadth of experience would have enabled him to do well!

He was intensely proud of his family's shooting prowess. and was almost "uncontrollable" when his son John was nominated for Olympic Games selection in 1976. Due to circumstances beyond the control of the ACTA. John Porter did not get to represent Australia at Montreal in 1976 however he gained selection to represent Australia in the trap events at the 1978 World Championships. held in Seoul. Korea.

Meanwhile Raymond Porter (the third son) had become something of a skeet shooter of note, and also showed some of his father's flair for administration. Both Raymond and John have been on the committee of the Brisbane Gun Club – John is currently a Vice President of the club.

The youngest of the four Porter children is Rhonda, who is 15. She hit the headlines on January 4 when she won the Ladies Division of the Eley Waratah classic held at Coffs Harbour. Ron had held high hopes of Rhonda featuring in the junior division results at the 1981 Australian Trap and Skeet Championships.

While the three younger Porter children have been featuring on the sporting scene. the eldest son. Graham. got married and has been the mainstay in the family plumbing business. It was Graham and his wife who produced the Porter grandson last year.

The plumbing business is also an example of the Ron Porter brand of guts. Ron became tired of being pushed around when he was doing his apprenticeship and decided that as soon as possible. he would go into his own plumbing business.

This he did in 1957 and had run C. and P. Plumbing ever since. He had worked extremely hard, and had always been "one of the boys." In fact, just the day before his death. Ron had put in a full day "on the bench" as he called it, because of pressure of work.

During his business career, he suffered some quite serious setbacks, but always adopted a very positive approach, and in doing so, worked his way out of trouble.

Ron Porter's contribution to clay target shooting will never be fully recognised. Wherever he has been, he has been a great ambassador for the sport and has created an image consistent with Australia's booming sport.

During 1978, he visited the Grand American Tournament and brought back some great ideas. Ron has been a regular visitor to New Zealand, and is held in very high regard by New Zealand competitors and administrators.

Usually, when a man spends a life time in a sport. he manages to make a few enemies — some of us can do it in just a brief time! Yet, in the case of Ron Porter, or "Poppa" Porter as he was affectionately known by some. I have not yet met a person who could truly be fitted into the 'enemy' category. Sure, many people have disagreed with him, some quite heatedly, but none of these people have ever thought any less of the MAN.

Furthermore, one rarely heard Ron Porter even speak against another person. He saw this sort of talk as negative and non productive, and in his bustling and progressive style, there was not time for negative actions.

As a leader of men, he has always walked tall! He never shirked an issue, and regularly demonstrated an ability to clearly think through a variety of problems.

He always supported his team, and has been a tremendously loyal "Boss" to work for.

Ron Porter was physically and in character a Big Man! His position in clay target shooting will be very hard to fill.

Clay busters throughout Australia and the Pacific area join me in extending to Muriel, Graham, John, Raymond and Rhonda our deepest sympathy in what has been a tragic loss to them and to the sport.

I wonder how Ron would have helped us through a crisis like this? 0

BIG FUNERAL FOR RON PORTER

A finale that matched the man!

At the biggest funeral service the sport has ever seen. clay target shooting paid its final respects to its late President Ron Porter at the Mt Thompson Crematorium, just south of Brisbane.

Well over 300 mourners attended, and the crowd overflowed onto the surrounding lawns when the chapel became full.

Chief mourners were Ron's wife Muriel, and the immediate family Graham. John. Raymond and Rhonda. The family group also included Graham's wife Robyn and their son Ronald (9 months) and Ron Porter's mother Pearl (80 years) and brothers Claude and Keith.

Many of the A.C.T.A. 'family' will not have had an opportunity to get to know Ron Porter as a person — and that in itself is a disappointment, as Ron was working extremely hard to meet as many shooters as possible. He had an incredible ability to "identify" with people at all levels and liked nothing more than to be accepted as "just another one of the boys."

This was made most evident at the funeral. where the crowd ranged from senior Government officers through business and sporting colleagues and friends. to shooters who had only met Ron once or twice but had been so impressed with the man that they wanted to share this moment with the family.

The service was conducted by the Reverend Barry Dangerfield. who has known the Porter family for many years and was therefore able to maintain a 'Ron Porter image' throughout the service.

The service was in itself a wonderful experience because of the sensitivity of the minister. There were no tear jerking lines or anything that could possibly be called a "frill".

The mourners were given a complete picture of **Ron Porter**, the man, and the family have been left with some very impressive memories.

Magnificent floral tributes had arrived from all over Australia. even as far afield as Canada and New Zealand. In addition, the family home was brightened by the arrival of many flowers.

Expressions of sympathy flowed in from individual shooters. and from clubs in most Australian states.

Amongst the mourners at the funeral were Acting President Laurie Connors and his wife Agnes: ACTA Executive Members Richard Dean and Arch Rowe: Queensland Director of Sport Stan Wilcox and his senior aide. Graham Wegner: Chairman of the Queensland Sports Advisory Committee Ron Leahy: Bev Grice (Secretary of QCTA. who represented QCTA President Neil Hardy). Les James. President of Brisbane Gun Club: Harry Somers from the New South Wales Clay Target Association (also an ex-member of the Executive Committee): Presidents or Committee members from clubs throughout Queensland: representatives of all Queensland shooting associations: officers of the Brisbane Commonwealth Games Foundation. The shooting industry was also well represented. Bob Dupuy and Trevor Schultz represented Winchester, while Eley was represented by Tom Pascoe.

At the time that this report is being read it is most likely that Muriel, John, Raymond and Rhonda will be attending the National Championships being held in Melbourne.

What a great welcome awaits such a courageous and popular family. **O**





TRIBUTES TO A PRESIDENT

Neil Hardy, President of the Queensland Clay Target Association says:

Ron Porter was a man of a type all too infrequent in today's community. A successful businessman whose word was his bond, Ron's reputation was that of being fair to all. He is best described as a community leader — unafraid to accept responsibility or to show the way with sheer hard work. He could mix well at all levels yet remained very approachable and "one of the boys". Ron's man management derived the best from his employees and fellow committeemen and stopped internal bickering, yet he would not hesitate to tell a person that their conduct was incorrect, resolve the issue and it was then forgotten.

In clay target shooting Ron was a "sportsman". A good shot to whom winning wasn't important — just the knowledge that you shot well. I never heard of him claiming a "no target". His attitude was that if a target came out of the trap. you should be able to shoot it. The only reason a target was missed was that you just couldn't hit it! If only all shooters adopted this approach! There was no hesitation to commit himself for his club in both physical effort and financial contribution. Brisbane Gun Club will tell you the full story of Ron's efforts over the years. Apart from his executive responsibilities Ron never hesitated to referee, score or to load targets — the trivial tasks so important to the functioning of the club.

Farewell Ron. You'll be missed on the clay target circuit. You've certainly left this community a lot better off for your lifetime with us. Let's all try to follow the virtues of this man. Bev Grice, Secretary of the Queensland Clay Target Association says:

Ron Porter had a dream... a Clay Target Association for Queensland: and on the 19th May 1978 that dream came true with the inaugural meeting of the Q.C.T.A. over which Ron resided. With an attendance of 56, representing 24 Clubs of the then 46 clubs circularized, the Draft Constitution drawn up by Ron was adopted and remains basically the same to this day. At that meeting Ron was elected Vice-President, a position he held with distinction up to his passing. In addition he represented Queensland on the A.C.T.A. Executive. in 1980 being elected to the position of National President.

His dynamic and yet friendly disposition won him a place of high regard throughout the Queensland clubs, many of which he personally visited, giving advice and encouragement. A top class shooter in his own right, he was ever ready to help the junior or the beginner to achieve maximum benefit from the sport.

At the first State Carnival of the Q.C.T.A (held in May 1979) the perpetual award of the G. R. & M. Porter Cup was created, for the Champion of Champions Queensland shooter. Thus in a practical way, his name will live on. In a less obvious way, his name will live on — as a FRIEND, A BENEFACTOR, A SPORTSMAN, and a man who had a dream.

To his wife Muriel and his four children, Graham, John, Raymond and Rhonda, who have their own personal grief to bear, he will have meant many more things. Their own connection with the sport means they will have many who feel for them — many who will do what they can to ease the pain of a good man passing.

There will be another National President, and State Vice President — there will never be another Ron Porter.

Acting President, Laurie Connors says:

On Wednesday, 4th March, 1981, Australian Clay Target shooting received a severe set back by the death of our National President, Ron Porter, Brisbane, Queensland. He is survived by his wife Muriel, sons, Graham, John, Raymond and daughter Rhonda.

Ron was elected to the National Executive in Tasmania in 1975, the same year as myself. Ever since then I had been closely associated with him in the administration of clay target shooting at a National level.

He had a power to get people united and motivated to work

To say I was shocked to hear of the death of our President, Ron Porter, soon after his return from visiting the members on this side of the continent, would be an understatement. It is with profound regret that I sit down and try to express the feelings of all of us over here who knew Ron, all of whom valued his friendship and appreciated the manner in which he undertook to promote the duties of the office he held for such a short time.

I have known him personally for the last ten years and as a member of your Executive had always found him a man of few unnecessary words, sometimes blunt in his expression, but always to the point. He was not known by me to back away from anything, however unpopular if he considered it was in the interests of our sport. However if the consensus of opinion was contrary to his thoughts on the subject would throw his weight behind the majority to the best of his ability. Men of the calibre of Ron Porter are hard to find and difficult to replace. I am extremely proud to have worked with him on your Executive and more recently as a member of the Management Committee.

The purpose of Ron's recent visit over here was to attend the W.A.C.T.A. Trap & Skeet Carnival, and I must say he appeared very relaxed and confident at what was to be his last shoot. He shot consistently well but his avowed purpose to shoot a score that would have put him in the W.A. Team, if he had been eligible, just eluded him. However, he had his revenge at the pool table after the barbecue, while waiting for his plane home.

On behalf of the shooting fraternity in Western Australia, all members of the W.A.C.T.A. Executive, Kath and myself, I extend to Muriel and the family our heartfelt sympathy at the loss of a fine gentleman and sportsman, whose words at the presentation of trophies appertaining to myself I will always remember.

Paul Cains Member of the Management Committee says:

I have just learned of the death of President Ron Porter. There will be many. many shooters who will mourn his passing, as I do. He was loved and respected. not only in his own state of Queensland. but throughout the country. He had so many fine qualities, he was straight and honest, kind, easy to get on with, he called a spade a spade, or something more colorful, and he was always prepared to listen.

He brought to the Presidency a freshness that will be hard to replace and he put the interests of the A.C.T.A. above personal considerations. to the extent he neglected his own health. We owe a debt it will be impossible to repay.



What they lacked in ability they made up for with enthusiasm when 60 youngsters faced their 20 targets SB in the first ever South Australian School Age Championships.

The event, sponsored by Winchester was part of the S.A. State Trap Carnival at S.A.G.C. Saturday, February 7.

Boys and girls participating, represented some 40 schools throughout the state, more than half of them in the Under 15 division.

But it was a 13-year-old from the South East who took the main honours. Scott Hetherington of Penola with a good 19/20 ran out as Overall Winner and Under 15 Champion. A veteran of just two years of shooting he is a member of the Mount Gambier Gun Club.

The Over 15's was decided after a shoot-off for the 18/20's. By running another 10 straight, Andrew Mules took the sash and trophy with a score of 28/30. The Girls section went to 15-year-old R. Davey.

Trophies were presented by National President Ron Porter who spoke in glowing terms of the attitude and demeanour of the youngsters who participated. He pointed out to them the wonderful advantages and discipline that could be learned from the sport of clay target shooting. 0

shot has no effect on the system, whereas, a human call will result in a released target.

Robbie Rehbein states: "If you select any mike (microphone), call for the target, and it will appear on your call!

Select the same mike and fire a shot over it. - NO target will appear. However, after the shot has been fired, the shooter may call and a target will appear!

The equipment consists basically of six microphones --- one for each of the five shooting tracks and one to screen or black out extraneous noise - a control box and a hand control.

The designers recently conducted a field test of the equipment at Brisbane Gun Club. Two of Australia's most experienced shooters (and referees) in the late Ron Porter and Bill Stevens were most impressed with the demonstration and were enthusiastic over the benefits to accrue to competitors and officials alike.

Provision has been made for the equipment to be connected to the release solenoid of most electric traps, and conversion is simple and quick. If the necessity to convert back arises, it can be done in a moment.

The equipment is now being offered for sale, and the sole supplier is:




QUEENSLAND CLAY TARGET ASSOCIATION REPORT



The work done must be valued at over \$350, and the staff is extremely grateful to the workers from Crikis and Jarrett.


