






PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I have been in clay target shooting for just on 30 years. During this time I have watched our sport grow and prosper. Last month at the O.D. Nationals, held in Perth, which I was unable to attend, I believe some shooters would not participate in the opening ceremony. This is the worst incident I have ever heard about in all my years of shooting.

I would like to explain to you, the bread and butter shooter, the genuine shooter who keeps the ACTA going,

just what happened and let you be the judge.

Briefly as I understand it, this is what happened. Sometime ago a few hard working people did a lot of work and were successful in obtaining the World Championships for Australia, to be held in Perth in 1991. They set about trying to raise funds to fund this major tournament. They were successful with their application to the Federal Government, and even more so with the W.A. Government. To put it mildly both Governments were extremely generous.

The stage is now set for a very successful World Championships which I am confident it will be. All this took a lot of time and effort by a very few people. The benefits to the ACTA will be enormous, particularly to the ISU shooters,

both trench and skeet.

Getting back to the O.D. Nationals — Tuesday February 13, a black day for clay target shooting. The opening ceremony consisted of the usual dignitaries, including W.A. Minister for Sport, Mr Graham Edwards, who opened the championships. During the opening he handed over a cheque to the Organising Committee for \$30,000 as part payment of the W.A. Government commitment to the World Championships. Some of the top ISU shooters, from Victoria and NSW boycotted this opening which had nothing to do with any other aspect of the National Championships.

The point I am trying to make is that these shooters had the chance to participate in the opening ceremony and say thank you to the Government for their help. After all, without Government help we would not be conducting the World Championships next year. In my opinion it is not unreasonable to expect shooters to attend opening ceremonies which form a traditional part of our National Championships as they are the ones who ultimately benefit most. However when shooters who were members of the Official State Teams refused to participate in the opening ceremony they insulted the Government, slapped the ACTA on the face, turned their back on the Organising Committee, certainly insulted the West Australian Clay Target Association who were hosting the Championships supported by their voluntary workers and not least of all let themselves down badly. Words cannot describe my anger and disappointment of the action of these very few inconsiderate, ungrateful shooters. I challenge anyone of these rebel band of shooters to write to the CTSN and explain, if they can, why they took this unforgivable action which will long be remembered in Clay Target Shooting.

1989 PRESIDENTIAL REPORT TO THE A.G.M.



At the end of my second year as your President it is pleasing for me to report to Members that the ACTA has finished the year on a Solid Financial Basis which taking all things into consideration is a very satisfactory result.

I find it disappointing that we were unable to hold a larger proportion of our members from last year. A large membership is crucial if the ACTA is to survive in the years to come. I would remind all shooters, whichever State they live in and whatever gun laws may be applicable to that State, gun legislation will always be there, it is always on the Government's mind. If anyone has any information about new gun laws, I ask you please pass it on to your National Executive or to the Head Office in Mount Waverley.

Your Executive is mindful of rising costs that affect the shooter, and is doing all it can to keep costs to a minimum. The rise in affiliation fees this year was well below CPI, and I am sure this can be maintained in the years to come.

During the year your Executive finally were able to purchase our very own premises. As luck or good management would have it, it happened to be the office we were renting at Mount Waverley. A lot of hard work and effort was put into the purchase of this building by a few people and I thank them sincerely on behalf of everyone for their good work. For those who have not seen the building, it is not lavish but, with some slight alterations to the inside partitions, it will be quite suitable to our needs now and in the future.

The three national championships held during the year at Melbourne (ISU), Echuca (DTL) and Wagga (Skeet) were successful, although numbers were disappointing. To the State Associations, Clubs and all those who helped organise these championships, thank you for a job well done.

During the year our National Coaching Director, Peter Quire, resigned his position. Colin Burt was appointed on a probationary basis until the 31st December, 1989. However, the Management Committee, at its November meeting, did not confirm Colin's appointment. New applications for this position will be called for early in 1990. In the meantime Colin has agreed to remain in office to help out with the coaching. Credit must be given to both these men for the way coaching has progressed throughout Australia.

Your executive had a number of changes during the year with Jack Matthey (Vic), Tim Catling (WA) and Brian Growden (SA) departing from the National Scene. Tim and Brian have been replaced by John Fissioli (WA) and George Steele (SA) who both attended their first National Meeting in May. Glenn Woodhatch (Vic) replacing Jack is yet to attend his first meeting. We thank Tim, Brian & Jack for their contribution at National level and welcome John, George and Glenn to the Executive.

You will be pleased to hear that changes to our constitution are being looked into with the intention to present them to the 1990 AGM. When the final draft is to hand, all State Presidents will be forwarded a copy for their comments.

The arrangements for the World Championships to be held in Perth during 1991 are progressing well thanks to a very hard working committee. The Government funded Alan Maher's trip to the last championships in Italy so he could get a first hand look and I am confident we can now run a very successful championship in Perth. The Government has still not been forthcoming with funds to help with the training and travel for the women's ISU team to these championships. Nevertheless we are still applying for funds, so keep up the training girls.

It was suggested we run a 'spot the target' competition in the CTSN each month but legal problems have put a stop to this suggestion. If any shooter or Club is interested in a small classified advertisement page in the CTSN we would be pleased to hear from you. To make it worthwhile we would require enough advertisement to fill a page, more about this during the coming year.

Your Executive has asked the Rules Sub-Committee to rethink the whole handicap rules. It is hoped they can come up with a formula suitable to the shooters so we can get back to shooting handicap events which was, and should be, an important part of clay target shooting. If you have any ideas please let the Rules Committee know of them preferably through the National Office.

After a lot of thought and paper work I look forward to the introduction of a Mackintosh type of team shoot for the skeet shooters and this should prove very popular at the Skeet Nationals.

At the time of writing this, news has just come through of the death of our Patron, Sir Henry Bolte G.C.M.C. On behalf of all shooters, I extend our deepest sympathy to all his family.

To the small band of supporters and sponsors of the AC-TA I say thank you very much for the support and help you have given to clay target shooting throughout the year. It is very much appreciated.

Thank you to the Executive and Sub-Committees for your time, effort and support throughout the year to help advance shooting in Australia. It has been a privilege to work with you as your President.

The Management Committee; Ross Silvester, Neil Hardy and Pud Burgess have met on a number of occasions and many recommendations were made, some of which were not easy. I thank them for the time they have put into our sport – especially my Vice President, Ross Silvester, who was always there when needed.

There have been a number of criticisms during this past year aimed at the Executive. This does not worry me if the criticism is fair and valid. However, in most instances this was not the case. The people making the criticisms did not know all the facts, or even try to find out both sides of the story. This is not good for the Association. If you have any criticism by all means bring it to the attention of your Executive. But do it correctly and by that I mean find out ALL the facts, go through the structure that is already there to handle such matters, by doing it through your Club, Zone and State Associations, this way your criticisms will be heard where it will do the most good. This is better than behind the boot of a car or over the bar.

To the people who keep the ACTA moving and who we sometimes take for granted and give very little credit to, the engine room if you like; Alan Maher, Leanne, Sandra and Tina – a big thank you for a job well done,

Lastly, but a very important point, it is now mandatory that all traps in Australia are fitted with arm guards. I appeal to all ACTA, State and Zone Executives to inspect Clubs to make sure this has been done. The safety of people is in your hands.

ANNUAL REPORT 1989

It is my pleasure to be able to present to Members, the 1989 Annual Report and Balance Sheet of the Association. In presenting this report, the traditional format of reporting to members has been adhered to.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Members of the National Executive Committee showed their support to NSW Executive Member, Jim Scott from Dubbo who was elected unopposed for his second term as National President. The President followed the pattern set by himself in 1988 by working tirelessly on behalf of all members. His dedication to the position to which he was elected has enabled the Association to build strongly on the firm foundation which he had inherited.

To support the President, Ross Silvester from Western Australia was elected as National Vice President and with the knowledge and experience gained at State level Ross proved himself to be a most able and capable Vice President who was quickly to the fore when his experience was required and always prepared to listen to the other side of the debate.

A more stable Committee than in previous years with only three persons vacating their positions. From Western Australia Tim Catling after 5 years on the National Executive Committee resigned his position and was replaced by WA State President John Fissioli who quickly settled in to his new role. A wealth of experience has been lost in recent years from the National Executive Committee. Fortunately in this case it has not been altogether lost for as a member of the National Referees Association and the Organising Committee of the 1991 World Championships Tim has retained a more than active interest in the sport.

Brian Growden from South Australia also departed from the Executive Committee during 1989. Brian who first joined the Executive in 1982 was a tireless worker for the sport and his years of experience will be missed. Replacing Brian as a member of the Executive is George Steele from Mt Gambier who is well known particularly in Victoria and South Australia.

Jack Matthey from Victoria first elected to the Executive in 1986 resigned his position late in the year and was replaced by V.C.T.A. President Glenn Woodhatch who is yet to attend a meeting of the Executive. The three new members elected during 1989 will no doubt make their mark in the sport as was the case with those men which they replaced, whom we thank for the time given and interest shown to the sport.

As in 1988, the National Executive Committee did only meet on the one occasion during the year, this practice has been brought about by the cost involved in bringing the Committee together at a central venue. While only meeting on the one occasion this did not mean their duties were neglected for in this age of technology, it is possible to be kept informed and make decisions much more easily than in the past. All Sub-Committees met during the year with no doubt the input given being beneficial to the Association. Reading from previous Annual Reports the same message is still very much the case "it is hoped that the decisions made during the year are accepted in the manner in which they were determined, that being in the overall best interests of the association as a whole and its participants in particular."

On behalf of all Member Clubs and Registered Shooters I take this opportunity to thank the Executive for a job well done and welcome to the Executive those Members who appointed in 1989 are anxious to play their part in ensuing years, they are John Fissioli, WA, and George Steele, SA.

MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The four man Management Committee elected by the executive to be responsible for the conduct of the association between meetings were again an active Committee. As members of the Premises Committee, they along with the Co-opted Member from Victoria Jack Matthey were responsible for the selection of a property suitable for purchase by the Executive to suit the needs of the Association as a National Sporting Association.

Always acting in a responsible manner with due care and attention to their trusted roles, this Committe worked tirelessly throughout the year and are to be commended for the responsible manner in which they attended to their duties.

As was the case in 1988, the Executive as a whole show ed their confidence in those they had elected and continued their encouragement for Management to assume responsibilities in keeping to the positions to which they had been entrusted. This confidence and encouragement was not misplaced and the Association will continue to benefit from this form of Executive direction.

NATIONAL SHOOTING COMMITTEE

Comprised of five voting members plus the National Coaching Director, this Committee under Chairman Robert Smith attended to its responsibilities in a capable manner. Elected from the General Membership as Shooters respresentatives for particular disciplines were, Trap Peter Hayman NSW, Skeet Robert Dower S.A., I.S.U. David Menck NSW. In addition two Members of the Executive are elected to this Committee and accepting this challenging role were Robert Smith and John Fissioli WA.

It is hoped that those elected as Shooters Representatives are kept busier throughout the coming year than was the case in 1989. These people have been elected as Shooters representatives, please ensure they are given the opportunity to work accordingly.

PROMOTION COMMITTEE

Always a difficult Committee so far as obtaining results are concerned. But nevertheless an important Committee so far as the Association is concerned. During the year successful negotiations took place with both Olin Australia-Winchester Division through National Marketing Manager Bruce Burns and Olimpyc Targets and Sergio Zuffo. We are more than aware of the importance of the role that Sponsorship Plays in this Sport and trust that our members return this support wherever possible.

With sponsorship arrangements ceasing at the completion of the 1990 National Trap Championships, the Role of this Committee in 1990 assumes great significance, a challenge which no doubt will be taken up.

AUSTRALIAN SHOOTING ASSOCIATION

Not quite a busy year so far as ACTA involvement was concerned, however this does not mean the ASA was not active. The A.S.A. is the only recognised body in Australia so far as International competition is concerned in the Olympic and Commonwealth Games and the International shooting Union. Shotgun representatives to the ASA for 1989 were Alan Maher, Vice President/Management Committee and Peter Quire Council Member and Member of the International Competitions Committee. Both of whom while working for the Shotgun discipline in particular were aware of their responsibilities to Australian Shooting as a whole.

NATIONAL COACHING COUNCIL

With the assistance of State Coaching Directors on the National Coaching Council, Coaching in Australia continues to improve as did the numbers seeking and gaining coaching accreditation.

With the assistance of the Australian Sports Commission a State Coaches Seminar was successfully conducted in Adelaide. The benefits of these seminars is becoming more evident each year as those involved continue in their endeavours to lift Coaching Standards in all areas and all disciplines. With the roles of the National Coaching Direc-

tor becoming more involved than before with administration, for the Coaching Council the years ahead will be most important ones.

AUSTRALIAN SPORTS COMMISSION

The assistance given all Sports by the Australian Sports Commission is vital to our continued success at International level with Assistance received over a wide and varied area including the availability to attend live in Cairns at the Australian Institute of Sport. We must never underestimate the values that are achieved by Shotgun being recognised in such a manner as is now the case. The ASC is assisting to develop our skills and image in the Shooting World where Australia has reached a much respected position with greater experiences yet to be achieved.

NATIONAL COACHING DIRECTOR

Under the guidance of National Coaching Director Peter Quire the National Coaching Council attended to the development of Coaching at State Level. During the year a State Coaching Directors Seminar which was scheduled for early 1989 was deferred owing to the sudden decision taken by Peter Quire to relinquish his position and return to the work force. As the position is funded to the association by the Australian Sports Commission as a full time position Peter did decide that a return to the work force as a self employed person was in his best interests. We wish him well for whatever the future holds in store for him and while he is no longer associated with the Sport as an employer his experience has not entirely been lost as he is continuing his role on behalf of the ACTA as a member of the Organising Committee for the 1989 World Shotgun Championships.

With Peter's resignation applications to fill the position were called for and NSW State Coaching Director Colin Burt was appointed on the first of July with the permanency of the full time appointment to be confirmed as at the first of January 1990, for reasons that have been published in the CTSN the permanency of the full time position was not established. The position of National Coaching Director is to be reviewed with applications for the position called for in due course. Colin has indicated he will be returning to Building and we wish him well in this regard and thank him for his efforts on behalf of the Sport during his period of employment.

AUSTRALIAN OLYMPIC FEDERATION

Not being an Olympic Year, 1989 was not as active so far as Shooting involvement overall was concerned however the Australian Shooting Association through delegates to the AOF, Richard Willis and Alan Maher continued to press for greater recognition of the Shooting Sports as a whole. With the need to consolidate the Sports standing in the eyes of the AOF, the Australian Shooting Association has presented to the AOF a selection of criteria which once accepted will assist in eliminating some of the past dramas of selection in Olympic years.

COMMONWEALTH GAMES FEDERATION

In preparation for the 1990 Commonwealth Games in Auckland, New Zealand the A.C.G.A. assisted the Shooting Sports during 1989 with funds for Commonwealth Games training. It is expected that shooting will produce many medals for Australia in 1990 and if this proves to be the case then the assistance given by the ACGA will be well and truly vindicated.

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS 1991

Planning is well under way particularly in W.A. where the Organising Committees under the Chairmanship of past President Roy Holtfreter is attending to their responsibility in a capable manner. As part of the planning for 1991 the Australian Sports Commission funded a study tour by the secretary of the Organising Committee, Executive Director Alan Maher, of the 1989 World Championships. Our appreciation is extended to the ASC for the opportunity which will as planning continues for 1991, be of assistance in our staging of the 1991 World Shotgun Championships at the Whiteman Park Shooting Complex in Western Australia which promises to be an exciting time for the Sport.

STATE ASSOCIATIONS

The support given the National Office by State Associations continued throughout the year with great cooperation received from all State Secretaries. During the year the decision was taken to increase the States per capita payments and this no doubt will assist each association in their administration of the Sport at State level.

MEMBERSHIP

Shooter Registrations in 1989 were down in number from the artificially inflated numbers of 1988. The was taken into account in the years budget and while there was an overall reduction in membership of 1744 Shooters a total of 1255 Shooters Registered with the Association for

Historically there is around a 20% drop in registrations from the previous years with around the same percentage being registered for the first time. The reasons for the drop in registrations each year is an obscure one with no one really able to establish the reasons behind this year's trend.

OLYMPIC DISCIPLINES (I.S.S.) conducted by the VCTA at the Melbourne Gun Club the O.D Nationals although not attracting the largest number of competitors was nevertheless chock full of interest and excitement over the six days of competition producing the members of the National Training Squad from where by the process of elimination our International Teams are derived from.

As always the Melbourne Club Grounds were turned out in an exemplary fashion and for this the association is truly appreciative as it is for the assitance given by the State Association in conducing these important Championships.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank President Jim Scott for his support during the year and also the Members of the Management Committee and National Executive Committee all of whom are assured that in the coming year, the National Office will continue in its efforts to provide Shooters with the services that are required at all levels of the Sport.

Giving Something Back to the Shooters — Echuca Gun Club.

Since 1986 the National Carnival has been held twice in Echuca, the first time being 1986 and to host the championships it was necessary for the Echuca Gun Club to do extensive improvements to make the event completely successful, for example it was necessary to install six new D.T.L. layouts, purchase additional white flyer traps, build a new toilet block with showers in both ladies and gents, provide for additional water supply and electrical installations.

The expense incurred not only drained the financial reserves of the club, but it was necessary to borrow money from the bank. Total cost to the club to stage the Nationals was just in excess of \$25,000 and the return the club received did not cover the expenses incurred, as a result the club was in debt for some time.

In 1989 the National Carnival was again held in Echuca and as all the facilities were in place expenses to the club were at a minimum, the result being a good profit obtained.

This profit has now been invested and the Committee of the Echuca Gun Club has decided to use the interest from this investment to help the shooter by way of reduced nominations at all our regular monthly shoots.

Before deciding this course the committee did consider providing better trophies, however as only a few shooters would benefit from this course, it was decided to reduce nominations so that all shooters attending our club would benefit.

Trophies provided by the club will still be of the same high value and sashes will still be provided for overall and two grades as well as trophies for 1st & 2nd in each grade.

The cost of nominations will be advertised in the C.T.S.N. each month.

In conclusion the committee feels that in these days of continually rising costs that this is the right way to go to help our sport.

COACHING IN OUR NORTH WEST ZONE

OPEN SKEET — TAMWORTH

The third weekend in February for skeet shooters far and wide means a trip to Tamworth for their Open shoot. So popular has the event become, that the fourth layout that was temporarily installed for the State Carnival in 1988, looks as if it will need to be made permanent to accommodate everyone.

This year in fine and very hot conditions 71 shooters went through on Saturday and 72 on Sunday — not bad when you consider the State Carnival in Tamworth in 1988 attracted 90 on the last day.

The attraction could be the reasonable nominations, or maybe the excellent range of trophies managed by great sponsorship, or it could just be the atmosphere and surrounds. Who knows. The one thing is that Tamworth is on another winner and the shooters just keep coming back

and bringing their mates.

The first event was the 50 target Loomberah Valley Championship and it was sponsored by Dufre Products and Abrasives. From the 71 shooters five possibles were recorded. The overall winner after the shoot off was the current Commonwealth Champion and National High Gun winner, Dave Dundon from Brisbane with 68-68, Neal Dimmick took first in "AA" with 60-61, from fellow Brisbane shooter, Nick Aird on 58-59. Tony Long from Ipswich was the winner in "A" Grade with 67-68 from local Ray Melville. Rod Prior also of Tamworth was the winner in "B" Grade with 54-55 from Peter Nash on 53-55. A young man who wasn't in "C" Grade when he finished on Sunday, Alberto Muoio from Wakehurst won "C" Grade with a very classy 48-50 with Allan Whyte from Tamworth finishing second in "C" with 60-64. Robyn Faber from Narrabri carried the flag for the ladies and with a good score of 43-50 is well on the way to a grade change soon. Young Justin Enrenreich, who will be remembered from the Nationals has got himself into "A" Grade since November and went home with the Junior trophy. The Veterans winner made the long trip from Melbourne, Henry Weitzel.

The highly popular 50 target trophy handicap was the next event and everyone was well prepared for the long shoot off — which proved to be very entertaining and showed some fine shooting. The overall winner was Tamworth's Rod Prior with 124-124 with handicap, second went to Albert Muoio from Wakehurst, third was another Wakehurst member, John Cobley and fourth place went to Barry Wilkins, also from Tamworth.

Sunday morning was clear and fresh following overnight rain — and had the makings of a very hot and steamy day.

The first event was the 50 target Summertime Skeet Championship which was sponsored by Ryobi Power Tools and six possibles were recorded.

The overall winner was local shooter and current NSW State Champion, Geoff Walters with a fine 168-168, from Doug Siggs of Brisbane on 167-168. Michael Blenman from Guyra was second in "AA" with 106-107. Bathurst member, Les Aberley was the winner in "A" Grade with 72-73, from Max Barton on 71-78. Another Wakehurst member, Tom Falvo won "B" Grade with 53-54 from that "gentleman" of the skeet layout, Cecil Herbert on 52-54. Alberto Muoio continued his march towards "A" Grade with an excellent 50-50 to take out the "C" Grade division from local Neville Whitten on 54-58. Robyn Faber recorded a 41-50 to win the Ladies and Justin Enrenreich took out the Juniors. Wakehurst veteran, Alf Najar was the winner in the Vets with 53-55.

The weekend events concluded with the 50 target Tamworth & District Skeet Championship which was sponsored by Toolmac and only two possibles were recorded.

The overall winner being Neal Dimmick from Brisbane with 58-58, from Henry Weitzel of Metro with 57-58,

second in "AA" went to Michael Blenman from Guyra with 55-56. "A" Grade was won by Max Barton with 85-86 from Newcastle's Bob Boggiss and Peter Nash of Tamworth was successful in "B" Grade with 49-50 from Tom Falvo on 58-60. Local "dedicated" skeet shooter, Rex Whitten won "C" Grade with 47-50 from Barry Wilkins on 53-58. Robyn Faber and Justin Enrenreich won the Ladies and Junior trophies respectively and the Veterans winner was Ray Melville with 49-59.

During the weekend various team events were also contested, with the Ray Melville Shield on the first 50 targets on Saturday and the winning combination with the outstanding score of 247-250 was the Brisbane combination of Doug Siggs, Neal Dimmick, Dave Dundon, Nick Aird and Ray Porter. The second 50 target of Saturday was for the Max Weston Trophy and the Brisbane "boys" again had a winner with 244-250.

The 100 targets on Sunday was for competition between Tamworth and Newcastle for the Chris Hughes/Linatex Trophy and the Tamworth No. 1 team of Rod Prior, Geoff Walters, Ray Melville, Col Barton and Kevin Weatherall were the winners with 465-500.

Also on Sunday was competition for the Col Burt/Vic Raszewski Trophy for competition between Tamworth and Guyra. Last year Guyra only had two shooters in attendance, so feeling very sorry Tamworth allowed them to make up their team — and you guessed it, they won. This year — they had three in attendance and somehow managed to ring in Neal Dimmick and Ray Porter — and yes they won with 479-500. Next year, honorary membership will be required by those making up the Guyra team, even though Mike Blenman has publicly announced that the trophy will be "bolted" to the shelf in Guyra!

The two-man combination of Doug Siggs and Dave Dundon totalled a score of 393-400 — and what a score it was — to take home a little cash.

High Gun awards were the last ones presented and the winner of the overall high gun, who took home a \$1000 tool cabinet and tools was Neal Dimmick with 198-200 (same score as last year's winner). Neal shot 99-100 each day—that's really great shooting. "AA" Grade high gun was Dave Dundon with 197-200, "A" Grade Ray Melville 195-200, "B" Grade Rod Prior 191-200, "C" Grade Alberto Muoio with 195-200, Ladies Robyn Faber 166-200, Junior Justin Enrenreich on 178-200 and Veterans Henry Weitzel 190-200.

So, it's over for another year and the Skeet shoot organising committee can feel very pleased with the result — a well organised, well run shoot with excellent support from the ladies in the kitchen, the bar staff, trappers, ground keepers and last but not least the 70-plus shooters who travelled to Tamworth to make it the success it was.

1991 will be the 16th-17th February, so if you haven't been to Tamworth before and are looking to have a great weekend's skeet shooting — why not come and join the

OLYMPIC DISCIPLINE NATIONALS

The 1990 National Olympic Discipline Championships were conducted by the WACTA at the Whiteman Park Shooting Complex which, as is always the case, was in a magnificent condition. Improvements to the ISU grounds had taken place since 1987 when the titles were last conducted in Western Australia which certainly added to the quality of the Trench Grounds, a fact which was noticeably appreciated by all competitors.

Leaving as they say, no stone unturned in their efforts to present the National Championships in the best manner possible, Western Australia through State President, John Fissioli and WAGC President Terry Morony had obtained the services of WA Minister for Sport and Recreation, Mr Graham Edwards to open the all important 1990 Championships.

State Teams assembled under their respective State flags for the traditional opening ceremony, having marched to their positions on the ground to the accompaniment of a Scottish piper. Accompanying the State Teams were two teams from overseas, one a team from America comprising three members who having been to Australia on previous occasions and having obviously enjoyed their visit had returned for another crack at the Australians. The second team was comprised of members from the Taiwan sister club of the WAGC who were most welcome. Both teams marched under their country flag and were obviously proud to do so.


A nice approach by WACTA was the presentation of commemorative WA plaques to each State Association. Presentations were made by the Minister who in turn received a plaque as a memento of his participation in the 1990 Olympic Discipline National Championships.

The one and only disappointing aspect of the opening ceremony was the failure of any members of the Victorian team or the NSW Trap team to take their place under their State flags despite being on the grounds during the opening ceremony as a form of protest against the teams event being conducted as a shoulder to shoulder match as is the case for Trap and Skeet shooters at the National Championships. It appears as though a group from within the competitors ranks wish to have the event recorded on the first 150T of the Nationals as against being shot as a shoulder to shoulder competition. While shot in conjunction may be the case at ISU competitions, these were the

ACTA National Championships which included grade medals which form no part of ISU shooting. And as such being a combination of ISU and ACTA Rules the Shoulder to Shoulder State Teams Match did not in any way compromise the ACTA National Championships.

The shoulder to shoulder match was introduced as the result of the request which emanated from at least one of the State Associations to make the State Teams match a meaningful competition in the same manner as the Trap and Skeet Championships. Whether or not the shoulder to shoulder match as against having the first 150T recorded as the State's result is the correct or best manner in which to conduct the match is not the issue, the simple fact is that some shooters from Victoria and NSW with their actions on the ground effectively boycotting the event appear to have taken the attitude that the sport at ISU level is for the benefit of the few as against being for the benefit of all. The procedures for change are in existence, however they have not been utilised and as a result the sport of shooting clay targets has suffered on the whole as the direct result of the actions of a few who by these actions have done very little to enhance their cause. Changes can be made, however the proper procedures must be followed to arrive at democratic decisions that are best for all and not just the best for some, and when the decisions are taken, shouldn't we accept the umpire's decision and get on with the game.

During the opening ceremony the WA Minister for Sport and Recreation, Mr Graham Edwards handed to the President of the WACTA, Terry Morony a cheque for \$30,000 as the first payment of a \$100,000 contribution by the WA Government to assist in the staging of the World Championships in 1991. In presenting the cheque, the Minister spoke on the need for sportsmanship to be shown at all times which was an obvious reference to those who chose not to participate in the opening ceremony.

Shooting on day one was conducted under excellent conditions with the numbers participating around what had been expected. The Commonwealth ISU Skeet Championship had a field of 25 with the one noticeable absentee being Commonwealth and Olympic Games team member Ian Hale who for personal reasons was unable to make the journey to Western Australia, a decision which would not have been an easy one for him as it eliminates him from all

contention for the 1990 World Shooting Championship in Moscow. The small field was anxious to do well however despite the excellent conditions good scores were hard to obtain

Victorian John Summers recorded the one and only clean round of 25 and at the end of the day led the field with 73-75 which was three targets ahead of 1989 World Shotgun Championships team member Michael Inguanti. Slotted in behind John and one ahead of Michael was another Victorian Paul Ryland whose score of 71-76 gave him outright second place. Paul having just turned 21 was competing for the first time in open company and was certainly acquitting himself with distinction. Well known Victorian shooter Mark Little had also made the trip to WA and proving his versatility in the sport shot a well compiled 69-75 in an attempt to regain a position on the international scene where he competed with distinction in years gone by.

The Olympic Trap event for the Commonwealth title produced some better scores from the 11 squads that competed. On the opening day a total of four 25s were shot, W. Iles, J. Ellis, R. Mark, J. Elliot-Forster. Commonwealth Games team members Russell Mark and Gold Medallist John Maxwell were having mixed results with Russell shooting an excellent 73-75 as against what could only be described as a disappointing 68-75 from John. A long way still to go however, particularly for those who lost a little ground on tht opening day.

Day two, and the conditions were a little different with some wind and occasional rain making the targets just that little more difficul to break. John Summers in the Skeet event, although not scoring as well as on the first day, still led the field at the end of the 150T. Brian Thomson adding to his first round 69 was in second place two ahead of fellow Victorian Michael Inguanti. Other results were not overly impressive and at the end of the second day the leading scorers were:

At the Trench grounds Russel Mark still leading the field with a well compiled 142-150, being two targets ahead of Bill Iles who had a disappointing round of 68 to add to his first day's 72. In outright third position was Junior World Champion Michael Diamond with a score of 139-150, two ahead of Commonwealth Games Gold Medallist John Maxwell in fifth position with a score of 129-150.

Disappointing scores by two juniors, Brett Dunstan 121-150 and Craig Tilley 129-150 who having their share of problems were anxious to produce better results.

Day three and a lot of rain. Weather conditions were cool by comparison to what is usually experienced in Western Australia at this time of the year and not to the liking of the majority of competitors. Fifty targets to go and the chance to win a Commonwealth title.

First final shot was the Skeet Final which went right to the last target where John Summers shot the target and in doing so took out the Commonwealth Skeet title on a count back from fellow Victorian Michael Inguanti with a final score of 210-225. In third position on 209-225 was Commonwealth Games shooter Craig Meuleman, also from Victoria.

Then came the Olympic Trap Final which was shot using Olimpyc flash targets which certainly added to the spectacle. Quite a few targets separated first and sixth in the final which really became a battle between Russell Mark and Michael Diamond for the Commonwealth title. Conditions were windy and made the targets that little more difficult however at the end of the final 25T, Russell Mark emerged the winner by two targets from Michael Diamond with John Maxwell taking out third position.

Following the Commonwealth Final was the State Teams shoulder to shoulder matches with Victoria not fielding teams in either Trap or Skeet. For a while it appeared as though NSW would only compete in the Skeet teams match owing to the refusal of their Trap team to participate however to their credit three NSW shooters sought permission to represent their State in the Trap event and shoot the competition. The NSW team took the skeet match from Western Australia with a score of 130-150.

In the Trap event, teams from Taiwan and USA participated by invitation with teams from NSW, Queensland, WA and South Australia. As this match was for the State Teams Perpetual Trophy both Taiwan and USA were shooting for scores only and at the completion of the Trap match the team from USA had shot an equal score of 108-150 with South Australia, who owing to the nature of the event, were winners and will be recorded as such on the R.F. Buchan Perpetual Trophy.

Friday, and day four the Championships, saw a total of 14 squads and 84 competitors in the National Trap title. Skeet numbers were unchanged with 5 squads and 25 shooters vying for the national title.

A very interesting battle was taking place in the Trap event as the Overall High Gun over the 400 targets was to receive a Beretta SO5 made available by the Winchester Division of Olin Australia. The Beretta had been on display throughout the Championships. WA State Manager Lex Shipp had set up a display in the main Club rooms which featured the Beretta and attracted a great deal of interest. Thank you Lex for your efforts in WA and the Winchester Company for this magnificent trophy for the Trap High Chun.

Conditions were better than on the previous three days and at the end of the first two days. At the end of the 150T mark John Summers was leading the Skeet field having shot three 25s to add to his first day's round of 70. Another interesting battle was also taking place in the Skeet events where John Summers with his 331-350 was leading Commonwealth Games representative Craig Meuleman by two targets for Overall High Gun, three shots back were Michael Inguanti. Brian Thomson and David Cunningham with Arnie Forsberg from WA were a further two targets away in fifth position. So far as selection in the National training squad was concerned it appeared as though these six would shoot their way over the last 50T into the squad,

however the opportunity was there for upsets to be caused.

A similar situation was occurring in the Trap event with Michael Diamond three targets ahead for the High Gun and leading qualifier into the National Training Squad from Victorian Russell Mark. Two Victorians, Bill Iles and Domingo Diaz were sitting equal third on a score of 312-350, one ahead of evergreen Jim Ellis whose score of 311-350 was keeping him three targets clear of John Maxwell whose 309-350 was only one target ahead of NSW junior Craig Tilley who was attempting to make the open squad and had his sights set on sixth position.

All interest now centred around the last 50T of the National Titles Trap and Skeet and the final results in both High Gun events.

Conditions were excellent and no excuses could be made for scores recorded on the final day. The Trap events having the larger number of competitors commenced at 9.00 am and all eyes were on the shooters as they set about their task. With only the five squads contesting the ISU Skeet Title, shooters had a little longer to wait before they commenced their last 50 targets and for some, waiting to shoot certainly added to the pressure of the event.

At the completion of the final 50T in both Trap and Skeet six shooters from each discipline had made their way into the final to be shot over 25T using the U.I.T. finals system which by now was a well accepted format. Finalists in order of qualification were:

The Trap Final was the first of the finals to be shot and was well supported by spectators and other shooters on the ground. Once again flash targets donated by Olimpyc Targets were being used and there is no doubt that the introduction of flash targets for finals has assisted in adding to the spectators' appreciation of the sport.

Leading qualifiers into the final for the National title were Michael Diamond and Jim Ellis both on 188-200. Michael certainly has his opportunities to take out the National title, however at the completion of the final 25T the experience of Jim Ellis was quite noticeable and he had led Michael to a final 22-25 equal to his own. Under the UIT finals system, as both finalists had entered the final round on equal scores and remained on equal scores after the final 25T, a miss and out shootoff was required, this for only a few targets before Canberra International's Jim Ellis emerged as National Champion for 1990.

The Skeet final was also full of interest with Craig

Meuleman leading the way into the final on 194, one target ahead of John Summers and David Cunningham. All three had a final round of 24-25 which left Craig that one target ahead of David with John in third place on a countback.

The first National Double Trap Championship which attracted a field of 47 who found the doubles to be a demanding event. Not surprising at the end of the event three well experienced competitors had taken out the overall positions with Russell Mark 149-200 being the National Champion from Jim Ellis 141-200 and Michael Diamond 134-200. Interesting to see a few "skeet shooters" taking part in this event which will grow in stature as time goes by.



SHOOTERS CORNER

Q. I was No. 1 shooter in a shoot off after shooting 5 targets and the next squad had also shot 5 targets when we were recalled. Three shooters were left from the first squad and we were to commence shooting off with three shooters remaining from the second squad. The squad was stopped after No. 1 shooter had called for his target and we were resquadded with shooters from the second squad. I was taken from No. 1 shooter to No. 4 shooter. I protested but kept shooting as I was sharing my gun with a junior shooter. Upon my protesting I was disqualified, so was the junior, with neither of us being given any details as to why.

There was no objection from the referee regarding sharing of the gun, nor was there any objections from any shooter within the squad.

A. Two questions arise from this letter:

1. Should the 2 squads of 3 shooters have been resquadded for the shoot-off and whether they could be resquadded after the No. 1 shooter called for his target? Answer — Yes, they should have been re-squadded to make one six-person squad. Yes, they could be re-squadded after the No. 1 shooter of the first 3-man squad had called for his target but NOT if he had shot at the target.

2. Sharing guns in the same squad — Although there are no written rules to prohibit this, etiquette should prevail and each shooter could rightly be expected to have their own gun. However, I can find no reason as to why either competitor should be disqualified.

This is more of a suggestion than a question - "When a shooter has a misfire it should be dealt with as quickly as possible because of the hold up to the squad." I suggest instead of waiting for the referee to check the gun the shooter should be allowed to open his gun, if he finds it was his fault either by leaving in a fired cartridge, or not placing a cartridge at all, he should notify the referee and accept a lost target. In the case if it was a cartridge that did not go off with the fault of primer or pin he should remove the unfired cartridge, place it on the track in front of himself, replace his cartridge and keep the squad moving. By placing the cartridge on the ground there would be no doubt that the shooter was correct. The reason I suggest this is that another shooter can leave a target go and call for another and nobody asks why. What do other shooters think?


LET'S TALK ABOUT SHOOTING SKEET

Cont'd from last month

SKEET FIELD DRAWING How to improve your form.

- * Position of feet on each of the 8 stations.
- * Space feet apart roughly the width of your shoulders and feel comfortable and alert.
- ★ Gun point on all stations is approx. 15-16 feet out from the trap house opening.
- * Some shooters will prefer to slightly realign their feet for the second shot. This is a matter of personal choice. However with the exception of station 8 I have never thought it necessary.
- * Try to break all going away targets over or just before centre station.
- ★ Targets coming to you can be shot at just after having passed centre station.
- * Stance and correct feet position for each station is very important.
- * Face, or position body just past where you intend to break the target.
- * Reason for correct body position is to ensure a free and easy gun swing with and through the target.



TROUBLE SHOOTING SKEET

It was only recently that a keen skeeter said to me—"George, in every article you write on shooting, you never fail to stress how important it is to have the gun properly fitting the shooter. Is this advice really so important and why is it so?"

Well to cut a long story short, it was 1½ hours later after two rounds of skeet instruction during which time I related to him my personal experiences with gun fitting. At this stage my friend was well able to see my point.

The story follows —

When I first came into clay target shooting some 45 years ago, I soon became very much aware of the importance of having a gun that would point more consistently on targets than dad's old double barrel gun that I used to hunt rabbits and ducks etc with. It was at this early stage of my clay target shooting career when I became aware of the need to have a gun to suit me in such a way that when I placed the butt on my shoulder, the muzzle would be pointing near to where my shooting eye was looking, ie. at the target. In the years just after World War II we had very little choice of shotguns and apart from the Werley and Scott and Greener double barrels very little else was available. Of course there was a single barrel H&R that almost everyone owned. They were inexpensive to buy, something like two pounds ten

shillings each. They proved an ideal rabbit and snake gun for the farmer.

I finally bought myself a Browning auto standard model, plain barrel without rib, bored half choke. However, I was far from happy with the standard field stock and its long pistol grip which felt like a cricket bat handle. I went to work on it, fitting a Monte Carlo comb plus a complete new pistol grip, which was needed in order to have complete control of the gun. I was then able to point the muzzle exactly where I was looking. It made shooting better scores easier.

I continued to use the Browning auto with a great amount of success for several years, finally switching to the over and under as they became available — around 1948.

Clay target shooting was beginning to recover and expand. New firearms manufacturing firms were coming into production. It became obvious that a change in styles of guns was necessary in order to shoot better scores at skeet and trap. And so we began to see a new style of gun like the over and under etc. Stocks were modified and barrels were bored differently. Raised and ventilated ribs were added to give us a new style shooting iron for clay target shooters. Today changes are still going on in an effort to build the right gun for "Mr Average". Unfortunately I don't have the space in this article to go more deeply into the subject, but suffice to say that "Mr Average" shooter should have his gun checked for personal fit so that he cannot blame the gun when he misses a target.

Unfortunately, a large number of our skeet shooters still don't realise that poor gun fitting and gun mounting is the reason why the average shooter is not a more consistent top scorer.

Of course there are many other reasons why we have a bad day and they are related to the basics of skeet shooting. So it becomes necessary to analyse ourselves from the feet, up to mounting the gun, and firing at the target. Feet and stance position is first on our check list after we know the gun fits us as it should.

HOW TO SHOOT PROBLEM TARGETS

Station one high is sometimes a problem. It is caused by changing the angle of gun hold to an angle that is either further out or closer in than has been the usual pointing position. This action will immediately upset timing, resulting in a desperate stab or a long slow tracking of the target.

Stations two high and six low also bother a lot of shooters. At both these stations, body control is vital. A smooth, easy gun movement and follow-through begins with a good stance position. Any stance we adopt that causes unnecessary strain is not going to help us because it will cause erratic movement and fatigue.

Station two high is a frequently missed target due mainly to the shooter rushing the target, stopping his gun swing and follow-through. Proper routine at two high is like all other stations only more so, i.e. face the centre of the field over station eight where the target is usually broken, now without moving the feet position, turn your body back towards the trap house to a spot about 16 feet from the trap opening. Hold the gun muzzle at this point on line of target travel, concentrate for a second to get a quick mental picture in mind about what you have to do when the target appears. With this clear mental picture in mind call for the target, look hard at it, swing the gun muzzle through with it and see the lead, fire and follow through. Lead should be about 18 inches of "daylight".

Station six low is more or less the opposite to high two. The difference being that it leaves the trap opening at a lower level. However, it still has to be handled in much the same manner. Keep in mind that low six is climbing more than high two. This means keeping your gun muzzle up on the target right from the start of your swing. This is why

we must always have the gun hold position prior to calling, right on line of target travel. This target is frequently missed by shooting low and behind. It is caused by failure to keep the gun muzzle up on the rising target. I prefer a left hand position on the fore-end to be a little further out when shooting low six. Not only does this give me a better muzzle pulling aid, but it also gives more accuracy of point on the fast moving target going from right to left.

Station two high can be handled in a similar way, except that the left hand is brought a little closer to the gun's metal action, something like a couple of inches from the action. The shorter hold will tend to help control accuracy and give more "gun push" at the fast flying high two target.

FOOT POSITION


Position of the skeet shooter's feet is important and it will vary from station to station. It is essential that we adopt a balanced and relaxed stance, but still be alert—ready to swing smoothly and quickly after the target when we call "pull". The good skeet shooter will pay special attention to his feet placing. Too close together will cause him to be off balance when he begins to swing with the target. He will in fact tend to move his body only from the hips, causing a rolling action resulting in a low shot. Body movement should be from the ankles up. On the other hand too wide a stance will cause a good deal of strain and tension, as well as restriction of movement.

Contrary to what some shooters may think, the safety catch on your gun is completely divorced from the gun's cocking and uncocking of the hammers. The safety catch is actually a mechanism that prevents the trigger or triggers from being pulled when on safety. Fact is, the hammers are still cocked so that if the gun is dropped or jarred by a fall, the hammers can operate and fire the shell — even though the safety catch was on "safe".

STATION 8 HIGH — Lead and follow through.

If you are not too sure of how follow-through works—this photo will illustrate just what it is and how it is done. Photo shows how the gun has come from behind—opened up the necessary lead—fire and follow-through after trigger let-off. Note that although the target is broken—








the gun is still on the shooter's shoulder and his face is just beginning to leave the comb. The gun muzzle is still pointing on target travel line — this is follow-through action.

Note stance and comfortable style of the shooter on this station. If you extend a line straight up from the gun barrels it will be apparent just how much follow-through we have on this particular shot.

"THE GUN AND EYE ALIGNMENT"





Gun at top of drawing is a skeet gun with too much drop at the heel of the stock. Because of this the shooter's eye will be looking into the back of the action instead of down along the barrel rib. This position is not uncommon with many skeet guns — it will cause low shooting. Compare the eye position on the lower gun: note how the eye position is up above the rib line where it should be, enabling the shot to be fired with target always visible over the front bead. As an example both my trap and skeet guns have the very same measurements with one exception — length of pull is ¼-inch shorter on the skeet gun, because I use an off-shoulder gun position at skeet.

- Will not attempt to bend rules and regulations to suit his own needs.
- * Places the good of his team before personal wellbeing.

- * Accepts people at face value.
- * Believes what his coach and team mates say.
- * Does not look for ulterior motives behind their words and actions.
- ★ Free of jealous tendencies.
- * Tends to get along well with fellow shooters.

Try applying all of the above points to yourself - and be honest! - you'll soon be able to pinpoint the areas of your game or character that needs improving.

You notice, self control, self confidence, and stick-ability are very prominent. Self blame, self punishment and emotional toughness are elevated. In all top shooters you will tend to find at least these traits.

Isolate and analyse those areas needing improvement and take positive steps to work on them. Who knows, you may improve your shooting before you even fire another shot.


RON SHEEN



THE BERETTA ASE 90 — The Latest Offering from Beretta

There is little doubt in my mind that Beretta have surged forward in popularity with their guns in recent years, particularly with the introduction of the 680 and 682 models. Beretta have always had their sidelocks, the ever so popular SO 4 model etc. (and now the SO 5), but there has always been a stop-gap between these and their boxlock series, with an associated price structure. To overcome this problem and place magnificent guns such as the SO series a little closer toward the more affordable end of the scale Beretta have released the ASE 90. This is a magnificent gun, almost a hybrid between the boxlock receiver of the 682 and the strength and appeal of the locking mechanism and barrels of the SO 5, but with the added introduction of a trigger lock assembly. Quite an innovation for Beretta and a divergence from their traditional lines.

The ASE 90 has been on the drawing board at Beretta for several years, with a prototype used two years ago to take second place at the World Championships. The demand for a trigger lock gun has stemmed from the popularity and success other Italian gunmakers have received with similar features, and a preference amongst shooters for just one competition gun. The interchangeable trigger lock mechanism should not be confused with other shotgun features; such as interchangeable chokes (which increase the versatility of a gun), but rather be seen as a step toward configuring the ultimate competition gun with the added bonus of swiftly replacing the trigger mechanism should a failure occur. The benefit being the continued use of the gun without the need to duplicate it with another. Quite a huge saving when the cost of a spare trigger lock is compared to the total price of setting-up an identical shotgun.

Beretta seem to have perfected the ASE 90 and have marketed it in either Trap, Sporting or Skeet with the option of a blued or silver matte finish on the receiver. The trap version provided for evaluation was quite impressive and is predicted to be highly sought by U.I.T. trench

shooters who enjoy using a gun well suited to this type of shooting and 28 gram loads. The Beretta ASE 90 shapedup as follows.

THE BARRELS

These were 30" (75cm) long and cold-hammered from pre-bored bars of nickel/chromium/molybdenum steel and of monobloc design. They were chrome-plated for superior corrosion resistance and improved ballistic performance. Chambered for 12 gauge 2%" cartridges, the chambers were well polished and longer in the foreing cone—to facilitate uninterrupted passage into the barrels and effectively reduce recoil. The inside of each barrel exhibited a highly polished chrome finish. It was obvious the metal work of the barrels had been painstakingly finished for the exterior tubes and monobloc were also without the slightest of tool marks. The ASE 90 showed it was hand finished to precise inspection controls and appeared well ahead of similar guns in its class. With a barrel weight of 1.65kg the ASE 90 was well suited to trap shooting.

The chokes were marked improved modified and full but upon measurement with a full length micrometer the chokes showed 0.44" constriction of the top barrel and 0.35" constriction of the bottom. This determined the chokes as over-full and full. During the evaluation two different loads were fired through the ASE 90 — Winchester, 32 gram, 325s in size 7 and Winchester, 28gm, Universal cartridges in size 7%. This was intended to evaluate the duplication of the pattern percentages of the two loads as each load had, approximately, the same number of pellets.


The Winchester 325 load printed patterns of 72% and 74% respectively from the bottom and then the top barrel whilst the Winchester 28gm, U.I.T. Universal load printed an astonishing 31% and 82% respectively. Tight patterns were expected as a result of the measurements obtained from the micrometer (quite in excess of the choke markings indicated on the barrels), for targets in U.I.T. Trench travel faster and demand lighter 28 gram loads than with normal D.T.L. competition. The tighter chokes held the patterns of the lighter 28 gram loads together further to enable the shot to perform well at the greater distances. A point which was proven when the gun was tested at the local gun club—it virtually smoked D.T.L. targets with both barrels, which would be quite an asset, particularly for U.I.T. shooters.

The patterns with the 32 gram loads were also exceptional, at 72% and 74%, but to achieve 81% and 82% patterns with the 28 gram loads not only indicated the extra speed of the loads was working for the shooter, also nearly every pellet in the shell was contained in a 30" circle at 40 yards. Beretta had obviously committed themselves to a full-on competition gun with exceptional patterning

ability especially suited to 28 gram loads and the U.I.T. trench style of shooting.

The 10mm ventilated top rib was posted in a different manner than found on either the 682 or SO models. It had a greater barrel surface exposure to provide the utmost in heat dissipation and to further facilitate cooling. The rib was finished with a cross-hatch file cut pattern and topped with a luminous fore sight. There was no mid sight fitted. The side ribs were also ventilated and supported long stylish flutes which complemented the overall appearance of a Beretta's new design. The muzzle had been finished by hand with a similar cross-hatch file design to the rib and ensured the barrels and final rib-post were complete and well presented.

The monobloc was jewel polished on the sides whilst the under surface was polished to a high lustre and inscribed with the brand name, model number, serial number and proof marks. Removable barrel shoulders have become a hallmark of the 680 and 682 series. The ASE 90 also had these fitted with engraving tastefully completed on the heads of the retaining screws. The extractors were positive and well fitted to handle extreme punishment from the competition shooter. They positively removed empty shells without being over-tensioned. Overall, the ASE 90 barrels were beautifully made and deeply blued (rather than coated with Bruniton as is the case with the 682 competition guns). It was certainly a gun extremely well finished.



• The Beretta ASE 90 is sold with its own case which comfortably houses the barrel and action. The case's construction also protects the gun from any abuse which it may endure during transit.


THE RECEIVER

Machined from a single block of nickel/chrome/moly-bdenum steel the receiver undergoes a thorough hardening/tempering treatment upon manufacture. It is available, as mentioned earlier, with either a silver matt or a deeply blued finish. The top mouldings tastefully complemented the breech bells at the end of the monobloc whilst the Anson-type monolithic locking system ensured the action was unshakingly firm and tight. This cross-bolt locking mechanism, onto two barrel protrusions, coupled with replaceable hinge pins and shoulders ensured the prolonged tightness of the action and guaranteed the longest possible service life with absolute safety.

The frame of the action was unmistakably Beretta and featured gold inlaid Olympic rings beneath the scroll name of P. Beretta. The receiver top had been treated to a hand-finished, non-glare surface which further demonstrated the exact detail undertaken to make the ASE 90 a highly regarded and completely vamped "full-on" competition gun. Apart from the top lever grip and the pin it hinged upon the ASE 90 had little engraving. In fact the receiver, apart from the gold inlaying, was very plain to the point of 100% practicality. Once again all surfaces, both inside and out, had been finely finished and polished to perfection. There was not the slightest sign of a tool mark anywhere.

The crux of the ASE 90 was its single trigger, non-selective trigger lock which was simply removed by pushing the safety forward and lowering the trigger mechanism downward from the rear of the action. The V-shaped mainsprings delivered instant response for they produced a light, crisp and short pull. All parts of the trigger mechanism were polished to perfection - there were certainly no pressed steel parts inside this beauty. The hammer V-springs used by Beretta have proven to be successful with other quality competition guns so they were probably a natural design progression with the ASE 90. Unfortunately though they are not easily accessible for quick replacement. This does not pose a problem however, as the gun is supplied with a spare trigger/lock mechanism for instant exchange in the unlikely event of a failure. Once removed from the stock the action and frame were magnificently finished with a matt surface - certainly part of the premium one is expected to pay for a gun manufactured so well! The firing pins were housed in the action and retained by pins which were readily accessible once the stock was removed. A small catch attached to the rear of the trigger enabled the selection of three pre-determined lengths of pull. The trigger guard was of a new design and well suited to the competitive lines of the gun. The nonautomatic, non-selective safety was located at the rear of the top tang and offered a firm, non-slip surface to push against. This was imperative for the safety catch needed to be pushed well forward to disengage the trigger retaining catch which enabled the trigger lock to be removed. Beretta stipulated in the literature forwarded with the gun that extra locks should be purchased with the ASE 90 at point of order to ensure that interchangeability with the original set is factory guaranteed.

STOCK AND FORE-END

Both the stock and the fore-end were of walnut selected for both appearance and durability. The wood supplied with the sample gun was more functional than attractive whilst wood viewed on another ASE 90 from the same shipment was magnificent. Shooters should simply take their time and select a gun with the wood which is the most appealing.

The stock was a Monte Carlo design supported with fine hand-cut checkering. The pistol grip features a well proportioned palm swell to provide greater control and a more positive grip. Stock configurations were standard as for most Berettas. The comb was quite high and very straight with a degree of toe out at the heel. When the ASE 90 was mounted it initially appeared to be excessively high although when fired it was obvious Beretta had designed the barrels to shoot marginally high too, but nowhere near as high as the height of the stock indicated. A bonus in pro-

viding the shooter with maximum vision for all targets, including flat, low-flying ball-trap clays. The side of the stock was quite thick and gave a shooter the option of either removing some from the side or having the stock bent (if required), for better fit. Part finished stocks are also available for order with the gun should a purchaser decide to have a custom stock made.

The fore-end featured the same metal work as found on Beretta's SO 5 which prompted me to believe the barrels were of quality SO 5 manufacture. The standard shaped fore-end was finished with the care the rest of the ASE 90 was assembled. The wood colour and grain matched the stock perfectly.

COMMENTS

There is little doubt in my mind the ASE 90 was designed specifically with the top-level competitor in mind. Its features were impressive, as was the workmanship and finish — second to none! The 26 lines per inch checkering complemented the overall appearance, and the balance of the gun was magnificent. It was very comfortable to shoot with both the 32 gram and 28 gram loads and seemingly swung through targets without any effort at all. The ASE 90, priced at a recommended retail exceeding \$8000 (with spare set of trigger/locks and case), is still \$3500 below the recommended retail of an SO 5 and approximately \$5000 above the price of a standard 682. For the competition or aspiring competition shooter wanting to improve their scores and seek the most in performance, if price was of little concern, the ASE 90 would be an excellent choice.




