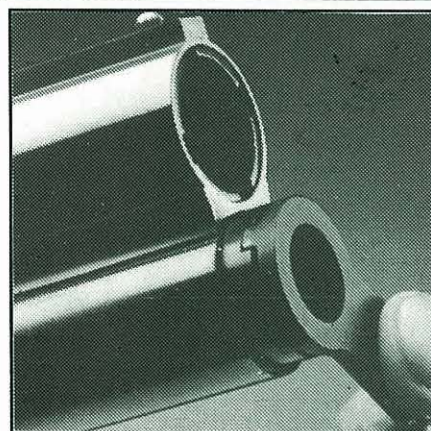
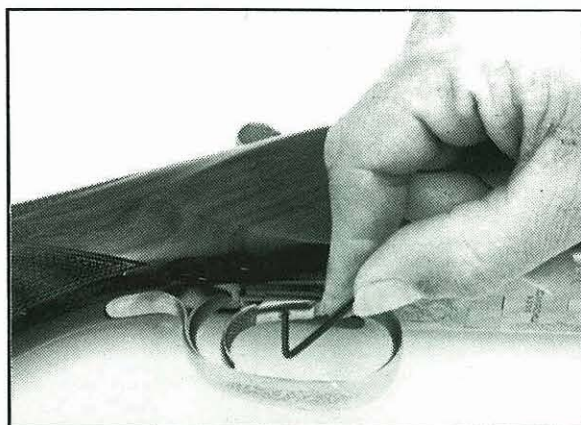

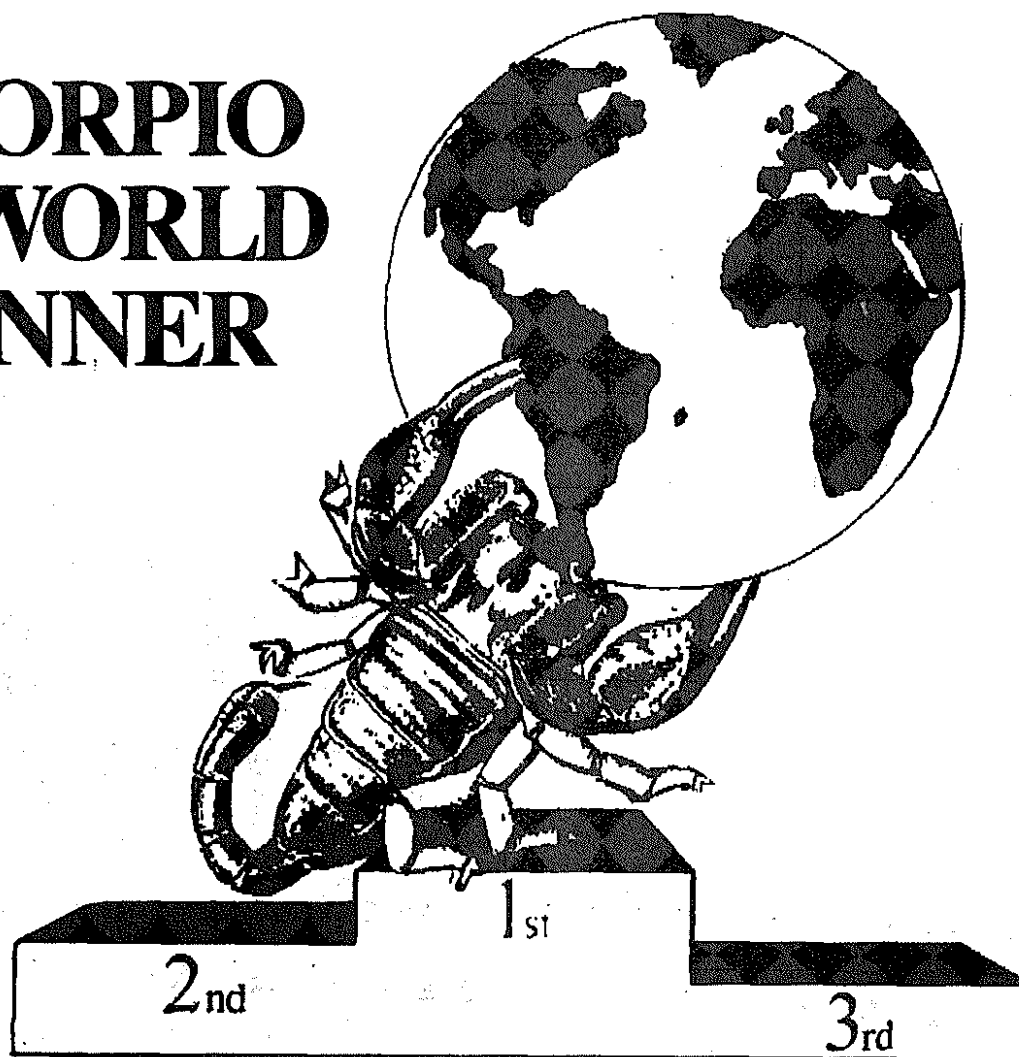

Skeet Shooters Representative

Five State Associations had advised of their nomination for a skeet shooters representative to the National Shooting Committee: WA — Ross Eckersly, Tas — Alan Kenny, Qld — Margaret Denton, Vic — Robert Buchan, NSW — Colin Burt.

As is now the custom, a meeting took place at Wagga chaired by Robert Smith, Committee Chairman, to elect from their number a skeet shooters representative. At the conclusion of voting, Mr Robert Buchan (Vic) was elected to the position for the period ending at the 1993 National Skeet Championships.

World Championships

When reading this, arrangements for the World Championships will have been completed with only a few short days before the actual competition. The Australian Shooting Association is delighted with the country response to contest the World Trap and Skeet Championships, the success of which will reflect well on Australian shooting as a whole.

UIT Secretary General, Mr Horst Schreiber will be attending the Championships as will hopefully President Mr Olegario Vasquez Rana. In addition Gary Anderson, a member of the UIT Executive will be officiating as the Competition Technical Delegate. The UIT Shotgun Technical Committee will also be officiating as jury members. We wish all competitors well including our 18 strong Australian Team and trust that all retain fond and lasting memories of the 1991 World Trap and Skeet Championships when they return home.

Australian Shooting Association

A meeting of the Australian Shooting Association is scheduled to take place in mid October. It is expected that a statement of policy will emerge in relation to existing and proposed firearm legislation.

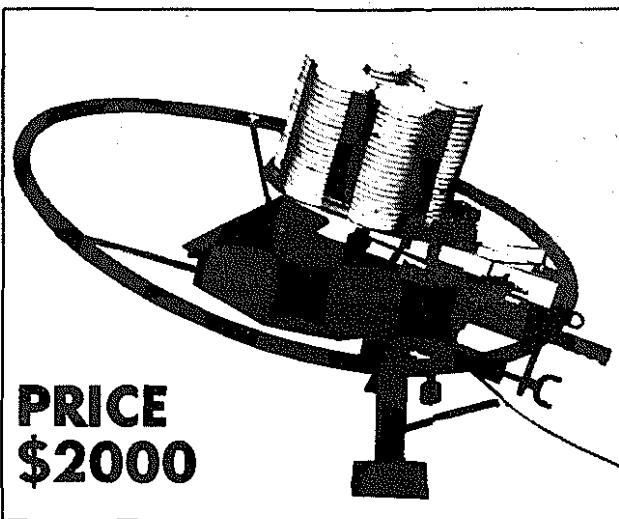

NATIONAL SKEET CHAMPIONSHIPS

The ground at Wagga Gun Club had been well prepared for the 1991 National Skeet Championships and was a great credit to the hard working members of the Wagga Gun Club. During the Pre National competition prior to the commencement of the National Championships the weather conditions took a considerable turn for the worse with rain, hail and wind the order of the day.

Notwithstanding, some 80 shooters took part in the days competition competing for excellent trophies made available by Wagga Gun Club.

On Thursday, the conditions had certainly improved with the rain replaced by a biting wind which assisted in drying out the grounds throughout the day.

The National Skeet Championships were officially declared open by Mr Pat Brassil, the Mayor of Wagga Wagga when invited to fire the opening shot by newly elected National President Mr Leighton Martin.

State Teams (Open)

As always keen interest and rivalry in the State Teams Shoulder to Shoulder Match produced good competition for the State Perpetual Trophy. The match over 50T was full of interest to the end which resulted in a win for the experienced Victorian team whose combined score of 245/250 was one better than the NSW team who finished on 244/250 much to the delight of the strong Victorian contingent.

Ladies

Being the inaugural year of competition it was not surprising that most states experienced some difficulty in fielding a team for the 25T Shoulder to Shoulder Match. Only two teams took part with victory going to host state NSW with a team score of 62/75, one target ahead of Victoria 61/75. No doubt this event will grow in stature as years go by and hopefully 1992 will see more states represented in the event.

Juniors

As was the situation with the ladies match, only two states fielded teams with Victoria winning the match with an excellent 71/85. Headed by Richard Sammon 25/25 the Victorian team is full of promise and should be a force in junior ranks for some time. The competition will be enhanced by the addition of other state teams and like the ladies will no doubt gather further strength as the years go by.

Congratulations must also go to the respective State Associations who ensured that their state teams were suitably outfitted for the State Team Matches.

5th National Doubles Championship

Sponsored by B.R.A. Insurance Pty Ltd. A total of 117 shooters took part in the Doubles title which has from 1991 been extended from a 25pr to a 50pr competition. Now in its fifth year of competition the Doubles has established itself as an event that is always full of interest and a title that is keenly contested.

From its inception no shooter has been able to win the title on more than one occasion. This trend continued at Wagga when Evan

Stephenson won the 5th National Doubles Championship outright with his score of 96/100. Evan from Broken Hill was delighted with his win receiving the B.R.A. Insurance Trophy, as well as the Perazzi trophy made available by Austral Gun Company, the Silver Australia Badge and Royal Blue Sash. In addition Evan is to be recorded as the 1991 winner on the National Skeet Doubles Trophy which was presented to him by the trophy donor and inaugural Doubles champion, Paul Johnston of Victoria.

The ladies section of the Doubles Championship was well won by Wagga's Maree Rooke with a score of 88/100. Richard Sammon from Victoria won the junior section with a score of 92/100, again proving that he will be a skeet shooter to be reckoned with for many years to come. The veterans sections was keenly contested and resulted in a win for Hawkesbury's Reg Clarke whose 91/100 under the conditions belied his veterans status.

Congratulations and well done to all who participated in particular those whose performances won for them overall recognition in the section contested.

All States Skeet Championship

Sponsored by Wagga Gun Club. Conditions had improved out of sight on day two with the sun shining strongly and the grounds showing good signs of recovery. The number of shooters had increased with a total of 136 contesting the Championship event.

At the 50T halfway mark, eleven shooters who had shot the possible were anxious to get on with their shooting and all had their vision well set on another straight 50 targets. At the end of the 100T the possibles totalled two only, Paul Johnston (Melbourne) and David Cunningham (Frankston-Australia). Good scores were being shot in the Ladies: Lee Brownbill, Frankston-Australia 96/100, Juniors: Richard Sammon, Wangaratta 93/100 and evergreen Ray Melville from Tamworth who took the Veteran section with a score of 100/104.

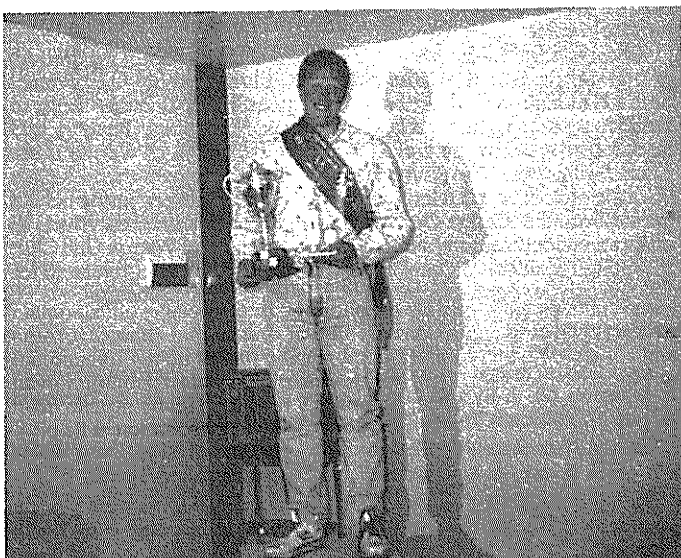
After a shoot off for Overall, David Cunningham was the winner of the All States Championship with a score of 118/118 with Paul Johnston taking first place in AA on 117/118.

Commonwealth Skeet Championship

Sponsored by Winchester Australia. Conditions were still a little on the cold side for the Commonwealth Title which along with the 100T of the All States Championship was to provide the Australian Teams for the Skeet Challenge Trophy.

One hundred and forty one shooters nominated for the 100T event including seven from New Zealand. After 50T had been shot a total of 5 competitors had shot the first 50 straight, D. Murphy and E. Stephenson both from Broken Hill, D. Dundon and N. Dimnick both from Brisbane and G. Guy from Melbourne.

At the completion of the Commonwealth Championship, Frankston's Paul Ryland had shot the best score of the day, finishing with a final score of 113/114 after a shoot-off with John Copley 112/114 and David Cunningham 111/114, with Doubles Champion Evan Stephenson shooting a creditable 106/108/

First in the ladies section was Wagga's Maree Rooke 96/100 with William Holloway from Wangaratta in Victoria shooting an outstanding 96/100 to win the junior section. Again with a score of 97/100 Hawkesbury's Reg Clarke belied his veteran status winning the veteran section of the Commonwealth title.

Australian Team

The open, ladies and junior teams to contest the inaugural International Skeet Challenge Trophy Match was selected from scores recorded over the 100T of the All States and Commonwealth Championships. Frankston's David Cunningham who was enjoying a good National Championships led the team with a well shot 199/200, ahead by one from Melbourne's Paul Johnston. The twelve member team to contest the open match had all performed well up to the Commonwealth Title event and a very good Australian score was a distinct possibility.

The six member ladies team was led by Maree Rooke whose score of 189/200 made her the best qualifier.

In the junior team, Wangaratta Gun Club were dominant providing three of the six member team which included brothers William and Robert Holloway which augurs well for skeet shooting in Victoria as well as at the Wangaratta Club.

International Challenge Trophy

A great deal of interest was generated in this inaugural match which will grow in stature and eventually prove to be for skeet shooters the equal of the DTL Mackintosh competition upon which it is modelled.

Results will not be announced until following the date of October 31 which is the closing date upon which country results will be received. Being an International event introduced by Australia, it would be fitting to see Australia recorded as the winner in 1991 — hopefully this will be the case.

National Skeet Championships

Sponsored by *Scorpio Cartridges* and *Olimpyc Targets*. Again early conditions were excellent and a good days shooting seemed assured. The sun, however, was not overly co-operative and it appeared as though grey skies would dominate the afternoon competition which was not enhanced by the strong wind that had blown up to make conditions a little tricky.

Fortunately the wind quickly abated and shooters were able to enjoy reasonably good weather throughout the days competition which was highlighted by the one possible shot by Wakehurst shooter, Scott Wright, who had been shooting consistently over the previous three days.

A number of shooters shot 99/100 including New Zealand President, Graeme Webber whose final score of 116/118 took third place in AA grade behind Evan Stephenson 141/143 and Queensland's Dave Dundon 142/143.

The ladies section was well won by Maree Rooke with an excellent 98/100. Another outstanding performance by Richard Sammon whose score of 97/100 won the junior section. Again Reg Clarke showed his ability and won the veterans section of the National title, an event won by him in the Open section in 1991.

Unfortunately two of the three were unable to accept the opportunity to contest the Skeet Championships at San Antonio and were replaced by Paul Johnston and Scott Wright, both of whom had been named as first and second emergencies. The skeet team is currently contesting the World Championships with their participation made possible by the financial assistance received from the Australian Sports Commission.

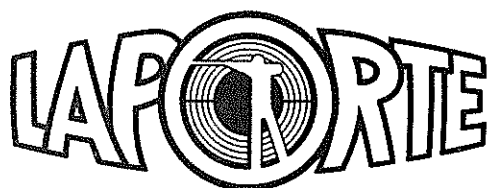

28 GRAM TARGET LOADS — A DISCUSSION

As we all know now, the 28 gram load has well and truly arrived. Since the UIT changeover, when the skeet and trench shooter was forced to depart from the traditional 32 gram shot weight, rumours have circulated with regard to how long it would be before other disciplines would follow suit.

The answer has turned out that it isn't to be very long at all. The ACTA has decreed that the maximum shot weight permissible in its competitions will be 28 grams, from January 1, 1993; in the meantime, the Nationals of 1992 will also be shot using 28 grams as a maximum, this being by way of a lead-up to the complete implementation of the new ruling in the following year. (The Grand Australian Handicap of 1991 will be the last time this event is permitted to be shot with 32 grams; after that, it will be back to 28 for handicap shooting as well.)

This has excited a lot of comment. It does, after all, involve a pretty fair departure from what has been standard practice in Australia. While I have no comment to make on the decision itself, I have been asked to provide some information on the ballistic aspects of it.

There is no doubt in my mind that some changes will in fact accrue from the decision. However, it is not a straightforward matter. For those unwilling to test combinations of guns and loads, it may seem black and white: if you take a standard 32 gram load and reduce that to 28 grams, then you're removing one pellet in every nine — so does that mean you're going to hit one less target in every nine?

No, it doesn't mean anything like that. What it does mean, overall, though, is that, yes, there will be one or two areas where changes in performance are noticeable, and, yes, if some shooters are going to try to maintain scores exactly as they have done under the 32 gram ruling, then they're going to have to work a bit harder.

Let's look at some background.

Thirty years ago, before plastic arrived in shotgunning, trapshooters were all using paper cased Blue Stars. These were far and away the rule of thumb by which other loads were judged; when plastic came onto the scene, and as paper cases gradually gave way to it, a lot of shooters felt that the actual performance, (putting aside moisture resistance, I mean — just the shooting quality) was not as good in the new loads as it was in the old. But these things change, and when attention focuses elsewhere everyone forgets.

It's less a question of what happened to the Blue Star, and more of a question about what succeeded it. In brief, it was the AA325 that arrived on the scene in 1979, and relatively soon it became the standard reference round. Many a shooter would use a 325 in the second barrel and a reload in the first, preferring when the chips are down to resort to what was felt to be an ultra-reliable backstop. The old practice was soon forgotten and a new standard evolved.

Now, we are about to go through another transition, and there will be many folk who lament the change, not because they've thought it through and conducted their own careful tests, but because it's a fair departure from what everybody has been used to — as in the case of the move away from the paper cased Blue Star that the older competitors will remember.

Innovation is fine when we do it ourselves, but when it's put upon us we may resent it. However, this one is not necessarily too much of a problem at all.

The reasons for the change as I understand them are as follows.

Firstly, there is the conformity aspect. If the faster and more difficult trench targets are being broken with 28 grams all round the world, then on the face of it at least there's some grounds for saying DTL targets can be, too.

Second, there's the recoil and health element. There are those who suffer from the effects of recoil; older shooters, younger shooters, more lightly built ones — all may be prone to suffering cumulative effects of recoil over the longer competitions, and, in the case of those shooters suffering from bone trouble such as arthritis, then having the standard as a heavier rather than a lighter load may be a matter of great concern.

Third, there is the area of noise pollution. Pressure is building on some clubs, depending on their proximity to housing, to limit the noise of their ammunition. I do not feel that for practical purposes there is much of a difference in the noise produced by 32 and 28 gram ammunition. However, I have never seen the results of a comparison test carried out with sensitive noise measuring devices. I am led to understand that when it is properly measured there is seen to be some slight benefit in favour of the lighter loads.

Lastly, there is an obvious advantage of using one ninth less lead; this is the most expensive part of the cartridge, and the saving must accrue over the years. I feel certain that in time greater pressure, probably economic, will come to bear on trapshooting to do what it can to eliminate any possible waste of resources, and in the world of tomorrow, if the lesser amount of anything will do the job, then that is the amount that will be favoured.

Altogether, while the change may not be embraced immediately by everybody concerned, I think that in the light of the reasons above we can at least see why it has come about.

Now, for some ballistic and other practical aspects of what it means to the whole spectrum of trapshooters.

Let's deal with the historical perspective of the 32 gram shotweight first.

Why 32 grams? Why not 30, or 34?

History has got this point fairly darkly shrouded. It's something that has often interested me.

Mostly, I believe it goes back to the days in England when choke was new and not widespread. Ordinary guns of game shooting persuasion tended to weigh about seven and a quarter pounds. Game was taken while being driven towards the shooter.

Much of the effectiveness of the gun was not realised because shot was soft, far softer than we use today, and borings were open. Three drams of black powder was a tolerable load in a gun of this weight (and bear in mind that black powder kicks more than smokeless), and when matched with an ounce and an eighth of shot, it provided killing patterns to all normal sporting distances.

It really wasn't practicable in those days before the turn of the century to use less shot, because the open borings and the pellet softness meant effectiveness would be diminished very quickly.

However, after antimony was added to shot to harden it, patterns became a lot tighter. So much so, in fact, that when World War I came about, in order to save on metal, it was accepted right throughout Britain when the standard game load had a sixteenth of an ounce removed, and it became an ounce and a sixteenth.

I suspect that if it hadn't been for the influence of the live pigeon shooters, who were always using heavier loads and trying to plaster their birds and kill them stone dead instantly, with no thought for their fitness for eating afterwards, then this figure of an ounce and a sixteenth, 30 grams, might well have ended up the worldwide standard.

But it didn't; and this illustrates that whichever way it went, the standard shot weight in 12 gauge is nothing more than a trick of history. It didn't evolve to this because there's anything magical about the weight. It just happened that way for a variety of reasons that are complex and mostly lost in the past.

Sometimes you hear people say things like the ounce and an eighth load is so good because of the way it lies in the bore. But this is not so, because the bore sizes to be found in the 12 gauge vary enormously. If this were correct, and it is a harmonious weight in some guns because of the height of the shot column as the bore squeezes it as it travels down, then it can be argued with equal force that it would be the opposite in many other guns, because their bores are so differently sized.

In short, it's just a matter of chance that it's 32 grams that we've always shot and not 33 or 31, or some other weight that's not far away.

Now, for some good news. It happens that the laws of physics ensure that the benefit that comes with an ounce and an eighth of shot is not cut back by one ninth when the shot is reduced to an ounce, though at first appearance it may seem that this would be so.

When the shot is fired from the gun, there is a lot of deformity to pellets which can only be guarded against to a certain degree. Plastic shot cups help, but that's all they do — they don't eliminate it entirely. Thankfully, raw lead-to-steel abrasion from the barrel walls is a thing of the past in this age of the highly developed one piece wad.

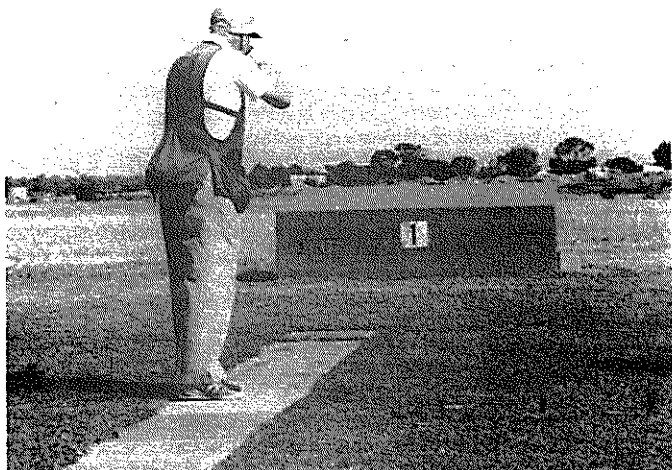
There is still the problem of pellet distortion from the setback on firing, however, and the shot mass must still be forced through the forcing cones of chamber and choke.

Such trauma as the charge moves up the barrel ensures that some pellets will be so much forced out of round that they must fail to travel with the bulk of the charge, and hence they don't form part of the effective pattern when it arrives at the target. They're trundling along in the rear, heading off at a tangent, and carrying little target-smashing energy.

When the shot column is shortened, as it must be in the event of a ninth of the charge being removed, then there is potential for less deformation resulting from the contact, even if it is indirect, with barrel walls. This is simply because there are fewer pellets in contact with the exterior surfaces in order to be distorted by them.

When long range performance is being considered, this may be a very telling fact. In order to keep the shot charge together at the very long ranges, say around 45 metres, pellet sphericity is most important. It is quite possible for the pattern percentage to rise when the shot charge is reduced — I have discovered instances of this when testing. I don't say it is the normal thing, but it can happen, and it can be encouraged to take place by a couple of means: manipulating pressure curves is one, as cartridge manufacturers are able to do, or by increasing anitmony in shot, possibly to levels above the ones to which we are accustomed. Both of these strategies can have an effect which results in less fewer pellets falling out of the main charge while on the way to the target.

So all is not necessarily lost.



For first barrel DTL there has been a move to 7½ shot since 28 grams became the UIT standard. It is unlikely a fifteen metre shooter could tell the difference between 32 grams of 7 and 28 of 7½.

The 28 gram load has risen dramatically in popularity over the short time since it was brought in for UIT purposes. It has been picked up by a lot of people who didn't really have to adopt it. In particular, it now features as a first barrel DTL cartridge.

If there was a good reason why this light shot weight would not work adequately, I doubt whether this would have taken place at all; there'd be a lot more resistance. But the fact is that Winchester has reported a great interest in its light 28 gram load, the Universal, and so much so in number 7½ shot that it now does not offer it in the more traditional number 7.

On the other hand, the International, doing 1290 FPS instead of the 1235 of the Universal, is called for in both sizes.

Perhaps shooters have come to grips with the idea that a 28 gram load of size 7½ shot contains the same number of pellets as the old standard, the 325, in number 7.

As a first barrel DTL cartridge, for practical purposes I believe the 28 gram load in 7½ is near enough to indistinguishable from the heavier 32 gram that we've been more familiar with.

You can find good reason to believe this if you try it for an extended time, and keep a record of the results.

Let me make it clear that one or two shoots are not enough, though, for a good and documented trial. You really need a shooting diary, kept over six months or so of regular shooting, so that your good and bad days are taken into account, and a meaningful average can be ascertained.

There is also good reason to believe it when you consider another couple of facts.

The trend for quite some time, according to the Winchester sales people, has been away from the standard 325 number 7 and over to both number 8 and number 7½. The eights, which have never been highly popular in the past, are beginning to come into their own in use not so much in the 325, but in the 300, and the 7½'s in the Universal.

The reasons for this are not completely clear, but obviously it is a move within clay target shooting, these being clay target loads only. It is reasonable to assume it is for first barrel DTL and for simulated field shooting — both are thirty metre propositions, and I suspect both are playing their part in this market shift. While 7½ is gaining ground in DTL, it is almost certainly the rise in simulated field shooting's popularity that is bringing about the call on the number eight. But it doesn't matter which discipline is causing what — the fact is that recently shooters have been finding success breaking thirty metre targets with shot smaller than the traditional seven.

In other words, before this ruling on 28 gram loads took effect, many shooters were catching on to the way an eight as a first barrel load is not a bad thing, and, secondly, that at least for a first barrel load a shooter can afford to sacrifice a bit of the pure ranging power of the 325 seven and gain instead from the lower recoil of the 200, as well as the pattern change that comes from the switch to smaller shot.

Whether that smaller shot is to be 7½ or 8 is beside the point; the fact is that sales demonstrate a swing to both of these sizes, and principally in cartridges that recoil less than the 325 standby.

In other words, for two good reasons already, there has been a drift towards the kind of cartridges that the 28 gram ruling must produce. This change to the official rules will be more likely to hurry it on a bit, that's all.

Why do people gain an advantage in using eights?

The reasons is not in pattern density, as many think, but almost certainly in pattern fringe.

When shooting off fifteen metres, I would drop down from sevens without hesitation. The result in the average sort of trap barrel of nominal modified or improved modified boring is likely to be an extra six or maybe ten centimetres of pattern fringe which is stocked with enough pellets to do the job on a clay.

There is no doubt about the centre of the pattern — as anyone who has ever had informal practice shooting straightaways on a mate's property in the bush can tell you; even if you use field loads of fives, when you hold accurately good breaks will result.

The problems occur when your swing is not spot on. At this point, the outer part of the pattern begins to do much more of the work, just as it does when your reflexes are a bit slow on an off day. Targets are really centred a lot less often than people think.

Shooters who look for centre-dense patterns as the one sure way to break targets seem to me to be making a mistake, particularly if they do it with regard to the first barrel.

The smaller shot sizes make it much harder for any choke to deliver such centrally tight patterns. The shot deforms more and the migration of the slightly out-of-round pellets to the outside of the pattern is usually under way nicely at the first barrel ranges of around thirty to thirty-two metres.

This is exactly what eights do; a 65% (improved modified) pattern of sevens will usually turn into a 58-59% (light modified) one when the move is made to the smaller size. That light modified pattern is really getting close to quarter choke — very effective at first barrel trap distances, and, yes, I know the mention of the word 'quarter' in connection with choke will make the average trapshooter shudder with fright.

However, this is what is happening when someone discovers that number eight shot instead of seven will do the job.

And, interestingly, 7½ shot will do it as well. It may not be quite so marked, but there is a noticeable drift down in pattern tightness, and I feel this is the phenomenon that is now becoming more obvious as increasing numbers of shooters are getting away from the number seven that was once the only shot imaginable for all DTL. It isn't all that important whether we're talking about 8 or 7½ — when it's smaller, it begins to break down those possibly too-tight first barrel patterns.

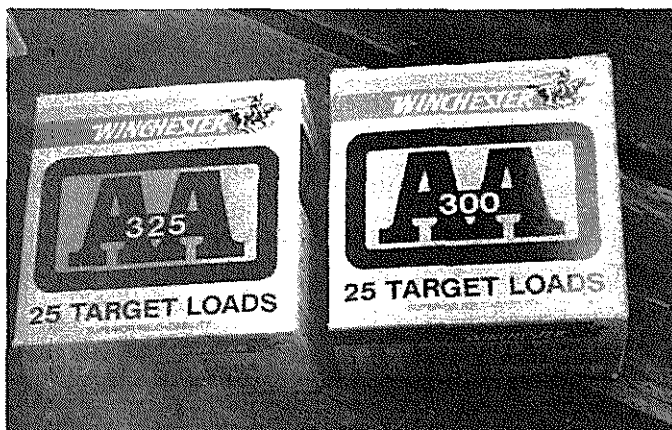
Another thing that must be taken into account here is the way the 28 gram load of 7½ shot carries with it the same pellet count as a 32 gram 7. Within the confines of its slightly shorter range limitations, this load is well able to pulverise clays in the same way the 325 can, because when they're smoked, it's multiple hits that do the damage. Here, the same number of pellets is being used as was always used in the cartridge that people have full confidence in to be able not just to break clays but to smash them.

Second barrel and handicap use, where ranges are going to be longer, bring a different dimension to the discussion.

Don't forget, though, that the 28 gram load is the international benchmark these days. Trench shooters are managing it, and their targets are faster.

In England some time ago an assembly of the best clay shooters who could be brought together put on a demonstration shoot with 28 gram loads at DTL, and the fact is that their scores reflected no difference at all. This should be encouraging to the average shooter.

However, this being said, I have no doubt that as the shooter's handicap increases, the terms of the problem will change.



As conditions require it, shooters find new standard loads. Already the 300 and 325, which have had long-term acceptance, have waiting in the wings a pair of 28 gram replacements, in the form of the Universal and International. It is likely that the range will be extended even further, in the opinion of the author. Probably the need will be demonstrated for a specialist back mark cartridge, at least.

Yes, there is a cutout distance with any gun and load combination; as we all know, the problem in shooting clays at long range is one of getting enough pellets to them.

At some point as the back mark is approached, the gun and load are going to reach their comfortable limit, and then pass it; however, this is not a phenomenon that is only going to be discovered when 28 gram loads supplant 32s. It already exists. If it didn't, wouldn't a lot more of us be shooting off 25 metres?

The thing is that the slightly thinner pattern may be more efficient out of your gun, or it may be less so; the only way to know is to test it. By this I mean that a number seven 32S through a modified choke may give you 60% of its pellets in the thirty inch circle, and this is 235 pellets. But a number seven International through the same barrel may be more efficient in pattern distribution, and give 63% and not 60%. If this is the case, it will put 220 pellets in the circle, losing only fifteen against the 32S instead of the thirty it would lose if it gave the same 60% pattern.

This is only a very marginal difference and you'd be hard pressed to pick it in practice.

Theoretically, I think a good case can be made out for needing 280 pellets in the thirty inch circle at any range at which a target is going to be taken for the shooter to be reasonably sure of a break.

A back marker is going to take his first barrel at about 40 to 42 yards; his second barrel is going to be fired at about 46 to 48 yards.

There are 350 pellets in an ounce of seven shot. It takes an eighty per cent pattern to provide this theoretical strike of 280 at forty yards.

Now, an eighty per cent pattern is not at all exceptional amongst modern combinations of plastic shotcups and tight chokes. However, where the yardage increases to over something like the 20 metre mark, the gun using 28 gram loads would have to be shooting around seven or eight per cent more tightly than a gun shooting a 32 gram 32S if it was to produce similar patterns at this extended range.

Most of us already know handicap shooters who use 36 gram handloads featuring 540 powder; this is one of the best ways to hold patterns together that I know of. When the 28 gram loading is introduced, this will be impossible for two reasons and not just one: these are, the obvious one first, that the shot weight must decrease; the less obvious one is that when it does, this powder with its long and steady pressure curve will no longer be applicable — it needs the heavier shot weight to gain proper ignition.

However, the *principle* operating here is still valid. The serious shooter is going to find it just a bit harder to settle on a longer range load to hold together for a distant second barrel. This is a very specialised shotgunning task. 540 won't be a way to go any more — but the idea stays the same.

It'll be necessary to start looking for ways to keep shot distortion to a minimum, and simultaneously to keep velocities up. This task can be addressed by manipulating powder types, and different cartridges have different powder types in them; Winchester will be looking at replacing the 300 and the 32S — but what with? I suspect that there will be a range of new 28 gram loads that offer greater pressure and velocity variation, and from that range it could be easier than people now think to find loads that hold together rather than open out.

By the same token, I think we're coming into the times when Australian shooters are going to start looking seriously at the merits of in general coaxing better results out of their gear by doing such things as relieving chamber forcing cones.

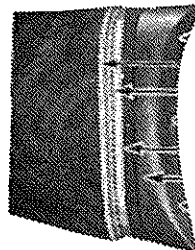
This simple operation can have a very marked effect on the patterning potential of a gun, and it could be just what's called for to gain greater ranging power from a decreased shot load. I've seen it do some remarkable things to patterns.

So, overall you can see that while I think changes will come about from the new ruling, I don't think that there are insurmountable problems that are going to pile up.

I'd argue strongly that it's coming at it from the wrong angle altogether to image that a 32 gram load gives a margin for error that a 28 gram doesn't give. It does give a slightly denser pattern, but the distribution of that pattern, that is, the way the pellets fall in it, is of far greater importance. Reducing a shot load brings about changes in performance that do not just involve the density of the pattern. There are plenty of bad trap cartridges on the loose — they're the ones that plaster the middle of the pattern with a dinner plate size mass that a butterfly couldn't get through, and leave the outer

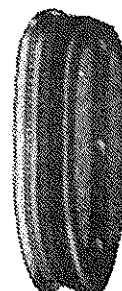

edges of the pattern full of holes. Unless people are testing for it, they often fail to pick up the kind of handicap they're applying to themselves unwittingly by bad ammunition selection. This is so, irrespective of whether or not the absolute shot weight stays the same or changes.

A move such as this could easily drive the more inquiring competitor to look at exactly what's happening by doing a little patterning.

As a place to start, if I were going through this exercise, I'd make the change before the ruling takes effect. I'd think about a 1230 FPS 28 gram load of 8 or 7½ in the first barrel. The 8 would be where I'd begin for fifteen metre work, and the 7½ would come in if I had to start walking backwards.

For a second barrel, if shooting off fifteen metres I'd look for something a bit faster, maybe 1250 or 1270, and I'd start with 7½ there as well, unless I was a very slow, deliberate shot, in which case I'd use 7.

Before making my final selection, I'd be looking to see two simple things. The first barrel would have to be providing me with at least a thirty inch killing circle at 35 yards, and I'd be fussy about how dense the fringe was. If it was at all ragged, I'd go straight to 8s and check that fringe again. If necessary I'd forget to change cartridge again till I found one that wasn't ragged and thin.

The second barrel would have to have 280 strikes in the thirty inch circle at forty yards, and I'd prefer to have 290. (This is best assessed over an average of a series of five shots. Ignore variations — these are normal.)

All that I'd do on butcher's paper, and I'd keep written records of what my testing found.

Then I'd just use the new loads against targets in an extended trial, and I'd compare results against my past performance, which I'd hope to have already recorded.

If I were shooting handicap, then I'd have 7½ in the first, and I'd try to unearth a second barrel cartridge of number 7 that would offer me close to 280 strikes at about 46 yards.

Maybe I'd have to resort to a screw-in choke tube for the second barrel to obtain this.

I'm sure that this kind of experimentation is necessary to get the best out of the lighter loads. I wouldn't be surprised to see a new generation of premium grade 28 gram loads designed with handicap and second work in mind, quite possibly bearing design advances, and carrying specially made shot, high in antimony, and possibly plated with nickel or copper.

I conclude that there could well be a bit of sorting out in the handicap element of trapshooting fairly soon. But overall, a lot of it will be due more to confidence failure than it is to cartridge failure.

However, in a while this will sort itself out, and the shooter who's prepared to do a bit of experimental work will be rewarded perhaps a little more noticeably than he would have been under the old rules — but not much.

It may be a long time before Roma Gun Club can once again claim such a strong, upright person as a member. We extend our condolences to Richard's wife and family.

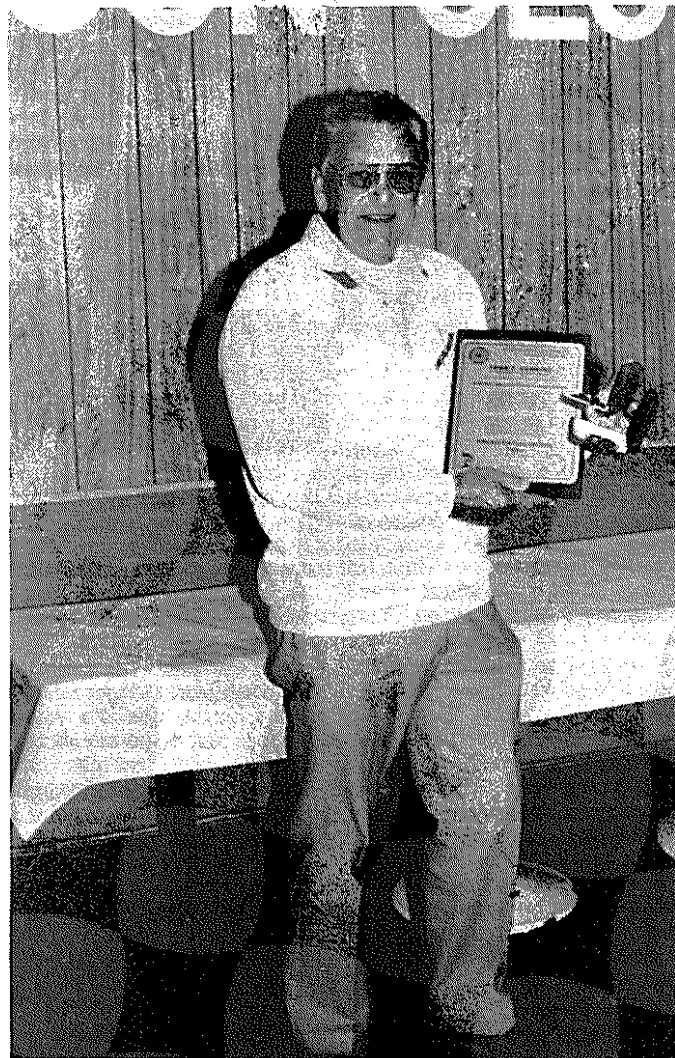
It is certain that it won't be the same for members or visitors to Boort now that Len has gone.

PUBLIC LIABILITY POLICY IN THE INTERESTS OF ALL REGISTERED SHOOTERS SUMMARY

The Public Liability Policy that has been arranged for the ACTA by C E Heath Casualty & General Insurance Limited is designed to provide specific protection for the Association and its registered members.

The ACTA Public Liability Insurance Policy protects the Association and its members from being sued for alleged negligence/blame attaching to an incident causing property damage or bodily injury.

If any person is injured in any way where no blame can be attached to the ACTA and its members, any claims that may be made would not be recognised under the policy conditions as it would be classified as a claim against a policy that the person may have in force on a personal basis or in the case of a registered shooter, a policy arranged for them by the ACTA.

Protection is afforded to the following who, subject to certain conditions, are considered to be members of the ACTA

- 1 State Associations
- 2 Registered Clubs
- 3 Registered Shooters
- 4 Voluntary Workers
- 5 Club Visitors participants and observers
- 6 Life Members/sponsors

1 STATE ASSOCIATIONS — Organising and controlling shooting events in accordance with the rules and regulations of the ACTA.

2 REGISTERED CLUBS — (A) Subject to payment of the prescribed affiliation fee as may be decided by the ACTA from time to time.

(B) Acting in accordance with the rules and regulations of the club (respective) which is operating under the rules and regulations of the State Association and ACTA.

3 REGISTERED SHOOTERS — (A) Subject to the payment of the prescribed registration fee as may be decided by the ACTA from time to time.

(B) Acting in accordance with the rules and regulations of the club (respective) which is operating under the rules and regulations of the State Association and ACTA.

4 VOLUNTARY WORKERS — (A) Acting in accordance with the rules and regulations of the club, State or National Association whilst undertaking their voluntary duties.

(B) Provided always that such voluntary workers are registered as members of the Australian Clay Target Association on the master register maintained by the Australian Clay Target Association with a description of their duties.

Additions or deletions from this master list are to be notified to the ACTA office as they are known.

NOTE: Voluntary workers to be registered with the ACTA are to be restricted to those persons likely to assist on a voluntary basis only. Paid personnel such as trappers, trap mechanics or any other paid staff are subject to the provisions of the Workers Compensation Act and protection must be obtained for them from the appropriate authority.

5 CLUB VISITORS — (Participants and Observers)

(A) Must be registered as such (club visitor) on the register to be maintained by each club for that specific purpose.

(B) Must at all times be under the control and supervision of registered ACTA shooters.

(C) Must be participating in accordance with the rules and regulations of the respective club, State Association and ACTA.

(D) Visitors, other than children who must be under the care of a

responsible person, must at all times sign the visitors' book which must be provided by all clubs for that purpose.

(E) In the event of a visitor or visitors to the club negligently causing injury or damage to any person or property, any actions that may be taken would need to be directed towards the person or persons concerned.

NOTE: Any organised event for participating visitors, such as school children etc. who are not registered with the ACTA must have been officially ratified by your club at a constituted meeting and minuted accordingly. Should this requirement not be complied with then difficulties could and may possibly arise in the event of a claim under the Public Liability Policy.

6 (A) Clubs who have life members or similar, where no affiliation fee is paid to either the club or the ACTA by reason of their inactivity in the sport at Club and/or ACTA level are fully protected under the same conditions as would apply to "registered shooters".

(B) Clubs who may have sponsors or the like attending their premises as "Honorary Members" on a more frequent basis than would be seen to be a visitor are fully protected under the same conditions as would apply to registered shooters.

7 Clubs conducting events that are outside the rules pertaining to regular competition, which are broadly known as "Novelty Events" are fully protected under the terms and conditions of the ACTA Public Liability Policy providing that all other conditions relating to safety etc have been complied with.

This protection extends to shoots conducted between different shooting disciplines such as a combination of clay target and field game.

8 Clubs electing to become Incorporated bodies should be able to use the master ACTA policy to fulfil the requirements of Incorporation, therefore eliminating the need for any club to maintain a Public Liability Policy in addition to the ACTA master policy unless cover in excess of \$2,000,000 is required.

Paid employees must at all times be protected under the Workers Compensation Act.

9 Situations arising that may not be covered in this policy summary will be clarified upon request.

The existing policy therefore extends to all persons likely to be on the grounds for a Club, State or National event.

The need for individual Club or State Associations to undertake a policy of their own is eliminated other than they may require cover for an amount in excess of the existing \$2,000,000.

10 Cover is extended to include

(A) Visitors attending National, State, Zone, International Championships are exempt from the requirement to sign a visitors register

(B) Member to member whilst participating in any event.

(C) Erection, demolition, alterations, additions to buildings including club houses and trap houses for the portion of the work undertaken by voluntary workers. Cover does not extend to any works carried out or undertaken by contractors or sub-contractors.

(D) Registered shooters involved in coaching or instruction are indemnified.

11 All shooting events must be sanctioned under the rules of the National body.

12 **NOTE:** Club shooters, not registered with the ACTA are not covered under any circumstances other than operating as a voluntary

worker at an organised event. This category of shooter-member is solely a club responsibility and insurance cover should be considered at all times as a club expense.

13 FOR INFORMATION: Further extensions included within the policy are member to member, food and drink, care custody and control, medical and welfare facilities, tenants' liability, hoists cranes and unregistered vehicles, car parking, cross liabilities.

14 Clubs on leased premises are indemnified in respect to tenants liability.

Property owners providing leased premises are required to have an existing policy to be indemnified as a property owner.

Clubs hiring premises to a third party are indemnified under the policy.

15 NOTE: The summary details as described have been confirmed by the Association's Insurers, CE Heath Casualty & General Insurance Limited as being an accurate advice to members of the cover contained in the policy document.

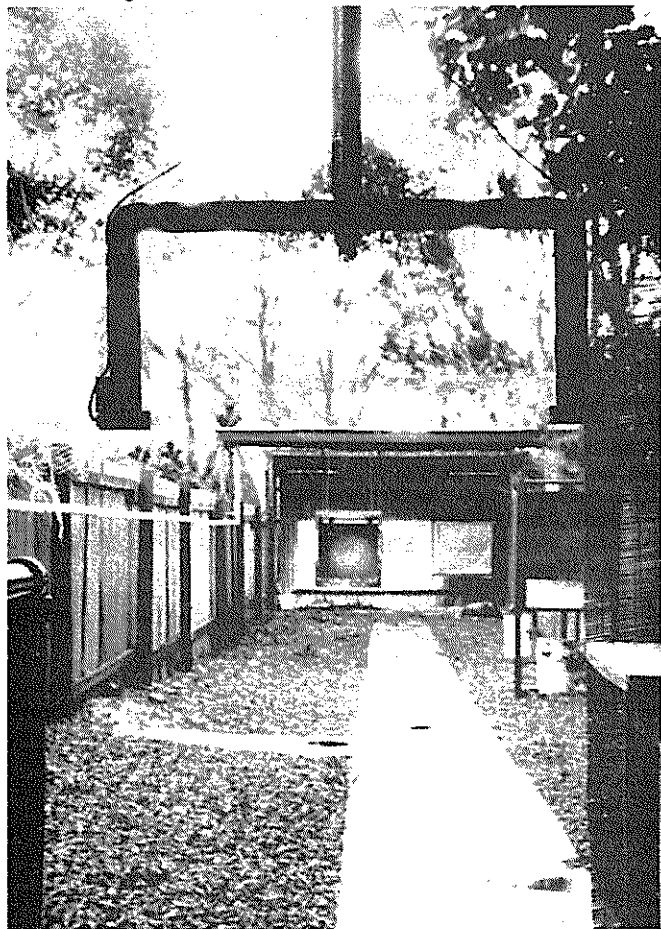

By exhaustive and continuing experiment, cartridge performance can be measured and improvements made to produce a cartridge to suit our Australian conditions.

As a result of these experiments a manufacturing process has been developed in relation to the combination of powder, wad, primer and case that produces the sting in the Scorpio cartridge.

Samples from each batch of manufactured cartridges are test fired to ensure that the measured results are constant.

The Scorpio cartridge is proudly Australian and is exported to our Pacific neighbours. It is not an imitation or replica of an imported cartridge. It is indeed Australian in design and manufacture.

The cost of research and development is not being passed on to the shooter. The expected increases in sales will keep prices down and that sting does not hurt any of us.

We also thank the **AUSTRALIAN INSTITUTE OF SPORT** and **W.A. GOVERNMENT** for the assistance which they provided to enable Australia to host the World Trap and Skeet Championships.

MILDURA GUN CLUB

Mildura Gun Club has now installed the ultimate in Clay Target Shooting by building a 15 trap Olympic Trench layout at the club. The members have installed and built the traps required for the layout. Requiring a phono-pull controller for the new Olympic 15 trap system, the committee decided to investigate the possibilities of incorporating a device that would be able to run a variety of programs.

After consultation with local electronic engineers, an idea evolved to design and manufacture a fully compatible phono-pull controller that would be capable of providing up to sixteen totally separate programs. A successful unit, the first of its type, has finally been completed and commissioned with the following features.

An Olympic 15 Trap with a random index program that will eliminate prediction of trajectories, but still guarantee equal distribution of targets to each shooter. This being, two left, two right, and one centre over five stations per shooter per trap.

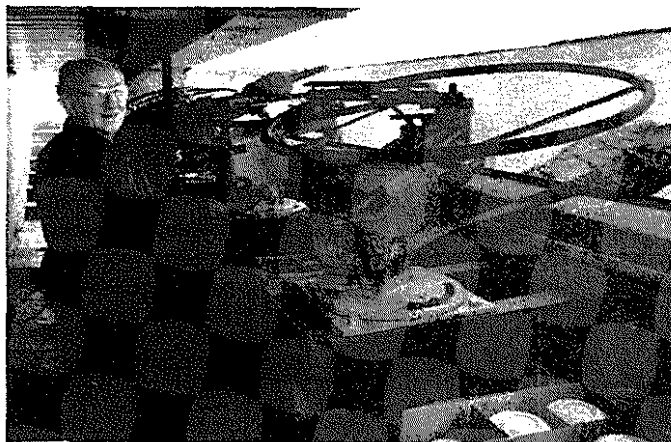
Doubles with a fixed sequence of two targets using only the centre three traps. There are a total of five different doubles programs available as per the regulations.

There are two 5 Trap Universal Trench 25 target programs with roulette facilities to scatter the index before a shoot. This again guarantees a random sequence for each shooter but still maintaining an equal distribution of targets. Two reduce elimination rounds time, two additional programs are provided giving either 15 or 20 targets per shooter while still maintaining equal distribution of targets overall.

Ball Trap may also be selected which makes use of the phono-pull system and operates only the centre trap.

All of the above systems are selected by one switch on the front panel of the unit, but the traps will need to be positioned and adjusted to suit the program. As the unit is software based, it is an easy matter to change or add programs to suit the user.

Features of the unit include a station selector that allows the operator to increment a station at a time using one button. An audible

"beep" plus a liquid crystal display (LCD) clearly indicate to the operator the selected station. To enable the microphone of the selected station to operate, only one other button needs to be pressed. The whole round can be controlled by these two buttons. In the case of a "no target", the shooter has the opportunity to shoot again before the next station is incremented.

The phono-pull section has been designed with an enhanced bandwidth to suit the frequency response of the human voice, but filter out unwanted sounds. The system will operate with adjacent groups shooting without inherent problems. A single adjustment knob sets the microphone level and a "P" is indicated on the LCD panel when a call has initiated the trap. Testing in "MIC" mode will disable the traps, allowing the system to be checked with little inconvenience even during a competition round.

The user panel operates from an internal six volt lantern battery with an expected life of 12 months. This connects to a trap controller in the pit which is powered from the pit battery. To prevent the program sequence being lost should there be an external short or fault, the two units are isolated electronically by infra-red couplers. Light emitting diodes (LEDS) in the pit controller indicate traps that have been initiated, giving a visual indication to the pit operator.

Should the internal battery in the user panel go flat, a fresh battery will restore the unit to working condition without loss of programs. The unit is user friendly with a minimum of controls, but provides maximum flexibility and reliability. Built using micro technology and being fully solid state it requires no maintenance.

The unit is available to clubs interested in purchasing. The cost of same is \$3584. This includes control box, trap controller, microphones excluding stands, and all wiring from control box to microphones and trap controller. The first trophy shoot on the program was won by Russell Mark 35/36, 2nd Len Downie 34/36 and 3rd Darren Murphy 26/27.

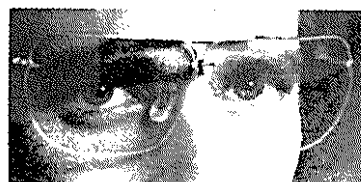
The Crown Hotel Trap Opening Championship saw Ross Walsh from Broken Hill win Overall with 45/50, AA went to Russell Mark

Weapons have played a central role in the evolution of the human race and have, since time immemorial, formed an integral part of the culture of most western societies. The invention and use of weapons led to the development of the teamwork and communication skills that allowed early man to conquer his environment. As human society evolved and our forebears collectivised into groups, tribes, and finally, communities, the use of weapons became an essential skill.

It is impossible to think of, or even begin to understand, early man without reference to the club, the spear and the bow.

Fundamentally there are two ways one can view the human race. One can decide on the basis of the evidence, that the path of human evolution is flawed, or at least incomplete, and as a result violence and aggression have not yet been filtered out of the system, or alternatively, one can believe on the basis of faith, that the Almighty created us just as we are — most of us good and some of us bad.

Whichever theory you prefer there is one thing that both sides agree on — there are quite a few misguided people in this world and when they're not controlled they very frequently make the rest of us suffer.

Weapons (hereafter read "guns") are what the good people of this world need to have on hand to keep the bad people in check. I cannot put it more simply than that.

Now you know this and your local policeman knows it and so does General Norman Schwarzkopf but believe me there are a lot of people who either don't know it or will not face it. There are several names for people who won't face facts. One of the names is "protester". You'll probably be familiar with the term. "Protesters" come in a large range of categories; here's a few easily identifiable ones:

- a Protestors who like using products made of steel, aluminium, chromium, copper, glass etc as long as nobody actually mines the raw materials.
- b Protestors who like guitars, pianos, hi-grade furniture and decks around their pools made from the exotic timber, as long as nobody cuts down any rain forest.
- c Protestors who like driving cars as long as nobody takes up arms to protect the supply of oil, and who enjoy the use of electricity as long as nobody builds any dams to produce it.
- d Protestors who want the world to be lawful and peaceful as long as nobody maintains any armed forces, or uses them to enforce the law or keep the peace.
- e Protestors who want our forests and grasslands free of deer, rabbits and opossums as long as nobody owns or uses any guns to do the job.

You may not have heard of this last category but read on, because they've got their campaign off the ground and they are beginning to build up momentum.

But first a brief run down on "the gun".

Firearms were invented in the 13th century and have in the intervening period been refined into instruments of exceptional accuracy and effectiveness. Men have always been fascinated by technology and take pleasure in manufacturing excellence and craftsmanship. Guns represent a very high standard of both. They are not merely tools — at the very least they are artifacts embodying highly developed skills in metallurgy, machining and ballistics and at best they are functional works of art with a 700 year history.

Most of the protestors neither know this or wish to recognise these facts. To them guns cause apprehension and fear. They're an anachronism whose usefulness has passed. They'd like to see them banned from the community. The protestors are not interested in the history of human conflict except in the negative sense. They show no ability to distinguish between pointless violence and the justifiable use of force. They demand simplistic solutions to complex issues.

Morally guns are neutral. They have been used to win popular revolutions and to suppress them, to topple dictators and to prop them up, to conquer land and to defend it, to commit crimes and to prevent the commission of crimes. Which raises an important point. Firearms are very often effective without actually being pressed into use for deterrence is one of their prime functions. And again, the deterrent factor is neutral. The exclusive possession of guns by those in power in society, be the benign or otherwise, is a strong factor in preserving the status quo.

In general terms the private ownership of guns is permitted in western democracies and forbidden in dictatorships and totalitarian regimes. The societies with the greatest degree of individual freedom such as Sweden, Switzerland, the USA, Australia and New Zealand, have relatively high percentages of firearm owning citizens and tend to be politically stable. Although crime rates are far higher in some of these countries than others the causes are racial and economic. Guns may be used by criminals but in these instances they are the instruments of criminal behaviour, not the cause of it.

To generalise further, those societies that forbid their citizens the ownership of guns tend, historically, to suffer the worst excesses of those who rule them. In the late 20's and early 30's some 15,000,000 unarmed Russian peasants were systematically starved to death by a totalitarian regime. In Germany during the 40's 6,000,000 unarmed Jews were slaughtered, and in Cambodia in the 70's upwards of 1,500,000 unarmed citizens met a similar fate.

There is a perception in the minds of conservative men that disarmed societies are at the mercy of those who govern them: Mao Tse Tung wrote, "Political power comes out of the barrel of a gun". It comes as no surprise that the private ownership of firearms has always been severely curtailed in Eastern Europe and Asia. Eugen Heer, the Director of Swiss Institute of Arms (quoted in NZ Guns, Issue One) said, "If guns are a token of power then in a democracy they belong in the hands of the people". One man sought to repress individual freedom — the other to preserve it. Both men knew what they were talking about.

All of which leave the status of gun ownership in New Zealand where? Before I get into that here's a few personal comments on the way I see life in New Zealand at present. In my opinion we're in trouble. "Those who the Gods destroy they first make mad." A thought provoking quote because evidence of madness is increasingly present in New Zealand society.

A bankrupt student is given \$90,000 to study spiritual communication between pot plants. Members of a gang with a long history of violence are given free travel vouchers to enable them to attend parties in the remote parts of the countryside. The Bank of New Zealand lent \$1,600,000 to businessmen who paid back not a cent, in the process turning itself into the country's biggest welfare beneficiary. The governments, past and present, have sold off nearly

all our assets with the stated intention of reducing our debt while in the same period our debts have increased.

Doctors and lawyers charge an hourly rate not far short of what many single unemployed people receive in a week, while the government contemplates spending our money (which it doesn't have enough of) to build a new law school and continues to subsidise doctors' incomes, allowing them to keep earning substantially more than the public can afford to pay them. For years Cook Strait ferry workers lived in Queenstown or Kaitia and received travel expenses to get them to work! There are countless other examples but I won't go on in this vein. If you're read this far you'll know what I mean.

Our politicians, our academics and our big businessmen, our rulers in other words, have demonstrated a shallowness of intellect that exposed their inability to deal with the problems this economic irrationality has caused. Unemployment, falling living standards, depression and anxiety are all rife in our community to greater or a lesser degree. Rather than confronting these problems many New Zealanders have opted to solve the world's problems instead. The attractive thing about solving the world's problems is that it allows us to adopt a moral attitude without actually having to do anything, or to bear any costs.

We agonise about nuclear weapons, racism in South Africa, disease in Asia, repression in Chile and starvation in Ethiopia. The only common thread linking these "problems" is that none of them have anything to do with the day to day lives of New Zealand's ordinary citizens. Should we turn our attention to, for example, effectively coping with our country's mentally ill? No, that's too hard, let's ban mining in Antarctica instead. Without a coherent national philosophy, and lacking a broadly educated top strata, the country is left adrift at the mercy of its emotions. And its emotions are in turn the plaything of the media. The prime example of this phenomenon is the protest/peace/feminist movement. Let's examine some of their most halloved beliefs.

- The Rugby Union is instrumental in supporting a racist regime in South Africa.

Fact. Rugby administrators have consistently deplored racism in South Africa and, until they were prevented from doing so, insisted that South Africa accept multi-racial teams from New Zealand.

- By banning American ships from its ports, New Zealand has bravely introduced a note of sanity into the world.

Fact. The power of the West's economy, the stability provided by its military might, and the freedoms enjoyed by its citizens have jointly led to the collapse of dictatorships in Eastern Europe and hence to the end of the Cold War. New Zealand's anti-nuclear policy was an irrelevant posturing that, in fact, played no part in these events and served to weaken the Western alliance.

- All men are rapists.

Fact. In a city the size of Auckland with nearly 250,000 adult males, less than 250 rapes are reported annually. Deplorable as this figure may be, it still suggests that 99% of men are not rapists.

- A quarter of all fathers sexually molest their children. (The theme of a recent Telethon.)

Fact. Facts on this are hard to come by but it is now generally agreed that the statement was, and continues to be, an outrageous lie.

The frightening thing is that very large proportions of our society (in some cases more than 50%) urged on by radicals and supported by the media, have been led into believing this kind of nonsense. Educated people have been talked into swallowing these fallacies by a media that has manipulated their emotions to the point where they are unable to form rational opinions. It doesn't take much imagination to see what would happen to gun ownership in this country if the forces opposed to guns decided to organise themselves, which I believe they have now done.

Neither the protestors nor the media are in themselves "bad" perse, but they are shallow and inconsistent, with a slight but persistent liberal and feminist bias. Programs such as a "Foreign Correspondent" for example, are ongoing guilt trips — constantly showing the West in a bad light. Occasionally programs like this partially redress the balance by running a feature on the plight of the people formerly under Communist rule but these are against the trend, and they almost invariably have a sting in their tales — the final message usually is that these people have been conned or abandoned by the West. Our guilt and responsibility for all the world's problems is almost invariably the underlying theme of this type of program.

What has prompted me to write this editorial is my genuine concern that the people that NZ Guns represents, the law abiding firearms owners of New Zealand, are about to come under a major attack on their rights and unless we brace ourselves and prepare for the fight we're going to lose a lot of ground. Here's a run down on recent media events:

1. Following the tragedy at Aramoana, the Auckland Star ran a feature by Gary McCormick calling all gun owners sick children, show offs and braggarts, and calling into question our mental stability.
2. In recent weeks another "Star" columnist, Iain Sharp, deplored gun ownership and suggested that firearms licences should be made as hard to get as pilot's licences.
3. The Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament publicly criticised the Government, in insulting terms, for contributing a medical team to the Gulf, which reveals the CND in its true light as an organisation that would appease a brutal dictator and deny medical attention to the soldiers of the United Nations whose job was to uphold international law. Have a guess which side of the gun's issue the CND is on.
4. TVNZ has just run another documentary on Aramoana, going over once again the semi-auto issue and dwelling at length on the deaths of the children involved.
5. The new film censor has let it be known that she is changing the emphasis of her concern from pornography to violence and, in particular, is gearing up to censor films on the Gulf War. Thus a military victory for the West and for the United Nations is about to be dismissed as merely an exercise in violence.
6. The Broadcasting Commission has just come up with \$100,000 to finance a film about . . . Aramoana. They have found the issue they've been waiting for and they're never going to let it rest.
7. A Christchurch judge has just lectured a newly admitted group of young lawyers on the evils of gun ownership and has floated the idea of removing guns from private possession and storing them in armouries. And don't think he is just talking about semi-autos, he is on about hunting rifles and shotguns as well.
8. TVNZ has just run another documentary on, of all things, the Mi Lai massacre. It happened 23 years ago and has no bearing on current events but it had the images they were looking for — American soldiers, automatic weapons, and dead children.

These events remind me all too clearly of the way the media handled the Falklands War. We heard virtually nothing about the fact that the war brought to an end the corrupt rule of a bunch of colonels who were killing Argentina's political dissenters by the thousands. What we did get was two separate hour long documentaries about a British soldier who got burned.

It is time to start fighting back. We are all going to have to become political if we want to retain our firearms in private ownership. Without a collective effort the 330,000 gun owners of this country are going to become an endangered species. I want to make it clear that I am not talking about the recent bans on semi-autos or various types of knives. These issues have already been lost. What I am saying is that it's not going to stop there. The protest/liberal/peace/feminist banning mentality is building up steam. Groups of protestors have already tried to disrupt the duck season. They will be back in force next year. They're on a roll and their confidence, and simplistic self-righteousness, is growing by the day.

What can you do about it? Here is a short list:

1. Don't let others put you down or categorise you because you enjoy the ownership and use of guns. If you are a law abiding citizen and you store and use your gun sensible you have nothing to feel guilty about.
2. Join a shooting club. Be it a small bore or centrefire club, pistol or shotgun club there is strength in numbers. You will get to meet people from all walks of life with whom you share a common bond.
3. Join Shooter's Rights. This organisation has your interests at heart.
4. Write to the media (TV or Press) whenever they feature obviously biased or emotionally charged anti-gun items. This should keep you busy because there's a lot of it about.

Finally it wouldn't be a bad idea to pass this magazine on to your friends.

It is felt that as this form of shooting is entirely different to ISU shooting, the choice of loads should be left with the shooter as to what load they would like to shoot. About 90% of shooters are concerned that, if we are forced to use only 1oz loads, we will lose a lot of shooters to other forms of shooting, such as Field and Game.

I feel that as most shooters shoot clay targets for the enjoyment and pleasure of shooting, we have enough restrictions on us now, so I am sure that the choice of loads should be left with the shooter.

I ask all concerned shooters to write into 'Editors Mailbox' so that, through weight of numbers, a decision can be reached to benefit all shooters.

In case you are not aware there are other shooting bodies in existence that shoot clay targets, not just the ACTA.

I also would like to know what group of shooters the above quango had the detailed discussions with.

If 28gm loads become compulsory then handicap shooting as we know it today will be a thing of the past tomorrow. Can you imagine shooters using 28gm loads from handicap marks beyond 20 metres? Only if they want to throw their money away.

I would also like to know the reasoning for the change to 28gm loads as none to date have been given.

It cannot be for the noise level as there is no difference between 28gm and 32gm loads. In actual fact some of the 28gm loads being imported into Australia are louder than any 32gm load.

To get good powder burn you have to use more powder for 28gm loads, good for the powder manufacturer, not so for the reloader.

It cannot be for uniformity, if it was then everybody should be made to use "model X" shotgun with exactly the same characteristics.

Trench and ISU skeet shooters are required by international rules to use 28gm loads. What we have here is a domestic situation, the vast majority of shooters are not interested in shooting these other two varieties of our sport.

Perhaps that's where the problem lies, perhaps the ISU section of the sport should become its own identity and be joined to the ACTA by application only. That way the average DTL shooter can then get on with improving their score. Let us not forget it is only a SPORT.

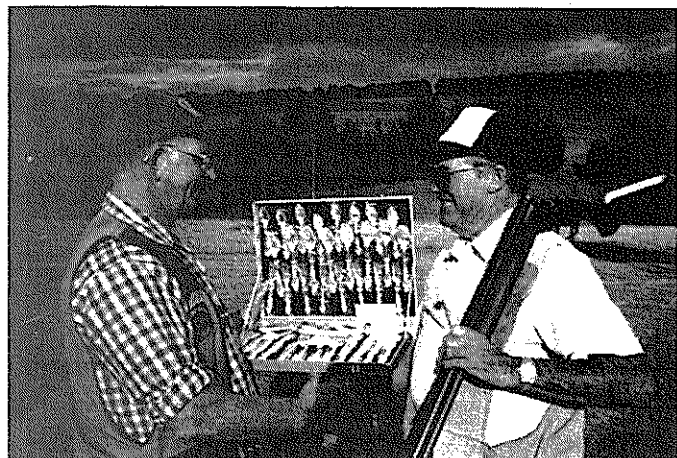
