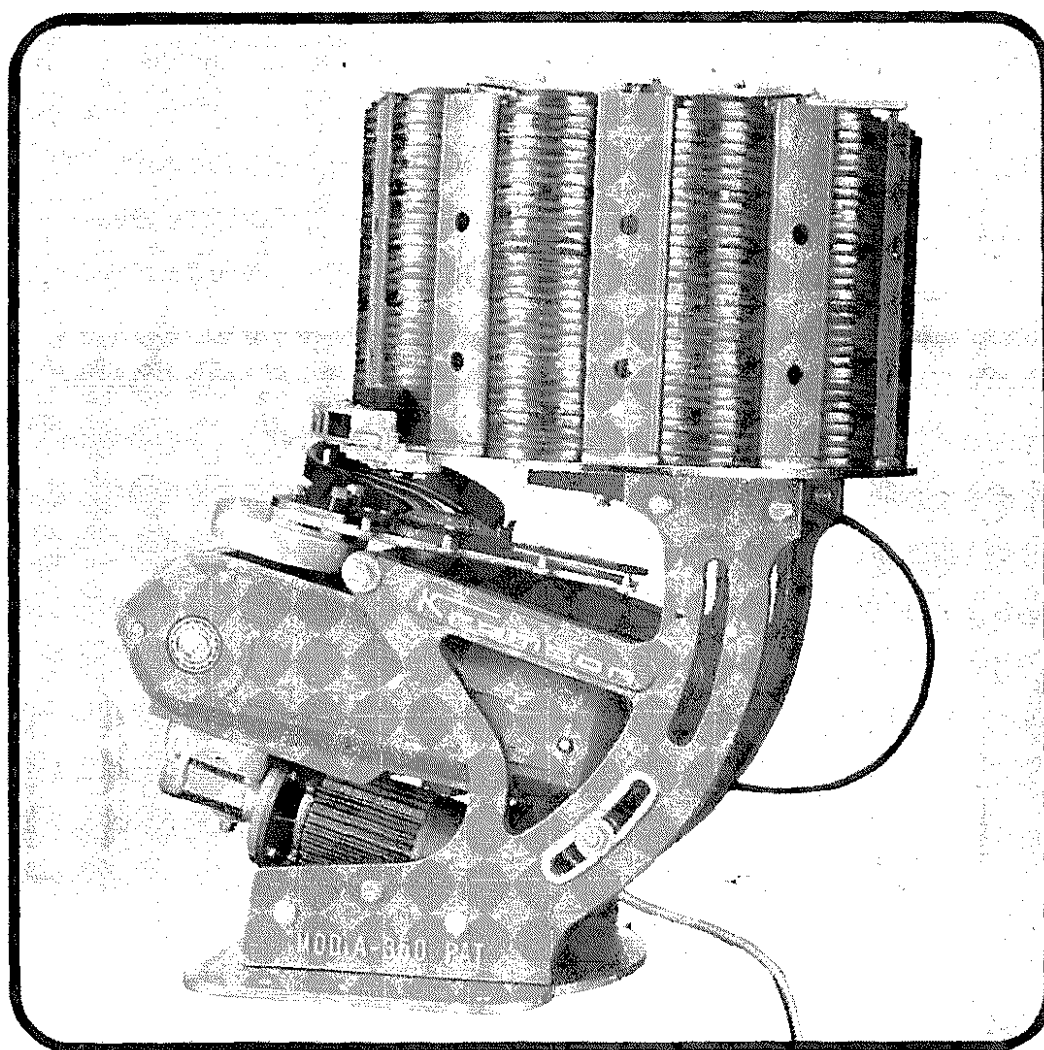

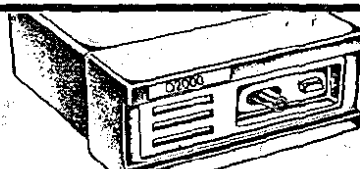

PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE 1986 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Another year is now behind us and we can all look back on it with a certain amount of pride at our achievements. Although there was only a small increase in our membership at least the downward trend has been reversed over the last two years, our membership in 1985 being 8929 as against 8766 in 1984.

All our National Titles were well attended and ran very smoothly. It is very gratifying to see so many junior shooters at all of these events.

This must augur well for our future and it is up to us all to see that they are catered for at all levels of our competitions, especially their own clubs. For the first time two juniors went with our team to the World Championships in Italy and both acquitted themselves very well under the circumstances, the experience gained being invaluable to them.

Your Executive have decided that the participation of juniors at this level should continue if at all possible and to this end have started a fund with a grant of \$1000 for this purpose. Donations are being solicited and I recommend this project for your earnest consideration. Of course selection of such juniors would be subject to them attaining a certain standard of competence and other criteria determined from time to time.

DTL NATIONALS — PERTH W.A.

These were conducted on the new shooting complex at Whiteman Park over 10 layouts and although the Club House was not finished and the organising staff had to "rough it" the shooting facilities left nothing to be desired.

The W.A.C.T.A., as hosts, must be commended for their effort in staging these events for us, and returning a profit well above budget by keeping expenditure to a minimum, as evidenced by the accompanying balance sheet. 440 individual shooters attended, consisting of 86 AA, 125 A, 130 B and 99 C grade. All in all a very satisfactory result considering the distance involved.

SKEET NATIONALS

These were conducted in Melbourne during November and were also a financial success due mainly to the fact that practically all the staff were unpaid volunteers. Our thanks must go to these dedicated people for their efforts, and the Melbourne Gun Club and V.C.T.A. for staging the events.

MINI-COMPUTER

Your Executive after considerable investigation purchased a computer to service our accounting procedures which had been manual and overseen by an outside organisation, with computerised equipment, on a quarterly basis. It was felt that this was an unnecessary duplication and the purchase will be self funding with the release of funds that had been outgoing for services that we will now be able to provide from within. Further it is intended to forward a computerised account direct to those shooters who have not re-registered with their Club by March 31st each year to try and prevent the several hundred drop off in membership annually we have at present.

PUBLICITY

A new sub-committee under the chairmanship of Laurie

Connors was formed from the Executive and had its first meeting in November last. The objective is to foster and encourage the development of the sport through all possible means including sponsorship. Any input from shooters generally would be most welcome. I further ask that our historian George Biggs be kept in mind, particularly by our older shooters, and supplied with any historic information that could be used in the promotion of our sport.

REFEREES

All referees will have received with their handicap card the pocket edition of our referees guidelines. All Clubs will receive by courtesy of the V.C.T.A. a wall poster along the same lines. As these simplified and abbreviated rules are all that our referees examiners would expect shooters to know on the tracks it is hoped that more will become accredited.

COACHING

The coaching council under the stewardship of National Coaching Director, Peter Quire has once again had a successful year and we now have 250 level 1 and 29 level 2 coaches, with the level 3 course on the drawing board. I am sure our novice shooters appreciate the work put in by these members who only receive for their efforts the satisfaction that comes from putting something back into a sport that has given them enjoyment in the past. We have at last been successful in arranging for Mr. Phil Murray a prominent skeet coach in the United States to come to Australia and conduct coaching seminars for us. He will be here during the Skeet Nationals in Wagga and will visit most States.

INSURANCE

Legislation in N.S.W. making it compulsory for Clubs such as ours to carry increased Public Liability Insurance has necessitated us increasing our cover from one to two million dollars, as other States are bound to follow suit. It is proposed to recoup some of the extra premiums by increasing Club membership and the matter is the subject of a notice of motion at this meeting. This will work out much cheaper than individual Club insurance and will be explained in due course.

ASSOCIATIONS INCORPORATION ACT 1981

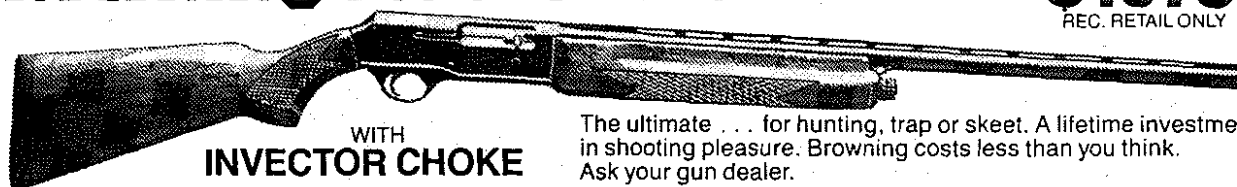
Some Clubs are still not incorporated but I am sure that once anybody has enquired into the risk that individual members are liable to if their Club is not incorporated they will quickly see the importance of this. As a matter of urgency I suggest that you check on your own Club's position, as it is a domestic matter that cannot be attended to by head office, although of grave concern to us. We have seen to it that the necessary Public Liability Insurance required under this legislation is in place and will assist further where possible, if asked.

CTSN

Our magazine is still being produced in the same format as previously, although our options are open on this and your Executive would welcome any suggestions for alteration and improvement. I congratulate our Executive Director on the production from the time he took over a task totally unknown to him at the time, although ably

assisted by our staff. Unfortunately costs have risen a massive 22% over the period under review and this has contributed to the loss we have made during the year.

EXECUTIVE

As you know our Executive Director Ian Hill resigned at the beginning of the year and was succeeded by Alan Maher, who has very quickly shown his ability on our behalf. He has already, with Peter O'Donnel our Administrative Officer streamlined some of our office procedures and put forward some innovative ideas to be considered by your Executive.

FINANCIAL

The funding of a National Association has always been a problem.

Your Association during 1985 has had some difficulties in this area with the main problem centring around the rising costs against a reasonably stable membership.

As you would be aware the cost of our organisation which I believe to be as efficient as any, centres around our membership requirements.

The C.T.S.N. is a reasonably costly exercise if you look at the cost structure. When viewed in an overall light however, the benefits that our sport achieves cannot be offset against the cost as it is the voice and information centre of Clay Target Shooting in Australia.

Our overseas Teams also could be construed to be costly to the Association. Not so in my opinion and this is borne out by the magnificent shooting that was seen by those who attended the Olympic Discipline Nationals. Where

would our shooters and more particularly our sport be if we were to confine ourself to shooting within Australia?

Experience has to be earned and shooting against the best in the World brings that experience back to Australia and ultimately Australian Shooting.

By way of summarising, should our expenses remain as they are and our membership have increased by around 10%, which is less than the increase in costs, our result would have been much different.

It does not cost any more, give or take to administer an Association of good members as it does for 10,000, the difference is reflected in the increase of the Association cash flow.

1986 will need to be a year of consolidation in certain areas. We are aware of the areas that need to be looked at, however, members must be also aware that if costs continue to increase and membership fees remain stable then there is only one result.

We do not want to consider increasing membership fees, neither do you — new members are the answer and that is where you can help — will you.

In closing I congratulate my executive for the way in which they represented their various states during the year and their input to the ACTA at a national level.

The dedication of the ACTA staff is also most commendable.

Lastly I would like to thank all the state associations and the clubs that I was able to visit during 1985 for their hospitality.

AUSTRALIAN CLAY TARGET ASSOCIATION ANNUAL REPORT 1985

It is my pleasure to be able to present the 1985 Annual Report and Balance Sheet of the Australian Clay Target Association.

There have been changes from within with the resignation in May of the Executive Director, Mr Ian Hill, who has rejoined the commercial world.

On behalf of the Association I would like to thank Ian for his years of service to the Association and wish him well in his future involvements.

In presenting this Annual Report I have followed the traditional format of reporting to the members.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive again showed their faith in the President, Mr Roy Holtfreter of Northam, W.A. by re-electing him to the position of National President for 1985.

The efforts of the President throughout the year were commendable to say the least as he was untiring with his involvement for the Association.

The Vice-President role was again the responsibility of Mr Laurie Connors who became a familiar face to shooters, as he attended many club shoots throughout 1985 as well as administering Committee responsibilities.

The Committee met twice during the year, at the National Trap Championships in Perth and the National Skeet Championships at Melbourne.

Meetings of this Committee were more than beneficial to the Association as members at all times contributed their

thoughts and ideas without fear or favour.

Members of the Executive Committee are commended for the time and effort that they afforded the Association in voluntary capacities — the sport of Clay Target Shooting does and will continue to improve with the dedication of members of this most important Committee.

A vacancy occurred in the latter part of the year owing to the resignation of Tasmanian Ken Copleman who had served the Executive well throughout his term in office. This position has been taken up by Stuart Browning from Hobart who will attend his first meeting at Echuca in April 1986.

MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Chaired by National President Mr Roy Holtfreter, this Committee had need to meet on three occasions during the year.

A meeting in May was necessary to conduct interviews for the Executive Director's position which was created by the resignation of Mr Ian Hill.

Following the appointment in June of Mr Alan Maher to the position, the Management Committee met again in July and also at the National Skeet Championships in November.

The meetings generally created a considerable flow of ideas and certainly contributed greatly to the overall operation of the Association.

Management members were always available for discussion and their combined experience in the Association.

tion is of great value — sometimes overlooked.

The support given Management by the Executive Committee does go a long way to ensure that the Association continues to advance, something which we all strive for.

INTERNATIONAL SHOOTING COMMITTEE

During 1985 this Committee met on two formal occasions to conduct the affairs of the Association at International level. Chaired by Vice-President Mr L.G. Connors, the Committee endeavoured at all times to ensure that Clay Target Shooting in Australia would continue to improve its recognition at International level.

With teams competing in Scotland and Italy our shooters can only benefit by the experience. The improvement at International level is evident and will continue to be seen particularly if the junior shooters that we have live up to the promise that they show. International competition is a must if we are to continue to seek and gain support at Government level.

A recommendation of this Committee could well see Australia gain membership to the Asian Clay Pigeon Shooting Federation at an early date.

An application for full membership of the Asian Federation has been forwarded and should the decision by the General Assembly be favorable, then we could well see an explosive growth of interest, particularly in Western Australia which has the ideal complex to conduct International shooting.

The Committee is also to be congratulated for its efforts in gaining the services of American Skeet Champion, Phil Murray, to conduct coaching seminars in all States other than N.T. and Tasmania. Shooters from Tas. and N.T. will be able to have their opportunity to gain experience from this champion shooter when he attends at Wagga to shoot for our National Skeet Championship Title.

PUBLICITY COMMITTEE

Although only meeting on the one occasion in November, this Committee newly formed in Perth and chaired by Vice-President L.G. Connors, will ultimately prove to be a most important one.

It is envisaged that major companies will see the benefit of being involved with our sport at a National level and all efforts will be undertaken during the coming year to secure sponsorship.

This Committee must not be expected to work wonders as it is only at the beginning of a long journey down a very difficult road.

The long-term results will come providing that short-term results are not expected.

NATIONAL COACHING DIRECTOR

International teams and the National Training Squad are the responsibility of the National Coaching Director, Peter Quire.

The benefits of his experience can be seen and will continue so as long as shooters under his care listen to what he has to tell them. Learning is a listening process and once the message has been absorbed then the practical side of things takes over.

State Associations have been called upon to ensure that the National Coaching Director's expertise is not confined to the few as it is the many who are important to the sport. Through the Coaching Director and his National Coaching

Council the level of shooting is continuing to improve.

Visits to all States throughout 1986 should see this level both maintained and improved upon. This will not be the case if the State Associations do not take advantage of the experience in coaching Clay Target shooters that is available from the National Coaching Director.

NATIONAL COACHING COUNCIL

Under the direction of the National Coaching Director, Mr Peter Quire, the council was active again in 1985.

It is obvious that the fruits of their labor are commencing to be seen as the scores being recorded are better than ever.

The A.C.T.A. is appreciative of the combined efforts from coaching personnel in all areas, Club, Zone and State, who have been very generous with their time and coaching expertise. The shooters thank you.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Appointed to the position in June following the resignation of Ian Hill and having no knowledge of shooting my early months were full of surprises.

Fortunately the ones behind the scene at the A.C.T.A. office had broken in new people before and their assistance was greatly appreciated as I strove to learn the ropes.

The support given me by the Management Committee and in particular National President Roy Holtfreter and Vice-President Laurie Connors left me with no doubt that I had made the right decision in leaving the commercial world to take up a role in sport administration.

Should the years ahead be as satisfying as the one past then I will be fortunate indeed. I have made many new friends, met many new acquaintances and enjoyed being part of a sport that only those who are involved can understand.

I look forward to continuing in my role with the Association for many years to come.

AUSTRALIAN SHOOTING ASSOCIATION

Fortunately for shooting as a whole, the A.S.A. has under their new chairman Mr Dick Willis been able to arrest their declining financial situation.

With the appointment of a new Executive Director in Mrs Lesley Drake, now known as the General Secretary in keeping with International standards, the A.S.A. is operating in a more efficient manner than had been the case in the past.

The importance of our relationship with the A.S.A. is that through them we are able to obtain accreditation to International competition which includes the Olympic and Commonwealth Games as well as other International shooting under the direction of the International Shooting Union.

The A.C.T.A. is represented at the A.S.A. by Mr R.F. Buchan who is on the senior Management Committee and the Executive Director.

GOVERNMENT GRANTS

The Association received grants totalling \$45,000 from the Australian Sports Commission for the period 1984/85. The assistance from the Federal Government is appreciated as it plays a vital part in the development of our shooters at International level as well as the availability to the sport of Clay Target Shooting, of a National Coaching Director.

We are pleased to be able to record our appreciation for the assistance received from the Australian Sports Commission. The co-operation of the Commission's depart-

mental officers is not to be underestimated — nor is its importance.

It must be noted however, that the pattern that is emerging indicates that Government assistance to sport is being reduced. We can only emphasise the need for assistance at National Sporting levels and trust that we are not correctly interpreting the emerging pattern.

STATE ASSOCIATIONS

A total amount of \$13,378 was returned to the State Associations for the year. This amount is reflected by the number of shooters registered as full adult shooters for 1985.

As well as this per capita grant, State Associations have continued to receive varying degrees of support from State Governments that assist in developing the sport at State level as well as enabling State Teams to compete against each other at National Championships.

MEMBERSHIP

During 1985 we saw an ever so slight increase in the number of registered clubs. The 1985 records show that 302 clubs were registered as against 300. A small increase, but nevertheless an increase.

Registered shooters were also up in numbers to 8929, and we certainly will be endeavouring to see this trend continue.

The incidence of non-registered shooters that are competing at clubs "on the cheap" is also declining. This must continue as clubs are being seriously disadvantaged by these non-registered shooters joining in and sharing the club facilities at very little cost. Who carries the cost? — obviously the club, as they have to provide insurance cover costing thousands of dollars.

One way to overcome this: make club membership for non-registered shooters an amount higher than to become a registered A.C.T.A. shooter. This way the club and the sport will benefit.

INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION (OVERSEAS)

During 1985, the Association was represented at the Home Counties International at Kippen, Scotland and the World Moving Target Championships which were conducted at Montecatini Italy.

HOME COUNTRIES INTERNATIONAL

SCOTLAND: The team, under the management of Mr Tim Catling from Western Australia, performed creditably without taking out the honors.

Representing Australia in the Van Diemen's Trophy, the team finished in fourth place with a score of 1431/1500 behind the winner Ireland who out-shot all others to record a score of 1457/1500.

An invitation has been extended to the Home Countries to shoot at our National Trap Championships in Echuca in 1986 and while we are hopeful of the invitation being accepted we will have to wait and see.

WORLD MOVING TARGET CHAMPIONSHIPS

The team's two juniors, Brett Dunstan and Michael Inguanti, both performed well and will certainly benefit from the experience.

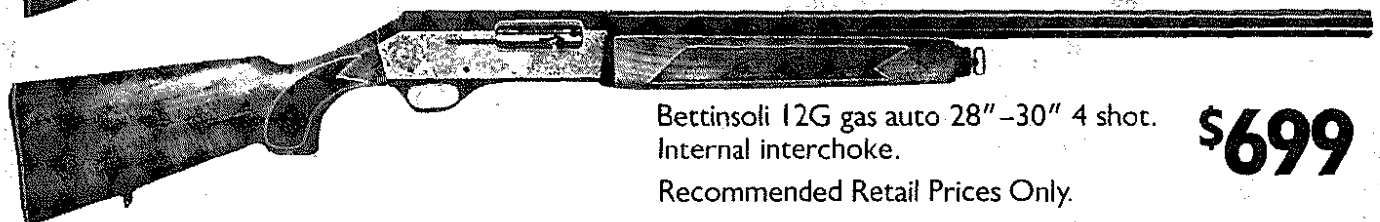

DIVISIONS

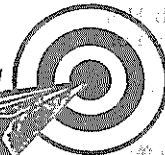

AUSTRALIAN CLAY TARGET ASSOCIATION

OUR FIRST 50 YEARS 1936-1986

Australia's history of trapshooting involvement goes back somewhere in the 1890s. We have evidence of gun clubs operating in New South Wales, Tasmania and Victoria as early as 1867 — they were of course live bird shooting clubs. It was a follow on from the sport of shooting in England where live pigeon shooting first became fashionable in England and on the Continent around 1850 and even earlier. We have reports that as far back as 1810 live pigeon shooting was gaining favour in some parts of the Continent.

W.W. Greener in his book "The Gun and Its Development" briefly traces the origin of trap shooting. He says that the origin of trap shooting can be traced back to the ancient pastime of Popinjay shooting, a game practised by the ancient Greeks and the expert bowmen of mediaeval times.

The Popinjay was a stuffed parrot or fowl placed upon the top of a pole, and used as a target. In some instances a live bird was used, a certain amount of liberty being given to it by the length of cord used to secure it to the pole.

The Toxophilite Society during the last century held frequent meetings for Popinjay shooting. The last recorded took place near Highgate in September 1792.

The first fashionable resort for pigeon shooting, near London, was the "Old Hats". A public house on the Uxbridge Road, it obtained its name from the pigeons used for shooting being placed in holes, covered with old hats, which were the primitive pigeon traps used.

The first pigeon club was formed at Hornsey Wood House. Traps were used here, and the "small cannon" which was formerly in vogue as pigeon guns were discounted, and the ordinary double barrel fowling piece substituted in August 1880, a set of shooting rules was drawn up to control live pigeon shooting in England. About this time pigeon shooting was also being received in France, Germany and Italy.

At times where pigeons were not available shooters would turn their thoughts to other forms of targets; one of the many such targets was the glass ball. The first balls used were merely coloured glass. However, it was not always possible to see when they were broken and so they were filled with feathers or smoke. Glass balls were first developed in Britain as a pastime game but later developed and made more fashionable in America by a Captain Bogardus who invented a type of spring trap for throwing purposes. The trap could be adjusted to throw the balls in

any direction at various distances. The sport became so popular that a set of rules was drawn up to apply for competition shooting. One rule stated that all matches or sweepstakes shall be shot from three traps placed 10 yards apart, 18 yards rise, and the choice of traps to be decided by the Referee, by drawing a gun wad from his pocket and showing it to the trap puller.

INTRODUCTION OF THE CLAY TARGET

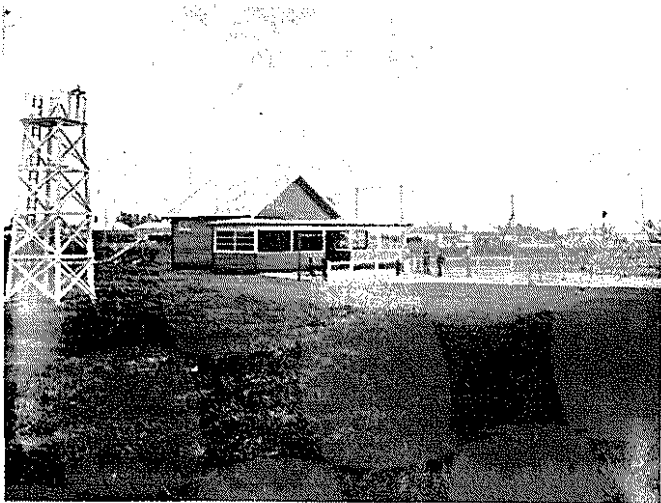
History records that an American named Ligowsky invented the clay target that we know today, in 1880. History also records that an Englishman named McCaskey also invented a clay target simultaneously in England in the same year. However, it was to be many years before the perfect target was acceptable for competition.

Over a period of some 15 years many types of so-called clay pigeons were tried without much success — it seemed that getting the correct ingredients together was the big problem. However, by the turn of the century, clay targets as we know them today were being made and used throughout America, completely replacing the glass ball and other types of targets.

Since the late 1890s clay target shooting has boomed throughout America to the extent that well over 1000 gun clubs regularly shoot programs and fire at more than 600 million targets per year. The Grand American Tournament held at Vandalia, Ohio annually since 1900 is a nine-day event where over 5000 shooters participate. The field is well over one mile long and 3½ million targets are thrown.

CLAY TARGET SHOOTING IN AUSTRALIA

Records of the very beginning of clay target shooting in Australia are almost non-existent and as far as I can gather the first Australian Clay Target Shooting group became known as the Williamstown and Melbourne Gun Club. It was formed by Mr Frank Albert and Mr Arthur Parker, a dentist of Newport Vic. using a hand-operated 1882 mod expert trap obtained from the makers of the Chamberlain Cartridge and Target Company of Cleveland, Ohio, U.S.A. The club, sited on Kororoit Creek Road where an oil refinery now stands, was a breakaway from live bird shooting and included such famous Australian shooters

as Jack Sutherland (Calrossie), Horrie James (Duxbac), Jack Mews and Frank Tubb. This was around 1920.

The big problems confronting the would-be clay target shooters of this time was non-availability of clay targets and suitable types of traps for throwing the targets. Cartridges were also imported and were in very short supply.

AUSTRALIA'S FIRST REGISTERED CLAY TARGET CLUB — THE NOBEL CLAY BIRD CLUB

The club first came into being through the efforts of a small band of enthusiastic clay target shooters who, in 1926, decided that they would prefer to shoot clay birds rather than live birds. And so after several months of fun shooting in a quarry at the back of I.C.I., a factory in West Footscray, a Melbourne suburb, it was decided that a club should be formed. History was made on Friday, September 9, 1927 when at a meeting, held at 380 Collins Street, Melbourne, it was decided to form Australia's first clay pigeon shooting club. It was to be known as the "Nobel Clay Bird Club".

Prior to the Nobel Club being formed, small groups of shooters in various places would run what could be called fun shoots, using more or less their own rules of competition. One of the more prominent of these clubs was the Victoria Clay Bird Club. This club used a piece of land adjacent to a market garden in Bentleigh, a south-eastern suburb of Melbourne. Nobel and Victoria Clubs were actually the two pioneer clubs. They merged in October 1939 and used the Nobel grounds. Shooting continued until several months after war was declared.

In the years between 1927 and 1936 numerous clay bird clubs were formed. They were affiliated with what was known as the Gun Clubs Association of Victoria. This was a live bird shooting body with headquarters at the original Melbourne Gun Club at Tottenham.

1936 was the year when Australia really began to shoot clay targets in an organised manner. Up to this time clay target shooting was controlled by the Live Bird Association and for obvious reasons it was apparent that we had to control our own type of trap shooting.

At a meeting called to discuss the matter, it was decided to proceed in this direction. It was agreed that the name of the Association would be "Clay Target Shooters' Association of Victoria".

Officials elected were as follows: President — Mr H.G. James; Vice-Presidents — Colonel C.W. Thompson and Messrs J.M. Wilson and L. Bertram; Secretary — Colonel Thompson; Treasurer — Mr H. Benison; Handicappers —

Messrs E.J. Parow, H.G. James, G. Townsend; Committee — R.W. Delaney, A.P. Cook, J. Benison with power to co-opt two others.

This was now the beginning of clay target shooting nationally.

CLAY TARGET SHOOTING BROUGHT TO A HALT

The outbreak of World War II in September 1939 brought to a halt the growth of clay target shooting in Australia. However, four or five clubs did hang on and managed to shoot at intervals throughout most part of the war whenever it became possible to obtain targets or shells, which was not often.

The Blackburn Gun Club, formed in 1936 and based on the private property of Jack Bryant, in Holland Road, Blackburn, was one of the clubs able to operate during the war.

During the early months of the war, units of the United States Air Force were often entertained for shooting practice (clay target practice was a part of Air Gunner training in those days). The theory was that shooting at targets familiarised the gunner with the technique of shooting moving targets. Can you imagine it, in today's age of computers?

The greatest problem facing the few clubs trying to keep going during the war was non-availability of targets and ammunition. However, two old-timers in Jack Bryant and Horrie Donnelly became clay target manufacturers, operating out of a garage in Blackburn. Unfortunately quality control was not always up to scratch. But no one complained about such a minor detail as some targets that only dusted when shot at!

Blackburn Club continued to shoot until the property was sold in 1947. It was then necessary to look for a new site. Vic Fankhauser, a very keen member of the Blackburn Club, who owned an orchard property in Burwood Road, offered a part of his land to the club. Nobel and Blackburn clubs then merged to form the Australian Clay Target Club. The first shoot was held in September 1948. Dave Watson was President and Aub Johnston Secretary. At a later date the name of the club was changed to Australian Gun Club and it was for a number of years the venue of Australian National Championships, until they were rotated round other States as the sport developed on a wider national scale.

Two other clubs to survive the war years to become forerunners to clubs operating today were Camberwell Gun Club and Coburg Gun Club. Eventually suburban expansion caused both clubs to seek other sites. Coburg went out to Epping to become Metropolitan Clay Target Club, while Camberwell joined with Croydon at Lilydale to

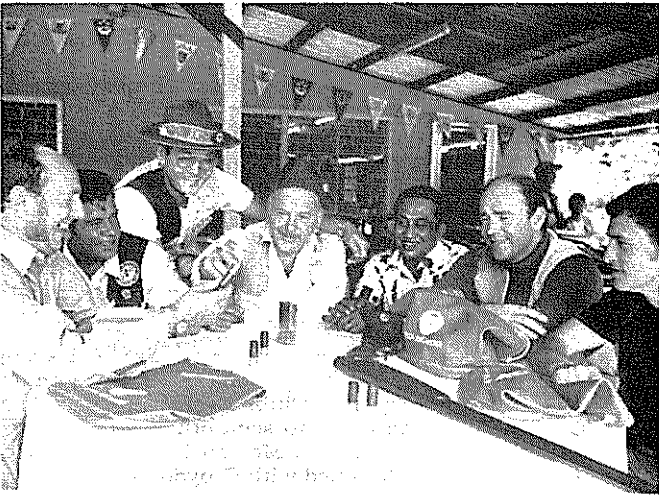
become Lilydale Clay Target Club and finally at a later date the name was changed to Melbourne Gun Club.

Bill Delaney Senior established the Camberwell Gun Club during the latter war years on land joining a creek on Bulleen Rd, North Balwyn. It was a one-trap ground as was Coburg simply because there was no room for more. The shot fall out was over a creek in both cases.

The original Melbourne Gun Club was based at Tottenham, a western suburb of Melbourne — it was the headquarters of live bird shooting in Victoria. In 1957 live bird shooting was banned in Victoria.

Although our early days of clay target shooting were centred in Melbourne in the early 1920s, it was not long after that other parts of Australia followed on. Queensland was quick to join in with Townsville in 1920, St George in 1937, and Cunnamulla in 1938. Townsville was, in fact, the first club to send a delegate to the newly formed National Association. Today Queensland has some fifty-odd active registered clubs.

Clay targets and cartridges continued to be a big problem for several years after the war. It was getting on to 1950 before I.C.I. were able to produce the Australian-made target and ammo. Prior to this clays came from England, and our shells, mostly Winchester and Remington, were U.S.A. Quite a few clubs of that time attempted to make their own clays in different ways. I know of two that gathered up the broken targets from in front of the trap and melted them down to form up again in their own version of a mould. Of course, when the broken targets were gathered, pieces of other things like leaves and twigs etc. were also included — result was a very well reinforced clay target — not too easily broken!

1950 PERIOD OF DEVELOPMENT

The 1950s saw a great leap forward for Clay Target Shooting in Australia — it was a decade of progress and development. Australia was recovering from the effects of World War 2. Equipment in the way of clay target traps and throwers, together with new types of guns and ammunition suitable for clay target shooting, was coming into the country more freely. Local targets and cartridges were being distributed throughout the country, and new clubs were able to set up without the hassles of being unable to obtain the equipment needed.

1955, 19th Annual Meeting of affiliated club delegates held on the Sunday of the National Championship series was the largest attended in the history of the Association.

The only wording that goes with it is a brief description as follows: "Lilydale Gun Club 1880s. Lilydale a change in pace. Education Department of Victoria 1982. Audio-Visual Resources Branch." From information I've been able to gather it would seem that the club was located on private property, east of the town along the Healesville road. My guess is that this club was one of many around Australia in the early days, before the turn of the century when live pigeon shooting was the only form of gun club competition. It was an extension of the English and European shotgun sports. A good number of our own older clubs had their beginning in this area. It was not until the early 1920s that Australian Gun Clubs began shooting clay targets. The Australian Clay Target Association was formed in 1936. A close look at the style of gun the shooters in the picture are using reveals that all are the early design of under lever action first used about 1860. This action was the forerunner of today's top lever opening action. The hammerless gun made its appearance in England just prior to 1880. Unfortunately time and space does not permit me to relate the story of the hammerless gun's development. Note the gentleman in the back row standing fourth from left — he's the only one smiling; perhaps he had a win this day!

Over sixty clubs were represented by appointed delegates, and there were also present a number of interested shooters as spectators.

One important decision reached was that the club affiliation fee from January 1, 1956 was fixed at £5 (\$10) instead of the figure of £1.10 (\$3.00) as at that present time. It was pointed out that the latter fee was more than 25 years ago, when money values were very different from those prevailing today. The meeting also decided to appoint one representative to the Executive Committee from each of the states of South Australia and Western Australia.

New Executive members were Mr J. Woodrow (SA) and Mr C. Fletcher (WA). Mr Roy Alexander of 256 Wellington St, Perth was appointed official Referee Examiner for the state of W.A. This will mean that the State representation will comprise: Queensland three members, New South Wales four members, Victoria four members, Tasmania two members, South Australia and Western Australia one member each. The meeting decided to rescind the motion, passed at the 1954 Annual Meeting, in regard to the formation of State Associations.

NEW EQUIPMENT FOR THE 1955 NATIONALS

An interesting innovation to be used for the first time during the National Series is the electric automatic releaser. The release is achieved merely by pressing a button held by the referee. The puller, of course, is retained for the purpose of recocking the trap. The electric release has now been in use at East Burwood for some time

and has proved very satisfactory. A uniform release is automatic. It is quick and reliable and should prove a boon at the big carnival over March 11th through to 15th.

THE YEAR 1956

Was our 20th Birthday and we celebrated the event in a number of ways. Possibly the staging of the Olympic Games Trench Shooting event was the outstanding effort. In this event we fielded a two-man team for the first time. All States took part in the eliminations to find the final two shooters, namely John Bryant and Clem Mudford of Victoria.

At this time, Australia-wide, there were approx. 280 Gun Clubs affiliated with the A.C.P.T.S.A. A list of Association handicaps for all registered shooters published in "News" — March 1956, shows there were in excess of 5000 registered shooters throughout Australia. There were also 151 registered Referees. (Not a bad effort really for the first 20 years considering that during this period we suffered the Great Depression of the 1930s and World War 2 of 1939-1945.)

1956 National Championships were held at Bankstown Aerodrome — the first occasion the series had been held outside Victoria — and was quite successful in every aspect, except for weather conditions. The shooting grounds, the normal rendezvous of the Royal Aero Club of N.S.W. (gun society), were in a somewhat unsettled state just prior to the start of shooting, chiefly because officials were unable to spend anything but brief periods in preparation for the big shoot, for one reason the inclement weather.

The night prior to the opening it poured rain and continued throughout the next day. It was decided to defer the opening event, the National Single Barrel Championship, for a period, hoping the weather would clear. The rain

continued; therefore, a late start was the result. However it did not prevent over 160 shooters from nominating. In the hazardous conditions some good shooting resulted. Victory went to Sid Lamb, Goulburn Gun Club secretary and N.S.W. Executive committee member, who came in with the only 50 straight.

The premier event of the program, the Champion of Champions cup, contested over 50 targets from 20 yards and resulted in several possibles. Clem Mudford, of Melbourne, finally came out the winner with 94-95. Joe Raleigh of Charleville, Queensland, shooting in great style, took out the National Double Barrel title for 1956. Joe had to contend with heavy rain that came down all day. 233 shooters lined up for the title which was shot under the points score system of 3 & 2. His score was 117-120 from W.N. Bullen, Vaucluse, N.S.W.

WE ENTER INTO INTERNATIONAL SHOOTING COMPETITION

The year was 1956. It was Australia's Olympic Games year in Melbourne. It was also Australia's first attempt at Olympic Clay Pigeon Shooting.

The Melbourne Olympic Games was a great boost to Australian Clay Target Shooting. We fielded a two-man team in International Trench shooting for the first time in our history. The event was staged at a specially prepared ground at Laverton Air Force Station over a three-day program.

Our Australian team of two shooters was selected after a simple process of elimination. Firstly, all States were requested to use their interstate teams match of 100 Targets as a qualifying round.

The Executive Committee agreed that a 200 Target elimination event would be staged and the two highest scores would be Australia's Olympic representatives. The event would be shot over two days. The nomination fee to take part in the elimination would be £5 (\$10). The earlier decision of the Executive Committee, that the ten High Guns in the 1956 interstate teams match from the States, Victoria and New South Wales, the top eight in Queensland, top four in Tasmania and the top two in South and Western Australia, a total of 38 shooters, would be eligible to shoot in the elimination for the games, was confirmed.

The games elimination shoot would take place at Laverton, over the new Olympic Trap ground.

A shoot to follow the Olympic Games was comprised of the Southern Hemisphere championship, also at 200 Targets, and the World's Grand Handicap.

The title event to be shot over automatic traps from 18 yards. The handicap event to be £500 (\$1000), nominations to be £10 (\$20) to be divided 60%, 30%, 10% and shot at 100 Targets over two days if necessary. The Friday and Saturday following the games shoot was the period allocated for the Southern Hemisphere championship and the Handicap. Trophies for the championship were a "K" Grade Browning for the winner, and a "D" Grade Browning U/O for second, third to receive an "A" Grade Browning.

Date for the elimination contest under Olympic conditions was set down for October 6 and 7. Practice was available on the ground over October 3 and 4, from 1.30 p.m. each day.

When the smoke cleared after the elimination trials, two Melbourne shooters emerged to become Australia's representatives for the 1956 Olympic Games. They were Clem Mudford and Jack Bryant with scores of 173 and 187. J. Harris of Cunderdin W.A. tied with Clem Mudford with 173 but was eliminated in a further 25 targets.

Fine but windy weather prevailed throughout the games shooting. 32 International shooters took part in the event that went over three days, 29th-30th November, 1956. G. Rossini of Italy went to the front from the beginning and stayed there right through, finishing with a score of 195-200. Second place went to A. Smeleczynski of Poland, score 190-200, followed by A. Ciceri, Italy with 188-200.

Australia's Jack Bryant finished 9th place with a score of 176-200 and Clem Mudford came in 20th place with a score of 164-200.

In all fairness to our Australian shooters it must be mentioned that up to three weeks before the games none of our shooters had the opportunity of shooting over Olympic Trench. Added to this handicap was the ruling by our Olympic Games Federation that stated people were employed in the firearms and ammunition trade — they must be considered as professionals and so were unable to compete. Because of this ruling those of us so engaged were not permitted to compete — it was a stupid rule really because no other country throughout the world was so restricted. It was because of this rule that Australia dropped out of I.S.U. shooting, only coming back in 1974 when a more realistic policy was instituted by Olympic Federation.

Many of our present-day shooters would not know the struggles and frustrations our administrators went through in the 1950s and 1960s when the Australian Clay Target Association was attempting to affiliate with the International Shooting Union, in order for us to compete in World Championships at Olympic Trench and Olympic Skeet. The struggle goes back to the Melbourne Olympic Games of 1956.

THIS IS A TRUE STORY

Quote from A.C.P.T.S. News February 1955.

Recently an Australian Club member shooting at East Burwood, scene of the forthcoming National championship series, was anxious to secure information of who "won the Holden motor car at Rainbow". He accordingly rang a Melbourne daily newspaper. The newspaper switchboard operator answered, and the enquirer said, "Have you any news of the shooting at Rainbow?" The switchboard operator replied, "Hold the line please, I'll switch you over". Another voice answered, "Hello, Russell Street police here — no there is no report of anybody being shot at Rainbow. I'll switch you back to the paper office."

The Games in Australia were seen by the Executive Committee as a great opportunity for Australian shooters to join the ranks of international competitors.

So we have applied to have Olympic Trap shooting included in the shooting sports program. The request was granted, but then the real problems began to show. Apart from the enormous amount of ground work and planning that went into preparing for an event that had never been attempted before in our country, we had to cope with the Australian Olympic Federation's conditions of amateur status for our shooters. Copious amounts of correspondence went back and forth to the International Shooting Union, who finally agreed to accept Australia's affiliation with the World International Shooting Union.

At this stage everything looked plain sailing, but unfortunately it was not to be. The Australian Olympic Federation's Chairman, Mr E. Tanner, ruled that, in his opinion, all Australian shooters were professional because we shot for big money trophies, such as motor cars etc. It mattered not that overseas countries also shot for big money prizes and were still within the amateur status. It was obvious to us that Mr Tanner was not going to budge, so in order that some of our shooters could shoot, the Executive Committee had to alter our constitution concerning rules of competition. It meant that big money trophies were out.

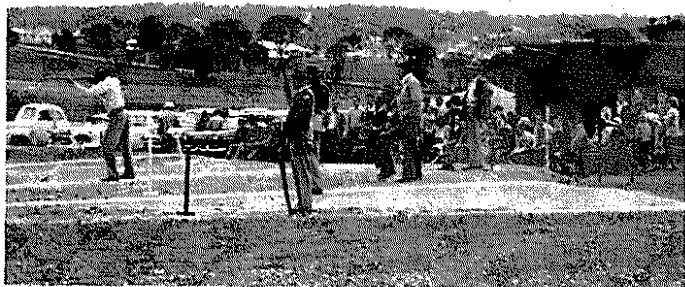
We did eventually field a two-man team in the 1956 Olympic Games. The two shooters were John Bryant and Clem Mudford, both of Melbourne.

One of the most ridiculous conditions of competition was that if a person was employed in the firearms and ammunition industry, they were ineligible for Olympic competition. This meant that several of our top shooters were not able to compete. When the games finished the A.C.T.A. had to come to a decision on whether to remain so-called "amateur" or revert back to our former conditions of shooting. A referendum conducted showed a 50% club response and a 3-1 against becoming an amateur body. This was not really unexpected as clubs throughout Australia could not see our shooters being able to conform to the Australian Olympic Federation's rules of eligibility.

The three most significant events of our first 50 years would have to be:

1. The 1956 Melbourne Olympic Games. This was Australia's first attempt at Olympic Clay Pigeon shooting. 32 International shooters took part in the event that ran over three days. We gained a lot of experience on this occasion.

2. 1973 World Moving Target Championships. 26 countries competed at the Melbourne Gun Club, November 12-22, at both Olympic Trench and Olympic Skeet.

Trench gold went to Russia, silver to U.S.A. and Australia shared equal bronze. The championships were looked on by the visitors as a welcome opportunity to win new friends for the sport of shooting in this part of the world. The occasion indeed signalled Australia's entry into the world of International Shooting competition. I believe that it is only when a sport becomes international it can become high-level competition. However it does bring with it a greater responsibility for our administrators.

3. Brisbane Commonwealth Games 1982 saw both our Trench and Skeet teams perform to standards that had not been reached before.

It was becoming apparent that we now have a greater depth of talent in our I.S.U. shooting disciplines.

As at December 1985 there were over 300 affiliated clubs in Australia with a total of 8929 registered A.C.T.A. shooters.

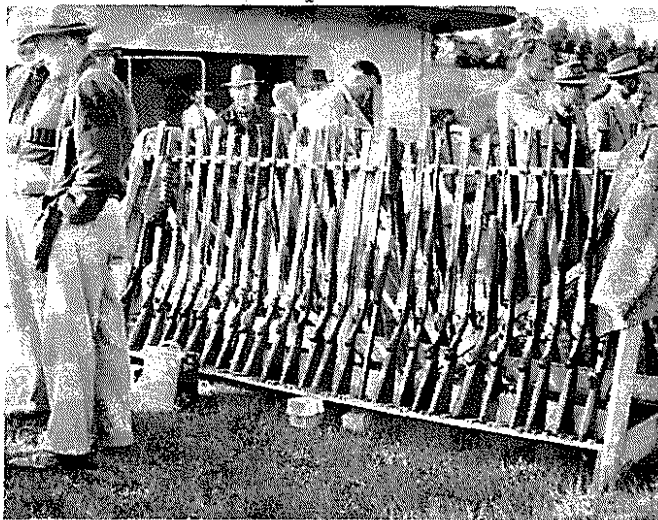

years. Later joined Croydon Gun Club which was formed in 1951. However, land subdivision in 1968 caused the Croydon Club to join in with Lilydale Club. The amalgamation created a club inherently stronger and able to develop rapidly. The new name of Melbourne Gun Club was adopted in 1969.

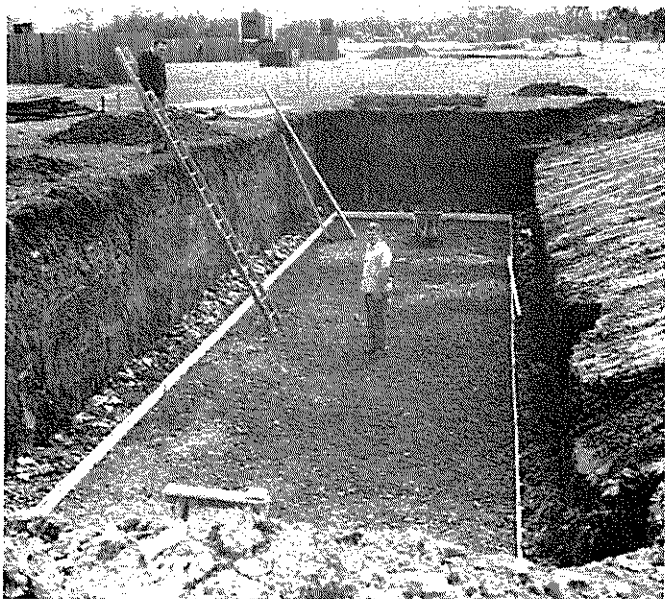

FROM THE DESK OF THE NATIONAL COACHING DIRECTOR



The South Pacific Regional Championships and the Australian National Championships have just finished in Brisbane and proved to be a great success, the Australian trap team winning both the international competition and the South Pacific regional competition. The United States won the skeet international competition and the New Zealand team the South Pacific Regional Skeet Championships.

In individual events Terry Rumbel of Australia won the gold medal for the international event in trap and the gold medal for the trap event in the South Pacific regional competition. John Wooley of New Zealand won the gold medal for the international event in skeet and Ian Hale of Australia won the gold medal for the South Pacific skeet event.

Al Mullins of America won the skeet over the 400 targets and Terry Rumbel of Australia won the trap over 400 targets. Terry Rumbel also broke the Australian and South Pacific records with a 199/200. A magnificent effort. John Maxwell shot 193 to take the silver medal in the nationals. The Australian record has been broken three times in the last two years, first by John Maxwell, then Jim Ellis, Domingo Diaz again equalling this and now Terry Rumbel breaking it again. I believe that this gives some indication of the rise in standard in the Olympic Disciplines in recent years.

I expect that these scores are duplicating some already printed, but I do so with a purpose, since I have been national coach I have seen our shooters win second place in the world championships, shoot off for gold in the world championships, our team win a bronze medal at the world championships, our shooters win gold, silver and bronze medals at the Commonwealth Games, Australian shooters win Asian championships, the New Zealand championships, and twice win the team events and many medals at the South Pacific Regional Championships, and of the four shooters to represent us at the Olympics three of them won official placings.

All of the above being so I am continually amazed and annoyed by people in our sport, often people in positions of authority, supposedly there to assist the shooters, who knock and criticize our team members, I hear comments, and so do our shooters, such as "you wait, so and so from this country or that country will beat our shooters" or "what are we sending those people for, they never do any good". These statements are not only not true, they are most damaging to morale under our system or first past the post, not only is justice being done it is seen to be done, it is a fair system for all.

We have some of the best shooters in the world, who should be heroes within their own sport, I know what they give up to compete for their country and their sport, most of us just don't have that sort of dedication. I have always been proud of our shooters, sometimes they are not in the winner's lists, but they have at all times represented the Clay Target Association and their country to the best of their ability at that time. Our champions need the encouragement and moral support of their own people to defeat the opposition, they don't need the handicap of negative opinion and criticism. Other countries honour their shooting champions, let us do the same.

The juniors once again put in excellent performances in Brisbane. The junior skeet team in particular are to be congratulated on their excellent shooting. The teams for the Commonwealth Games are Terry Rumbel and Domingo Diaz trap, and Ian Hale and Alec Crikis skeet, for the world championships they are joined by Russell Mark trap, and Craig Meuleman skeet, the addition of these two young talented shooters to our team is great.

All I.S.U. shooters develop their own style, but it is obvious the influence. That those two greats Danny Carlile and Matt Dryke have had on the U.S. shooters, style of shooting. Danny Carlile was a great skeet shooter who won the 1982 world skeet championships before he started trap shooting and brought with him from skeet the slight squat that we now see in many of the U.S. trap shooters. Matt Dryke squats even lower to the ground when he shoots skeet, this technique is now used by the U.S. Army team. Other countries don't adopt this extreme squatting position. I believe it is successful if you are young and fit and able to maintain the squat at the same level during the whole process of shooting and follow through, movement of the body up or down spells disaster.

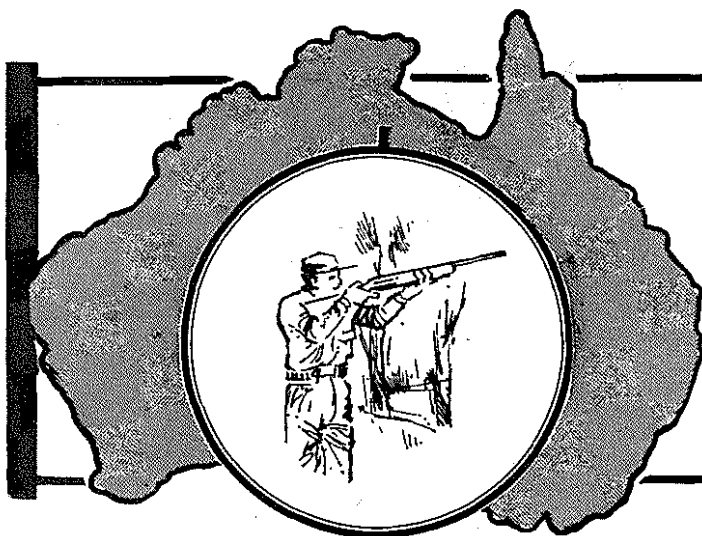
Terry Rumbel's technique is good in that it is a simple technique and suits Terry, the simplicity of his actions eliminates errors to a great extent, a completely contrasting technique of trap shooting is used by former world and Commonwealth Games champion John Primrose of Canada, who was also in Brisbane, John's technique requires enormous concentration, waiting approximately 10 seconds after mounting his gun before calling pull for the target, he has mastered this and with 2 world championships and 2 Commonwealth Games under his belt, who could argue with him.

I am looking forward to working with the international teams and the new national squad this year, new faces include Bobby Dower from South Australia, Filippo Petriella from Canberra, and Keld Madsen from Queensland, as well as those already mentioned.

Before I close I would like to praise all those people who put in hours of volunteer labour to make the South Pacific Regional and National Championships such a success. It was great to see so many overseas competitors in Brisbane, not only is it good for us and our shooters, but it is also a compliment that our shooters are seen as being of a sufficiently high standard to provide good competition for the visitors.

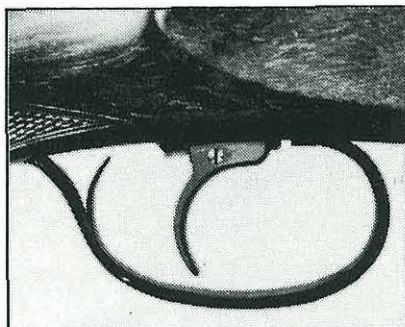

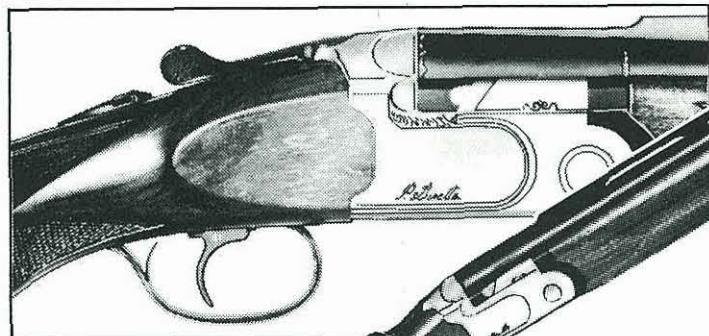
